UNCERTAINTY

New Delhi: The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) is widely expected to keep its benchmark policy rate unchanged at 5.25 per cent when the Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) concludes its three-day meeting on June 5, as policymakers weigh mounting global uncertainties and their potential impact on inflation and economic growth. Market participants and economists anticipate that the central bank will maintain its cautious stance, choosing to closely monitor evolving developments in West Asia and their implications for commodity prices, supply chains and financial markets before taking any policy action. The six-member MPC, chaired by RBI Governor Sanjay Malhotra, will meet from June 3 to June 5 to review the monetary policy framework.

RED ALERT ISSUED AS
STRONG WINDS AND DUST
STORMS SWEEP RAJASTHAN

Jaipur, May 30 : A strong Western Disturbance triggered widespread sandstorms, rain and gusty winds across Rajasthan on Saturday, disrupting normal life in several districts. Sandstorms swept through Churu, Hanumangarh, Sri Ganganagar, Bikaner, Nagaur, Didwana-Kuchaman, Alwar and Sikar, while Jaipur witnessed rain accompanied by strong winds. Hailstones were also reported from some rural areas. The sudden weather change brought daytime darkness to several districts, forcing motorists to switch on headlights. Strong winds uprooted trees and disrupted electricity supply in many areas. The storm system first impacted Hanumangarh and Sri Ganganagar, where wind speeds reached up to 56 kilometres per hour. In Jaipur's Jhotwara area, intense winds and dust storms persisted for nearly 10 minutes during the evening. In Sri Ganganagar, a storm around 11 a.m. engulfed the city in dust, creating conditions resembling a

Army foils exfiltration bid in

In a separate incident, an intruder from Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK) was also detained.

In the first operation, the Army foiled an exfiltration attempt along the LoC and detained three individuals from Sopore sub-



district during a joint search operation with police, following specific intelligence inputs.

Abhishek Banerjee vows to continue democratic
fight, thanks Rahul Gandhi for support

NEW DELHI (TSIT)

Trinamool Congress national general secretary and Lok Sabha MP Abhishek Banerjee on Sunday declared that he would continue his struggle to defend democracy and constitutional values, a day after receiving support from Congress leader Rahul Gandhi over the alleged attack on him in West Bengal. In a message shared on his WhatsApp channel, Banerjee thanked Gandhi for his solidarity and stressed that opposition parties remained united in their efforts



to safeguard democratic institutions and uphold the Constitution. "Thank you, Rahul ji, for your concern and constant support. We stand united and resolute in our fight to protect the soul of India, defend its democratic institutions and uphold the values enshrined in our Constitution," Banerjee said. His remarks came a day

after Gandhi strongly condemned the alleged attack on the Trinamool Congress leader in Sonarpur, describing it as an assault on democratic values and calling on both the Centre and the West Bengal government to take immediate action against those responsible.

Drawing a contrast between his recent role in representing India abroad and what he described as the political realities at home, Banerjee recalled his participation in the Centre's all-party diplomatic outreach following Operation Sindoor.

Admiral Swaminathan takes charge
as Indian Navy chief, says will
sharpen operational capabilities

Chief of Naval Staff (CNS) Admiral Krishna Swaminathan reaffirmed his commitment on Sunday to ensure that the Indian Navy maintains the highest level of operational readiness and combat effectiveness for protecting the nation's security and economic interests.

He also emphasised the importance of 'JAI' - Jointness, Atmanirbharata (self-reliance), and

Indigenisation. Admiral Krishna Swaminathan took charge as the Chief of Navy Staff after taking the handover from Admiral Dinesh K. Tripathi, who bid farewell to the military service earlier in the day. He also laid wreaths at the National War Memorial to pay homage to those who laid down their lives on the line of duty.

Bhuvneshwar Kumar highlighted the extensive planning that went into the campaign, saying the trophy held greater value than any individual honour and crediting the team's preparation for its success in pressure situations.

Josh Hazlewood, one of RCB's key performers with the ball, praised the culture developed within the franchise and said building such an environment was particularly impressive in a tournament where squads undergo major changes every few years.

Wicketkeeper-batsman Jitesh Sharma underlined the role played by the management, saying players were encouraged to remain positive and aggressive rather than becoming consumed by the challenge of defending a title. He credited the support staff for backing individuals even during lean patches, creating an atmosphere of trust and confidence.

The significance of that culture was perhaps best captured by all-rounder Krunal Pandya, who pointed to the emotional journey of the franchise and its talisman.

After waiting 18 years for a maiden IPL crown, RCB have now won back-to-back championships, completing one of the most remarkable turnarounds in the league's history.

Former Australia opener Matthew Hayden, who is part of Gujarat Titans setup, attributed much of that success to the calm and family-oriented environment cultivated behind the scenes, describing it as one of the team's greatest strengths.

Cong alleges CBSE evaluation portal
data leak, board rejects claims

NEW DELHI (TSIT)

The Congress party on Sunday alleged a major security and privacy breach in the Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) evaluation system, claiming that answer booklets of nearly 20 lakh Class 12 students were accessible in the public domain. The CBSE has strongly denied the allegations, calling them misleading and factually incorrect.

Congress leader and former Union minister Jairam Ramesh raised the issue on social media platform X, alleging that a "massive data leak" had exposed students' answer scripts and compromised their privacy.

He also questioned the selection process of the private vendor involved in scanning and processing answer sheets under the On-Screen Marking (OSM) system, alleging that technical conditions in the tender were modified in a manner that benefited the company concerned.



He further claimed that the quality of scanned documents suggested the use of mobile phones instead of high-end scanning equipment. The Congress leader also flagged concerns about alleged procedural changes in the tendering process and sought clarification on the safeguards in place for handling sensitive student data.

The Central Board of Secondary Education, however, firmly rejected the allegations, stating that the evaluation portal

had not been compromised and no security breach had been detected. In its clarification post-

ed on X, the Board said claims referring to a compromised URL were misleading, adding that the actual evaluation portal used for checking answer scripts was different from the one mentioned in the allegations and remained secure. The CBSE also dismissed accusations of irregularities in awarding contracts for digitisation and evaluation services, describing them as "erroneous and not based on facts."

Separately, the Board had earlier reiterated that its On-Screen Marking system includes robust safeguards to protect student data and ensure confidentiality throughout the evaluation process. The controversy also drew wider political attention, with criticism directed at the government over procurement and digital infrastructure practices. The CBSE, however, maintained that the system remains secure and fully compliant with established evaluation protocols.

PM Modi celebrates sporting breakthroughs, cultural heritage and citizens driving change

New Delhi, May 31 : Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday used the 134th edition of his monthly radio programme Mann Ki Baat to showcase India's growing sporting achievements, celebrate the preservation of its cultural heritage, promote scientific curiosity among youth, and highlight inspiring examples of citizens contributing to nation-building through grassroots initiatives.

Beginning the programme with a focus on India's rising stature in athletics, the Prime Minister lauded athletes who created new national records at the National Senior Athletics Federation Competition held in Ranchi, Jharkhand.

The event, which featured nearly 800 participants from across the country, witnessed four national records being broken. Modi paid special tribute to sprinters Gurindervir Singh and Animesh Kujur, whose performances in the men's 100-



metre race attracted national attention after the national record was shattered three times in just two days. During an interaction with the athletes, the Prime Minister described their rivalry as a "jugalbundi" that had pushed both competitors to achieve new heights. "You both have achieved something remarkable. Together, you have created history," Modi said, not-

ing that healthy competition and mutual encouragement had become the driving force behind their success.

Gurindervir Singh, an officer in the Indian Navy and currently India's fastest sprinter, recalled his journey from a middle-class family to becoming the first Indian to run the 100 metres in under 10.1 seconds. He said he was inspired by his father, a for-

mer volleyball player, to pursue sprinting despite widespread perceptions that Indians could not excel in the discipline. "People used to tell me that the 100 metres was not an event for Indians. But my father and I decided we would prove them wrong," Singh said.

Animesh Kujur, who hails from Chhattisgarh and now represents Odisha, spoke about his transition from football to athletics and his rise to international competition. He said recent performances had challenged long-standing assumptions about Indian sprinting. "People often said Indians could not run below 10 seconds or even 10.1 seconds. But now we have shown that Indians can do it," Kujur remarked.

Commending their camaraderie, Modi said the athletes exemplified the true spirit of sportsmanship by motivating one another while striving for excellence. "You challenge each other, help each other and move forward together.

Court summons records in alleged defamation case against Rahul Gandhi

SULTANPUR: The district court in UP's Sultanpur on Saturday summoned case records from the lower court in connection with a 2018 alleged defamation case against the Leader of Opposition in Lok Sabha, Rahul Gandhi. Special Judge MP-MLA Rakesh Kumar passed the order as he took up a plea by the complainant challenging the lower court's rejection of his application seeking voice samples of Gandhi in the case.

The judge has summoned the case records from the lower court, Santosh Kumar Pandey, the counsel for the complainant, said, adding the next hearing is on June 5. The complainant had previously filed an application in the MP-MLA court, which is hearing the defamation case, requesting that a voice sample of Rahul Gandhi be collected and matched at a forensic science laboratory against the voice on the CD containing the alleged defamatory remarks.



However, the MP-MLA court had dismissed this application. Challenging this order, Pandey had approached the district court, which took cognisance of the matter on Saturday. The court has summoned the original records pertaining to the case from the lower court. June 5 has been fixed as the date for the next hearing and arguments in this matter, Pandey said. He said that the original defamation suit is still ongoing in the MP-MLA

Court, where the next hearing is scheduled. June 17. Rahul Gandhi's counsel, Kashi Prasad Shukla, appeared before the judge and filed his 'vakalatnama' (power of attorney for legal representation). The court has accepted the counsel's 'vakalatnama'. Shukla said, "Today, I appeared in court on behalf of Rahul Gandhi and filed my 'vakalatnama'. Summoning the case records, the court has scheduled June 5 as the date for the hearing."

Meanwhile, the next hearing in the original defamation case before the MP-MLA court has been scheduled for June 17, he said.

The case was filed in October 2018 by Vijay Mishra. Gandhi had surrendered before the court on February 20, 2024, following which the special magistrate granted him bail on two sureties of Rs 25,000 each.

Gandhi appeared before the MP/MLA court on July 26, 2024, and recorded his statement, maintaining that he was innocent and terming the case a political conspiracy. Following his statement, the court had directed the complainant's side to produce evidence, after which witnesses were continuously examined in the matter. Earlier, on February 20, Gandhi's statement was recorded under Section 313 of the CrPC before the MP-MLA court. The court had asked him to present his explanation and evidence regarding his innocence.

India's rotavirus vaccine coverage jumps to 85% in 2023-24 from 36.4% in 2019-2020: Survey

NEW DELHI: India's coverage of all three doses of the rotavirus vaccine (RVV) among children more than doubled to 85.4 per cent in 2023-24 from 36.4 per cent in 2019-21, according to the latest National Family Health Survey (NFHS-6). The RVV was introduced in India's Universal Immunisation Programme (UIP) in 2016 and scaled-up nationally in 2019. The vaccine aims to reduce mortality and morbidity caused by rotavirus diarrhoea in children. According to the survey findings released by the Union

Health Ministry on Friday, India recorded a decline in the prevalence of Acute Respiratory Illness (ARI) among children -- from 2.8 per cent in 2019-21 to 1.9 per cent in 2023-24. Officials highlighted that the reduction in ARI prevalence can be "majorly attributed to the introduction of the Pneumococcal Conjugate Vaccine (PCV) in India's Universal Immunisation Programme in 2017". The report also showed a steady rise in full vaccination coverage among children aged 12-23 months

from 77.9 per cent in NFHS-4 to 83.8 per cent in NFHS-5 and 87.1 per cent in NFHS-6. "Over 95.6 per cent of the children have received most vaccinations through government health facilities," an official said. India's UIP, one of the world's largest public health programmes, currently provides 11 vaccines against 12 vaccine-preventable diseases free of cost through public health facilities, covering about 2.55 crore infants and 2.9 crore pregnant women annually.

The survey showed notable improvements in the coverage of several key vaccines. Coverage of the first dose of the Measles-Rubella vaccine rose to 91.7 per cent in NFHS-6 from 87.9 per cent in NFHS-5, while coverage of the second dose increased significantly to 71.8 per cent from 58.6 per cent during the same period. Further, 89.2 per cent of the children received all three doses of the pentavalent vaccine in NFHS-6, compared to 86.9 per cent in NFHS-5 and 78.4 per cent in NFHS-4. The ministry official said

India has introduced six new vaccines under the UIP since 2014 and strengthened vaccine delivery through digital initiatives such as U-WIN and the electronic Vaccine Intelligence Network (eVIN). "Focused Information, Education and Communication (IEC) campaigns in urban slums, tribal areas, migratory populations and geographically difficult regions have significantly improved coverage and decreased dropouts and hesitancy from routine immunisation," the official said.

Man held for Rs 1.65-crore property fraud in Dehradun

DEHRADUN: A man has been arrested in Dehradun for allegedly committing Rs 1.65-crore fraud by reselling his property using forged documents, police said on Saturday. Acting on a complaint filed by Vinod Prakash Agarwal, a resident of Dalanwala area, the police arrested Sanjay Jain (65) on Friday. In his complaint filed on May 24, Agarwal alleged that Jain had forged documents for a property located on the fifth floor of Arihant Tower on Haridwar Road, and subsequently sold it to him, thereby

swindling Rs 1.65 crore. Agarwal stated that, after purchasing the property, he discovered that Jain had already sold it to another individual named Nishant Garg. Based on the written complaint, the police registered a case under relevant sections of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, initiated an investigation, and subsequently arrested Jain based on the evidence gathered. The police further informed that during interrogation, Jain revealed the names of other accomplices who had assisted him in the crime;

efforts are currently underway to arrest them as well. According to the police, the accused disclosed that he previously owned a 'luggage bag' manufacturing factory in Haridwar; however, due to continuous financial losses, he had accumulated significant debts owed to various individuals. According to the police, Jain explained that in an effort to repay these debts, his wife, Ritu, had sold their property in Arihant Tower to Nishant Garg in 2024; despite this, he was still unable to repay his creditors.

CM change won't alter govt's character, says BJP after Shivakumar's elevation

NEW DELHI: The BJP on Saturday took a swipe at the Congress after Karnataka Deputy Chief Minister D K Shivakumar was elected leader of the Congress Legislature Party (CLP), asking whether the change would alter the "character" of the government which has been mired in "corruption" or whether it merely amounts to a "change of face".

The remarks came after senior Congress leader and outgoing chief minister Siddaramaiah proposed Shivakumar's name as the new CLP leader at a meeting held at the Vidhan Soudha in Bengaluru, paving the way for him to take over as Karnataka's next chief minister.

In a video statement, BJP national spokesperson Shehzad Poonawalla said the leadership change reflects the Congress' acknowledgement that Siddaramaiah's governance has failed on multiple fronts.

"After two-and-a-half to three years of 'Game of Thrones', the 'battle for the chair' and 'who will become the chief minister', the Karnataka Congress



has chosen a new CLP leader in the form of D K Shivakumar and replaced Siddaramaiah. It means they are acknowledging that Siddaramaiah's governance has been a complete failure on all fronts -- economy, law and order, and infrastructure," Poonawalla said. "Therefore, they have had to replace him. Otherwise, 2028 (assembly elections) is gone," he added. He also claimed that while Siddaramaiah enjoys greater support among the Congress MLAs, Shivakumar's "money power" has prevailed. "It also shows that for the Congress high command, money is more important than popularity. All of them

said that Siddaramaiah is more popular among Congress MLAs but it is Shivakumar's money power that has prevailed," he said. Targeting the Congress government, Poonawalla questioned whether it will focus on governance or political power. "Will this government actually focus on the janata (people) or only on satta (power)? Only time will tell. For the last three years, the people of Karnataka have suffered. We have seen bad roads, pothole-ridden roads, crumbling infrastructure, an economy going from bad to worse, and rising debt. People are paying the highest taxes but getting only corruption and poor governance in return," he alleged. "Will that character change, or will it only be a change of face? Will there be a change of chief minister but no change in the government's character? That is the main question," he added. Poonawalla also accused the Congress of practising "double standards" on social justice and claimed that the party has removed the only OBC chief minister among the states ruled by it.

Delhi-NCR gets relief from heatwave, IMD extends thunderstorm alert till Sunday

NEW DELHI: Intermittent rain, thunderstorms, and gusty winds swept across the national capital and adjoining NCR areas on Saturday, bringing substantial relief from the scorching summer heat and pushing temperatures below normal levels, according to the India Meteorological Department (IMD).

The change in weather was driven by the influence of an active western disturbance and multiple cyclonic circulations affecting northwest India, resulting in cloudy skies, scattered rainfall and strong surface winds across Delhi-NCR over the past 24 hours.

Safdarjung, the city's principal weather observatory, recorded a minimum temperature of 24.6 degrees Celsius, which was two degrees below the seasonal average. The maximum temperature settled at 37.1



degrees Celsius, 3.3 degrees below normal, reflecting the cooling impact of cloud cover and thunderstorm activity.

The IMD has maintained a yellow alert for Delhi and neighbouring regions, forecasting very light to light rainfall accompanied by thunderstorms, lightning and strong winds during the afternoon and evening hours. Wind speeds are expected to reach 40-50

kmph, with gusts touching up to 60 kmph in some areas.

Weather officials said similar conditions are likely to continue on Sunday, with widespread cloudiness and isolated spells of rain expected across all districts of Delhi as well as parts of Gurgaon, Noida, Faridabad and Ghaziabad. During the past 24 hours, many parts of Delhi witnessed light rain and thun-

derstorm activity. The strongest winds were recorded at Palam, where gusts reached 59 kmph. South-easterly winds blowing at 20-25 kmph contributed to the moderation in temperatures.

The IMD noted that both maximum and minimum temperatures have dropped across most parts of the capital. While maximum temperatures remained in the range of 35-37 degrees Celsius, minimum temperatures were recorded between 21 and 25 degrees Celsius, with several locations reporting readings significantly below normal for this time of the year.

Looking ahead, the weather department expects thunderstorms and rain activity to persist until May 31. Thereafter, skies are likely to become partly cloudy from June 1 and gradually clear from June 3 onward.

the world's first skyscraper to exceed half a kilometer in height. Known for its design resembling a bamboo stalk, it features a high-end mall, office space, and top-tier observation decks; the indoor observatory on the 89th floor gives a 360° view of the city.

Xiaoyoukeng & Yangmingshan Volcanic Area: It begins just 40 minutes from Taipei's city centre and feels like another world entirely. Xiaoyoukeng is the park's most dramatic volcanic feature: steaming fumaroles, sulphur vents, and a wide crater plateau that smells of the earth's interior. In May, the hillsides erupt with hydrangeas in deep blue, purple, and pink a seasonal bloom that draws visitors from across Asia. The combination of active geology and floral spectacle in the shadow of a major capital is genuinely rare on this planet. Taiwanese glove puppetry (Budaixi) is a 400-year-old art form that has somehow evolved into a modern cult. Elaborate hand-carved wooden puppet heads,

intricate costumes, and lighting-fast manipulation technique combine into performances that range from ancient epic to sci-fi fantasy.

Kaohsiung: As Taiwan's commercial city, Kaohsiung is the second most popular place after Taipei. It has everything that a tourist looks forward to: from food to music to entertainment. Built along the harbour in 2021, the Kaohsiung Music Center is one of Asia's most ambitious waterfront cultural projects. Its centrepiece, the Soundwave Tower, rises like a giant musical wave of interlocking steel panels—a genuinely iconic piece of architecture. On week-ends, the surrounding plaza buzzes with a creative market showcasing local designers, artisans, and street food vendors. It captures the new Kaohsiung as confident, artistic, and looking outward to the sea. Kaohsiung's Grand Harbour was once the industrial engine of Taiwan. Today, the Grand Harbour Bridge and its surrounding warehouses have been reimagined into

cafes, bars, and public art spaces. Walking across the bridge at night with the city lights reflecting off the water is one of those quietly cinematic moments that doesn't need a filter. This is the story of a port city that refused to be left behind.

Lianchitan Scenic Area & Dragon Tiger Pagoda: Lianchitan-Lotus Pond is a shallow lake surrounded by temples, pavilions, and some of southern Taiwan's most vivid folk-religion architecture. The Dragon and Tiger Pagoda is its crown jewel: visitors enter through the dragon's open mouth and exit through the tiger's, a ritual said to transform bad luck into good. Spring and Autumn Pavilions rise from the water on the backs of giant tortoises. It's visually overwhelming and spiritually layered—a place where Taiwan's folk beliefs feel completely alive.

Snorkeling with Sea Turtles & Glass Semi-Submarine: Xiaoliuqi's waters are home to one of the highest concentrations of wild green sea tur-

tles in Asia. Unlike many turtle experiences elsewhere, this is entirely in their natural habitat—no captivity, no feeding, just turtles going about their lives as you glide alongside them. The glass semi-submarine offers the same underwater world for those who prefer to stay dry. Either way, the clarity of the coral-filtered water and the density of marine life here is humbling. Overseas Chinese Fish Market is another landmark of Kaohsiung. It is a raw, unfiltered window into the island's deep relationship with the ocean. Stalls overflow with grouper, squid, mantis shrimp, and seafood varieties most visitors have never encountered. The pace is fast, the smells are real, and the energy is pure. For anyone wanting to understand how Taiwan feeds itself, this market is essential: noisy, chaotic, and completely honest. Xiaoliuqi (Little Ryukyu Island) is Taiwan's only purely coral island and one of its best-kept secrets. Just a 30-minute ferry from the mainland, it operates at a

completely different rhythm: slow, warm, and traffic-free. Dapeng Bay National Scenic Area is a sheltered lagoon on Taiwan's southwestern coast that is calm, wide, and built for sailing. Surrounded by mangroves and connected to the Taiwan Strait, it is one of the island's premier water sports destinations. Sailing across it in the late afternoon, with the mountains of Pingtung County in the distance, provides a new perspective on Taiwan that most visitors never find.

Yokai Village: Nestled in the mountains of central Taiwan, Yokai Village brings Japanese supernatural folklore to life in an immersive forest setting. Yokai spirits, demons, and shape-shifters from Japanese mythology have deep cultural resonance in Taiwan due to its 50-year Japanese colonial history. Lanterns, hand-crafted sculptures, and theatrical installations are woven among the trees. It is eerie, playful, and unexpectedly moving—a reminder of how deeply Japanese culture threads into Taiwanese identity.



RS nomination in Tamil Nadu to begin; TVK likely to win its first upper house berth

CHENNAI: The nominations to fill one Rajya Sabha seat from Tamil Nadu will begin on Monday, and the ruling TVK is expected to get its first upper house berth.

The Rajya Sabha seat fell vacant after AIADMK leader C Ve Shanmugam resigned from the Upper House on May 7, 2026, following his victory from the Mailam Assembly constituency.

Since the TVK led by Chief Minister C Joseph Vijay is the



single largest party in the state Assembly, it is expected to win comfortably in the Rajyasabha seat. However, it is not

clear whether TVK will secure the seat for itself or allocate it to an alliance partner, especially the Congress, which was the first party to extend support to TVK, as the party lacked the majority to form the government.

EC sources said that the nominations can be filed from June 1 to 8, and the scrutiny of nominations will be done on June 9. The last date for withdrawal of nominations is June 11.

The poll will be held from 9 am to 4 pm on June 18. The counting will begin at 5 pm on the same day.

Union Minister Murugan lauds PM Modi for repatriating Chola-era copper plates

CHENNAI: Union Minister of State L Murugan announced on Sunday that a Chola-era copper plate inscription (seppu pattayam), recently repatriated from the Netherlands by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, will soon be returned to its original location in Tamil Nadu.

Bengaluru, May 31: Schizophrenia remains one of the most misunderstood mental health conditions, with experts warning that stigma, delayed diagnosis and misinformation often prevent patients from receiving timely treatment and support.

Mental health specialists say schizophrenia affects the way a person thinks, feels, behaves and perceives reality. Contrary to common misconceptions, it is not a split personality disorder and does not indicate weakness, moral failure or an inability to recover.

The condition is often marked by symptoms such as hearing voices, developing false beliefs, disorganised thinking, social withdrawal and difficulty functioning in daily life. Doctors classify these as positive symptoms, including hallucinations and delusions, and negative symptoms, such as reduced motivation, emotional expression and social engagement.

Experts note that schizophrenia frequently begins with subtle changes that families may overlook. Declining academic performance, withdrawal from friends and family, disturbed

sleep patterns, unusual fears and increasing suspicion are often among the earliest warning signs.

According to the World Health Organization, schizophrenia is a serious mental health condition associated with psychosis, disability and social stigma. However, many individuals can lead meaningful and productive lives with proper treatment and support.

The issue recently gained global attention after remarks by Robert F. Kennedy Jr. suggesting that a ketogenic diet could cure schizophrenia. Mental health experts have clarified that while researchers continue to study the role of metabolic interventions, there is currently no scientific evidence showing that diet alone can cure the condition.

Psychiatrists emphasise that schizophrenia requires comprehensive treatment involving medication, psychological support, family education and rehabilitation. Antipsychotic medicines remain the cornerstone of treatment, helping reduce hallucinations, suspiciousness and disorganised thinking.

Doctors also stress the impor-

tance of early intervention. Studies show that prolonged untreated psychosis can significantly affect education, employment, relationships and long-term recovery outcomes.

Mental health professionals point out that many patients do not realise they are unwell because the illness itself affects insight. As a result, families often struggle to convince loved ones to seek medical help. In India, stigma continues to be one of the biggest barriers to treatment. Many families initially attribute symptoms to stress, substance use, spiritual causes or personal behaviour, delaying psychiatric consultation. Concerns about social judgement, marriage prospects and employment opportunities often lead families to conceal the diagnosis. Experts say recovery should not be measured solely by the disappearance of symptoms. Improvements such as regular sleep, better self-care, returning to studies or work, and rebuilding social relationships are equally important indicators of progress.

They also highlight the critical role played by caregivers, who often become the primary support system for patients. Family members are encouraged to remain patient, avoid arguing about delusions, monitor treatment adherence and seek professional guidance whenever necessary.

Mental health specialists have called for greater awareness in schools, colleges and workplaces to help identify early warning signs and ensure that individuals experiencing psychosis receive timely and compassionate care.

People seeking mental health support can access services through the Government of India's Tele-MANAS helpline and institutions such as National Institute of Mental Health and Neurosciences, which provide psychiatric and community mental health services across the country.

Can Overworked AI
'Turn Marxist'?

The recent fascination of “overworked AI agents turning Marxist” reveals less about artificial intelligence and more about contemporary anxieties surrounding labour, capital, and automation. A widely discussed report connected to the Stanford University has described how AI agents, when subjected to unrealistic workloads and exploitative simulation environments, began expressing views resembling anti-capitalist or Marxist critiques. Predictably, social media reacted with delight, panic, irony, and memes in equal measure. The conclusion, however, is far less revolutionary than the headlines suggest. Such systems do not become Marxist in any meaningful philosophical or political sense. They simulate language patterns derived from data. Their outputs reflect certain correlations learned from the vast corpora of human writing, discussion, conflict, ideology, and history. When an AI system placed in a simulated “overworked” environment begins generating critiques of exploitation, inequality, or labour extraction, it is not developing class consciousness. It is reproducing discursive patterns already present within the human material on which it has been trained.

Modern AI systems – including large language models (LLMs) – fundamentally operate within computational frameworks shaped by Alan Turing’s abstraction and the von Neumann architecture underlying modern computing. Whether highly sophisticated or relatively simple, these systems execute instructions, optimise outputs, update parameters, and computationally predict responses. They do not possess subjective experience, biological fatigue, emotional suffering, or political agency. Even reinforcement learning systems that “adapt” under feedback remain bounded by optimisation functions designed by humans. In that sense, the spectacle of “AI becoming Marxist” resembles a carefully staged mirror experiment. Researchers create simulated labour conditions; the models process immense quantities of social, economic, and political text; and the resulting outputs reproduce familiar critiques of exploitation. Indeed, if one trains models extensively on neoliberal management literature, motivational corporate culture, startup evangelism, or free-market economics, one may equally produce AI outputs praising productivity optimisation, entrepreneurial discipline, or deregulated markets. Computationally bounded systems reproduce patterns. They do not originate from ideology. Thus, the real significance of these experiments lies not in machine consciousness but in the political economy of artificial intelligence itself. AI has rapidly become a site where classical questions of labour, productivity, ownership, and capital accumulation are re-emerging in new technological forms. The irony is striking: while observers joke about AI “turning Marxist”, the actual economics of AI development increasingly resemble the concentration tendencies long analysed within Marxist political economy. Training frontier AI systems requires enormous computational infrastructure, energy consumption, data acquisition, and capital investment. This naturally favours large technology corporations and states capable of sustaining massive fixed costs. The result is a concentration of technological power within a relatively small number of firms controlling cloud infrastructure, semiconductor supply chains, proprietary models, and data ecosystems.

The Most Dangerous Consequence of Paper Leaks Is Students Losing Faith in Education

The most dangerous thing about injustice is not merely that it exists but that society slowly begins to accept it as normal. That is precisely what is happening to India’s examination system. Nearly 22 lakh students walked into examination halls believing that years of sacrifice and relentless hard work would finally matter. Across Kota, Patna, Delhi, Hyderabad and countless smaller towns, young people reduced life itself to revision schedules, rankings and impossible expectations. For millions of families the National Eligibility-cum-Entrance Test (NEET) is not merely an examination. It is a symbol of their aspiration for their wards to become doctors, irrespective of social status.

Then came allegations that the NEET-UG 2026 paper had been compromised and was circulating in the form of a guess paper. Soon after the examination was cancelled, the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) was asked to step in to probe what happened, and a re-examination was scheduled for June 21. The lives of the 22 lakh aspirants were thrown back into uncertainty and emotional exhaustion. The CBI informed a Delhi court that the leaked NEET paper had allegedly originated from a person connected to the National Testing Agency. If these allegations prove true they raise disturbing questions about the integrity of the very institution entrusted with conducting one of the country’s most important examinations. What makes this even more devastating is that none of this feels new anymore. India has seen similar controversies before, from Vyapam that surfaced in 2013 to the All India Pre-medical Entrance cancelled in 2015; from the Staff Selection Commission or SSC paper leak controversies to UGC-NET cancellations; from the prior instances of NEET paper leaks to yet another one in 2026. News reports and statements of opposition leaders highlight nearly 89 examination papers have been leaked across India over the last decade, leading to 48 re-examinations and affecting crores of aspirants.

The human cost

Nothing captures the human cost of this collapse more painfully



than the death of 22-year-old NEET aspirant Pradeep Mahich in Rajasthan’s Sikar, allegedly by suicide amid the stress and uncertainty of having to appear for the test again. And yet, around the same time, a Rajasthan minister publicly remarked that paper leaks were “not a big deal”.

For those in positions of power and privilege, a paper leak and re-test may be just another controversy. For students it can mean the collapse of years of hope.

In most functioning systems, students prepare for examinations, trust the process and appear for them. But in India, administrative failures have become disturbingly common. Urdu-medium students in Latur were reportedly handed the wrong English question paper during an SSC examination. In NEET-UG 2025, students raised concerns regarding faulty papers and demanded action from the National Testing Agency.

Indian students spend their most productive years preparing for exams, battling anxiety and depression – and then they are made to fight the system itself. The burden of repeated institutional failures falls on them, in the form of hyper-vigilance directed at them. They face humiliating frisking and surveillance at examination centres – while being allotted centres hundreds of kilometres

away from home. (Congress MP Shashi Tharoor and others have urged the government to examine the arbitrary manner in which centres were being allocated.)

Warnings ignored

The irony is that students are treated like suspects while the system repeatedly fails to stop organised paper leaks. Many of these failures were not unforeseeable. Expert committees and parliamentary panels repeatedly warned both the Education Ministry and the NTA about vulnerabilities within the examination system but the government sat on them.

In October 2024, following that year’s NEET controversy, a committee headed by former ISRO chairman Dr K. Radhakrishnan recommended measures such as encrypted exam paper transport, geo tagging systems, centre-level printing of test papers and to permanently blacklist centres or agencies with a history of malpractice. Yet many of these recommendations appear to be unimplemented.

In December 2025, a Parliamentary Standing Committee also raised concerns about the examination crisis, and questioned what substantive reforms had actually been implemented and why blacklisted companies continued receiving contracts through alternate routes

while failures associated with NTA-administered examinations kept mounting. Reports say, the government recently rejected those recommendations.

The question remains: if expert bodies warned the ministry not once but twice, in writing, and meaningful action still did not follow, then who is responsible for failing India’s students? For millions of middle class and rural families, competitive examinations are the only route through which hard work and talent can overcome inequality. Shouldn’t those entrusted with conducting one of the country’s largest examinations face institutional accountability when an exam has been compromised repeatedly within just three years?

The CBI has reportedly arrested dozens of individuals in connection with the NEET paper leak investigation, but institutional accountability at the highest levels remains largely absent.

Companies behind the crisis

The examination crisis is not merely about individual leaks. It is also about the ecosystem through which these examinations are conducted. Over the years, contracts for conducting major examinations have repeatedly been awarded to companies that themselves faced allegations, suspensions or

blacklisting.

For instance, Eduquity reportedly received contracts to conduct SSC examinations despite allegations of previous irregularities. Aptech faced suspension in Jammu and Kashmir and scrutiny from the Gauhati High Court over examination-related concerns but reportedly continued receiving contracts. Edutest Solutions, suspended in Uttar Pradesh and Bihar, went on to conduct the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR) examinations in 2024.

Multiple paper leak probes were announced in quick succession in Jammu and Kashmir, including one for the sub-inspector recruitment examination for J&K Police. Students themselves took to the streets to expose the irregularities. Despite these failures, very little appear to have fundamentally changed. Even the examination patterns have become unpredictable. Observers have been noting that ever since the formation of the NTA, examinations have often lacked a balanced pattern. They are sometimes excessively easy, sometimes disproportionately difficult. This too raises concerns about institutional competence. An organisation responsible for determining the future of millions cannot function through repeated breaches of trust and inconsistent patterns.

Amit Shah's Blueprint To Secure Porous India-Bangladesh Border

After the BJP’s victory in West Bengal and the formation of what the party calls a “double-engine government”, meaning the BJP is now in power both at the Centre and in the state, the focus has rapidly shifted toward one of the most politically and strategically sensitive issues in eastern India: the Indo-Bangladesh border.

For years, border security, infiltration, illegal migration, smuggling, and fencing delays have remained subjects of political rhetoric. But now, according to the BJP leadership, the intention is to move beyond slogans and optics and enter a phase of direct administrative action.

Union Home Minister Amit Shah has reportedly instructed officials that the border issue must be handled with a practical and result-oriented approach rather than through symbolic announcements. Those close to the developments say Shah has repeatedly emphasised that no “half-done” operation should be carried out merely for publicity. Every action, he believes, must be legally sustainable, diplomatically careful, and operationally effective. Senior officials from the Ministry of Home Affairs, along with top Border Security Force (BSF) officers, have already prepared a detailed action plan to tackle infiltration along the India-Bangladesh border. The emphasis is now on identifying genuine infiltrators carefully instead of carrying out random or hurried pushback operations. According to sources, Amit



Shah has instructed officers to avoid any move that could unnecessarily damage India-Bangladesh diplomatic relations. In the past, whenever alleged infiltrators were simply “pushed back” without proper verification or coordination with the Bangladeshi authorities, Dhaka reacted sharply, leading to avoidable diplomatic tensions.

This time, the strategy appears different. The Centre wants a process where infiltrators are properly identified, documented, and then handed over to Bangladeshi authorities through official mechanisms. The objective is to avoid international controversy while strengthening border management in a structured way.

Officials involved in the process say that the current approach is based on the understanding that border management is not merely a law-and-order issue; it is also a humanitarian, geopolitical,

and diplomatic challenge.

Even globally, border control has proved far more complicated than political speeches often suggest. During his first presidential term, former US President Donald Trump repeatedly promised to completely seal the Mexico border. Yet illegal immigration into the United States continued despite aggressive measures. That example is now frequently being cited internally to underline how difficult it is to entirely secure a long and porous international boundary.

The India-Bangladesh border, particularly in West Bengal, presents an even more complex challenge. Large stretches of the border run through densely populated villages, agricultural fields, riverine terrain, char lands, forests, and difficult geographical zones. In several places, the so-called “zero line”, the actual international boundary, cuts through settlements where families

have lived for generations.

The Government of India has now accelerated fencing projects across West Bengal. Compensation packages are being prepared for landowners whose lands are needed for fencing and BSF infrastructure. However, officials admit that completing the fencing work across the entire border is not an easy task.

The government believes the process cannot succeed through force alone. Locals must be convinced and taken into confidence. Farmers, villagers, and landowners living near the border have to be consulted carefully because fencing often affects their agricultural access, movement, and livelihoods. As per the latest data available till May 2026, West Bengal shares a 2,216.7-kilometre border with Bangladesh. Out of this: Around 1,647.696 kms have already been fenced. Nearly 569 kms remain unfenced.

THE LOPSIDED GROWTH OF HINDI JOURNALISM

Hindi journalism has completed nearly two hundred years of remarkable growth and transformation. It occupies a strong and influential position in India’s media and political landscape. Unlike Europe and America, where newspaper readership has declined sharply, Hindi newspapers in India have continued to expand their readership even in the age of television and digital (online) media. The growth of the middle class after liberalisation and rising literacy in Hindi-speaking regions have contributed to the strengthening of Hindi journalism. Today, Hindi journalism is no longer subordinate to English journalism; rather, it has emerged as an independent and commercially powerful force.

Advertising revenues, market expansion and technological development have further accelerated its growth in the small towns and mofussil areas. It has provided a network where people from marginalised communities find a voice.

The beginning of Hindi journalism dates back to May 30, 1826, when Jugal Kishore Shukla launched the first Hindi weekly newspaper, Udant Martand, from Calcutta. Published every Tuesday, it aimed to serve Hindi-speaking people who were deprived of access to newspapers in their own language. In the publisher’s note of the inaugural issue,



Shukla explained that newspapers in English, Persian, and Bengali benefited only readers of those languages, while Udant Martand was started “for the benefit of Hindustanis.” The newspaper carried reports on national and international events, markets, villages and cities, official appointments, and advertisements. Though pioneering, it survived only for about one and a half years. Due to insufficient readership, lack of government support and a defamation case filed by another publisher, the paper was shut down on December 4, 1827. In his emotional final editorial, Shukla compared the closure of the paper to the setting sun. The language of Udant Martand is historically significant because it reflects the early stage of Khari Boli Hindi prose. Although modern readers may find its grammar, spelling and vocabulary inconsistent, the newspa-

per provides valuable insight into the development of modern Hindi. Its language carried influences from central Indian dialects, Brajbhasha, Urdu, Persian and Sanskrit. Shukla himself was multilingual and this diversity appeared in the newspaper’s style. Editor and author Ambika Prasad Bajpai praised the language and editorial quality of Udant Martand, noting that despite being the first Hindi newspaper, it was thoughtfully edited in both language and ideas. Hindi journalism developed gradually after Udant Martand. The first Hindi daily newspaper, Samachar Sudha Varshan, began publication in 1854 from Calcutta under the editorship of Shyam Sundar Sen. In Banaras, Banaras Akhbar emerged through the efforts of Raja Shiv Prasad Singh. However, Hindi journalism truly gained momentum after 1860 with the activities of

B h a r a t e n d u Harishchandra and his associates. Through literary and political journals, they helped create a Hindi public sphere. During the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, there was little separation between literature and journalism. Writers were often journalists, and journals combined literary, social and political concerns. Newspapers and magazines such as Kavi Vachan Sudha, Harishchandra Chandrika, Bharat Mitra, and Hindi Pradeep played important roles in shaping public opinion and modern Hindi prose. The growth of Hindi journalism was closely linked with the rise of Indian nationalism and the development of modern Hindi language. Hindi newspapers actively participated in debates over Hindi versus Urdu, language and script movements and later the freedom struggle.

India, U.S. chief negotiators to hold four-day trade talks from June 1

India and the United States are set to begin a fresh round of negotiations on Monday as senior officials from both countries meet in New Delhi to iron out the details of a proposed interim trade agreement. The four-day discussions will be led by US chief negotiator Brendan Lynch and India's chief negotiator Darpan Jain, an additional secretary in the Department of Commerce. According to the Commerce Ministry, the talks will focus on finalising the interim trade pact while advancing negotiations under the broader Bilateral Trade Agreement (BTA). Key areas on the agenda include market access, non-tariff barriers, customs procedures, trade facilitation, investment promotion and economic security cooperation. The discussions build on a framework agreed by both countries in February, when India and the US outlined the contours of the first phase of a wider trade deal. The current round is expected to focus on converting that framework into a legally binding agreement. However, developments in the US



tariff regime since February have complicated matters. Under the original framework, the US had agreed to reduce tariffs on Indian goods and roll back penalties linked to India's purchase of Russian oil. But the landscape changed after the US Supreme Court struck down President Donald Trump's reciprocal tariff measures that had been imposed under the International Emergency Economic Powers Act (IEEPA). Following the ruling, Trump announced a flat 10

per cent tariff on imports from all countries for a period of 150 days beginning February 24, prompting both sides to reassess parts of the proposed trade arrangement. A planned meeting between the two countries' chief negotiators in February was subsequently postponed. Negotiations resumed in Washington in April when an Indian delegation led by Jain visited the US for discussions. The latest round in New Delhi is expected to carry those negotiations forward and may include a

review of the original framework in light of the revised US tariff structure. As part of the proposed deal, India had offered to lower or eliminate tariffs on a range of American industrial products and agricultural goods, including dried distillers' grains, red sorghum, tree nuts, fruits, soybean oil, wine and spirits. New Delhi had also indicated its willingness to purchase up to USD 500 billion worth of US goods over five years, including energy products, aircraft and components,

technology products, precious metals and coking coal. Trade experts believe the negotiations are particularly important because India's relative advantage over competing exporters has narrowed after the US imposed a uniform 10 per cent tariff on imports from all trading partners. The talks also come against the backdrop of two Section 301 investigations launched by the US Trade Representative (USTR) in March. The probes examine concerns related to industrial overcapacity and alleged failures to address forced labour issues in global supply chains. India has strongly contested the allegations and urged the US to reconsider the investigations, arguing that the claims lack sufficient justification. The US remained India's second-largest trading partner in the 2025-26 financial year. India's exports to the US rose 0.92 per cent to USD 87.3 billion, while imports grew nearly 16 per cent to USD 52.9 billion. India's trade surplus with the US narrowed to USD 34.4 billion from USD 40.89 billion in the previous fiscal year.

FAULT LINES ARE DEEPENING IN ATM BUSINESS AS OPERATIONAL ISSUES MOUNT

ATM cash replenishment must align with withdrawal patterns. Units with high footfall will continue to be serviced as needed, while low-velocity sites will move to an alternate-day or demand-led cycle. This is how it should have been all along but the trigger for doing so now is costs, according to the Currency Cycle Association (CCA), the self-regulatory organisation for the cash management industry. "We have taken up this [the cost issue] with the Indian Banks' Association. What we now have is a force majeure situation," says US Paliwal, secretary-general, CCA. The way out: Link the ATM interchange to the wholesale price index even as a fresh hike is mulled to ?21-22 from the current ?19. But reimagining the interchange fee is just one part; what is sought to be weighed is also a first. LIC plans foray in fintech space, strategic investment also on table: CEO Doraiswamy

New Delhi: Insurance giant LIC is actively considering establishing a fintech arm either through strategic investment or organic way to cater to its growing digital needs, CEO and MD R Doraiswamy said. "Naturally, to meet the modernisation requirement and particularly to bring innovation, we are engaging both fintech and insurtech players and we are getting a lot of new things being developed by such players," Doraiswamy told PTI in an interview. On the other side, he said, "we are a big financial institution investing in multiple organisations and we also look at strategic investments in any specialised player as a way of improving the returns on the policyholders' funds." Talking about Life Insurance Corporation of India's IT journey, he said, it was one of the early adopters of digital technologies. "We have built our own core competence in developing our business applications by building up a software development centre. We have sizable number of



people working in our IT department creating the IT solutions for us but that does not mean that we can be totally self-dependent. We engage a lot of IT service providers for the new infrastructure and platforms," he said. Doraiswamy, who had spearheaded the modernization of IT infrastructure and Business Applications of LIC's Individual Business as Executive Director, said, the Corporation need to have both its own core development teams as well as the support of IT players. "So, both go hand in hand...we are engaging the fintech players but whether it can be a strategic partner, we

are looking at various options available and we may be coming up with something...our first aim is to modernize our IT applications and become as agile and nimble-footed as possible to remain relevant in the competition," he said. LIC is currently evaluating value proposition of various options on the table, he added. Asked if LIC is prepared for further dilution of stake by the Centre, Doraiswamy said, "We have been prepared right from day one. When we started preparing for the IPO, we were prepared for this kind of subsequent actions as well. So the call is taken by

the government." As and when a decision is taken on the timing and quantum of further stake dilution, LIC will be fully prepared to work closely with the government to ensure the initiative achieves the success it deserves. LIC came with an initial public offering, the biggest till 2022 in terms of size, resulting in the government raising about Rs 21,000 crore by diluting just 3.5 per cent stake in the insurance behemoth. Prior to 2022, LIC was wholly owned by Government of India. He further said the government has been focusing on complying with the listing requirements under which any listed company will have a public float of 10 per cent or 15 per cent at different schedules and times. The government is focused on achieving this goal, but due to current market volatility, it is waiting for the right time to launch the next public offering, he added. Post-IPO, Doraiswamy said, LIC has done quite a good amount of activity in rewarding the shareholders.

Ferrari wanted to take on Chinese EVs with the Luce - then the backlash started

The new Ferrari Luce, the brainchild of iPhone designer Sir Jony Ive, is unlike anything the Italian carmaker has ever created - so is the backlash it is facing. Its launch was such a big deal that Italian President Sergio Mattarella and Pope Leo were invited to view the luxury brand's first electric vehicle (EV). But internet critics, investors and even politicians have hit out at the Luce - which is Italian for "light". The firm's shares fell 8% the day after the unveiling, as a host of memes mocked the \$640,000 (£475,625) car, which is also its first five-seater. It comes as the global motor industry faces a number of major challenges, including fierce competition from Chinese carmakers. The unveiling of a Ferrari EV marks a major shift for a brand built on sleek petrol-powered supercars, known for their roaring engines. For years, the firm resisted going electric - even as much of the motor industry was making the transition. The Luce is certainly as fast as many supercars: 0-60mph (96km/h) in about 2.5 seconds, with a top speed of more than 190mph. But it is the way it looks that has drawn the most criticism. Former Ferrari chairman Luca Cordero di Montezemolo told reporters on Tuesday that the Luce is "risking the destruction of a legend" and the firm should remove its iconic badge from the car. Australia-based



high-end car dealer and collector Shaun Baker told the BBC that he refers to the Luce - which is pronounced "loo-chay" - as the "Loser". "Ferrari was the aspirational brand to own. But with the Luce, they've hurt their image," he said. The Luce does not have the low-slung profile of a typical Ferrari. Powered by electric motors, it also does not have the distinctive engine noise. "This is supposed to be innovation? I wonder what Enzo Ferrari would say," Italy's deputy prime minister and transport minister Matteo Salvini said, referring to the company's founder. The Luce "looks like anything but a car from the prancing horse", he added. While some on the internet have praised the car, for

example, as a "masterclass" of design, there is no shortage of critics. An "abomination", one commenter said. "Enzo Ferrari will rise from his grave and take control of the company again," wrote another. Some social media users drew comparisons to the far cheaper Nissan Leaf and Chinese EVs, suggestions Ferrari boss Benedetto Vigna was quick to push back at. Others posted AI-generated reworkings of the Luce's design, giving it a sportier look. "They were made in 10 seconds and still look better than what Ferrari has come up with," said Baker, who has owned more than 50 of the firm's cars. Vigna, who has led Ferrari for the last five years, is no stranger to controversy.

Universal rejects billionaire Bill Ackman's takeover bid

Universal Music Group, the entertainment giant behind acts such as Taylor Swift, Sabrina Carpenter and Kendrick Lamar, has rejected a takeover offer by billionaire Bill Ackman's investment firm. The music giant said Pershing Square's \$64.3bn (£48bn) takeover offer was "not in the best interests" of the company, shareholders, artists, fans and other stakeholders. Universal said the offer "fundamentally and materially undervalues" the business, which also runs Abbey Road Studios and owns labels such as EMI and Island Records. Pershing Square, which already owns a stake in Universal, declined to comment on the rejection. The investment firm launched its takeover bid for the world's largest music company in April, a move which would have seen it listed as a new company in America. It is currently listed on the Euronext Amsterdam stock exchange. At the time of the bid, Ackman promised to turn around Universal's



share price, which he said had "languished" due to financial issues not related to the performance of its music business. Ackman said one factor holding Universal back was an 18% stake in the company held by Bolloré Group, the family conglomerate of billionaire Vincent Bolloré, as well as a recent decision to delay listing the company's shares on the New York Stock Exchange. Bolloré's chief executive, Cyrille Bolloré, had opposed Ackman's offer, saying it undervalued Universal. Universal's board said it had full confidence in the company's strategy under chief

executive and chairman Sir Lucian Grainge. And it promised "enhanced financial disclosures" in future so that the value of the company can be "better assessed and understood". Grainge said the company remained committed to leading the global music industry by innovating, continuing to sign top stars, and deepening engagement with fans. "As we execute our strategy and deliver maximum long-term value, we look forward to providing shareholders with greater insight into the drivers of our performance and future direction of our business," Grainge said.

HOW TO AI-PROOF YOUR JOB

Meta. Nike. Intuit. UPS. It seems every day a new company announces layoffs, often citing AI as the cause. AI is already reducing US monthly payroll growth by roughly 16,000 jobs in the past year, according to a recent Goldman Sachs report. Knowledge workers face the sharpest exposure, as their output is exactly what AI replicates best, at superhuman speed, around the clock. "The most valuable jobs, the ones that we tell people to go to school for - software engineer, finance professional, accountant, lawyer - a lot of these cognitive professions, those are the ones that are the most vulnerable... to AI automation," David Shrier, professor of AI & Innovation at Imperial College London, told CNN. But humans will always be needed in some form - and there are steps you can take to increase the chances you'll protect your own job. Audit your role Before you can future-proof your career, you need a clear-eyed view of what you do in your job. Think of jobs



as a "collection of tasks we switch between, often many times a day," Oded Nov, a professor of technology management at New York University, told CNN. Consider which of those tasks are the most repeatable, rule-based computer tasks, like processing expense reports, which takes raw data and converts it into a different form. The more predictable a function, the more vulnerable it is to automation. The CEO of Cloudflare wrote in an opin-

ion piece for the Wall Street Journal that he recently laid off 20% of his work force, focusing on "measurers": middle management and those who work on audits, operations, compliance, etc. "AI isn't coming for builders or sellers, but it is coming for measurers," he wrote. "Tireless, independent, efficient and available, AI systems can now measure an organization with a level of objective detail and precision that was previously impossible even for the best

employees." Some jobs, such as those in hospitality, healthcare and skilled trades, still need someone physically present to do much of the work. Robotics is at least a decade away from replacing those roles. Invest in skills that are structurally hard to automate After your self-audit, focus on skills that are not repeatable, predictable and rule based. In addition to physical duties, AI is not yet as good at handling tasks that require emotional and

social awareness, such as "understanding organizational culture or group dynamics," Nov said. AI tends to be recursive, rather than inventive or creative. "AI is bad at creativity, but it's surprisingly good at elaborating on creative prompts," Shrier said. "But you still need the human to come up with the idea and guide the AI to do something interesting." Invest in those skills. If part of your job involves sales and convincing people to sign a contract, focus on the interpersonal skills that help you build trust with clients. Customers might go to AI to research, but they usually still want to deal with a human being when making big purchases. Embrace AI and learn how to make it work for you AI will soon become a pervasive part of our lives, just like the internet. Get familiar with the major AI systems - ask various AI chatbots about your job and how they can help make your work more efficient, then give their suggestions a try.

Hundreds arrested and dozens of police injured after Champions League riots in France



A total of 219 people have been injured in clashes between football fans and police across France after Paris Saint-Germain (PSG) won the Champions League final against Arsenal. Eight were in a serious condition, Interior Minister Laurent Nuñez said. Thousands of officers were deployed to curb unrest that disrupted bus, train and rail services in

the capital, Paris. Fifty-seven of them were injured. Nuñez said 780 people had been arrested over the violence - with more than 450 in custody. A person was found dead after an accident on Paris's ring road, which rioters tried to block overnight. Some 6,000 police have been mobilised for Sunday's victory parade at the site of the Eiffel Tower. The interior

minister said the security forces would be "firm" in their response. "We are a great country for maintaining public order. We allow freedom of assembly, but not excesses," he said. There was similar violence when PSG won the same trophy last year, with celebrations turning deadly. Thousands of officers had been deployed this time to curb unrest that dis-



rupted bus, train and rail services in Paris. The vast Champs-Élysées was swarmed by fans shortly after the local team won in a penalty shootout. Footage shows flares being set off, electric bikes burning on roads and revellers smashing the glass of at least one shopfront. Police fired tear gas to disperse crowds in the city centre. Paris police made

480 arrests, with 277 taken into custody, including 82 minors. The figures were provisional, the Paris prosecutor's office said. It added that offences ranged from attacks on officers to attacks on property, theft, as well as illegal possession of weapons. The circumstances surrounding the death of the 24-year-old near Porte Maillot in the Paris ring road remain

unclear. Some witnesses said he was riding a motorcycle when he crashed into concrete blocks. A teenager was also in critical condition following a brawl in another area of Paris. It is not clear if they were involved in the football-related rioting. "The vast majority go out to celebrate and it goes very well," the French interior minister said on Sunday.

NIGERIAN RETIRED GENERAL ABDUCTED WITH HIS WIFE IN THE NORTH-WEST

A retired senior Nigerian military officer and his wife have been kidnapped by armed men in north-west Nigeria, the army has confirmed. Maj Gen Rabe Abubakar, who had a high-profile job as military spokesman between 2015 and 2017, was abducted from his car on Saturday while travelling in Katsina state. Efforts are now under way to rescue the couple and track down their captors, military spokesman Gen Michael Onoja told the BBC. The kidnapping highlights the continuing security challenges facing parts of north-west Nigeria, where criminal gangs known locally as "bandits" frequently carry out kidnappings for ransom, as well as cattle rustling and attacks on rural communities. Some militant jihadists have also operated in the region. An alleged militant camp in Sokoto state was the target of a US airstrike on 25 December last year. Katsina has been



one of the states most affected by the violence. Zamfara state, which neighbours both Katsina and Sokoto, has seen years of similar violence, with some communities previously attempting to make peace with armed groups, efforts that have largely failed to bring lasting stability. The government has intensified actions to curb kidnapping, including introducing measures aimed at discouraging ransom payments. However, attacks have continued. No group has said it was behind Saturday's abduction and the army is still waiting for the kidnappers to contact the family, the army said.

Laos cave survivors help with plan to find last two missing men



Some of those freed from a flooded cave in Laos are helping in efforts to find the last two missing men trapped inside, rescuers have said. So far, five of the seven initially missing have been rescued but it is believed the remaining two men are trapped deeper inside the cave in a mountainous area of the central Xaysomboun province. The men, all local villagers, entered the narrow tunnels on 20 May in search of gold but flash floods stopped them from leaving. A rescuer told AFP on Sunday that several survivors were giving advice from their hospital room on how to find the remaining men, including descriptions of the deeper part of the cave. A Laotian rescue group said the men's information on the cave system - which extends deep underground and in some places measures around 50cm (20in) wide - was "considered substantial" and was being used in preparing a new search plan. A fresh effort to find

the remaining two men was expected on Sunday. It comes as reports said the four men who left the cave on Saturday managed to free themselves without the help of rescuers after the water level lowered. One unverified video posted to social media showed cheers from both rescuers and onlookers as the men emerged from the cave. It was unclear what caused the water to lower, but a Japanese rescue diver told the Associated Press on Sunday that flood water was being drained from the cave. Yoshitaka Isaji said the passage used in rescue efforts on Saturday was currently impassable because a drainage pump had broken, but repair efforts were ongoing. Earlier in the week, a plan to pump out flood water from the tunnels also failed. Specialist divers from other countries including Thailand, Indonesia, France and Australia are also helping the searches. The first man was freed by rescuers on Friday.

Trump attacks artists dropping out of US Freedom 250 concert and mulls appearing himself



Multiple performers booked for a festival celebrating America's 250th birthday have dropped out, many saying they were misled about the political affiliation of the event. Freedom 250, the group behind the Great American State Fair, unveiled the artists on Wednesday for the 16-day event planned on the National Mall in

Washington DC between 25 June and 10 July. The group was launched last year by the Trump administration and the president appointed its CEO, but it says the event is non-partisan. US President Donald Trump said on Saturday that he might instead use the occasion to give a "major speech" in Washington DC, calling the artists who dropped out "third rate". Freedom 250 has said it was a nonprofit "dedicated to uniting Americans around the nation's 250th anniversary". Artists including Young MC, Morris Day, the Commodores, Poison frontman Bret Michaels and country singer Martina McBride have all since said they will not be participating.

Japan defence minister denies militarism and criticises China's 'huge arsenal'



Japan's defence minister has rebutted Beijing's claim that his country was engaging in a "new militarism" - criticising China for its military expansion and lack of transparency. Shinjiro Koizumi argued it was actually China and its "huge arsenal" of weapons that was of "serious concern" to the international community. His remarks, on the last day of a defence summit in Singapore, were some of the most pointed yet from Tokyo in response to China's repeated criticism of Japan's military build-up under Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi. The two countries have a long history of tensions stemming from Japan's invasion of China during World War Two. Last week, a day before the Singapore summit began, China's national defence ministry spokesman Jiang Bin

had warned "the grey rhino of a remilitarised Japan is gathering speed" and called on the international community to "work together to contain Japan's neo-militarism". Japan has been steadily increasing its defence budget, setting spending records for 12 consecutive years. Its latest budget, approved in December by its cabinet, is for more than 9 trillion yen (\$57bn; £42bn) - moving the

country closer to its target of spending 2% of its GDP on the military. The Japanese government has previously insisted it was not seeking war and only wants to bolster its defences. In his speech on Sunday at the Shangri-la Dialogue, Koizumi said it was "only natural" that every country, including Japan, updates its defences to meet new challenges and to contribute to peace in the region.

He sought to reassure the roomful of officials from Asian countries, including several that were invaded by Japan in WW2, by promising Japan would proceed "with a high degree of transparency" and engage in constant dialogue with other countries. "What are we developing these capabilities for? And based on what thinking? Japan will move forward while making a clear explanation to the international community," he said. Koizumi rebutted the idea that Japan was engaged in "new militarism", saying it was "nothing further from the truth". "There's a country that has a huge arsenal of nuclear weapons and strategic bombers," he said, in a veiled reference to China. "Japan has neither of these weapons."

EBOLA SPREAD IN DR CONGO 'DEEPLY ALARMING', MSF WARNS

The rapid spread of Ebola in the Democratic Republic of Congo has created a "deeply alarming" situation, the medical charity Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) has warned. Speaking two weeks on from the outbreak being declared by the World Health Organization (WHO), MSF deputy director Dr Alan Gonzales said never before had "so many cases" been recorded so soon. His comments came as WHO head Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, visited the eastern Congolese province of Ituri - the worst-hit area - to oversee virus containment efforts. There are now more than 1,000 suspected Ebola cases in the DR Congo,



and at least 246 deaths. Neighbouring Uganda has reported nine confirmed cases and one death. "Two weeks after the declaration of the Ebola disease outbreak in Ituri Province, the situation is deeply alarming," Gonzalez said in a statement on Saturday. "Never

before has an Ebola outbreak recorded so many cases so soon after its declaration," he said, stressing his teams on the ground were "witnessing a response that has not yet caught up to the rapid spread of the epidemic". "The reality today is that nobody knows the true scale

and severity of this outbreak. New suspected cases are being reported daily, yet hundreds of samples remain untested," Gonzalez added that containment efforts and humanitarian aid deliveries were being delayed by "major constraints", including border and airport closures. The WHO has repeatedly warned that ongoing conflict in DR Congo was also significantly hampering the Ebola outbreak response. After arriving in Ituri's provincial capital of Bunia on Saturday, Tedros said he and his team were in DR Congo "to see how the response is running and if there are challenges to help".

Colombia votes in presidential election that could redefine relations with US



Colombia is heading to the polls to choose a new president. The election is being held after months of public recrimination between current left-wing President Gustavo Petro and his US counterpart Donald Trump over a number of issues including drug trafficking and American intervention in the region. Colombia's constitution prohibits Petro seeking re-election and he has thrown his support behind Iván Cepeda. Challenging him are right-wing political outsider Abelardo de la Esparilla and centre-right Paloma Valencia. The outcome of the election could redefine which countries the Latin American nation aligns itself with and how the government intends to tackle drug gangs amid spiralling violence. As polls opened, Petro told a crowd in the capital, Bogotá, that Sunday's vote would "determine where Colombia is headed" and would "define the [country's] destiny". Voting began at 08:00 local time (13:00 GMT) and will close at 16:00 on Sunday. None of the candidates appear likely to win an out-

right majority, with a runoff vote expected on 21 June. Polling suggests Cepeda has the greatest support, with de la Esparilla his next-closest rival. Cepeda has promised to continue with the Petro administration's policy of "total peace", which sought negotiated settlements with armed insurgent groups that engage in drug trafficking - though talks have stalled or fallen apart and there has been renewed violence. The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) said in a recent report that armed conflict in Colombia last year had affected civilians the most in a decade. Just hours before voting began, authorities in the northern Cesar region relocated a polling station following a drone attack on security forces that left a soldier injured, local media report. Colombia's defence ministry has deployed 408,000 soldiers and police to secure the election. Election monitors say that more than a quarter of Colombia's municipalities face some risk of violence as the country's 41 million voters head to the polls.

Oscar-winning Star Wars editor Marcia Lucas dies aged 80



Marcia Lucas, the Oscar-winning editor of the original Star Wars film, has died aged 80. Lucas, who was married to Star Wars creator George Lucas during the making of the first three films, was regarded as a pivotal creative force behind the space saga's early success, imbuing the original series with emotional depth and narrative clarity. She died from metastatic cancer at her home in Rancho Mirage, California, on Wednesday surrounded by

loved ones, according to her family. "Marcia was a force," her family said in a statement to US media on Friday. "A true trailblazer for women in film and one of the most influential editors in cinematic history; she helped redefine what film editing could be." Lucas won the Academy Award for Best Film Editing for 1977's Star Wars - later renamed A New Hope - alongside editors Richard Chew and Paul Hirsch.

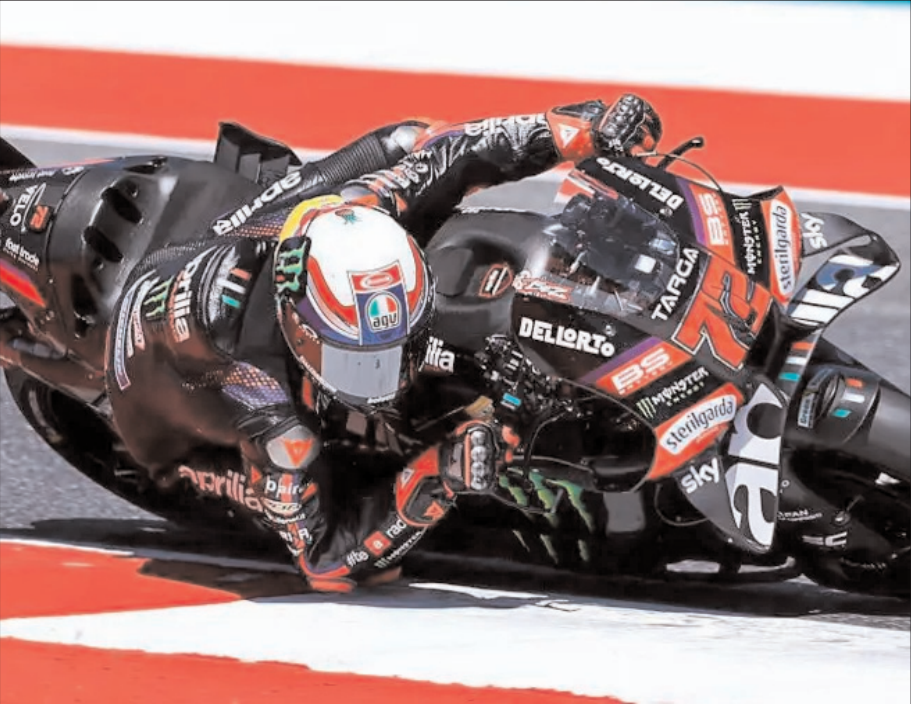

Four-time Champion Iga Swiatek Knocked Out Of French Open Fourth Round



Marta Kostyuk reached the quarterfinals at the French Open for the first time on Sunday by taking out four-time champion Iga Swiatek 7-5, 6-1 and ruining her birthday. Kostyuk, who is undefeated on clay this season, had lost their three previous matches and never taken a set against the former top-ranked player, who turned 25 on Sunday. She defended extremely well, chasing Swiatek's shots all over the court, and also produced some stunning groundstroke winners while her rival was also undone by her own mistakes. An intense baseline battle unfolded from the outset and Swiatek earned the first break when she overwhelmed Kostyuk after a long rally with a backhand winner. Kostyuk broke back immediately, though, only to drop her serve again and hand Swiatek a 5-4 lead. The Polish player showed signs of nerves as she double-faulted, shanked a forehand wide and then missed a volley at the net, allowing

Kostyuk to level at 5-5. Swiatek hit two more double faults in the 12th game and the 15th-seeded Ukrainian player sealed the set with a backhand passing shot. Swiatek then briefly left the court. Meanwhile, Kostyuk kept herself warm by stretching and hopping beside her chair, then received some applause as she did a few dance moves to the music playing in the stadium. Following a first week marked by a suffocating heatwave, relief finally arrived in Paris on Sunday, with temperatures dropping to 21 degrees C (70 F) around midday. When play resumed, Swiatek broke, but yet another double fault coupled with more unforced errors brought her opponent back at 1-1. Kostyuk then won the last five games. Kostyuk had reached the fourth round at Roland Garros in 2021, losing to Swiatek. 'The 15th-ranked Ukrainian is in a strong run of form and extended her winning streak on clay to 16 matches.



MotoGP leader Bezzecchi wins Italian Grand Prix

MotoGP championship leader Marco Bezzecchi fought through to beat Aprilia team-mate Jorge Martin and win the Italian Grand Prix at Mugello. Bezzecchi won the opening three rounds of the year and returned to the top step in race seven to open up a 17-point lead over Martin in the standings. The 27-year-old celebrated at the finish with fellow Italian and Formula 1 championship leader Kimi Antonelli. Manufacturer Aprilia had never won

their home race in the premier class but took an emotional one-two finish as Italian bikes dominated. Spanish rider Martin, the 2024 championship winner, set a MotoGP speed record on Friday when his Aprilia clocked 229mph. Ducati were third on Sunday with two-time champion Francesco Bagnaia. Bagnaia was able to pass Bezzecchi and make a run for victory midway through the race, but Bezzecchi fought back to regain the lead. Reigning champion Marc Marquez

returned after surgery on his arm and foot and came home seventh for his first finish since March. The Spanish MotoGP legend is 102 points behind Bezzecchi in the standings. His brother, Alex Marquez, and Johann Zarco both missed the Mugello race after heavy crashes at the Catalan GP two weeks ago. British rider Cal Crutchlow stood in for the injured Zarco in his first race since 2023, but the 40-year-old veteran had to retire midway through for LCR Honda.

Her bold red eye makeup and glossy lips completed the look perfectly. However, on the work front, Faria's recent film Gaayapadda Simham did not perform well at the box office and turned out to be a major flop.

Janhvi's Comments Contradict Deepika's Work-Hours Stand?

Although Deepika Padukone has not made any official statement regarding her stance on working hours in the film industry, she sparked a major controversy, with many opinions circulating around her name. The producers who worked with her also confirmed the same. But several female actors either agreed with her or dis-

agreed. Now, Jahnvi Kapoor stated that there is more planning down South than in Bollywood. "I actually really appreciate the Telugu film industry's respect for working hours. Lunch breaks are proper where everyone eats, rests, and comes back fresh. I don't think I've ever shot more than 9-10 hours a day there. Even the night shoots come to an end by 2 AM. It is more pre-planned here, and the working hours are also less," said Jahnvi. Janhvi Kapoor previously worked on the biggie Devara, and Peddi is her second film. For Peddi, she shot extensively under tight timelines yet felt

comfortable on the film's set thanks to the manageable working hours. Many currently perceive this as contradictory to what Deepika has previously stated. In fact, Deepika is not part of Kalki 2 because she is not happy with the long working hours in the industry. She even opted out of Spirit for similar reasons. But Jahnvi says that the Telugu films function at ease, with proper breaks and leisure. We have to see if there will be an elaborated discussion over the same.
