TOP EU LEADERS IN INDIA; major EU-India trade deal on cards

NEW DELHI (TSIT): European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen and European Council President Antonio Costa are on a state visit to India, setting the stage for a significant deepening of India-European Union relations, with the much-anticipated EU-India Free Trade Agreement (FTA) — described by von der Leyen as the “mother of all trade deals” — expected to be announced during their visit. The two leaders were accorded a ceremonial welcome and guard of honour in New Delhi on Sunday. They will attend the 77th Republic Day Parade as Chief Guests and hold bilateral talks with Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Tuesday during the 16th India-EU Summit.

External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar met the visiting leaders and expressed confidence that the discussions with Prime Minister Modi would “herald a new chapter in India-European Union relations.” Von der Leyen said India and Europe



have chosen strategic partnership, dialogue and openness, demonstrating that cooperation is possible even in a fractured global environment.

The proposed EU-India FTA, expected to be announced on January 27, aims to eliminate tariffs on over 90% of traded goods and could boost bilateral trade from the current \$136 billion to over \$200 billion within a decade. The agreement is seen as a strategic move to diversify global supply chains amid growing trade uncertainties and potential tariff hikes elsewhere. In addition to trade, the summit is expected to announce a new Security

and Defence Partnership, expanding cooperation in maritime security, cyber defence and counter-terrorism. Indian companies are likely to gain access to the EU's €50 billion SAFE defence preparedness programme, allowing them to participate in European defence value chains.

Both sides are also expected to sign a Mobility Framework MoU, facilitating easier movement of Indian professionals, students, researchers and skilled workers to Europe, while addressing skill shortages within the EU.

European leaders have described India as “indispensable” to Europe's eco-

omic resilience, particularly in sectors such as clean technologies, pharmaceuticals and semiconductors. A new India-EU Comprehensive Strategic Agenda 2030 is also expected to be adopted, outlining cooperation across trade, security, climate action, digital transition and people-to-people ties. During the visit, the EU leaders will meet President Droupadi Murmu and participate in an India-EU Business Forum. India and the EU have been strategic partners since 2004, with ties significantly expanding following the visit of the EU College of Commissioners to India in February 2025.

The visit underscores the growing importance of India-EU relations, rooted in shared democratic values, a rules-based international order and commitment to multilateralism, as both sides look to strengthen economic, strategic and geopolitical cooperation in an evolving global landscape.

2 from Telangana named among 2026 Padma Shri awardees



New Delhi (TSIT): Two from Telangana were among 45 individuals from across India chosen for the Padma Shri award in the ‘unsung heroes’ category on Sunday, January 25. Dr. Kumarasamy Thangaraj is a senior scientist at the Centre for Cellular and Molecular Biology (CCMB) in Hyderabad, and has been recognised for his decades of research in human genetics and tracing human migration from Africa to India.

Whereas, Rama Reddy Mamidi has been selected for his work in animal husbandry and the dairy sector. Other awardees include Anke Gowda from Karnataka, a former bus conductor, who set up the world's largest free-access library, ‘Pustak Mane’, compris-

ing more than two million books in 20 languages along with rare manuscripts.

The 75-year-old bibliophile from Haralahalli village near Mysuru has been chosen for the Padma Shri for his unique effort to empower learners across India. Joining him will be Armida Fernandes, the Mumbai-based paediatrician who set up Asia's first human milk bank, improving the survival prospects of infants. Bundeli war art trainer Bhagwandas Raikwar from Madhya Pradesh, Bhiklya Ladakya Dhinda, a 90-year old tribal Tappa player – a musical instrument made of bottle gourd and bamboo – from Maharashtra, and distinguished social worker from Jammu and Kashmir, Brij Lal Bhat, among others.



No place for Hindi in TN then, now and forever: Stalin

CHENNAI (TSIT): DMK President and Chief Minister M K Stalin on Sunday hailed the “Language Martyrs” of the state who sacrificed their lives during the anti-Hindi agitation in the past and asserted that there was “no place” for the language here forever.

Paying tributes on the occasion of Language Martyrs Day, he said, “a state that loved its language like its life, unitedly struggled against Hindi imposition; protested with the same intensity every time it was imposed.”

“Language Martyrs Day; there is no place for Hindi then, now and forever (in TN),” the Dravidian party chief said in a social media post.

He shared a brief video of the history related to the anti-Hindi agitation, which peaked during 1965, that included references to the ‘martyrs’, besides the contributions of late DMK stalwarts, CN Annadurai and M Karunanidhi in the language issue.

Tamil Nadu, by leading the anti-Hindi agitation, “safeguarded the right and identity of various linguistic national races in the sub-continent,” Stalin added. “I pay my grateful respects to those martyrs who gave their precious lives for Tamil. No more life will be lost in the language war; our love for Tamil will never die! We shall oppose Hindi imposition forever.”

Language Martyrs is a reference to those who had sacrificed their lives, mainly by self-immolation, during the anti-Hindi agitation across Tamil Nadu in 1964-65.

Till this day, the southern state follows the Two Language formula—Tamil and English, even as the DMK has been alleging Hindi imposition through the Centre's NEP 2020.

Meanwhile, AIADMK chief Edappadi K Palaniswami and Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam leader Vijay also paid tributes to the Language Martyrs. “Mother Tamil is equal to our life,” Palaniswami, also state Leader of Opposition, said in a social media post.

India messenger of peace in conflict ridden world: Prez Murmu in R-Day Address

New Delhi (TSIT) Amidst geopolitical tensions escalating across multiple continents, President Droupadi Murmu on Sunday said India is spreading the message of peace in the world which is crucial to secure the future of humanity. In her address to the nation on the eve of 77th Republic Day, she spoke about various issues, including Operation Sindoor and women empowerment, and also touched upon the topics of Vande Mataram and growing economy of the country.

President Murmu outlined India's position as a “messenger” of peace while reinforcing ancient civilisational commitment to universal harmony. “In our tradition, we have been offering prayers for peace to prevail in the entire universe. The future of humanity can remain secure only if there is peace in the whole world.”



India votes against UNHRC Resolution on Iran

New Delhi: India voted against a UN Human Rights Council (UNHRC) Resolution which condemned the recent crackdown on protesters in Iran by the Iranian government. India was among seven countries which voted against the Resolution brought by an independent Fact-Finding Mission on Iran. The other six countries which voted against are China, Pakistan, Cuba, Indonesia, Vietnam and Iraq.

The Resolution was passed by the 47-member UNHRC with 25 votes in favour, 14 abstentions and seven against. Iran's Ambassador to India, Mohammed Fathali, thanked India for its “principled and firm support” to Iran. “I extend my sincere gratitude to the Govt. of India for its principled and firm support of I.R. of Iran at the UN_HRC, including opposing an unjust and politically motivated resolution. This stance reflects India's commitment to justice, multilateralism, and national sovereignty,” Ambassador Fathali said on X. The Human Rights Council in its 39th special session on the “deteriorating human rights situation in the Islamic Republic of Iran,” strongly “deplored the violent crackdown of peaceful protests” resulting in the deaths of thousands of persons, including children, and large numbers of injured individuals, as well as the arrest of thousands in connection with the nationwide protests that started on December 28, 2025.

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Thousands Participate in MGNREGA Bachao Sangram Yatra in Hyderabad



Hyderabad (TSIT) Thousands of people participated in the MGNREGA Bachao Sangram Yatra organised in Hyderabad, protesting against the alleged dilution of the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) scheme by the government.

The rally was led by Khairatabad (Hyderabad Central) District Congress Committee President, Motha Rohith Mudhiraj. The march commenced from the Rajiv Gandhi statue opposite the Secretariat and proceeded up to the Indira Gandhi statue.

Addressing the gathering, Congress leaders demanded that the government protect the constitutional rights of the poor and ensure the effective

implementation of the MGNREGA scheme without weakening its provisions. They asserted that MGNREGA is a lifeline for millions of poor families and any attempt to dilute it would adversely impact their livelihoods.

New Delhi (TSIT) On Republic Day eve, the government announced 131 Padma awards for the year 2026, including five Padma Vibhushan, 13 Padma Bhushan and 113 Padma Shri which include two cases in which the award for two individuals is counted as one. The Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) said. Former Kerala Chief Minister and veteran communist leader V. S. Achuthanandan and actor Dharmendra have been awarded the second-highest civilian honour, Padma Vibhushan, posthumously for 2026, a government statement said Sunday.

Former Supreme Court judge KT Thomas for public affairs, Hindustani Classical musician and violinist N Rajam in Art, eminent Malayalam journalist P Narayanan in literature and education have been awarded Padma Vibhushan, it said. Playback singer Alka Yagnik, former Uttarakhand chief minister Bhagat Singh Koshyari, actor Mammooty and banker Uday Kotak are among those



awarded Padma Bhushan, the Home Ministry said.

Ad guru Piyush Pandey, JMM founder Shibu Soren and BJP leader VK Malhotra have been awarded Padma Bhushan, while actor and comedian Satish Shah has been awarded Padma Shri, posthumously, it said.

Ninety awardees are women and the list includes six persons from the category of foreigners, NRI, PIO and OCI, and 16 post-humous awardees, it said.

Tennis legend Vijay Amritraj has been awarded Padma Bhushan; cricketer Rohit Sharma, women's cricket captain Harmanpreet Kaur and

hockey player Savita Punia have been awarded Padma Shri, the statement said.

Former JNU VC M Jagadeesh Kumar, former Prasar Bharti CEO Shashi Shekhar Vempati and actors R Madhavan and Prosenjit Chatterjee are also among those awarded Padma Shri, the ministry said.

Hyderabad, January 25, TSIT: The state government has made large-scale arrangements to protect the health of lakhs of devotees who come to the Medaram fair.

On the one hand, providing safe fresh water, carrying out sanitation programmes, taking measures to prevent water pollution in Jampanna river and providing medical facilities on a large scale. A 50-bed super specialty hospital has been set up in the TTD Kalyana Mandapam near the Medaram Jataara main venue, and special medical camps have been set up in 30 areas.

The Health Department has deployed 5192 medical and para-medical personnel to prevent any kind of trouble during the fair. 649 medical officers to provide 24 hours medical services during the fair.

154 AYUSH Medical Officers, 673 Nursing Officers,

1905 ASHA Workers, 1111 Paramedical Staff, 331 Supervisory Staff, 700 other staff specially appointed.

Even after the end of the fair, arrangements were made to organize 10 medical camps to prevent any health problems to the local tribes.

In addition to these, the CSC hospitals of Eturunagaram, Mulugu, Pasra, Govindarao Pet and Mangapeta around Medaram have been strengthened.

325 skimmers, lifeguards for safe bathing in Jampanna river : Devotees who come to Medaram must take holy bath in Jampanna river. A total of 325 personnel of safe swimmers, Singareni and SDRF personnel have been deployed

along the length of the Jampanna river to avoid accidental falls in the Jampanna river.

Among them, 210 swimmers, 12 members of the Singareni Rescue Team, by the Fisheries Department, There are 100 SDRF team members.

All of them were given life jackets, special T-shirts, search lights and life saving equipment. 268 personnel to avoid fire accidents : The state fire department has made elaborate arrangements to prevent any fire in the entire premises of the fair. 15 fire brigades, 12 mist bullets and two fire engines were deployed in the fair premises. A total of 268 fire personnel will be on duty.

Hyderabad District gets 313 NCC Cadets as first responders under YAMS

Hyderabad, Jan 25 (UNI) Hyderabad is set to receive a trained pool of 313 National Cadet Corps (NCC) volunteers as first responders for disaster management following the successful completion of the first Yuva Aapda Mitra Training Camp at 68 Medium Regiment, Bowenpally.

Organised by 1 Telangana Battalion NCC and Revenue (Disaster Management) Department, Government of Telangana, the camp placed significant emphasis on disaster preparedness and response, reflecting the state's vulnerability to natural disasters such as earthquakes and floods. Of the total trained cadets, 151 are girl cadets, highlighting strong female participation in community-based disaster response initiatives, a defence release said here on Sunday. The central component of the camp was the Yuva Aapda Mitra training module conducted by the Revenue (Disaster Management) Department, State Disaster Response Force (SDRF), National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) and other line departments. Through a combination of theoretical instruction and hands-on exercises, SDRF, NDRF and other line departments resource persons trained the cadets in disaster preparedness, basic search and rescue operations, first aid, casualty evacuation, and coordination with civil authorities during emergencies.

Special focus was placed on region-specific disaster scenarios relevant to Telangana's terrain and climatic conditions. Officials noted that such targeted training would enable cadets to respond effectively during emergencies and support local administrations in mitigating disaster impacts. The camp concluded with a formal closing ceremony attended by NCC officers and resource personnel representatives. Addressing the cadets, the officials underscored the importance of trained youth in disaster risk reduction and in strengthening community resilience, particularly in a disaster-prone state like Telangana.

BRS demands cancellation of all tenders of Singareni Collieries



Hyderabad, Jan 25 : Alleviating massive corruption in public sector undertaking Singareni Collieries under the Revanth Reddy government in Telangana, BRS leader and former minister T. Harish Rao has demanded immediate cancellation of all tenders issued under the site visit certificate.

The Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) leader told the media on Sunday that Chief Minister Revanth Reddy is the key person behind the Singareni scam, while his brother-in-law, Srujan Reddy, acted as the main beneficiary.

Harish Rao, who is the deputy floor leader of BRS in the Telangana Assembly, said the cancellation of the Naini tender itself proves that serious irregularities had taken place. Harish Rao accused the government of changing tender rules to favour select contractors linked to the Chief Minister and demanded a judicial or Central Bureau of

Investigation (CBI) probe into all coal and solar tenders issued in Singareni.

The former minister said that instead of giving clear answers on corruption, Deputy Chief Minister Bhatti Vikramarka showed unrelated documents at a recent press conference to mislead people.

Harish Rao questioned why tenders finalised in January at 7 per cent below the estimated cost, without site visit conditions, were later reissued in May with new conditions and awarded at rates higher than estimates.

Harish Rao referred to Bhatti Vikramarka's statement asking him to submit a letter so that the issue could be discussed with the Chief Minister.

"When we are clearly stating that the Chief Minister is the architect of this scam and his brother-in-law is the first beneficiary, what purpose will such discussions serve?" he asked. The BRS leader stated that Singareni

belongs to the people of Telangana and not to any individual, minister, or group of contractors.

He pointed out that three basic questions remain unanswered — who is responsible for the scam, how much financial loss occurred, and who benefited from it.

The former minister said that tender conditions were changed without holding mandatory meetings with contractors or recording minutes.

He alleged that instead of protecting Singareni's interests, attempts are being made to shield the Chief Minister and his relatives from scrutiny.

Harish Rao said claims that the site visit certificate system existed earlier are misleading.

He said that in January 2025, Bhupalpally works were awarded through reverse auction at 7 per cent below the estimated cost without site visit conditions.

"But within three months, in May 2025, the same government introduced the condition for VK OC tender. Competition dropped, and the work was awarded at higher rates to the Chief Minister's relative-linked company," he alleged.

Harish Rao said the first beneficiary of the site visit certificate system was Srujan Reddy's Shodha Constructions.

He alleged that after May 2025, all OB tenders were controlled by one individual acting as a "ring master."

Harish Rao demanded cancellation of all tenders finalised through the site visit certificate system, not just the Naini block tender.

Democracy Thrives on Responsible Voting: Telangana Governor

Hyderabad: Telangana Governor Jishnu Dev Varma on Sunday urged citizens to exercise their voting rights responsibly, stating that democracy remains strong only when people participate with awareness and integrity.

Addressing the 16th National Voters' Day celebrations at Ravindra Bharathi, Hyderabad, the Governor said the theme "My India, My Vote" underlines the central role of citizens



in Indian democracy. National Voters' Day is observed on January 25 every year to mark the formation of the Election Commission of India

(EC). Referring to Article 324 of the Constitution, the Governor highlighted the independence and impartiality of the Election Commission in conducting free and fair elections.

Quoting Dr. B.R. Ambedkar and Mahatma Gandhi, he said political democracy can sustain only when supported by social democracy and ethical participation by voters. He

Hyderabad police to deal firmly with digital blackmail, cyberstalking

Hyderabad, Jan 25 : Hyderabad Police Commissioner V. C. Sajjanar said on Sunday that harassment of women, particularly digital blackmail and cyberstalking, will be dealt with firmly and without compromise.

"No offender should assume anonymity or technology will shield them from the law. We will pursue every complaint with seriousness and ensure strict legal action," the Commissioner said. SHE Teams of Hyderabad police resolved over 1,100 complaints and apprehended over 3,800 miscreants in a year.

Using a combination of undercover surveillance, decoy operations, and technical expertise, the specialised wing of the city police apprehended 3,826 individuals caught red-handed for various forms of harassment in 2025. Sajjanar reiterated that women's safety



remains a non-negotiable priority for the Hyderabad police.

Urging women not to suffer in silence, he stated that fear of stigma or exposure should never deter victims from seeking help. "Your identity

and dignity will be protected. Confidentiality is our responsibility, and the police will stand with every woman who approaches us," he added, assuring a swift response and victim-centric handling of com-

plaints.

Sajjanar said that an analysis of cases registered during the year pointed to a worrying rise in cyber-related offences. Blackmail emerged as the most common complaint, with

366 victims seeking assistance.

Offenders typically befriended women on social media platforms such as Facebook and Instagram, gained their trust, and later misused recorded video calls or private photographs to extort money or sexual favours. In several cases, former partners used old images to threaten victims, often attempting to disrupt their future marriages or personal lives.

Police also observed a rise in what they termed "psychological voyeurism," where offenders exploit the anonymity of digital platforms to harass women. The SHE Teams resolved 121 cases of midnight harassment through internet calls and 82 cases involving fake profiles and the circulation of obscene content on WhatsApp.

At least 50 women reported severe mental distress due to repeated abusive calls from

untraceable numbers, which were later identified using forensic analysis. The teams further handled 98 cases of breach of promise to marry, where men allegedly exploited women emotionally, physically, or financially under the pretext of marriage before abandoning them.

Psychological counselling was provided to the victims, and criminal proceedings were initiated against the accused.

Apart from complaint-based action, the SHE Teams maintained a strong preventive presence on the ground. Fifteen teams operating in plain clothes conducted surveillance and decoy operations at bus stations, colleges, and other crowded public places. Of the 3,826 individuals apprehended, most were counselled along with their family members, while serious cases led to FIRs, arrests, and judicial custody.

He pointed out that the region has long struggled with severe drought due to its red and sandy soil and erratic rainfall patterns. “The soil here is red and sandy. This is

the reason people face water scarcity. Many regions do not witness rainfall for long periods. Many a times, people even compare Anantapur with the drought conditions of a desert,” the Prime Minister said. He said that to address the problem, residents took a pledge to clean reservoirs and, with administrative support, launched the ‘Ananta N e e r u Samarakshanam’ project. The Prime Minister noted that more than 10 reservoirs have been revived under the initiative and are now filled with water. Over 7,000 trees have also been planted, leading to an increase in green cover. “In Anantapur, along with water conservation, greenery has also increased. Children can now enjoy swimming here. In a way, the entire ecosystem has blossomed again,” he said. Prime Minister Modi also shared a video clip of the water conservation efforts in Anantapur on X, along with a post in Telugu. “I congratulate the people of Anantapur in Andhra Pradesh who are working to rejuvenate water tanks,” he wrote.

Bhu Bharati’ to ensure land security for farmers

Khammam (TSIT): The Telangana government aims to digitise every inch of land and provide permanent ownership security to farmers, said Revenue, Housing and Information Minister Ponguleti Srinivasa Reddy on Sunday. He stated that the Bhu Bharati Act has been introduced to resolve complications created under the previous government’s Dharani portal and to make land administration farmer-friendly. Speaking after distributing appointment letters to licensed surveyors at the Khammam Collectorate (IDOC), the Minister said the government has replaced outdated survey practices with advanced rover technology, ensuring accuracy up to centimetre-level measurements. He said 600 rovers



have been procured and supplied to districts, and 5,500 trained licensed surveyors have been deployed across mandals based on land extent. In Khammam district, appointment letters were issued to 47 surveyors selected in the second phase. The Minister said forensic audits into irregularities under the Dharani system have already been completed in Sircilla and Siddipet districts, and the reports are under government review. Similar audits will soon be conducted in the remaining 31 districts, he added, dismissing opposition allegations over land registrations as baseless.

SC issues notice to Centre, CBI, RBI

New Delhi, Jan 25: The Supreme Court has sought responses from the Centre, the CBI and others on a plea filed by a 78-year-old retired banker who was duped of Rs 23 crore after allegedly being put under “digital arrest” for nearly a month. A bench of Chief Justice Surya Kant and Justice Joymalya Bagchi has issued notices to the Union of India, Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI), Reserve Bank of India (RBI) and others on the plea filed by Naresh Malhotra.

The plea has sought directions to the banks involved to deposit the defrauded amount of Rs 22.92 crore in the petitioner's accounts. Malhotra has made the Kotak Mahindra Bank, HDFC Bank, Axis Bank, ICICI Bank, Indus Ind Bank, City Union Bank and Yes Bank parties to the case. Cyber fraudsters posing as Enforcement Directorate (ED) and CBI officials duped the retired banker from south Delhi's Gulmohar Park area of Rs 23 crore by allegedly putting him under “digital arrest” for

nearly a month. The accused allegedly told the victim that his Aadhaar card was involved in narcotics trafficking, terror funding and the Pulwama terror attack, and confined him to his flat under the pretext of investigation, an officer said. “The scammers directed him not to step out of his house and coerced him into transferring his savings to various bank accounts over a span of a month,” police said. According to police, the victim has stated in his complaint

that the ordeal began August 4 last year, when he received a call from a man claiming to be a Mumbai Police officer. The caller accused him of being linked to a drug-trafficking racket. Subsequently, fraudsters impersonating ED and CBI officials also contacted him. “Out of fear, the victim complied with their instructions and kept transferring money from his bank accounts to the accounts specified by the fraudsters. The accused also threatened the victim of dire consequences if he revealed the matter to anyone,” police added. Realising that he was duped, Malhotra got a complaint lodged on the National Cyber-crime Reporting Portal (NCRP) September 19 last year, following which the matter was transferred to the Intelligence Fusion and Strategic Operations (IFSO) unit. Police had said an FIR was registered and Rs 12.11 crore of the cheated amount were frozen in various bank accounts.

Over 70 fugitives wanted by India located abroad during 2024-25: Report

New Delhi, Jan 25: Over 70 fugitives, wanted by India, were located abroad during 2024-25, according to an official report. As many as 203 fugitives wanted by other countries were detected/located in India during the same period. A total of 71 “wanted persons/fugitives wanted by India” were located abroad in 2024-25, according to the annual report of the Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances and Pensions. The number of such wanted fugitives located abroad is the highest in the over a decade time, officials claimed. A total of 27 fugitives/wanted persons returned to India, from abroad in the last financial year, said the ministry's annual report for 2024-25.

It also gave details on the working of the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI), which acts as the National Central Bureau (NCB) – the nodal point for Interpol in India. During the period of April, 2024 to March, 2025, 74 Letters Rogatory (LRs) were sent abroad, out of which 54 pertained to CBI cases and 20 of them to state law enforcement and other central agencies, the report said. It was confirmed by Indian law enforcement agencies including CBI that 47 LRs were fully executed during the said period and 29 were disposed of as closed/withdrawn on partial execution. As March 31, 2025, a total 533 LRs were pending with other countries, out of which 276 pertained to CBI cases and 257 to state police and other central law enforcement agencies. As many as 32 LRs/treaty based requests were received from various countries requesting to provide assistance in the investigation of criminal matters.

T'gana: 900 strays killed so far, sarpanch booked

Hyderabad, Jan 25: In a fresh incident of alleged stray dogs killing in Telangana, about 300 canines were allegedly killed in Jagtial district, taking the toll to 900, animal rights activists claimed. The killings are suspected to have been carried out by some elected representatives, including Sarpanchs, allegedly to fulfil promises made to villagers ahead of gram panchayat elections held in December last year, to address the stray dog menace. The latest incident came to light after a complaint was lodged, alleging that 300 stray dogs were killed in Pegadapally village by administering poison-



ous injections January 22. Blaming the village Sarpanch and Gram Panchayat secretary for the gruesome act, the complaint alleged that the former hired few individuals to kill the strays. Based on the complaint, police registered an FIR against the duo under relevant sections of BNS and Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, police said Saturday.

Inspector Ch Kiran said, during the inquest, around 70 to 80 dog carcasses were exhumed from the burial site. The burial appeared to have taken place three to four days ago. “At this stage, we cannot confirm the involvement of the accused persons in the incident,” he said, adding that post-mortem reports were awaited and further investigation was in progress. In January alone, several incidents of stray dog killings were reported in the state. As per the complaint lodged by animal rights activists, 100 dogs were allegedly poisoned to death at Yacharam village near here January 19 though 50 carcasses were found immediately.

Unapologetic on Op Sindoor: Tharoor on issues with Cong

Kozhikode (Kerala), Jan 25: Congress MP Shashi Tharoor Saturday said he has never violated the party's stated positions in Parliament, asserting that his only public disagreement in principle was over Operation Sindoor. Answering questions during a session at the Kerala Literature Festival here, Tharoor said he had taken a strong stand on that issue and remained “unapologetic”. His statement comes amidst recent reports stating “Tharoor's differences with the party leadership”, with a speculation that he is upset over Congress leader Rahul Gandhi not adequately acknowledging his presence at a recent event in Kochi and over alleged repeated attempts by state leaders to sideline him. Explaining his position, Tharoor said that, as an observer and writer, he had written a newspaper column after the Pahalgam incident, stating that it should not go unpunished and that there should be a kinetic response. Earlier, answering questions during a session at the Kerala Literature Festival here, Tharoor said he had taken a strong stand on 'Operation Sindoor' and remained “unapologetic,” about it. Explaining his position, Tharoor said that as an observer, commentator and writer, he had written a newspaper column after the Pahalgam terror attack, stating that it should not go unpunished and that there should be a kinetic response. He said that while India is focused on development, it should not be dragged into a prolonged conflict with Pakistan, and that any action should be limited to targeting terrorist camps. Tharoor said that to his surprise, the Indian government did exactly what he had recommended. “How could I be expected to



criticise it when I myself recommended it. I supported it fully throughout Operation Sindoor and afterwards,” he said. When the government sent him abroad as part of a multi-party delegation over Operation Sindoor, his party, for some reason, did not like it. “You can speak to them and find out,” he said. Tharoor said it was Jawaharlal Nehru who posed the famous question: “Who lives if India dies.” “When India is at stake, when India's security and its place in the world are involved, India comes first,” he said. He added that political parties may have differences as part of the process of building a better India, but when national interests are involved, India must prevail. Terrorists had gunned down 26 people, mostly tourists, in Jammu and Kashmir's Pahalgam in April 2025, sending shockwaves across the country. In response, India launched Operation Sindoor, a precision military offensive targeting terror launchpads in Pakistan.

CBSE mandates mental health, career counselors in all affiliated schools

New Delhi: In a significant policy reform aimed at strengthening students' mental health and providing them with career guidance, the Central Board of Secondary Education has made the appointment of socio-emotional and career counsellors mandatory in all affiliated schools. For this, the national education board amended Clause 2.4.12 of the CBSE Affiliation Bye-Laws, 2018, following a Public Interest Litigation (PIL) filed before the Rajasthan High Court in July 2025 by Kota-based advocate Sujet Swami and some psychology experts. The PIL highlighted rising mental health challenges among students, including academic stress and lack of structured career guidance, and sought mandatory provisions for qualified counsellors and a uniform mental health support framework in schools.

Techie death: Accident site draws curious crowds

Residents and commuters were seen peering into the area of Noida's Sector 150 and asking security personnel and media persons whether it was the same location where the software engineer was allegedly pleading for help for hours after his car plunged into the ditch

Noida, Jan 25: A grim curiosity surrounds the spot in Noida where a 27-year-old techie drowned last week in a water-filled trench, as passers-by stop to inquire and take pictures of the site, while questioning the role and responsibility of civic authorities. Residents and commuters were seen peering into the area of Noida's Sector 150 and asking security personnel and media persons whether it was

the same location where the software engineer was allegedly pleading for help for hours after his car plunged into the ditch. Many paused briefly to take photographs and videos, discussing where the onus falls. Rakesh Chauhan, a retired teacher in his early 60s, slowed his car while passing through the area and asked, “Is this the place where the boy drowned?” Expressing anguish, he said the tragedy reflected “gross negligence” and lamented that the



victim could have been saved had timely efforts been made. A car driver, Raman, pointed out that the trench lay only a few metres from the road and involved a sharp drop. “There were no barricades, reflectors, warning signboards or streetlights before the incident,” he said, adding that

safety arrangements were put in place only after the tragedy. “If these steps had been taken earlier, his life could have been saved,” he said before leaving the spot. A police personnel deployed at the site said many people stop to inquire about the incident, often leading to crowding. A tea vendor located about 200 metres from the site said there were “several other vulnerable spots” in the area that posed similar risks. Mithlesh Kasana, a resident of Dadri, said the area has seen frequent visits by police officials, a Special Investigation Team (SIT) and local residents since the incident. The software engineer died in the early hours of January 17 after his car skidded in dense fog and plunged into

an unbarricaded, water-filled trench in Sector 150 crossing over a drain at a sharp, almost 90-degree turning road. The incident triggered widespread public outrage, leading the Uttar Pradesh government to remove the Noida Authority CEO on January 19 and earlier terminate the services of a junior engineer in connection with the case. Police, who have lodged cases of negligence, culpable homicide not amounting to murder and for pollution and violations of environment laws, have arrested three builders and launched a probe against real estate developers MZ Wiltown and Lotus Greens, while investigations are continuing to fix accountability for the lapses that allegedly led to the fatal accident.

Rescue units or spectators to tragedy?

The utter incompetence of multiple civic agencies in saving a drowning man in the heart of Greater Noida last week throws light on an effete state that is simply unable to summon up the will to serve its citizens. Yuvraj Mehta's desperate cries for help from atop his sinking car, and the lack of capacity as well as courage among rescue personnel on the shore amid a fog enveloping the dreadful night make for a depressing picture of India under the current dispensation. The man, 27-year-old Yuvraj Mehta, was driving back home under poor visibility conditions at midnight Friday, January 16, when his SUV plunged into a 50-ft flooded construction site that had neither a protective barrier nor warning signage. Mehta survived the initial fall and climbed onto the roof of his sinking car.

For nearly 90 minutes, he desperately signalled for help using his mobile phone's torch and spoke to his father on the phone, who rushed to the site. Rescue personnel from four agencies—the Noida civic authority, the fire brigade, police and the National Disaster Response Force – assembled on the shore but quibbled over the conditions, the equipment, the method and even the temperature of the water as the car went under the water, taking the young man with it.

The case has sparked nationwide outrage after the naked truth of the lack of prowess of our emergency services played out for everyone to see. Supposedly, trained rescue personnel refused to enter the water because the water was cold and feared the presence of iron rods under water. They lacked the thermal gear to operate at 30-foot depth and the fog lights needed to work in darkness. Even in terms of derring-do, they were shown up by a local delivery agent who jumped in to help with a rope tied around his waist. But by then, the vehicle had submerged and Mehta had succumbed to asphyxiation and cardiac arrest. This tragedy highlights failure at multiple levels, a many-headed failure that shows up at every crisis and in every disaster, be it a stampede at a crowded event, an outbreak of fire at an establishment with no safety arrangements, and the all-too-common and annual bouts of urban flooding in multiple cities. In the crisis management aspect, we have been witness to poorly trained and poorly equipped responders, as was glaringly evident in Greater Noida last week. But also, we see all too often contributory failings in the form of derelict safety regulation and administration. It's a shame that basic safety measures such as cautionary signage, working streetlights, and concrete barricading were absent on the street on which Yuvraj Mehta met his death. The fact that these were the conditions in the streets of a much-touted urban area is the least of it. Badly contoured lakesides and open excavation pits are universal conditions in the cities of India. Municipalities ignore them and local people normalise them, converting them into death traps. Yuvraj Mehta's death must jolt civic administrations and rescue agencies to overhaul their training methods, response protocols and equipment.

The Republic of India turns 77 today. The Constitution, which came into effect on January 26, 1950, laid the foundation for a new India, inspired by the sacrifices of the freedom struggle. Since independence, we have progressed in many areas—from literature, sports, agriculture, science and technology, to economic and military capabilities. Strengthening our diverse culture, the nation has established its identity on the global stage. The Chandrayaan missions made us pioneers in space science, the digital revolution of UPI transformed the payment system, while a slew of medals at the Olympics and Asian Games took sports to new heights. Today, the world sees India as the fourth largest economy, where a growth rate of seven to eight percent has contributed to poverty alleviation. But this journey has not been smooth. Internal challenges, cross-border threats, and social inequalities persist. On Republic Day, introspection is necessary: what have we gained, what have we lost, and what resolutions should we take for the future?

77 Years of the Republic: Achievements, Challenges and a Pledge for the Future



India's first and greatest challenge was unity in diversity. This continent-sized country was a blend of over 1.3 billion people, hundreds of languages and dialects, diverse religions and cultures. At the time of independence, there were fears that it would not remain united. The tragedy of Partition reinforced these fears, resulting in the loss of millions of lives. However, the Constitution ensured unity through a federal structure. Article 1 declared India a united state. The reorganization of linguistic states, a unified judiciary, and constitutional institutions integrated regional aspirations into the mainstream. Despite challenges like Naxalism and separatism, we maintained unity. Over the past 25 years, the removal of Article 370 from Jammu and Kashmir and the peace process in the Northeast are proof of this. Today, schemes like "One Nation, One Nation" are turning diversity into strength. This achievement is no small feat—most pluralistic countries in the world have disintegrated, but India stands firm.

The second challenge was to enliven democracy. The Constitution provided adult suffrage, fundamental rights, and secularism. A parliamentary system was adopted, inspired by the British model but tailored to Indian needs. Eighteen Lok Sabha elections were held peacefully, continuing a tradition dating back to the Nehruvian era. The judiciary established the rights of the poor through public interest litigation—the Vishakha Guidelines ensured women's safety, and the Right to Education ensured the right to education. Women's reservation revolutionized Panchayati Raj from 33 to 50 percent, a process awaiting national expansion. The

Right to Information increased transparency, while the Goods and Services Tax facilitated economic integration. Challenges persisted—dark chapters like the Emergency—but institutions were revived. Today, the pillars stand strong: the Election Commission is impartial, and the Reserve Bank of India is a guardian of economic stability. The world's largest democracy proved that democracy can flourish despite poverty and illiteracy.

The third challenge was development. In 1947, the GDP was 230,000 crore rupees, today it is over 400 lakh crore rupees. The Green Revolution filled the food reserves, and the White Revolution set a world record in milk production. ISRO's 100-plus satellite missions and the Covishield vaccine demonstrated self-reliance. Digital India added over 100 million Aadhaar cards, while Startup India spawned over 100,000 startups. On the social front, the National Food Security Act provided affordable food grains to 800 million people, and Swachh Bharat built 120 million toilets. Ayushman Bharat provided health insurance to 500 million poor people. But inequality persisted—the top 10 percent owned 57 percent of the wealth, while the bottom 50 percent owned only 3 percent. The rural-urban divide and farmer suicides are worrying. Nevertheless, 250 million people emerged above the poverty line—a matter of pride.

The achievements of the Republic are a reason for pride, but a lot was also lost. Corruption took root - scams like 2G, coal allocation looted billions. Questions on electoral bonds, black money return after demonetization failed. Women's insecurity at its peak - from Nirbhaya to Hathras, rape incidents are not

stopping. Caste violence, Dalit atrocities continue. Farmers' crisis deepens: Demand for minimum support price, loan waiver is insufficient. Youth unemployment is at three percent, violence is erupting due to dissatisfaction. Pollution is fatal, the poison of provincialism persists. Abuse of freedom of expression. Naxalism, terrorism have become a headache. These wounds are staining Mother India with blood.

It may be lost, but a solution is possible. Direct benefit transfer on corruption has stopped leakage. Fast-track court for women's safety, increase the use of Nirbhaya Fund. Prime Minister Kisan Samman Nidhi for farmers, strengthen farmer producer organizations. Skill India for employment, self-reliance, creation of three to ten crore jobs is possible. Run Constitution awareness campaign for social harmony. Electric vehicle policy on pollution, speed up Namami Gange. Empower Panchayati Raj - local governance strengthened with women's representation. Include youth in the mainstream. Spread of hatred can be stopped with Artificial Intelligence-Big Data. Unite to realize the dream of developed India by 2047.

Republic Day is not just a parade and flag hoisting, it is an opportunity for introspection. We gained unity, democracy, and development; we lost corruption and inequality. But youth power is our weapon. Be optimistic—adopt the Indian model. Follow the principles of Gandhi, the Father of the Nation, and Ambedkar, the architect of the Constitution. Let us extricate the Republic from the thorny bushes and build a bright future. Jai Hind, Jai Bharat!

How to feed 10 billion people

With the world struggling to feed 8 billion people today, how will we feed 10 billion by 2050? Meeting the nutritional needs of a growing population requires not just a radical increase in food production — almost all of it plant-based — but also a more equitable distribution to ensure that no one is food-insecure.

That is a tall order. The current food system is already buckling. About 673 million people go to bed hungry every night and, in 2025, we witnessed two famines (in Gaza and Sudan), each driven by conflict, climate shocks and soaring food prices. At the same time, 1.66 billion hectares — 60 percent of which is agricultural land — have been degraded by the very practices we rely on to feed the world.

Global hunger stems not from a lack of capacity to produce enough food, but partly from our failure to produce it efficiently and distribute it evenly. Conflict and insecurity remain the dominant causes of hunger across 20 countries and territories, leaving nearly 140 million people facing acute food insecurity. Disasters have inflicted an estimated \$3.26 trillion in agricultural losses worldwide over the past 33 years — an average of \$99 billion annually, or roughly 4 percent of global agricultural output; and recent supply-driven food price spikes have pushed tens of millions of people into hunger almost overnight. Worse, these are not one-off shocks. They represent the new normal.

We already have the knowledge and the tools to optimize what we use and diversify what we grow. For



decades, the agriculture sector has responded well to rising demand by developing higher-yielding crops and using more of everything: more fertilizer, more pesticides and more water. Yet this trend has produced unnecessary waste, polluted rivers, degraded the soil and released evermore greenhouse gases. We need to find a better path — and science can show us the way. We already have the knowledge and the tools to optimize what we use and diversify what we grow. One priority is to improve

efficiency. Between 1990 and 2020, fertilizer use rose 46 percent and pesticide use doubled. But only 30 percent to 60 percent of fertilizer nutrients and 20 percent to 70 percent of pesticides are effectively absorbed; the rest washes into rivers, degrades soil or releases greenhouse gases. Fortunately, research shows that optimizing nitrogen use can boost yields by up to 19 percent and slash fertilizer use by 15 percent to 19 percent. Improved pesticide management — through precision spraying,

biopesticides and residue monitoring — reduces chemical waste while safeguarding biodiversity. Agroecological practices, such as intercropping, crop rotation and integrating trees into farm systems, further enhance soil health, lower input dependence and strengthen long-term resilience.

The next priority is to diversify the food system. Decades of productivity gains have fostered a dangerous dependency on just three crops. Wheat, rice and maize now provide

most of the world's calories. Such reliance on monocultures creates profound vulnerability to pests, diseases and climate change.

The solution lies in the crops we have marginalized. Traditional and underused species — hardy millets, nutrient-dense legumes, indigenous fruits, robust yams — offer ample nutrition alongside other benefits such as climate resilience. UN Food and Agriculture Organization initiatives like "Future Smart Food" (in Asia) and "100 Crops for Africa" demonstrate how these "forgotten" crops can simultaneously expand diets, boost farm incomes and restore degraded soils.

The objective is clear: agriculture must produce more with less every season, everywhere.

Finally, we must scale up effective technologies. Data analytics and precision agriculture tools are already reshaping farming. Drones can plant seeds and deliver inputs with pinpoint accuracy. Artificial intelligence platforms can use satellite imagery to provide tailored, real-time recommendations. Robots can detect weeds for targeted spraying, avoiding the need for blanket herbicide applications. Digital soil tests and weather stations can guide day-to-day decisions and blockchain systems can link smallholders to transparent and traceable markets.

Scaling these tools will require substantial investments in agricultural extension services (to promote best practices), major science-based policy shifts and knowledge-sharing platforms to help farmers optimize inputs. Likewise, ongoing

innovation must be incorporated into local practices, which calls for greater collaboration among governments, investors, the private sector and farmers. The objective is clear: agriculture must produce more with less — more crop per drop, more calories per kilogram of fertilizer and more nutrition per hectare — every season, everywhere. That requires replacing one-size-fits-all industrial packages with resilient, context-specific systems finely tuned to local soils, water regimes, crops and climates. Publicly funded research must lead where markets fall short to ensure equitable access to precision agriculture, while private innovation continues to scale up what works. Knowledge is no longer the bottleneck; political will and aligned incentives are.

Even in the face of recurring conflict, drought and market chaos, stable production and affordable prices are possible. Resilient soils, diversified cropping and precision management hold the key. A world where nearly everyone eats well, farmers prosper, soils regenerate, waters run clean, biodiversity recovers and agrifood systems emit minimal greenhouse gases is not utopian. It is the realistic reward for embracing a different agricultural model before the old one collapses. The only question is whether we use the knowledge, science and proven tools already in hand. Future generations will not ask whether the solutions existed; they will ask what took us so long to implement them. The choice is ours and it starts with turning science into real-world practice.



Transport grids planned for all cities in Karnataka: DCM Shivakumar

Bengaluru : Deputy Chief Minister DK Shivakumar said that transport grids are being planned for all the cities in the state keeping in mind a 25-year horizon.

Addressing a press conference at Vidhana Soudha after returning from his visit to the World Economic Forum at Davos, he said, “During the Davos meet, companies have expressed interest in investing in tier 2 and tier 3 cities as well. Companies want infrastructure in these towns. We are looking at developing a transport grid including Ring Roads for all the cities in the state keeping in mind growth projections for the next 25 years. Time is precious and we need to plan for it from now itself in association with various departments.”

“The investors are predicting 70% urbanization levels in the next 25 years and they wanted to know our plan to develop required infrastructure. In this backdrop, we have decided to develop a transport grid including aspects like road needs and road widths, etc.,” he added.

45 companies have expressed interest in Karnataka

We had discussions with about 45 companies who have expressed interest in investing in data centres, GCCs, food processing, aviation, renewable energy, EV, electronics and advanced manufacturing. The companies have taken information on the availability of water and power for their industries,” he added. “We decided not to sign the agreements with



the investors in Davos. Instead, we would like to invite them to the state to get a first-hand idea about the human resource, infrastructure, weather and other resources. Of the Rs 11 lakh crore investment committed during Global Investors Meet, half of it is being realized. Investors are aware of massive investments such as Foxconn. They are aware that South Indian states offer excellent business environment after China,” he explained.

“Many investors are excited about the AI city we are planning in Bidadi. Some of them expressed reservations about the opposition to the project. I told them that the project would be realized as farmers are giving up their land on their own. No other state has given the amount of compensation we have given for the Bengaluru Business Corridor,” he said.

“I discussed the tunnel project with the Maharashtra CM too as they are building a lot of

tunnels. They have some suggestions about parking facilities near tunnels. We would like to visit some of the tunnel projects in Maharashtra,” he added.

Need to create awareness about discipline

“Davos is twice the size of Sadashivanagar and all the world leaders had to walk from place to place. I noticed the discipline on roads during my travel. We need to create awareness about road discipline. This is my first visit to Davos and I had an opportunity to meet many world leaders and businessmen,” he said.

“I noticed that the world is looking at India through Bengaluru which has 450 Fortune 500 companies. We discussed upgrading the infrastructure for the rapid urbanization. I met many leaders including World Bank President Ajay Banga, National General Secretary Mark Rutte, finance minister of Saudi Arabia among others. BDA Chairman Harris sent out a message to the investors that Bengaluru

is gearing up for the future,” he noted.

Asked how many companies have expressed interest in investing in Karnataka, he said, “Forty five companies had discussions with us. We also discussed developing tourism in coastal Karnataka.”

Asked about FDI, he said, “There are some guidelines for FDI. Some people were interested in Race Course, but I told them there are other lands in Bengaluru. Many of them expressed interest in lands in 40 km raidus from Bengaluru airport.”

Speed of doing business

“Many companies asked us to look into ease of doing business and the lengthy process of getting approvals. We are planning to achieve ‘speed of doing business’ for quicker approvals. Discussion with JICA for tunnel roads

Asked if anything would be changed in the tunnel projects after inspecting tunnels in Davos, he said, “Our tunnel projects have modern designs. Maharashtra has an agree-

ment with JICA for their tunnel projects. I will also travel to Japan to discuss our tunnel projects with JICA.”

Asked about his ‘India Rising’ comments were contradicting Rahul Gandhi’s stand on India’s growth, he said, “Don’t bring politics into this, let’s look at it in a broad-minded way. We would not want to hurt India abroad. Rahul Gandhi has also never done it. He has expressed his unhappiness internally. We will not let down our country.”

Will not respond to BJP leaders’ comments

Asked about BJP leaders’ criticism of his Davos visit, he said, “I will not reply to BJP leaders comments. I am answerable to the people of Karnataka and India. I had said in the past that the world looks at India through Bengaluru and I have said the same thing abroad as well. No other state has the capability that we have.”

“Karnataka is not competing with other states but at a global level. Atal Behari Vajpayee and PM Modi have called Bengaluru a global city,” he added.

Asked about the comments of Gita Gopinathan of IMF on pollution in India, he said, “Karnataka has the best climate in India.”

Asked about Bengaluru being ranked at No. 2 for traffic congestion, he said, “We are spending about Rs 2.5 lakh crores over the next 5 years to develop basic infrastructure in Bengaluru including tunnel roads, elevated corridors, buffer roads, etc.”

Move to take action against Governor is condemnable: MP Basavaraj Bommai

B e n g a l u r u : Former Chief Minister and Member of Parliament Basavaraj Bommai has strongly criticised the State government for proposing legal action against the Governor, calling the move unconstitutional and politically motivated.

In a statement posted on X (formerly Twitter), Bommai said the State government, in an attempt to divert attention from its own failures, is making allegations against the Central Government and showing disrespect to the constitutional office of the Governor. He said initiating legal action against the Governor amounts to an affront to the Constitution and is highly condemnable.

Bommai stated that there have been several instances in the past where Governors have not gone through documents page by page, and such proce-



dural issues should not be politicised. He said the use of abusive language against the Governor is an insult not only to the individual but also to the Constitution and the dignity of the Raj Bhavan.

The MP also demanded action against senior Congress legislator and MLC B.K. Hariprasad, stating that his conduct reflects the mindset of the Congress party. “It is absolutely necessary to initiate action against him for his remarks,” Bommai said.

Recalling past events, Bommai pointed out that

during the tenure of former Governor H.R. Bhardwaj, there were several occasions when constitutional limits were allegedly exceeded. He questioned whether Chief Minister Siddaramaiah had forgotten that Raj Bhavan had once functioned like a “Congress Bhavan.”

Bommai reiterated that constitutional offices must be respected irrespective of political differences and warned that undermining such institutions would weaken the democratic framework of the country.

Ready for debate on Bidadi township, let media decide date: DCM DK Shivakumar



Kanakapura: Deputy Chief Minister D.K. Shivakumar on Saturday said he is ready for a public debate with Union Minister H.D. Kumaraswamy on the Bidadi township project and invited the media to decide the date for the discussion. Speaking to reporters after inaugurating a new Rama temple near Kanakapura, Shivakumar said he had earlier accepted a similar challenge when Kumaraswamy was the Chief Minister and was extending the invitation once again. “I am ready for a debate on the Bidadi township. Let the media decide the date. Inform me three days in advance and I will block my calendar,” he said.

Responding to Kumaraswamy’s statement that the DK brothers should come forward for a debate, Shivakumar reiterated that he was prepared whenever Kumaraswamy was ready. He also dismissed the Union Minister’s claim that he would not allow the Bidadi township, stating that the project was originally initiated during Kumaraswamy’s tenure. “He himself has admitted that he promised 800 square feet of land to farmers. We are only continuing the same project now,” he said.

Shivakumar said that political leaders

may not be permanent, but their decisions would have a lasting impact. “This project will benefit future generations, and they will remember us for it. We have widened roads in my constituency and paid compensation of ₹,500 per square foot,” he added.

On Kumaraswamy’s remarks that people want him back in State politics, Shivakumar said he saw no contradiction. “He is already in politics. I don’t understand the distinction between national and State politics,” he remarked. Highlighting development and social initiatives in Kanakapura constituency, Shivakumar said around 500 temples have been built in the region. “My father built the Shakareshwara temple during his time. We have supported the construction of mosques and churches as well. We help people of all religions,” he said. Referring to his emotional connection with the constituency, Shivakumar recalled that people from the area had walked barefoot to Delhi when he was jailed. “I was released after 48 days because of their prayers. The people of my constituency are my real assets,” he said, adding that he had given up ancestral property and donated land for schools and hostels.

For countries like India, where millions continue to struggle from the lack of proper and affordable healthcare, AI could very well turn out to be a game-changer in the form of a support system in healthcare. However, in order to make effective use of AI, it is essential that India uses it in a responsible way.

Artificial intelligence is already beginning to penetrate Indian hospitals and clinics. Tools that analyse X-rays, CT scans, and lab results are helping doctors detect diseases such as tuberculosis, cancer, and heart conditions earlier than before. Telemedicine platforms supported by AI chat-screening and triage systems are making remote



consultations easier, especially in rural areas. Government initiatives such as the Ayushman Bharat Digital Mission is also paving the way for digital health records which is an essential requirement for AI systems. Startups are developing AI-based tools to monitor chronic illnesses, predict disease risk, and streamline hospital workflows. However, adoption remains uneven. Large urban hospitals benefit the most, while small clinics

and rural health centres often lack the infrastructure needed to support AI tools. Health data in India is still fragmented across private hospitals, government institutions, and standalone clinics, which limits AI’s accuracy and usefulness. There are also important ethical questions around privacy, consent, and accountability when AI systems influence medical decisions.

To make AI truly effective in healthcare, India needs a structured approach rather than rapid, unplanned adoption. First, building a strong digital health backbone is essential. Secure and compatible electronic health records allow doctors and AI systems to work with complete and reliable information. Without this foundation, AI risks being inaccurate or underused.

CM Stalin announces Republic Day medals for 44 intelligence, special operations personnel

CHENNAI: Chief Minister M K Stalin on Sunday ordered the conferment of the Tamil Nadu Chief Minister's Medal for Excellence in Intelligence and Excellence in Special Operations on 44 personnel on the occasion of Republic Day 2026.

The awards will be given to 43 police officers and personnel and one Special Branch Assistant from the Intelligence Unit in recognition of outstand-



ing performance in intelligence work and special operations. The medals are instituted to acknowledge exemplary service and motivate personnel engaged in sensitive and high-risk assignments.

Each awardee will receive a gold medal weighing 10 grams along with a cash award of Rs 25,000. The medals will be presented by the Chief Minister at a function to be held later.

Free turtle excluder devices worth Rs 6.40 cr to be distributed to TN fishermen

CHENNAI: In a conservation initiative aimed at protecting endangered sea turtles without affecting fishermen's livelihoods, the Tamil Nadu government on Sunday announced a Rs 6.40 crore scheme to distribute Turtle Excluder Devices (TEDs) free of cost to mechanised fishing vessels operating along the State's coastline.

The programme, implemented through the Fisheries and Fishermen Welfare department, seeks to prevent sea turtles, particularly during their annual nesting season, from being trapped in fishing trawl nets. The nesting period extends from January 1 to April 30 every year.

As part of turtle protection measures, the State has imposed a ban on mechanised fishing with-



in five nautical miles from the shore and prohibited the use of mechanised traditional boats with engines exceeding 10 horsepower in notified turtle nesting zones. The use of specific fishing nets has also been restricted during the breeding season.

According to the government, monitoring and enforcement are being strengthened through joint patrols and real-time tracking of fishing vessels using ISRO-enabled transponders via the 'Nabhmitra' online application. Action has been initiated against violators under the TN Marine

Fishing Regulation Act. Awareness campaigns are also being conducted in fishing hamlets in coordination with the Forest department, Coastal Security Group, Coast Guard, fishermen associations, NGOs and village panchayat leaders. A total of 270 awareness programmes have been held during the current nesting season. The TEDs, designed with technical support from the ICAR Central Institute of Fisheries Technology, Kochi, allow turtles caught in trawl nets to escape safely without damaging the catch. In the first phase, TEDs worth Rs 11.75 lakh were distributed to 50 vessels on a pilot basis, followed by distribution to 2,613 boats at a cost of Rs 6.29 crore. Installation work is currently underway, officials said.

RAIN LIKELY IN 16 TN DISTRICTS, INCLUDING CHENNAI, TILL 1 PM

CHENNAI: The Chennai Regional Meteorological Centre has forecast rain in 16 districts of Tamil Nadu till 1 pm today, with light to moderate rainfall accompanied by thunder at a few places. According to the weather bulletin, light to moderate rain with isolated thunderstorms is likely in Chengalpattu, Cuddalore, Mayiladuthurai and Villupuram districts. Light to moderate rain may occur in Chennai, Kancheepuram, Nagapattinam, Thanjavur, Tiruvallur and Tiruvarur districts. Light rain is expected in Ariyalur, Tiruvannamalai, Ranipet, Kanniyakumari, Tiruchirappalli and Pudukkottai districts. Earlier, the weather department had stated that light to moderate rain accompanied by thunder and lightning was likely at a few places across Tamil Nadu and in Pudukcherry and Karaikal today.

Dharmapuri sugar mill worker's son sweeps 23 medals at Tanuvas

CHENNAI: At the 25th convocation of Tamil Nadu Veterinary and Animal Sciences University, 25-year-old EL Arunaneswaran stole the spotlight by sweeping 23 awards.

A graduate of the Veterinary College and Research Institute, Namakkal, his haul included prestigious honours like the Dorabji Tata Prize and the Tanuvas Alumni Association Medal for his 2018-19 academic performance.

The Dharmapuri native credited his success to his parents – his father is a sugar mill accountant, while his mother is a homemaker – and his sup-



portive faculty. "This is a proud moment. I am grateful to my parents, who struggled to educate me," he said. "My father was very particular about my education. The dean and

teachers of various departments motivated and guided me," he added. Arunaneswaran is currently pursuing an MVSc at the Indian Veterinary Research Institute in Uttar

Pradesh. While completing his master's, he is preparing for civil service exams with a mission: to become a government veterinary doctor and serve the farming community.

CM Stalin unveils statues of Tamil language martyrs Thalamuthu and Natarajan

CHENNAI: Marking Tamil Language Martyrs' Day, Chief Minister M K Stalin on Sunday paid homage to freedom-era language activists Thalamuthu and Natarajan at Moolakothalam here and later unveiled their busts at the Thalamuthu-Natarajan Maaligai in Egmore, commemorating their role in the historic anti-Hindi agitation of 1937-39.

Observing Tamil Language Martyrs' Day, the Chief Minister recalled that the agitation erupted after Hindi was made a compulsory subject in schools in 1938, with failure to pass resulting in denial of promotion. The move, he



said, triggered widespread protests cutting across parties and social movements, drawing participation from students, scholars and reformers.

Natarajan, the first martyr of the agitation, died in custody in January 1939 after pro-

longed illness following his arrest at a protest in Adyar. His death galvanised the movement, drawing thousands to his funeral procession. Two months later, Thalamuthu, a young protester from Kumbakonam, died in

prison in March 1939 after being sentenced for participating in demonstrations against compulsory Hindi.

"The sacrifice of Thalamuthu and Natarajan stands as a beacon for Tamil consciousness and linguistic self-respect," Stalin said, noting that their legacy continues to inspire generations.

Earlier, the Chief Minister participated in a commemorative procession and paid respects at the memorial of social reformer S Dharmambal. Deputy Chief Minister Udhayanidhi Stalin, senior ministers, legislators, Mayor Priya and officials were present at the events.

Humanitarian sector must be prepared for cyberattack threat

The growing sophistication of cyberwarfare has resulted in a notable escalation in recent years. Cyberattacks have evolved beyond mere disruptions of digital systems and now have the potential to cause real-world harm with devastating consequences. This may be a paradigm shift in the landscape of modern conflict. As our reliance on digital technologies continues to expand across various sectors, so does the potential for cyber threats and attacks.



Last month, a hacking group known as "Gonjeshke Darande" (Predatory Sparrow) claimed responsibility for a cyberattack that knocked out the majority of gas stations across Iran, leading to long queues. Almost 70 percent of the country's gas stations experienced service disruptions, according to Iranian state TV. The disruption was attributed to a "software problem" and the public was advised against rushing to those stations that were still operational.

Already this year, the global landscape has been marred by a series of more than 15 major cyberattacks spanning diverse sectors and affecting numerous countries. These incidents underscore the pervasive and evolving nature of cyber threats in our interconnected world. From critical infrastructure to financial institutions, government entities to private enterprises, the targets have been varied, highlighting the indiscriminate reach of malicious actors in the digital realm.

Nation states, nonstate actors and even individuals are increasingly leveraging advanced cyber capabilities in order to achieve financial, political and strategic objectives.

The humanitarian challenges stemming from cyberattacks have unfortunately emerged as a pressing concern, as hospitals, power grids, financial institutions and critical infrastructure are no longer immune to the reach of such adversaries. As the world becomes increasingly reliant on technology for essential services, communica-

tion and commerce, the vulnerabilities exposed by malicious cyber activities pose profound threats to humanity's well-being.

This is why it is important to look at the intricate web of humanitarian challenges associated with cyberattacks by delving into the implications for individuals, communities and global organizations and ways to tackle this issue.

First of all, it is critical to point out that the infrastructure that is essential for the functioning of societies has increasingly become a target – and is susceptible – to cyber threats. The interconnectivity of systems controlling energy, water supply, transport and healthcare leaves these sectors vulnerable to malicious cyber activities. Disruptions in these areas can have cascading effects, jeopardizing the delivery of vital services and posing significant challenges for humanitarian organizations responding to crises. As humanitarian organizations collect and store vast amounts of sensitive data, the risk of data breaches looms large. More fundamentally, the healthcare sector, a core pillar of humanitarian efforts, has increasingly become a prime target for cyberattacks. Ransomware attacks on hospitals have the potential to disrupt patient care, compromise sensitive medical records and even endanger lives. Unfortunately, the humanitarian consequences are dire in such cases because, if the integrity of medical services is compromised, vulnerable popula-

tions would be left without access to critical healthcare during times of need. Cyberattacks can also compromise emergency response systems. Attacks can disrupt communication channels, hinder logistics and compromise the efficiency of relief efforts. This not only endangers lives but also exacerbates the challenges faced by communities already grappling with the aftermath of disasters. Humanitarian crises, whether caused by natural disasters or conflicts, demand swift, immediate and coordinated emergency responses. Access to essential services, financial systems and communications platforms is critical for marginalized populations and any disruption in these areas further marginalizes and isolates them. In addition, as humanitarian organizations collect and store vast amounts of sensitive data to help them deliver aid effectively, the risk of data breaches looms large. It is evident that safeguarding the confidentiality of personal information is paramount for maintaining the integrity of humanitarian efforts. But the problem is that cyberattacks that compromise the privacy of affected populations can erode trust and deter individuals from seeking assistance.

One of the key challenges in tackling cyberattacks is related to the

issue of accountability. It is often difficult to identify the perpetrators of cyberattacks with certainty. This lack of clear attribution can hinder efforts to hold the responsible parties accountable for their actions. This ambiguity also undermines the potential for legal recourse and international cooperation in addressing cyber threats with a humanitarian impact.

This is why it is critical for humanitarian organizations to enhance their cybersecurity capabilities and resilience. Capacity-building initiatives ought to concentrate on training personnel, implementing robust cybersecurity measures and developing contingency plans to respond effectively in the event of a cyberattack. Proactive investment in cybersecurity infrastructure is also crucial for mitigating the impact of cyber threats on humanitarian operations.

In addition, efficiently addressing the humanitarian challenges of cyberattacks requires a collaborative approach. Strengthening international cooperation on cybersecurity and fostering diplomacy to establish norms and regulations are essential. The establishment of clear guidelines and frameworks can contribute to a more secure cyberspace, reducing the potential for humanitarian crises resulting from malicious cyber activities. In a nutshell, the humanitarian challenges of cyberwarfare underscore their impact on people's well-being. The evolving nature of cyber threats poses multifaceted risks to critical infrastructure, healthcare, emergency response systems and marginalized communities. This underscores the urgent need for international cooperation – including on fortifying defenses and enhancing resilience. Only through concerted efforts to fortify cybersecurity measures and foster a global understanding of the humanitarian consequences of cyber threats can we navigate the complex terrain of the digital age, while ensuring the protection and well-being of individuals and communities worldwide.

AI GUIDES TO SMART PARKING: TECH-DRIVEN TRAFFIC PLAN TO STEER REPUBLIC DAY CROWD TO KARTAVYA PATH

NEW DELHI: From AI-generated informational videos to car-calling systems, Delhi Traffic Police has rolled out a slew of technology-driven measures to ensure smooth traffic flow and a hassle-free commute for people heading to Kartavya Path for the Republic Day parade and the Beating Retreat ceremony.



In a first, the traffic police has prepared detailed animated videos with the help of Artificial Intelligence (AI), depicting the arrival, alighting, departure and parking plans for invitees. Officials said the videos are aimed at familiarising visitors with the movement and parking arrangements well in advance.

The videos are available on the Ministry of Defence website and can also be accessed through the QR code-based parking system issued to invitees. They explain in detail how arrival, alighting and parking will be managed on the day of the event, a senior police officer told PTI.

The parking management system covers 22 designated parking lots and has been designed to accommodate around 8,000 vehicles. Every year, nearly 77,000 passes are issued to spectators for the Republic Day parade, of which about 8,000 are earmarked for those arriving by private vehicles, the police said.

Another first this year is the introduction of shuttle services for security personnel deployed

for Republic Day arrangements. Shuttles will operate from four locations—Khan Market, Amrita Sher-Gil Marg, Patel Chowk Metro Station and HC Mathur Lane—to ferry personnel to their respective destinations. The shuttles will run at a frequency of 10 minutes, he said.

To assist commuters in reaching their designated parking areas on Republic Day, invited guests and ticket holders can use Google Maps or Mappls for real-time navigation support. A senior police officer said the platforms will provide details of appropriate routes to Kartavya Path and the exact location of allotted parking spots.

On Mappls, a dedicated Republic Day tab has been created, while Google Maps will display specially marked parking locations along with entry and exit routes to help visitors reach their destinations without confusion, he said. Apart from digital assistance, the traffic police has significantly expanded on-ground support by setting up 12 help desks at key locations—up from just two in previous years. Personnel deployed at these help

desks will guide commuters on parking facilities, pedestrian movement routes and security arrangements, the officer said.

The help desks will be located at Moti Lal Nehru Place roundabout, Sunehri Masjid roundabout, Man Singh roundabout, Jaswant Singh roundabout, GPO roundabout, Windsor Place roundabout, Mandi House roundabout, Q-point, Teen Murti roundabout, Crossing Janpath/Dr Rajendra Prasad Road, Gate number 14 of Jawahar Lal Nehru Stadium and Palika Parking, they added.

Car-calling systems have also been introduced this year to avoid crowding after the conclusion of the programme and to ensure smooth dispersal of invitees. Under the system, invitees can inform an officer stationed at the exit gate, following which announcements mentioning the car number or the driver's name will be made. The traffic police has advised people to follow official advisories, use public transport as far as possible and rely on digital navigation tools for a smoother commute to Kartavya Path.

Mcap of 9 of top-10 most valued firms plunges by Rs 2.51 lakh cr

New Delhi: The combined market valuation of nine of the top-10 most valued firms slumped by Rs 2.51 lakh crore last week, with Reliance Industries taking the biggest hit, in line with a weak trend in equities. Last week, the BSE benchmark Sensex tanked 2,032.65 points or 2.43 per cent.

“Markets witnessed a sharp sell-off during the week, with bears firmly in control. Weak global cues, persistent FII outflows, a depreciating rupee, and subdued corporate earnings kept pressure elevated throughout the week,” Ajit Mishra – SVP, Research, Religare Broking Ltd, said. The combined market valuation of nine of the top-10



most valued firms, including Reliance Industries, HDFC Bank, ICICI Bank and Bharti Airtel, plunged by Rs 2,51,711.6 crore. The market valuation of Reliance Industries tumbled Rs 96,960.17 crore to Rs 18,75,533.04 crore. ICICI Bank's valuation eroded by Rs 48,644.99

crore to Rs 9,60,825.29 crore. The valuation of HDFC Bank tanked Rs 22,923.02 crore to Rs 14,09,611.89 crore and that of Bharti Airtel diminished by Rs 17,533.97 crore to Rs 11,32,010.46 crore. Market capitalisation (mcap) of Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) dropped by

Rs 16,588.93 crore to Rs 11,43,623.19 crore and that of Larsen & Toubro tanked Rs 15,248.32 crore to Rs 5,15,161.91 crore. Mcap of Bajaj Finance declined by Rs 14,093.93 crore to Rs 5,77,353.23 crore and that of State Bank of India edged lower by Rs 11,907.5 crore to Rs 9,50,199.77 crore.

Market valuation of Infosys dived Rs 7,810.77 crore to Rs 6,94,078.82 crore. However, mcap of Hindustan Unilever climbed Rs 12,311.86 crore to Rs 5,66,733.16 crore. Reliance Industries remained the most valued firm, followed by HDFC Bank, TCS, Bharti Airtel, ICICI Bank, State Bank of India, Infosys, Bajaj Finance, Hindustan Unilever and Larsen & Toubro. “The correction was fuelled by a confluence of factors: escalating geopolitical tensions, aggressive FII selling, and panic regarding the Rupee's weakness,” Santosh Meena, Head of Research at Swastika Investmart Ltd, said on markets sell-off last week.

Why stock markets often trade lower ahead of Union Budgets

NEW DELHI: As the government prepares to present the Union Budget 2026-27, data from 2010-2022 shows that markets often trade lower ahead of the event due to fear of policy surprises, though post-budget rebounds are common — with an average 1.36 per cent gain in the following week, according to market watchers. This pre-budget weakness is attributed to elevated volatility, as seen in the average 2.65 per cent intra-day trading range on budget day itself, they said.

Over the past 15 years, the average return for Nifty one week before the budget has been negative at -0.52 per cent, with the index closing higher only on 8 occasions. This pattern aligns with broader trends, where Nifty posted negative returns in the month preceding the



budget in four out of the last five years, including a drop in January 2025.

“For the Union Budget 2026, expectations centre on balancing fiscal prudence with growth stimulus amid global headwinds like US tariffs under President Donald Trump,” said Rahul Sharma, Director, Head - Technical and Derivative Research, JM Financial Services Ltd. Key anticipations include increased capital expenditure on

Infrastructure, Defence, and Railways to shield the economy from external shocks, with a hike in defence allocation. Industry bodies seek boosts for MSMEs, manufacturing, green energy, AI and exports through incentives like faster GST refunds and investments in logistics. “Fiscal deficit is projected at 4.4 per cent of GDP, with emphasis on job creation, rural demand, and sustainable development to propel India toward a \$5 trillion economy.

RBI may cut rates further if India-US trade deal is delayed: Goldman Sachs



MUMBAI: India's strong economic fundamentals continue to support a healthy growth outlook, but prolonged uncertainty over the India-US trade deal could push the Reserve Bank of India to step in with further rate cuts.

According to Goldman Sachs, if trade-related headwinds persist beyond the first quarter of FY27 and start weighing on growth, the RBI may use its remaining policy space to support the economy through additional monetary easing. The brokerage said India's mass consumption story, especially in rural areas and among lower-income households in cities, is still in the early stages of recovery.

This recovery is being supported by a good crop cycle, higher state-level transfer payments to women in lower-income families and GST cuts that benefited the bottom end of the consumption ladder.

Goldman Sachs believes these factors are helping demand gradually pick up, even though broader global uncertainties remain.

In an interaction with NDTV Profit, Santanu Sengupta, Chief

In such a situation, the government and the Reserve Bank of India may need to use their policy space to support the economy.

Sengupta explained that while India's overall consumption outlook remains positive, the picture is mixed across income groups. The affluent segment of consumers, which includes the middle and top income groups, saw strong growth after the Covid-19 pandemic but is now showing signs of slowing. He added that the middle-income segment faces challenges due to concerns around job creation and the increasing use of artificial intelligence.

On the policy front, the central government moderated its fiscal consolidation in FY26 and shifted focus towards supporting con-

Egypt aims to double trade with India to \$12 billion

NEW DELHI: Egypt has set a strong goal to nearly double its trade with India, aiming to reach \$12 billion in the coming years. Currently, trade between the two countries stands at around \$5 billion, which Egypt believes is far below the real potential of the partnership.

Speaking at the Foreign Correspondents' Club of South Asia here, Egypt's Ambassador to India, Kamel Zayed Galal, said both nations have many opportunities to grow together, especially in sectors like energy, manufacturing, agriculture and connectivity.

He also shared that Indian investments in Egypt, which are now around \$3.7 billion, are expected to cross \$10 billion in the future. The Ambassador encouraged Indian companies to see Egypt as a long-term strategic partner rather than just

a short-term business destination. Energy cooperation is becoming a major focus, especially in renewable energy and green hydrogen.

Galal explained that Egypt has strong solar and wind resources, along with growing infrastructure and easy access to major global shipping routes. These advantages could help Egypt become an important hub for green energy production and exports. He also pointed to fertilisers, agriculture and industrial manufacturing as areas where closer supply chain links could quickly increase trade. "The ICC has confirmed Scotland will replace Bangladesh in Group C, after Bangladesh withdrew from the competition. Details around squad selection for the tournament will be shared in the coming days," Cricket Scotland said. Cricket Scotland chairman Wilf Walsh said he received a call from ICC chairman Jay Shah on confirming Scotland's participation.

Agha, Faheem Ashraf, Khawaja Mohammad Nafay, Mohammad Salman Mirza, Sahibzada Farhan and Usman Tariq have received their maiden mega-event call-ups to the Pakistan squad. Meanwhile, Abrar Ahmed, Babar Azam, Fakhar Zaman, Mohammad Nawaz, Naseem Shah, Saim Ayub, Shaheen Shah Afridi, Shadab Khan and Usman Khan have played in at least one or more editions of the tournament since 2021.

Pakistan boasts a strong batting lineup, which includes the likes of Fakhar Zaman, Saim

Ayub, and Sahibzada Farhan. In the absence of Rauf, Pakistan have relied on Afridi and Naseem Shah in their pace unit.

There is also a strong presence of all-rounders in the squad, with the likes of Faheem Ashraf, Shadab Khan and Mohammad Nawaz providing multiple options with the bat and ball.

The 2009 winner are slotted in Group A alongside co-hosts and defending champions India, the Netherlands, the USA and Namibia. They will kickstart their campaign against the Netherlands on February 7 in Colombo at the Sinhalese Sports

Club (SSC) Ground. Pakistan's squad announcement comes just a day after the PCB chief Mohsin Naqvi said a final decision on their T20 World Cup participation would be made after talking to government.

Aryna Sabalenka beats 19-year-old Mboko, faces 18-year-old Jovic in Australian Open quarterfinals

MELBOURNE: TikTok influencer and top-ranked Aryna Sabalenka is having to work her way through some rising teenager stars in her bid for a third Australian Open title in four years.

Sabalenka held off 19-year-old Vicky Mboko 6-1, 7-6 (1) at Rod Laver Arena on Sunday to advance to a quarterfinal match against 18-year-old Iva Jovic. The 29-seeded Jovic overwhelmed Yulia Putintseva 6-0, 6-1 in 53 minutes at John Cain Arena, the so-called People's Court, and she secured a spot in the last eight of a Grand Slam for the first time.



Coco Gauff, who was still a teenager when she won her first major title in 2023, is back into the quarterfinals in Australia for the third straight year after a 6-1, 3-6, 6-3 win over No. 19 Karolina Muchova. In a good omen for Gauff, her four previous wins over Muchova have been during runs to the title, including in the semifinals at the 2023 U.S. Open. In the opening men's match Sunday, No. 1-ranked Carlos Alcaraz continued his bid for a career Grand Slam at age 22 with a 7-6 (6), 6-4, 7-5 win over No. 19-seeded Tommy Paul to reach the quarterfinals for the third consecutive year in Australia. He's never gone past the last eight at Melbourne Park, the only one of the four Grand Slam venues where he hasn't won the title. That's a statistic he's determined to rectify, to the point where he's reworking his serve to a look a little bit more in style like 10-time Australian Open champion Novak Djokovic.

Djokovic's influence has been getting some good advice from Djokovic, a 24-time major winner, during the tournament. He said he's been happy to help an up-and-coming star with Serbian heritage. Jovic made

it clear last year that she wanted a chance to play the World No. 1. Now she'll get the chance. Sabalenka, who has joked about waiting for a formal invitation to partner Djokovic in mixed doubles at a major, breezed through the first set in 31 minutes against Mboko but had some difficulty in the second. Mboko saved match points and played well enough to beat many players, but not the two-time Australian Open champion.

"What an incredible player for such a young age," Sabalenka said of Mboko. "It's incredible to see these kids coming up on Tour. I can't believe I say that. I feel like I'm a kid! "She pushed me so much, and I'm happy to be through," Sabalenka added in her on-court TV interview. Sabalenka led the second set 4-1, and then failed to convert three match points while leading 5-4. Mboko slowly took momentum and forced a tiebreaker only for Sabalenka to dominate.

It was the 20th straight tiebreak victory for Sabalenka. "I try to not to think this is a tiebreak and play point by point," said Sabalenka, who won back-to-back titles in Australia in 2023 and 24 before losing last year's final to Madison Keys. "I guess that's the key to consistency." Sabalenka said playing the morning match at Melbourne Park came with some challenges, including shadows and

bright sun. "Don't get me wrong, I like to play the first match, but the tricky part, at some point the sun goes right into your serve point. It's kind of like tricky. You can break the serve," she said. "That's what actually happened. Two breaks that she got, it was on the side when I was facing the sun. Yeah, I didn't deal that good with the serve. She did an incredible job serving on that side." Jovic and Mboko were scheduled to play doubles together later Sunday on Kia Arena against fourth-seeded Elise Mertens and Zhang Shuai. After her singles win when she broke Putintseva's serve six times and led 6-0, 4-0 before she dropped serve herself Jovic said she'd just concentrate on her own game when she faced Sabalenka.

She saved two break points in the opening game of the match against Putintseva and was dominant throughout. She had her 31-year-old rival chastising herself during the changeovers and practicing shots trying to work out ways to get back into the match. When Jovic hit a crosscourt forehand winner to convert another break in the second set, Putintseva tossed her racket toward the ball, trying to make a connection. As for taking on Sabalenka, Jovic said, "Obviously, she's No. 1 for a reason and had so much success at this tournament.

Novak Djokovic advances to Australian Open quarterfinals on a walkover after Jakub Mensik withdraws



MELBOURNE: Novak Djokovic has had a walkover into the Australian Open quarterfinals after Jakub Mensik withdrew 24 hours ahead of their scheduled fourth-round match with an abdominal injury. The tournament confirmed Mensik's withdrawal late Sunday. The match had been scheduled for Rod Laver Arena on Monday night.

"After last couple of matches, I started to feel worse, and actually the problem is my abdominal muscle on the left side," Mensik said in comments published by the tournament. "Like I said, last few matches it got significantly

worse, and I think if I would step on the court tomorrow, it would be such a big risk for me for my next weeks, for my next tournaments, and actually for my health."

No. 16-seeded Mensik beat Ethan Quinn in straight sets on Saturday.

Novak Djokovic has won the Australian Open a record 10 times. The 24-time major winner became the first player to reach 400 wins in Grand Slam singles when he beat Botic van de Zandschulp 6-3, 6-4, 7-6 (4) on Saturday night in the third round of the Australian Open.

Bangladesh's exit from T20 World Cup "sad moment": Global players' body

LONDON: The World Cricket Association (WCA) on Sunday expressed concern over Bangladesh's exit from the upcoming T20 World Cup, saying it was "a sad moment" that requires "deep reflection".

The ICC on Saturday confirmed that Scotland has replaced Bangladesh in the T20 World Cup beginning February 7, saying the "difficult decision" was taken since it was not feasible to meet Bangladesh Cricket Board's (BCB) request to shift their matches to Sri Lanka so close to the tournament.

"The withdrawal of Bangladesh from the T20 World Cup, and resulting absence of a valued cricketing nation from cricket's pinnacle international T20 event, is a sad moment for our sport, the Bangladesh players and fans, and one that requires deep reflection," WCA CEO Tom Moffat said in a statement.

The BCB refused to let its team travel to India citing security concerns in the wake of Mustafizur Rahman's ouster from

the IPL. The ICC, however, maintained that there was no verifiable security threat to the Bangladesh national team, officials or supporters in India and it was not appropriate to amend the published event schedule.

"Cricket is at its strongest when every team and every player is treated with respect, supported appropriately and consistently, and able to participate on fair terms. The game is at its best when all participants are genuine contributors to its success."

WCA is a global body for professional cricketers with membership of players from several countries. But, Indian cricketers are not members of the WCA.

"In recent times, the WCA has become increasingly concerned by broader trends in the sport, including agreements not being honoured, rights being eroded, and a lack of meaningful consultation with players and their representatives — all of this amounts to a careless

Hindi films have lost their roots, are fake and money-driven: Prakash Raj



Unlike Malayalam and Tamil cinema, which he hailed for their strong, content-driven storytelling, actor Prakash Raj said mainstream Hindi cinema has lost its roots, becoming increasingly “fake” and “money-oriented”. Speaking at the ongoing ninth edition of the Kerala Literature Festival (KLF) on Saturday, January 24, the award-winning actor criticised Hindi films for their artificiality, saying they have become like a “Madame Tussauds museum” where everything seems beautiful with no substance. “In the present context, I feel Malayalam and Tamil cinema are making very strong films... Hindi cinema, on the other hand, has lost its roots. Everything looks beautiful, wonderful, like plastic, as you see in the Madame Tussauds museum. “We (the South) still have stories to

tell, the new young directors of Tamil are talking about Dalit issues. And that gives so much of hope,” said Raj, renowned for his work across Tamil, Telugu, Hindi, Kannada, and Malayalam cinema, in a session titled “The Artist I Became”. The 60-year-old filmmaker-actor further analysed what ails Hindi cinema, tracing its decline to the post-multiplex era, when it began catering primarily to urban audiences. Raj, known for his performances in hit films such as “Singham” and “Wanted”, argued that the industry’s focus on glamour and surface-level aesthetics has weakened its emotional connection with viewers. “After multiplexes, the Bombay film industry started making films only for multiplexes. Very cute films and things like that. Because they were running well. They went into that Page 3 culture, and with that lost the touch with rural Rajasthan and Bihar,” he explained. This shift, he argued, also led to the decline of the nation-building narratives that once defined post-independence Hindi cinema. To buttress his point, Raj cited the 1977 blockbuster “Amar Akbar Anthony”, and its famous scene of three men from different religions donating blood to save one person, reflecting shared values, social harmony and collective aspirations. “Now, it’s not like that anymore. Today, it’s all about money and appearances — reels, page 3 coverage, and loud self-promotion. In the process, I feel the industry has lost its connection with the audience,” he concluded. The four-day literary extravaganza is hosting over 400 speakers, including Nobel Laureates Abdulrazak Gurnah and Abhijit Banerjee, astronaut Sunita Williams, author Kiran Desai, essayist Pico Iyer, Jnanpith winner Pratibha Ray, sports icons Rohan Bopanna and Ben Johnson, and Wikipedia founder Jimmy Wales. KLF 2026, now in its ninth edition, will come to a close on January 25.
