CBI BOOKS ANIL AMBANI IN RS 1085 CR PNB LOAN FRAUD CASE

New Delhi, March 8 (TSIT) In a fresh trouble to Anil Ambani, the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) has registered another case against him under Sections 420 (cheating) and 120B (criminal conspiracy) of the IPC based on a complaint filed by Santoshkrishna Annavarapu, Chief Manager of Punjab National Bank (PNB). The UNI is in the possession of the FIR copy lodged by the CBI. According to the FIR, between 2013 and 2017, Anil Ambani, along with other then officials of Reliance Communications, allegedly cheated PNB of Rs1,085 crore. The bank has alleged that Reliance Communications obtained the loan of Rs1,085 crore with the intention of not repaying it. PNB has further claimed that the company deliberately diverted the funds obtained from the bank to other purposes. The accused are alleged to have misused the bank's money, amounting to cheating and criminal breach of trust.

India Make History, Clinch 3rd Title After Beating New Zealand



Ahmedabad (TSIT): A dominant India became the first team to retain the ICC Men's T20 World Cup title, win three world crowns, and clinch the trophy on home soil after defeating New Zealand by 96 runs in the final played in front of 86, 824 fans at the Narendra Modi Stadium in Ahmedabad on Sunday.

Captain Suryakumar Yadav will now lift the trophy and be the fourth Indian to lead the side to a men's cricket World Cup title after having not lost a single series since taking charge in July 2024 - a remarkable record that highlights India's dominance in the shortest format.

Though the massive win, India broke two hoodoos - of having never previously beaten New Zealand in a Men's T20 World Cup match, and winning in

Ahmedabad after their last two ICC white-ball defeats - the 2023 ODI World Cup final loss to Australia and a Super Eights defeat to South Africa earlier in this tournament - came at the venue.

Sanju Samson's blistering 89 off 46 balls, laced with five fours and eight sixes, led India's charge to posting a massive 255/5 - the second highest total of the tournament and the

most posted by a team in the World Cup - before their bowlers dismantled New Zealand inside the powerplay to seal a comprehensive victory, as the visitors were bowled out for 159 in 19 overs.

Samson, in the form of his life, having struck 97 not out and 89 in his two previous innings, shared an opening stand of 98 with Abhishek Sharma, who saved his best for the

title clash by hitting 52 off 21 balls, while Ishan Kishan hit 54 off 25 balls to extend the carnage.

James Neesham briefly checked India's momentum with three wickets in a single over before Shivam Dube plundered an unbeaten 26 off eight balls to take India past 250. Local lads Jasprit Bumrah and Axar Patel then wrecked New Zealand's top order, reducing the challengers to 52/3 and extinguishing any realistic hope of a record chase, as India lived up to their pre-tournament hype and made history.

TELANGANA SHOCKER: MAN KILLS THREE DAUGHTERS BY THROWING THEM INTO LAKE

Hyderabad (TSIT) : In a shocking incident, a man in Telangana's Kamaraeddy town killed his three daughters by throwing them into the lake as he was unable to raise them due to financial problems, police said on Sunday. The bodies of Ayat (7) and Mariyam (5) were recovered from the lake on Saturday night, while the body of Shifat (8) was pulled out on Sunday morning. Police have arrested Ismail, an autrickshaw driver, who was remanded to judicial custody on Sunday. The accused had approached the police to lodge a missing complaint after throwing them into the lake. On suspicion, police interrogated him, during which he confessed to the crime.

Assistant Superintendent of Police Chaitanya Reddy on Sunday revealed the details of the case at a news conference. She said that the parents of the three children came to the police station at 3.30 p.m. on Saturday to complain that the children had not been seen since 10 a.m.

Doctors save 11-year-old by performing rare diaphragmatic hernia surgery at Jaipur hospital

JAIPUR: Doctors at the state-run Sawai Man Singh hospital here have successfully performed a complex laparoscopic surgery on an 11-year-old boy suffering from a rare congenital diaphragmatic hernia, hospital authorities said.

The child, a resident of Alwar, had been suffering from breathlessness and chest pain for the past two months, with symptoms worsening while walking or running. He visited the hospital's outpatient department (OPD) around two weeks ago for consultation, following which a detailed investigation revealed that he had a congenital diaphragmatic hernia – a condition present since birth. Due to a defect in the di-



aphragm, the muscle that separates the chest and abdominal cavity, nearly 70 per cent of the liver, along with the gallbladder and a large portion of the intestines, had shifted into the right side of the chest cavity, the hospital said in a statement.

"As a result, the right lung had become severely com-

pressed, preventing adequate expansion. The child had effectively been living with the function of only one lung," it said. Congenital diaphragmatic hernia is a rare condition, and is usually found on the left side of the body. Right-sided cases are extremely uncommon, making this case particularly

challenging from a surgical perspective, it added. "Considering the severity of the condition, surgery was planned. Conventionally, such cases require large surgical incisions by opening the abdomen and chest, or through a large incision in the back (via laparotomy or thoracotomy)," the statement said. However, in this case, the surgical team decided to perform the procedure laparoscopically, which is technically much more demanding, it added.

The entire surgery was performed through only three small incisions, and all the displaced organs were carefully repositioned into the abdomen. "Seven days after the operation, the child is completely healthy," the statement said.

Nearly 40 lakh beneficiaries to get Rs 9,000 next week: Himanta on Women's Day

GUWAHATI: Emphasising that women empowerment has been central to Assam's growth story, Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Sunday, on the occasion of International Women's Day, said that nearly 40 lakh 'Orunodoi' beneficiaries will receive Rs 9,000 each next week.

The consolidated payment comprising grants for four months along with an additional amount will be made on Tuesday, making it a record bank transfer of Rs 3,600 crore on a single day under a government scheme, he claimed.

The single-day transfer to women beneficiaries comes as the state gears up for Assembly elections, when the BJP-led government will seek a third straight term.

"On March 10 at 10.30 am, 40 lakh Orunodoi families

will receive Rs 9,000 each," Sarma said in a Facebook Live.

Orunodoi is a flagship poverty alleviation scheme of the current government, under which eligible women beneficiaries receive Rs 1,250 per month.

On the occasion, meetings will be held at the local level across the state, and the CM invited the beneficiary families to attend those, maintaining that it was the support of the people which has been the strength of the government.

"On a single day, Rs 3,600 crore will be transferred to the beneficiaries, it will also be a record," he claimed.

Sarma had announced earlier that payment for four months from January this year, along with an additional amount for Bohag Bihu celebration (marking the Assamese New

Year in mid-April), will be paid together in March. Highlighting his government's focus on women's development, Sarma said in a post on X: "Empowering women has been central to Assam's growth story. From financial security to education, healthcare and entrepreneurship, our initiatives are helping lakhs of women step forward with confidence and independence."

"Today, we celebrate the strength and spirit of Assam's #NariShakti," he added. In another post seeking support for the party in the coming elections, Sarma said, "One right vote can change the voice inside every home. The focus of @BJP4Assam has been to empower Assam's #NariShakti and every action of ours has reflected this belief." Asserting that the effort to empower women will con-

tinue with more rigour, he appealed all to "Choose wisely, choose BJP".

The Chief Minister's Office (CMO), also in a post on the social media site, maintained that major strides have been made for the women of the state.

Bishnoi among three discharged by Delhi court in extortion call case

NEW DELHI: A Delhi court has discharged gangster Lawrence Bishnoi and two others in a case related to an alleged Rs 1 crore extortion call, saying the prosecution failed to place sufficient material on record to establish the essential ingredients of the offences.

Chief Judicial Magistrate Nupur Gupta discharged Haren Sarapadhiya, Lawrence Bishnoi and Ashish Sharma in a case registered at the Sunlight Colony police station under Section 387 (putting a person in fear of death or grievous hurt in an attempt to commit extortion) of the Indian Penal Code (IPC) on a complaint by Raman Deep Singh.

The complainant alleged that between the midnight of April 23 and 24, 2023, he began receiving calls

from an unknown number threatening his life and demanding Rs 1 crore. After investigation, the police filed a chargesheet against the accused under Sections 386 (extortion by putting a person in fear of death or grievous hurt to themselves or another person) and 387 read with Section 120B (criminal conspiracy) of the IPC. The court, however, noted that the offence of extortion under Section 386 IPC requires actual delivery of property induced by fear of death or grievous hurt, which was absent in the case. "Neither the complainant has alleged any delivery of property under threat nor the same has been alleged in the entire charge-sheet," the court said in its order dated February 20. It further

observed that even for the offence under Section 387 of the IPC, the prosecution failed to show any "overt act" indicating that the accused had put the complainant in fear of death or grievous hurt.

"The complainant has merely alleged that he received calls from an unknown number demanding an amount of Rs 1 crore. On perusal of the complaint itself, it can be said that nothing has been mentioned at all about the physical act, rather it has simply been said he was asked to pay a particular sum of money," the court said. The judge also pointed out that investigators did not procure call records or collect other material evidence and that the case primarily relied on disclosure statements of the co-accused persons.

'Grew up in a family where women were bosses': Rahul tells students

NEW DELHI: "I grew up in a family where the women were the bosses," Congress leader Rahul Gandhi told students during an interaction in Kerala recently, while asserting that women are generally more intelligent than men.

said women's leadership is moving from "women's development" to "women-led development". Referring to government initiatives, Devi said over Rs 5 lakh crore was allocated in the 2026-27 gender budget for women's empowerment.

Noting that today's woman is both a homemaker and a nation-maker, she said that as a result of the government's policies, women's participation in the workforce has risen over the past six years from 22 per cent to more than 41 per cent. Speaking at the event, Delhi Chief Minister Rekha Gupta said the event reflected the spirit of women's empowerment and their role in nation-building.

"Today, through this Kartavya Path, we are reminded that our responsibility is not only towards ourselves or our families but also towards society and the country," Gupta said while addressing participants.

Meanwhile, at the first national conference of Indian Women in Law, Chief Justice of India Surya Kant batted for greater institutional reforms in the judiciary to bring more women into the legal field and said that high court collegiums should consider meritorious women members of the Bar for judgeship as a norm and not as an exception.

GODDESSES OF
SMALLER FOLK

A weird scene is going viral on social media today. The boss is sitting in the White House surrounded by what appears to be a group of evangelists fervently praying to God for wisdom, grace and strength for the man who leads this one nation under God. Is it AI, you wonder?

“Sometimes the broiling sea of imbecility gets too much. Wave upon wave of cretins,” notes Edward Luce elsewhere about Trump’s America. Sadly such a mindset is not limited to one country. A new wave of conservatism – political, religious, and deeply hostile to liberals, peace-lovers and feminists – seems to be sweeping across the world as the shadows of war grow larger. Ever since it began, mankind has seldom been so oblivious to the International Women’s Day being observed today and the threat that wars pose to the existence of women and children already struggling with major changes in their lives and environment. In India it is an under-reported fact that both in cities and villages, large joint families are giving way to smaller nuclear units. The young families are migrating with their children, leaving the vulnerable elderly behind. But even after the nuclear families have migrated out of their villages or small towns, there are practically no signs that the ideology of the patriarchal socio-political system has given way to a more gender-balanced outlook. Marriages are mostly being fixed along clear caste and community lines and celebrated with even more ritualistic fervour. Inter-faith marriages are even more heavily frowned upon and often undone by family-led violence.

Besides this, both available data and social media messages show that even after half a century of Mandalisation, India’s democratic institutions are being led mostly by upper castes from the majority community. As they reap the benefits of all governmental schemes, the poor, especially our marginalised minorities, women and children are increasingly becoming invisible and largely irrelevant to the growth story. As proof of the above, look at the image of a working mother promoted by governmental agencies and mainstream dailies. Most are smartly attired urban women striding along confidently or standing out in a crowd of scowling men, in work scrubs or helmets. Even the lower governmental functionary didis dress well and carry smart bags and clipboards. Working women in rural areas are shown clustered around self-run shops selling fresh produce or hand-made goods in front of gaily decorated walls or outside thatched huts.

In the meanwhile most homes, workplaces and boardrooms remain female-deficient and the latest statistics say only 7% of outstanding credit for MSMEs reaches women. The loquacious PR lady from Galgotias University seen defending charges of technical plagiarism against her institution was an arch-example of the gap between perception and reality.

Imagine this spectrum. At one end are rural landless families desperately trying to make sense of and access VB-G RAM G, the new avatar of MGNREGA. They subsist on daily earnings. At the other end stands a powerful political lab run by males with deep pockets creating educational facilities and medical colleges. They are funded by the new billionaires with political links and get to display their ‘products’ in international seminars.

And at the same time political leaders who have never married, some in orange garbs of childless ascetics, tell women in all seriousness that each of them must produce at least five children or their race may soon be obsolete!

Rallies then turn into prayer meetings and bhajan-clubbing, whipping up fervour and lies about race, purity and vegetarianism. In the meanwhile it remains undeniable that most of the labour in the country is still done by women – overworked, underpaid, under-represented in unions or boardrooms and seldom included in planning panels.

This International Women’s Day, India needs to confront its national care crisis. India’s female labour force participation stands at just 33% – one of the lowest rates in the world. Reaching Viksit Bharat’s goal of 70% by 2047 will require addressing the barriers that keep women out of work. The most significant of those barriers is care work. Indian women spend significantly more time, on average around five hours a day on unpaid work, far more time than men who spend on average around two hours on the same activities. Time spent by women on unpaid care and domestic work is time unavailable for them to engage in paid work, skill development, or entrepreneurship. This reality remains across both rural and urban India. Looking after children, ageing parents and family members with disabilities, domestic chores like cooking and cleaning are still culturally coded as the responsibility of women alone. In rural areas, caregiving also includes collecting water and firewood, tending to livestock. In the corporate world, this translates into career breaks, reducing women’s lifetime earnings and curbs them from growing into leaders. Many women do not return to the workforce at all. India now stands at a demographic inflection point. It is racing to create jobs for a young population where nearly a third of young people in India are not in employment, education, or training, many of whom are women. At the same time, projections suggest that close to 20% of India’s population will be elderly by 2050, which will increase care demands exponentially. The pressure on women to take on caring for the elderly will intensify precisely at the moment when the country needs more women in the workforce, not fewer. Care is critical infrastructure, just like highways We treat roads as economic multipliers. We finance freight corridors and industrial corridors. Why not finance childcare centres? Why not invest in eldercare systems with the same seriousness we reserve for physical infrastructure? Evidence suggests investing in care is a strong employment stimulus to spur job creation and increase women’s labour force participation. Every rupee spent expanding care services including early childhood care and long-term care, could create substantial employment opportunities, particularly for women. Studies also show that equivalent public spending on care services can create far more jobs than the same spending on construction because care services are highly labour-intensive and generate broad labour demand. We do not ask whether highways “pay for themselves” in isolation. Their value lies in the ecosystem they make possible. They reduce transaction costs, expand labour mobility, and stimulate private investment. Care functions in much the same way. Over time, jobs created in the care sector and related support services will lead to higher employment, expand consumption, raise aggregate demand, and strengthen the national tax base, reinforcing fiscal sustainability. The Nordic economies have long invested in universal childcare systems as part of their social and economic model. These countries have also consistently achieved some of the highest female LFPRs worldwide, where providing universal or low-fee childcare has been correlated to over 70 per cent employment rates for women. Few investments offer such strong dividends, yet care continues to lack commensurate fiscal recognition in India. Fragmented spending across the Union Budget 2026-27 National care-related expenditures remain dispersed across ministries as diverse as Women and Child Development, Health, Social Justice, Rural Development, Jal Shakti, Labour & Employment, as isolated schemes rather than as a coordinated system. This year’s Union Budget saw increases in gender budget allocations, expanded nutrition and childcare spending and announced plans to train 1.5 lakh caregivers. Yet it stopped short of recognising care as economic infrastructure or creating a dedicated financing architecture. Saksham Anganwadi and POSHAN 2.0 indicated a budget estimate of Rs 23,100 crore, but is still focused largely on nutrition, not universal full-day childcare. Allocations towards Mission Shakti Samarthya including working women’s hostels and creches and the National Social Assistance Programme for basic pensions to the elderly, widows and persons with disabilities remain relatively modest. The Union Ministry of Health & Family Welfare was allocated around Rs 1 lakh crore, a significant increase from the previous year, yet it lacks explicitly earmarked allocations for structured community based long-term elder or disability care services. In total, identifiable care allocations amount to roughly Rs 25,000 crore, likely still under only 1% of total Union expenditure. By contrast, roads and highways command roughly over 5% of the Budget. This sharp difference is not an argument against roads. There is a need for consistency in how we define economic infrastructure. A national care infrastructure mission: Contours of a care budget The 2024 National Care Strategy too notes the current state of fragmented care spending on welfare and skilling, rather than being one strategic investment.

Modi Demeans PM’s Office

Let’s recall what Narendra Modi said on May 23, 2016 during his first visit to Iran: “Shakkar-Shikan Shavand Hame Bulbulane-azam/Je in qade-Hindi ki be-Tehran mee rasad.” This means: All the nightingales of Iran get this fresh sweet arriving in Tehran from India. Can Modi now hear the nightingales of Iran sobbing in grief as bodies of young naval officials return to Tehran from India? The Iranian ship was returning after participating in an exercise in Visakhapatnam on Indian Navy’s invitation when an American submarine drowned it. The question is not whether India can be held responsible for this illegal attack. What will definitely bruise India’s image is the ominous silence of the Modi Government. Modi, who chose not to offer condolences to Iran on the murder of its supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, remained silent on this heinous crime in the Indian Ocean. India doesn’t have the tradition of treating her guests with such apathy. What would be Modi’s response if Pakistan bombed our guests just outside our territorial control? Will Modi choose to ignore the tragedy if over 100 American or Israeli soldiers are gunned down while returning from India? Modi’s designation, doubtless, is the Prime Minister. But does he behave like the Prime Minister of India? Several recent incidents have given birth to this unusual query. Prime Ministers aren’t free to act on personal whims and fancies. They operate within an institutional framework; they are duty-bound to represent India’s constitutional majesty and socio-cultural traits. Iran is an old and trusted friend and no Indian Prime Minister enjoys any personal choice to violate that national obligation towards an ally. The least Modi could have done was to express sorrow at Khamenei’s assassination and regret the killing of Iranian naval officials. This human courtesy doesn’t entail a revolt against Modi’s, not India’s, best friends – the United States and Israel. The institutional dignity of the office of the Prime Minister doesn’t allow any individual occupant to show cowardice, so distressing as to demean our national pride. India’s credentials as a trusted partner now lie in



tatters. Modi himself asserted during his 2016 trip: “In the world of today, political pundits talk of strategic convergence. But, India and Iran are two civilisations that celebrate the meeting of our great cultures. India and Iran are not new friends. Our dosti is as old as history. Through centuries, our societies have stayed connected through art and architecture, ideas and traditions, and culture and commerce. As friends and neighbours, we have shared interest in each other’s growth and prosperity, and joys and sorrows.” Was this rhetoric totally delinked from reality? If not, Modi should have expressed sorrow for Khamenei’s murder even as he didn’t have the courage to condemn the murderers. Modi wrapped up his 2016 speech saying: “Zunoonat garbe nafse-khud ast/Je-Kashi pa-be Khashan neem gaam ast (Once we make up our mind, the distance between Kashi and Kaashan is only half a step). India wants to know when did Modi “make up his mind” to burn the bridges with Iran? He called the neighbouring countries to enquire about the damages caused by Iranian strikes. He didn’t call Iran to ask about the damages inflicted by the ferocious US-Israeli attack. Which friend was grappling with a greater tragedy – Iran, or Qatar, Kuwait and Oman? Modi condemned violation of sovereignty and territorial integrity of all these countries except Iran. Modi, whom the opposition parties describe as “compromised”, has acted in a man-

ner that belittles India as well as the office of the Prime Minister. Iran’s sovereignty Donald Trump and Benjamin Netanyahu could have unleashed the unjust attack on Iran without the smokescreen of freeing people from the oppressive regime. Iranian women, they said, needed freedom. Women in hijab are doubtless better than women in the Epstein gutter. Forces that bomb schools to kill 165 little girls do not have the credentials to talk about gender justice. Nobody wants any sermons on liberalism from the protagonists of Gaza carnage. The world now understands the charade of freedom that the United States peddles to legitimize its illegal imperialist designs. How they served humanity in the garb of changing evil regimes over the past many decades is not a secret. America and Israel were itching to dance on the ruins of Iran for a long time. Israel wanted to force America into this unjust war for the last 15 years but Barack Obama and Joe Biden refused to take the plunge. Israel continued its evil designs all these while. A famous book – Mossad – published in 2016 says, “Waging a stubborn shadow of war against Iran by sabotaging nuclear facilities, assassinating scientists, supplying plants with faulty equipment and raw materials via bogus companies, organising desertions of high-ranking military officers and major figures in nuclear research, introducing ferocious viruses into Iran’s computer systems.

Iran, Palestine and India in
the New ‘Span’ of History

The genocide in Palestine and the war against Iran are creating new spatial and temporal forms that will shape the history of our region in the coming months. In historiography, the concepts of space and time are neither scientific nor transcendental, but relational, as was thought deeply by Leibniz. Historians come to historiography with a concern for the constitution of “the span” that precedes history and activates it from below – the capability of relations and actions which is the invisible pandemonium that stirs the earth above. We have to commence with what is apparent, namely, the cracks on the surface of the world opening towards the span beneath. Last June, the US and Israeli attack on Iran’s nuclear installations was in violation of the principles of human co-existence, and a crime according to international law and was condemned by three dozen United Nations special rapporteurs: These attacks violate the most fundamental rules of world order since 1945 – the prohibition on the aggressive use of military force and the duties to respect sovereignty and not to coercively intervene in another country [...] The responsible U.S. political and military leaders may also be liable for the international crime of aggression. The ongoing war against Iran waged by the US and Israel, too, is in violation of several international laws and conventions for safety, as well as being utterly immoral. Netanyahu, who is partnering the US in this aggression, is an indicted war criminal wanted by the International Criminal Court. According to the ICC, Netanyahu, has committed the war crimes of starvation as a method of warfare and of intentionally directing an attack against the civilian population; and the crimes against humanity of murder, persecution, and other inhumane acts from at least October 8, 2023 until at least May 20, 2024. He is also undergoing trial for corruption charges – breach of trust, fraud, bribery – within Israel, and has been using the genocide against the



Palestinian people to postpone his trial. Israel can get away with all of it because of the very fact that any legitimate retaliation will result in a ‘western’ aggression led by the USA. However, this “West” is also in rapid decline: the proxy war against Russia has exhausted the arsenals and strained the economies of many EU countries; educational institutions are failing to provide a classical education while remaining resistant to developing new capabilities or engaging with advances in science and technology; populations are ageing; and political elites are growing increasingly distant from public concerns. One leadership after another has shown itself to be in decline – in both acumen and probity. US President Donald Trump is no less decorated; he is a convicted felon, for “falsifying business records”. The Trump family and the US administration are indistinguishable and are approaching the conflicts of the world with a view to extortion, bribery and embezzlement. The parallel monetary system controlled by this family (“Donald Trump has turned the Oval Office into the world’s most corrupt crypto startup operation, minting staggering personal fortunes for him and his family in less than a year”) is also seeking to control the fate of the world as a fiefdom through the the ‘board of

peace’. Trump is also battling the released, unreleased and unredacted portions of the ‘Epstein files’. Many of these trends were incrementally developed in India through the ‘Gujarat model’, which involved corporations like Adani and Ambani growing in correlation with the increase of the power of the RSS through the BJP, in the enterprise of nationalism as pure business. These corporations are today the equivalent of the former ‘Russian oligarchs’ in malice and avarice, who have begun hosting the visiting leaders of foreign countries, which is undermining the state of India. Similar to Trump, ambiguous financial entities are also operating in India. Through the destruction of education, educators, and the universities the RSS mafia famiglia has accomplished the creation of a people without memories at the plane of history. The enslavement of India is underway one TV news show at a time. It must become obvious to the WhatsApp communities of Indians that the Modi government’s alignment under Israel and the US in the genocide in Palestine and the war against Iran is truly the alignment of the lowest potential of humanity – illiteracy, avarice, corruption of all kinds, apathy to all and, in effect, a certain hatred to the idea and the people of India.

There's an inflation wave coming. How worried should we be?

Up until late on Thursday the rise in global oil markets appeared to be more of an unfortunate bump than imminent oil shock. The immediate response to the closure of the Strait of Hormuz, a 10% price increase, appeared rather benign for what was long-assumed to be the oil market's nightmare scenario. On Friday the situation changed, pennies started to drop. The intervention from the Qatari Energy minister Saad al-Kaabi that all Gulf energy providers were likely to halt export in days, and \$150 a barrel of oil was coming, sparked oil markets into life. Crude oil ended up 27% since the conflict began. Derivative petrochemical products vital for livelihoods, and industrial supply chains that are also dependent on free passage in the Gulf, from jet fuel, to urea, are also spiking in price. While this is not yet an energy shock, the markets are starting to assume worse scenarios if not yet the worst case. It won't take much for oil to breach the \$100 barrier next week. Iran has not actually formally closed the Strait.



They have de facto been closed voluntarily as insurance costs soar, and sailors fear for their safety. The net result is a wave of inflationary pressures emanating from the conflict zone, and upsetting global markets for energy, fuel, food, industrial chemicals, and credit. On Monday night I gently suggested that forecasts from the Office for Budget Responsibility, the UK government's independent forecaster, could prove rather out of date even before publication on Tuesday. The extent of that

mismatch has surprised me, four days on from the Spring Statement and a week into this conflict. On Tuesday the price of a barrel of crude oil was assumed to be \$63. It closed at \$94 on Friday. A therm of gas delivered to the UK was assumed to cost 74 pence. It is £1.35, and got as high as £1.70 this week. The gilt rate, the effective interest rate on 10-year government borrowing was assumed to be 4.4%, it ended the week at 4.6%, having nearly hit 4.7%, a significant difference. The UK's bonds have been hit

more than other countries as traders recall the UK's sensitivity to energy price inflation during the Russia-Ukraine crisis. The essential bet is that the Bank of England (BoE) will rein in interest rate cuts as inflation stays sticky. All this came just at the moment when the markets had started to give credit to the government for the speed of its planned fall in borrowing. There is immediate feed through into the mortgage market. Home mortgages are being repriced by banks who had just started to show some

confidence that rates were coming down. There will be no mortgage price war while all this is going on. The BoE, which had been heavily backed to cut rates this month, is now expected to wait and see. Of course, these clouds might lift, but US President Donald Trump seems to be suggesting a conflict of weeks or months. Some of the economic warnings from the Gulf may be a way to focus his mind. It isn't just about the stoppage in the flow of energy through its most important artery. From Bahrain's oil facilities, to Qatar's gas processing, the port near the Dubai Palm, or tankers near Kuwait, there have been a pattern of attacks that raise questions about a conscious Iranian strategy to up the economic price for the US-Israeli attacks. The economic consequences are not an accidental byproduct of this conflict, they are an intrinsic aspect of the war. This makes the precise consequences very difficult to predict, but this new wave of inflation from the Gulf will wash up on the shores of the rest of the globe, including here in the UK.

FOREIGN INVESTORS PULL OUT RS 21K CRORE FROM INDIAN EQUITIES AMID IRAN TENSIONS

New Delhi: Foreign investors pulled out Rs 21,000 crore (around USD 2.3 billion) from Indian equities over the last four trading sessions amid deteriorating global risk sentiment triggered by the West Asia crisis. The latest sell-off comes after foreign portfolio investors (FPIs) infused Rs 22,615 crore into Indian equities in February, the highest monthly inflow in 17 months. Prior to that, FPIs had been net sellers for three consecutive months. They withdrew Rs 35,962 crore in January, Rs 22,611 crore in December, and Rs 3,765 crore in November, according to data from the depositories. The latest outflows occurred during March 2-6, when FPIs sold equities worth about Rs 21,000 crore in the cash market. March 3 was a trading holiday on account of Holi. Market experts attributed the pullout primarily to the rising geopolitical tensions in West Asia. The US and Israel launched a major attack on Iran on February 28 which killed Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, triggering conflict in the region. Vaqarjaved Khan, Senior Fundamental Analyst at Angel One, said fears of



potential disruptions in the Strait of Hormuz pushed Brent crude prices above USD 90 per barrel, triggering a global risk-off sentiment. Other factors contributing to the outflows include rupee depreciation beyond the 92-per-dollar level, elevated US Treasury yields drawing capital back to safe-haven assets, and mixed early outlook for Q4 FY26 corporate earnings, particularly margin pressures in the IT and consumption sectors, he added. VK Vijayakumar, Chief Investment Strategist at Geojit Investments, said "uncertainty surrounding the Middle East conflict, the recent market correction, the Indian economy's vulnerability to a sharp rise in crude prices, and the depreciation of the rupee have all contributed to sustained

FPI selling in the cash market". Himanshu Srivastava, Principal Manager Research at Morningstar Investment Research India, noted that higher crude prices increase risks related to inflation, the current account deficit, and currency stability, which typically weigh on foreign investor sentiment toward emerging markets. He added that global investors have also shifted towards safer assets such as the US dollar amid rising uncertainty. The recent uptick in US Treasury yields during the week further contributed to capital outflows from emerging markets. Going ahead, Vijayakumar said FPIs are unlikely to return as buyers until there is greater clarity on the geopolitical situation and crude prices moderate.

Escalating tensions in Middle East to impact steel markets: BigMint

simultaneously, transmitting cost pressure directly into steel and steel-related commodity markets. From an average of USD 70 a barrel before the war, crude oil prices have risen to about USD 90/per barrel, an analyst said, adding that the cost is expected to continue to rise in the coming days. War has also impacted freight cost, which jumped almost 40 per cent in recent times. In the absence of insurance cover, marine operators

are also offering freight at non-negotiable prices as per the availability of the vessel. On the impact of the US-Iran conflict on steel markets, including India, they said the industry would face sustained input cost inflation across coal, scrap and ore, with freight and energy reinforcing one another. "The players are expected to pass on the increased cost to customers. However, if market is not ready to absorb the cost, steel demand can also

be affected," an expert said. Extended disruption could push prices of coking coal — a key steel making raw material — from major supplying markets such as Australia, Russia, and the US. Increased input cost, coupled with higher freight cost, will also put pressure on the margins, the analysts added. Gold poised for volatile week as Middle East tensions roil markets: Analysts

New Delhi: Gold prices are expected to remain volatile next week as investors track geopolitical developments in the Middle East and key macroeconomic data releases that could shape the sentiment in the domestic market, analysts said. "Focus will again be on the developments in the Middle East and further escalation would be positive for gold prices, but a sign of de-escalation may trigger sharp selling," Pranav Mer, Vice President, EBG – Commodity & Currency Research, JM Financial Services Ltd, said. Mer added that silver is also undergoing a consolidation phase but remains highly volatile. "Silver too is passing through a consolidation phase but trading with high volatility as gains are capped by consolidative moves in gold and industrial metals like Copper and Zinc," he said. During the past week, bullion futures witnessed sharp movements in the domestic market. On the Multi Commodity Exchange, sil-



ver plunged Rs 14,359, or 5.08 per cent, while gold slipped Rs 470, or 0.3 per cent. "Gold prices consolidated in a broad range last week, in a range of Rs 1.59 lakh-1.70 lakh per 10 grams," Prathamesh Mallya, DVP – Research, Non-Agri Commodities and Currencies, Angel One, said. He added that geopolitical tensions, Asian demand, strong central bank purchases, elevated US Treasury bond yields and a firm dollar remain the key factors influencing price dynamics in the bullion market. Globally, silver futures on the Comex slumped USD 8.98, or near-

ly 10 per cent, while gold prices fell USD 89.2, or 1.7 per cent, during the past week. Gold has closed in the negative territory on a weekly basis amid rising demand for alternative safe-haven assets such as the US dollar, Franc, and Bonds, though the downside remains capped by ongoing geopolitical escalation in the Middle East, Mer said. Geopolitical tensions remained elevated after the Israeli military said it is moving to the "next phase" of its campaign against Iran. Meanwhile, Defence Secretary Pete Hegseth said the amount of firepower

in the region "is about to surge dramatically," following Britain's decision to allow the US armed forces to use its military installations. Analysts noted that major global Exchange Traded Funds (ETFs) are witnessing outflows as traders, especially from the Middle East region, look to book profits or raise liquidity amid the escalating conflict. At the same time, surging energy prices have reduced expectations of a near-term interest rate cut by the US Federal Reserve at its June meeting. Investors will watch key releases, including China's inflation and trade data, and inflation readings from the US, Germany, and India. Later in the week, provisional GDP, Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) price index and US consumer sentiment will guide the global growth and monetary policy outlook, they added. During the past week, bullion futures witnessed sharp movements in the domestic market.

Mcap of 8 of top-10 most valued firms erodes by Rs 2.81 lakh cr

New Delhi: The combined market valuation of eight of the top-10 most-valued firms eroded by Rs 2,81,581.53 crore last week, with the State Bank of India taking the biggest hit, in tandem with a weak trend in equities. Last week, the BSE benchmark tanked 2,368.29 points, or 2.91 per cent. "Markets ended the holiday-shortened week with steep losses as escalating geopolitical tensions in West Asia and a sharp spike in crude oil prices weighed heavily on investor sentiment," Ajit Mishra, SVP, Research, Religare Broking Ltd, said. From the top-10 pack, Reliance Industries and Infosys were the only gainers. The market valuation of State Bank of India tumbled Rs 53,952.96 crore to Rs 10,55,567.27 crore. ICICI Bank's valuation eroded by Rs 46,936.82 crore to Rs 9,40,049.82 crore and that of HDFC Bank dived Rs 46,552.3 crore to Rs 13,19,107.08



crore. The valuation of Larsen & Toubro tanked Rs 45,629.03 crore to Rs 5,43,208.36 crore. The market capitalisation (mcap) of Bajaj Finance dropped by Rs 28,934.56 crore to Rs 5,91,136.03 crore and that of Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) diminished by Rs 28,492.44 crore to Rs 9,25,380.15 crore. Hindustan Unilever's mcap declined by 26,350.67 crore to Rs 5,23,042.51 crore and that of Bharti Airtel edged lower by Rs 4,732.75 crore to Rs 10,67,120.50 crore.

However, the market valuation of Reliance Industries jumped Rs 14,750.39 crore to Rs 19,01,583.05 crore. The mcap of Infosys climbed by Rs 3,459.99 crore to Rs 5,30,546.54 crore. Reliance Industries remained the most valued domestic firm followed by HDFC Bank, Bharti Airtel, State Bank of India, ICICI Bank, TCS, Bajaj Finance, Larsen & Toubro, Infosys, and Hindustan Unilever. SWIGGY, MAGICPIN, ZOMATO SEE FOOD DELIVERY REGAIN GROWTH MOMENTUM IN DEC QTR

New Delhi: India's top three food delivery players — Swiggy, magicpin and Zomato — regained growth momentum in the October-December period after a period of slower expansion, on strong order volumes led by festive demand, affordability-focused offerings and expanding user bases. With continued investments in marketing, product innovation, and value-led propositions, industry executives said the sector expects the momentum in order growth to sustain in the coming quarters. "It has been a phenomenal October-November-December quarter for us, marked by strong growth and sharper execution across markets. Our unit economics at an order level have improved by over 60 per cent, reflecting greater efficiency and improved monetisation," magicpin Founder and CEO Anshoo Sharma told PTI. While mature markets such as Delhi-NCR remained steady, the company report-



ed more than 40 per cent growth in gross order value in cities, including Bengaluru, Hyderabad, and Mumbai. The magicpin CEO said affordability-led consumption is a key growth driver, with an average order value of Rs 150-Rs 300 encouraging frequent ordering among users. According to Swiggy's Q3 FY26 shareholder letter, the company's gross order value (GOV)

grew 20.5 per cent year-on-year to Rs 8,959 crore, marking the fastest growth in the last three years. Swiggy said the acceleration was driven by stronger adoption of new propositions across speed, selection and affordability. Its average monthly transacting user (MTU) base grew 22 per cent year-on-year to 24.3 million during the quarter from 17.8 million a year ago, while total orders rose

to 294 million from 234 million during the period. Zomato's food delivery business also reported improving growth trends during the quarter under review. The company posted 16.6 per cent year-on-year net order value (NOV) growth at Rs 9,846 crore in the December quarter translating into 21.3 per cent growth in GOV. This marked an acceleration from 13.8 per cent growth in

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the September quarter. Its average monthly transacting users grew 21 per cent year-on-year to 24.9 million during the December quarter. Executives also said the growth was increasingly coming from smaller cities as affordability-led offerings resonated strongly with consumers in tier-II and III markets. Iranian clerics close to naming new leader as smoke chokes Tehran after oil depot strikes

Destinations include: Jeddah, Toronto, New York, Riyadh, Seoul, Malé, Bangkok, Phuket, Hanoi, Colombo, London, Moscow, Paris, Milan, Zurich, Delhi, Mumbai, Hyderabad and Bengaluru. Etihad stresses that passengers should check before they travel as the situ-



ation is being closely monitored and could change. Emirates says it will operate a reduced flight schedule in the coming days, following the partial re-opening of regional airspace. Tickets for the commercial airline went on sale a few hours ago and I have had a look at Emirates' website for the earliest dates that Brits in Dubai can find a flight back to the UK. They include 9 March for Gatwick and Heathrow; 10 March for

Glasgow and Newcastle; 11 March for Edinburgh; 12 March for Birmingham. Similar to Etihad Airways, Emirates notes the airline will continue to monitor developments in the region and "will develop our operational schedule accordingly". Passengers are advised to keep checking before travelling. US Central Command (Centcom) is urging Iranians to stay home as it claims the Islamic Republic's regime is

carrying out military operations from densely populated civilian areas. Iran has used "crowded areas surrounded by civilians in cities such as Dezful, Isfahan and Shiraz to launch attack drones and ballistic missiles", Centcom says in a statement released on X. It adds that this behaviour puts the lives of civilians at risk "since locations used for military purposes lose protected status" and can become legitimate targets. "Iran's ter-

rorist regime is blatantly disregarding civilian lives by attacking Gulf partners while compromising the safety of their own people," says Centcom commander Adm Brad Cooper. Since the start of the strikes on 28 February, Iran has also accused the United States of hitting civilian infrastructure. BBC Verify has documented damage to a hospital, sporting centres, a Unesco world heritage site and two schools - one of which saw 168 people killed on Saturday morning, according to Iranian officials. People in Iran have been sending messages to BBC Persian's Ghoncheh Habibiabzad, after several oil refineries in Tehran were targeted in Israeli strikes overnight. A man in his 30s from Karaj, in the west of the Tehran province, said: "It started with a red light that lit up everything followed by a wave that jolted the door. Then the sky was lit again and a huge red cloud appeared." A woman in her

20s said the city was covered in smoke. "You can smell the burning," she said. "I can't see the sun. There is a horrible smoke. It's still there. I'm very tired." Another woman in her 20s described opening the window "for a moment and it smelled like a pump station [burning]". After the Karaj depot was hit, another man in his 20s described a "huge explosion and it was on fire for hours". BBC Persian is the Persian language service of BBC News, used by 24 million people around the world - the majority in Iran - despite being blocked and routinely jammed by Iranian authorities. Rapper-politician Balendra Shah unseats Nepal's ex-PM as he heads for victory



Rapper Balendra Shah has defeated the former Nepalese Prime Minister Sharma KP Oli in his parliamentary constituency, as he takes a step closer to becoming Nepal's next prime minister. Nepal's Election Commission confirmed on Saturday that Shah, 35, received 68,348 votes compared to Oli's 18,734 to unseat the former leader in his constituency. Thursday's general election - the first since violent youth-led protests toppled the government in September - pitted the establishment against a new generation of politicians advocating for angry, young Gen Z voters

hungry for change. Shah's Rastriya Swatantra Party (RSP) is now seemingly on course to win the general election. The party has a majority in directly elected seats in the general election counted so far, according to partial official results on Sunday, and could be heading for a landslide, official trends suggest. The 35-year-old is also leading in the proportional representation vote count so far, according to the election commission. For more than two decades, Nepal has seen a revolving door of coalition governments, largely dominated by three parties, two of them communist.

Explosion at US embassy in Oslo may have been terrorism, Norway police say



An overnight explosion at the US embassy in Oslo may have been an act of terrorism, Norway's police have said. The embassy in the Norwegian capital sustained minor damage after the blast in the early hours of Sunday - but no one was injured. "One of the hypotheses is that it is an act of terrorism, but we are not completely locked into it," Frode Larsen, the head of police joint investigation and intelligence unit, told Norway's public broadcaster NRK. Norwegian authorities say they are in contact with US diplomats, and an investigation into the incident is now under way. US diplomats have not commented. Speaking to NRK later on Sunday, Larsen stressed that "we have to be open to the possibility that there may be other causes behind what has happened". In an earlier statement, Norway's police said that "large resources" were sent to the area around the US embassy at about 01:00 local time on Sunday (00:00 GMT). "The police

are in dialogue with the embassy and no injuries have been reported," the statement added. Michael Dellemyr, who is leading the police response, told NRK that the explosion was at the public entrance to the building. He said police officers had conducted searches in the area around the embassy in the Morgedalsvegen district of Oslo, about 7km (4 miles) outside the city centre. He said the police had also issued an appeal for information from anyone who may have seen or heard anything about the incident. Photos posted on social media later showed shattered glass in the snow outside the entrance to the consular section of the building, cracks in a glass door as well as dark marks on a tiled floor. Norwegian authorities described the incident as "unacceptable", with Foreign Minister Espen Barth Eide stressing that "the security of diplomatic missions is very important to us". He added that he had contacted US embassy chargé d'affaires Eric Meyer regarding Sunday's incident.

Irish government chartered flight from Oman arrives in Dublin



The first Irish government chartered flight to bring home stranded Irish citizens from the Middle East has landed at Dublin Airport. The flight carrying 194 passengers left Oman on Saturday afternoon (local time) and arrived in Dublin at about 05:00 (local time). The Irish embassy in the United Arab Emirates (UAE) said earlier this week that elderly citizens or those with medical conditions would be prioritised and that children under 16 years would

be able to travel for free. Thousands of people from the UK and Republic of Ireland have been unable to leave the region after US-Israeli strikes on Iran prompted retaliatory strikes by Tehran across the region. The Irish Foreign Affairs Minister, Helen McEntee said it was a "challenging journey", but she was "glad that we have been able to directly facilitate the return of nearly 200 people, including a number of children and infants".

War fuels debate in Cyprus over UK military bases

A drone strike on a British airbase in Cyprus has reignited an enduring debate about the UK's presence on the island. It's a week since the drone punched a hole in a hangar at RAF Akrotiri. That hole, for some in Britain, symbolises embarrassing gaps in UK hard power. For some in Cyprus, it's another unwelcome result of British military overreach.

"We just want to have an independent Cyprus," said local business owner Natasha Theodotou. She was holding a banner that read "British Bases Out" at a demonstration outside the presidential palace in the capital, Nicosia. "Just as we're occupied by the Turkish government," said Natasha, "we are occupied by the UK." She wants to see a unified country where Greek Cypriots and Turkish Cypriots live



together. Britain retained two major sovereign bases in Cyprus' south and south east, Akrotiri and Dhekelia, as part of a 1960 treaty that established the island's independence and ended its status as a British colony. In 1974 Turkey invaded and took control of Cyprus' northern third in response to a Greece-backed military coup. Not far from the protest tourists queue up at a checkpoint allowing pas-

sage into the Turkish-controlled part of Nicosia. The city, which sits on the UN-patrolled buffer zone known as the Green Line, is sometimes called the world's last divided capital. British military officials' best assessment is that the drone that hit RAF Akrotiri was launched in Lebanon by the Iranian-backed militia Hezbollah. The UK government has said its bases in Cyprus are not among those that could be utilised

by US bombers for "defensive" strikes on Iranian missile sites. But the reported use of the base by American U-2 spy planes may explain why RAF Akrotiri was a target, as Iran and its proxies retaliated against US-Israeli strikes. The UK has not taken part in any direct attacks on Iran itself. Roughly 200 to 300 protesters joined the march on Saturday, carrying signs that were also pro-Palestine and critical of the US and Israel. Chants included: "Say it loud, say it clear, British bases out of here." The territory, kept by the UK, covers about 98 sq miles (254 sq km) and is even patrolled by a separate, special police force. These Sovereign Base Areas (SBAs) are a lingering point of contention while also being highly interwoven into the island and a source of employment.

Dancers loved practising in this Singapore walkway. Then the complaints came

With its wide floors, floor-to-ceiling mirrors and a ready audience, the underground passage connecting a train station to Singapore's iconic Gardens by the Bay had served as a practice ground for aspiring dancers for years. Until 1 January, when they showed up as usual only to find the mirrors frosted. Hundreds of commuters and tourists walk through the spacious tunnel every day, many of them on their way to the city's number-one attraction. People had complained that the dancers were "blocking pedestrian flow at this high-traffic area", local media reported. So, the mirrors



were frosted, triggering a debate - not just about space, but also Singapore's fixation with orderliness, the low bar for people to complain, and its many, many rules. All of which arguably stifle the abandon, or even the havoc, that is often characteristic of the

world's biggest cities. This is not the first time Singaporeans have crossed swords over how common spaces should be used in the land-scarce country, where more than 8,300 people jostle for each kilometre. From whether frisbees should be allowed in parks, to bench-

es fitted with dividers to deter rough sleepers, Singaporeans are often split on whose needs come first. Additional restrictions are not the problem, says urban planning expert Tan Shin Bin from the National University of Singapore. "[What should] give us pause is really whether the decision was a well-considered and fair one... Whose needs are being prioritised as legitimate, and whose desires are deemed secondary?" In the case of the walkway, it is one of many owned and maintained by private developers to "facilitate all-weather, safe and convenient connectivity", authorities told.

Boy, 12, among six dead as tornadoes hit Michigan and Oklahoma

At least six people have died and more than a dozen others injured after tornadoes struck Michigan and Oklahoma, in severe storms that swept across parts of the US. Officials said four people were killed in southern Michigan, including a 12-year-old boy, and two died in Oklahoma on Friday, with rescue workers continuing to assess the damage. The storms uprooted trees, downed power lines, damaged buildings and ripped the roofs off some houses on Friday. The National Weather Service (NWS) said the severe weather could continue into the weekend, warning of thunderstorms and flash flooding from the Great Plains to Texas. In Michigan, the Branch



County sheriff's department said three people were killed and 12 others were injured near Union City after a tornado hit on Friday. Power outages and road closures are expected this weekend, they added. About 50 miles (80 km) away in Cass County, Michigan, authorities reported one one death and several injuries.

Gilgeous-Alexander closes in on Chamberlain record

Shai Gilgeous-Alexander moved to within two games of breaking a decades-old NBA record as he scored 27 points to help the Oklahoma City Thunder to a 104-97 home win over the Golden State Warriors. He has scored at least 20 points in 125 consecutive games for the defending champions, a sequence that began on 1 November 2024. The legendary Wilt Chamberlain holds the record of 126 games - set between October 1961 and January 1963. The Thunder host the Denver Nuggets on Monday and the Boston Celtics on Thursday. Victory at Paycom Center was the Thunder's fifth in a row. They became the first side to 50 wins this season and sit top of the Western Conference.

Gilgeous-Alexander said: "If we were the best team last year, all year, we win a championship, and we get better, we should put ourselves in



great position to repeat. "This year's had a little bit more ups and downs for us, but I think we've done a pretty good job keeping that front of mind." The Warriors - again missing the injured Stephen Curry - scored seven unanswered points to reduce the

Thunder's lead to 99-97 before a three-pointer from Gilgeous-Alexander in the final minute. Michael Porter Jr scored 30 points as the Brooklyn Nets came from 23 points down to win 107-105 at Eastern Conference leaders Detroit Pistons and end a 10-game

losing streak. Giannis Antetokounmpo scored 27 points as the Milwaukee Bucks beat the visiting Utah Jazz 113-99. Jalen Johnson's 35 points, 10 rebounds, and seven assists helped the Atlanta Hawks to a 125-116 home win over the Philadelphia 76ers. Kawhi

Leonard scored 28 points as the Los Angeles Clippers overturned a 19-point first-half deficit to win 123-120 at the Memphis Grizzlies. The Orlando Magic won 119-92 at the Minnesota Timberwolves despite Anthony Edwards' 34 points for the hosts.

Rohit Sharma Reveals Chat With Sanju Samson Over Non-Selection In T20 World Cup

One of the finest to play for India in white-ball cricket, Rohit Sharma knows what it means to wear the India shirt in a World Cup. Rohit wasn't picked for India's squad for the 2011 World Cup, the last 50-over World Cup that the country won. Earlier in his career, he too had to warm the bench, be ignored by selectors in a number of tournaments and series. Seeing India wicket-keeper batter Sanju Samson face selection snubs for a spot in the playing XI early in the ongoing T20 World Cup, Rohit had a heartwarming chat with him. Samson was a part of the Indian team in the T20 World Cup 2024 but didn't get to play a single game. The opening batter might have feared that the 2026 campaign could turn out to be the same for him, as he was snubbed early on in the tournament. But, Rohit urged him to not lose hope as opportunities can come any time in a tournament like this. "Dukhi mat ho bhai. It is a long tourna-



ment, kabhi bhi mauka aa sakta hai. ("Don't be disheartened. It is a long tournament. You'll get your chance. The opportunity can come anytime)," Rohit said in a video shared by ICC on Instagram. Sharing some words of wisdom from his own experience, Rohit said that he can sometimes "feel the pulse of a player" and understand what they are going through. "I can sometimes feel the pulse of the player. I have been myself in that place where, you know, when I've been in a tournament like this, and my chances haven't come, it's important to stay

focused and try and do the right things and not get frustrated with you not getting the opportunity, and that's what I felt with him," said Rohit in a video, "Because he was consistently playing for India and then was dropped just before the World Cup started, you know, I just wanted to tell him that it's a long tournament and funny things have happened in the past, so I just wanted to reassure him that your chance would come. So it happened in the game where it was a crucial game for India, and he played a blinder," said Rohit.

Suryakumar Yadav's First Reaction On Seeing New Zealand's Playing XI In T20 World Cup Final

Finals are all about strategy and perfect execution. Making changes to the playing XI for a title clash is often a tough call. India did not walk that path in the T20 World Cup 2026 final against New Zealand. However, New Zealand took the big call by dropping Cole McConchie and introducing Jacob Duffy for the title clash in Ahmedabad on Sunday. India captain Suryakumar Yadav was intrigued when he received New Zealand's team sheet from Mitchell Santner right before the toss. He noticed that the Blackcaps were not fielding specialist spinner Cole McConchie. Yadav then signalled towards the team dugout: "Off-spinner



nahi hai" (there is no off-spinner). Earlier, legendary cricketers MS Dhoni and Rohit Sharma brought out the 2026 ICC Men's T20 World Cup trophy together ahead of the final between India and New Zealand at the Narendra Modi Stadium on Sunday.

The sight of the duo carrying out the glittering silverware generated a thunderous roar of delight from the packed crowd. Dhoni, who captained India to the title in the inaugural 2007 edition, joined Rohit, who led the team to the trophy in 2024. Apart from

Dhoni and Rohit, tournament ambassador and ICC chairman Jay Shah, along with JioStar vice-chairman Uday Shankar, also walked out with the trophy, which was placed on the pedestal before both teams lined up for the national anthems. Legendary playback singer Kavitha Krishnamurthy delivered a soaring rendition of the Indian national anthem. Coming to the match, New Zealand captain Mitchell Santner won the toss and elected to bowl against defending champions India. The Blackcaps made one change, drafting in pacer Jacob Duffy in place of off-spin bowling all-rounder Cole McConchie.

White House To Host First Professional Sporting Event As UFC Announces Title Bouts

The UFC (Ultimate Fighting Championship) has announced two championship fights for its upcoming event at the White House in Washington, DC, scheduled for June 14. The card, called UFC Freedom Fights 250, will be led by a lightweight title clash between Ilia Topuria and Justin Gaethje. The event will take place on the South Lawn of the White House and is being organised as part of celebrations marking 250 years of American independence. The date also coincides with US President Donald Trump's 80th birthday. UFC officials confirmed the matchups during the broadcast of UFC 326. Topuria vs Gaethje headlines card Topuria (17-0), a 29-year-old Spanish-



Georgian fighter, will defend his lightweight belt against Gaethje in the main event. Widely regarded as one of the sport's most dangerous knockout artists, Topuria captured the 155-pound (70 kg) title last June with a first-round knockout of Charles Oliveira after moving up from featherweight. Later in 2025,

Topuria announced he would step away briefly to deal with personal matters. With those issues resolved, he now returns for his first title defence and could consider a future move to welterweight. Gaethje (27-5), 37, will get his third chance to win the UFC's undisputed lightweight title. He previously fought for the belt in

2020 and 2022 but lost to Khabib Nurmagomedov and Oliveira. In January, Gaethje captured the interim championship by defeating Britain's Paddy Pimblett via unanimous decision in Las Vegas while Topuria was inactive. A two-time interim champion and 18-year veteran of the sport, Gaethje trains in Denver and grew up in Safford, Arizona. Pereira eyes historic third belt The co-main event features Pereira (13-3) taking on Gane (13-2) for the interim heavyweight title. Pereira will attempt to become the first fighter to win UFC championships in three different weight divisions. The Brazilian fighter previously held titles at middleweight and light heavyweight.

BORTHWICK BACKED BY RFU DESPITE RUN OF DEFEATS

Steve Borthwick's boss has given the England coach his backing, but says there will be a full examination of the woeful Six Nations campaign after the team's final-round match against France on Saturday. England are fifth in the table and well out of the title running after successive defeats by Scotland, Ireland and Italy - which was the first loss to the Azzurri - ruined their ambitions and prompted questions over Borthwick's future. "After a 12-match winning run, these past three results have been hugely disappointing, and we feel that just as much as everyone else," said Rugby Football Union chief executive Bill Sweeney. "Steve



and his coaching team are working tirelessly to make improvements, and we remain fully committed to supporting them and the players as they face France this weekend and then look ahead to the Nations Championship. "Part of that support is being open about what hasn't gone right during this Six

Nations and making sure everyone has a clear sense of how we move through those challenges together. "That's something we'll be talking through and working on in the days and weeks ahead. "We will work together to understand and rectify why we have been unable to meet the expectations and anticipation going into these games. "England fans rightly expect a team that learns and grows through adversity, and we're confident this group will do everything they can to deliver that." Borthwick defended his record and the direction of the team after Italy, who had lost their previous 32 games against England, ran out 23-18 winners in Rome.

England great and one of the legends of the game, James Anderson, has been left in awe of India pacer Jasprit Bumrah's bowling precision. It was Bumrah who turned the game on its head as India beat England in the T20 World Cup 2026 semifinal on Thursday. For Anderson, the manner in which Bumrah executes his yorkers with inch-perfect accuracy sets him apart from the rest of the bowlers in the world, whether in men's or women's cricket. "The thing about Bumrah is, I look at him and think, I don't think you can learn anything from him. He's an absolute freak. There's not one bowler in the world, in any format, men or women, who can bowl six yorkers



out of six and absolutely nail it every time. Even one of the yorkers he bowled [vs England] in his last over was a slower ball. So he nailed five fast yorkers and one slower-ball yorker you just can't hit them anywhere," Anderson said on the BBC podcast. England had their task cut out in the semifinal against India as they chased a gigantic total of 254. Yet, Jacob Bethell

showed exemplary determination and desire to fight on. He scored a breathtaking century, taking all Indian bowlers to the cleaners-except Bumrah. For Anderson, if it hadn't been for Bumrah, England might well have chased down the target. "England did really well to get six [runs] off the hole, like they squeezed the ball out.

McLaren's Oscar Piastri Involved In Ugly Crash At Australian Grand Prix



The mood at Albert Park changed suddenly from joy to shock when Oscar Piastri crashed during the warm-up lap of the Australian Grand Prix. In a cruel twist, the McLaren driver lost control of his MCL38 coming out of Turn 4, a fast part of the Melbourne track that has troubled many experienced racers before. The crash was heavy. Piastri's car spun across the track and slammed into the barriers, badly damaging the suspension and bodywork. Thankfully, he climbed out on his own and looked unhurt, but the heartbreak of missing his home race was clear on his face. "Marshals rushed to clear the wreck, but Piastri's dream of a podium finish in front of a record home crowd ended in the run-off area.

For McLaren, this is a big blow. With Piastri out, all hopes now rest on Lando Norris, who must fight alone against the leaders. The race starts at 3 p.m. local time, leaving the engineers no choice but to focus fully on Norris's race plan. At the front, Mercedes are stealing the spotlight. George Russell grabbed pole position, showing the team finally has the speed to win regularly. Alongside him is teenage rookie Kimi Antonelli, starting on the front row. The battle between Russell, the team leader, and Antonelli, the fearless newcomer, will be one of the main stories in the opening laps, especially with strong rivals chasing close behind. As fans come to terms with Piastri's absence, the stage is set for a tense and tactical race under the Australian sun.

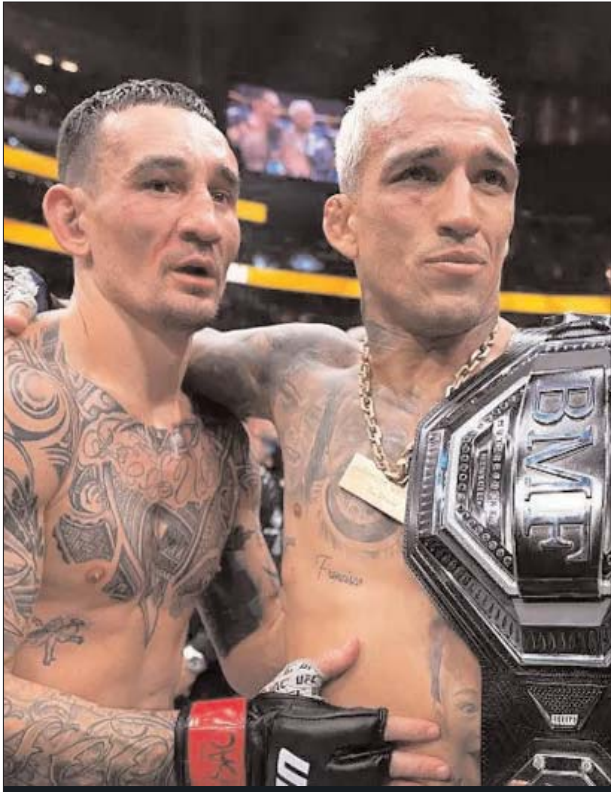
Oliveira dominates Holloway to win BMF title

Charles Oliveira dominated Max Holloway from start to finish to win the BMF title by unanimous decision at UFC 326 in Las Vegas. Defending champion Holloway had no answer to Oliveira's grappling as the Brazilian took him down at will in the lightweight main event at the T-Mobile Arena. Although Holloway defended against submissions admirably, the American failed to mount any significant offence as Oliveira added the symbolic BMF belt to the lightweight world championship he won in 2021. The BMF title was

first introduced by the UFC in 2019 to commemorate the promotion's 'baddest' fighter. "I respect you so much, we're different to other people," Oliveira told Holloway after being crowned champion. "These dudes come here and talk a lot, we come here and do a lot of beautiful things for our family and this sport. There are two BMFs who are Charles Oliveira and Max Holloway." Holloway, 34, and Oliveira, 36, went into the contest as two of the most popular fighters on the UFC roster and two future Hall-of-Famers. Former

featherweight champion Holloway holds the record for the most significant strikes in UFC history with 3,681 and became the first fighter to defend the BMF belt when he defeated Dustin Poirier last year. Oliveira came into the bout as the fighter with the most finishes in UFC history with 21, and the most submission wins with 17. The pair fought previously in 2015 with Holloway winning via stoppage, but Oliveira said in the build-up to the rematch he was a "jiu-jitsu fighter" then, compared to an "MMA fighter" now.

From the first round, Oliveira demonstrated his evolution as a fighter as he put Holloway on the back foot, before securing an early takedown. For over four minutes Oliveira searched for submissions on the ground and although Holloway defended resolutely, it would be a pattern which would repeat itself throughout the fight. On the feet Holloway landed sparingly and when he did, Oliveira paid little respect to the Hawaiian's power as he marched forward before securing multiple take-downs.
