## Healthcare must remain humane, says CM Revanth



**HYDERABAD TSIT BUREAU:**

A.Revanth Reddy said that healthcare should never become purely mechanical and stressed that medical services must always be delivered with compassion and humanity. Speaking at the inauguration of a new facility of Medcover Hospitals in Hyderabad, the Chief Minister said the hospital group has earned wide recognition across the country for its medical services.

Highlighting Hyderabad's contribution to the pharmaceutical sector, he said around 40 percent of India's pharmaceutical production comes from Hyderabad, adding that three COVID-19 vaccines were produced in the city's Genome Valley, which is a matter of pride for the state.

Chief Minister recalled that economic reforms introduced by former leaders such as P. V. Narasimha Rao and N. Chandrababu Naidu played a key role in completing HITEC

City and transforming the city into an IT hub. Revanth Reddy said the state government is introducing major reforms in the education sector to ensure quality learning. From the coming academic year, the government plans to introduce an integrated education system from Nursery to Class 12 and establish Telangana Public Schools, providing students with quality breakfast, lunch and transport facilities.

Transport facilities will also be provided free of cost or at 50 percent subsidy for students studying in government schools. To strengthen employability, the government is also setting up a Skills University to enhance students' professional capabilities. The Chief Minister emphasized that providing quality education can reduce the need for welfare support, adding that a healthy woman ensures the well-being of the entire family.

He also announced that the state government is preparing digital health data for around

6.5 million people, based on 20 years of Aarogyasri Health Care Trust data, and plans to issue digital health cards to beneficiaries.

The government is also focusing on cancer care, he said, adding that renowned oncologist Nori Dattatreya has been appointed as an advisor. Revanth Reddy noted that the state has spent Rs.1,800 crore on Aarogyasri and Chief Minister's Relief Fund (CMRF) and is investing nearly Rs.10,000 crore in the construction and infrastructure development of hospitals including Osmania General Hospital and Telangana Institute of Medical Sciences.

Expressing concern over the rising cost of medical treatment, the Chief Minister suggested that private sector doctors should dedicate one month each year to serve in government hospitals. He further stated that the government is exploring plans to provide life insurance coverage to nearly 1.3 crore families across the state.

## IRAN'S NEW LEADER MOJTABA KHAMENEI VOWS TO AVENGE FAMILY, THREATENS HORMUZ BLOCKADE

**New Delhi (TSIT)** Iran's new Supreme Leader, Mojtaba Khamenei, issued his first statement on Thursday after succeeding his father, Ali Khamenei, who was killed along with several family members in the US-Israeli strikes at the outset of the ongoing West Asia war.

In a message broadcast on Iranian state television, read out by a news anchor, Khamenei vowed that Tehran would "avenge the blood of Iranians" killed during the conflict and warned that Iran would continue targeting American bases across

the region. "We are not enemies of the countries around us," the statement said. "But the existence of the US bases in some of these countries and their use to attack Iran is not benefiting the region and they must be closed." He also warned that Iran would continue to use the threat of blocking the strategically vital Strait of Hormuz as leverage against the US and Israel.

Linking the war to personal loss, Khamenei said members of his own family were among those killed in the strikes. "I lost my father and my wife. My sister lost

her child and her husband," he said, adding that patience and faith would guide Iran through the crisis. The statement also demanded compensation for war damages, warning that Iran could seize or destroy foreign assets if reparations were denied. The remarks echoed Iranian President Masoud Pezeshkian, who earlier said in talks with leaders of Russia and Pakistan that peace would require recognition of Iran's rights, reparations for war losses and firm international guarantees against future aggression.



## 50 LAKH LPG CYLINDERS BEING SUPPLIED PER DAY, AVOID PANIC BOOKING: GOVT

**New Delhi (TSIT):** The Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas said on Thursday that all steps are being taken by the Government to ensure uninterrupted energy supplies, with 50 lakh LPG cylinders being delivered every day, so consumers should avoid "panic booking" of cooking gas. Crude is sourced from more than 40 countries, and 70 per cent of the crude is now coming from routes other than the Strait of Hormuz, which is currently closed, a ministry statement said. India's daily oil consumption is 5.5 million barrels, and it is the fourth largest refiner



in the world with 22 refineries in the country. Further, refineries are operating at high-capacity utilisation; in several cases, they are exceeding 100 per cent. This large refining capacity is allowing the coun-

try a much more comfortable position in terms of availability of petroleum products during the Iran war crisis, availability and sustain the crisis, it said. There are over 1 lakh retail outlets providing petroleum products, all of which have adequate stocks. The supply of natural gas has been affected due to force majeure conditions, but the procurement through alternative routes and suppliers is underway to offset this disruption. To manage this situation effectively, the government has issued a Natural Gas Control Order under the Essential

Commodities Act to prioritise the supply, the statement said. The global situation is challenging, but the Government has taken many steps to maintain the demand-supply balance. These include enhancing production of LPG by the refineries with the entire output of C3 and C4 hydrocarbon streams, comprising propane, butane, propylene, and butane being provided exclusively to the three oil marketing companies for domestic cooking gas.

Hence, in the last five days, LPG production has been increased by 28 per cent through refinery directives.

## DON'T PANIC OVER GAS CYLINDERS, CM STALIN APPEALS TO PUBLIC



**CHENNAI (TSIT):** Chief Minister MK Stalin on Thursday (March 12) appealed to the public not to panic over the reported shortage of LPG cylinders, in a post on social media platform X. He said he had written to Prime Minister Narendra Modi and the concerned Union Ministers regarding the gas cylinder situation and urged them to take immediate measures to ensure adequate supply. Recalling the discussions held to tackle the issue, the Chief

Minister said efforts were underway to manage the situation arising out of the conflict in the West Asian region. "We have also raised the gas cylinder issue in Parliament and staged a demonstration to emphasise the need for immediate intervention by the Union government," Stalin said.

Meanwhile, the reported scarcity of LPG cylinders has affected the hospitality sector, with around 300 hotels reportedly shutting down operations in Chennai on Thursday. Several eateries have also reduced their menu options due to the shortage. In addition, canteens and hotels operating in government buildings have increased the prices of food items, with rates of items such as coffee and meals rising by Rs 10 to Rs 20, without prior notice.

## Nearly 9,000 Indians currently in Iran, govt tells Parliament



**New Delhi (TSIT):** There are nearly 9,000 Indians including students, business persons, factory workers, pilgrims, seafarers, and fishermen in Iran at present, the government informed Parliament on Thursday, March 12. In a written response to a query in Rajya Sabha, Minister of State for External Affairs Pabitra Margherita also said the Indian Embassy has advised Indian nationals in Iran to exercise utmost

caution, maintain situational awareness, monitor local media for any developments and stay in contact with the embassy.

The Ministry of External Affairs was asked the details of Indian citizens who are still in Iran, and the details of measures taken for their safety, including emergency helplines activated by the embassy, deployment of consular teams and any arrangements with Iranian authorities for protection. "The Ministry and the Embassy of India in Iran have issued periodic advisories (5 January, 14 January, 23 February, 28 February and 3 March 2026) to Indian nationals, urging avoidance of non-essential travel to Iran and advising those wishing to leave to do so by the means available.

## POLICE KEY TO ACHIEVING \$3 TRILLION ECONOMY GOAL: BHATTI



**Hyderabad (TSIT) :** Telangana Deputy Chief Minister Bhatti Vikramarka Mallu said the police department plays a crucial role in achieving the state's goal of becoming a \$3 trillion economy by 2047. He made the remarks during pre-budget meetings with the Home, Industries and IT departments held at the Dr. B. R. Ambedkar Telangana Secretariat on Thursday.

The Deputy Chief Minister said strong law and order is essential as more investors are showing interest in Telangana. He directed officials of the Home Department to ensure there are no lapses in security and surveillance, assuring full government support to strengthen policing

systems. He also suggested introducing electric vehicles in the police department in phases as part of the government's push towards sustainable mobility. Stressing the importance of surveillance in crime prevention, he instructed officials to expand the use of CCTV cameras across the state and repair non-functional cameras. Bhatti Vikramarka said the state must adopt the Public-Private Partnership model to achieve its economic goals and asked the Industries Department to prepare suitable plans. He also emphasised the need to focus on rural development through the RARE (Rural Agri Region Economy) initiative.

## Rahul Gandhi raises LPG issue in Lok Sabha, says 'pain has just started'

**New Delhi, March 12 :** Lok Sabha Leader of Opposition (LoP) Rahul Gandhi, on Thursday, flagged the issue of LPG shortages hitting the hotel industry, in the wake of West Asia crisis and claimed that this was the "beginning of pain" that will only aggravate in days to come. Speaking in Lok Sabha over 'LPG crisis', the Congress MP took potshots at the Union government over its alleged surrender to the US administration's diktats and asked how could the US President Donald Trump decide "from where and from whom India makes its oil purchases". Rahul Gandhi reiterated his 'compromise' charge, holding it to be the key reason for petrol and LPG shortages in the country. These claims were subsequently countered by the Union Petroleum Minister Hardeep Singh Puri, who declared that the country's oil reserves were full and there was no looming crisis before the country.

LoP Rahul Gandhi, while speaking on the West Asia crisis, said the US-Israel and Iran war will have far-reaching consequences for everyone, including India, and it has started becoming evident.

"The central artery through which 20 per cent of the global oil flows, the Strait of Hormuz, has been closed. And this is going to have tremendous repercussions, particularly for us (India), because a very large portion of our oil and natural gas comes through the Strait of Hormuz." "The pain has just started. Restaurants are closing, there is widespread panic about LPG, street vendors are affected, and as I said, this is only the beginning," the Lok

Sabha LoP added.

Questioning United States' 'interference' in India's petroleum pacts, LoP Rahul Gandhi asked "how could a third nation decide who we buy oil from, whether we can buy oil from Russia or not, and whether our relationships with different oil suppliers can be decided by us -- this is what has been bartered".

He went to add that this issue puzzled and perplexed him for long, however, he has now understood it and such 'capitulation' is because of India compromising its interests.

"It is a very puzzling fact why a nation the size of India would allow any other nation, or the President of another nation, to give us permission to buy Russian oil and decide who our relationships are with."

"I have figured the puzzle out, and the puzzle is about compromise," the Lok Sabha LoP said.

The LoP's mention of Epstein however did raise eyebrows as well as the hackles of the ruling Treasury benches. While cornering the Central government on the LPG issue, Rahul Gandhi said that the Union Petroleum Minister has admitted on record that he had relations with Jeffrey Epstein.

This prompted Speaker Om Birla to intervene. Outside the Parliament, a couple of Bharatiya Janata Party MPs demanded that the Congress MP Rahul Gandhi be penalised for violating the parliamentary protocols and raking up the Epstein issue despite the latter having no connection with the issue.

## Lok Sabha functions under rules, no member has privilege to speak beyond framework: Birla

**NEW DELHI:** The House functions strictly according to rules and no member has the privilege to speak at any time and on any subject, Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla asserted on Thursday, a day after a resolution seeking his removal from office was defeated.

Birla said the Chair does not belong to any individual, but is a symbol of the prestige of the House.

The Lok Sabha will continue to function according to laid down rules and procedures irrespective of whether it is acceptable to any member or not, he said, underlining that he will conduct the proceedings with sincerity and fairness.

"No member in this House possesses any privilege to speak outside the framework of these rules," Birla said amid thumping of desks by the ruling side.

He said he was grateful to the members of the House for reposing their faith in him during debate. He also thanked all those who spoke in favour of him as well as against him.

"The House has been



running with rules and regulations and will continue to function in future, irrespective of whether it is acceptable to any member or not. I will continue to discharge my duty with all sincerity and impartiality," he said.

Thursday was the first time Birla came to the House to conduct the proceedings since the notice of no confidence was given against him by the opposition on February 10 during the first part of the Budget session, which ended on

February 13. The second part of the session began on March 9.

The speaker said that during the debate over the last two days, some members said Leader of Opposition Rahul Gandhi is not given enough opportunities to speak, and he should be allowed to speak whenever he wishes and on any subject.

"Everyone has the right to speak in the House, but by following rules and regulations. No member, not even the prime minister

or any minister, can speak without the permission of the Chair. No member of the House has the privilege to speak at any time and on any subject. He can speak only when the Chair allows," he said.

Birla said the MPs have the freedom of speech in the House, but they have to follow rules and regulations.

He also addressed allegations that microphones of some members are switched off when they want to speak.

"I don't have a switch to turn the mic on or off. The mic is put on when a member is given permission to speak by the Chair," he said.

Responding to claims that Gandhi was disallowed to table a magazine article based on the unpublished memoir of former Army chief M M Naravane on the India-China conflict of 2020, Birla cited rulings by past speakers when members were not allowed to table documents by the Chair.

Soon after his speech, Birla adjourned the House till 2 pm.

## ED attaches fresh Rs 581-cr assets in case against Anil Ambani's Reliance Group

**NEW DELHI:** The Enforcement Directorate on Thursday said it has attached fresh assets worth more than Rs 581 crore of RHFL and RCFL, companies of Reliance Group Chairman Anil Ambani.

An order was issued on March 11 to attach land parcels in Goa, Kerala, Karnataka, Punjab, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh, Haryana, Jharkhand, Maharashtra, Delhi, West Bengal, Andhra Pradesh and Rajasthan, the Enforcement Directorate (ED) said in a statement.

The properties worth Rs 581.65 crore belong to Reliance Home Finance Limited (RHFL) and Reliance Commercial Finance Limited (RCFL), the agency said.

"The attachment follows search operations conducted on March 6 in the case against Reliance Power Limited under the Foreign Exchange Management Act (FEMA)," it said.

## R N Ravi takes oath as 22nd Governor of West Bengal

**KOLKATA:** Former IPS officer R N Ravi on Thursday took oath as the 22nd governor of West Bengal at a ceremony in the Lok Bhavan here.

He was administered the oath of office by Chief Justice of the Calcutta High Court, Sujoy Paul, in the presence of Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee, Assembly Speaker Biman Banerjee, senior minister and Kolkata Mayor Firhad Hakim and Left Front chairman Biman Bose.

No leader from the opposition BJP camp, however, was present at the programme. Several bureaucrats, including Chief Secretary Nandini Chakravorty and senior police officers, also attended the event. The ceremony began with the singing of the national song and anthem.

Ravi was presented the Guard of Honour at Lok Bhavan, before he was



sworn in at the Sardar Patel Unity Hall. Later, the CM greeted Ravi and his wife and welcomed both by presenting traditional 'uttariyas' (stole).

During her brief interaction with the new governor, Mamata Banerjee described West Bengal as a land of culture, and that Bengali people love those who love the state.

Ravi described Kolkata as the country's cultural

capital and noted that it had served as the capital of India during the British rule, adding that he would keep a close watch on developments.

Ravi was appointed the governor of West Bengal following the resignation of his predecessor C V Ananda Bose on March 5.

He had earlier served as the governor of Nagaland, Meghalaya and Tamil Nadu.

## PM Modi asking people not to panic but is himself panicked for various reasons: Rahul

**NEW DELHI:** Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Thursday attacked Prime Minister Narendra Modi amid concerns over reported LPG shortage, saying the PM is asking the people not to panic but is himself panicked for "completely different reasons".

Gandhi alleged that the prime minister is panicked because of the Epstein files issue and the Adami Case in the US.

He made the remarks after several opposition MPs, including himself and Priyanka Gandhi Vadra, staged a protest in the Parliament House complex over the shortage of commercial LPG cylinders to demand answers from the government over it.

Speaking with reporters after the protest, Gandhi said, "The PM is saying there is no need to panic, but the PM himself has panicked for completely different reasons... he is panicked because of Epstein, he is panicked because of the Adami case, he is not able to come inside the House."

"You saw yesterday that the prime minister's chair was empty. So, he is telling the country not to panic but has panicked himself," Gandhi added.

Several opposition MPs from the Congress, DMK, TMC and SP, among others, staged a protest near Parliament's Makar Dwar, raising slogans such as 'Naam Narendra, Kaam Surrender' and 'Modi ji, LPG'.

The women opposition MPs, including Priyanka Gandhi, sat down



with a mock brick cooking stove and raised slogans against the government.

In a post on X in Hindi, Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge said, "When the country is grappling with a severe crisis, Prime Minister Modi ji is engrossed in election tours."

"There is a severe shortage of LPG across the country, and people are standing in queues. Countless small and large industries are being forced to bear the consequences of the BJP's failure. But the government has no answers. Only false claims," he said.

The failure of diplomacy is a serious issue, and the result of the mismanagement of energy is being borne today by the 1.4 billion people of the country, he claimed.

"Narendra Modi ji, bahut hui 'Mann ki Baat, zara sansad mein aa kar kariye

'mudde ki baat' (Enough of 'Mann Ki Baat', come to Parliament and talk on real issues)," the Congress chief said.

With the House being adjourned shortly after meeting at 11 am amid sloganeering by the opposition demanding a discussion on the West Asia situation, Gandhi sat with suspended opposition MPs on the steps of the Makar Dwar and had tea with them.

The opposition has been demanding a full-fledged discussion on the West Asia situation and its impact on India.

Prime Minister Modi on Wednesday appealed to people not to panic and assured them that public interest will be protected. He expressed confidence in tackling the LPG crisis, where the short supply of commercial LPG has crippled the country's hotel sector.

From induction cooktops and microwaves to firewood and solar options, restaurants, street food vendors, and catering businesses across the country are scrambling for alternatives as a shortage of commercial LPG cylinders begins to disrupt kitchens amid the widening conflict in West Asia.

With the government prioritising domestic cooking gas supply to households as the war disrupts global fuel lifelines, businesses dependent on commercial LPG -- from small eateries to high-end restaurants -- are watching the situation anxiously, with some even staring at possible closure in the days to come.

**NEW DELHI:** The Supreme Court on Thursday refused to entertain a plea filed by the grand nephew of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, seeking directions to bring back to India the ashes believed to be those of Bose from Tokyo's Renkoji temple. After a bench of Chief Justice Surya Kant and Justices Joymalya Bagchi and Vipul M Pancholi showed its disinclination to entertain the plea, senior advocate Abhishek Singhvi, appearing for petitioner Ashis Ray, sought permission to withdraw it.

The bench permitted him to withdraw the petition.

"I am appearing for the family members who want

to give a decent quietus to the ashes," Singhvi told the bench at the outset.

The CJJ asked how many times this issue would come up before the apex court.

The bench said last year itself, the top court had dismissed one petition.

Singhvi said this was not the issue that had come up before the court earlier. "First of all, where are the ashes? What is that proof?" the CJJ said, adding that Bose was one of the greatest leaders of our nation, and we all bow down to his sacrifice.

Singhvi said it is recorded that every head of state from India has paid obeisance at the Renkoji temple in Japan.



He said the matter which the apex court had dealt with earlier was concerning declaring whether Bose had died or not.

"That is inference. Until

and unless he dies, there can't be ashes," the bench observed. "First, we would like to know how many family members are supporting this," the bench asked.

## Rahul Gandhi's soul will be at peace if China, US and Russia attack India: MP Dubey

**NEW DELHI:** Congress leader Rahul Gandhi's soul will be at peace when China, Russia and the US attack India, BJP MP Nishikant Dubey said on Thursday while accusing the leader of opposition in the Lok Sabha of being involved in a conspiracy to "break" India.

"He seems to want the prime minister to abuse Donald Trump in the morning, abuse Vladimir Putin in the afternoon and in the evening abuse Xi Jinping. If the prime minister insults all three, then Rahul Gandhi's soul

will find peace," Dubey told reporters inside the Parliament House complex.

"When Russia, America and China together boycott India, or even attack India, then his heart will feel satisfied because George Soros' agenda of breaking India would have succeeded," he said. "I always say this -- there is a conspiracy to break India and Rahul Gandhi is involved in that conspiracy," he added.

Dubey, the MP from Godda in Jharkhand, also criticised former prime minister Rajiv Gandhi's deci-

sion to send the Indian Peace Keeping Force to Sri Lanka during the island nation's civil war.

"When a civil war was going on in Sri Lanka, Rajiv Gandhi forcibly sent the Indian Army there. The result was that, for the first time abroad, the prime minister of our country was attacked by soldiers of that very country," he said.

Hitting out at the opposition, Dubey said the country has never seen "such a low, undisciplined and reckless opposition".

## Women in agri-food sector should get greater role in policy formation: Prez

**NEW DELHI:** President Droupadi Murmu on Thursday said women engaged in agriculture and agri-food sectors should get a greater role in policy formation, decision-making and leadership positions, and called for collective action to close gender gaps across the value chain.

Addressing the three-day Global Conference on Women in Agri-Food Systems, the President said success case studies on women in agriculture should be published widely to ensure more people were aware of their contributions.

Emphasising India's strategic choice of women-led development, Murmu said women in the agriculture sector must be given a greater role in policy formulation, decision-making, and leadership positions.

"Larger participation of women at all levels in the sector will promote gender-inclusive agricultural growth," she said.

She called for targeted support for women farmers on issues of land titles, access to technical knowledge, and institutional finance.

On the role of technology, Murmu highlighted 'Sarlaben' -- an AI-powered initiative inspired by the government's livestock care vision -- as an example of how artificial intelligence is opening new



possibilities for women farmers.

Noting that the government had conferred Padma Shri awards on women farmers from Tamil Nadu, Maharashtra, Odisha, and Bihar, Murmu said the next generation should draw inspiration from these trailblazers to contribute meaningfully to the farm sector.

The President welcomed the UN's declaration of 2026 as the International Year of Women Farmers, describing it as a call for "collective action to close gender gaps and promote leadership roles for women across the agri-food value chain". The President cited a series of central government initiatives from the past decade that have sought to economically empower women in agriculture.

The Jan Dhan Yojana, the world's largest financial inclusion programme, now has 570 million bank accounts, of which 56 per cent are held by women. Women also constitute 68 per cent of all Mudra loan beneficiaries, reflecting the reach of India's digital public infrastructure.

Under the Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana -- National Rural Livelihoods Mission (DAY-NRLM) -- over 10 crore rural households and 90 lakh self-help groups (SHGs) have been mobilised, making it one of the world's largest women-led community initiatives.

More than 4.6 crore women farmers under this mission have received support for adopting improved farming practices.

The Namo Drone Didi scheme provides drones to women SHGs for precision agriculture. The National Rural Livelihood Mission has set a target of creating 6 crore Lakhpati Didis -- women earning over Rs 1 lakh annually -- of whom more than 3 crore have already achieved that status.

The 2025-26 Union Budget has also introduced SHE Marts (Self-Help Entrepreneur Marts) community-owned retail outlets in every district dedicated to marketing products made by SHGs and rural enterprises -- to provide women in agriculture and allied sectors better

market access.

Closing her address, Murmu invoked the global framework of people, planet, prosperity, peace, and partnership, urging all stakeholders to make gender a special priority in both thought and action.

"With effective gender inclusion in every sphere of activity, including agriculture, we will not only achieve the SDGs but will also make the planet a much more sensitive and harmonious place," she said.

Agriculture Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan, ICAR Director General M L Jat, Trust for Advancement of Agricultural Sciences (TAAS) founder Chairman R S Paroda, Protection of Plant Varieties and Farmers Rights Authority (PPVFRA), Chairperson Trilochana Mohapatra among others were present at the event.

The three-day event focuses on sharing inspiring success stories of women leaders and scientists; integrating gender-sensitive approaches into agricultural policies and institutions; examining entrepreneurship, financial models, and market linkages to strengthen women's roles in value chains.

It will also deliberate on digital tools, climate-smart innovations, and women-friendly technologies designed to boost productivity and reduce drudgery.

## Assassination bid on Farooq Abdullah figures in RS, opposition blames revocation of statehood

**NEW DELHI:** The assassination bid on former Jammu and Kashmir chief minister Farooq Abdullah figured in the Rajya Sabha on Thursday, with opposition parties blaming revocation of statehood for the incident, while the Centre promised a comprehensive investigation.

Leader of the Opposition in the Upper House, Mallikarjun Kharge, raised the issue when the House met for the day, saying the former chief minister's security was at risk.

"His security is under threat because statehood of Jammu and Kashmir was revoked," he said, adding that when local security and police arrangements were previously with the state government, no such incident could occur.

The situation in Jammu and Kashmir today is because the security is with the Union Home Ministry after the revocation of statehood, he alleged. "Law and order has broken down and conspiracy is being hatched to eliminate important leaders."

He said Abdullah was saved by a whisker he was fired at while leading a marriage function at the venue on the outskirts of Jammu on Wednesday night.

"Is it the intention of the

government to kill Farooq Abdullah," the Congress president asked. "If the intention was to safeguard him, he should have had full security cover."

People will be safe when the state gets full statehood, he said. "People of Kashmir are not safe in your hands," he told the Centre.

He went on to allege that there was a conspiracy being hatched to eliminate people who stand for secularism, socialism and keeping the country united.

The accused, identified as Kamal Singh Jamwal, was quickly overpowered and taken into custody. Responding to the concerns, Leader of the House and Union Minister J P Nadda said the government will take all necessary steps to ensure the security of Abdullah.

He said that "a murderous attack" on Abdullah "is a matter of great concern and a very serious matter".

"The Government of India is taking the matter very seriously," he said, assuring a thorough investigation will be done.

The motive of the alleged assign, who has been arrested, would also be ascertained, he said, adding that appropriate action will be taken to provide security to Abdullah.

## Government untenable if it can't ensure girls' safety: TVK chief Vijay

Vijay referred to the brutal murder of a 17-year-old girl in Vilathikulam in Thoothukudi district, who was allegedly sexually assaulted and killed, and said the incident had shocked the conscience of society

CHENNAI: Actor and Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam (TVK) president Vijay on Thursday mounted a sharp attack on the ruling DMK government, questioning the state of women's safety in Tamil Nadu in the wake of a series of violent crimes reported across Tamil Nadu in recent days.

In a statement, Vijay referred to the brutal murder of a 17-year-old girl in Vilathikulam in Thoothukudi district, who was allegedly sexually assaulted and killed, and said the incident had shocked the conscience of society. He noted that the victim's parents and local residents were staging protests demanding justice.

The TVK leader also cited another incident near Madhuranthakam, where a 14-year-old girl was allegedly sexually assaulted and left stranded in a forest area overnight before walking nearly 10 km to reach a police station the



next morning.

"Chief Minister, who appears focused only on preserving his alliance, must explain where the safety of women and girl children in Tamil Nadu stands today," Vijay said.

Listing a series of recent crimes, he referred to violent attacks reported in Nanguneri, Sivaganga and

Manamadurai, the abduction and sexual assault of a seven-year-old girl in Namakkal, an alleged custodial death in Manamadurai, and the killing of a 70-year-old man in Krishnagiri, followed by the sexual assault of his wife.

Vijay said such incidents occurring within a

short span of time had shaken public confidence in law and order. "There is no safety for the public, for women, for children, for the elderly or for youth. People have begun asking whether such a government is necessary," he said. Meanwhile, BJP leader K Annamalai also criticised the state government, citing reports of a college student from Tiruchy being abducted and sexually assaulted in Chennai while visiting the city for project work.

"Before the scars of the horrific sexual assault and murder of the Vilathikulam girl and the gang assault near Madhuranthakam could heal, yet another case has surfaced in the capital city, barely minutes away from the Chief Minister's residence," he said. "Every such incident is a painful reminder of the state of law and order under the DMK government," Annamalai added.

## Rajendra Vishwanath Arlekar sworn in as acting Governor in CM Stalin's presence



CHENNAI: Rajendra Vishwanath Arlekar on Thursday took oath as the Governor, assuming charge in addition to his existing responsibilities as the Governor of Kerala.

The oath of office was administered by Chief Justice of the Madras High Court Sushrut Arvind Dharmadhikari at a brief ceremony held at the Lok Bhavan here. Arlekar took

the oath in the name of God, pledging to faithfully discharge the functions of the Governor of Tamil Nadu and uphold the Constitution and the law.

Chief Minister MK Stalin attended the ceremony along with Union Minister L Murugan, several judges of the Madras High Court, State Ministers, senior government officials, and MPs.

Leaders from various political parties were also present. Arlekar later exchanged greetings with the Chief Minister, judges and other dignitaries present at the event. According to Lok Bhavan officials, the arrangement is an interim measure until further orders from the Union government regarding the gubernatorial post in Tamil Nadu.

## Several express trains to run with changes via Tiruchy: Southern Railway

CHENNAI: Southern Railway has announced changes in the services of several express trains due to maintenance work being carried out in various sections of the Tiruchy division, according to Daily Thanthi. According to the railway authorities, the SeSengottai-Mayiladuthurai Express (Train No. 16848) will operate with changes from Thursday (March 12) to March 17. The Mumbai CSTM Express (Train No. 12666) will run with changes on Thursday (March 12) and March 15. Similarly, the Kanniyakumari-Howrah Ativi Raivu Express (Train No. 16128) will operate with revised services on Friday and Saturday. Tiruchythe Guruvayur-Chennai Egmore operate with revised services on Friday and Saturday, while the Guruvayur-Chennai Egmore Express (Train No. 16128) will run with changes from Thursday to March 15. The Kanniyakumari-Hyderabad Special (Train No. 07229) will run on Friday (March 13) via Madurai, Manamadurai, and Karaikudi and will reach Tiruchy.

## No alliance talks held with TVK, says Palaniswami

CHENNAI: AIADMK general secretary Edappadi K Palaniswami Wednesday night dismissed reports of talks with Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam (TVK) for an electoral alliance, calling the speculation "purely the media's imagination".

Responding to questions from reporters in Tiruchirappalli, Palaniswami said the AIADMK had not held any discussions with the party led by actor-politician Vijay. He also said seat-sharing talks with allies had not yet begun and would be announced when

the process starts.

The AIADMK leader was speaking after meeting Union Ministers Piyush Goyal and L Murugan following an NDA rally addressed by Narendra Modi. Palaniswami also criticised Chief Minister MK Stalin for describing the upcoming Assembly election as a contest between Delhi and Tamil Nadu, saying the remarks reflected a lack of confidence. He expressed confidence that the AIADMK-led NDA would perform well in the polls.

## Coimbatore: Three staff suspended after 44 kids fall ill post eating noon meal

CHENNAI: Three staff members have reportedly been suspended at a corporation school following the incident of forty-four students who fell ill after consuming the midday meal, allegedly after a lizard fell into the food on March 11.

According to Daily Thanthi, 408 students study at the school, of whom around 384 regularly consume the government's nutritious midday meal. On March 11, 44 students, including 31 boys and 13 girls, who had eaten lunch



at the school, complained of vomiting and fainting soon after the meal. Teachers immediately rushed the affected students to the Coimbatore Government Hospital, where they were treated. All the students were discharged later in

the evening after receiving medical care. Following the incident, Coimbatore Corporation Commissioner Sivaguru Prabhakaran and the corporation school's Chief Educational Officer conducted an inquiry. Students undergoing treat-

ment after consuming the Noon meal. During the inspection, a dead lizard was reportedly found in the food served to the students. Officials said the catering staff had served the meal without noticing the reptile had fallen into the food. Based on the preliminary investigation, the district collector ordered the suspension of three staff members: Kausalya, the nutrition organiser; Manokari, the cook; and Jaya Kamalam, the kitchen assistant, for negligence.

## Madras HC grants interim stay on civil suit against Anbumani

CHENNAI: The Madras High Court has granted an interim stay on the proceedings in a civil suit filed by S Ramadoss against Anbumani Ramadoss concerning the use of the name and symbol of the Pattali Makkal Katchi (PMK).

Earlier, PMK founder S Ramadoss had filed a civil suit before the Chennai Civil Court seeking a direction restraining Anbumani Ramadoss from using the party's name and symbol.

He also sought to set aside the communication issued by the Election

Commission of India allocating the party symbol by referring to Anbumani as the party president, and further prayed that he himself be declared as the president of the PMK. When the matter came up for hearing before Justice M Dharmaprabu, a counter affidavit was filed on behalf of Dr Anbumani Ramadoss. In the counter affidavit, it was stated that S Ramadoss, about 87 years old, is not in a position to make administrative decisions due to his age and allied medical conditions.

## Antimicrobial resistance a major health challenge for India: Experts

NEW DELHI: Prime Minister Narendra Modi's call to check the indiscriminate use of antibiotics has been lauded by health experts who said that his message drew attention to a major health concern of antimicrobial resistance (AMR) that the country is presently facing and called for regulating over-the-counter sale of such drugs.

AMR occurs when bacteria, viruses, fungi and parasites no longer respond to antimicrobial medicines, according to WHO. As a result of drug resistance, antibiotics become ineffective and infections become difficult or impossible to treat.

In his monthly 'Mann Ki Baat' radio address, Prime Minister Modi on Sunday said that antibiotics are not medicines that can be taken mindlessly and urged people to take them only on the doctor's advice.

He said the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) recently released a report which said that antibiotics were proving ineffective against many diseases like pneumonia and UTI (Urinary Tract Infections). "This is a matter of great concern for all of us," he said.

Dr M Srinivas, Director of AIIMS-Delhi, underlined that antibiotics should be consumed only when prescribed by doctors and for the exact duration.

"Indiscriminate use of antibiotics will lead to resistance, and if the infection increases, there will be no reserved drugs left to use. The AIIMS has taken the leadership role in this matter... we have SoPs and hospital infection control systems and are creating awareness about the issue," he said. ICMR Director General Rajiv Bahl said, "PM Modi has drawn the nation's attention to a serious issue. Overuse or irrational use of antibiotics for infections like pneumonia can lead to resistance, mak-



ing them less effective. Antibiotics should only be used when needed and prescribed by doctors," he said. Dr Atul Gogia, senior consultant and Head of Infectious Diseases at Sir Ganga Ram Hospital, said that antimicrobial resistance is one of the greatest challenges India is currently facing. Indiscriminate use of antibiotics - unsupervised and self-medication - is leading to growing morbidity and mortality, he said.

The common simple-to-treat infections are becoming increasingly difficult to treat because of the growing antimicrobial resistance, Gogia stressed.

"There is a need of the hour to restrict over-the-counter sale of antibiotics as well as restrictions on their use in animals. Ensuring supervised antibiotic use in proper dosage and duration is the need of

the hour to prevent further aggravation in the AMR situation," he said. The early involvement of physicians and infectious disease doctors for proper implementation of the guidelines is very essential to prevent the onslaught of AMR, he added.

India, bearing a silent and large pandemic in terms of high burden of infectious diseases, with UTI and pneumonia being the major ones, easy over-the-counter availability of antibiotics, irrational prescribing, and incomplete treatment courses have accelerated resistance, said Dr Neha Rastogi, Senior Consultant-Infectious Diseases, Fortis Gurugram.

"With the strategy to empower the community as a modality to combat antimicrobial resistance, Prime Minister Narendra Modi emphasised on mass awareness,"

she said. Massive impact of behavioural change, better diagnostics alongside stringent regulation and implementation of national policies on controlling AMR are needed. "Prevention of infections - vaccination, sanitation and environmental factors; pre-empting - early and improved affordable diagnostics, avoidance of self-medication, right dose right duration protocol are key pillars to build and sustain the drive against antimicrobial resistance," Rastogi said.

Dr Manisha Arora, Director of Internal Medicine at CK Birla Hospital, Delhi, said that antibiotic resistance has emerged as one of the most serious global public health crises.

While it is a worldwide concern, India is among the countries most severely affected due to the widespread misuse and overuse of antibiotics, she said.

Studies suggest that nearly 50-70 per cent of antibiotic use in India is inappropriate, she said.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), the rise of drug-resistant "superbugs" is alarming, with antimicrobial resistance currently responsible for approximately 700,000 deaths each year globally. If left unchecked, this number could rise dramatically to 10 million deaths annually by 2050, surpassing cancer as a leading cause of mortality. "In India, the situation is further worsened by self-medication and the easy availability of antibiotics without a prescription. This is a major concern and calls for stricter regulation and enforcement. "Antibiotics should only be taken when prescribed by a qualified healthcare professional. In parallel, strengthening infection prevention and control measures, along with increasing public awareness and education on responsible antibiotic use, is critical to tackling this growing threat," Dr Arora said.

## Experts call for integrated action to curb antibiotic resistance

CHENNAI: Antibiotic resistance is a critical global health threat due to excessive and inappropriate use of antibiotics in humans, livestock and agriculture, warn health experts. A major concern is the growing tendency among people to take antibiotics without medical advice.

When antibiotics are misused, taken in the wrong dose or stopped midway, bacteria survive, mutate and become resistant, making infections harder to treat. "If antibiotics are not taken properly, some bacteria survive, mutate and become resistant over time. Even simple infections can turn life threatening," infectious disease expert Dr Surendran told DT Next. "Patients often discontinue antibiotics once symptoms

improve, instead of completing the full course, enabling harmful bacteria to persist. Self-medication, use of left-over antibiotics and pressure on doctors to prescribe them for viral infections like colds and flu worsen the problem."

Antibiotic misuse extends beyond humans. Large quantities are used in poultry, dairy and livestock farming to accelerate growth and prevent disease. In agriculture, antibiotics used for crop protection contaminate soil and water. "These residues enter our food chain and water sources, contributing to resistance. It is not only a medical problem but an environmental one too," said environmental activist Sundarajan of Poovulagin Nanbargal.

The scale of the crisis is

evident in global data. WHO estimates that nearly one in six bacterial infections worldwide is now antibiotic resistant. It warns that antibiotic resistance could lead to 10 million deaths annually by 2050 if urgent action is not taken. In India, surveillance by the Indian Council of Medical Research shows alarming trends. In 2024, analysis of more than 99,000 laboratory samples revealed that gram-negative bacteria continue to dominate serious infections, particularly blood, urine and respiratory illnesses. Declining effectiveness of last-resort antibiotics such as carbapenems against pathogens like Klebsiella pneumoniae has raised serious concern among clinicians.

## Amid Growing LPG Crisis, Why Your Piped Gas May Be The Real Winner

The contrast between LPG and PNG is a contrast between two energy delivery architectures: one, based on physical distribution cycles, and another on continuous infrastructure flow. India's latest cooking-fuel disruption has revealed a structural asymmetry in how energy reaches Indian households. As geopolitical tensions around the Strait of Hormuz disrupted LPG cargo movements in March 2026, the contrast between India's cylinder-based LPG ecosystem and the piped natural gas (PNG) network became stark. The queues outside LPG agencies were not merely a temporary logistics problem. They exposed a deeper vulnerability in India's cooking fuel architecture, one rooted in import dependence, thin storage buffers and a complex distribution chain. By contrast, households connected to city gas distribution (CGD) pipelines experienced little disruption. However, the current crisis does not mean PNG has replaced LPG. But it does explain why, under stress, PNG has demonstrated an infrastructure resilience that LPG struggles to match.

### INDIA'S LPG DEPENDENCE

India is one of the world's largest LPG consumers. According to data from the Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas (MoPNG), India consumed about 31.3 million tonnes of LPG in FY2024-25, while domestic production stood at roughly 12.8 million tonnes. Imports, therefore, met close to 60% of total demand. The scale of LPG dependence is equally visible at the household level. Data from the Petroleum Planning and Analysis Cell (PPAC) indicates that India has over 33.2 crore active LPG connections, including more than 10 crore beneficiaries under the Pradhan Mantri Ujjwala Yojana (PMUY). This rapid expansion of LPG access since 2016 has been a major clean-cooking achievement. But it has also deepened the country's exposure to external supply shocks. The geographical concentration of LPG imports amplifies this risk. Government briefings in March 2026 indicated that around 90% of India's LPG imports normally transit through the Strait of Hormuz, one of the world's most critical energy choke-points. Estimates from S&P Global suggest that the strait directly affects over half of India's LPG consumption when transit routes are accounted for. The physical storage capacity of the system offers limited cushioning. In a supply system designed for rapid cargo-to-distribution turnover, even short shipping disruptions can create local shortages before national reserves are mobilised. This is exactly what unfolded during the March disruption.

### WHY PIPED GAS WAS UNHARMED

However, while LPG distribution faltered, PNG supplies to households in major cities continued largely uninterrupted. The difference lies in the structure of the two delivery systems. LPG is a logistics-heavy fuel. After production or import, LPG must pass through multiple stages: storage at terminals, transport to bottling plants, cylinder filling, trucking to distributors and final delivery to households. India operates around 210 LPG bottling plants with a rated capacity of about 22.6 million tonnes annually, with more than 25,000 LPG distributors. Each stage in this chain introduces potential disruption points during supply shocks. PNG, by contrast, relies on a continuous pipeline network. Natural gas flows from production fields or import terminals through the national gas grid to city gas distribution systems and then directly to household meters. Once connected, the household receives gas through an underground pipeline without booking refills or managing cylinder deliveries.

## Is Trump Starting To Regret Backing Netanyahu's Iran Gameplan?

January's anti-government protests in Iran were probably seen by Israel's wily leader, Benjamin Netanyahu, as a golden opportunity to finally convince Donald Trump to mount a joint military operation against the country. Basking in the glory of his stunning success in Venezuela, Trump must have been swayed by Netanyahu's argument that the clerical regime was at its weakest since the 1979 Islamic revolution and could easily collapse, giving him another quick victory. Trump was likely convinced by Netanyahu that during the 12-day war last summer, Israel had destroyed Iran's air defences, killed its top military commanders, and finished off its air force as well as its large stock of ballistic missiles and drones. He also believed that his decision to drop massive 13,000 kg GBU-57 MOP bombs using giant B2 bombers had destroyed Iran's nuclear facilities in Fordow, Natanz, and Isfahan. If Iran had concealed any ballistic missiles within these facilities, those would have been inaccessible after the attack.

### Were Israel And The US In Sync?

While Israel was convinced of the need to launch a joint attack to completely destroy Iran's military capability, American military commanders were not sure whether there was any immediate need to do so; they were also not prepared. Only a quarter of the US public supported attacking Iran. But Trump only needed to convince himself. He was emboldened by his swift capture of Nicolás Maduro, replacing him with a compliant Delcy Rodríguez. He wanted to repeat that change in Iran. Persuading American presidents to attack Iran and change its regime has been a major political and strategic goal of Netanyahu for over three decades. But Israel never had an occupant in White House who would actually share that objective and be so open towards it. It was Trump who, in his first term, recognised Jerusalem as Israel's capital and shifted the US embassy there from Tel Aviv. Under Netanyahu's influence, Trump also withdrew the US from the Iran nuclear deal negotiated by the Obama administration, which Tehran had adhered to. Iran



began enriching uranium to levels close to weapons-grade only after Trump pulled the US out of the deal. It was also Trump who supported Netanyahu's brutal military campaign in Gaza following Hamas's invasion of Israel in 2023. He even sanctioned the judges of the World Court who issued an arrest warrant against Netanyahu for alleged war crimes. Most Israelis have seen Iran as their most important security challenge for years and agreed with Netanyahu that its Islamic regime with an advanced nuclear programme posed an existential threat to the Jewish state. The Ayatollahs have never hidden their wish to wipe Israel from the face of the earth. Under the previous Supreme Leader, Ali Khamenei, Iran funded, armed and trained anti-Israel groups such as Hezbollah, Hamas and the Houthis. Israel, however, has managed to degrade most of these groups and kill their leaders and commanders in the past three years.

### Netanyahu's Awkward Timing

Even so, the timing of Netanyahu's push for a joint military operation against Iran raised eyebrows even in Israel. The strikes came when he was under increasing criticism for the security failures that allowed the 2023 Hamas attack, which resulted in the death of 1,200 Israelis and 251 others being taken hostage. Netanyahu was also fac-

ing a corruption trial, and his popularity was waning ahead of the October elections. Therefore, he aimed to regain public support, which he had enjoyed during the early stages of the Gaza war. For Netanyahu, the Iran conflict is also a useful distraction that has gained even more political significance after the Gaza ceasefire put into question the logic of that conflict - with the release of hostages, he couldn't justify military action in Gaza. Israelis are tired of endless wars where ordinary citizens, as military reserves, have to participate in military conflicts. Netanyahu's policies on Gaza and West Bank settlements have also isolated Israel on the international stage. But as happens during wars, Netanyahu has managed to unite his country once again in favour of military action. After years of suffering from missile attacks by Iran's proxies, they are in favour of destroying its military capability to harm them and even bringing regime change in Tehran. Iran and its proxies have killed at least 3,500 Israelis since the turn of the century. No wonder that last month, a poll in Israel found that 59% of Israelis supported joining an American attack on Iran.

### Americans No Longer Support This War

But in the US, the picture has been different. Fewer Americans than

ever share Israel's aims. On the eve of the launch of the current military operation in Iran, a Gallup poll found that more Americans now sympathise with the Palestinians than with the Israelis. According to the survey, 41% of respondents express greater sympathy for the Palestinians, compared with the 36% who side with the Israelis. This is the first major military conflict in which an American administration lacks majority public support. Only 41% of the US public supports this war, according to an analysis of various polls by The New York Times. Even the Iraq war of 2003, during which the public was misled by the George W Bush administration into believing that Saddam Hussein possessed weapons of mass destruction, had the backing of 76% Americans.

### Goodbye To Powell Doctrine

The late Colin Powell, who was the Chairman of the US Joint Chiefs of Staff during the first Iraq war in 1991, developed a war doctrine that stated that war should be the last resort, used only after all political, economic, and diplomatic efforts have been exhausted. If the US must go to war, it should have a clear objective, public support, and an exit strategy, according to the doctrine. Since then, most military campaigns have largely adhered to the Powell doctrine, except for the current war against Iran.

## Obscene content, social media and culture: Whose responsibility is it?

also a vital part of this digital ecosystem. On the other hand, there is also the argument that art and entertainment have their own freedoms. There are many forms of dance, acting, and expression, and each person views them differently. What one person finds inappropriate may be merely a form of entertainment or art to another. This is why this topic sparks heated debate in society. Some consider it a part of freedom of expression, while others see it as an erosion of social and cultural values. This raises an important question—should any kind of popularity be considered a benchmark for success? Social media has greatly accelerated the process of achieving fame. Previously, it took years for an artist to gain recognition; today, a viral video can make someone a star overnight. But this instant fame is often not lasting, and its social impact can be complex. Many young people may fall into the trap of believing that only controversial or attention-grabbing content is the path to success. As a result, they chase instant popularity instead of developing their talents. This trend not only impacts personal growth but also impacts the quality of entertainment in society. Therefore, the solution lies not in mere protests or boycotts, but in a balanced approach. Society must decide what type of content it wants to promote. If audiences are more supportive of creative, informative, and culturally rich content, more of that content will naturally be seen. Social media algorithms ultimately depend on audience preferences. Platform companies also have a responsibility to develop standards and policies that take into account the broader interests of society. Many platforms already implement community guidelines, but their effectiveness depends on how seriously they are enforced. Ultimately, it's important to understand that culture isn't protected solely by slogans or hashtags. Culture is strengthened when society sustains it through its behavior, choices, and priorities. ## The hunger for followers and the auction of relationships

This means that the conflict isn't real, but an attempt is made to appear real to attract audience attention. This blurs the line between entertainment and reality. In this age of social media, going “viral” has become synonymous with success. When a video receives millions of views and thousands of new followers, the creator feels they've chosen the right path. But this popularity is often fleeting. A controversy that captured audience attention one day is overshadowed by another controversy the next. There's also a social aspect to this trend. When viewers repeatedly see such content, they gradually begin to perceive it as normal to

bring personal relationships into the public arena and make them a topic of discussion. This can undermine the sense of privacy and decorum in society. In our society, the family has always been considered a strong institution. Family is not just a living arrangement, but also a foundation of emotional security, trust, and mutual understanding. When internal family problems are made a public spectacle, it undermines the trust that is the foundation of relationships. Furthermore, young people and teenagers make up a significant portion of the social media audience. They are influenced by what they see. If they repeatedly see that it's normal to publicize personal conflicts in order to gain popularity, they may develop the impression that it's acceptable to go to any lengths to achieve success in life. It's also true that not all content creators are like this. There are many YouTubers, bloggers, and digital creators who produce informative, creative, and positive content. Their efforts prove that controversy and drama aren't the only path to popularity. The real question is one of responsibility. When someone has the power to reach thousands or even millions of people, it also carries a social responsibility. Content creators must understand that their con-

tent not only entertains but also influences people's thinking and perspectives. Viewers also play a significant role in this. After all, they are the ones who decide what type of content gets watched and what gets ignored. If viewers only promote sensational and controversial videos, it's natural that such content will continue to grow. But if they give more support to constructive and positive content, the digital landscape could change. Today, there's a need for balance and understanding in the use of social media. We should set boundaries for our personal lives and understand that not everything needs to be made public. Popularity and followers are important, but the dignity of relationships and personal respect are far more important. Ultimately, it's important to remember that social media is a tool, not an end. ## Iran's unrelenting attacks on Mideast shipping, energy infrastructure send oil prices soaring

**Dubai:** Unrelenting Iranian attacks on shipping traffic and energy infrastructure pushed oil above USD 100 a barrel Thursday, March 12, as American and Israeli strikes pounded the Islamic Republic with no sign of an end to the war in sight. Iran hit a container ship off the coast of Dubai, caused a blaze near Bahrain's international airport, targeted a major Saudi oil field with a drone and forced Iraq to halt operations at all of its oil terminals after attacking its port of Basra on the Persian Gulf. Iran flouted a UN Security Council resolution from the previous day demanding that it halt strikes on its Gulf neighbours with new attacks also reported in Kuwait and the United Arab Emirates. Sirens wailed before dawn in Jerusalem as Israel intercepted incoming Iranian missiles, and loud booms were heard later in the day in another attack on the city. Israel launched a "wide-scale wave of strikes" on Tehran and in Lebanon, where Israel says it is targeting Iran-linked Hezbollah militants, 11 people were killed in two early morning strikes. Since the United States and Israel started the war with a February 28 attack on Iran, Tehran has focused on inflicting enough global economic pain to pressure them to halt their attacks. US President



Donald Trump suggested that was not imminent, however, promising to "finish the job" even though he claimed Iran is "virtually destroyed." "We don't want to leave early do we? We've got to finish the job," he said at an event Wednesday in Kentucky. Iranian Supreme Leader Ayatollah Mojtaba Khamenei hasn't yet made a statement or been seen since being chosen to succeed his father Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, who was killed in the opening day of the conflict. But Iranian President Masoud Pezeshkian suggested online Thursday that for the war to end, the world would need to recognise Iran's "legitimate rights," pay reparations and offer guarantees against

future attacks. In addition to attacking energy infrastructure around the region, Iran has a stranglehold on the Strait of Hormuz, the waterway leading from the Persian Gulf toward the Indian Ocean through which a fifth of the world's oil is transported. With traffic in the strait effectively stopped, the price of Brent crude oil, the international standard, rose another 9 per cent to more than USD 100 a barrel, up some 38 per cent over what it cost when the war started. Iran fires at Gulf Arab countries and hits ship in Persian Gulf The UN Security Council voted Wednesday to approve a resolution demanding a halt to Iran's "egregious attacks" on its Gulf neighbours, but

Tehran showed no signs of changing its strategy. As the day began Thursday, a container ship in the Persian Gulf was hit with a projectile off the coast of Dubai, sparking a small fire, according to British military's United Kingdom Maritime Trade Operations Centre. It said the crew of the vessel were safe. In Bahrain, an Iranian attack sparked a major fire on Muharra Island, home to the country's international airport. Sirens sounded again later in the morning with more incoming Iranian fire. Kuwait's Defence Ministry said an Iranian drone smashed into a residential building, wounding two people. The UAE said it had activated air defences twice to

protect Dubai from attacks, and firefighters extinguished a blaze at a tower in Dubai Creek Harbour after a drone hit. Saudi Arabia said it shot down a drone targeting the diplomatic quarter of the capital, Riyadh, and also reported downing drones in the kingdom's east, including at least one trying to target its Shaybah oil field. Following an attack on Iraq's Basra port Wednesday that killed at least one person, officials said Thursday that operations were halted at all the country's oil terminals. Farhan al-Fartousi, the director-general of the General Company for Ports of Iraq, said the attack targeted a vessel in a ship-to-ship transfer area of the Persian Gulf port. In the UAE, Citibank said it would close all its branches except one due to a threat by Iran, not yet realised, to target financial institutions in the region. Other financial institutions have reportedly urged their staff to work from home for the time being. Explosions heard in Jerusalem while Lebanon and Tehran are hit In addition to the attacks on Jerusalem, in which no casualties were immediately reported, missile launches from Iran and Hezbollah also sent Israelis to shelters in multiple other areas, including Tel Aviv and the northern border with Lebanon.

## HOW IRAN WAR LAID BARE THE WORLD'S RELIANCE ON GULF OIL AND GAS

The US-Israel war with Iran has made startlingly clear how much the world relies on energy from the Gulf region. Since the conflict began, the price of oil has soared and is currently trading at over a third higher at \$100 a barrel, pushed up by air strikes on shipping and energy infrastructure, and the effective closure of the Strait of Hormuz, a vital waterway for energy shipments, which carries a fifth of global oil supplies. Nowhere is feeling the effects of the current energy crisis quite like Asia. Last year, nearly 90% of all the oil and gas that passed through the Strait of Hormuz was bound for the region. Ordinary people rely on it to heat their homes, fuel their vehicles and generate electricity. Businesses need it to power the region's vast manufacturing base. South East Asia, in particular, is highly exposed to the blockade in the Persian Gulf. Even countries that produce oil themselves, such as Malaysia and Indonesia,



have gradually started producing less and importing more over the past decade. The vulnerability is also partly to do with the type of oil produced in the Middle East and how countries in the region refine it. "Middle Eastern crude is generally 'heavy sour' or 'medium sour'," says Jane Nakano, a senior fellow in the Energy Security and Climate Change Program at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. Refineries in South East Asia, Nakano explains, have been set up to process this type of crude oil and simply switching to another provider, such as the US,

is not straightforward. "It would take significant investment to alter refinery specifications," she says. It puts many countries in a bind. The Philippines, for example, gets around 95% of its crude oil from the Middle East. The country's president has already told public workers to switch to a four-day working week to save fuel. Working from home is being heavily encouraged by various governments in the region. Other fuel-saving measures, such as setting air conditioner temperatures in public offices at a higher than usual 26°C, were announced by Thailand's energy minis-

ter on Tuesday. South East Asia is also heavily reliant on food imports. The island city-state of Singapore imports 90% of its food, while all of Indonesia's wheat, for example, comes from outside the country. This makes food prices particularly sensitive to rising transportation costs. Last week, the price of jet fuel had soared by nearly 60%. Petrol price caps Vietnam is also feeling the strain. The price of diesel has gone up there by nearly 60% since last month. In some cities this week there were long queues of moped riders at petrol stations panic-buying fuel. There have been similar scenes in Bangladesh. Prices at the pumps have been going up around the world, although to a lesser extent than seen in Asia. In the US average petrol prices are up 23% on a month ago, while diesel prices are up by a third. In the UK diesel is up 9%. It is something that governments are keeping an eye on. South Korea has ordered a tem-

## WHATSAPP ROLLS OUT PARENT-CONTROLLED ACCOUNTS FOR CHILDREN UNDER 13



**New Delhi:** Meta-owned WhatsApp has unveiled a new "parent-managed" account model, effectively opening the messaging platform to pre-teens (children under the age of 13) under strict guardian oversight. The move marks a strategic shift for the messaging app, which has historically maintained a minimum age require-

ment of 13 (or higher in some regions). "With input from families and experts, we're rolling out new parent-managed accounts that allow parents or guardians to set up WhatsApp for pre-teens, with new controls to limit their WhatsApp experience to messaging and calling," WhatsApp said in a blog post. WhatsApp said that while parents can con-

trol the contact list, the content of the messages will remain protected by end-to-end encryption. The new parental controls and settings will be gated by a parent PIN on the managed device, and only parents will be able to access and change privacy settings. The feature is currently being rolled out in phases.

# Iran's new supreme leader vows to keep blocking Strait of Hormuz in first statement released by regime

The fact that Mojtaba Khamenei has not yet been seen on state media has led to widespread speculation on social media, particularly among the Iranian diaspora, about whether Iran's new supreme leader has been injured, or even whether he is still alive. What we know so far is limited. Iran's state TV news channel has referred to him as a "veteran of the Ramadan war", without providing any further confirmation as to whether he has been injured. Reuters has reported that he was "lightly injured", citing an unnamed Iranian official. In addition to his father, the late Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, Mojtaba Khamenei's mother and wife were also killed in the US-Israeli strikes. We have yet to see him in public, or in videos or photographs on state media, even though it has now been almost four days since he became Iran's third supreme leader on 8 March. Iran's supreme



leader is elected indirectly by the Assembly of Experts, a constitutional body consisting of 88 members responsible for both the election and supervision of the supreme leader. One thing that caught my attention in Mojtaba Khamenei's first message was his claim that he learned he had become the supreme leader of Iran via the country's state TV channel. "I learned about the result of the vote of the

esteemed Assembly of Experts at the same time as you and through the Islamic Republic's television," Khamenei said in his message, which was read aloud a presenter. Iran is hitting out in many directions to try to damage sectors crucial to the West, targeting oil, shipping and banking. Dubai is one of the places in the firing line. A drone came down near the international financial district earlier. It didn't

injure anyone, but has provided a symbol for how business and banking here is being impacted by the war. Tehran says it will hit western banks in retaliation for US-Israeli attacks on Iranian banking. Citibank has said it is temporarily shutting most of its branches in the United Arab Emirates, with staff now working remotely. Other banks and businesses across the region have taken similar measures already.

There was no alert in Dubai when this morning's drone flew through - an indication of how some incoming Iranian fire can pass under the radar. Donald Trump has claimed repeatedly that he's on the verge of victory but Iran is inflicting pain - financial and otherwise - on the US and its Gulf allies, which find themselves engulfed in a war he started. Around the same time as the supreme leader's statement was broadcast by Iran, we also heard from Donald Trump, who writes on social media that the US stands to profit from soaring global energy prices.

He says on his Truth Social platform: "The United States is the largest Oil Producer in the World, by far, so when oil prices go up, we make a lot of money. BUT, of far greater interest and importance to me, as President, is stopping [sic] an evil Empire, Iran, from having Nuclear Weapons, and destroying the Middle East and, indeed, the

World. I won't ever let that happen!" In the last few minutes, a statement purportedly from Iran's new Supreme Leader Mojtaba Khamenei, who has not been seen in public since succeeding his father, has been read out on state-controlled television. It includes a vow to continue blocking the Strait of Hormuz and says the regime will "avenge the blood" of those killed in US and Israeli attacks.

Three more civilian cargo ships were attacked in the Gulf earlier, while oil prices hit almost \$100 a barrel. One person was killed on a US-owned tanker off the coast of Iraq, which was reported to have been hit by an unmanned speed boat carrying explosives. Photos show the extent of the damage. Another tanker was attacked while heading to an Iraqi port. Both ships reported fires on board. A Chinese vessel was struck by an unidentified projectile near the Strait of Hormuz.

## NINETEEN JAILED OVER DEADLY MOSCOW CONCERT ATTACK



Nineteen people have been jailed over an attack at a concert hall near Moscow that killed 149 people and left more than 500 injured - the deadliest mass shooting in Russia in two decades. A Russian military court handed life sentences to four gunmen and 11 accomplices. Four other defendants were given between 19 and 22 years, state media reported. The attack at Crocus City Concert Hall on the outskirts of Russia's capital on 22 March 2024 began with gunmen shooting before setting fire to the venue. An Islamic State (IS) group affiliate admitted it had carried out the attack

and posted video evidence. Moscow has repeatedly accused Ukraine of involvement - an allegation strenuously denied by Kyiv. Some 6,000 people had been at the auditorium in Krasnogorsk for a rock concert on the evening of the attack when gunmen burst into the complex and started shooting randomly. The attackers then set fires which engulfed the venue and caused the roof to collapse. Many of the victims died from bullet wounds and some from smoke inhalation. The four men convicted of carrying out the shooting have all been identified as citizens of Tajikistan.


## Hozier, Jessie Buckley and Bruce Springsteen record Shane MacGowan tribute album



Three years after his death, some of music's biggest names have combined to record a tribute album to Pogues frontman Shane MacGowan. The album, titled 20th Century Paddy - The Songs of Shane MacGowan, was announced on Thursday, alongside the first single, Bruce Springsteen's cover of A Rainy Night In Soho. In an accompanying essay, Springsteen described the Irish musician's songwriting as "raw, hilarious, no apologies and profound". The album, which will be released in November, also includes a duet between Hozier and Oscar nominee Jessie Buckley, as well as songs by Tom Waits, Primal Scream, Steve Earle and David Gray. Actor Johnny Depp has a duet with singer Imelda May, while the album will also feature The Jesus and Mary Chain, The Libertines and Kate Moss. MacGowan died in November 2023 at the age of 65, following a period of ill health. He left a peerless catalogue of songs articulating the life of working class Irish immigrants, with tales of finding love in the slums lit-

tered with references to literature, mythology and the Bible. In his essay, Springsteen recalled spending an afternoon with MacGowan shortly before his death. "He was not well but he and his wife, Victoria, proved warm and gracious hosts. As I left, I thanked him for his beautiful work, his music, his songs, his life. I stood in his warmth, kissed him and told him I loved him." Springsteen called the musician a writer in the lineage of "geniuses" and "natural rebels" like Woody Guthrie, Hank Williams, Miles Davis, Aretha Franklin and Bob Dylan. "Shane was all naked bottomless humanity. Threatening to force us to ask ourselves if we were living deeply, authentically," he continued. "[His] voice was so deeply real, profane and honest, his writing so flashing, alive and historically rich its genesis appeared as a mystery to all including, I believe, its creator," Springsteen added. "His soul was filled with the transgressive and ecstatic properties of the saints. 'I don't know who'll be listening to my music in 100 years but I know they'll be listening to Shane's.'"

## NOMA HEAD CHEF RESIGNS FROM RESTAURANT AMID ABUSE ALLEGATIONS



The head chef of Noma, one of the highest-rated restaurants in the world, has resigned amid allegations of abuse. René Redzepi announced his exit on social media, saying: "After more than two decades of building and leading this restaurant, I've decided to step away and allow our extraordinary leaders to now guide the restaurant into its next chapter." Former employees had accused the chef of creating a toxic work environment, including verbal and physical abuse, according to media reports. The fine-dining establishment, which is based in Denmark, has been preparing for a Los Angeles residency, but corporate sponsors pulled out after the abuse claims and protests

outside his pop-up location. In a statement posted on Instagram, Redzepi said: "An apology is not enough; I take responsibility for my own actions. For anyone wondering what this means for the restaurant, let me say it clearly: the Noma team today is the strongest and most inspiring it has ever been," he added. "We've been open for 23 years, and I'm incredibly proud of our people, our creativity, and the direction Noma is heading."

## 'FINGERS ON THE TRIGGER': DEADLY WARNINGS FOR IRANIANS BEING URGED TO TAKE ACTION

When US President Donald Trump began strikes on Iran, killing Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei in the process, he told Iranians to "take over your government". "It will be yours to take," Trump said. "This will be probably your only chance for generations." But as the war between the US and Israel and Iran has deepened over the past two weeks, Iranians have received sharply different messages about what may happen if they do take action. Encouragement from figures outside Iran has come as reports have emerged of an increased security and police presence in cities across the country, with officials of the Islamic Republic warning against any possible gatherings or protests. "We will come after you" Earlier this



week, Iran's Police Chief, Brigadier General Ahmadreza Radan, warned that his forces would treat anyone who takes to the streets "at the enemy's request" as an "enemy". "All our forces have their fingers on the trigger and are ready to defend the revolution and support their people and their country," Radan added. Separately, a presenter on Iran's state television

Channel Three addressed opponents of the Islamic Republic and those who might protest against the government. "When the dust of this sedition settles, we will come after you," the presenter said. "Confiscating your property will be the least of it. We will make you and your families pay, whether you are inside the country or abroad." And on 8 March, Iran's Prosecutor General Office

issued a statement warning Iranians living abroad that if they cooperate with what it described as "hostile enemies", they could face severe punishment. Citing Iran's law on the "intensification of punishment for espionage and cooperation with Israel and hostile countries", the statement stressed that any "operational activity, intelligence cooperation or espionage" for such countries could result not only in the confiscation of property but also the death penalty. These threats are a stark reminder of the threats faced by Iranians if they do protest against the government. During weeks of anti-government protests in December and January, at least 7,000 protesters were killed in an unprecedented crackdown by security forces, human rights groups say.

## China approves 'ethnic unity' law requiring minorities to learn Mandarin

China has approved a sweeping new law which claims to help promote "ethnic unity" - but critics say it will further erode the rights of minority groups. On paper, it aims to promote integration among the 56 officially recognised ethnic groups, dominated by the Han Chinese, through education and housing. But critics say it cuts people off from their language and culture. It mandates that all children should be taught Mandarin before kindergarten and up until the end of high school. Previously students could study most of the curriculum in their native language such as Tibetan, Uyghur or Mongolian. The law was



approved on Thursday as the annual rubber-stamp parliamentary session drew to an end. "The law is consistent with a dramatic recent policy shift, to suppress the ethnic diversity formally recognised since 1949," Magnus Fiskesjö, an associate professor of anthropol-

ogy at Cornell University said in a university report. "The children of the next generation are now isolated and brutally forced to forget their own language and culture." However, Beijing argues that teaching the next generation Mandarin will help their job prospects.

It also says the law for "Promoting Ethnic Unity and Progress" is crucial for promoting "modernisation through greater unity". The law was voted and passed on Thursday at the National People's Congress in Beijing, which has never rejected an item on its agenda. The law also provides a legal basis to prosecute parents or guardians who may instill what it described as "detrimental" views in children which would affect ethnic harmony and it calls for "mutually embedded community environments" which some analysts believe could result in the break up of minority-heavy neighbourhoods.

## EPSTEIN USED MODELLING AGENT TO RECRUIT GIRLS, BRAZILIAN WOMEN TELL



In 2004, as a 16-year-old living in the Brazilian countryside, she was taking her first steps in the modelling world. She says French modelling agent Jean-Luc Brunel visited her family home, to persuade her mother to let her go to a modelling contest in Ecuador. He later killed himself in prison, accused of rape, sexual assault and recruiting girls for the late US financier and sex offender Jeffrey Epstein. Back then, they didn't know who Brunel was; they had been introduced by a famous Brazilian scout. A BBC News Brasil investigation has found evidence that Brunel used modelling agencies linked to him at the time to actively seek out young women and girls from South America for Epstein, and to arrange visas for them to travel to the US. Another Brazilian woman, who says she had a relationship with Epstein, showed the BBC her US visa. It named one of Brunel's agencies as her sponsor, even though she says she never did any modelling work for him and the travel documents were arranged solely so that she could visit Epstein. Gláucia's mother was suspicious of Brunel,

but he seemed "very charming" and eventually she agreed her daughter could go to Ecuador without her. The teenager travelled with Brunel's team to Guayaquil for the Models New Generation competition. At the time, local newspapers reported that the participants were between 15 and 19 years old. Gláucia says the competition passed without any major problems, although she grew suspicious when she was not allowed to contact her family. Another contestant, from Western Europe, who was 16 at the time, remembers how Brunel's behaviour struck her as odd. She asked not to be named, so we are referring to her as Laura. "It was weird how he behaved and was always hanging out with the young Brazilian girls... He was behaving like a clown and only hanging out with quite young girls," she says. Laura believes that while the competition was "legit" and well organised, "he knew exactly which girls were vulnerable". "He seemed to control their finances," she says. "The girls from Brazil and East European countries seemed to be the prime target."

## Nasa spacecraft weighing 1,300lb re-enters Earth's atmosphere



The Van Allen Probe spacecraft weighing more than 1,300lb (600kg) has re-entered Earth's atmosphere, almost 14 years after its launch.

The US Space Force confirmed the probe's re-entry on Wednesday over the Eastern Pacific region around 06:37 EDT (10:37 GMT), roughly 12 hours later than originally predicted but within the

expected margin of error. Most of the probe, which launched in 2012, was expected to burn up as it travelled through the atmosphere, though some components may have survived.

The space agency said there was a one in 4,200 chance of being harmed by a piece of the probe, which it characterised as "low" risk.



## IPL 2026 Schedule Announced By BCCI: RCB vs SRH On Day 1, MI vs KKR On Day 2

The Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) on Wednesday announced the schedule for the first phase of the TATA Indian Premier League (IPL) 2026, to be played from March 28 to April 12, 2026. As three states are scheduled to undergo State Assembly elections during this period, the full schedule of the tournament will be announced once the poll dates are announced.

The 19th edition of the T20 league will commence when defending champions Royal Challengers Bengaluru (RCB) host Sunrisers Hyderabad (SRH) at the M. Chinnaswamy Stadium in Bengaluru. A total of 20 matches will be played across 10 venues: Bengaluru, Mumbai, Guwahati, New Chandigarh, Lucknow, Kolkata, Chennai, Delhi, Ahmedabad and Hyderabad. During this period, the tournament will feature four double-



headers, with the afternoon matches beginning at 03:30 PM IST and the evening matches commencing at 07:30 PM IST. Following the opening encounter on Saturday, Mumbai Indians will take on Kolkata Knight Riders at the Wankhede Stadium

in Mumbai on Sunday. The first double-header of the season will take place on April 4, 2026, when Delhi Capitals face Mumbai Indians in the afternoon match at the Arun Jaitley Stadium in Delhi, followed by Gujarat Titans taking on

Rajasthan Royals at the Narendra Modi Stadium in Ahmedabad. Rajasthan Royals will begin their home campaign in Guwahati, where they will host Chennai Super Kings and Mumbai Indians. Punjab Kings (PBKS), meanwhile, will

play their early home fixtures at the PCA Stadium in New Chandigarh.

During the season, Royal Challengers Bengaluru will play five home matches in Bengaluru and two in Raipur. Punjab Kings will play four home matches in New Chandigarh and three in Dharamshala, while Rajasthan Royals will play three home matches in Guwahati and four in Jaipur.

Note: The matches scheduled in Bengaluru are subject to clearance from the Expert Committee constituted by the Government of Karnataka. The committee will conduct a meeting and inspection of the M. Chinnaswamy Stadium on March 13, 2026, during which a full-scale mock demonstration of match-day arrangements will be carried out to assess the stadium's preparedness for hosting IPL matches.

## Gulf Conflict, Ramzan Take Huge Toll On World Para Athletics Grand Prix

The escalating conflict in West Asia has dealt a major blow to the ongoing World Para Athletics Grand Prix, with participation shrinking drastically as only six foreign nations ultimately made it to Indian shores, despite nearly 30 countries having earlier confirmed their presence. Coaches associated with the Indian team said the war, coupled with the holy month of Ramzan, played a significant role in drastically reducing participation numbers, adding that while 18 foreign nations had travelled for India's inaugural edition of the World Para Athletics Grand Prix at the same venue last year, the organisers could not replicate those numbers this time. A total of 257 athletes are competing in the Grand Prix, the second leg of the season, with India fielding a massive 219 participants across multiple track-and-field events and sport classifications. Russia has the second-largest contingent with 40 para athletes, while the remaining countries account for only a minuscule presence in comparison.



"The event has been hit hard by the ongoing conflict in the Gulf as well as Ramzan. Around seven to eight Muslim countries could not make the trip because of that (Ramzan). Several International Paralympic Committee officials were also unable to travel and had to be replaced at the last minute as they were not getting flights into India," said a coach of a renowned para athlete on condition of anonymity. "Most of the connecting

flights come via Dubai and the Gulf and with the disruptions they (athletes) had to cancel their trips," said the coach. The inaugural World Para Athletics Grand Prix in Dubai last month featured athletes from 53 nations, lending the competition a truly international flavour, but the event in India has been largely dominated by the hosts, with several clean sweeps owing to the limited participation from foreign countries.

## Pakistan Get Startling 'Shoot The Man' Message After Devastating Bangladesh Loss In 1st ODI

Pakistan are in a rebuilding phase after their T20 World Cup 2026 Super 8 exit. They chose six new faces for the ODI series against Bangladesh, but the start to that rebuilding phase was disastrous. Fast bowler Nahid Rana grabbed a maiden five-wicket haul as Bangladesh handed Pakistan a new low in white-ball cricket with a dominant eight-wicket win. Rana picked up 5-24, and captain Mehidy Hasan Miraz took 3-29 with his off-spin, as Pakistan were blown away for 114 all out in 30.4 overs. It was Pakistan's lowest-ever ODI score against Bangladesh, eclipsing the previous



mark of 161 during a 62-run loss at the 1999 World Cup. Bangladesh galloped to 115-2 in only 15.1 overs, powered by a blazing unbeaten 67 off 42 balls. Former Pakistan player Basit Ali was furious after the result. "First, shoot the man who told them to score a minimum

of 60 runs in the ten powerplay overs," he said on The Gameplan, as quoted by The Indian Express. From 41/0 in 9.5 overs, Pakistan collapsed to 92/9 in 23.5 overs. "He never played cricket on a ground. He just hands over a piece of paper. Did he not see what the condi-

tions are like here? Did he not know that even India have lost in Bangladesh?" Former Pakistan wicket-keeper Kamran Akmal also came down hard on the side.

"It felt like one team was international and the other was a club side playing a practice match before a World Cup," he said. "I called Basit and couldn't find words to describe what kind of cricket we were playing. I swear to God, batting like this doesn't even happen in club cricket. Club cricketers don't play this badly." The second and third games of the ODI series will also be played in Dhaka on Friday and Sunday.

## India's Yuki Bhambri Reaches Indian Well Quarters With Andre Goransson In Men's Doubles Category

India's top doubles player Yuki Bhambri and his partner Andre Goransson advanced to the quarterfinals of the men's doubles event at the Indian Wells Masters after registering a straight-set win over the pair of Sander Arends and Jiri Lehecka. Bhambri and Goransson produced a solid performance to defeat Arends and Lehecka 6-4 6-4 in the pre-quarterfinal clash that lasted one hour and 14 minutes. They did not face any break point in the match and broke their rivals twice. The Indo-Swedish pair maintained control through most of the match, securing a crucial break in each set to seal the contest in straight sets. take on Alexander Erler of Austria and Andrea Vavassori from Italy in the last-eight stage of the prestigious ATP Masters 1000 tournament. India's Yuki Bhambri and his Swedish partner Andre Goransson have sailed into the semifinals of the Indian Wells Open on Thursday morning, dismantling the Austrian-

Italian pairing of Alexander Erler and Andrea Vavassori. Bhambri and Goransson registered a 6-3, 7-6(2) win over Erler and Vavassori. This is Bhambri's maiden semifinal at the ATP Masters 1000 level, having made the doubles quarter-final at the Masters 1000 level twice. His previous two quarterfinal appearances were at Indian Wells

came in 2025 (with Goransson) and Miami Masters 2025 (with Nuno Borges). Notably, the unseeded duo has yet to drop a single set in the tournament. In the Round of 16, Bhambri and Goransson defeated the pair of Sander Arends and Jiri Lehecka 6-4, 6-4 after launching their campaign with a resounding victory, defeating the duo of David Pel and Fabrice Martin in straight sets 6-1, 6-3. They will face await the winners of Khachanov/Rublev and Rinderknech/Vacherot, with a place in the final at stake. Last month, Bhambri climbed to a career-high ranking of world No. 20 in the latest ATP Rankings, making him the first Indian men's doubles player to break into the Top 20 after Rohan Bopanna.

## THE REALITY IS MOST MMA DREAMS FAIL - HARDWICK

When Harry Hardwick was working at his dad's cafe in Middlesbrough to fund his dream of becoming a UFC fighter, the bright lights of Las Vegas felt a world away. "It's not a sensible idea, pursuing MMA," he says. But in September 2025, on just five days' notice Hardwick stepped in to face Brazil's Kaua Fernandes for his UFC debut - over 10 years after his first professional MMA fight. Unfortunately for Hardwick, the fight didn't go to plan - he suffered a painful first-round loss and left the octagon in a wheelchair. Now the 31-year-old has a second chance to prove himself as he faces the undefeated Marwan Rahiki on Saturday at the Meta Apex in Las Vegas.



After a full camp and back at his preferred weight class of featherweight, Hardwick is expecting a better performance this time round. A second defeat could see him cut from the UFC - but after a career filled with highs and lows, he still feels thankful to be "one of the few MMA fighters that has escaped the rat race". "I

pinch myself because I'm very fortunate to be where I am," Hardwick tells BBC Sport. "I've still got a lot I want to do, and I'm still very much looking forward, but this is mad. The harshest reality is that most dreams fail." Hardwick is a former Cage Warriors featherweight champion and entered his UFC debut undefeated in his last nine fights, with eight wins and one draw. He's spent most of his career fighting alongside part-time jobs, including night shifts as a support worker and in his dad's local cafe. In the early days, Hardwick would often turn up to training without any sleep, and admits that at times the experience could be "miserable".

## DE BOINVILLE DENIES 'RACIAL SLURS' TOWARDS QUEALLY

Nico de Boinville has "categorically" denied using any "racial slurs" towards Irish jockey Declan Queally during the opening race on day two of the Cheltenham Festival. The English jockey was accused of "abusing" the amateur jockey before the start of the Novices' Hurdle on Wednesday, as it was held up due to a false start. Queally later told The Racing Post, external he had received "repeated racist abuse" from his rival. The Irishman, riding I'll Sort That, and De Boinville on Act Of Innocence could be seen exchanging words at the start line, but the Englishman denies any wrongdoing. De Boinville told BBC Radio Sports Extra: "It is an ongoing



investigation. "The stewards are gathering all the evidence they can from all the video footage. "From my point of view, I deny all the allegations against me. "I can categorically say there weren't any racial slurs or anything like that. Let's let it play out." Queally, 37, appeared to topple off his horse before

the race started and had to be checked over by a doctor. He was given the all clear to race, along with Ballyfad, who was kicked pre-race and assessed by a vet in a chaotic few minutes. A number of false starts to the planned rolling start meant the horses were moved to a standing start at the tape-leaving jockeys jostling for position. Queally, who finished fifth in the race, told ITV Racing before entering the weight room post-race: "Being abused by an English rider, Nico de Boinville, not very nice."

## NO RADUCANU OR BOULTER IN GB'S BJK CUP SQUAD



Emma Raducanu and Katie Boulter will be absent when Great Britain face Australia in their Billie Jean King Cup qualifier next month. Raducanu, the British number one and world number 24, has committed to playing the WTA 500 clay-court tournament in Linz, Austria, which runs across the same week. Boulter, ranked 64th in the world, also misses the tie. GB captain Anne Keothavong has instead selected Sonay Kartal, Harriet Dart, Jodie Burrage and 17-year-old Mika Stojsavljevic for the contest that will be staged in Melbourne on 10-11 April. A fifth player can be added to the squad nearer the time. Keothavong, who it was thought would face a tough task persuading the top British players to travel to Australia for a hard-court tie at a time when the European clay court season is getting under way, described the best-of-five encounter

as "tough". But she added: "We always embrace these weeks together as a team and will be up for the challenge. "We've got players with great experience in this competition in our team and it's an exciting opportunity for Mika to join the senior team for the first time." Kartal will be hoping to repeat the form that saw her reach the fourth round at Indian Wells this week before withdrawing with a lower back injury during her match against Elena Rybakina. Australia have also named their squad. Talia Gibson, who has beaten three top-20 players at Indian Wells en route to the quarter-finals, is included alongside Maya Joint, Storm Hunter, Kimberly Birrell and Ellen Perez. The eight-team Billie Jean King Cup finals will be held in Shenzhen in the week beginning 21 September. Great Britain reached the semi-finals last year.

## Verstappen wishes F1 was 'more fun'


Max Verstappen says he wishes the new Formula 1 was "more fun" but is hopeful the sport is heading towards changes that will "improve everything". The four-time world champion is among many drivers who find the increased amount of energy management required for the engines this year is taking away enjoyment and some elements of their skill. "I am a bit conflicted, because I don't really enjoy to drive the car but I do enjoy working with the team," Red Bull's Verstappen said. "I don't want to leave [F1] but I also hope of course it gets better. I have had discussions with F1 and the [governing body] FIA and we are working towards

something that will hopefully improve everything." There are concerns over the unusual techniques required of drivers to ensure that the new engines, which have a 50-50 split between internal combustion and electrical power, have sufficient battery charge for optimum performance. F1's bosses initially agreed to take stock of the rules after the first three races and analyse whether changes could be made. It now seems there is a chance modifications could be made after this weekend's race in China, the second of the season after Sunday's opener in Australia. The main issue is that the overriding requirement to ensure the battery is fully charged at the most per-

formance-sensitive parts of the circuit is reducing the driving challenge, especially in the most demanding high-speed corners. Aston Martin's two-time champion Fernando Alonso said: "It is a different challenge. That's where you put the line, if these cars are more fun or less fun, and everyone will have their own opinion. "We used to 'fight for our life' in Turn 12 in Bahrain, Turn Nine and 10 in Melbourne, sector one and 130R in Suzuka, Turn Seven and Eight here in China. "There were always certain corners that in Formula 1 were challenging the limits of the physics, and the driver had to use all the skills and be brave in some of the moments as

well. "When you put new tyres and you go through the corner at a speed that you've never been before in any of the free practices, that challenge is gone in a way. "You use those corners to charge the battery, not any more to make the lap time. "Still fun? Yes, we love racing. Because I grew up on the other, and I was challenging myself in the corners, I probably prefer the other one. But I was super-lucky to race in that era and I still feel lucky that I race now, so I like both." World champion Lando Norris said the "very, very different style of driving" now needed meant "you can still make a difference as a driver by driving the power unit in the correct way, but not by

necessarily driving the car in a much better way".


