RAILWAYS TOLD TO PAY RS 25,000 AFTER RAC PASSENGER MADE TO SHARE BLANKET

New Delhi (TSIT): The Delhi State Consumer Disputes Redressal Commission has directed Indian Railways to pay Rs 25,000 in compensation to a passenger who was forced to share a blanket with a stranger during a train journey, holding the national transporter guilty of deficiency in service. In its order dated July 29, the commission awarded Rs 20,000 as compensation for mental harassment and physical inconvenience, along with Rs 5,000 towards litigation expenses. The bench, comprising commission president Monika Aggarwal Srivastava and members Rajender Dhar and Ritu Garodia, observed that the passenger, who travelled on a Reservation Against Cancellation (RAC) ticket, was entitled to separate linen despite sharing a berth with another passenger. The case relates to a journey from Prayagraj to Delhi in October 2022. The complainant alleged that the train attendant provided only one blanket, one pillow and two bedsheets for two unrelated passengers sharing an RAC berth. Despite requesting separate blankets and pillows.

ICRA LIMITED'S Q1 REVENUE SLIPS 6.6 PC SEQUENTIALLY; PAT RISES 32 PC

Mumbai (TSIT): ICRA Limited on Thursday reported a 6.57 per cent sequential decline in consolidated revenue from operations for the June quarter (Q1 FY27) to Rs 163.4 crore in the June quarter of FY27 from Rs 174.85 crore in the preceding quarter (Q4 FY26). However, on a year-on-year (YoY) basis, revenue rose 31.2 per cent from Rs 124.5 crore, according to its stock exchange filing. The company's profit after tax (PAT) increased 32 per cent year-on-year (YoY) to Rs 56.5 crore during the quarter, compared with Rs 42.8 crore in the corresponding period last financial year. ICRA said the quarterly financial performance includes the impact of the consolidation of Fintelix, which it acquired in October 2025. As a result, the company noted that the current quarter's financials are not directly comparable with those of the year-ago period. "ICRA delivered a strong quarterly performance, supported by healthy growth in Ratings and sustained momentum in Risk & Analytics.

No reforms, only politics: Kharge attacks Centre over anti-paper leak bill

New Delhi (TSIT)

Leader of Opposition in the Rajya Sabha Mallikarjun Kharge on Thursday launched a sharp attack on the Central government during the debate on the Public Examinations (Prevention of Unfair Means) Amendment Bill 2026 in the Upper House, accusing it of prioritising politics over students' futures and demanding accountability from Union Home Minister Amit Shah for alleged police excesses against protesting students in Delhi.

Kharge alleged that the government had ordered a lathi charge on protesting students.

He pointed out that the Delhi Police and the CRPF fall under the direct jurisdiction of the Union Home Minister, asserting that such action could not have taken place without the approval of the Home



Ministry. "You're sitting inside a room, without being answerable to anything, but we will bring you out," Kharge said, insisting that the Home Minister could not evade responsibility. He demanded a statement from Amit Shah on the alleged police brutality in Delhi.

Questioning the timing of the legislation, Kharge asked why a bill to prevent paper leaks had not been brought earlier.

He charged that the

Union government had remained busy with politics instead of securing the future of students. "You brought the Bill to stop the protests in Delhi. You did not bring in the bill for reforms," he alleged. "Because of the BJP's politics, the country had to witness paper leaks, protests and police brutality," Kharge said, adding that all of this could have been prevented had the ruling party not indulged in petty politics.

PM MODI DIRECTS ALL-OUT EFFORTS TO SAFEGUARD INTERESTS OF INDIAN CITIZENS AMID WEST ASIA CONFLICT

New Delhi (TSIT) :

Prime Minister Narendra Modi, chairing a meeting of the Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS) on Thursday, issued directions for making all efforts to safeguard the interests of Indian citizens and the country's diaspora from the adverse impact of the West Asia conflict.

The CCS meeting was held to review the situation in the context of the ongoing West Asia conflict and measures taken by various Ministries and Departments to ensure adequate energy and fertiliser supplies and safety of Indian seafarers, according to an official statement issued after the meeting.

During the meeting, the fertiliser requirement for the ensuing Rabi season was assessed, and alterna-



tive sources of fertilisers were also discussed.

The Prime Minister said that all measures should be taken for ensuring uninterrupted supply of fertilisers. The situation regarding seafarers serving on domestic as well as foreign-flagged vessels in conflict zones was also deliberated with the Prime Minister directing that a mechanism be established to provide timely information, emergency assistance

and counselling to seafarers and their families. The discussion comes in the backdrop of commercial ships coming under attack in the Middle East region.

PM Modi also highlighted that in order to ensure energy independence, emphasis should be made on renewable energy sources including solar energy and other non-fossil-fuel based sources.

The Prime Minister also said that a whole-of-government approach should continue to be adopted to tackle the challenges arising due to the crisis. He said that a unified coordinated mechanism be put in place for regular monitoring of all the developments to ensure expeditious implementation of appropriate measures to safeguard the interests of the citizens.

Bengaluru (TSIT)

Karnataka suffered a fresh setback in the Cauvery water dispute on Thursday after the Cauvery Water Management Authority (CWMA) rejected the state's plea citing water stress and directed it to release 3,500 cusecs of water per day to Tamil Nadu for 15 days, reigniting political and public anger in the Cauvery basin region.

The CWMA order, which will be effective retrospectively from July 29, came despite Karnataka's contention that its reservoirs were under pressure and that meeting the water requirements of its own farmers, drinking water needs and livestock remained a challenge.

Tamil Nadu had sought a significantly higher quantum, demanding the release of 7,000 cusecs of water



daily for 15 days and a total of 9 TMC feet of water from Karnataka. However, the Authority settled for the Cauvery Water Regulation Committee's (CWRC) recommendation of 3,500 cusecs per day and rejected Karnataka's argument that it was not in a position to release water.

The decision has triggered a political response in Karnataka, with Chief Minister DK Shivakumar announcing an all-party meeting on Sunday to discuss the way forward. Shivakumar said the state

government wanted to hold discussions in the larger interest of both Karnataka and Tamil Nadu while addressing concerns over the order.

Meanwhile, the directive sparked protests in Mandya, the heartland of Karnataka's Cauvery agitation. Kannada activists intensified their demonstrations, opposing the release of water to Tamil Nadu and submitting a memorandum to the state government urging it to protect the interests of farmers. Protesters also

tore posters of Tamil Nadu Chief Minister C Joseph Vijay's film Jana Nayagan and demanded cancellation of its screening at a theatre in the city. The theatre management later agreed to stop the screening.

Farmers and activists argued that Karnataka was itself facing severe water concerns and appealed to the state government to seek more time before releasing water. Protesters said the state was struggling to meet drinking water and livestock needs and urged the Chief Minister to intervene. With the CWMA order now in force, Karnataka's next legal option is likely to be approaching the Supreme Court to challenge the directive. The latest development has once again brought the decades-old Cauvery dispute to the centre of political debate in both states.

CM Suvendu Adhikari praises Bengal Police for its work despite facing adversities

Kolkata (TSIT) :

Despite the West Bengal government facing huge financial debt and lack of infrastructure, Chief Minister Suvendu Adhikari on Thursday highly appreciated the work being done by the state police amid these adversities. At the same time, the Chief Minister conveyed that he will now directly listen to the grievances of the lower-level police personnel. Chief Minister Adhikari attended an event at the Barrackpore Police Training School in North 24 Parganas district where he also attended lunch with the police personnel.

While speaking before the lunch, the Chief



Minister discussed the role of the state police in detail.

He highlighted the exact position of the West Bengal Police in terms of other states. The Chief Minister admitted the poor financial condition of the state.

Chief Minister Adhikari said, "If there were some good things in the previous practices, there were many bad things. Then cut your coat according to your cloth. There is a lot of debt in this state."

The Chief Minister's speech spoke about the daily struggle of the police personnel. He also mentioned that he knows what kind of problems the police face while doing their duty in remote areas.

Acknowledging the infrastructural deficiencies, the Chief Minister said, "Overall, you are in a lot of trouble, we know. You have to work in remote areas. There is no place to stay, no purified

drinking water, logistical support, cars, horses, etc. There are many shortcomings." However, despite all these problems, Chief Minister Adhikari highlighted the successes achieved by the police in the last few weeks.

He especially praised the role of the police in ensuring women's safety, combating corruption and border security. The Chief Minister said, "Even in that (adversities), you can do it. Because in the last two months or ten weeks, you have done a lot of good work, be it in combating corruption, maintaining law and order, arresting identified criminals, securing borders, identifying infiltrators or in providing security to our mothers.

PM MODI ASSURES ARUNACHAL, NAGALAND MPS OF SUPPORT TO TACKLE FLOODS



New Delhi (TSIT): Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Thursday assured five Members of Parliament from Arunachal Pradesh and Nagaland that the Central government would extend all necessary support and continue working in close coordination with the concerned state governments to effectively tackle the challenges posed by the ongoing heavy rainfall and

floods. After meeting the MPs from the two Northeastern states, PM Modi posted on his official X account: "Had a meeting with MPs from Arunachal Pradesh and Nagaland. We talked about the situation in these states in the wake of floods there. The Central Government will keep working with the respective state Governments to address the challenges.

1st module of Indian space station launch in 2028; Proto hardware development in progress

New Delhi (TSIT):

Bharatiya Antariksh Station, planned as India's first indigenous space station comprising five modules and targeted for establishment by 2035, will see the development and launch of its first module, BAS-01, by 2028, the government said on Thursday.

Baseline design review and system engineering for BAS-01 have been completed, 31 baseline design documents released, subsystem design work has commenced and development of proto hardware for human space programme is in progress, Union MoS Atomic Energy and Space, Dr. Jitendra Singh said in the Rajya Sabha. As part of



Gaganyaan programme, new developments in the area of Human Rated Launch Vehicle (HLVM3), Orbital Module, Crew Escape System, ground infrastructure establishments, establishment of flight operations and communication network, Crew recovery operations have been carried out. Precursor missions TV-D1, IADT-01 and 02 have been accomplished and activities are in advance stages for 1st Uncrewed mission, G1, the minister noted.

KIMS Saveera Treats Brain Aneurysm Without Open Surgery



Anantapur (TSIT): Doctors at KIMS Saveera Hospital, Anantapur, have successfully treated a farmer suffering from a brain aneurysm without open brain surgery by using an advanced endovascular coiling procedure, offering a safer and minimally invasive treatment option. Consultant Neurologist Dr. Karthik Reddy and Interventional Radiologist Dr. Pritviraj said the patient, Rameshwar Reddy from Tadipatri, was admitted with severe headache, vomiting

and dizziness. A CT scan and CT angiogram revealed a brain aneurysm, a balloon-like swelling in a blood vessel that can become life-threatening if it ruptures. Instead of conventional open brain surgery, the medical team performed endovascular coiling. The procedure involves inserting a thin catheter through a small puncture in the groin and guiding it to the aneurysm, where platinum micro-coils are placed to block blood flow into the swollen vessel.

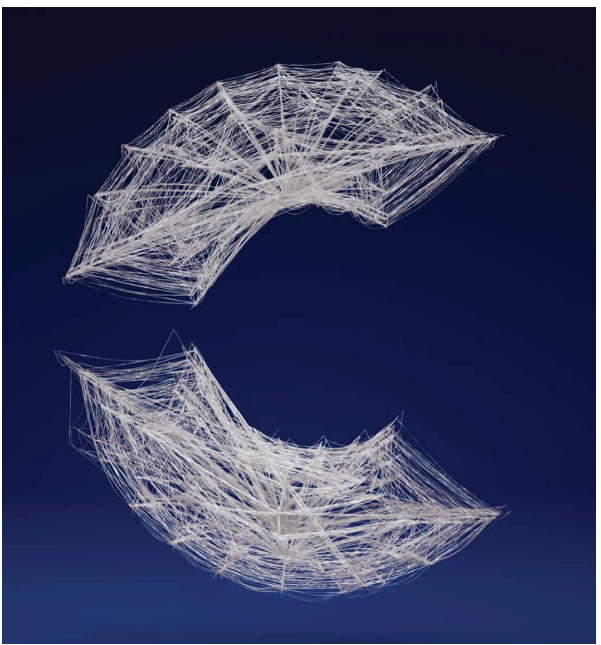

Railways Sanctions Rs.220-Crore Traction Upgrade for Wadi–Raichur Section

102 Route Kilometre Wadi-Raichur Section to be Upgraded with 2×25 kV Electric Traction System on High Density Network

SC to hear plea for pre-arrest bail plea of ex-minister Senthil Balaji in fresh corruption case

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court has agreed to hear on Friday a plea of former minister and DMK leader V Senthil Balaji seeking anticipatory bail in a corruption case pertaining to alleged irregularities in the functioning of the Tamil Nadu State Marketing Corporation (TASMAC). Earlier in the day, the Madras High Court dismissed the anticipatory bail petition of Balaji in the fresh FIR lodged by the Directorate of Vigilance and Anti-Corruption (DVAC) in the TASMAC scam case.

Soon after the denial of pre-arrest bail by the high court, the top court bench headed by Chief Justice Surya Kant was urged by senior lawyers Kapil Sibal, Mukul Rohatgi and Amit Anand Tiwari on behalf of the DMK leader that his plea be listed for urgent hearing as he faces imminent coercive action.

The bench, also comprising Justices Joymalya Bagchi and V Mohana, said that it will be listed on Friday. Balaji represents Coimbatore South in the Tamil Nadu Assembly. According to the fresh FIR, a large-scale scam took place in TASMAC in the allotment of shops and bars. Balaji alleged that the FIR quoted verbatim the affidavit of the



Enforcement Directorate (ED) and the petition filed by the anti-money laundering probe agency before the Supreme Court. In fact, the FIR itself at various places says that it is from the counter affidavit and petition of the ED, the plea said.

"Our contention is that the FIR is for the incident said to have been committed between 2021 and 2025. I am at no flight risk; no custodial interrogation required. I was the minister of the department and TASMAC is a corporation independent in existence and functioning," said senior advocate Tirwari. He also said there was no direct role or connection and it was political vendetta.

"Also, it is interference with the pending proceeding before the Supreme Court inasmuch as the petition filed by TASMAC and the state of Tamil Nadu in which the ED has filed the said counter-affi-

davit, which is the basis of the FIR, there is a stay of investigation against TASMAC and no coercive action order. Reliance on such an affidavit of a pending matter is interference with the judicial proceeding," the senior lawyer said. The plea said it was diametrically opposite to the earlier stand taken by the state government in the matter. The high court, while rejecting the pre-arrest bail plea of the leader, referred to the prosecution's allegation of causing loss to the exchequer against Balaji and said that custodial questioning was necessary. The DVAC in its FIR said that Balaji entered into a criminal conspiracy to manipulate TASMAC's functioning by rigging bar and transport tenders, favouring a few select liquor manufacturers, resulting in overpricing of liquor, and causing financial loss to the public exchequer.

Entire Tamil Nadu's welfare at stake; take all parties to meet: BJP to CM Vijay



CHENNAI: The state unit of the BJP on Thursday announced a statewide protest on August 1, Saturday, against Karnataka's proposed Mokedatu dam project, describing it as a serious threat to the State's Cauvery water rights, and urged Chief Minister C Joseph Vijay to lead an all-party delegation to Karnataka instead of taking up the issue independently. The decision was taken at a meeting of the party's state and district office-bearers chaired by BJP state president Nainar Nagenthran at the party headquarters, Kamalayalam, in T Nagar here. Briefing reporters after the meeting, former union minister Pon Radhakrishnan said the party had adopted three major resolutions. Claiming that Tamil Nadu was yet to receive its due share of Cauvery water, Pon Radhakrishnan alleged that Karnataka was pursuing the Mokedatu project to further curtail downstream flows. "This is not an issue concerning a single political party or an individual. It concerns the rights of all eight crore people of Tamil Nadu," he said. He urged the Chief Minister to consult leaders of

all recognised political parties represented in the Assembly and jointly engage Karnataka on the issue. Radhakrishnan also alleged that the 1924 Cauvery agreement was not renewed in 1974 under the then DMK Congress government and claimed the previous DMK regime had withdrawn legal proceedings related to the agreement. He further alleged that Karnataka had already constructed four dams in the Cauvery basin despite provisions of the pact. The BJP also demanded a White Paper on properties belonging to temples administered by the Hindu Religious and Charitable Endowments Department, sought the retrieval of temple lands from private encroachers, and called for action against officials responsible for irregularities. Radhakrishnan said the party had formed a committee to examine alleged violations involving temple properties. The party further condemned alleged crimes against women and rising custodial deaths, accused the State government of failing to fulfil its electoral promises, and reiterated.

VCK demands all-party meeting in Tamil Nadu over Karnataka's refusal to release Cauvery water

CHENNAI: VCK chief Thol Thirumavalavan on Thursday (July 30) urged the Tamil Nadu government to immediately convene an all-party meeting over the Cauvery water dispute, strongly condemning the Karnataka government's "anti-Tamil stance" in failing to release the state's due share of water despite explicit directives from regulatory authorities. In an official statement, the Lok Sabha MP expressed shock over Karnataka's continued non-compliance with the orders of the Cauvery Water Regulatory Committee (CWRC) and warned that its stubborn refusal threatens



to turn Tamil Nadu's agricultural hub, the Delta region, into a desert. Highlighting the gravity of the water deficit, Thirumavalavan cited data shared by CWRC Chairman Vineet Gupta, noting that against the prescribed allocation of 36.4 TMC ft (thou-

sand million cubic feet) between June 1 and July 27 as per the 2018 Supreme Court judgment, Tamil Nadu received only about 3.6 TMC ft at Biligundlu - a meager 10 per cent of its rightful share. "The cumulative shortfall in water receipt since June 1 stands at nearly 33 TMC ft. Overall water released by Karnataka has barely touched 1 TMC ft cumulatively at key intervals," Thirumavalavan pointed out, emphasising the crippling effect of this deficit on local agriculture. He noted that while the Cauvery Water Management Authority

(CWMA) has currently directed Karnataka to release 3,500 cusecs of water daily for the next 15 days, farmer groups in the neighbouring state are opposing even this minimal release.

Health Minister Arunraj directs officials to expedite Guindy children's hospital project

CHENNAI: State Minister for Health and Family Welfare KG Arunraj on Thursday directed officials to streamline patient registration at the Kalaignar Centenary Super Speciality Hospital in Guindy after finding long queues during an inspection, while also instructing the contractor to complete the Rs 338.70-crore Children's Super Speciality Hospital and Research Centre within the stipulated timeline by adhering to prescribed quality standards.

Reviewing the hospital's 'NalamAI' digital registration system, the minister sought details from officials on delays faced by patients and directed them to deploy adequate personnel to guide visitors through the application, ensuring quicker registration and reduced waiting time. He later inspected the outpatient and neurology departments, scrutinised treatment records and interacted with patients to assess the quality of medical services being delivered.

*Social Justice, Electoral
Math And Battle For
UP's Upper Castes*

The Cockroach Janta Party's protests at Jantar Mantar have wound down. But the national conversation they reignited - over social justice, equity and merit - hasn't gone anywhere. And Uttar Pradesh, heading into its consequential 2027 assembly election, may be the only state where that conversation collides directly with hard electoral arithmetic. Three forces are converging here at once: the BJP's upper-caste base, the Samajwadi Party's expanding caste-outreach strategy, and a national debate on social justice. Few other states carry all three at this scale, or with these stakes.

The Numbers

Brahmins account for close to 10 per cent of Uttar Pradesh's population, with the community concentrated most heavily in the central and eastern parts of the state. Add Rajputs, Baniyas and other upper-caste groups, and the bloc becomes electorally significant well beyond its numeric share - a bloc that has voted overwhelmingly with the BJP through the last two election cycles. The data bears this out. In the 2022 Assembly election, CSDS-Loknit's post-poll survey found that 79 per cent of upper-caste (Brahmin, Rajput and Vaishya) voters backed the NDA, against just 16 per cent for the Opposition alliance. Two years later, in the 2024 Lok Sabha election, that loyalty held firm at the individual community level - the same survey found that the upper-caste voter bloc still largely favoured the BJP, with close to nine in 10 Rajput voters backing the party. Notably, though, the 2024 result also showed the coalition arithmetic shifting elsewhere - the Opposition INDIA alliance won 43 of UP's seats to the BJP's 33, powered by OBC, Dalit and Muslim consolidation, partly on the back of a narrative around constitutional and reservation change that the BJP struggled to counter. In other words: upper-caste loyalty to the BJP has not cracked yet. But the coalition around it has already shown it can be beaten. That loyalty had never really been tested until the UGC equity row early this year - a national controversy that landed with particular force in UP. A magistrate in Bareilly resigned in protest and close to a dozen BJP members in Lucknow left the party. Neither reads as manufactured Opposition noise; both point to a genuine, even if narrow, fracture within the base the BJP has relied on for a decade. In fact, eastern UP is where this will likely be decided most - the highest pockets of Brahmin presence, and also Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath's home turf. Any erosion in Brahmin loyalty here cuts closest to the CM's own backyard. Two Brahmin Faces, Two Strategies - The Ticket Count The BJP's answer has a name: Manoj Pandey, once a close aide to Akhilesh Yadav and known in SP circles as the "Chanakya of Raebareli", now a minister in the Yogi cabinet and one of the party's key upper caste faces heading into 2027. The Samajwadi Party's counter has also taken shape. Akhilesh Yadav chose Mata Prasad Pandey, a seven-time MLA and a two-time Assembly Speaker, as Leader of Opposition - a visible signal that the party's post-2024 social engineering, built around the PDA formula (Pichhda, Dalit, Alpsankhyak), is now explicitly being widened to include a section of upper castes. Akhilesh has framed this shift as extending PDA's "A" to include Agada, or upper castes, alongside the backward classes and minorities the acronym was built for.

What The Rawalakot Bloodshed Says About
Pakistan And Its 'Azad Kashmir' Narrative

"India mein kaha jaata hai, 'Dar ke aage jeet hai'. Pakistan mein shayad kahani kuch aur hai: 'Ghar ke aage jeep hai'." (In India, it's said, 'There's victory beyond fear'. Pakistan's story is different: 'There's a jeep in front of the house'.) A young Pakistani woman's video on X captures, in a chilling sentence, the dark crisis unfolding in her country. The slightest dissent is crushed by security forces. Protesters simply disappear. The Balochs have paid the price of dissent with the disappearance of their young men. Prominent human rights activist Dr Mahrang Baloch, who spearheaded massive peaceful anti-disappearance marches across the country, was recently convicted by an anti-terrorism court in Quetta and sentenced to life imprisonment. While the world watches the political turmoil in Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK) from a distance, Pakistan's own citizens are confronting something far more immediate: the power of the state on their streets. The images emerging from PoK are difficult to ignore: streets stained with blood, protesters lying motionless, grieving families searching for loved ones, and heavily armed security personnel confronting civilians. They present a picture sharply at odds with Pakistan's long-standing claim on international platforms - that it is the defender of the democratic aspirations of the people of Jammu & Kashmir. The scale of the violence may be contested, but there is little doubt that the crack-down has been severe. At the heart of the unrest is a political and democratic question. The Joint Awami Action Committee (JAAC), a prominent civil-society coalition leading the agitation, was banned by the authorities under anti-ter-



rorism laws. The protests have continued for weeks, driven by grievances over political representation, governance, and the credibility of the electoral process. The elections themselves have been marred by allegations of rigging, boycotts, and violence. The most popular mass leader, Imran Khan, continues to be in jail, and his party, the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI), has boycotted the elections. But the larger question goes beyond the elections. Can Pakistan's citizens protest without being treated as enemies of the state? And after Balochistan, can Pakistan afford to see another region slip into sustained unrest? The Pakistani youth is voicing another uncomfortable question: while the Pakistani television channels gleefully flashed visuals of the recent youth protests in India, the protests and the coverage of the bloodshed in Mirpur and Rawalakot were completely blacked out. The contrast has not gone unno-

ticed. When young people in India took to the streets over issues such as paper leaks, their protests became a major subject of public debate. In Pakistan, however, young people confronting what they describe as state high-handedness are facing bullets, arrests, and the branding of their civil-society movement as a security threat. And then came an extraordinary statement from Pakistan's Defence Minister Khawaja Asif. Defending the state's response to the protesters, Asif said he viewed the protesters in Pakistan-administered Kashmir "the same way" he viewed India: enemies. His remarks have triggered further outrage because they expose the central contradiction at the heart of the crisis: what happens when a state begins to see its own protesting citizens through the lens of an external enemy? The violence in PoK is thus not merely about an election. It is about the shrinking space for dissent. If citizens demanding their

rights are treated as enemies, then who, exactly, is the state supposed to protect? What is unfolding in PoK did not happen overnight. The unrest has been building over political grievances, particularly the Pakistani government's decision to reserve 12 seats in the Azad Jammu and Kashmir Legislative Assembly for refugees who migrated from Jammu and Kashmir decades ago. The Joint Awami Action Committee (JAAC), an alliance of civil-society and activist groups, opposed the arrangement and mobilised demonstrations, including a call to boycott the elections. The JAAC has maintained that it is not seeking to contest the polls itself but political representation based on the consent and interests of the people living in the area. Islamabad's response, however, has been one of criminalisation rather than conversation. The government banned JAAC under anti-terrorism laws and launched a sweeping crackdown on its lead-

ership and supporters. Reports from Rawalakot suggest that security forces used live ammunition to disperse demonstrators, leaving dozens dead and many more injured. According to available reports, at least 40 people, including 34 protesters and six police and paramilitary personnel, have lost their lives in the run-up to the elections. Whether every protest remained peaceful or every action by security forces was justified will ultimately be determined by credible investigations. But what is beyond dispute is that a political disagreement has spiralled into a deadly confrontation because dissent was treated as a security threat rather than a democratic right. The United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, Volker, has called for prompt, thorough, and impartial investigations into all deaths arising from the unrest. His criticism extended beyond the violence itself to the government's decision to outlaw

JAAC under anti-terrorism legislation, warning that criminalising a civil society organisation and curtailing peaceful assembly raise serious concerns about fundamental freedoms. Equally troubling is the prolonged communication blackout. Mobile phone and internet services have reportedly remained suspended across the region for weeks. Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) Chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari himself questioned the necessity of such an extended shutdown, warning that depriving an entire population of communication creates the impression of collective punishment rather than targeted security measures. Rawalakot is more than the site of a local protest. It has become a test of Pakistan's willingness to tolerate dissent within the territory it administers. Democracies are measured not by how they treat those who agree with the government, but by how they respond to those who challenge it peacefully.

Accountability should not only be of
the government but also of the society

In a democracy, accountability is most often demanded from those in power and positions of power. If corruption occurs in a minister's department, crime rises in an officer's jurisdiction, a teacher's school results are poor, or law and order deteriorates in a police officer's jurisdiction, the first person to be held accountable is that officer. This is appropriate, because authority carries responsibility. But the question is: can society absolve itself of its responsibilities? Is it enough to simply blame the government, administration, and system for every crime? Do we, as citizens, have no accountability? Democracy isn't just about government. It's a shared system of government and society. The Constitution has entrusted citizens with as many fundamental duties as it has rights. If we only talk about rights and forget about duties, the balance of democracy is disrupted. This is why many social problems today are rooted not only in administrative failure but also in a lack of civic responsibility. When someone steals, murders, rapes, engages in cyber fraud, drug trafficking, or participates in organized crime, they not only harm an individual but also impact the peace and order of society as a whole. To prevent such crimes, there are laws and courts that prescribe punishments according to the nature of the offense. But this also raises the question: should some of the benefits provided by the state after conviction be reconsidered? This topic has been debated

from time to time, especially in the context of heinous crimes. However, it is important to understand a crucial constitutional principle. Every citizen in India has the right to equality before the law, due process, and human dignity. Therefore, a person cannot be punished merely on the basis of accusation, but only after a proper judicial process. Furthermore, many basic services provided by the state—such as education, primary health care, and life-saving assistance—are also linked to humanitarian and constitutional obligations. Therefore, "depriving a person of all government benefits for life" due to a crime is neither practical nor consistent with the current constitutional system. Yes, it is certainly worth considering that some legal consequences may be more severe for individuals convicted by a court of serious crimes. For example, disqualification from contesting elections, restrictions on government employment, withholding of arms licenses, disqualification from certain types of government positions, or limitations on specific government schemes depending on the nature of the offense—such matters could be legislated. But all this must be done within the judicial process and constitutional limits. On the other hand, society must also recognize that crime isn't solely caused by police failure. The erosion of values in families, the declining focus on character development in schools, the proliferation of violent and hateful content on social media, the

growing influence of drug abuse, and a mindset that considers breaking the law "smart" also contribute to crime. If society remains silent on these causes, crime won't end simply by changing the government. Today, we often see that when road accidents occur, people don't wear helmets, but then blame the government. They themselves commit tax evasion, then complain about the lack of development work. Both bribe-givers and bribe-takers come from within society. Citizens commit illegal construction, but the administration is blamed. Students cheat in exams, but the entire education system is put on trial. This approach is incomplete. Accountability means not only punishment but also self-discipline. If citizens themselves obey the law, report crimes, are not afraid to testify, protect public property, and impart moral education to their children, the number of crimes can naturally decrease. An informed society can be a more effective security shield than any police force. In this context, the concept of rehabilitation cannot be overlooked. Not all crimes are the same, and neither are all criminals. Many people turn to crime due to circumstances, immaturity, or bad company, and yet they later reform. The modern justice system emphasizes not only punishment but also reform and rehabilitation. If society does not provide an individual with the opportunity to reform, the likelihood of their return to crime may increase. Therefore, a balance between severity and

sensitivity is essential. Equally important in a democracy is the principle that the state's purpose is not merely to punish, but to build a safe, just, and humane society. Therefore, policies should discourage crime, provide justice to victims, punish the guilty according to law, and, where possible, provide opportunities for reform. Similarly, the accountability of those in power cannot be diminished. If an official fails to discharge his or her duties, a minister encourages corruption, or a public representative neglects his or her constitutional duties, strict action should be taken against them. The relationship between authority and accountability applies equally to both parties—to power and society. If India is to truly become a crime-free, disciplined, and accountable nation, we must move beyond the extreme thinking of "only the government is responsible" and "only the public is to blame." Preventing crime is a shared responsibility of everyone—the government, the judiciary, the police, families, schools, the media, and citizens. The failure of one party does not absolve the other of responsibility. Ultimately, the success of democracy lies in ensuring that rights and duties go hand in hand. Those in power fulfill their responsibilities, the law is enforced impartially, and citizens are held accountable for their own conduct. Society will be empowered only when a mindset develops to apply justice not only to others but also to oneself equally.

How Everything That Could Go Wrong Has
Gone Wrong For The US In Iran

The US war on Iran has proved an all-round disaster. American and Israeli interests in West Asia do not define the interests of virtually the rest of the world in this region. The US has in the past succeeded in controlling or eliminating all regimes that opposed Israel. But the clerical regime in Iran has been the exception, and Trump made a major strategic miscalculation in seeking a regime change in Iran by force at Israel's urging. The US-Iran MoU raised some hope that the war may wind down, with the worst behind for all of us. The involvement of US Vice-President JD Vance also indicated seriousness on the part of the US to find a way out of the disaster. But realists remained sceptical of success. The interim agreement, on the face of it, conceded a lot to Iran. It included an immediate and permanent end to military operations on all fronts, including in Lebanon. This meant that far from curbing Iran's regional role, the inclusion of Lebanon recognised Iran's interests. The agreement to respect Iran's sovereignty and territorial integrity and non-interference in its internal affairs meant that the goal of regime change was abjured. The nuclear issue, hitherto central for the US, was left for discussion and finalisation later. The opening of the Strait of Hormuz took precedence, although that was not the reason to go to war, rather its inevitable consequence. In a major reversal of earlier positions, the US agreed to Iran's enriched uranium stockpile to be down-blended in Iran itself under IAEA supervi-



sion. Even with regard to the Strait, it was agreed that Iran would conduct a dialogue with Oman to define the future administration and maritime services on the route, recognising, in other words, that navigation of commercial ships will be subject to a new regime. The issue of reparations was addressed by the US, agreeing with regional partners to offer a USD 300 billion plan for the reconstruction and economic development of Iran. Sanctions on the export of Iranian oil were lifted for sixty days. The US undertook to make fully available for use the frozen or restricted funds and assets of Iran upon the implementation of the MoU. A complete removal of all sanctions was envisaged as part of the final deal. The US also agreed to the withdrawal of US forces from the proximity of Iran within 30 days of the final deal. In public statements, Trump made some astonishing statements that reversed long-held US positions, namely, that Iran cannot be denied enrichment rights and missiles, as other coun-

tries in the region have them. That this framework agreement and the ceasefire have collapsed so quickly and dramatically because Iran considered a ship using the southern Oman channel without consultation with it a violation of the MoU and attacked it, is telling. The US, in turn, saw Iranian action, too, as a violation of the MoU and retaliated with attacks on Iranian infrastructure over several days. This shows how fragile the US commitment to the MoU was and raises questions about policymaking in the current US administration. Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi says that they entered talks and agreed to the MoU to avoid being accused of refusing to negotiate and hence justifying US attacks, well knowing that the US could not be trusted to abide by the agreement and was essentially buying time and would resume military operations, for which Iran was prepared. The reasons why the US agreed to the MoU and seemingly made major concessions to roll back the conflict remain

pertinent. The Strait of Hormuz cannot be opened up by force. Trump acknowledged that the US was set to run out of oil reserves in four weeks, and hence the pressure to negotiate a ceasefire and let oil flow again through Hormuz. With the Strait not only closed again but Trump announcing that the US will charge a 20% fee for letting non-Iranian oil and gas flow through the Strait to compensate for the cost of war, an untenable financial situation was being created for oil carriers, which would have affected the flow of energy from the Gulf and caused a further spurt in global oil prices, something that Trump had sought to avoid. Trump has been compelled to revoke the announcement. Trump's attacks on Iran have continued, with Iran retaliating against US bases in Kuwait, Bahrain, and Jordan, with threats to attack Dubai/UAE airport and ports. The assumption that Iran's stockpiles of missiles had depleted has proved wrong as Iran has apparently used even more advanced missiles- hypersonic- with greater accuracy, leading to US claims that China and Russia were providing technical support to it. The US has suffered casualties in Jordan, which puts pressure on Trump to retaliate further. His rhetoric has crossed all diplomatic norms, calling the Iranians "scum", "sick", and a "cancer". The MoU has been repudiated, though one can assume some channels of communication through Qatar are being kept open, especially with the IRGC leadership.

Govt Shares Data To Refute Claims WILL E20 PETROL DAMAGE OLDER VEHICLES?



The Government of India has dismissed what it called as "misleading claims" surrounding the Ethanol Blended Petrol (EBP) Programme, saying there is no verified evidence that E20 fuel has caused widespread engine damage, rendered older vehicles unusable or led to systemic performance issues. According to a Press Information Bureau (PIB) release, the Centre noted that E15-plus fuel has been in widespread use for more than three-and-a-half years, while E19-E20 blends have been used for over two-and-a-half years without reports of large-scale engine failures or vehicle breakdowns attributable to ethanol blending. The government said India's ethanol blending programme has been implemented in phases since a pilot project in 2001, with average blending levels rising gradually from about 1.53% in 2013-14 to 20% between November 2025 and June 2026. It said the rollout followed scientific validation, stakeholder consultations and infrastructure development involving automobile manufacturers,

the Society of Indian Automobile Manufacturers (SIAM), the Automotive Research Association of India (ARAI), component makers and oil marketing companies. The PIB said around eight crore vehicles visit fuel stations every day, while a leading automobile manufacturer serviced 2.84 crore vehicles in FY26, including about 1.5 crore that were not originally certified as E20-compatible, without reporting E20-related

corrosion, abnormal wear or reduced component life. Another manufacturer tracked 1.4 crore E20-operated vehicles and similarly found no ethanol-induced corrosion, while a leading two-wheeler maker reported comparable field experience. Rejecting the claims that nearly 30 crore vehicles could become unusable, the government said more than 20 crore two-wheelers and over three crore petrol cars have already operated on higher

ethanol blends without verified evidence of widespread failures. The government also rejected allegations that automobile manufacturers were privately opposed to E20 or were being pressured to support it. It is cited that on July 4, 2026, a joint press conference was held attended by senior executives from Toyota Kirloskar, Maruti Suzuki, Hero MotoCorp, Hyundai Motor India, TVS Motor Company and Bajaj Auto, who reaffirmed confidence in the programme after extensive testing. According to the PIB, manufacturers said any reduction in fuel efficiency for certain older E10-designed vehicles is generally limited to 3%-5%, while E20 offers benefits such as a higher octane rating, cleaner combustion and improved anti-knock performance. The government added that oil marketing companies continue to conduct fuel quality checks at more than 30,000 retail outlets, while manufacturers continue to honour warranties for vehicles using specification-compliant E20 fuel.

Missile that left crater deep inside Poland was probably Russian - Polish PM



Polish Prime Minister Donald Tusk has said an object that crashed into a field in eastern Poland in the early hours of Thursday was probably a Russian missile. The unidentified object caused a 10m-wide (33ft) crater a short distance from the village of Tarnawa Kolonia, 92km (57 miles) from the border with Ukraine during a large-scale Russian attack on the cities of Lviv, Kyiv and near Kryvyi Rih. Tusk said initially that "all the indications" were that the missile that violated Polish airspace was a Russian Kh-101 cruise missile, during a specially convened meeting in the eastern city of Lublin. He then went to the site of the incident and said that according to military experts the majority of "recovered fragments point to it being a Russian Kh-101 missile". Although no casualties had been reported in Thursday's incident near Tarnawa Kolonia, the Polish prime

minister made clear it was being taken very seriously. There was no immediate threat as it had not landed in a built-up area, he said, adding that "we were prepared to shoot it down if had continued its flight". Nato said it was in close contact with Polish authorities and the Supreme Allied Commander in Europe, Gen Alexus G Grynkeiwich, said the Western defensive alliance would "continue to take all necessary measures to defend Nato territory". Polish Defence Minister Wladyslaw Kosiniak-Kamysz said about 20 objects were seen close to Polish airspace overnight and pyrotechnical analysis was being carried out. Ukraine's acting Foreign Minister Andriy Sybiha had earlier declared definitively that a Russian Kh-101 cruise missile had "crossed into Poland as part of Russia's massive strike against Ukraine, violating Nato airspace".

SAUDI ARABIA'S DILEMMA AS IT TRIES TO STAY OUT OF US-IRAN WAR

Saudi Arabia is facing a difficult dilemma. Ever since the US and Israel launched their war on Iran on 28 February, the Saudis have largely tried to stay out of it. But now, after being attacked from three sides, the Saudis have had enough. This week, they carried out joint strikes with the US on Iranian proxy militias in Iraq who they believe have been launching drones at the Kingdom. For Saudi Arabia the dilemma now is whether to keep on hitting back as a deterrent, or whether to try to de-escalate the situation, perhaps by paying off some of their adversaries. So who is attacking who and why? First, a bit of context. There are broadly two sides in the conflict that has been consuming the Gulf and other parts of the Middle



East for five months now. On one side there is Iran and its Islamic Revolutionary Guards Corps (IRGC). Allied to them are the Houthis in Yemen, a tribal group who took over much of the country in 2014. Also backed by Iran are the Popular Mobilisation Forces in Iraq, the paramilitary group that has allegedly carried out 30 drone strikes on Saudi Arabia and has now been

attacked in return. Then there is Hezbollah in Lebanon, still a potent force but one that is currently lying low. On the opposite side of this conflict is the US with its immensely powerful Central Command (Centcom) forces plus - to varying degrees - the Gulf Arab states and Jordan. Israel remains a close US ally but is currently not an active participant in this war. Iran

has most recently been concentrating its drone and missile attacks on Jordan, Kuwait and Bahrain, as well as targeting any commercial shipping that tries to slip through the Strait of Hormuz while avoiding Iran's new rules and routing. The addition of Iraqi militias and the Houthis in Yemen is a relatively new phenomenon and it shows how - without a lasting peace deal between the US and Iran - the region risks becoming ever more embroiled in a widening conflict. There are a number of reasons why Saudi Arabia is trying not to get sucked into a full-scale conflict. Its de facto ruler, the relatively young Crown Prince Mohammed Bin Salman, has embarked the country on a course known as "Vision 2030".

NICARAGUAN LEADER PROPOSES EXTENDING PRESIDENTIAL TERM BY ANOTHER YEAR



Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega, who has been in power since 2007, has proposed extending the presidential term by another year. The government-controlled National Assembly is expected to approve the extension in September. It is part of a proposed constitutional reform which also includes plans to bar members of the opposition deemed by the government to be "traitors" or "coup plotters" from running for office. The 80-year-old's rule has become increasingly authoritarian, with political opponents jailed, sent into exile and stripped of their citizenship. During Ortega's 19 years in power, there have been several changes to the presidential term already. In 2014, the country's National Assembly scrapped presidential term limits and in 2024 it extended the term from five to six years. The legislative body also approved Ortega's plan to name his wife, Rosario Murillo, as "co-president". It thereby paved the way for her to assume as president should Ortega, who is believed to be in frail health, be declared "permanently absent". Presidential elections were last held in Nicaragua in November 2021. The one-sided contest was won by Ortega following a brutal crackdown on the opposition. Any rival potential candidates with a chance

to garner a significant number of votes were detained and disqualified from standing for office or forced into exile. Dozens of other opposition members were also arrested. Only a small handful of little-known candidates, who were unlikely to get much support, were allowed to stand. United Nations human rights chief Volker Türk has warned that government repression has deepened further since then, with the rule of law steadily eroded and the persecution of political dissidents escalating. Few Nicaraguans have dared to speak out in public against Ortega and Murillo since more than 300 people were killed when the security forces quashed anti-government protests in 2018. Dissidents living in exile have also been targeted with many stripped of their citizenship by the Ortega government, their homes they left behind in Nicaragua seized and sold.

Japan earthquake death toll rises to 34 as evacuees battle sweltering heat

The number of people who have died after a powerful earthquake hit southwestern Japan has risen to 34, authorities in Kumamoto prefecture said on Thursday. Rescuers are still working to find survivors after the magnitude 6.8 earthquake hit Kumamoto prefecture on Kyushu island on Tuesday, causing widespread damage to houses and power lines. Several people died after part of a shopping centre collapsed and an explosion ripped through the mall about an hour later. Thousands of displaced residents are now staying in evacuation centres - though the challenge is to keep them cool and hydrated as the region battles sweltering heat. Temperatures could reach 39C in the prefecture in the coming days, according to forecasts, with officials urging survivors and rescuers to take precautions against heatstroke. On Wednesday, Japan's defence minister Shinjiro Koizumi announced the delivery of 300 air conditioners to



Kumamoto, with 150 of the units bound for evacuation centres. Around 9,000 displaced residents have been put up in evacuation centres, and more than 30,000 households were out of power as of Wednesday. Yukiya Sanoue, who works at one of the centres, told the BBC that heat stroke was the biggest concern at his facility, which hosts about 1,000 people. About 30% of the people at his evacuation centre are senior citizens. He said their electricity and water supplies had stopped since the earthquake, and the centre had been without air conditioning until Wednesday

afternoon when they received a generator. Quite a few people are suffering from conditions similar to heatstroke, and several have been taken to hospital, he said. More than 100 aftershocks have been recorded since the initial quake, and many have taken to sleeping in their cars for fear of further tremors. Thousands of personnel have been deployed for search-and-rescue operations. Many are digging through rubble at Kashima's Aeon shopping centre, one of the worst-hit buildings where a portion of the second floor collapsed. The mall was also rocked by an explosion about an hour

after the initial quake. The president of Aeon said it was "very likely" a gas explosion, though the cause of the blast remains under investigation. A cat cafe inside the mall said on Wednesday that its 25 cats, which had been left behind during the chaos of the quake, had all since been safely rescued. The quake-hit Aeon mall in Kumamoto had just reopened last month as a revamped shopping complex. It had previously been damaged during a series of strong earthquakes in April 2016, which killed 278 people in the region. Rescuers were also combing a Nippon Paper factory in Yatsushiro city, where at least five people have died after the factory partially collapsed during the quake. Eleven people were trapped in the building, seven of whom have been rescued so far, Nippon Paper said in a statement on Wednesday. The quake, which had a shallow depth of 10km (six miles), shocked residents across Kumamoto.

Veteran Ugandan opposition leader collapses in court and in ICU, his wife says



Ugandan opposition leader Kizza Besigye has been admitted to an intensive care unit (ICU) in the capital, Kampala, after collapsing and losing consciousness during his treason trial, his wife has said. The 70-year-old has been in detention since November 2024. His lead lawyer was arrested last month and charged with allegedly failing to report acts of treason. The visibly frail politician was objecting to state lawyers being appointed to represent him when he fell, prompting prison guards to rush him to hospital. "He is unconscious,

unable to speak, and unresponsive even to a pain stimulus," his wife, Winnie Byanyima, who heads the UN's agency tackling HIV and Aids (UNAids), wrote on X. Besigye, who has run for president against long-serving leader Yoweri Museveni four times, was dramatically abducted in Kenya in 2024 and taken back to Uganda. He has since been held along with his aide, Obeid Lutale, and both have been charged with treason, which they deny. Prosecutors allege that Besigye and his co-accused plotted to overthrow President Museveni's government. Treason is a capital offence in Uganda and if found guilty the veteran politician could be sentenced to death. During Wednesday's hearing at the High Court in Kampala witnesses in court said Besigye repeatedly shouted "stop" about his legal representation before collapsing.

Three children among eight dead in Russian strikes on Ukraine, officials say

Eight people, including two boys and a girl, have died during a Russian missile and drone attack on Ukraine, according to local officials. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky said Russia had launched more than 70 missiles and over 280 drones at the country overnight. The worst attack was near Zelensky's hometown of Kryvyi Rih. Dozens of "ordinary homes, civilian businesses and infrastructure facilities" were destroyed or damaged in the attack, he added. The attack comes after Zelensky met US President Donald Trump in Washington DC this week to urge the US to grant Ukraine a licence to produce Patriot interceptor missiles, which he says are crucial to the country's

where a large family lived, according to Vilkul, and Zelensky said the house had been "blown into smithereens". Two private homes were completely destroyed, the defence council chief said. Another eight people were wounded in the attack, including an 84-year-old woman who was taken to hospital, and two children who were pulled from the rubble alive, officials added. Ukraine had been expecting a Russian offensive, with Zelensky warning just hours before the strikes that Moscow was preparing for a "massive attack". In Kyiv, one person died and fires broke out in three non-residential buildings overnight, the capital's mayor Vitali Klitschko wrote on Telegram.

The experienced Kiran outclassed compatriot Tharun Mannepalli 21-15 21-16 in just 32 minutes to book his place in the last eight. The 25-year-old, who won the 2022 Odisha Open, 2023 Indonesia Masters and the 2023 Odisha Masters, will next face fourth seed Yudai Okimoto of Japan. In women's singles, third seed Unnati, the former Odisha Masters champion, defeated compatriot Tanya Hemanth 21-19 21-12 in an all-Indian contest. Teenager Tanvi, one of India's brightest emerging talents, edged past Indonesia's Thalita Ramadhani Wiryawan 21-17 22-20, while eighth seed Devika beat Indonesia's Ni



Kadek Dhinda Amartya Pratiwi 21-16 21-15. Unnati and Devika are now set for an all-Indian quarterfinal, ensuring India at least one semifinalist in the women's singles, while Tanvi will take on fourth seed Supanida Katethong of Thailand. However, it was

the end of the road for senior pro HS Prannoy and promising youngster Anmol Kharb. Seventh seed Prannoy suffered a 9-21 19-21 defeat to Hong Kong's Jason Gunawan in 39 minutes, while Anmol lost 10-21 20-21 to local second seed Lin Hsiang-Ti.

Praveen Chithravel, Selva Prabhu Qualify For Triple Jump Final At CWG 2026



National record holder Praveen Chithravel and Selva Prabhu advanced to the men's triple jump final round in the Commonwealth Games after finishing second and third respectively in the qualification round on Thursday. Chithravel jumped 16.41m in his first and only attempt to take the second spot. With none of the 14 competitors breaching the automatic final qualification mark of 16.60m under cold and windy conditions, Chithravel did not take his second and third attempts. His national record stands at 17.37m. His season best is

17.08m. Prabhu, however, spent some anxious moments as he fouled his first two attempts but came up with 16.26m in his final effort to end at third. The top 12 performers qualify for the final round to be held on Saturday. Jordan Scott of Jamaica, who has a season best of 17.69m, topped the qualification round with a second round jump of 16.56m. In the men's 400m race, however, national record holder Vishal TK failed to make it to the final round after finishing sixth in his semifinal heat with a below par time of 46.33 seconds.

Hockey India Clarifies Jersey Colour Change To 'Saffron' Amid Backlash

Hockey India, the governing body for the sport in the country, has clarified the reasons behind changing the jersey colour for the men's and women's national teams ahead of the 2026 World Cup. On 27 July, Hockey India released a video on social media confirming that both teams would wear saffron jerseys instead of their traditional blue kits at next month's FIH World Cup in the Netherlands and Belgium. The move away from the traditional blue sparked a backlash on social media and was questioned by former men's team captain Viren Rasquinha. Issuing a clarification on Thursday (30 July), Hockey India stated that the decision to change the primary uniform colour was made because the previous blue kits merged visually with the blue synthetic playing surface. "We wish to inform you that the decision to change the uniform colour was based on recommendations from, and detailed consultations with, the support staff and players. The primary consideration was technical. It was observed that the blue



playing uniform tended to blend with the blue synthetic playing surface, which is now the standard colour for international hockey pitches. This visual similarity affected on-field clarity and visibility for the players," Hockey India said in a statement. The row over jersey colour change intensified after Rasquinha's post questioning Hockey India went viral. On Thursday, the former India captain also called out unnecessary politicisation of his post. "I'm seeing many unnecessary political comments on this. I don't want to get into any of that. My simple & humble point is on pride, identity & legacy. India is to hockey what Argentina is to Football.

Will we ever see Argentina wearing Orange and White stripes as their 1st jersey?" he wrote on X. The governing body added that suggestions were sought regarding potential alternative colours. Ultimately, saffron was selected as the base colour because it features on the country's national flag. "In light of the above, the coaches and players suggested alternative colours, such as yellow or saffron. After careful consideration, saffron was finalised. Apart from addressing the technical requirement, saffron holds deep significance as one of the colours of our National Flag, symbolising courage, sacrifice, and national pride.

Boxer's Commonwealth Games racism claim rejected

Claims made by boxer Aziz Abdul - the grandson of Ugandan dictator Idi Amin - that racism was behind his disqualification at the Commonwealth Games have been rejected by the president of the event organisers. Abdul was ruled to have headbutted England boxer Damar Thomas as the pair grappled during the third round of their fight. The 25-year-old claimed the judges were against him because he is a "black African" and, answering questions from BBC Sport, referred to Thomas by using a racial slur. "When you watch the previous fights of England their boxers create a lot of fouls," said Abdul. "I land a heavy punch on him, they never count. Instead of counting they deduct me. I am black African. He is in homeland." Commonwealth Sport president Donald Rukare, who is also from Uganda, said: "We at Commonwealth Sport believe every athlete is treated fairly and in a non-discriminatory manner. "We are inclusive. That is a field-of-play decision and that is something that was said in the heat of the moment." Before the super-heavyweight bout, Abdul told the BBC he wanted to



become the new 'King of Scotland' - in reference to Amin giving himself that name in 1976. After taking power in a coup in 1971, Amin ran a brutal regime during which an estimated half a million people were killed. He was also known as the Butcher of Uganda. Abdul, who never met his grandfather, was chasing Uganda's first Commonwealth boxing medal since Auckland in 1990 - something which would have been guaranteed had he beaten Thomas. Instead, he was given warnings in the previous two rounds and was trailing on all of

the judges' scorecards. "All I can say about this is the decision is not right, I am not happy," he said. "He elbowed me. He caught me with the elbow. It [the head movement] was not intentional. I was trying to come back. How can I headbutt someone? I would not. "He was the person they wanted to win. He was the winner before. I knew if I did not get knockout I could not win the fight." Rukare raised the prospect of Abdul facing punishment from the Ugandan team. "We have a team manager and chef de mission and I am sure the appropriate chan-

nels will be followed," he said. "We have a code of conduct. I don't represent Uganda here. I am sure that matter will be handled appropriately with our own code of conduct." Thomas, who is now guaranteed at least a bronze medal, said it was "not the way" he wanted to win. "I can't change what happened today but I can control how I box on Friday," he said. Amin - himself a boxer - harboured a fascination with Scotland after serving in the King's African Rifles in his 20s. At the height of the regime, he was fond of wearing a kilt and playing the bagpipes - and even declared himself "King of Scotland" in 1976. Some years later, those predilections even spawned an Oscar-winning film, The Last King of Scotland, starring Forest Whitaker and James McAvoy. In a previous interview, Abdul said he was "inspired" by Amin, although it was not entirely clear whether he was talking about his boxing feats or not. Speaking to the BBC, he refused to answer when asked if he was proud to be the dictator's grandson, but he did address the question of how he feels when he is linked to someone with such a sinister reputation.

Ajinkya Rahane, Veteran Of 85 Tests And 90 ODIs, Announces Shock Retirement

Ajinkya Rahane officially announced his shock retirement from all forms of cricket on Thursday, drawing the curtain on a distinguished career that spanned over a decade for Team India.

Known for his solid technique, calm demeanour, and exceptional record in tough overseas conditions, Rahane scored over 8,000 international runs across formats, featuring in 85 Tests, 90 ODIs, and 20 T20Is. His defining moment as a leader arrived during the famous 2020-21 Border-Gavaskar Trophy, where he captained an injury-depleted Indian side to a historical 2-1 Test series victory in Australia following a century at Melbourne. Giving him more responsibility will help him mature even further," Pravanjan Mullick, a former Odisha Ranji player, told Cricbuzz. Mullick also pointed out that Sooryavanshi was already the vice-captain of Bihar in first-class cricket and he even served as Ayush Mhatre's deputy during the U-19 World

Cup. The selector also expressed his hope that Sooryavanshi one day will captain the Indian cricket team. "He has been doing very well for the country and also had an excellent IPL season with Rajasthan Royals. He is also the vice-captain of Bihar in first-class cricket," Mullick said. "This is a great opportunity for him to take on the responsibility of being vice-captain in the Duleep Trophy.

Former South Africa all-rounder Albie Morkel has been appointed as the new head coach of Joburg Super Kings ahead of the upcoming season of the SA20. Morkel represented South Africa in one Test, 58 ODIs, and 50 T20Is from 2004 to 2015. Over a prolific T20 career spanning 319 matches, he

scored more than 4,000 runs and claimed nearly 250 wickets. Apart from representing the Chennai Super Kings (CSK) in the Indian Premier League (IPL), Morkel has been an integral part of the Joburg Super Kings coaching setup since the franchise's inception in the SA20. "It is an incredible honour to be appointed Head Coach of the Joburg Super Kings. From wearing the Super Kings jersey as a player to now leading one of its franchises as Head Coach, this

journey is truly special. I look forward to building on the strong foundations we've created together and helping this group achieve its full potential," Morkel said in a statement by the franchise on Thursday. The JSK team is yet to make it to the SA20 final in four seasons, and Morkel's first task will be to lead the team towards that goal. Morkel had been a consultant coach with the South African team in this year's T20 World Cup, where they reached the semi-finals. "Albie Morkel has been an invaluable member of our coaching group over the years. He understands what the Super Kings stand for, has built strong relationships with our players and staff, and has played an important role behind the scenes in player development. We are excited to see him take on this new role and lead the team into the next chapter.

DISCUS THROWER SEEMA KALIRAMNA RETURNS TO CWG AFTER EMBRACING MOTHERHOOD



Over the past few seasons, Seema Kaliramna has emerged as one of India's most consistent discus throwers, overcoming personal and professional challenges to establish herself among the country's leading athletes. After making a successful return to competition following motherhood, winning gold at the 2025 National Games and claiming the national title, the 27-year-old Seema now heads into the Commonwealth Games in Glasgow in the best form of her career. With a personal best of 59.73m, achieved earlier this season, and a string of consistent performances that secured her Commonwealth Games qualification, Seema believes progress in discus is built on patience and repetition rather than chasing one big throw. "Discus is an event where consistency matters just as much as distance. Every training session is about improving a little, trusting the process

and making sure you can reproduce your best throws when it matters. I am happy with the work I have put in this season, and Glasgow is another opportunity to test myself against a strong field," she said as per a press release by the Inspire Institute of Sport (IIS). Balancing her sport with motherhood and pursuing a PhD has made Seema's journey one of resilience, and she credits the support system around her for helping her compete at the highest level. "Returning to competition after becoming a mother taught me to be more patient with myself. There were days when balancing training, my PhD and family responsibilities felt overwhelming, but every challenge made me mentally stronger. Having the support of my family and the team at the Inspire Institute of Sport has helped me stay focused on my goal and continue improving as an athlete," she added.

Neeraj Chopra Finishes Ahead Of Arshad Nadeem In CWG Javelin Qualification But This Star Takes Top Spot



India's star javelin thrower Neeraj Chopra, who is a gold medallist at the Tokyo Olympics as well as the 2018 Commonwealth Games, qualified for the CWG 2026 final in Glasgow on Thursday. A total of three Indian players made it to the main event with Yashvir Singh and Rohit Yadav being the other two athletes. The final will take place in the early hours of August 1. Neeraj recorded a best throw of 79.61m, comfortably finishing ahead of his Pakistani opponent Arshad Nadeem, whose best effort was 78.63m which

came in the first attempt. Neeraj began with a throw of 76.28m before registering a distance of 79.61m, which comfortably took him to the final. He ended the qualification round in fifth spot, while Arshad finished at seventh position. Rumesh Tharanga of Sri Lanka grabbed the pole position with his only throw of 82.84m. Grenada's Anderson Peters (81.29m) came second while Douw Smit (80.64m) of South Africa stood third. India's Rohit recorded a best throw of 78.37m, while Yashvir registered a distance of 78.36m. They

grabbed the ninth and 10th spots, respectively. Neeraj won the gold medal at the 2018 Commonwealth Games in Gold Coast but missed the Birmingham 2022 edition due to an injury. The Olympic medallist has now returned to the Games in Glasgow with an eye on securing his second Commonwealth Games title. Earlier, the former world champion competed at the Doha Diamond League, marking his first competition of the 2026 season after recovering from a back injury. In Doha, the former Olympic gold medallist

dusted off the rust and soon found his groove on the third attempt, registering a throw of 85.69 metres to move up to third in the standings at the end of round three. The former World No. 1 followed it up with a throw of 83.45 metres in the fourth round and needed a throw in excess of 86 metres in the fifth round to remain in the top three and qualify for the final shootout. Unfortunately, as things panned out, Neeraj recorded another foul throw and dropped to fourth, bringing an end to his participation.
