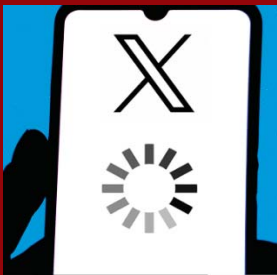

Gold, silver fall as dollar strengthens

Gold and silver prices declined on Monday amid a stronger US dollar following in-line US inflation data. On MCX, gold April futures fell 0.56% to Rs 1,55,023 per 10 grams, while silver March futures dropped nearly 2% to Rs 2,39,501 per kg. US CPI rose 0.2% in January, with annual inflation easing to 2.4%, giving room for the US Fed to hold rates steady. Analysts said precious metals remain supported by geopolitical tensions and central bank buying, while investors await FOMC minutes and key US economic data for further direction.

28 schools in Ahmedabad and Vadodara get bomb threat

AHMEDABAD (TSIT): At least 28 schools in Ahmedabad and Vadodara in Gujarat received bomb threat emails on Monday, following which the campuses were evacuated, officials said. Search operations were immediately undertaken, they said, adding that nothing suspicious has been found so far. More than 15 schools in Ahmedabad received bomb threat emails, District Education Officer Rohit Chaudhary said. "All the schools were instructed to immediately inform the nearby police stations and follow security protocol," he told reporters. Vadodara Police Commissioner Narasimha Komar said as many as 13 schools in different localities of the city received bomb threat emails. The managements of these schools informed the police control room. Subsequently, the local police, Special Operations Group (SOG), Crime Branch and Bomb Detection and Disposal Squads (BDDS) personnel carried out a sanitisation exercise and evacuation of students and teachers, he said. "Sanitisation exercise of nine schools has been completed, and the process is underway for the remaining schools."

Seven killed in chemical factory fire

JAIPUR: Seven people were burnt alive in an illegal firecracker-manufacturing factory in the Bhiwadi town of Rajasthan's Khairthal-Tijara district on Monday, officials said. "Seven persons have died in the incident. It was a garment factory but firecrackers were being manufactured inside it illegally," Sumitra Pareek, Additional District Magistrate, said. She said that two people were trapped in the factory. The incident occurred in the Khushkhhera-Karoli industrial area in Bhiwadi. "The premises was leased out in the name of a garment factory but as per the preliminary report, firecrackers were being manufactured illegally," she said.

Congress dominates Telangana mayoral polls, BRS fails to open account

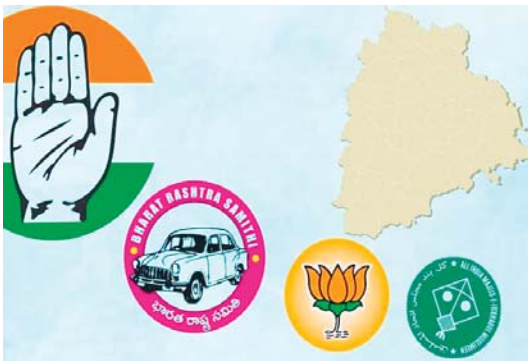
District Collectors postponed the polling of the Mayor and Deputy Mayor posts to 11 Telangana municipalities.

HYDERABAD (TSIT): The State Election Commission, on Monday, February 16, announced the list of candidates declared as Mayors and Deputy Mayors for its seven municipal corporations in Telangana. Five Mayoral posts went to Congress, while the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and the Communist Party of India (CPI) got one each.

For the Deputy Mayor post, five candidates from Congress were declared as winners, while the BJP and All India Majlis-e-Ittehadul Muslimeen (AIMIM) secured one post each. Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) failed to secure any posts.

Through crucial ex officio votes, the ruling Congress won Wardhannapet and Kesamudram, earlier declared hung municipalities in the recently announced poll results. In Wardhannapet, the Congress had bagged five seats, while six were won by the BRS.

Independent candidate, Nethavath Shibharani-Rajender, won the remaining seat but declared support for the ruling party, resulting in a tie. On Monday, MLA KR Nagaraj cast his ex officio vote in favour of the Congress. Similarly, in the Kesamudram municipality, the Congress and the BRS won eight seats of the total 16. Mahabubabad MP P Balram Naik cast his ex officio vote in favour of the Grand Old Party.

BJP attacks Rahul Gandhi, calls him 'failed dynast'

NEW DELHI: (Feb 16) The BJP on Monday attacked Congress leader Rahul Gandhi, alleging that he is a "failed dynast" as neither his own party leaders nor allies have any confidence in him. This came after Bhupen Borah, former president of the Assam Congress, sent his resignation letter to party president Mallikarjun Kharge, claiming he was being "ignored" by the party leadership and not being accorded his due in the state unit. Reacting to the development, BJP national spokesperson Shehzad Poonawalla wrote on X, "No Confidence in Rahul Gandhi."

KTR slams Congress over 'undemocratic' municipal polls

Hyderabad (TSIT): Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) Working President K T Rama Rao on Monday strongly condemned what he termed as undemocratic and anarchic practices adopted by the ruling Congress during the ongoing chairman and vice-chairman elections in several municipalities across Telangana. In a statement, KTR alleged that instead of respecting the people's mandate, the government and police were acting in a partisan manner by obstructing elected representatives. He expressed anger over alleged attempts by Congress MPs and MLAs to kidnap elected members and resort to intimidation and attacks in various towns, including Thorur, Jangaon, Kyatanapalli and Kagaznagar. Accusing the Congress of promoting a "gunda raj," KTR said

India-Bangladesh ties will be reset, but incrementally

New Delhi (TSIT) Ahead of the swearing-in ceremony of BNP leader Tarique Rahman as Bangladesh's prime minister, Mandarins in India's South Bloc are working overtime on the country's outreach to its eastern neighbour. For Indian policymakers, the real challenge in resetting ties with Dhaka is not one of intent but of calibration, understanding what is politically feasible in Bangladesh's new landscape, and what is not. "We should not think of an immediate reset in ties. It will be a gradual process ... However with foreign Secretary travelling to Dhaka for the swearing in ceremony along with Speaker Om Birla, informal talks are likely on the sidelines," said top officials of the Ministry of

External Affairs. The last one-and-a-half years are seen by South Bloc as "wasted time" on the Bangladesh front as the interim administration led by Muhammad Yunus was seen as jeopardising every attempt made at normalising relations. Pinak Chakravarty, former Secretary-Economic Relations in the Ministry of External

Affairs, told UNI, "There will be an incremental improvement in relations. The new PM has to settle in before decisions can be taken." Both countries may tackle issues such as "trade, rail connectivity and visas in the first instance, as these produce visible, tangible people-to-people benefits," added Riva Ganguly Das, former

Secretary-East in the MEA. Tarique Rahman has signalled a clear desire to stabilise relations with India. Throughout his campaign, he refrained from the familiar anti-India rhetoric that has periodically animated Bangladeshi politics. "Rahman has displayed considerable political maturity both during the campaign and in pronouncements afterwards," agreed Shantanu Mukharji, former National Security Advisor to Mauritius. The BNP leader's advisers have been unusually forthcoming, projecting goodwill and even extending an invitation to Prime Minister Narendra Modi. The tone, at least rhetorically, has been constructive. Yet rhetoric and governance are two different arenas.

PM Modi 'surrendered' before Trump, US trade deal will devastate farmers' livelihood: Cong

NEW DELHI (TSIT) The Congress on Monday alleged that Prime Minister Narendra Modi has "surrendered" before US President Donald Trump in agreeing to the India-US interim trade deal, which, it claimed, will "devastate" the livelihoods of crores of farmers across states. Slamming the Centre, Congress general secretary Randeep Surjewala said trade agreements should not become a path to slavery by "sacrificing a country's sovereignty." "Trade agreements are the path to economic progress. The very foundation of trade agreements is mutual public interest on equal terms. Trade agreements should not be a path to slavery by sacrificing a coun-

try's sovereignty. National and public interests cannot be sacrificed under the guise of trade agreements," Surjewala said at a press conference. Tagging Surjewala's statement at the presser, Congress general secretary in-charge communications, Jairam Ramesh, said the former explained how this trade deal will "devastate" the livelihoods

of millions of farmers across states. "The prime minister has completely surrendered before President Trump - just as he did on May 10, 2025, when he abruptly and unexpectedly halted Operation Sindoor," Ramesh said on X. Through the US-India trade agreement, the Modi government has sacrificed the interests of India's farmers and farms, Surjewala alleged at the presser. "India's energy security was openly compromised. Serious questions have been raised about India's digital autonomy and data privacy. Instead of standing firmly in defence of India's interests, a helpless government compromised India's sovereignty and self-reliance," he claimed.











Amit Shah slams Congress over trade deal claims, says farmers' interests fully protected

Gandhinagar, Feb 15: Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Sunday accused the Congress and its leader Rahul Gandhi of spreading "lies" and misleading farmers over India's trade agreements with the US, UK and the European Union, asserting that the Centre has fully safeguarded the agriculture and dairy sectors.

Addressing a gathering in Gandhinagar after launching India's first Central Bank Digital Currency (CBDC)-based Public Distribution System, Shah termed the



Opposition's allegations that trade pacts would harm Indian farmers as "laughable". "I feel like laughing when Congress's Shahzada

Rahul Gandhi stands in Parliament and talks about protecting farmers. The Congress has a long history of misleading the country and now they are spreading lies about trade deals," Shah said.

He also challenged Gandhi to a public debate on the issue.

"Rahul Gandhi ji, decide any platform. Even the president of the BJP Yuva Morcha can come and debate with you on who has harmed farmers and who has worked for their welfare," he added. Shah asserted that

Prime Minister Narendra Modi has ensured comprehensive protection for farmers, cattle-rearers and fishermen in every trade agreement signed with the European Union, England and the United States.

"I want to assure the farmers, cattle-rearers and fishermen of this country that in every trade deal signed with the European Union, England and America, Narendra Modi has safeguarded your interests completely. There is no need to worry," he said.

Yogi Adityanath hails UP's transformation, highlights law, development, and investment gains

Lucknow, Feb 16: Uttar Pradesh chief minister Yogi Adityanath on Monday lauded the state's transformation since 2017, saying it has shed its former image of crime and unrest to emerge as a model of "technology, trust, and transformation." Addressing the Legislative Council during the debate on the Governor's Address, CM Yogi criticized the opposition for what he described as disrespect toward constitutional traditions during the speech, asserting that such conduct undermines democratic institutions.

Highlighting the shift in law and order, he said curfews and riots are now a thing of the past, replaced by governance rooted in the "rule of law." "Uttar Pradesh has moved from being a 'fear zone' to a 'faith zone,'" he declared, citing the participation of over 40 lakh devotees in the Triveni bath during Mahashivratri as evidence of improved security. He also pointed to the deployment of more than 44,000 women in the police force, alongside modern training centers and barracks, as milestones in strengthening the state's law enforcement infrastructure.

On the economic front, CM Yogi highlighted that the state, previously branded a "BIMARU" region, now contributes 9.5% to



India's GDP, with per capita income having tripled. He noted that no new taxes have been imposed in the past eight-and-a-half years, tax evasion has been curtailed, and the state has become revenue-surplus.

Industrial growth has also accelerated, with factories rising from 14,000 in 2017 to over 31,000 today. The One District One Product (ODOP) scheme has linked local producers to markets, while 96 lakh MSME units have created employment opportunities for youth. CM Yogi stressed that governments ignoring artisans face the same fate as previous parties like the Samajwadi Party. Farmers, he said, now benefit from reduced input costs, higher output, and direct benefit transfers.

Over Rs 95,000 crore has been disbursed under the Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi, with sugarcane farmers receiving Rs 3.06 lakh crore. Additionally, 7,727 cow shelters are operational across the state.

In healthcare, the Chief Minister highlighted the One District, One Medical College initiative and an expanded medical infrastructure. The state has also strengthened forensic capabilities, with A-grade labs increasing from two to twelve, and six more under construction. Reaffirming his government's nationalist stance, CM Yogi emphasized mandatory respect for the national anthem and national song, warning that opposition to Vande Mataram will not be tolerated.

Assam Rifles, DRI seize drugs worth Rs 45 crore in Northeast crackdown

Agartala, Feb 16: In a significant blow to narcotics trafficking in the Northeast, the Assam Rifles, working alongside the Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI), confiscated methamphetamine tablets worth more than Rs 45 crore in Tripura and arrested one suspected trafficker, officials confirmed on Monday.

Acting on specific intelligence inputs, joint teams intercepted a truck at Mungiaikami in Khowai district. A meticulous search of the vehicle led to the discovery of nearly 4.5 lakh methamphetamine tablets, commonly known as Yaba or "party pills." The seized narcotics, estimated to be valued at ₹45 crore in the illicit market, are banned in India due to their highly addictive nature. These tablets typically contain a combination of methamphetamine and caffeine and are often referred



to as the "crazy drug." Authorities apprehended

Hafijul Hoque (42), a resident of Udalguri district in Assam, in connection with the seizure. Both the recovered contraband and the accused have been handed over to the DRI for further investigation and legal action.

Officials described the operation as part of an ongoing effort by the Assam Rifles and DRI to curb the growing threat of drug trafficking in the region and to prevent the spread of narcotics across vulnerable border states.

Separate Operation in Manipur

In a parallel action based on intelligence reports about cigarette smuggling, the Assam Rifles set up a mobile vehicle check post in Noney district of Manipur on Sunday. During the operation, a truck travelling from Churachandpur to Kangpokpi was stopped and

searched thoroughly.

The inspection resulted in the seizure of 88 cartons of foreign-made cigarettes valued at approximately Rs 2.9 crore. The consignment, along with the vehicle, has been handed over to the DRI for further legal proceedings. Two individuals were detained in connection with the case.

Preliminary investigations suggest that both the methamphetamine tablets and the smuggled cigarettes may have originated from Myanmar. Myanmar, which shares a 1,643-km unfenced border with four northeastern states — Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur, Nagaland, and Mizoram — remains a critical transit route for illicit drugs, including heroin and methamphetamine, entering India. Authorities continue to strengthen surveillance and enforcement measures along the porous border to counter cross-border smuggling networks.

Kerala launches massive AI literacy drive

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM: Kerala Infrastructure and Technology for Education (KITE), the technical arm of the state General Education Department, has launched a massive artificial intelligence literacy drive targeting the adult population. Titled 'Sarvam AI Mayam' (AI is Everywhere), the initiative is considered as the largest such artificial intelligence awareness programme to be implemented in the country, official sources said here on Sunday. Under the initiative, students of the Little KITEs IT clubs will provide AI training to 6 lakh parents through the state's public schools, according to an official statement. The programme, which is scheduled to run until June 30, 2026, is being implemented across 2,200 Little KITEs units, with each unit training an average of 300 parents, it said.

Sabarimala women entry issue: Govt will take appropriate stand through discussions, says minister

CLARIFYING THE GOVERNMENT'S STAND, STATE LAW MINISTER P RAJEEV SAID THE SUPREME COURT HAD ALREADY MADE IT CLEAR THAT IT

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM: The ruling Left in Kerala on Monday said the Sabarimala women entry issue is a matter involving several constitutional complications, and so the government would take an appropriate stand through discussions. Clarifying the government's stand, State Law Minister P Rajeev said the Supreme Court had already made it clear that it would take the review petitions only after addressing seven constitutional questions.

So, the state government has enough time to inform its stand, he said, adding that it is not the time to say a "yes or no" in the matter.

He, however, said the government is here to protect the faith of believers and it would stand by them cutting across belief.

"This is not an issue that can be solved in one minute. Several constitutional complications are involved in it," Rajeev said. He said the state government, in its earlier affidavit, had suggested constituting a com-



mission of scholars having deep knowledge of Hindu beliefs to study the women's entry issue, but the apex court didn't consider it.

The stand of the state government is clear with that suggestion, he added. "We will present a good stand before the supreme court after examining the constitutional aspects. We have ample time," he said, adding that a stand would be taken after examining all aspects in detail.

The minister's remarks came soon

after the Supreme Court said that a nine-judge bench will commence a final hearing on a batch of petitions relating to discrimination against women in religions and at religious places, including Kerala's Sabarimala Temple. A bench comprising Chief Justice Surya Kant and Justices Joymalya Bagchi and Vipul M Pancholi said the bench, which will be constituted by the CJI, will commence the crucial hearing on the petitions on April 7.

Let institutions not be defunct: SC asks Centre to come up with scheme on tribunal reforms

The bench expressed concern over the vacancy crisis and the lack of a streamlined legislative framework that often leaves tribunals in a state of limbo.

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court on Monday took note of issues plaguing the functioning of quasi-judicial bodies and asked the Centre to submit a comprehensive and uniform proposal for the management of all tribunals across the country within four weeks. A bench comprising Chief Justice Surya Kant and Justices Joymalya Bagchi and Vipul M Pancholi was hearing the long-standing matter of Madras Bar Association, a case centred on the independence and structural integrity of tribunals.

The bench expressed concern over the vacancy crisis and the lack of a streamlined legislative framework that often leaves tribunals in a state



of limbo. The CJI told Attorney General R Venkataramani that the government must act in accordance with previous judicial mandates. "Let the institutions not be defunct," the CJI said.

"Bring a uniform proposal before us covering all tribunals within four weeks. Give us a holistic scheme for all tribunals. Whether you want to bring a new legislation, a new

amendment etc," the CJI said. The bench asked the Centre to bring a "uniform proposal" that covers all tribunals, whether they are established under the Constitution or specific statutes.

It asked the Centre to clarify its roadmap, including whether it intends to introduce new legislation or comprehensive amendments to stabilise the functioning of these bodies. The attorney general suggested a pragmatic approach to prevent immediate vacancies.

He proposed that sitting chairmen be allowed to continue their duties until they reach the age of superannuation or until the fresh selection process is completed, whichever is earlier.

Odisha caste row ends; children return to anganwadi centre, consume food cooked by Dalit helper

KENDRAPARA: A three-month-long caste row at an anganwadi centre in a village in Odisha's Kendrapara district ended on Monday as upper caste children returned to the facility and consumed food cooked by a Dalit woman helper. Of the 20 children on the roll, 16 came to the anganwadi centre in Nuagaon village under Ghalimala gram panchayat with their parents and accepted the food cooked by the helper, with the absentees reporting ill.

The anganwadi centre remained shut since November 21 last year, following the appointment of Sharmistha Sethy, a Dalit woman, as a helper, with several upper caste families refusing to send their wards to the facility or



even accept nutritious food items supplied by the government for pregnant women and lactating mothers.

The caste row triggered nationwide outrage, and the matter was even raised in Parliament, with Congress president and Leader of the Opposition in Rajya Sabha, Mallikarjun Kharge, voic-

ing concern over caste discrimination in the workplace. On Monday, Kendrapara Child Development Project Officer (CDPO) Dipali Mishra and Rajnagar MLA Dhruba Charan Sahoo were present at the anganwadi centre to welcome the children.

"I served ragi ladoos to the children. Later, I

cooked rice and 'dalma' (vegetable curry) and served the children. Seeing them eat the meals made me overjoyed. They also played with toys, bringing back life to the centre, which was left deserted for around three months," Sethy said.

"I hope caste discrimination will not lurk its ugly head in the village anymore," she added.

CDPO Mishra said the children, flanked by their guardians, had joyous moments at the centre.

"The centre functioned sans the children for almost three months due to some villagers' disagreement over the appointment of Sharmistha Sethy as the anganwadi centre helper. Now, the vibrancy is back," Mishra said.

UPI pips cash as India's top payment mode with 57 per cent share of total transactions

New Delhi, Feb 16 : UPI has emerged as the most preferred mode of payment, accounting for 57 per cent of total payment transactions in India, surpassing cash transactions at 38 per cent, primarily due to ease of use and instant fund transfer capability, according to an independent study commissioned by the Finance Ministry.

Digital payments now dominate everyday transaction behaviour, with 65 per cent of UPI users reporting multiple digital transactions per day. Preference for UPI is particularly pronounced among younger users in the 18-25 age group, where adoption stands at 66 per cent, indicating a strong behavioural shift toward



digital-first financial habits, the study stated.

It finds that 90 per cent of users reported increased confidence in digital payments after using UPI and RuPay cards, accompanied by a marked decline in cash usage and ATM withdrawals. Cashback incentives were identified as a key motivation for adoption by 52 per cent of

users, while 74 per cent cited speed of payment as the primary advantage.

Among merchants, digital acceptance has reached near universality, with 94 per cent of small merchants reporting adoption of UPI. About 72 per cent expressed satisfaction with digital payments, citing faster transactions, improved record-keeping,

and operational convenience, while 57 per cent reported an increase in sales following digital adoption.

The report highlights that incentives have played a critical role in reducing cost barriers for merchants and acquiring banks, accelerating merchant onboarding, and building trust in digital payment systems across income groups and geographies. Coordinated efforts of the government, the National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI), banks, fintech players, and payment service providers have collectively strengthened India's digital payments ecosystem and advanced the vision of a less-cash, digitally empowered economy.

India’s retail market to more than double to Rs 210–215 trillion by 2035: Report



Mumbai, Feb 16 : India’s retail market is set for massive expansion over the next decade, with its size expected to more than double to Rs 210–215 trillion by 2035 from around Rs 90–95 trillion in 2025, according to a new joint report released on Monday.

The report, unveiled by Boston Consulting Group (BCG) and the Retailers Association of India (RAI) at the Retail Leadership Summit 2026 here underline the strong consumption momentum in the country and highlight how technology, especially artificial intelligence (AI), will play a defin-

ing role in shaping the next phase of retail growth.

It examines the structural shifts reshaping Indian retail, evolving consumer behaviour, and the strategic choices retailers must make to remain competitive.

India continues to be one of the fastest-growing major economies in the world, with GDP growth of 8 per cent in 2025.

Strong private consumption, particularly in discretionary and services spending, is driving this momentum.

The report said that India is on track to become the world’s third-

largest economy by 2030, creating a significant opportunity for retailers over the next decade.

According to the report, AI is not just improving front-end experiences but also reshaping core retail functions such as merchandising, supply chain, marketing and customer service. A full-scale, function-led AI transformation can unlock performance gains of 40 per cent to 60 per cent, compared with just 10 per cent to 15 per cent improvements from isolated use cases.

However, the study emphasised that nearly 70 per cent of the value generated from AI comes from internal capabilities, process redesign and effective change management rather than technology alone.

Abheek Singhi, Managing Director and Senior Partner at BCG, said India’s retail sector is poised to expand into a nearly Rs 200 trillion opportunity over the next decade.

Bharat Mimani, Managing Director and Partner at BCG, said retail is entering a decisive phase where AI is becoming a core driver of competitive advantage rather than a side experiment.

Kumar Rajagopalan, CEO of RAI, said the next decade’s Rs 200 trillion opportunity will not be captured by sales growth alone. He stressed that retailers must embed AI across the shopper journey, rebuild talent and operating models, and treat transformation as a continuous discipline rather than a one-time project.

Priyank Kharge Alleges Financial Irregularities in RSS, Seeks Legal Scrutiny

Bengaluru: Karnataka minister Priyank Kharge on Sunday launched a sharp attack on the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS), alleging financial opacity and demanding that the organisation be brought under constitutional and legal scrutiny.

Kharge, son of Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge, accused the RSS — widely regarded as the ideological mentor of the Bharatiya Janata Party — of financial irregularities, including money laundering, though he did not provide documentary proof.

He claimed funds were being routed through donations and “guru dakshina” and questioned the lack of clarity about the source and final destination of these funds.

“... they (i.e., the RSS) want us to be good citizens and pay our income tax... but they want to remain free (from pay-



ing taxes). How is this possible? We will have to question this,” Kharge said at a private event in Bengaluru.

“Around 2,500 organisations are associated with the RSS. Money is being collected from many countries, including US and UK. Considering this, it can be said there is a huge money laundering racket behind the RSS,” he alleged.

“But if we ask about the source of the money, they tell

us ‘guru dakshina’... but where is this coming from? Who is paying it? And why is RSS not paying tax? When every rupee of others is being accounted for... why is there no accountability for their money and spending?” he asked.

Kharge asserted he would “not give up until RSS is registered under the Constitution,” maintaining that no organisation should be above the law.

He was responding to remarks by RSS chief Mohan Bhagwat, who had said the RSS is a “body of individuals” and therefore does not require registration. Disagreeing, Kharge argued that similar bodies are registered and pay taxes.

“Even the Bangalore Club is a body of individuals... but have they not registered? And are they not paying taxes?” he said, comparing the RSS and the BJP to a “devil” and its “shadow”.

War of words erupt as BJP, Cong clash over RSS

Bengaluru, Feb 16 (TSIT) A political slugfest erupted in Karnataka with the Congress questioning the transparency and registration status of the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) and the BJP hitting back, triggering a bitter and personal war of words between the two parties. The controversy began after Karnataka Minister Priyank Kharge raised questions regarding the legal registration, financial disclosures and functioning of the RSS, asking whether an organisation operating nationwide should not be subject to statutory scrutiny. Responding sharply, Karnataka BJP president Vijayendra Yediyurappa accused the Congress of deliberately targeting the ideological mentor of the BJP for political mileage. He defended the RSS and alleged that the Congress was attempting to malign nationalist organisations to divert attention from its own governance failures. The exchange soon turned personal, with Congress leaders criticising Vijayendra’s remarks and accusing him of attacking Kharge and his family instead of addressing the substantive issues raised. The Karnataka Pradesh Congress Committee (KPCC) said the BJP was evading “basic and legitimate questions” about transparency by resorting to personal criticism. Congress leaders maintained that any organisation operating in India must comply with the law, including proper registration and financial accountability.

Rajnath sets 5–7 year deadline for indigenous aero engine breakthrough

Bengaluru, Feb 16 (UNI) In a strong push for strategic urgency, Raksha Mantri Rajnath Singh on Monday declared that India must fast-track indigenous aero engine development and act as if “20 years have already passed” with only “5–7 years left” to deliver next-generation capabilities.

Speaking during his visit to the Gas Turbine Research Establishment (GTRE) of the Defence Research and Development Organisation here, Singh said the country can no longer afford prolonged timelines in mastering critical military engine technologies. “We must assume that 20 years have

already passed and we now have only 5–7 years left,” he said, calling it a decisive moment aligned with India’s strategic aspirations.

Reviewing ongoing indigenous military gas turbine engine programmes, the Raksha Mantri was briefed on projects under development, collaboration with Indian industry, academia and R&D institutions, and support extended to the armed forces.

He also witnessed the full afterburner engine test of the Kaveri engine and toured an exhibition of indigenous engines and components.

Linking aero engine capability directly to

national security, Singh stressed that in a rapidly evolving geopolitical landscape marked by fragile global supply chains, nations possessing indigenous critical technologies would remain secure and self-sustaining.

He reiterated the Centre’s commitment under Prime Minister Narendra Modi to achieve Aatmanirbharta across strategic sectors.

Referring to the Advanced Medium Combat Aircraft (AMCA) programme, he said India is moving swiftly towards its design and development phase and underscored the need to complete past efforts in engine technology.

No one should endure such grief, say parents as body of software professional shot in Canada arrives in Bengaluru

Bengaluru, Feb 16 : The body of 37-year-old Chandan Kumar, who was shot dead by unidentified assailants in the parking lot of a busy shopping centre in Toronto, Canada, on February 7, reached his hometown Tyamagondlu in Bengaluru Rural district, ten days after the incident. His parents told the media on Monday that their son’s good deeds have brought them pride and solace. Praying to God to bless his soul, they added that no one should have to endure such grief. The mortal remains arrived at

Kempegowda International Airport in Bengaluru from Delhi late on Sunday night. The body was later shifted by ambulance to Nelamangala and then taken to Tyamagondlu town. Family members said the body will be kept for public darshan from 12 noon to 3 pm on Monday. The final rites will be performed at the Aryavaishya Sangha premises. Chandan’s father, Nandan Kumar, said the family received their son’s body on the occasion of Maha Shivaratri festival and expressed deep grief over the loss. “We received the body of our son on the day of Shivaratri. May God bless him with another life. Our

son never troubled us for anything. We did not know he was so popular and had earned such a good name. He

never shared his struggles with us. He had asked us to move to Canada, but we did not go.

Vijayendra Slams Congress Govt Over Medicine Shortage, Targets CM and Ministers

Bengaluru: BJP State President and MLA B. Y. Vijayendra has expressed concern, stating that while the Chief Minister has granted foreign tours to MLAs, if even the Health Minister is sent to Australia and New Zealand, what will be the fate of the poor?

Speaking at a press conference held at the BJP State Office, Jagannath Bhavan, he alleged that poor people are struggling as medicines are not available in government hospitals in rural areas. In many places, surgeries are reportedly being postponed. He criticized the Health Minister and the Chief Minister for not paying attention to the issue. Before sending ministers and MLAs abroad, the state government must ensure proper supply of medicines, he demanded.

Unable to tolerate the popularity of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the Congress government had even resorted to attacking Jan Aushadhi centres, he alleged. He said that in rural areas, the government appears to be creating an artificial shortage of medicines and raising suspicion among the public about possible malpractice under the pretext of emergency procurement without calling tenders. He urged the state government and ministers to wake up and immediately resolve the issue.



Subtle hints about the CM’s resignation from his son

Referring to Chief Minister Siddaramaiah’s son Yathindra Siddaramaiah, Vijayendra criticized that Yathindra had said things would be good for D. K. Shivakumar and others after Shivaratri, but did not say that it would be good for the people of the state. He analyzed that the Chief Minister’s son had subtly hinted at the CM’s possible resignation and indicated that he himself might join the cabinet if the CM steps down.

He further said that over the

past two and a half years, the Congress government led by Siddaramaiah has committed injustice and betrayal against the people of the entire state, and that Yathindra’s remarks have made this evident. He added that Yathindra had voiced his inner thoughts and understood the pulse of the people in expressing hope that things would improve after Shivaratri.

Resolve the issues of shepherds

He questioned how much more political strength Siddaramaiah needs from the

community. At least resolve the problems of shepherds in the state, he urged. He criticized the government for not providing compensation under relief schemes when sheep die suddenly. He pointed out that 90,000 sheep and goats have died, with 45 crore still pending. He alleged that compensation has been provided only for 30,000 cases and urged Yathindra to at least ensure that pending dues are cleared.

Provide at least 1,000 crore

For the development of youth from oppressed and marginalized communities, former Chief Minister B. S. Yediyurappa had allocated 550 crore through various boards, he noted. He urged that if Siddaramaiah presents the budget, he should allocate at least 1,000 crore. He also demanded that Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes be further empowered. Responding to a question, he termed IT-BT Minister Priyank Kharge’s statement about the coastal districts as an unpardonable offense. He challenged the minister to state how many IT and BT industries he has brought to the coastal districts or to Kalaburagi. He added that apart from Bengaluru, coastal districts are among the fastest-developing regions in the state.

EDITORIAL

Pakistan Cricket And Lessons In How To Destroy A Sport, Completely

I am not entirely certain who I felt more sorry for after the conclusion of the latest instalment of the India vs Pakistan cricket "rivalry" (if one can still call it that). My heart went out to the ticket-buying public in Colombo. According to news reports, about 18,000 Indian and 12,000 Pakistani fans travelled to Sri Lanka for this match, which was a sellout. Did those in the stadium get their ticket's worth? Not to mention the money they spent on travel, stay, food, etc? Definitely not. One also felt a twinge of sadness for the broadcasters. How could you expect each and every cricket fan who had tuned in to stay interested in a "contest" that was pretty much done and dusted in the first five overs of the second innings (by which time Pakistan had been reduced to 34/4 in their chase of 176)? How many people would have just lost complete interest in the match at the time?

Did I feel sorry for the Pakistan team and their entire cricketing establishment, though? Not really. After all, what I witnessed on Sunday didn't surprise me one bit. Sure, this was the biggest margin of victory ever by runs (61 runs) for India in a T20i match against the neighbours, but did we really expect this to be an even contest? Disappointing, Not Surprising

In the answer to that question lies the root of the disappointment we all felt, despite India's commanding performance that officially took them into the Super Eights stage. Most of us wanted to see an even, well-fought contest. While we did see India play good, solid cricket, we didn't get to see a good cricket match. But then, India vs Pakistan cricket, which at one time was billed as a contest that rivalled the Ashes and maybe even overshadowed the hallowed Test series, is just not a rivalry anymore. The "mother of all cricket battles", as TV headlines screamed at one time, is now the mother of all no-contests. There's no bilateral Test cricket that is played between the two countries anymore, of course, and India is way ahead in white-ball cricket. And at the end of the day, Team India stamped their authority on the "contest" yet again, while Pakistan cricket, as their white-ball cricket Head Coach Mike Hesson (who is no stranger to Indian cricket fans) admitted "...probably took a little step back", at least when it comes to adapting to different conditions. For the record, this was India's 13th win in their last seventeen T20i matches vs Pakistan. This particular India vs Pakistan World Cup match had an extra layer of political sheen to it after the 'boycott saga'. Such was the level of humiliation the Pakistan fans felt after the 61-run thrashing that many of them said that the PCB should have just stuck to their stance of boycotting the match against India - it would have saved them the embarrassment of being reminded of the huge gulf that exists between the two teams in terms of overall quality and mental strength. This Team India, if you squeeze them, more often than not, will focus. Pakistan tend to fold.

A Bygone Era

However, while India's on-field prowess cannot be questioned, their policy of not shaking hands with the Pakistani cricketers (something that we see now also in senior women's international cricket and U-19 cricket) continues to raise a few eyebrows. There are certain things that fall within the bracket of "spirit of the game", and if two teams are playing each other, irrespective of what is happening between the two countries off the field, not shaking an opponent's hand can be seen as a mark of going against one of the longest traditions of the game. It just feels wrong. But make no mistake about it. This is here to stay. The moment the decision was taken not to shake hands with Pakistani cricketers on the field in the Asia Cup last year, the on-field relations between the two teams, which had been quite friendly for a long time, hit rock bottom. On Sunday, the call to continue to give the opponents the cold shoulder also added an icy element to the clash. Not only were there no handshakes, but the players barely even looked at each other. I was actually expecting some sledging from the players, but there were no words exchanged at all - either polite or nasty. Ironically, off the field, before the match began, former India captain Rohit Sharma, who is also the brand ambassador of the tournament, hugged and shook hands with Pakistan legend Wasim Akram.

Sonia-Rahul To Maken, Why Mani Shankar Aiyar Keeps Ditching His Verbal 'Filter'

Now, in the Rahul Gandhi era, too, Aiyar has been shown the door several times. His humiliation was complete when the All India Congress Committee (AICC) media department head, Pawan Khera, wrote on X, "Mr Mani Shankar Aiyar has had no connection whatsoever with the Congress for the past few years. He speaks and writes purely in his personal capacity." Aiyar was quick to retort in his trademark style and told the media, "I have not left the Congress. If Pawan Khera is going to expel me, I will happily go outside and kick his backside after I have Mani Shankar Aiyar has been known to create political storms with his words. with the internal goings-on in the grand old party point towards Jairam Ramesh, the chairman of the AICC's communication department. The rivalry between Jairam Ramesh and Mani Shankar Aiyar dates back to the 1980s and requires a separate volume. Priyanka's Snub Aiyar's disillusionment with the Congress hit its peak when his third autobiographical account, titled A Maverick in Politics 1991-2024, was released in New Delhi, and no member of the Nehru-Gandhi family turned up at the India International Centre on December 16, 2024, for its launch. Aiyar had earlier gone to campaign for Priyanka Gandhi at Wayanad during the Lok Sabha bypolls. Priyanka had reportedly agreed to release his book, but her office feigned ignorance, declining to give any time or date. Aiyar isn't new to courting controversies. From alluding to a party colleague as a "gangster's moll" - when Arjun Singh, Sheila Dikshit and some others rebelled against then Prime Minister PV Narasimha Rao in 1995, Aiyar had alluded to Sheila as a "gangster's moll" in his magazine column - to calling Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee "nalayak" (useless person), the career diplomat in Mani Shankar Aiyar has let just one too many un-diplomatic gaffes to blot his political track record. He had once called Narendra

Modi a "neech kism ka aadmi" (indecent man) in retaliation for a remark the Prime Minister had made at the inauguration of the Ambedkar International Centre, about the Congress undermining the legacy of BR Ambedkar. "Nalayak Neta" And Other Gaffes In November 1998, Aiyar, appointed Congress spokesperson, had dubbed Atal Bihari Vajpayee a "layak vyakti, nalayak neta" (competent person, useless leader). "I have subsequently learned that the expression I used could have an unparliamentary connotation," he said in his apology. "Not being a native Hindi speaker, I seem to have inadvertently used an improper expression, for which I wish to tender my apologies to the Prime Minister for any offence unintentionally caused." Aiyar had told this correspondent. He said he had initially been "tempted to use the Hindi word 'ayogya' (undeserving), but in Tamil [Aiyar's mother tongue] it has a different and rather derogatory meaning". So, said Aiyar, he consulted a dictionary and surmised that there was a word, "nalayak", to describe a person as weak. Ahead of the 2014 Lok Sabha elections, Aiyar had infamously dismissed Modi as a "chaiwalla" (tea seller), prompting the BJP leader to portray the remark as an insult to his "humble roots" and project the Congress as arrogant.

That is why the United States-Iran engagement through the Oman channel matters to Delhi even if India is not in the room. The realistic hope is not reconciliation. It is something rarer in West Asia: predictability. This negotiation is shaped by four fears and four interests. Each side is trying to reduce one risk without paying for another. Washington wants an Iran that cannot sprint to a bomb. The Trump administration prefers diplomacy, but it is negotiating with escalation still on the table. President Trump is letting the talks continue while maintaining maximum pressure and reinforcing the regional posture by deploying a carrier strike group. This is coercive bargaining: talk seriously, or prepare for pressure that will not stay financial. Tehran wants sanctions relief and the political dignity of having its right to enrich acknowledged. It is willing to bargain over ceilings, sequencing, and monitoring. But it has drawn a line around missile capability. For Iran, missiles are not an add-on. They are deterrence in a region where hostile intent is assumed. Tehran warns that any American strike would trigger the atre-wide retaliation, including against US bases in the Gulf and Israel. That is how it prices deterrence, turning escalation into a regional bill. Israel is focused on one

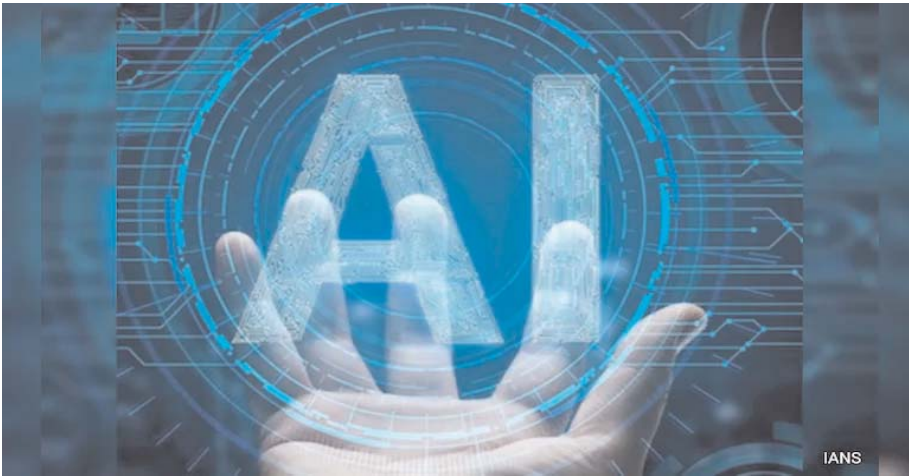
idea: warning time. A nuclear agreement that trims enrichment while leaving delivery systems and regional networks intact looks, in Tel Aviv, less like a settlement and more like a postponement. A narrow nuclear deal reduces one danger while leaving another alive. Israel, therefore, pushes for missiles and the proxy ecosystem to be in frame, or for coercion robust enough to roll back Iran's capacity. The Gulf states sit closest to the blast radius. They want de-escalation that protects ports, pipelines, cities, and investor confidence without rewarding coercive tools. They lean toward diplomacy because they pay first for escalation, but they prefer constraints that bite. They want the crisis defused, not Iran empowered. Taken together, the overlap sits mainly on uranium enrichment. It thins quickly on missiles and proxies. That is why the Oman channel points to a thin deal: not a grand bargain, not Armageddon. That thinness is not a weakness; it is the only bargain available. The alternative is a sharper crisis. As President Trump warned, "Otherwise, it's going to be very traumatic." Enrichment is where progress is most realistic, because it is measurable. Cap levels, reduce stockpiles, neutralise the most sensitive material, restore tight monitoring, and sequence partial relief. If Washington can tolerate bounded enrichment, and Tehran can accept low ceilings, small quantities, and tight IAEA oversight, an agreement is possible. Even on the

nuclear file, the hinge is not enrichment alone. It is verification. The IAEA has described large declared stockpiles and a continuity of knowledge problem. That combination, scale plus uncertainty, turns every promise into a credibility challenge. Enriched uranium you can measure can be capped, blended down, or shipped out. The quantities you cannot account for are a crisis. Verification gaps turn any ceiling into a guess, and guesses do not survive crises. Ask the deal to carry every grievance, and it collapses. Here, the choice is between a workable compromise and a beautiful failure. Missiles are where the thin deal hits reality, and where the overlap disappears. The United States has, at times, signalled that it would prefer missiles and proxies in the frame. Iran refuses. Israel wants to shrink the warning time and insists missiles and proxies be in frame. The Gulf wants constraints because it lives with vulnerability every day. This is where diplomacy runs into doctrine. Missile capability is harder than centrifuges to verify because it can be dispersed and is dual-use. Moreover, missiles sit inside deterrence logic rather than inside a negotiable technical programme. At best, you get informal risk reduction measures: hotlines, notification norms, or tacit restraint. A missile inspection regime strong enough to satisfy Washington and Israel would look like strategic nakedness in Tehran. You can negotiate centrifuge

numbers. You cannot negotiate a nation's sense of vulnerability. One more truth sits awkwardly beneath the rhetoric. In the Western narrative, support for the Iranian people is voiced loudly. In real negotiations, it recedes quickly. When nuclear risk, missiles, and sanctions relief are on the table, the Iranian people become a secondary priority in hard power bargaining. Washington may still speak of protestors and repression, but the negotiating priority becomes containment and verification. Human rights rhetoric, in Tehran's ears, often sounds like regime change pressure by another name. Israel prioritises threat reduction. Gulf states prioritise stability. This is not cynicism. It is the logic of crisis diplomacy. The bigger the security stakes, the smaller the space for moral clarity. India's interest is clear. Avoid panic in the Gulf. We should not romanticise a deal, nor should we posture against one. A thin, verifiable nuclear stabilisation, even if it leaves missiles untouched, is still valuable. It reduces the probability of a regional scare that spikes energy prices, disrupts shipping, and unsettles the Indian diaspora across the Gulf. The downside of conflict there far outweighs any plausible upside. The talks may move to Geneva, for discretion and convenience, but the Oman channel endures. Geneva is geography, Oman is the channel. The Oman channel, however, will not deliver trust. It may deliver something useful: fewer surprises.

The focus is clear: build computing capacity, strengthen data infrastructure, and position India as a central player in the global AI ecosystem. A Vision for Human-Centric AI IT Secretary S. Krishnan has described India's AI vision as "human-centric and inclusive", emphasising "democratic access to AI resources". Prime Minister Narendra Modi is expected to meet global AI leaders, including Sam Altman, Sundar Pichai, Dario Amodei, and Demis Hassabis. India signals that it aims not merely to adopt AI but to shape its trajectory globally. Yet, alongside infrastructure, a quieter but crucial question remains: how is the personal data used to train AI systems governed? The Legal Framework: DPDP Act 2023 India's Digital Personal Data Protection Act, 2023 provides a comprehensive framework: Section 6 mandates consent for processing, Section 16 regulates cross-border transfers, and Section 33 prescribes penal-



ties for non-compliance. "Processing" is defined broadly, covering automated operations on personal data, which would appear to include AI training where identifiable data is involved. The Missing Guidance for AI Training Data However, neither the statute nor the draft DPDP Rules 2025 offer guidance on how consent, purpose limitation, and transparency principles apply when personal data contributes to model training and refinement. The law is technologically neutral, but neutrality is not clarity. India's Strategic Opportunity and Global Attention This matters strategically as India's digital ecosystem is large, diverse, and highly engaged with AI. Global firms see this environment as invaluable for testing, localisation, and iterative improvement. Offering AI tools at low or no cost immediately benefits users while creating rich feedback loops that refine models. In effect, access and data contribution are intertwined, a nuance policymakers can-

not afford to overlook. Learning from Europe: GDPR as a Benchmark Europe's GDPR guidance provides a useful benchmark. Supervisory authorities there have clarified how consent, purpose limitation, and automated decision-making apply to AI, creating an interpretive structure even without AI-specific statutes. India faces a similar inflexion point: infrastructure and investment alone will not establish leadership. Governance clarity must follow. Guidance for AI Training and Data Use Rather than suggesting entirely new rules, India could clarify how existing principles apply in AI training contexts, including: Consent in AI training scenarios: guidance on whether interactions with AI require explicit consent for use in model training. Purpose limitation for AI reuse: clarity on how secondary uses, like training, align with consented purposes. Transparency norms for training datasets: recommendations on what discl-

tures companies should provide about Indian data used to improve AI systems. Regulatory guidance on data provenance and model accountability: defining what documentation or reporting fiduciaries should maintain for AI training and validation datasets. Operationalising human-centric, ethical AI: concrete guidance on implementing principles of safety, inclusion, and trust in AI model development. These are not new mandates but practical clarifications to make India's AI framework actionable, strategic, and globally credible. Beyond Infrastructure: Completing the AI Architecture As the AI Summit deliberates on "Safe and Trusted AI", the conversation must extend beyond data centres and investment. Democratisation is not just about access to tools; it is about clarity on how the data powering these systems are used. India has laid the foundations of data protection. Its AI ambition now calls for completing that architecture.

TRUMP'S NEW WORLD ORDER HAS BECOME REAL AND EUROPE IS HAVING TO ADJUST FAST

Downtown Munich is best-known for chic shops and flashy fast cars but right now its streets are bedecked with posters advertising next generation drones. "Europe's security under construction" boasts the slogan on an eye-catching set of sleek black-and-white photographs, festooned across a scaffolding-clad church on one of this town's best known pedestrian boulevards. Such an unapologetic public display of military muscle would have been unimaginable here just a few years ago, but the world outside Germany is changing fast, and taking this country with it. The southern region of Bavaria has become Germany's leading defence technology hub, focusing on AI, drones and aerospace. People here, like most other Europeans, say they feel increasingly exposed - squeezed between an expansionist Russia and an economically aggressive China to the east, and an increasingly unpredictable,

former best pal, the United States, to the west. According to a recent Eurobarometer poll, more than two-thirds of Europeans (68%) feel their country is under threat. This autumn, Germany's Federal Office of Civil Protection and Disaster Assistance warned for the first time since the Cold War that war is no longer "unlikely". While emphasising that this is a safe country, it also recommends that Germans keep food supplies to last three to ten days at home. Just in case. Germany is the number one single donor of military and other aid to Ukraine, now that the US has halted any new direct aid. Opinion polls suggest voters here want to feel better protected at home too. The question for this country, along with others in Europe is whether traditional alliances with the US, in Nato and the EU can suffice, or whether they should be diversifying into ad-hoc coalitions alongside other like-minded nations



such as Australia, South Korea and Japan? By 2029, the German defence budget will be higher than the UK and French equivalents combined, Nato's Secretary General Mark Rutte pointed out to me. He described the 150bn they say they will spend on defence as "a staggering amount". It's some-

thing the United States notices and appreciates, he said. Donald Trump is far from the first US president to insist that Europe do more for its own security, though his tone has been noticeably more threatening than that of his predecessors. The precarious state of transatlantic relations was the main focus

of the Munich Security Conference (MSC) this week-end. It's the world's biggest annual defence meeting, bringing leaders, security experts and defence industries together. While it's easy to dismiss speech-heavy get-togethers like this as wind-baggy talking shops, in the turbulent times we live in, they can make a difference - especially the informal private huddles between global decision makers, far away from the glare of the cameras. The most eagerly - and for some the most anxiously - anticipated speech at this year's conference was that of the US Secretary of State, Marco Rubio, who represented the Trump administration here. European leaders and top diplomats were seriously on the edge of their seats. But why was a simple 30-minute address given so much importance? It's because Europe-US relations have never been so frayed as they are now, over the last 80 years since World War Two.

And this isn't a bust-up between buddies that will easily blow over. Denmark still furious In the just over 12 months since Trump returned to the White House, he has at times insulted and undermined European leaders, slapped big tariffs on their exports, and most shockingly of all to his allies in Nato, threatened Danish sovereignty over its territory, Greenland, refusing for a while to rule out taking the island by force. Speaking at the MSC on Saturday, Denmark's still clearly furious prime minister, Mette Frederiksen, said Trump's designs on Greenland remained "the same" despite ongoing trilateral talks between representatives of Greenland, the US and Denmark. Trump has ruled out taking Greenland by military force for now, and he's backed away (for the moment, at least) from slapping economic sanctions on allies, including the UK, France and Germany.

Navalny's mother says she always knew he was murdered after poison finding



The mother of the late Russian opposition figure Alexei Navalny says the assessment that her son died of poisoning has validated her belief that he was murdered. On Saturday, the UK and European allies put out a statement saying Navalny, who died in 2024, was killed using a poison developed from a dart frog toxin, and that "only the Russian state had the means, motive and opportunity to deploy this lethal toxin". "This confirms what we knew from the very beginning," Lyudmila Navalnaya said while visiting her son's grave in

Moscow on Monday - the second anniversary of his death. "We knew that our son did not simply die in prison, he was murdered." Russia has firmly rejected the accusations. "Of course, we do not accept such accusations. We disagree with them, we consider them biased and unfounded. And, in fact, we resolutely reject them," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said on Monday. Navalny's widow Yulia has also marked the two-year anniversary of his death, writing in a social media post: "We have achieved truth and we will achieve justice one day too."

Nigeria warns against enlisting abroad after reports of deaths in Ukraine



Nigeria's foreign ministry has issued an urgent warning over what it describes as the increasing illegal recruitment of its citizens to fight in foreign conflicts. It comes after Ukrainian officials said they found the bodies of two Nigerians who they said were killed in combat last year. Nigeria has not confirmed those deaths but in a statement on Sunday, foreign ministry spokesperson Kimiebi Imomotimi Ebienfa revealed that "several Nigerians who have fallen victim to such unfortunate situations were deployed to combat zones after being misled and coerced into signing military service contracts". Kenya has issued a similar warning to its citizens. According to Nigerian officials, investigations and security reports indicate that some nationals were enticed with promises of well-paid employment, security work, educational opportunities or migration incentives, only to find themselves thrust into active war zones. In some cases, victims were allegedly forced to sign

contracts written in foreign languages without proper legal advice, and their travel documents were confiscated upon arrival. Intermediaries are also said to arrange travel using tourist or other non-military visas. Ebienfa cautioned Nigerians against accepting such offers, emphasising that they not only endanger lives but may also violate Nigerian and international laws concerning mercenary activities and foreign enlistment. The Nigerian government stated it was working with local and international partners to investigate these cases and enhance public awareness. Its diplomatic missions abroad have been directed to strengthen consular support and issue advisories to citizens. Ukrainian intelligence estimates that more than 1,400 individuals from 36 African countries have been recruited to fight for Russia. Ukraine itself has previously faced criticism for attempting to recruit foreign nationals, including Africans, to fight on its side.

BONDI BEACH SHOOTING ACCUSED FACES COURT FOR THE FIRST TIME

Accused Bondi Beach gunman Naveed Akram faced court for the first time on Monday, two months after he and his father allegedly carried out Australia's worst mass shooting in almost 30 years. The 24-year-old appeared in a Sydney court for about five minutes via video link from prison. He faces 59 charges relating to the Bondi Beach shooting, including 15 counts of murder and one of committing a terrorist attack. Naveed and his father, Sajid, allegedly attacked a Hanukkah event at the famous beach on 14 December, killing 15 people and injuring more than 40. Sajid, 50, was shot dead by police at the scene, while Naveed was critically injured and later trans-

ferred from hospital to prison. Monday was the first time Akram had been seen on screen and spoken since his arrest - saying just one word when Deputy Chief Magistrate Sharon Freund asked if he heard a discussion about an extension of suppression orders: "Yeah". The court orders cover the identities of those who survived the shooting, but allow the survivors to self-identify if they wish. Outside court, Akram's lawyer, Ben Archbold, said it was too early to say what plea his client would enter, according to the Australian Broadcasting Corporation. He said Akram was doing "as well as can be expected" while in custody in Goulburn supermax prison.

'It's never too late': Savannah Guthrie's new plea for mother's release as FBI analyses glove

Savannah Guthrie has issued a plea for her 84-year-old mother's release two weeks after she disappeared in a suspected kidnapping, telling anyone involved that "it is never too late to do the right thing". In her latest video appeal, the US TV anchor addresses "whoever has her, or knows where she is" - adding that Nancy Guthrie's loved ones "still have hope". It comes as investigators analyse DNA found on a glove that they recovered. The glove being studied appears to match one that was worn by a suspect who appeared in doorbell-camera footage taken the night Nancy Guthrie went missing. Authorities believe the suspect in the video kidnapped Guthrie in the early hours of 1 February. The FBI said on



Sunday that investigators recovered the glove from a field near the side of the road about two miles (three km) from Guthrie's home in Tucson, Arizona. The agency collected about 16 gloves from various locations near her home, though most turned out to have been discarded by people

searching for Guthrie. "The one with the DNA profile recovered is different and appears to match the gloves of the subject in the surveillance video," the FBI said. The agency said it has received preliminary DNA test results on the glove and is still waiting for "quality control and official confir-

mation" before entering an "unknown male profile" into its database. Earlier this week, investigators released video footage taken from a doorbell camera at Guthrie's front door that showed a masked man wearing gloves and a backpack. In the video, the suspect walks toward the camera and tries to cover it with his gloved hand before grabbing some brush from the front yard to block the camera's view. After conducting a forensic analysis of the video, the FBI announced earlier this week that it believed the man was between 5ft 9in and 5ft 10in (175-177cm) tall with an average build. The FBI also highlighted the backpack the suspect was wearing in the video, identifying it as a 25-litre Ozark Trail Hiker Pack.

Pressure grows for release of remaining Venezuelan political prisoners

Pressure is growing on the Venezuelan interim government to free the remaining political prisoners being held in the country. A pressure group campaigning on detainees' behalf, Foro Penal, said on Sunday that it had been able to verify that 444 political prisoners had been released since US forces seized Venezuelan leader Nicolás Maduro last month. But hundreds more remain behind bars, according to a tally kept by Foro Penal, even though the Trump administration has pressured Venezuelan officials to speed up their release. Activists say the health of some relatives who have gone on hunger strike



to demand the release of their loved ones is quickly deteriorating. Opposition party Vente Venezuela posted footage of one of the relatives - who appears to be unconscious - being tended to by others outside the Zona 7 detention centre in the cap-

ital, Caracas. According to a pressure group, 10 people went on hunger strike on Saturday to demand that their relatives, who are being held at Zona 7, be freed. They have been holding a vigil outside the police detention centre since 8

January, when the head of Venezuela's National Assembly, Jorge Rodríguez, first announced that "a significant number" of prisoners would be freed as a goodwill gesture to demonstrate what he said was the interim government's will "seek peace". While the Trump administration has praised Venezuela's interim government for the progress it has made so far, activists within the South American country have denounced delays and a lack of transparency in who is being freed. Members of the opposition have also denounced that those who have been released have been barred from speaking out publicly.

Bondi criticised after saying all Epstein files have been released



The US Department of Justice (DoJ) has said it has released all of the files required by the Epstein Files Transparency Act, but lawmakers have argued the release is insufficient. A letter sent to members of the US Congress on Saturday from US Attorney General Pam Bondi and her deputy said all documents held by the DoJ had been released. It contained a list of names appearing in the files. Kentucky Republican Representative Thomas Massie, who co-wrote the law, called for the DoJ to also release internal memos outlining past decisions on whether to charge Jeffrey Epstein and his associates. Millions of new files relating to the late sex offender Epstein were released by the DoJ earlier this month. At the time, the deputy attorney general said three million pages were not released. This was due to the existence of personal medical files, graphic depictions of child abuse or other material that would jeopardise investigations, said Todd Blanche on the day of the documents dump. In the latest letter, Bondi and Blanche wrote: "In accordance with the requirements of the Act, and as described in various

Department submissions to the courts of the Southern District of New York assigned to the Epstein and Maxwell prosecutions and related orders, the Department released all 'records, documents, communications and investigative materials in the possession of the Department' that 'relate to' any of nine different categories." No records were withheld from the DoJ's release "on the basis of embarrassment, reputational harm, or political sensitivity", the letter added. The individuals listed in the letter include people who "are or were a government official or politically exposed person", and whose name appeared at least once in the files, the letter says. The names appear in the files in a "wide variety of contexts", including some people who had "extensive direct email contact with Epstein or Maxwell" and others who were merely referenced in documents or news articles contained in the files, Blanche and Bondi wrote. Donald Trump, Bill Gates, Andrew Mountbatten-Windsor, and Bill Clinton - who are included in the list - all had documented past relationships with Epstein and Maxwell.

IRAN MUST ABANDON ENRICHED URANIUM AND NOT PRODUCE MORE, NETANYAHU SAYS

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu says the US must require Iran to relinquish all of its enriched uranium and be barred from enriching more, as part of any nuclear deal with Tehran. In a speech in Jerusalem on Sunday, he outlined several conditions he wanted, including that "all enriched material has to leave Iran" and that "there should be no enrichment capability". His comments come as Iranian and US officials prepare for a second round of talks in Switzerland on Tuesday. Iran will consider compromises to reach a nuclear deal if the US is willing to discuss lifting sanctions, Iranian deputy foreign minister Majid Takht-

Ravanchi told the BBC in Tehran. However, Iran regards zero enrichment as a red line and a violation of its rights under the nuclear non-proliferation treaty. The US has piled pressure on Iran to reach a deal and has built up its military capabilities in the Middle East, sending two aircraft carriers - including its largest-ever warship - to the region. Additional American naval forces will protect against any potential threats in the region, US Secretary of State Marco Rubio told a news conference in Slovakia. He said US President Donald Trump "prefers diplomacy and an outcome of negotiated settlement" over direct attacks on Iran. Trump's top envoy Steve Witkoff and son-



in-law Jared Kushner are set to meet Iranian negotiators including Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi, who is travelling to Geneva. "No-one's ever been able to do a successful deal with Iran, but we're

going to try," Rubio said. Under the 2015 nuclear deal, from which Trump withdrew, Iran had agreed to limit its nuclear activities and allow international inspections in return for the lifting

of crippling economic sanctions. Ahead of the latest round of talks, Takht-Ravanchi told the BBC Tehran has offered to dilute its 60%-enriched uranium as evidence of its willingness to compromise. Highly enriched uranium, at near weapons-grade level, has deepened suspicions that the Islamic Republic is moving towards the development of a nuclear weapon, something it has always denied. "We are ready to discuss this and other issues related to our programme if they are ready to talk about sanctions," Takht-Ravanchi told the BBC. He would not confirm whether this meant lifting all or some sanctions. He also did not say whether Iran

would consider agreeing to ship more than 400kg of highly enriched uranium out of the country. Washington has been pushing for a deal with Tehran, but Netanyahu said he raised "scepticism" with Trump during a recent meeting at the White House. "I said that if a deal is to be reached, it should have several components... that we believe are important not only for the security of Israel, but for the security of the world," Netanyahu said. One of Israel's key demands include curbing Iran's development ballistic missiles, which have been used to strike Israel. Tehran has so far refused to discuss its ballistic missile programme with US officials.

■ WE HEARD YOU ARE ALSO A SINGER?
I learned Kuchipudi and music. I am a singer turned actor. I did a small humming bit in Little Hearts and sang a song in Aarambham. I'm open to singing if opportunities come.

■ HOW WAS WORKING WITH SUHAS AGAIN?
He is very friendly and supportive, and a very good actor. Our combination will entertain in this film. Audiences will enjoy our scenes together.

■ DID YOUR FAMILY SUPPORT YOUR DECISION TO ENTER FILMS?
My family is very supportive. I proved myself with good films using the opportunity they gave me. They are very happy.

■ HOW ARE YOU MANAGING OFFERS AFTER THE SUCCESS OF LITTLE HEARTS?
I take success as an advantage and move to the next film, but I accept a film only if I like the story, irrespec-

tive of the combination. I see if I connect with the story and how important my role is. That is important to me.

Delhi HC grants interim bail to Rajpal Yadav in cheque bounce cases

New Delhi: The Delhi High Court on Monday granted an interim suspension of sentence to Bollywood actor Rajpal Yadav in connection with multiple cheque bounce cases. Paving the way for his release from jail until March 18, a single-judge Bench of Justice Swarna Kanta Sharma passed the order after being informed that a sum of Rs 1.5 crore had been deposited in the complainant company's bank account. Taking note of the payment made by the actor, the Delhi High Court suspended the sen-

tence on the condition that Yadav furnish a personal bond of Rs 1 lakh along with one surety of the same amount. It also directed him to surrender his passport. It was further submitted that Yadav's niece is



scheduled to be married on February 19 in Shahjahanpur, for which interim relief was sought. “Interim suspension of sentence till the next date of hearing. You should be present in the court or remain present through video conferencing. We do not want any discrepancy,” Justice Sharma observed. The matter is now slated for further hearing on March 18, and Yadav will remain out of custody till then. The relief comes days after the Delhi High Court had taken a stern view of the actor's conduct.
