50 flights to and from Srinagar cancelled due to snowfall



SRI NAGAR (TSIT): As many as 50 flights to and from Srinagar International Airport were cancelled on Tuesday due to snowfall in Kashmir, officials said. "In view of adverse weather conditions and continuing snowfall at Srinagar Airport, airlines have cancelled most of the flights for today," an official of the Airport Authority of India said here. Around 50 flights – 25 inbound and 25 outbound – have been cancelled so far due to the snowfall, which was continuing until the last reports arrived. Four more flights were scheduled to arrive at the Srinagar airport but officials said they are unlikely to operate in view of the inclement weather. "Passengers have been advised to stay in touch with their respective airlines for the latest updates and alternate arrangements," an official said. The cancellation of flights has left hundreds of tourists, who were scheduled to return home after spending the weekend and Republic Day holiday in the Valley, stranded.

Six on-duty Kerala cops suspended for consuming alcohol

THIRUVANATHAPURAM: Six police personnel attached to the Kazhakkootam Police Station in Thiruvananthapuram have been suspended following an incident of public drinking that has embarrassed the force and triggered sharp scrutiny from senior officers. The suspended personnel have also been directed to undergo mandatory good conduct training, officials said. The action comes after visuals showing the policemen consuming alcohol while seated inside a car surfaced. The senior officials quickly conducted a probe, and on Tuesday, the suspension order was served. The footage, which went viral after being shared with senior police officials, shows the officers in civil dress drinking inside a parked vehicle right in front of the Kazhakkootam police station. This police station comes under the prestigious Technopark campus area. A preliminary inquiry ordered immediately after the visuals emerged has termed the incident a "serious lapse" and an act that is "completely unacceptable" for serving police personnel. The report clearly states that the officers were on duty at the time of the incident, aggravating the gravity of the misconduct.

India-EU free trade agreement: Mother of all deals

New Delhi (TSIT): India and the European Union announced the closure of the long-drawn negotiations on the free trade agreement on Tuesday. European Commission president Ursula von der Leyen termed the deal as the 'mother of all deals'. The pact, which is likely to be implemented next year, is beneficial for both sides, and will also help Tamil Nadu, as it relaxes conditions on exports from key labour-intensive sectors like textiles, leather, auto parts, etc.

Telangana municipal elections: Polling on Feb 11, results on Feb 13

HYDERABAD (TSIT): The Telangana State Election Commission on Tuesday, January 27, announced the schedule for the second municipal elections, with polling scheduled for February 11 and results in February 13. An election notice and ward-wise electoral rolls of urban local bodies will be issued by the Returning Officer on January 28.

Polling for 116 municipalities and seven corporations will take place between 7 am and 5 pm on February 11. Any re-polls, if necessary, will take place on February 12.

The counting of votes will start from 8 am onwards on February 13, and the results will be declared soon after. Candidates can file their nominations till 5 pm on January 30. The nominations will be scrutinised the next day from 11 am onwards, and the final list of candidates will be published on the same day.

Appeals against the rejection of nomination can be filed before the District Election Authority till 5 pm on February 1. All appeals will be disposed of before 5 pm on February 2. Candidates can withdraw



their nominations till 3 pm on February 3, after which the final list of the contesting candidates will be uploaded on the same day.

GHMC NOT INCLUDED

The election schedule does not apply to the Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (GHMC) as its term ends on February 10.

Additionally, Minister for Transport and BC Welfare Ponnampallabai Prabhakar has said that the GHMC might split into three after the end of its term. GHMC may be divided into Hyderabad, Cyberabad and Malkajgiri corporations, with Hyderabad Corporation covering areas under 150 wards, while the other two other corporations may have 75 wards each.

PM Modi thanks all European leaders in making 'mother of all deals' possible

New Delhi (TSIT) Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Tuesday said that the conclusion of the India-EU Free Trade Agreement (FTA) marks a significant milestone in their relations, and also thanked all the leaders of Europe over the years for their constructive spirit and commitment in making this possible. "This agreement will deepen economic ties, create opportunities for our people and strengthen the India-Europe partnership for a prosperous future," PM Modi said in a post on X after the "mother of all deals" was reached.

India and Europe have taken an important step forward today. The free trade agreement between India and the EU opens new pathways for growth, investment, and strategic cooperation, PM Modi added. During a joint press conference at Hyderabad House here, PM Modi announced the signing of the FTA between India and the European Union, stressing that the landmark partnership between two major economies will create new opportunities



for businesses, consumers, and the skilled workforce. PM Modi underlined that the agreement reflects growing trust, shared values, and a common commitment to peace, stability, and cooperation in an increasingly uncertain global environment.

According to Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal, the 16th India-EU Summit will be remembered in history as the event where the world's fourth and second largest economies joined hands to script a new chapter in global trade. "The agreement will unlock opportunities across sectors, benefiting businesses and people, and contributing to growth and prosperity on both sides," he posted on X.

BJP wants to destroy Rahul's image through false propaganda, alleges Kharge

NEW DELHI (TSIT): Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge on Tuesday slammed the BJP over the 'Gamosa' controversy involving Rahul Gandhi and said the ruling party wants to "destroy Gandhi's image through false propaganda" but will never succeed.

Kharge also claimed that the Modi government insulted Gandhi, the Leader of Opposition in Lok Sabha, and him by seating them in the third row alongside ministers of state during the Republic Day parade.

A political row erupted over Gandhi allegedly not wearing an Assamese 'Gamosa' given to all the guests at the reception hosted by President Droupadi Murmu on Republic Day, with the BJP alleging that the Congress leader insulted the country's Northeast.

The BJP also accused Gandhi of showing disregard for President Murmu by not wearing the 'Gamosa' while the Congress countered by pointing out that Defence Minister Rajnath Singh had also not worn the "patka (scarf)".



Asked about the BJP's claims, Kharge told PTI Videos, "This is a lie. Even the defence minister was not wearing the 'Gamosa'...the BJP president was also not wearing it. He (Gandhi) was holding it in his hand after wearing it.

They (BJP) are doing such propaganda that Rahul Gandhi has insulted the whole of Northeast states and their culture. They (BJP) want to (destroy) that culture." Gandhi is the only leader who met all the Northeast artists, shook hands with them and also hugged an artist from Arunachal, photographs for

this are available," he said.

"These people want to destroy Rahul Gandhi's image through false propaganda but they will never succeed. I am an eyewitness," Kharge asserted. "The government insulted Rahul Gandhi and myself by seating us in the third row...made us sit behind kids, we were made to sit next to ministers of state. They should apologise to us," he said. Kharge said Gandhi and he were wearing the 'Gamosa' and took it off while eating and kept it on the table. "Their people were not wearing it," he added, slamming the BJP.

NEW DELHI: (Jan 27) "I am calling it off, it was a wonderful journey," said Arijit Singh on Tuesday, announcing that he will not be taking up any new assignments as a playback singer, a decision that sent shockwaves across his fan



base. In a message shared on his social media pages, Singh said he has decided to step away from playback singing, a move that comes at the peak of his career as one of the most popular and in-demand voices in Hindi cinema. "Hello, Happy New Year to all. I want to thank you all for giving me so much love all these years as listeners. I am happy to announce that I am not going to be taking any new assignments as a playback vocalist from now on.

Mamata Banerjee only leader in India who can take on BJP: Akhilesh Yadav

Kolkata (TSIT): West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee is the only political leader in the entire country who has the courage and capability to take on Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), said Samajwadi Party (SP) President and former Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Akhilesh Yadav here on Tuesday.

He arrived in Kolkata on Monday night to attend a family function. On Tuesday afternoon, he reached the West Bengal state secretariat of Nabanna and had a meeting with Mamata Banerjee.



After the meeting, Yadav said at a press conference that in the West Bengal Assembly elections scheduled later this year, it would be proved again that Mamata Banerjee was the only leader in the country capable of taking on the might of the BJP.

"In the entire country, only Mamata Banerjee is countering the BJP in the

right manner. It is just a matter of time that BJP faces a landslide defeat in West Bengal. The Enforcement Directorate had lost to Mamata Banerjee. It will be time now for the BJP to accept that defeat. Again, I am saying that Mamata Banerjee is the only leader in the country who is countering the BJP in the right manner," the SP chief said.

He also echoed Mamata Banerjee's die-hard opposition to the ongoing special intensive revision (SIR) in the state. "SIR is a reflection of the BJP's fear of defeat.

TRADE DEAL

Over 99 pc of Indian goods gain preferential entry into EU, \$75 billion worth exports to take off

NEW DELHI (TSIT): With the India-EU trade deal, the country has secured unprecedented market access for more than 99 per cent of Indian exports by trade value to the EU that also bolsters the 'Make in India' initiative, the Commerce Ministry said on Tuesday, adding that along with India's FTA with the UK and the European Free Trade Association (EFTA), the latest EU deal effectively opens up the entire European market for Indian businesses, exporters, and entrepreneurs.

With this historic deal, which is touted as the biggest



in India's history, Rs 6.41 lakh crore (\$75 billion) worth of exports are poised for take-off, with \$33 billion of exports in labour-intensive sectors like textiles, leather, marine products, gems and jewellery are set to gain immensely from preferential access

under the FTA.

Union Minister for Commerce and Industry Piyush Goyal said the conclusion of the India-EU FTA represents a defining achievement in India's economic engagement and global outlook. "This supports

India's approach to secure trusted, mutually beneficial and balanced partnerships. Beyond a conventional trade deal, it represents a comprehensive partnership with strategic dimensions and is one of the most consequential FTAs," he said.

India, powered by a young and dynamic workforce and one of the fastest-growing major economies, stands poised to leverage this FTA to create jobs, spur innovation, unlock opportunities across sectors, and enhance its competitiveness on the global stage, said the minister.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi and European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen jointly announced the conclusion of the "mother of all deals", marking a historic milestone in India-EU economic relations and trade engagement with key global partners. In 2024-25, India's bilateral trade in goods with the EU stood at Rs 11.5 lakh crore (\$136.54 billion) with exports worth Rs 6.4 lakh crore (\$75.85 billion) and imports amounting to Rs 5.1 lakh crore (\$60.68 billion). India-EU trade in services reached Rs 7.2 lakh crore (\$83.10 billion) in 2024.

New Delhi, Jan 27 : Aday after taking the salute at the Republic Day Parade on Kartavya Path, President Droupadi Murmu on Tuesday interacted with special visitors, including students, tribals, tableaux artists and NSS volunteers and NCC cadets who took part in the Republic Day Parade, an official said.

Separate groups of students from Leh, Jharkhand and Jammu and Kashmir called on the President, said a statement by the President's Secretariat on social media.

"During the day, she also met guests from tribal communities, tableaux artists and tractor drivers, NSS volunteers and NCC cadets, officials and other participants of the Republic Day Parade 2026 at Rashtrapati Bhavan," said the official.

On Monday, Murmu hosted the traditional 'At Home' reception at Rashtrapati Bhavan on the occasion of the 77th Republic Day, bringing together prominent dignitaries to mark the conclusion of the day's celebrations.

History-sheeter Azhaguraja shot dead in police encounter in TN

Chennai, Jan 27 : Notorious criminal Azhaguraja was shot dead in a police encounter in Tamil Nadu's Perambalur, marking yet another addition to the list of high-profile encounter killings in the state.

The encounter, late on Monday night, took place near a forested stretch close to Thirumanthurai village in Perambalur, when the accused allegedly attacked police personnel while attempting to flee.

According to police sources, Azhaguraja sustained a bullet injury to the head during the encounter and died on the spot. He was a long-time offender with more than 30 criminal cases registered against him, including murder, attempt to murder, extortion, and contract killings.

Police said he was considered extremely dangerous and had evaded arrest for



several years by frequently changing hideouts across districts.

On Sunday night, a special police team led by Mangalamet Inspector Nandakumar arrested Azhaguraja along with six other accused from a hideout in Ooty, where they had been living under assumed identities.

Following their arrest, the suspects were taken to the forest area near Thirumanthurai to recover hidden weapons, explosives, and other incriminating materials.

Police claim that during the recovery operation, Azhaguraja suddenly at-

tacked the escorting officers with a sickle in an attempt to escape. Despite repeated warnings to surrender, he allegedly continued the assault, forcing the police to open fire in self-defence.

One police personnel sustained injuries in the attack and was immediately rushed to a nearby hospital. His condition is said to be stable.

The arrest of Azhaguraja was linked to a recent incident in which another hardened criminal, Kalimuthu, was attacked by a gang while being transported to prison under police escort. Investigators believe Azhaguraja played a key role in planning and executing that attack.

Based on intelligence inputs suggesting that he was hiding in the Tirunelveli region, intensified surveillance and search operations were launched, eventually leading to his arrest.

Kerala HC slams SIT over delay in Sabarimala gold heist case, warns of credibility loss

Kochi, Jan 27 : The Kerala High Court on Tuesday came down heavily on the Special Investigation Team (SIT) probing the Sabarimala gold theft cases, expressing serious concern over the delays in filing charge sheets that have enabled key accused to walk free on statutory bail.

So far, 13 people have so far been arrested in the two charge sheets filed by the SIT, and one person has now secured statutory bail.

A bench of Justice A. Badaruddin warned that such lapses erode public confidence in the investigation and raise doubts about the seriousness of the probe.

Observing that accused persons gaining release due to the failure to file charge sheets within the statutory time frame creates widespread suspicion, the court questioned why the SIT had failed to take timely and effective steps to prevent the situation.

"When accused are released by default, it inevitably casts a shadow over the credibility of the investigation," the judge noted.



The court pointed out that Murari Babu, former administrative officer of the Devaswom Board and an accused in both the Dwarapalaka and Kattilappala cases, had already secured statutory bail earlier.

It also flagged that Unnikrishnan Potti, the prime accused in both cases, had obtained bail in the Dwarapalaka case and would become eligible for statutory bail in the Kattilappala case as the 90-day period was set to expire on February 2.

The observations were made while considering a plea filed by accused and Smart Creations CEO Pankaj Bhandari seeking his release.

Bhandari contended that he had

given statements six times even before being arrayed as an accused and had fully cooperated with the investigation, arguing that his arrest was unnecessary.

However, the court made it clear that the arrest in the case was unavoidable.

At the same time, it stressed that arrested persons must be granted all legal protections, including statutory bail, in accordance with Supreme Court rulings.

Responding to the court's concerns, the SIT submitted that several procedural and evidentiary hurdles had delayed the preparation of the charge sheet. It said documents had been seized from Devaswom Board offices and other locations, while key scientific evidence required to conclusively establish the offences was still awaited.

The SIT maintained that even if the accused were released on bail, the investigation remained focused on securing convictions and ensuring that those responsible were ultimately brought to justice.

Security forces recover, neutralise Maoist-planted IEDs in Bastar

Raipur/Dantewada, Jan 27 : In a major success for anti-Naxal operations in Chhattisgarh's South Bastar region, security forces recovered and neutralised two improvised explosive devices (IEDs) planted by Maoists in the forest hills near Gufa village under Barsur Police Station limits in Dantewada district.

The joint operation took place on January 27, following precise intelligence inputs. Acting on specific information received on January 22 from the Central Reserve Police Force, a co-ordinated search and demining mission was launched early in the morning. The operation began on Tuesday morning and involved personnel from CRPF, the Bomb Disposal Squad, and officers from Barsur Police Station.

During the detailed search



in the dense forest terrain around Gufa village, the teams located a hidden Maoist explosive dump. The recovered items included one directional pipe bomb fitted with a detonator, weighing around 5 kilograms, and one pressure cooker improvised explosive device weighing approximately 5 kilograms, attached to 15 meters of wire.

Both devices were immediately taken to a safe location and destroyed by the

Bomb Disposal Squad in accordance with standard operating procedures, eliminating any risk they posed to security personnel and local civilians.

Anil Kumar Singh, Commandant of the 195 Battalion, with the Young Platoon and Bomb Disposal team led by Assistant Commandant Himansu, conducted the operation. Superintendent of Police Gaurav Rai and Additional Superintendent of Police

R.K. Barman have been overseeing intensified anti-Naxal patrolling and area domination efforts across Dantewada district.

The latest recovery highlights the effectiveness of continuous ground operations backed by reliable intelligence sharing among agencies.

Officials described the operation as a significant blow to Maoist activities in the region, preventing potential ambushes or attacks on patrolling parties and villagers.

The swift neutralisation of the explosives underscores the high level of coordination between the Central Reserve Police Force, local police, and intelligence units.

Such recoveries are seen as crucial in weakening the logistical network of Naxal groups operating in the Bastar division.

New industrial revolution has begun in Odisha: CM Majhi

Bhubaneswar, Jan 27 : Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi on Tuesday said that a new industrial revolution has begun in Odisha, asserting that the state is steadily moving ahead with industrial proposals amounting to nearly Rs 20 lakh crore for the establishment of new industries across Odisha.

While inaugurating India's first Flat Rolled Products (FRP) aluminium unit at Hindalco Industries Limited's Aditya Aluminium plant at Lapanga in Sambalpur district, CM Majhi stated that once these industrial proposals become operational, around 15 lakh new jobs will be created in Odisha.

The project, set up with an investment of Rs 26,996 crore, is expected to generate employment for 5012 people, further strengthening downstream manufacturing and creating new livelihood opportunities in the region.

Addressing the gathering, the Chief Minister said, "Western Odisha today stands as a symbol of confidence, discipline and enterprise transforming from forests and farmlands into a hub of world-class manufacturing."

He also described the workers as the real architects of Odisha's industrial success and said that their dedication ensures that production never stops and progress never slows.

SC suggests attachment of properties of acid attackers

New Delhi, Jan 27 : The Supreme Court on Tuesday expressed serious concern over the pendency of acid attack cases across the country and called for more stringent measures, including the attachment of properties of convicts to ensure meaningful compensation to victims.

A Bench headed by Chief Justice of India (CJI) Surya Kant, while hearing a PIL seeking enforcement of guidelines earlier laid down by the top court, noted the submission that 15 High Courts have so far furnished details of pending acid attack cases.

As per the status report placed before the apex court, Uttar Pradesh alone has 198 pending cases, followed by Gujarat with 114, West Bengal with 60, Bihar with 68 and Maharashtra with 58 cases.

In its order, the CJI Kant-led Bench noted that reports from the remaining High Courts are still awaited.

"We request the High Courts to consider the desirability of taking a decision for expediting and concluding matters concerning acid attacks in a time-bound manner on an out-of-turn basis," the Supreme Court said.

During the hearing, the CJI Kant-led Bench made strong oral observations on the need for tougher punitive measures to act as a deterrent.

"Why should the assets of the accused not be attached? If a person is found guilty of an acid attack, why should all his immovable assets not be acquired and used to compensate the victim? You have to take some extraordinary punitive measures. Unless the action is so painful, the deterrent theory must be followed here," the top court observed. It also directed all states and Union Territories to place comprehensive data before it within four weeks, including year-wise incidents of acid attacks, filing of chargesheets, number of cases decided, pendency at the trial stage, and appeals arising out of concluded trials.

Mamata Banerjee cautions against attempts to instigate violence in Bengal before Assembly polls this year

Kolkata, Jan 27 : West Bengal Chief Minister, Mamata Banerjee, on Tuesday issued a note of caution about attempts to create tension and violence before the crucial Assembly elections in the state, scheduled later this year.

While issuing the note of caution on Tuesday, the Chief Minister gave some subtle hints about certain sections of people whose actions might trigger possible tension in the state.

Chief Minister Banerjee asked everyone to be careful about possible attempts to create a riot-like situation in West Bengal before the Assembly polls. However, she refrained from directly pointing out those sources of tension and violence.

"We have people from a community whose percentage representation is over 30. In case of grievances, they will block roads. Around 26 per cent of the population is Scheduled Castes. Around six per cent of the population is tribal. Whenever something happens, the people from the tribal community block



train services. I do not want this. I want everyone to live together. There might be an attempt to create a situation of unrest before the elections," the Chief Minister warned.

According to Chief Minister Banerjee, the most important thing is that people should stay together peacefully. "If there is peace in life, there will be progress. If the situation is peaceful, then the work becomes easier," she said.

At the same time, Chief Minister Banerjee once again became vocal on the issue of migrant workers

from West Bengal being subjected to attacks and humiliation in other states, especially the ones ruled by the BJP.

"Around 1.5 crore of migrant workers are in West Bengal. They do not face any kind of problem here. But when migrant workers from West Bengal go to other states to earn their livelihoods, they are being attacked. I am asking the migrant workers from the state who are currently in other states to return to West Bengal. The state government will take full responsibility for their livelihoods,"

Fence along Bangladesh border: HC directs Bengal govt to hand over land to BSF by March 31

Kolkata, Jan 27 : The Calcutta High Court has issued a major directive regarding the construction of a barbed-wire fence along the India-Bangladesh international border in West Bengal.

On Tuesday, a division bench comprising Chief Justice Sujoy Paul and Justice Partha Sarathi Sen ordered the state government to hand over land to the Border Security Force (BSF) for the construction of the fence in nine districts bordering Bangladesh by March 31, said high court sources.

It may be noted that the

central government has already provided the funds for this land acquisition, and the acquisition process has been completed. However, the land has not yet been handed over.

The High Court on Tuesday directed the state government to transfer the land as quickly as possible. The court also made it clear that the state cannot use the excuse of the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) process in this matter.

Furthermore, regarding the land acquisition that has not yet received the state cabinet's approval, the court will hear arguments from



both the central and state governments.

Considering the national security of the country, all parties have been directed to

in this case is scheduled for April 2.

A public interest litigation (PIL) was filed by former army officer Dr Subrata Saha regarding the state's negligence in constructing the barbed-wire fence along the India-Bangladesh border.

He alleged that illegal smuggling and infiltration are rampant through the portion of the India-Bangladesh border located in this state, and held the state government responsible for this.

In the last hearing of this case, the division bench of the Calcutta High Court, comprising Chief Justice

Sujoy Paul and Justice Partha Sarathi Sen, had directed the Principal Secretary of the state's Land Acquisition Department to submit an affidavit.

On Tuesday, the state government informed the court that the 181 kilometres of land for which the central government has provided funds for the construction of the barbed-wire fence along the India-Bangladesh border would be handed over to the BSF by March.

After hearing the arguments of all parties, the Chief Justice's division bench set March 31 as the deadline.

Republic under democratic strain

The world is likely to witness several momentous changes, and India needs to brace itself to not only deal with them but also fulfil its vision of emerging as a developed, democratic country with matching global clout. It cannot be denied that there is a dire need for introspection and course correction. In her Republic Day address to the nation, President Droupadi Murmu reiterated that the Indian Constitution was a “foundational document” and that the ideals of justice, liberty, equality, and fraternity enshrined in it define the Republic. Amidst fears and doubts regarding the future of the Constitution, it was heartening to note that the President made the point unequivocally, and the hope is that the government will follow the Constitution in letter and spirit. The Narendra Modi government has been in power since 2014 and with an enviable mandate, opportunity and power to reshape India as per Hindutva ideology. There has been a healthy tussle between two competing ideas of India – the Nehruvian and the Hindutva idea. Both have their flaws and fault lines.

The Nehruvian idea had laid the foundation for a modern, secular and united republic. It was progressive, forward-looking and celebrated a scientific temper. The Hindutva idea is more focused on reversing historical wrongs, restoring the lost glory and establishing the Hindu hegemony. In politics, it paves the way for a unitary form of government, which undermines federalism and excessive centralisation of executive power in one or two persons. It adversely affects religious and other minorities and also linguistic diversity.

There is ample evidence of the increase in hatred and acrimony in general, and religious divisiveness and bigotry in particular, among many sections of society. Secondly, in politics, the pursuit of absolute power through amoral and immoral means has been shrinking the space for a healthy political opposition, which does not augur well for an electoral democracy.

The nation is fast degenerating into what the V-Dem Institute has characterised as “electoral autocracy”. Another worrying aspect is the seeping of election calculations into every aspect of government and governance. For instance, in the President’s speech, it is difficult not to notice the selective and calculated references to Subramanya Bharati, Sri Narayana Guru, Rabindranath Tagore, Aurobindo, Bankim Chandra Chattopadhyay and his Vande Mataram. Likewise, merit apart, the selection of Padma awardees appears to have been done with an eye on making electoral gains in Assembly elections in Tamil Nadu, Kerala and West Bengal. Only voters can make the party mend its ways in the national interest. Despite some notable achievements in economic development, poverty and inequality persist, and the fact that nearly 81 crore people continue to be dependent on the government for food is a testament to the failure of critical policy and implementation. On the other hand, the gap between the rich and the poor is not only widening, but in many key sectors, there are unhealthy oligarchy tendencies, and they are increasingly being dominated by de facto duopolies.

Voluntary contribution of Asha-Anganwadi workers

Women's empowerment, nutrition, and health in India's rural society depend heavily on ASHA and Anganwadi workers. These are the women who go door-to-door to administer vaccinations, detect malnutrition in children, assist pregnant women in safe delivery, and play a crucial role in reducing maternal and infant mortality. In pandemics like COVID-19, they were used as frontline soldiers, but these days, these women are on the streets, their destinations being Sealdah Railway Station in West Bengal or Fountain Chowk in Karnataka. Their situation is no better: will these women, who care for the nation's health, not be given the status of workers? The needs of ASHA and Anganwadi workers are not extraordinary; they receive minimum wages, pensions, gratuities, Class III employee status, and social security. Yet, governments deny them formal labor rights and label them as volunteers or project workers. The nationwide strikes from December 2025 to January 2026 are a public expression of this long-term neglect.

The Anganwadi Scheme and Asha Scheme were launched in 1975 under the ICDS and in 2005 under the National Health Mission. Their aim was to strengthen rural health and nutrition systems through the participation of local women. Initially, a voluntary system was adopted to limit government expenditure, but the reality on the ground is that these women are employed as full-time workers. An Asha worker has to care for 1,000 people, while Anganwadi workers care for 40 children, including pregnant women, distributing nutrition, and maintaining records.

In 2006, the Supreme Court ruled that they were government employees because they did not hold statutory positions, but this decision was ignored. However, a 2022 decision granted Anganwadi workers the right to gratuity under the 2013 ICDS Act. Later, in 2024, the Gujarat High Court recognized them as state employees based on

the principle of equality, while the Calcutta High Court directed consideration of the issue of promotion. Despite this, central and state policies remain inconsistent and erratic.

The practice of honorarium is shameful. ASHA workers receive a minimum honorarium of Rs.3,500 to Rs.6,000, and that too is based on incentives. In Karnataka, the honorarium is fixed at Rs.6,000, but it is paid eight to nine months late. Anganwadi supervisors receive an average of Rs.15,000. There are no holidays, no transportation allowance, and no proper personal protective equipment. Maternity leave is also limited, and the workload is constantly increasing. Because the term applies to volunteers, they are outside the scope of the Minimum Wages Act 1948, the Equal

Remuneration Act 1976, and four new labor laws. The 45th Indian Labor Conference's recommendation of Rs.26,000 for a minimum wage has not yet been implemented. There are no social security schemes like EPF and ESI. The demand for an increase of Rs.1,200 in retirement pension has persisted for years, but no action has been taken on it. The e-Shram card does not provide any eligibility, but only collects data.

Ironically, women, who play a crucial role in reducing malnutrition and infant mortality in the country, are themselves vulnerable. According to the NFHS-5 report, 35 percent of children in India suffer from stunting, and the infant mortality rate is 28 per thousand. ASHA workers and Anganwadi workers have played a crucial role in increasing these figures. More than 500 workers lost their lives during COVID-19, and compensation was announced, but payments were severely delayed. The situation is further exacerbated by mental stress, workload, and 20 percent vacant posts in states like Haryana.

Solutions must be structural, not half-measures. Workers under the

working is a blatant injustice. In the 77th year of the Republic, when India claims to be a global leader, the issue of respecting these women is not a question of policy, but a constitutional question of morality. These protests are a message; justice delayed is revolution.

ASHA and Anganwadi workers are not supplements to any scheme, but rather the backbone of India's public health system. Denying them labor rights by labeling them as volunteers is an affront to social justice and constitutional equality. Women, who are on the front lines of saving the country from epidemics, malnutrition, and maternal mortality, are themselves vulnerable in the current situation. These protests indicate that time is running out. If the republic is to be strengthened, these women must be afforded respect, security, and rights. Justice may be delayed, but it cannot be avoided.

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SPACE WEATHER:

Proposed mission creates artificial solar eclipses

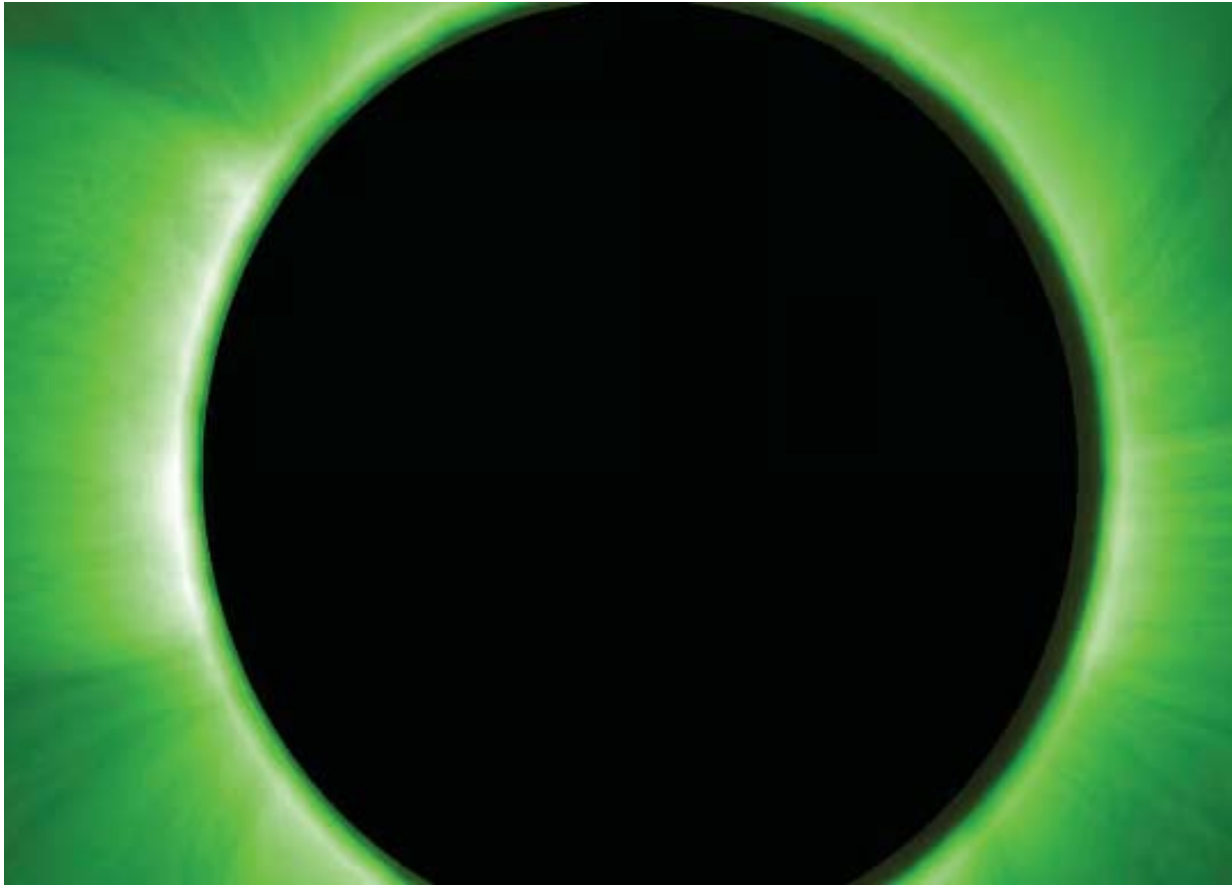
When a solar storm strikes Earth, it can disrupt technologies vital to daily life. These storms occur when bursts of electrically charged particles and magnetic fields from the Sun collide with Earth's magnetic field, producing what is known as space weather.

The Earth is currently experiencing one of the most intense solar storms of the past two decades, highlighting the need to better understand these events. An international team of researchers is working on a spacecraft mission designed to study the solar conditions that generate such storms, with the aim of improving space-weather forecasting.

The proposed mission, known as Mesom (Moon-enabled Sun Occultation Mission), would create total solar eclipses in space. By doing so, it would allow scientists to observe the Sun's outer atmosphere — the solar corona — in unprecedented detail.

Past disruptions show why this matters. In 1989, a coronal mass ejection (CME) triggered a nine-hour power blackout in Quebec, affecting Canada and the US and costing tens of millions of dollars in lost productivity and damaged equipment. More recently, in May 2024, a series of

weaker solar eruptions caused thousands of satellites in low-Earth orbit to lose altitude. GPS outages alone cost US farmers an estimated \$500 million. These events pale in comparison with the 1859 Carrington Event, the most powerful solar storm on record. Electrical currents surged through telegraph wires across North America and Europe, shocking operators and even starting fires. A storm of similar magnitude today would have catastrophic consequences for our technology-dependent world, a risk recognised by successive UK governments.

Yet our view of the solar corona — where CMEs originate — remains obscured by the Sun's own intense brightness. During total solar eclipses, the Moon blocks the Sun's visible surface, revealing the faint glow of the corona. Studying this region is crucial for understanding how solar storms form and for improving forecasts that could protect Earth's infrastructure. Unfortunately, total eclipses are rare and brief, lasting only a few minutes and occurring roughly once every 18 months. Ground-based observations are further limited by weather and atmospheric distortion. Artificial alternatives, known as coronagraphs, use disks and optical filters to block sunlight and have provided valuable data, including from the Soho spacecraft since 1995. However, even the most advanced coronagraphs struggle to observe the deepest layers of the Sun's atmosphere.

Mesom proposes a different approach: using a natural celestial body as the occulting disk. The Moon, with its near-perfect spherical shape and lack of atmosphere, is an ideal candidate. By flying a mini-satellite into the Moon's shadow, Mesom would recreate eclipse conditions without Earth's atmospheric interference.

Developed by engineers and scientists at the Surrey Space Centre and partner institutions, Mesom would exploit the dynamics of the Sun-Earth-Moon system to observe the inner solar corona once a month for up to 48 minutes at a time — far longer than eclipses seen from Earth. Funded by the UK Space Agency, the project has grown into an international consortium led by UCL's Mullard Space Science Laboratory. Recently submitted to the European Space Agency for consideration, the mission could launch in the 2030s. Over two years, Mesom would return at least 400 minutes of high-resolution coronal observations — data that would otherwise take more than 80 years to collect from Earth.

need to improve farm incomes. At the same time, pressure on land and water resources has pushed farmers towards intensive production models, many of which originated in horticulture but are now influencing broader agricultural practices.

"This platform was created to respond to how the sector is evolving," said S.K. Gutgutia, Chairman, Florance Flora, and a member of HortiConnect Global. "Advanced technologies first adopted in horticulture are now influencing broader agricultural practices, and the exhibition reflects that shift."

ALL INDIA BANK STRIKE ON JANUARY 27 OVER FIVE-DAY WORK WEEK DEMAND

Hyderabad : The United Forum of Bank Unions (UFBU), an umbrella body comprising nine unions of bank employees and officers, has called for an All India Bank Strike on January 27, 2026, pressing for the implementation of a five-day work week in the banking industry. Nearly eight lakh employees and officers from public sector banks, private sector banks, foreign banks, regional rural banks and cooperative banks are expected to participate in the strike.

The key demand of the unions is government approval for declaring all remaining Saturdays as bank holidays, in addition to the existing second and fourth Saturdays, by introducing extended working hours from Monday to Friday. This proposal was recommended by the Indian Banks' Association (IBA) based on Memorandums of Understanding signed with UFBU on December 7, 2023, and reiterated in the Settlement/Joint Note dated March 8, 2024.

UFBU leaders recalled that during the 10th Bipartite Settlement and 7th Joint Note in 2015, it was agreed that the



demand for a five-day work week would be considered in due course. After prolonged discussions, the IBA and unions agreed in 2023 to increase daily working hours by 40 minutes on weekdays to facilitate Saturday holidays. However, the proposal has been pending government

approval for over two years. Despite assurances that the matter was under active consideration—following the deferment of a proposed two-day strike in March 2025—the unions allege no concrete action has been taken. UFBU stated that bank employees feel discriminated against,

especially when institutions like RBI, LIC, GIC, government offices and stock exchanges already follow a Monday-to-Friday work schedule. The unions argue that with digital banking and alternative service channels in place, customer inconvenience would be minimal.

US-CANADA TRADE TENSIONS RISE

Trump warns of 100% tariffs

Washington, Jan 27: President Donald Trump Saturday threatened to impose a 100 per cent tariff on goods imported from Canada if America's northern neighbour went ahead with its trade deal with China.

Trump said in a social media post that if Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney "thinks he is going to make Canada a Drop Off Port' for China to send goods and products into the United States, he is sorely mistaken."

While Trump has waged a trade war over the past year, Canada this month negotiated a deal to lower tariffs on Chinese electric vehicles in return for lower import taxes on Canadian farm products.

Trump initially had said that agreement was what Carney "should be doing and it's a good thing for him to sign a trade deal."

Carney's office did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Trump's threat came amid

an escalating war of words with Carney as the Republican president's push to acquire Greenland strained the NATO alliance. Trump had commented while in Davos, Switzerland, this week that "Canada lives because of the United States." Carney shot back that his nation can be an example that the world does not have to bend toward autocratic tendencies.

Trump later revoked his in-

vitiation to Carney to join the president's "Board of Peace" that he is forming to try to resolve global conflicts.

Trump's push to acquire Greenland has come after he has repeatedly needled Canada over its sovereignty and suggested it also be absorbed the United States as a 51st state.

He resumed that this week, posting an altered image on social media showing a map

of the United States that included Canada, Venezuela, Greenland and Cuba as part of its territory.

In his message Saturday, Trump continued his provocations by calling Canada's leader "Governor Carney." Trump had used the same nickname for Carney's predecessor, Justin Trudeau, and his use of it toward Carney was the latest mark of their soured relationship.

Russian air attack on Ukraine knocks out power for millions



Moscow carried out the strikes as trilateral, US-brokered talks between Russia and Ukraine continued into a second day in the UAE, with no sign of compromise Friday

Kyiv, Jan 27: Russia launched another vast attack on Ukraine's energy system in the small hours of Saturday, rocking Kyiv with explosions throughout the night and leaving 1.2 million properties without power countrywide.

Nearly 6,000 buildings in the capital were left without heating Saturday morning as temperatures hovered around -10 degrees Celsius (14 F). Many residents' apartments were already freezing cold from disruption to the city's centralised heat distribution system following previous attacks.

Moscow carried out the strikes as trilateral, US-brokered talks between Russia and Ukraine continued into a second day in the UAE, with no sign of compromise Friday.

Kyiv Mayor Vitali Klitschko said one person was killed in the capital city and four injured, including three being treated in hospital, while 19 people including a child were wounded in Ukraine's second city, Kharkiv.

Russia, which has pummelled Ukraine's power grid

since its full-scale invasion in 2022, is conducting its heaviest bombardment campaign on energy facilities this winter, leaving people across Ukraine with only a few hours of power a day and some without heat or water.

Over 800,000 people in the capital and another 400,000 in the northern region of Chernihiv were without power after the latest attacks, Deputy Prime Minister Oleksiy Kuleba said.

Ukraine's air force said Russia had unleashed 375 drones and 21 missiles, including two of its rarely deployed Tsirkon ballistic missiles, in its overnight attack.

The sky over Kyiv was lit up by regular orange flashes as air defences fired on missiles and drones descending on the capital, with loud booms echoing around the city's tall buildings.

Tymur Tkachenko, head of Kyiv's military administration, reported strikes in at least four districts. A medical facility was among the buildings damaged.

Before Saturday, Kyiv had already endured two mass overnight attacks since the New Year that have knocked out power and heating to hundreds of residential buildings.

Emergency workers were still engaged in restoring services to residents that had been knocked out by those attacks, and Klitschko said many of the buildings that had lost heating Saturday had only recently had it restored. In Kharkiv, a frequent target 30 km (18 miles) from the Russian border and much closer to eastern battlefronts, Mayor Ihor Terekhov said 25 drones had hit several districts.

Federal agents fatally shoot second person in Minneapolis

Minneapolis, Jan 27: A man shot by federal agents in Minneapolis Saturday has died, local and federal officials said, the second fatal shooting involving federal agents this month during a surge in immigration enforcement in the northern US city.

The man, who has not been identified, was armed with a handgun and two magazines, the Department of Homeland Security said in a statement.

A video circulating on social media and aired on cable news stations showed people wearing masks and tactical vests wrestling with a man on a snow-covered street before shots are heard. In the video, the man falls to the ground, and several more shots are heard.

Minnesota Governor Tim Walz called for an immediate end to the Trump administration's immigration enforcement operations in the state.

"I just spoke with the White House after another horrific shooting by federal agents this morning," Walz wrote on social media platform X. "This is sickening. The President must end this operation. Pull the thousands of violent, untrained officers out of Minnesota. Now."

Tina Smith, a Democratic US senator from Minnesota, called the shooting "catastrophic."

Minneapolis officials urged calm as the incident is investigated. Video from the area showed immigration agents deploying tear gas on a growing crowd of onlookers.

Winter storm forces over 10,000 flight cancellations across US

Dallas, Jan 27: More than 10,000 flights across the US set to take off over the weekend were cancelled as a monster storm started to wreak havoc Saturday across much of the country and threatened to knock out power for days and snarl major roadways with dangerous ice.

Roughly 140 million people, or more than 40 per cent of the US population, were under a winter storm warning from New Mexico to New England. The National Weather Service forecast warns of widespread

heavy snow and a band of catastrophic ice stretching from east Texas to North Carolina.

All Saturday flights were cancelled at Will Rogers International Airport in Oklahoma City, and all Sunday morning flights also were called off, as officials aimed to restart service Sunday afternoon at Oklahoma's biggest airport. The airport was nearly deserted Saturday morning, with only a few TSA agents and a couple of travellers remaining inside the departures side. The Texas Department of Transportation Saturday posted images of snow-covered highways in the suburbs north of Dallas.

China places highest-ranking general under investigation

Beijing, Jan 27: China's most senior general is under investigation, China's defence ministry said Saturday, in the highest-profile purge to date of senior military leadership just as Beijing modernises its forces and tries to further project its might.

Zhang Youxia serves as second-in-command under President Xi Jinping as vice-chairman of the Central Military Commission - the supreme

command body - and has long been seen as Xi's closest military ally.

The ministry said Zhang and Liu Zhenli, chief of staff of the CMC's Joint Staff Department, were under investigation for suspected serious violations of discipline and law.

Zhang is also a member of the elite Politburo of the ruling Communist Party and is one of just a few leading officers with combat experience.

The military was one of the

main targets of a broad corruption crackdown ordered by Xi in 2012. That drive reached the upper echelons of the People's Liberation Army in 2023 when the elite Rocket Force was targeted.

Zhang's removal is the second of a sitting general on the Central Military Commission since the 1966-76 Cultural Revolution. He has not been seen in public since November 20, when he held talks with Russia's defence minister in Moscow.

Indian crew world's most abandoned seafarers in 2025

The International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) said that abandonment worldwide hit record levels last year as it released new data showing 6,223 seafarers abandoned across 410 ships

London, Jan 27: Indians are the most abandoned nationality of seafarers for the second consecutive year as 1,125 cases of abandonment were logged at the end of 2025, a UK-headquartered global union of transport workers has found.

The International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) said that abandonment worldwide hit record levels last year as it released new data showing 6,223 seafarers abandoned across 410 ships.

The ITF welcomed the Indian government's "blacklisting" measures to protect its seafar-

ers from ships as a result of repeat abandonments and other bad practices.

"It's nothing short of a disgrace that, yet again, we are seeing record numbers of seafarers abandoned by unscrupulous ship owners," said David Heindel, Chair of the ITF Seafarers' Section.

"Every day, all around the world, seafarers face horrific violations of their human and labour rights, all so that bottom-feeding companies can make a quick buck at their expense. It's very clear that this is a systemic issue in the industry and that means we need the entire industry to come together



with seafarers and their unions to say, 'enough is enough', and take action together to end this crisis," he said.

Seafarer abandonment is defined by the International Maritime Organisation (IMO), headquartered in London, under three criteria: failing to cover

the cost of a seafarer's repatriation; leaving a seafarer without necessary maintenance and support; unilaterally severing ties with a seafarer, including failure to pay contractual wages for a period of at least two months.

According to the ITF analy-

sis, the worst region for abandonment was the Middle East, followed by Europe. The two countries where most ship abandonments took place and the highest number of vessels on which abandonments occurred were Türkiye (61) and the United Arab Emirates (54) both of which were found to have significantly higher abandonment rates than any other country.

The ITF data, to be submitted in a report to the IMO ahead of its discussion at a legal committee meeting later this year, also shows that seafarers were owed a total of 25.8 million dollars in 2025 as a consequence of the abandonments. From this total, the ITF said it has recovered and returned 16.5 million dollars to seafarers.

"In 2025, we've yet again seen the worst year on record for seafarer abandonment. But this isn't just a story about

numbers, these are the people the workers who keep our economy moving forward being forced into absolutely desperate situations, far from home and often without any clear resolution in sight," said ITF General Secretary Stephen Cotton.

"As we've long said, the solutions to abandonment lie in accountability in the shipping industry ensuring that ship owners can't dodge their responsibilities. The International Maritime Organisation must be given more power to play a coordinating role in eradicating abandonment," he said.

The union has been campaigning against the misuse of the 'Flags of Convenience' (FOC) system. An FOC vessel is one that flies the flag of a country other than the country of ownership, at the same time adopting the regulations set down by that flag.

Dominant India eye sparkling outing from spinners in 4th T20I against NZ



VISAKAPTANAM: With the series already sealed, India will be hoping for a positive turn in their spinners' performance while attempting to extend the total domination over New Zealand to the fourth T20I here on Wednesday. The batting storm kicked up by Abhishek Sharma, Suryakumar Yadav and Ishan Kishan and the resultant 3-0 series lead has so far masked the underwhelming outings of two premier spinners - Kuldeep Yadav and Varun Chakravarthi.

Kuldeep has picked up two wickets in as many matches, but looked a distant shadow of his bewitching self, conceding 9.5 runs an over. The left-arm wrist spinner had three expensive overs, that leaked 32 runs, even when India limited the Kiwis to 153 for 9 riding on brilliant spells by Jasprit Bumrah, Ravi Bishnoi and Hardik Pandya.

In fact, the modest effort was a continuation from the

preceding ODI series in which he took three wickets across three matches and gave away 7.28 runs an over.

Chakravarthi, who was rested for the third T20I, is a slightly different case as he has played in two high-scoring matches when the visitors scored 190 and 208. But the usual zip has not been there in his bowling. The little time away might have been useful in replenishing him.

Kuldeep or Bishnoi?

In that context, India will ponder whether to persist with Bishnoi (40-18-2 at Guwahati) in the fourth match, and bring back Chakravarthi in place of Kuldeep to allow the latter some breathing space. India will also keep a close eye on the fitness of all-rounder Axar Patel, as he has not played since the first game at Nagpur because of a finger injury.

Bats of fury

While the bowling pieces in this series have still not

entirely fallen in their places, the hosts' batting has been a different story.

The top-order reshaped India's T20 batting in this series and third match resembled an extended Power Play. Abhishek has scored at a strike-rate of over 300 while Suryakumar and Kishan have maintained a strike-rate close to 230. Such has been the fury in their batting that India have so far spent only a combined 25.2 overs in the park while chasing 209 and 154 (363 runs in total) in the second and third T20Is. If the nature of the pitch and the amount of dew in Visakhapatnam are anything to go by, this match too will not be offering a different script.

The only out of sync piece, surprisingly too, is the wretched form of Sanju Samson, who has been given his preferred opening slot in this series. Perhaps, dawdling in the middle-order the whole of last year without role clari-

ty has affected his rhythm but the talent rush in Indian cricket has made it mandatory for Samson to come good on almost all occasions. However, pitiful numbers in this series so far - 16 runs in three matches at 5.33 - have made the ride rough for him. But with a recuperating Tilak Varma having an extended time away from the team, Samson might be getting another game here to vindicate the management's faith in him. Perhaps, the team think tank can also consider giving him the No. 3 slot while pushing Kishan up to pair with Abhishek. However, the Kerala man will be aware that he is closer to the tip of the rope more than ever before.

Can Kiwis fly high?

Little has gone right for New Zealand in the ongoing series. Their batters found occasional spark but bowlers failed to mount a response to Indian batters' onslaught.

That Jacob Duffy, with an economy of 10.30, is their most parsimonious bowler tells a story in itself, but his numbers shine bright in comparison to other bowlers.

They offer a stunning read too. Matt Henry (13.80), Kyle Jamieson (14.20), Mitchell Santner (13.14) and Ish Sodhi (12.50) have all been taken to the cleaners by the home side.

There are some peripheral concerns such as a possible promotion of in-form Daryl Mitchell higher up in the order, but if the bowlers do not self-heal their scars and manage their fears quickly then another round of walloping awaits them.

Sabalenka ends Jovic's dream run, reaches fourth straight Aus Open semifinal



Melbourne, Jan 27: World No. 1 Aryna Sabalenka ended the 18-year-old American Iva Jovic's dream run, securing a 6-3, 6-0 win to reach her fourth consecutive Australian Open semifinal on Tuesday.

Sabalenka is the only player still standing in the women's field to have previously lifted the Daphne Akhurst Memorial Cup. With her place in a fourth consecutive Melbourne semifinal, the top seed has reached the last four at a major for the 14th time.

In a dominant display, the top seed struck 31 winners to Jovic's 12 and won 61

per cent of points on the 29th seed's second serve.

Jovic at 18 was the youngest player to reach the last eight at the Australian Open without dropping a set since Venus Williams in 1998. Sabalenka, who is yet to drop a set, will face either No. 3 seed Coco Gauff or No. 12 seed Elina Svitolina next.

In the pair's first-ever meeting, Sabalenka immediately exerted her authority by pouncing on Jovic's second serves to break and quickly consolidated for a 3-0 lead. Jovic prevented herself from falling to an even bigger deficit. Her stunning ball-striking trou-

bled Sabalenka. Serving for the set at 5-3, the top seed saved one break point before Jovic fended off a first set point. The four-time major champion saved another two break points with her trusty serve and set up a second set point with a cracking forehand winner down the line, only to be denied when Jovic returned her serve, the Australian Open reports. Sabalenka then struck a brilliant backhand to earn a third set point and pumelled another backhand down the line to claim the set. In the second set, Sabalenka surged to an

early lead, placing yet another backhand winner, leading her to break in the 29th seed's opening service game. Sabalenka then gained an insurance break and a 3-0 lead, then held to love to put the match within two games of its conclusion. The 29th seed, Jovic, benefited from a double fault donation from Sabalenka and produced winners off both wings to earn a pair of break points as the top-seeded rival served for the match. Sabalenka saved the two serves and seconds later claimed victory and a semifinal berth with an ace out wide on match point.

Australian Open: Pegula knocks out defending champion Keys



MELBOURNE: Jessica Pegula knocked podcast pal and defending champion Madison Keys out of the Australian Open on Monday and moved into a quarterfinal against Amanda Anisimova, another all-American match. Their fourth-round wins on Day 9 meant four Americans reached the women's singles

quarterfinals in Australia for the first time since 2001, when Serena and Venus Williams, Jennifer Capriati, Monica Seles and Lindsay Davenport made it to the last 8. "Sucks that one American has to go out in the quarterfinals," Anisimova said. Pegula had a slightly different view: "At least one of us will get through, and I think that's great for American tennis. Yeah, it's been pretty crazy how well the women have been doing and how many top-ranked girls there are," she added. "I'm just happy to be a part of that conversation." Pegula and Anisimova advanced a day after No. 3 Coco Gauff and 18-year-old Iva Jovic earned their places on the other side of the draw.

VISAKHAPATNAM: The struggling Sanju Samson on Tuesday received a big vote of confidence as bowling coach Morne Morkel said the opener was just one knock away from breaking free from a lean run. Samson has so far made just 16 runs in three T20Is with a highest of 10 when other top-order batters like Abhishek Sharma, Ishan Kishan and Suryakumar Yadav were punishing the New Zealand bowlers.

"Sanju is one knock away from getting that confidence, getting that form back. For us, building up to the World Cup it's important for the guys to find that peak performance at the right time. He's training well, he's hitting the ball very well," Morkel said on the eve of the fourth T20I here.

Despite it being an optional nets, Samson spent more than 30 minutes at nets facing various bowlers such as Axar Patel, Varun Chakravarthi, Abhishek and side-armner Raghu. After an initial few min-

utes of struggle, the familiar Samson surfaced with him sending the ball to the far corners of ACA-VDCA Stadium. The Kerala batter then proceeded to have a long chat with head coach Gautam Gambhir and batting coach Sitanshu Kotak on the sides of nets where Shreyas Iyer went about his task.

They were seen patiently explaining a few things to the beleaguered batter.

Fittingly, Morkel was not overly worried about Samson's form and said team's victory mattered more than individual efforts. "So, I think it's just a matter of time for him to get his foot on the board. But the main focus is that the team is winning, and I think that's important. We're 3-0 up in this series at the moment, the boys are playing some very good cricket. "We've got a couple of games now before the start of the World Cup, and I have no doubt that Sanju will find his form," added the South African.

Scotland hopeful of timely Indian visas ahead of T20 World Cup opener

NEW DELHI: Cricket Scotland chief executive Trudy Lindblade is confident that players of the national team, including Pakistan-origin pacer Safyaan Sharif, will get visas in time to travel to India for the T20 World Cup. Scotland were included into the T20 World Cup following Bangladesh's withdrawal citing security concerns despite the ICC insisting that there were no threats as per their assessment.

Scotland will open their campaign against West Indies in Kolkata on February 7. Pakistan origin applicants of India visa attract more scrutiny and therefore taking more processing time.

"We are all committed (to) working with the ICC to make that happen," Lindblade was quoted as saying by ESPNcricinfo. "The visa piece is always slightly an unknown, and

it doesn't matter whether you've got three days or whether you've got 45 days. "Certainly that's been our focus in the last 48 hours: just getting those visas done so our players are all ready to go. They're all in the middle of submitting their visas and we will be there on the ground in India as quickly as we can, so it's just a matter of time now." Sharif, who was born in Huddersfield to a Pakistani father and a British-Pakistani mother, shifted to Scotland as a seven-year-old.

"(The ICC) can only give us the assurances of the bits that they can control and, absolutely, of the bits that they control, we are working with them and obviously they're working with the BCCI and local people on the ground there to make sure that we are getting all of that support that we need," Lindblade said. "So, absolutely, (they



have given) the assurance that they can provide of things that were in their control. There is a team working very, very hard to not just help us, but to help 19 other teams as well that are also going to a World Cup. But we are their intense focus right now."

As a contingency plan, Scotland will also apply for visas for two travelling reserves and three non-

travelling reserves to ensure they can field a team in case of delays.

"We [also] anticipate some support whenever we can [get it] from the BCCI," Scotland's head of performance, Steve Snell said. "I don't think we need to escalate that any further to get into the country, because you'd suggest that Scotland being invited to attend the World Cup and

then not being able to get there wouldn't be a great look for anybody."

Scotland will play warm-up matches against Afghanistan and Namibia in Bengaluru on February 2 and 4 before their opening match against West Indies in Kolkata. Their other first-round matches are against Italy, England and Nepal, with the top two teams in Group B

qualifying for the Super 8s stage. We do feel for Bangladesh

Lindblade said Scotland sympathise with Bangladesh and that this was not how they wanted to compete in the ICC showpiece.

"We certainly have for the Bangladesh team," Lindblade said when asked if she had sympathy for the side they had replaced.

"Obviously, this is not how we wanted to go to a World Cup. There is a qualification process and nobody wants to qualify or attend or be invited to a World Cup in the way that we have done. We acknowledge it is certainly unique circumstances by our participation, and we do feel for the Bangladesh players." Scotland had missed out on qualification after losing matches against Italy and Jersey at the Europe Regional Final last July.
