New Delhi (TSIT): As flight operations to and from West Asia remain disrupted after the US and Israel's attack on Iran, hundreds of Indians are stranded in Dubai and other key hub airports, with many of them taking to social media to appeal to the Indian government for assistance.

Amid Middle East tensions, CM Revanth seeks safety for Telugus in Gulf

Hyderabad (TSIT): Amid escalating geopolitical tensions after the United States and Israel launched large-scale attacks on Iran, Telangana Chief Minister Revanth Reddy expressed concern over the safety of Telugu people residing in Gulf countries.

In a statement on Sunday, March 1, the Chief Minister urged all Telugu-speaking people to remain vigilant and strictly follow the advisories issued by Indian diplomatic missions and local authorities.

On Saturday, February 28, a barrage of missiles hit Iran targeting hundreds of military and strategic sites, including air defence systems, missile launch facilities and bases linked to the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps.

"This transformation is particularly visible in Tamil Nadu. The railway budget allocation for Tamil Nadu has increased nearly nine-fold since our government came in (2014), he said. Citing statistics, he said, during 2009 to 2014, the average yearly railway allocation was Rs 880 crore.

In 2026-27, it increased to Rs 7,600 crore, he said. Noting that 9 Vande Bharat trains and 9 Amrit Bharat trains benefited people of Tamil Nadu, he said their coaches were manufactured at ICF.

Highlighting that the infrastructure funding to Tamil Nadu has tripled compared to the previous decade, Modi said, "The budget of 2026 continues the trend with a strong focus on Tamil Nadu."

In this budget, the Centre has proposed Bengaluru-Chennai and Chennai-Hyderabad bullet train corridors. "They will revolutionise the economy of this whole region," he said.

Priority to rescue Kannadigas stranded in war-affected nations: CM Siddaramaiah

Bengaluru, Mar 1 (TSIT): With the escalating conflict between Iran and Israel causing severe disruptions in the Middle East, Chief Minister Siddaramaiah on Sunday assured that the state government is taking all necessary measures to ensure the safety and rescue of Kannadigas stranded in various countries, particularly Dubai.

"We are taking the safety of Kannadigas living in Middle Eastern nations, including Israel, UAE, Iran, and Qatar, very seriously. I have instructed



ed the resident commissioner in Delhi to take all essential steps for their security," the CM stated.

Due to the suspension of flight services across the Middle East, many residents have been unable to return to the state. Siddaramaiah urged

those currently stuck in conflict zones to move to safer locations as advised by local authorities.

Helpline to be launched The chief minister further noted that he has ordered officials to set up a dedicated helpline for the affected individuals and their families. He appealed to family members in Karnataka not to panic if they are unable to establish immediate contact with their loved ones abroad.

Siddaramaiah also mentioned that former minister Nagendra had informed him about 32 individuals from Ballari currently stranded in Dubai. He confirmed that specific measures are being initiated to ensure their safety and eventual return.

Owaisi calls Khamenei's assassination 'immoral, unlawful'

Hyderabad, (TSIT): AIMIM President Asaduddin Owaisi on Sunday termed the assassination of Ayatollah Khamenei as an immoral and unlawful act. The Hyderabad MP, on behalf of his party, offered condolences to the Shia community, who consider Khamenei as their leader. He condemned the attacks on Iran by the United States and Israel. The attacks are absolutely condemnable, especially when Iran-US talks were going on in Geneva," he said.



India's foreign policy 'completely exposed': Congress

New Delhi (TSIT): The Congress, on Sunday, launched an acerbic attack on the Union government's foreign policy in the backdrop of the tension in West Asia, claiming that the country's foreign policy has been "completely exposed".

A day after criticising the US-Israel joint strike on Iran and calling upon Prime Minister Narendra Modi-led government to intervene citing safety of expatriates, Jairam Ramesh, Congress General Secretary Communications Incharge, publicity and media, in a social media post on X, said, "The country is paying a heavy price for both the substance and the methods of Prime Minister Modi's foreign policy."



"No matter how much the Prime Minister and his coterie try to put on a show, the reality is that India's foreign policy under the leadership of the self-proclaimed 'Vishwa Guru' has been completely exposed," he wrote. He said, "The American President (Donald Trump) has been consistently maintaining his closeness with Pakistan and repeatedly praising the very individual whose inflammatory statements laid the groundwork for the terrorist attacks in Pahalgam on April 22, 2025.

PM Modi to chair urgent CCS meeting tonight amid escalating Middle East tensions



New Delhi (TSIT): Prime Minister Narendra Modi will chair a high-level meeting of the Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS) upon his return to the national capital on Sunday night, government sources said. The meeting of the Cabinet committee, the apex decision-making body on security and strategic matters of India, comes against the backdrop of a rapidly deteriorating geopolitical situation in the Middle East following coordinated US-Israeli airstrikes on Iran, which have intensified regional conflict and raised global security concerns.

PM Modi is expected to land in Delhi around 9:30 pm after concluding a two-day tour across several states, including Rajasthan, Gujarat, Tamil Nadu, and Puducherry. During the visit, the Prime Minister inaugurated development projects, flagged off new train services like Amrit Bharat Express trains connecting southern cities, and reviewed key infrastructure initiatives worth thousands of crores.

"The Prime Minister will chair a meeting of the CCS on returning to Delhi tonight from his two-day tour of the states. He is expected to land here at around 9:30 pm," a government source said.

The CCS, India's apex body for national security decisions, comprises the Prime Minister and the Ministers of Defence, Home, External Affairs, and Finance. The urgent convening of the CCS is widely seen as a response to the latest developments in West Asia, including US-Israel strikes on Iranian targets and subsequent retaliatory actions.

Iranian Supreme Leader killed in US-Israeli strikes, Iran launches retaliatory attacks, Middle East peace in limbo

Tehran/New Delhi (TSIT): Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei was killed in a coordinated US-Israeli military strike on Tehran early Sunday, triggering Iranian retaliatory attacks on US bases in many countries, threatening destabilisation of the entire Middle East. Ali Khamenei was killed in strikes that targeted areas in northern Tehran, including locations near his compound and offices. Multiple missiles hit areas close to the presidential palace and the Supreme Leader's residence.

Some top security officials were also killed in Saturday's strikes, along with Khamenei's daughter, son-in-law and grandson. The reports, however, could not be confirmed. Iran's police intelligence chief Gholamreza Rezaian was also killed during the strikes, Iranian media reported. "General Gholamreza Rezaian, head of the national police intelligence, was killed following the enemy attacks," Iran's Fars news agency said.



The killings mark one of the most significant blows to Iran's leadership since the 1979 Islamic revolution. Photos released by the White House showed President Trump closely monitoring the strikes on Iran from his Mar-a-Lago club in Palm Beach, joined by

Secretary of State Marco Rubio and CIA Director John Ratcliffe during the tense operation. Trump, while announcing Khamenei's death on his social media platform, said "Khamenei, one of the most evil people in history, is dead. This is not only Justice for the

New supreme leader to be chosen in a day or two, says Iran's foreign minister

Israel said on Sunday it had launched another wave of attacks on Iran, as Iranians grappled with uncertainty after the killing of their supreme leader in US-Israel strikes a day earlier, while President Donald Trump warned Tehran of consequences for retaliation. Hours after the US and Israel said an air strike killed Ayatollah Ali Khamenei in

the military campaign to overthrow the government of the Islamic Republic, Iran's state media confirmed the 86-year-old leader had died. The Israeli military said on Sunday that he had been killed in a large-scale operation carried out by its air force. In another blow for Iran's leaders, Armed Forces Chief of Staff Abdolrahim Mousavi was killed in the strikes.

PM inaugurates semiconductor plant at Sanand; says after software, India making its mark in hardware

SANAND: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday inaugurated Micron Technology's semiconductor plant at Sanand in Gujarat, and said that after being known for its strength in software, the country is "firmly establishing its identity in the hardware sector too. The inauguration of the US-based company's ATMP (Assembly, Testing, Marking and Packaging) plant -- the first such facility in the country -- reflects a deep partnership between India and the United States, he said. The message has reached the world loud and clear: India is capable, India is competitive and India is committed, Modi said. India's message for global

investors is "India is ready, India is reliable, and India delivers," and both dynamic market and global opportunities await investors in the country, the prime minister added. "India, long known for its software strength, is now firmly establishing its identity in the hardware sector as well," he said. The prime minister said the event is a testament to the strong cooperation and collaboration between India and the US, especially in the areas of AI and chip technologies where the partnership between the two countries is very important. "The world witnessed a period of industrial revolution throughout the 20th century. During that time, countries that were ahead

in factories, machines, and mass production made rapid progress. But this is the century of the AI revolution, and semiconductors are the bridge to this change. The tiny chip is the medium connecting both the industrial revolution and the AI revolution," he said. "If oil was the regulator of the last century, the microchip will be the regulator of this century. With this thought in mind, India decided to move forward rapidly in the semiconductor sector," Modi said, noting that the country announced its Semiconductor Mission at a time when the world was battling COVID. "During the pandemic, everything felt like it was falling apart, but the seeds we planted with conviction are



now growing and bearing fruits," the PM further said. India is rapidly becoming an integral part of the global semiconductor value chain, and the entire world wants to secure the supply chain of both these technologies for a better future for humanity, he said. The two largest democracies - India and the US -- are continuously striving for this, the PM stated, adding that their collective effort will also make the global supply chain of critical minerals more secure and reliable. His government has so far approved 10 projects under the Semicon India programme, and besides the Micron plant, three more projects are also going to start production very soon, he added. "The semiconduc-

tor ecosystem we are building is not limited to any one region, it is pan-India," the PM said, adding that work has started in projects located in Noida (Uttar Pradesh), Assam, Odisha and Punjab. The semiconductor ecosystem isn't just about a single factory and India is focusing on the entire value chain, said Modi. "India Semiconductor Mission 2.0 was announced in this budget. Its objective is the same: as production increases, demand for material components and services in India will also increase. This is the biggest opportunity," he said. The PM said another advantage for India is its significant manufacturing ambitions. "India has a large population that is becoming

first-time users of gadgets. Whether it is electronics, automobiles, or other technologies, demand in India is constantly growing," he said, highlighting the exponential growth of electronics production and exports in the last 11 years. As electronic component manufacturing expands, domestic demand for semiconductors will also grow, Modi said, adding that both a dynamic market and global opportunities await investors in India. The new plant will create a new ecosystem at Sanand, the prime minister said. "When a major automotive company arrived here, an entire ecosystem developed with it," he said, in apparent reference to the setting up of TATA Nano factory years ago.

AI Summit Protest: Delhi court grants bail to IYC president Chib

NEW DELHI: A Delhi court has granted bail to Indian Youth Congress (IYC) president Uday Bhanu Chib, who was arrested in connection with a protest at the India AI Summit. Chib was produced before the duty magistrate around 1 am on Saturday as his four-day police custody, granted by the court on February 24, came to an end. Duty Magistrate Vanshika Mehta was hearing an application by the Delhi Police seeking a seven-day extension of his custody. However, she dismissed the plea and granted him bail. Speaking to the media, Chib's counsel informed that bail was granted by the magistrate against the surety bond of Rs 50,000, and the court has also directed his client to surrender his passport and electronic gadgets. "The duty magistrate was pleased enough to grant bail to Uday Bhanu Chib and has explained in the bail order that the police crime branch has not been able to explain the reasons for seeking extension of PC remand to Uday Bhanu Chib," the IYC president's counsel said. On February 24, the court allowed four days of custody to the police to question Chib over his role in the AI Sum-



mit protest held at Bharat Mandapam here, during which IYC members took their shirts off to reveal anti-Modi and anti-Centre slogans on T-shirts beneath. The summit began on February 16 and saw packed halls and long queues throughout, as tech moguls, industry leaders, policymakers, and founders thronged the venue. The accused wore T-shirts bearing images of Prime Minister Narendra Modi and US President Donald Trump, with slogans against the government and the India-US trade deal. The protesters also allegedly engaged in a protracted scuffle with security personnel and police staff deployed at the venue.


9 cheetahs from Botswana get new home in MP's Kuno National Park; India's count rises to 48

SHEOPUR: Nine cheetahs airlifted from Botswana arrived at Kuno National Park in Madhya Pradesh on Saturday and were released into an enclosure, boosting India's big cat count under the reintroduction programme to 48. Union Forest Minister Bhupendra Yadav released six female and three male cheetahs into the enclosure for quarantine, Madhya Pradesh Additional Principal Chief Conservator of Forests (Wildlife) L. Krishnamoorthy told PTI. The third batch of cheetahs from Africa arrived earlier in the day on an Indian Air Force (IAF) aircraft as part of a four-year cheetah population revival plan, officials said. Speaking to reporters, district public relations officer Avantika Shrivastava said that the animals were flown from Botswana to Gwalior on an IAF aircraft and were later transported to Kuno in IAF helicopters. The IAF has been assisting the cheetah revival programme and had earlier transported the animals from Namibia in September 2022 and from South Africa in February 2023, said Project Cheetah Director Uttam Sharma.

"The arrival of more cheetahs will strengthen the revival programme. With the support of the Central government, we aim to increase the population to 50 as soon as possible," he said. Three cheetahs have been relocated to Gandhi Sagar Wildlife Sanctuary, while 36 remain at Kuno, Sharma said. Officials said endangered animals are generally not kept in a single habitat due to the risk of disease outbreaks that could wipe out an entire population. The cheetah, the world's fastest land animal, became extinct in India nearly seven decades ago. Last year, 12 cubs were born at Kuno, though six, including three cubs, did not survive. This year, nine cubs were born in two litters between February 7 and February 18. In all, 39 cubs have been born at Kuno since 2023, of which 27 have survived. Namibia-born Jwala and Aasha, South Africa-born Gamini, Veera and Nirva, and India-born Mukhi have all produced litters at the park.

Education shapes character, nation's future: C P Radhakrishnan at St Berchmans Centenary

KOTTAYAM: Vice-President C P Radhakrishnan on Saturday underscored the transformative power of education, asserting that it shapes the character of individuals and, in turn, the future of the nation. Addressing the valedictory function of the centenary celebrations of St Berchmans College at Changanassery, he said education plays a vital role in moulding responsible citizens from a young age, enabling them to make meaningful contributions to society and the country. "Education builds character. An educated citizen shapes society and the nation," he said, urging people to maintain an open mind and embrace continuous learning regardless of their position, social status, or economic background. Highlighting the need for research and technological advancement, the vice president said India has moved beyond the era when education merely produced clerks for colonial administration. "The time of merely adopting technologies is over. We must become creators of technology so that the world adopts what we produce," he said, expressing confidence in the country's youth-driven transformation. Referring to the vision of 'Viksit Bharat' under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, he said institutions like St Berchmans College would play a crucial role in nurturing innovators, leaders, and socially responsible citizens. Describing the 100-year-old institution, founded in 1922, as more than just a campus of classrooms and corridors, he said it had served as a centre of intellectual awakening during colonial rule and had steadily contributed to nation-building over the decades. He noted that several distinguished personalities were alumni of the college, including actor Prem Nazir and former Chief Ministers Oommen



Chandy and C Achutha Menon, calling the institution's role in producing two Chief Ministers among its significant contributions to the state. Emphasising mutual respect and social harmony, Radhakrishnan said respecting the sentiments of others was essential for ensuring respect for one's own beliefs. He also stressed that living for oneself is not wrong, but living only for oneself is undesirable. Recalling his recent participation in a convocation ceremony at the University of Kashmir, he highlighted the growing participation of women in higher education, noting that a majority of gold medals at the ceremony were awarded to women. "No religion is against education," he said, describing the trend as a positive social transformation. Addressing students, he urged them to dream big, work hard, and remain rooted in values, stating that they would shape the institution's next century. On the occasion, the vice president inaugurated the Berchmans Centre for Emerging Technologies and the Dr K M Abraham Centre for Energy and Environment as part of the centenary celebrations. He also said this was his third visit to Kerala after assuming office and described it as a special one, noting that "Kerala has become Kerala," reflecting the deep cultural identity and pride of the state.

63.66 lakh names deleted, 60 lakh under adjudication in post-SIR electoral rolls in Bengal



KOLKATA: Around 63.66 lakh names, nearly 8.3 per cent of the electorate, have been deleted in West Bengal since the Special

Intensive Revision (SIR) began in November last year, bringing down the total number of voters in the state to over 7.04 crore

ahead of the assembly elections due in April, EC officials said. The post-SIR rolls, released on Saturday after a 116-day exercise, also show that over 60 lakh electors have been placed in the "under adjudication" category, with their fate to be decided by judicial officers in the coming weeks, a process that could further recalibrate constituency-level equations. The draft rolls, published on December 16, had already pared down the electorate from 7.66 crore to 7.08 crore, deleting

over 58 lakh names on grounds of death, migration, duplication and untraceability. Following hearings, scrutiny and disposal of claims and objections, another 5,46,053 deletions were recorded through Form-7 applications, taking the total SIR-linked omissions to around 63.66 lakh. More than 1.82 lakh electors were added through Form-6 and Form-6A submissions, partially offsetting the deletions. Officials said the figures could still witness marginal changes as fresh inclusions and objections continue to

be processed. Earlier in the day, a senior official of the Chief Electoral Officer's office told PTI that the EC was likely to delete nearly eight lakh names over and above the 58 lakh removed in the draft rolls, taking the total SIR-linked deletions in the state to around 66 lakh. He had also said that the figures following the post-SIR publication may not be definitive, as further inclusions through Form-6 applications and fresh deletions based on Form-7 objections could alter the overall numbers.

AAIB releases preliminary report on Baramati plane crash

NEW DELHI: The Aircraft Accident Investigation Bureau (AAIB) in its preliminary report on the Baramati plane crash has recommended that the aviation regulator DGCA may issue necessary directions to all operators flying VFR to uncontrolled airfields to strictly adhere to the laid-down standard operating procedures. In its 22-page preliminary report on the VSR Venture's Learjet plane crash near Baramati in January that killed Maharashtra Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar and four others, the aircraft accident probe agency AAIB also said that all aspects of the plane crash will be investigated to bring out facts, root causes and contributory factors. "In view of the interim findings brought out so far, it is considered necessary to issue following interim safety recommendations so that necessary preventive actions can be taken promptly to enhance aviation safety. "It is recommended that DGCA may issue necessary directions to all operators operating VFR flights to uncontrolled airfields to strictly adhere to the laid down standard operating procedures," the AAIB said. Further, "necessary directions may also be issued to all the aerodrome operators/organisations responsible for handling

the aerodrome services at the uncontrolled airfields to ensure that the flying operations (including Non-scheduled/Private/Charter operations) in the airfield are allowed only when the prevailing meteorological conditions are within the criteria laid down in the relevant DGCA regulations," the report said. The aircraft, a Learjet, was cleared for landing at Baramati on the morning of January 28 after a go-around due to poor visibility, but after receiving the clearance, it did not give any read-back to the ATC, and moments later, it burst into flames on the edge of the runway. "Later, the aircraft was heard transmitting 'Oh S*t... Oh S*t...' before it crash landed on the left side of the runway abeam runway 11 threshold," the report said. Maharashtra Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar and four other persons on board a chartered aircraft were killed after it crashed barely 200 metres from the edge of a tabletop runway at Baramati airport. The others killed in the tragedy were Captain Sumit Kapoor, who had a flying experience of 15,000 hours, co-pilot Capt. Shambhavi Pathak with 1,500 hours of flying, Personal Security Officer (PSO) Vidip Jadhav and flight attendant Pinky Mali.

High proportion of law graduates opting for corporate jobs is worrisome: CJI

AHMEDABAD: Chief Justice of India (CJI) Surya Kant on Saturday said if a high proportion of law graduates are opting for jobs in corporate firms instead of practising in courts, then the situation is worrisome. Addressing law graduates at the 16th convocation of the Gujarat National Law University (GNLU) in Ahmedabad, he also advised the students that the classroom cannot teach what practical experience can. "As (GNLU) Vice-Chancellor Professor Dr S Shanthakumar pointed out, if 93 per cent of you have been hijacked outside the gates of this university by corporate entities, then it increases my worry. Because I presume, as a very selfish head of the Indian Judiciary, that the national law schools will produce more and more

members of the bar and the bench," the CJI said. He advised newly-graduated law students about their career as a lawyer, and explained the difference between studying law and actually practising it in a real courtroom. "From experience, I remember the early months of practice with clarity that decades have not dulled. There is a particular disorientation in discovering that the law you studied so carefully bears only a partial resemblance to the actual profession," CJI Surya Kant said. "The textbooks gave you doctrines. Your seniors now give you deadlines. In moot courts, you are co-coined by your mentor, but in real courtrooms, you argue within constraints you do not choose and may not



even agree with. This is not a failure of education. It is simply the friction between learning the map and navigating the territory," he added. The classroom cannot teach what years of practical experience can. Initial years of practice also teach you things no classroom ever could. You learn to read the mood of a bench before you have spoken even a word. You figure out how to sit with an anxious client and

say something useful before you have the answers, he said. You discover how to disagree with a senior without damaging a relationship you will need the very next week, and how to lose a case and still leave your client with the impression that the system, not indifference, hurts them. No curriculum details any of this, and only you can discover where within all of it you truly belong, he added. CJI noted that the discipline of knowing the "game" is important. Drawing an analogy from the recent T20 World Cup, he emphasized, "Some of you might be cricket followers, and if you have been catching the T20 World Cup between hearings, you may have noticed something relevant here. The teams that

succeed are not built on the assumption that every player must excel at everything. "No one expects (batsman) Suryakumar Yadav to bowl the death overs, or (bowler Jasprit) Bumrah to anchor a chase. They are trusted to do precisely what they do best, and the team is built around that clarity," he said, adding that the same principle applies to the legal profession. He, however, added that the profession rarely teaches this lesson at the beginning. "In the initial years, you are simply expected to keep up. If you observe closely, those you admire did not become distinguished by attempting everything equally," the CJI noted. Chief Justice of the Gujarat High Court Sunita Agrawal was also present at the event.

Most parts of India to see above-normal heatwave days between March and May: IMD

NEW DELHI: Above-normal heatwave days are expected over most parts of the country between March and May, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) said in its monthly forecast on Saturday. These parts include West Rajasthan, Gujarat, Haryana, Punjab, southern and eastern Maharashtra, eastern Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Jharkhand, Gangetic West Bengal, Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Telangana, Andhra Pradesh, and parts of north Karnataka and north Tamil Nadu. "During the March-April-

May (MAM) season, the increased likelihood of heatwave conditions may pose significant risks to public health, water resources, power demand, and essential services, particularly affecting vulnerable populations such as the elderly, children, outdoor workers, and individuals with pre-existing medical conditions," IMD DG Mrutyunjay Mohapatra said at a press conference here. During March, however, maximum temperatures are likely to be normal to below normal over many parts of the country, ex-

cept northeast and east India, and some parts of the Western Himalayan region and central and peninsular India. Meanwhile, normal minimum temperatures are likely over most parts of the country except some parts of northwest India, south peninsula and along east coast, where normal to below normal minimum temperatures are likely during March. "This could be because rainfall averaged over India is most likely to be normal during March 2026. The LPA of rainfall over the country during March,

based on data from 1971 to 2020, is about 29.9 mm," he said. While many parts of the country are expected to experience normal to above-normal rainfall in March, northeast India, and some parts of north-west and east-central India might witness below normal rainfall. The meteorological department has also noted that, currently, weak La Nina conditions are prevailing over the equatorial Pacific. But, in the following months, neutral El Nino Southern Oscillation (ENSO) conditions could

return, according to the forecasts by global models and IMD's Monsoon Mission Climate Forecast System (MCMFS). Reviewing weather conditions that prevailed during February, the IMD said that the rainfall all over India last month was the lowest since 2001. Also, no cold waves or cold days prevailed during February. "The absence of any active western disturbances and lack of their interactions/confluences with easterly (winds) are the major reasons for subdued snow/rainfall in the month," the IMD said.

Holi played with funeral pyre ashes at Varanasi's Manikarnika Ghat

VARANASI: Holi was played with funeral pyre ashes at Manikarnika Ghat here on Saturday, the second day of Rangbhari Ekadashi. Event organiser Gulshan Kapoor said that since morning, devotees had been preparing for the celebration. The auspicious sound of shehnai resonated at the ghat, which is known for cremations. However, those who waited were able to offer ashes to Baba Hashamshah Nath Ji (incarnation of Lord Shiva) after 2 pm. Kapoor also said that it is believed that on the day of Rangbhari Ekadashi, Baba Vishwanath brings Goddess Parvati to his abode in Kashi after her 'gauna' (farewell), which is celebrated by the people of Kashi as a festival and is considered the beginning of Holi.

CJI lays foundation stone for Judicial Academy in Amaravati

Amaravati, March 1: Chief Justice of India, Justice Surya Kant, on Sunday laid the foundation stone for Andhra Pradesh Judicial Academy and inaugurated High Court Judges' Residential Complex in Amaravati.

He also laid the foundation stone for the Andhra Pradesh Judges' Guest House. The Judicial Academy is being constructed at a cost of Rs 165 crore with academic, residential and training facilities to accommodate 120 trainee judges in each batch.

With a total built-up area of about 2.05 lakh square feet, the proposed complex will include an academic block, hostel facilities, indoor sports amenities and other infrastructure.

The Chief Justice inaugurated the High Court Judges' Residential Complex constructed at Pichukalapalem.

Houses with modern facilities have been constructed for 36 High Court Judges in an area of 33.20 acres at a cost of Rs 210 crore. Adequate land has also been allocated to construct 13 more bungalows, keeping in mind the future needs. Each house has been constructed in the G 1 model with an area of 7,841 square feet. These houses



have been comprehensively designed with office rooms, waiting halls and other facilities as per the needs of the judges.

The Chief Justice also laid the foundation stone for the Andhra Pradesh Judges' Guest House in Amaravati.

The facility will be constructed in a total area of 6,300 square feet at an estimated cost of Rs.69.40 crore.

The guest house building will have ground plus three floors. According to officials, 20 per cent of the total land area has been allocated for construction and the remaining 80 per cent for greenery.

The building is located just 1.2 km from the

Andhra Pradesh High Court building in Amaravati and is easily accessible through 25-metre and 50-metre wide roads.

Earlier, the CJI laid the foundation stone for the District Courts Complex in Tirupati. Speaking on the occasion, he said the bar and the bench are not adversaries but two hands of the same institution.

He stated that a strong bar produces strong advocacy, and when there is strong advocacy, that challenges the judges to think harder, reason more carefully, and write more clearly. He said that the quality of assistance which the bar provides is reflected in the overall work of the judge. The better the bar argues, the better the quality of the judgment, and when there is a better-reasoned judgment, public confidence is built in the

Congress running 'Bulldozer regime' in Telangana, says KTR

Hyderabad, March 1: Bharat Rashtira Samithi (BRS) working president K.T. Rama Rao on Sunday alleged that a "bulldozer regime" is being run in Telangana under the Congress government.

He said that from the very day Revanth Reddy assumed office as Chief Minister, the state has been witnessing large-scale demolition of houses and harassment of citizens. KTR accused the Chief Minister of focusing only on demolishing homes, selling lands and promoting what he termed as a "real estate broker-style governance," instead of working for people's welfare.

The BRS leader alleged that thousands of houses are being targeted in the name of the Musi project to facilitate a massive scam. Participating in the 'Musi Dandi March' organised by affected families, KTR undertook a 3.5-kilometre padayatra in Rajendranagar, meeting and consoling victims from Haider Shah Kote and Madhu Park Ridge Apartment who are facing displacement. Thousands of residents joined the march and expressed their grievances to him.



Addressing a meeting later, KTR assured the affected families that the BRS party would stand firmly with them.

He urged residents to protect their homes and lands for the next two years and expressed confidence that once the BRS returns to power under K. Chandrasekhar Rao's leadership, the party would ensure that no one loses their house in the name of the Musi project.

KTR alleged that despite repeated appeals and pleas from apartment residents and families — including requests showing concern for children — the Congress gov-

ernment and Chief Minister Revanth Reddy are proceeding ruthlessly with evictions and threats.

He further criticised the Chief Minister for allegedly prioritising the construction of a new official residence worth Rs 200 crore despite already having access to existing facilities, while ordinary and middle-class families are being pushed out of their homes. The BRS leader claimed that since coming to power, the Congress government has made house demolitions its primary activity across the state, citing

actions in Hyderabad under HYDRA as well as in Ramagundam, Mahabubnagar and Khammam.

KTR alleged that the Musi project is being used as a pretext for a large-scale financial irregularity aimed at benefiting contractors close to the ruling dispensation.

He stated that during the previous BRS government, a Detailed Project Report (DPR) for Musi rejuvenation was prepared at a cost of about Rs 16,000 crore without displacing a single household, and included plans for roads and flyovers with minimal public disruption.

Questioning the Congress government's stand on buffer zones, KTR pointed out that the same apartments now facing action had earlier received official permissions. He asked why action is not being taken against those who granted approvals earlier. KTR also criticised Congress leadership at the national level, stating that while Rahul Gandhi speaks against bulldozer politics elsewhere, the alleged demolitions in Telangana are being ignored.

AP: SC CJ Surya Kanh lays stone construction of guest house for judges

Vijayawada, Mar 1 (UNI) Chief Justice of India Surya Kant laid the foundation stone for the construction of the Judicial academy at Pichukalapalem village near the state capital Amaravati in Andhra Pradesh on Sunday.

The Judicial academy is being constructed at a cost of Rs 165 crore.

The event marks a key step in enhancing judicial training infrastructure in the state. It will accommodate batches of 120 trainee judges with academic, residential, and recreational facilities. Located 5.7 km from the AP High Court, it connects via a 50-meter-wide road.

Later, the CJI laid the foundation stone for the construction of a guest house for judges in the capital city region. The guest house complex for judges will be constructed at a cost of Rs 69.40 crore on a 50,000 square feet plot, about 1.2 kms from the High Court.

Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu, Supreme Court judges Justice JK Maheshwari, Justice PS Narasimha, Justice Prashant Kumar Mishra, Justice SVN Bhatti, Justice Joyimalya Bagchi, AP high court chief justice Dhiraj Singh Thakur and Chief Secretary G Sai Prasad besides officials were among those present.

The CJI also inaugurated the newly constructed residential quarters of AP high court judges on Sunday. The quarters were constructed at a cost of Rs 210 crore on 33.20 acres of land. The quarters were constructed for 36 judges with all modern facilities in the capital city region.

Apart from the distinguished judges, CM and Chief Secretary, Principal Secretaries Shyamala Rao and Suresh Kumar, CRDA Commissioner Kannababu, Guntur District Collector Thamim Ansariya, and SP Vakul Jindal participated in the program.

Route via Muscat opens for Gulf NRIs to return home: union Minister Bandi Sanjay



Hyderabad, Mar 1 (TSIT) union Minister of State for Home Affairs Bandi Sanjay Kumar on Sunday said that NRIs living in Gulf countries need not worry amid the ongoing US-Israel-Iran war, as the Centre has facilitated a route for their safe return to India via Muscat, Oman.

In a statement, The Minister said NRIs stranded in countries such as Dubai, Qatar, Bahrain, Kuwait and Saudi Arabia can now travel by road to Oman and fly to India from Muscat International Airport.

He said the Indian Embassy in Muscat has also issued an advisory in this regard. According to officials, Dubai is about 450 km by road from Muscat, while travellers from other Gulf nations may need to cover

nearly 1,000 km.

Bandi Sanjay clarified that travellers must obtain the required visit or tourist visa before entering Oman. Indian passport holders with valid visas or residence permits from the US, UK, Canada, Japan or Schengen countries are eligible for a 14-day on-arrival visa, subject to conditions such as return tickets, hotel bookings and health insurance. The on-arrival visa facility is also available to Indians residing in GCC countries with valid resident cards.

He said passports must be valid for at least six months at the time of travel and advised NRIs seeking to return to India to stay in touch with the Indian Embassy in Oman for further assistance.

Insider' Info? Why US-Israel Couldn't Have Struck Khamenei Without Help

The assassination of Supreme Leader Ayatollah Khamenei, who had been Iran's spiritual and overarching leader since 1989, by a coordinated day-time raid conducted jointly by the United States and Israel, has pushed the Shia seat of power into a timeline of the unknown. In a departure from the air strikes of last year, which actively did not target the Ayatollah, today the American-led narrative was clear: that of regime change.

The removal of Khamenei is a tectonic shift in the region. Iran since 1979 had solidified its role as a pole of power, ideology, and identity. During its monarchic era, specially under Reza Shah Pahlvi, it was pro-West and had strategic relations with Israel, which were severed following the Islamic Revolution. Since then, the centrality of the Ayatollah in taking Iran down the path of having a vehemently anti-US and anti-Israel stance has been core to the theocracy's very identity.

Those Working From Within

Over the past years, the question of who replaces Khamenei, who was 86 and ailing, was a contested one. Even when Ayatollah Khomeini, who was popular as he took over the state coming out of his exile in France, died, his selection for his successor was unexpected. There were others, more senior, and those closer to Khomeini, who were looked past to allow a youngish, 50-year old cleric to take charge of one of the Middle East's largest states, and one that was going to build its capacities that would end up building a level of consensus between Arab powers and Israel, most in the former who did not have political relations with the latter.

What, or who, will be Khamenei's replacement is an open-ended question right now. However, Iran also has bigger issues to deal with in the interim. The only way actionable intelligence would reach Israel and the US on Khamenei's whereabouts, movements, and schedules, is if the calls were coming from inside the house itself. Following 2025, the Iranian government ran an extensive programme across its political and military ranks to weed out those who were helping provide intelligence to the enemy. Reports suggested that hundreds were taken out of their ranks, often without trial, and were made an example of - via imprisonment or being sent to death - to instil fear. The fact that the Ayatollah was killed in his own office shows that those working against the Islamic Republic from within remain prominent. Only a few days prior, America's Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) posted multiple videos online in Farsi, asking Iranians to contact them with intel and information in exchange for dividends.

Iran, oddly today, stands at a poetic juncture where two roads stare at it: one it has been taking since 1979, and one which is yet to be taken. It remains unlikely that an inward collapse of the Islamic Republic will take place purely due to Khamenei's death. The US is demanding capitulation of not the Ayatollah, but the system in place, defanging much beyond the nuclear programme.

How Will Iran Respond?

As a response, beyond regime sustainability, Iran is also facing a stark crisis of an ability to respond. Tehran over the past months seemed to have realised that while it does indeed have a large stockpile of missiles, their technological prowess, which is needed to target Israel around a thousand kilometres away, is severely restrained. So, to cause maximum regional concern over the trajectory of the conflict, it has lobbed drones and missiles, seemingly in a restrained manner, towards Gulf capitals such as Dubai, Abu Dhabi, Manama, Doha and Kuwait City. The hope here would be to push a regional crisis, and at this stage, pull the US even further into an entrenched and protracted war, something Trump is averse to.

Who Gets The 'Peace Prize' Now, Mr Trump - The Drones Or The Bombers?

First it was Maduro. In complete disregard of international law, the US forces attacked the presidential palace in Caracas and kidnapped the president. And now, Iran's Supreme Leader, Khamenei. They bombed his house and killed him. This is the modern reality, and this is how America has become what it is under Trump. It's dagadiri of the highest order, with no accountability. The entire West Asian region has been pushed into a level of chaos it has not seen in decades. Airports are scenes of panic, port cities are on edge, American bases are on high alert and vulnerable to Iranian retaliation. And hundreds of thousands of Indian workers, who send billions of dollars in remittances back home, are stranded in a war that is not theirs. To add to the chaos, insurance premiums are rising, shipping lanes are under threat, oil markets are nervous and every government is drawing up evacuation plans. It's Iraq 2003 All Over Again! The Trump administration has made clear that a nuclear deal was never the endgame; removing the Islamic Republic was. It is safe to assume that the strikes are designed not to bring Iran to the negotiating table but to create the conditions for internal collapse, economic devastation, political fracturing and popular revolt. It is Iraq 2003 all over again, except this time, the target is far larger, more capable and busily engaged in retaliation. The assumption in Washington seems to be that sufficient military pressure will either trigger a coup or embolden opposition movements to finish what sanctions and isolation could not. It is quite possible, especially if the supreme leader's death is confirmed. History suggests otherwise. But then, history has rarely constrained American ambitions in the region. What makes this especially reckless is that Washington appears to have no coherent plan for what comes after. Regime change is the goal, but the options beyond that are dangerously thin. Will the United States occupy Iran? Partition it? Install a client government and hope it holds? Support exiled opposition groups with no domestic legitimacy? Every one of these paths has failed elsewhere, particularly in Afghanistan, Iraq, Libya. And yet, the same playbook is being deployed again. The real objective may not be stability at all, but prolonged chaos



that ensures no regional power can challenge Israeli or American dominance. If that is the strategy, then the human cost is not a failure of planning; it is the plan. What Does Trump Want, Anyway? The most disturbing question is no longer why President Trump chose to fight. It is why the United States and Israel chose to strike at the precise moment Omani mediators said the Geneva talks were making real progress. Wars are launched for a reason. Any military general will testify that wars have to have an objective. They cannot be fought on the basis of the whims and fancies of a Maverik leader. If negotiations were moving forward, then stopping a nuclear programme overnight was not the real objective. Washington has for weeks, if not months, spoken openly about regime change in Tehran. Israel sees a once-in-a-generation chance to eliminate its last serious regional rival while it is strategically and economically

weakened. Strip away the language of security and the convergence is straightforward. The US is reasserting its global hegemony, with the message that it still decides which governments survive, while Israel is seeking undisputed military supremacy in West Asia. This is unipolarity by force. The world was not consulted. The UN was not convened. Allies were reportedly informed, not asked. The script is familiar. First the threat is constructed in the Western media. Then war is framed as a moral necessity. Dialogue is discarded just when it begins to show results. From Iraq's imaginary weapons of mass destruction (WMD) to Libya's 'humanitarian intervention' and now to Iran's collapsing negotiations, the narrative remains unchanged. The Trump Pattern What makes this moment more dangerous is that it fits into a pattern. The attempted suffocation of Venezuela through sanctions and

political delegitimation, followed by an attack and arrest of its president. The extraordinary treatment of its elected leadership as if sovereignty were negotiable. The open talk of taking over Cuba. The repeated insistence that Greenland could be acquired like a commercial asset. These are not stray incidents. They reflect a worldview in which power, not international law, defines legitimacy and where geography itself is seen as negotiable if it serves strategic interests. The contradiction in Washington is, therefore, stark. A president who returned to the White House on the promise of ending 'Forever Wars' now presides over the largest American military build-up in the region since the infamous Iraq war. The US foreign policy once again risks becoming a tool of domestic electoral calculation. If this escalation is linked to midterm positioning, then the lesson of the last three decades is being repeated: that war abroad is necessary to manage politics at home. Trump's West Asia war is a declaration that American power - unilateral, coercive and willing to bypass institutions - remains the organising principle of the global order. All the talk of BRICS (of which Iran is a full member), of alternative financial systems, of Global South solidarity collapses when one man in Washington decides that a government must fall or a region must be reshaped. There is also a harder material reality behind this return of force: energy and currency. The Gulf remains the heart of the global oil system. The dollar remains the currency in which that oil is traded. Any geopolitical shift that threatens to move energy trade outside the dollar system is, by definition, a challenge to American power. Seen through that lens, this war is not only about Iran. It is about control over the economic architecture that underpins American primacy. For the Gulf states, the crisis is existential. They host American bases as their security umbrella, yet those very bases now make them targets for Iranian retaliation. Their sovereignty seems to be dependent on decisions taken elsewhere. Their prosperity, built on stability and trade, is now hostage to a conflict they did not choose. India Isn't Immune For India and the wider Asian economies, the consequences of the ongoing war are immediate and tangible. Energy security, remit-

Khamenei's Martyrdom: The Final Journey of a True Friend of India

The official announcement by Iranian state media shook the world—Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei was martyred in a US-Israeli airstrike in Tehran on February 28, 2026. The social media post proved true—"Khamenei's passing marks the end of an era. India has lost a true friend." Humble tributes to Khamenei. Under his leadership, Iran supported us against Pakistan, voted in India's favor at the United Nations on the Kashmir issue, provided security in the energy sector, and made available cheap oil. Today, Iran is plunged into crisis. India must clarify its position. The global dictator, America, must be stopped—after Venezuela, Iran, who will be next? India-Iran relations have ancient roots. From the Indus Valley Civilization and the trade of the Persian Empire to today's Chabahar port—this friendship is a testament to history. The Non-Aligned Movement formalized it in the 1950s. The 1979 Islamic Revolution brought ups and downs, but Khamenei's leadership since 1989 has brought stability. His stance on Kashmir remained unwavering. In the 1971, 1994, and 2017 UN elections, Iran rejected Pakistan's propaganda and supported India. When most Muslim countries sided with Pakistan, Iran said Kashmir was India's internal matter. This was a diplomatic victory. Iran's support against Pakistan was evident. Iran sent a strong message to Pakistan in the Balochistan border disputes. India received support against the

Taliban in Afghanistan. The Chabahar port became a symbol of this. This \$500 million project, initiated by Prime Minister Modi in 2016, challenges Pakistan's Gwadar and opens alternative routes to Central Asia and Afghanistan. India invested \$370 million by 2024. In 2025, it was linked to the India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor. Khamenei personally supported it. Energy cooperation was also historic. Between 2005 and 2015, Iran supplied 25 percent of India's crude oil, 20 percent cheaper than the market rate. Despite US sanctions, India saved \$12 billion through informal rupee-oil trade. Bilateral trade reached \$2.5 billion in 2023. Iran purchased rice, tea, medicines, and engineering goods from India. Khamenei had said, "India is our cultural brother." Iran's current crisis is profound. US sanctions have devastated the economy—inflation has reached 45 percent, unemployment 15 percent, and GDP has shrunk by 12 percent. The 2015 nuclear deal, the JCPOA, has failed, and Israeli cyberattacks and airstrikes have increased. Support for Houthi rebels has disrupted shipping in the Red Sea, harming global trade. Internally, the Mahsa Amini movement (2022) has sparked women's anger. Khamenei's martyrdom has sparked a succession war. The Expert Council will form a three-member provisional council. Possible successors are Majlis Speaker Mohammad Bagher Ghalibaf or the head of the IRGC. But the threat of a military coup looms. US President Trump called it "Judgment Day." Israel celebrated. This is a unilateral dictatorship. Venezuela's oil crisis, Syria's destruction—now Iran. Is Yemen or North Korea the next target? India adopted a balanced policy. Abu Dhabi supported the Abraham Accords, but Iran was isolated. Is this balance or cowardice? What steps should India take? First, prioritize Chabahar. Additional investment of \$500 million, rail and road access to Afghanistan. Second, immediate contact with the new Iranian leadership. Send a high-level delegation to the condolence meeting. Third, strengthen energy security. Continue 2 million barrels per day from Russia, and restore 1 million from Iran. Fourth, active engagement on multilateral platforms. BRICS and SCO oppose US sanctions. Fifth, regional peace initiative. Host an Iran-Pakistan-Afghanistan trilateral dialogue. India's diplomacy has been tested—purchasing oil during the Russia-Ukraine war, blocking China in Ladakh, and Qatar acting as a mediator. Repeat this in Iran. Haryana's importance—the state's green energy policy should receive cheap Iranian oil. Gurugram IT exports should go to Central Asia via Chabahar. Rohtak-Karnal farmers should double their rice exports. BJP MLA Nayab Singh Saini emphasized regional stability. Conclusion (about 100 words) Today is not a moment of mere grief or reaction, but of prudent decision-making. The instability in West Asia teaches us that the use of force does not suppress ideas, but rather intensifies them. India needs to rise above emotions and pressures and adopt a clear and balanced stance in support of its long-term interests, regional peace, and international law. How Is A Supreme Leader Chosen, Who Will Succeed Khamenei

The announcement was repeated several times by state outlets, emphasising the immediate formation of the interim leadership structure. Immediate Transition: The Leadership Council Iran's

constitution provides for continuity if the supreme leader dies or becomes incapacitated. Authority temporarily transfers to a three-member council consisting of the President, the head of the judiciary and a clerical jurist chosen by the Guardian Council. Alireza Araf's appointment as a jurist member does not mean he will become the next supreme leader. According to Professor Simon Mabon of Lancaster University, the council exists only to manage affairs until a successor is formally selected. "What they (Assembly of Experts) are doing is they are creating a leadership council to run until it formally names a successor to Khamenei. And so Araf has been appointed as a jurist to that leadership council to offer some sort of theological guidance," Professor

Mabon told NDTV. It is possible he could emerge as a candidate later, but there is no automatic path from interim council member to supreme leadership. Importantly, being an Ayatollah does not mean someone is eligible or likely to become the supreme leader. Many clerics hold the title without occupying political authority. "I think it is just important to make the distinction. You can be an ayatollah and not be the supreme leader, the threshold for theological, moral and political skill sets. So just because you are an ayatollah, it does not mean you are a supreme leader. You can be an ayatollah and just be a religious cleric," Professor Mabon told NDTV. A System Prepared For Succession Analysts believe Iran had already been preparing for a leadership transition, partly because of Khamenei's declining health. Professor Mabon says that Tehran learned from previous crises, including the "12-day war" last June, when senior military figures were killed. Iran subsequently developed contingency plans to ensure continuity even in the event of leadership decapitation. "Iran has learned a lot from the 12-day war last June. It has put a lot of planning in place. It has worked hard to ensure that in the event of these decapitation strategies working, as they did in the 12-day war last June, it would be able to operate and to respond. And I think we are seeing that now," Professor Mabon told.

Why is WhatsApp's privacy policy facing a legal challenge in India?

A landmark legal battle over privacy, data control and the business model of big tech is playing out in India as WhatsApp's 2021 privacy policy faces close scrutiny from the country's top court. At stake is not just WhatsApp's policy, but broader questions over privacy rights, consumer choice and regulation of dominant online platforms. WhatsApp is India's most popular messaging app. A few days ago, WhatsApp told the Supreme Court it would comply by 16 March with an order requiring it to give Indian users greater control over how their data is shared with its parent company, Meta. In an affidavit, seen by the BBC, the messaging platform added that users could continue using the app even if they opted out of sharing data with Meta for advertising. The move comes days after the court criticised WhatsApp's 2021 privacy policy, warning that it would not allow WhatsApp or Meta to "play with" Indians' right to privacy or "make a mockery" of the Constitution, which guarantees privacy as a fundamental right. The remarks were made during open court hearings on WhatsApp's January 2021 policy update, which required users to share data with Meta companies to keep



using the app - a "take it or leave it" approach that India's competition watchdog, the Competition Commission of India (CCI), said left users with "no real choice". The update drew criticism from users who said they felt compelled to accept terms they were uncomfortable with, noting it differed from the 2016 policy, which had allowed existing users to opt out of sharing data with Meta for advertising. The policy has also been criticised by digital rights activists as invasive and a violation of user autonomy, while others argue that leveraging a platform's popularity for advertising is common practice in the

internet age. WhatsApp is ubiquitous in India with about 853 million users, according to World Population Review. Rivals such as Signal, Telegram and homegrown platforms like Koo exist, but none match in popularity. Given its vast reach, WhatsApp and its parent company are among the global tech firms closely watched by India's federal government which has, in recent years, tightened digital regulations and pushed platforms for greater accountability. A legal battle over WhatsApp's privacy policy began in March 2021 when the CCI ordered an investigation, alleging that Meta was engag-

ing in "exploitative and exclusionary conduct". It said forcing users to share data with Meta companies allowed the firm to leverage WhatsApp's dominance in India to deny advertising access to rivals. In November 2024, the CCI fined Meta \$25m for "abusing its dominant position" and ordered it and WhatsApp to implement behavioural remedies within three months. It barred WhatsApp from sharing user data with Meta entities for five years and directed the company to clearly specify the purposes of data sharing in its privacy policy. WhatsApp and Meta challenged the order before a company law tribunal, which

upheld the penalty but stayed the five-year data-sharing ban. In January 2026, the firms moved the Supreme Court to contest the fine. While hearing the case earlier this month, the Supreme Court criticised WhatsApp's "take it or leave it policy", saying that it was a way of "committing theft of private information". The court also voiced concern over personal communications being used for targeted advertising and directed WhatsApp to establish a consent-based framework for data sharing. In an affidavit to the Supreme Court, WhatsApp reiterated that personal messages are protected by end-to-end encryption and said it would implement the CCI's data-sharing remedies, which aim to give users greater control over their data. The app said it would notify users to allow them to opt out of data sharing and enable them to review or modify their choices through a prominent tab in the app's settings. "Sharing of user data collected on WhatsApp with other Meta companies or Meta company products for purposes other than for providing WhatsApp services shall not be made a condition for users to access WhatsApp service in India," the affidavit said.

Gold, Silver set for fiery start as Middle East tensions rise

New Delhi: Precious metal prices are likely to see a fiery start to the week when trading resumes on Monday, March 2, as investors would rush for safe-haven assets amid global uncertainties following the escalating Middle East tension, analysts said. President Donald Trump announced "major combat operations" in Iran after Israeli strikes on Tehran. Iranian state media confirmed the death of Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei on Sunday, February 28, triggering retaliations from Iran against US military installations and Israeli targets across the region. Analysts said the extent of the impact on domestic silver and gold prices will depend on how long the conflict persists, as global investors recalibrate risk exposure amid fears of a prolonged instability in the Middle East. Besides, they added that the geopolitical situation, macroeconomic data announcements (including



manufacturing/services PMI from across regions), and US retail sales and non-farm payroll and employment data toward the end of the week will be factors. "Gold and silver prices are set to remain highly volatile with gap-up on the opening session on Monday as the Middle East conflict involving renewed US and Israeli military action against Iran - continues to dominate global risk sentiment," Jateen Trivedi, VP Research Analyst - Commodity and Currency, LKP Securities, said. He said escalating hostilities and diminishing hopes of a quick diplomatic

resolution are driving investors toward traditional safe-haven assets like gold and silver, and widely expecting a gap-up opening for bullion markets. "As global equities and risk assets come under pressure, capital tends to shift into precious metals, which act as a hedge against uncertainty," Trivedi added. The domestic commodities market will remain closed on Tuesday due to Holi. On the Multi Commodity Exchange, silver futures for the March contract surged Rs 22,054 or 8.72 per cent, while gold for April contract rose Rs 5,228, or 3.33 per cent.

Iran names interim leaders as Israeli rescuers says nine killed in missile attack



The death toll from the Beit Shemesh strike has now risen to nine, according to a spokesperson from the Magen David Adom (MDA) medical emergency service. Additional MDA teams are providing medical treatment and evacuating 28 injured to hospitals in Jerusalem and to Shamir Medical Center, including two in a serious condition, two in a moderate condition, and 24 in a "light" condition, the spokesperson says. MDA paramedic Dror Eini adds: "We saw destroyed homes, flames and smoke rising from residential buildings, wrecked cars, and significant chaos at the scene. I saw three casualties lying on the ground with no signs of life and had to pronounce them dead at the scene. Later, additional MDA paramedics pronounced six more victims dead. In an exclusive interview with Al Jazeera, external, Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi

says that, following the death of Khamenei, a new supreme leader may be selected in "a day or two". It comes after Tehran announced an interim leadership who Araghchi says "will act as in charge of the leadership before a new leader is elected". He adds that Iran's strikes are "an act of self-defence and retaliation to the American aggression against us". Iran President Masoud

Pezeshkian just appeared on state TV in what appears to be a recorded video message. He expresses his condolences over the death of Iran Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, and says that the interim leadership council has started its work. According to Iranian state media, Pezeshkian is himself part of the three-man interim committee that has stepped in to avoid a vacuum while

recent onslaught would "not disrupt the resolve of the government of the Islamic republic to carry out its duties and responsibilities". He also said that the "sorrow" from the death of Iran's supreme leader would "remain in the minds of people" for a "long time". The UAE Ministry of Defense (MoD) says three people have been killed by Iranian attacks since yesterday. In a statement, the ministry says it has dealt with 167 missiles and 541 Iranian drones so far. Of those drones, 35 fell within the country's territory, resulting in three deaths and 58 minor injuries as well as "material damage". The ministry says it remains on high alert and is ready to respond to any threats. Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guards Corp (IRGC) says in a statement that they have attacked USS Abraham Lincoln with four ballistic missiles, according to Iranian state media. USS

Abraham Lincoln is the fifth Nimitz-class aircraft carrier in the United States Navy. Lincoln includes the latest F-35 stealth jets, capable of evading enemy radar. The strike group also has three destroyers loaded with Tomahawk land attack cruise missiles, and is normally accompanied by a nuclear-powered submarine, which fires the same weapon. Emergency and rescue services are here in Beit Shemesh, where an Iranian missile hit a residential neighbourhood, killing at least eight people, according to medical services. Officials say a building where people were sheltering was hit and collapsed. A search operation is under way for people feared to be under the rubble. There are piles of broken concrete and twisted metal, and a huge crater which indicates the point of impact. Cars that were parked nearby were completely destroyed.

Wellness peptide craze: Why people are injecting drugs 'not for human consumption'



Katie carefully takes a syringe out of its packet. She pricks the top of a small jar of blue liquid and pulls up the plunger. She turns and jabs the needle into her bum cheek and gives the camera a big thumbs up, looking pleased. Katie's been injecting GHK-Cu, a copper peptide, for several weeks now and she's confident it's making a difference to her skin. So much so, she says, the stretch marks she developed after having her two children have almost disappeared. The only disconcerting thing? It clearly says "for research purposes only" on the label wrapped around the jar. This peptide is not suitable for human consumption.

Like the growing number of others on social media who film themselves injecting unregulated peptides, Katie is seemingly unfazed by the warning. She believes it's safe. Peptides are short chains of amino acids, or small proteins, which our bodies naturally produce. They act as messengers, telling our cells what to do, and play vital roles in our skin health, immune system and helping to control our hormones. "I've done a lot of research into them, and I am exercising caution," says Katie. "I started super small," she continues. "Just to make sure I didn't notice anything weird."

Where have Nepal's 'nepo kids' gone as corruption takes centre stage in election?



It was the excess on show on the social media accounts of politicians' children that provided the kindling for Nepal's Gen Z uprising last year. The lavish presents - all clearly marked with designer labels - piled up and decorated like a Christmas tree, the expensive trips to five-star resorts around the world, the extravagant wedding parties that closed roads to traffic. For many, the disparity between the haves and have-nots right there, on your phone, was too much to be ignored, in a country where youth unemployment stands at 20.6% and with three million working overseas. "The kids of big politicians celebrate special occasions in places like Thailand and Switzerland," Satish Kumar Yadav, a 25-year-old lab technician, tells the BBC. "But, the children of the general public are forced to go to Gulf countries to find jobs." A proposed ban on the very social media where young Nepalis were voicing their anger at the so-called "nepo kids" was the spark that would send thousands into the street on 8 September. Within two days, 77 people - many of them protesters shot by police - would be dead, and the prime minister would

have stepped down. As the country heads to the polls next week, it appears politicians have taken note of their anger, and have promised a raft of changes to appease it. Meanwhile, many of the social media accounts which so carefully curated privileged lives have gone quiet. Shrinkkhal Khatriwada, a former Miss Nepal and daughter of a former health minister - who was reported to have more than a million followers at one point - appears to have shut her Instagram account down entirely. Her last post on YouTube is a 34-minute video explaining why she did not deserve the "nepo kids" label, uploaded months ago. Smita Dahal, granddaughter of a three-time prime minister and former Maoist guerrilla leader, who was criticised for showing off her expensive handbag collection, has set her Instagram account to private. Her Facebook page has not been updated since late August. There are exceptions. One of the most striking images doing the rounds last summer was that of a former minister's son Saugat Thapa, standing beside Louis Vuitton, Cartier and Gucci boxes piled high in the shape of a Christmas tree.

'Not the Dubai we know': Residents and holidaymakers react to Iran attacks

Thousands of people are stranded across the Middle East as Iran launched attacks across the region in response to a massive and ongoing attack against it by the US and Israel. In Dubai, in the United Arab Emirates, two luxury hotels and its main airport - the world's busiest by passenger traffic - have been damaged. The BBC has spoken to people who live in the Emirate, as well as those who are on holiday. Dubai resident Becky Williams said she saw about 15 missiles "launched from behind my house yesterday", referring to missiles fired by UAE authorities to intercept incoming Iranian projectiles. "You can hear the interceptions happening in the air." But she added that

she and her family were remaining calm and trusted the UAE military to defend its airspace, saying she believed it would "all blow over soon". Iran's attacks in retaliation for the US-Israeli strikes continued into Sunday. On the Palm Jumeirah, Dubai's luxury man-made archipelago, the five-star Fairmont The Palm hotel was struck by a large explosion. One killed and 11 injured at Dubai and Abu Dhabi airports as Iran strikes region

One person has been killed and 11 injured at airports in Dubai and Abu Dhabi, as Iran launched attacks across the Middle East in response to a massive and ongoing attack against it by the US and Israel. Authorities in Abu Dhabi confirmed a drone targeting Zayed International Airport (AUH) was intercepted, leading to "falling debris" killing one person and injuring seven. Dubai International Airport (DXB) - the world's busiest by passenger traffic - was damaged in an "incident" that injured four staff, according to authorities, who did not give further details. Thousands of flights have been grounded to and from the region, in one of the most serious disruptions to global travel since the Covid-19 pandemic.



Across the Gulf, Iran has used ballistic missiles and drones to launch large-scale attacks on US allies and assets, after Iran's supreme leader was killed in the ongoing US-Israeli air offensive launched on Saturday morning. Qatar, Bahrain, Jordan and Kuwait - all home to US military bases - said they had intercepted missiles fired towards them, but falling

Jumeirah, Dubai's luxury man-made archipelago, the five-star Fairmont The Palm hotel was struck by a large explosion on Saturday afternoon. Video verified by the BBC shows a fire raging as black smoke rises into the sky. Also in Dubai, debris from an "aerial interception" caused a fire in a berth at the Jebel Ali deep sea port - the world's ninth busiest. AT LEAST 20 KILLED AFTER MILITARY PLANE CARRYING BANKNOTES CRASHES IN BOLIVIA

At least 20 people have been killed and others injured after a Bolivian air force cargo plane crashed in the western city of El Alto, the country's authorities say. The incident happened at 18:15 local time (22:15 GMT) on Friday as the plane was arriving at El Alto's airport from the city of Santa Cruz, aviation officials said. It reportedly skidded off the runway and hit nearby vehicles. The defence ministry later confirmed its C-130 Hercules was involved and that it had been transporting banknotes to the Central Bank of Bolivia. There were eight people



aboard the plane, the air force commander said. Police fired tear gas to disperse crowds allegedly trying to take the scattered banknotes. Firefighters had given an earlier death

toll of at least 15. Video footage showed the plane on the ground and badly damaged vehicles. In other videos, people could be seen running away from the tear gas and police officers, some holding shields, forming a line. Some in the crowds are seen throwing rocks. "While news crews were covering the accident, individuals attempting to steal the transported money attacked the press with unusual violence," the National Association of Journalists of Bolivia said in a statement. It said a mobile TV unit was "directly targeted", while other journalists "were attacked with stones, suffering serious injuries while carrying out their work". The government-run Bolivian News Agency reported that at least a dozen people were arrested for stealing banknotes.

Aid groups in Gaza and West Bank thrown lifeline as Israel court pauses ban threat



Israel's High Court has temporarily halted a ban on international aid groups from working in the occupied Palestinian territories unless they meet strict new rules. The injunction came ahead of an Israeli deadline for 37 well-known organisations to stop work, something the groups warn will remove a lifeline for vulnerable people and cause "irreparable harm". Four months into a fragile ceasefire in war-torn Gaza, most of the more than two million population relies on aid - for food, medical care and water. In the West Bank, humanitarian organisations have been helping Palestinian refugees, UNrwa, from operating in Israel, impacting its work in the West Bank and Gaza. Israel has claimed that UNrwa - and other organisations, including MSF - have been infiltrated by members of Palestinian armed groups or have ties to them. The humanitarian groups strongly deny that. Israel's Ministry for Diaspora Affairs and Combating Antisemitism says its "clear transparency requirements" mean all NGOs and humanitarian organisations must now give full details of their staff, funding sources and operational structures.

At least 148 dead after Israel strike on school

At least 148 people including children have died after a reported strike hit a school in southern Iran, according to Iranian officials. Iran has blamed the US and Israel. The US military's Central Command (Centcom) said it was looking into reports of the incident, while Israel's military said it was "not aware" of any IDF operations in the area. The girls' school was located in Minab, near an Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) base which has previously been a target. At least 201 people have been killed in air strikes in Iran and 747 hurt since Saturday, the Iranian Red Crescent said. Iran's President Masoud Pezeshkian called the incident a "barbaric act" and "another black page in the record of countless crimes committed by the aggressors". In a statement reported in US media, Centcom spokesman Tim Hawkins said: "We take these reports seriously. The protection of civilians is of utmost importance, and we will continue to



take all precautions available to minimise the risk of unintended harm." The six-day working week in Iran runs from Saturday to Thursday, with Friday being the only official day of rest, meaning

the school was likely occupied when it was hit. Following the incident on Saturday, Red Cross and Red Crescent officials in Geneva said the society had mobilised response teams to

go to the school. An official said that the school, in the town of Minab in Hormozgan province, had been "targeted by three missile attacks". It is located about 600m (1970ft) from the base of the IRGC. The BBC has verified clips of the aftermath of the explosion, which show smoke rising from a building as crowds gather nearby and people can be heard screaming in panic. But it has not been able to independently verify the death toll - international news organisations are often refused visas to Iran which severely limits their ability to gather information there. Iranian social media users have reacted with anger to news of the incident. An Iranian living abroad who opposes military intervention in Iran commented: "The first victims of this war are 40

girls in Minab, hit by a missile attack. Is this the war you cheer for?" Deep mistrust of the Iranian regime, however, makes official reports difficult for many to accept, and some Iranians directly blamed the regime for the attack. One user wrote: "Even if the regime did not directly target schools, the deaths of children in Minab remain the responsibility of the Islamic Republic. People have no shelters, the internet is cut, phone lines are down, and there has been no warning to keep children out of school. In these conditions, the minimum requirement should be to stay at home." The school tragedy took place as the US and Israel launched wave after wave of air strikes against targets in a number of Iranian cities throughout Saturday.

Mitchell Starc Emotional As Alyssa Healy Slams Ton In Final ODI For Australia

In the annals of Australian cricket, Alyssa Healy is a name that will be etched permanently. Healy bid an emotional farewell to white-ball international cricket with a breathtaking 158-run knock in the third and final match at Bellerive Oval in Hobart on Sunday. The 35-year-old wicketkeeper-batter had earlier confirmed that the bilateral series against India would mark the conclusion of her 16-year international career. Australia, asked to bat first in the final ODI, were chasing a clean sweep against the touring Indian side. Healy was greeted with a guard of honour as she walked to the crease. She wasted no time asserting her dominance, striking 27



fours and two sixes in a quickfire 98-ball knock that helped Australia reach an imposing 409/7. Her teammate Beth Mooney also contributed an unbeaten 106 off 84 balls, ensuring the hosts crossed the 400-run mark. Alyssa Healy's husband and Australia skipper Mitchell Starc was present in the

stands when she reached the milestone. He was visibly emotional after Healy's feat. Healy, who debuted for Australia at 19 in February 2010, finishes her ODI career with over 3,500 runs. In T20 internationals, she amassed 3,054 runs at an average of 25.45, including a career-best 148 not out - the

highest individual T20I score among Full Member nations. She holds the record for the most T20I dismissals (as wicketkeeper) globally and ranks second in appearances for Australia in the format. Her glittering career includes six T20 World Cup triumphs (2010, 2012, 2014, 2018, 2020, 2023) and two ODI World Cup titles (2013, 2022). Healy was also recognised as the ICC T20I Cricketer of the Year in both 2018 and 2019. The Australian star will conclude her international career in the longest format, leading the side in her 11th and final Test match against India, scheduled to begin on March 6 at Perth Stadium.

'LEGENDARY MOMENT' - KAVANAGH UPSETS EX-CHAMPION MORENO

Britain's Lone'er Kavanagh claimed the biggest win of his career as he upset former UFC flyweight champion Brandon Moreno in Mexico City. Kavanagh, who took the fight on just three weeks' notice, delivered a mature display to win by unanimous decision 49-46, 48-47 and 48-47. Kavanagh, 26, was unranked heading into the contest, but victory over sixth-ranked Moreno - in front of the Mexican's home fans - will see him take a big leap towards the top end of the division. "I said before this fight - I live for legendary moments," said Kavanagh. "This is a legendary moment. Brandon is a legend. Two-time world



champ. I'm a big fan. I watched him when I was a kid. To get to fight him is amazing." Kavanagh took

the fight against two-time flyweight champion Moreno when his original opponent Asu Albamabayev

withdrew because of injury. The Briton came into the contest after the first defeat of his 11-fight career against Charles Johnson in August, but took control in the early stages against Moreno. Kavanagh kept Moreno at bay with a series of leg kicks, before hurting him with a flurry of punches midway through the second round. Moreno had more success in the third round, but Kavanagh regained control with more thudding leg kicks, before seeing out victory by defending a number of takedowns. The win was the 10th of Kavanagh's 11-fight career, while Moreno suffered a fourth defeat in his past six fights.

HOW DO LIONESSES SOLVE FULL-BACK SUCCESSION PROBLEM?



The Lionesses will be looking to win the Women's World Cup next year - but to accomplish that goal they may need to find a solution to their "full-back problem". At right-back, Lucy Bronze, 34, has been England's undisputed starter for the best part of a decade - but how long can she keep playing? And is there anyone following in her footsteps? There is even more ambiguity at left-back - with several centre-backs having filled the position in recent years, while striker Rachel Daly started every game there when England won the first of their back-to-back European titles in 2022. The full-back issue has not gone unnoticed at the Football Association - interim England Under-23s boss Lauren Smith admits they have been plotting a succession plan for more than 18 months. "You've probably been thinking 'hey, what's this full-back

problem?' And that's the same as we have been thinking a little bit over time," said Smith. "It's not something that is new to us. When I stepped into [my under-19s head coach] role, the conversation was happening about how we could maybe think differently or look differently for players in the pathway. "That work has been going on a long time. You are starting to see the fruits of it." In England's four friendly matches to end 2025, manager Sarina Wiegman started three different players at left-back, and Bronze and Maya Le Tissier at right-back. The Dutchwoman has made it clear she believes Le Tissier is the current back-up option for Bronze despite captaining Manchester United at centre-back. Versatile Washington Spirit defender Esme Morgan, who impressed at centre-back during Euro 2025.

GREEN WINS LPGA TITLE WITH HUSBAND AS CADDIE

=Australia's Hannah Green won the LPGA's Women's World Championship in Singapore after her husband stepped in as her caddie. With Green's usual caddie unable to leave the USA while he applies for a green card, her husband Jarryd Felton - who is a professional golfer - filled the role for the second time this year. Green, 29, carded a three-under-par 69 on Sunday to finish one shot clear of American Auston Kim and win this title for a second time. She married Felton in 2024 and has also caddied for her husband in the past. "It was absolutely a team effort over the last two weeks, and it's very special to share my seventh win, which is also my favourite number, with him," said Green. "My usual caddie is applying for a green card and couldn't leave the US, so it wasn't part of the



plan for the season. Luckily, my husband was able to pick up the bag for me." Green started the day tied for the lead with three-time major champion Minjee Lee, but took control with an early birdie followed by an eagle on the eighth hole. Green sank three more birdies on the

final nine, and - despite a nervous finish after bogeying her final two holes - ended on 14 under overall to win this tournament for the second time in three years, having triumphed in 2024. "I was feeling nervous and told Jarryd a couple of times that I wasn't comfortable. He reminded

me to take a deep breath, have a snack or even sip some water," she said. "I haven't played with this kind of adrenaline in a long time, and we handled it really well." England's Charley Hull, Mimi Rhodes and Lottie Woad all finished in a tie for 10th on six under.

CARRICK NOT INTERESTED IN PERSONAL GLASNER DUEL



Michael Carrick says the chance to inflict damage on one of the men thought to be a contender to be Manchester United's next head coach will not be a motivating factor in Sunday's game against Crystal Palace. Palace manager Oliver Glasner is second favourite for the permanent role with most bookmakers, despite a troubled campaign in which he has openly criticised his club's board, lost in the FA Cup to Macclesfield and fallen out with supporters amid a struggling Premier League campaign. Interim United boss Carrick is now the favourite, thanks to five wins and a draw from his six games in charge. It is a record which, after Aston Villa's shock defeat at Wolves on Friday, means United will go third in the table for the first time since the end of the 2022-23 campaign if they beat Palace at Old Trafford. That is enough of a motivation for Carrick, who says there is no personal element to his preparations at all. "It is not something that would cross my mind until you mentioned it," he said. "It doesn't make any differ-

ence whatsoever. "I have total respect for Crystal Palace and Oliver, in terms of the team that they are and the role they are doing. But it's the next game for us." Palace were ahead of United in the table when the two sides met on 30 November. One influential figure in United's 2-1 success that day, Matthijs de Ligt, has not played since because of a back injury. Fellow centre-half Lisandro Martinez missed Monday's win at Everton with a calf problem which Carrick regards as "a small issue" that will not keep the Argentine out "for very long". With fifth-placed Chelsea due to play Arsenal and Aston Villa in their next two games, this is looking like a chance for United to cement their position in the Champions League spots. It is an aim few thought likely when Ruben Amorim was sacked in January. "We are in a decent spot," Carrick said. "We feel like we are moving forwards, but it's just about what's in front of us, and trying to get to where we want to be, which is a little bit higher in the league. "That's literally all I'm worried about in the moment."




