All top Union ministers, including Amit Shah, Rajnath Singh, Nirmala Sitharaman and S Jaishankar, were present at the event, besides Chief Justice of India Surya Kant, Chief Election Commissioner Gyanesh Kumar, National Security Advisor Ajit Doval and principal secretaries to the prime minister, PK Mishra and Shaktikanta Das. Reacting sharply, BJP spokesperson Pradeep Bhandari said in a post on X, "Rahul Gandhi misses being present at Red Fort. Can any patriotic LOP (Leader of Opposition), or an individual holding public office, commit such a voluntary act?"

He alleged that Gandhi's decision to skip the event



reflected his hatred for Vande Mataram. "Rahul Gandhi is unfit to be LoP. Rahul Gandhi's mindset reflects that

I-Day speech: 'State interests will be protected,' says CM Vijay

CHENNAI (TSIT):

Chief Minister C Joseph Vijay, in his Independence Day address at Fort St George on Saturday, struck a different note by focusing largely on his government's welfare measures and achievements, while asserting that the TVK government would stand firm on Tamil Nadu's interests and state rights and work towards ensuring a transparent and corruption-free administration.

Addressing the gathering from the ramparts of Fort St George after hoisting the national flag, Vijay said the government would work with the Centre only on administrative matters concerning the welfare of Tamil Nadu.

Earlier, Vijay arrived at Fort St George after leaving his Neelankarai residence



around 8 am. He received the ceremonial guard of honour and inspected the police parade in an open jeep before proceeding to the Fort ram-

parts. He hoisted the Tricolour at around 8.45 am, marking his first Independence Day flag-hoisting ceremony as Tamil Nadu Chief Minister.

Instead of changing names, Cong worked to change economic conditions: Kharge's swipe at Centre on I-Day

New Delhi (TSIT) : Congress President Mallikarjun Kharge on Saturday took a swipe at the NDA government at the Centre during his Independence Day address at the party headquarters, saying that instead of changing names, the Congress "worked to change people's economic conditions".

Kharge listed the contributions made by former and late Prime Ministers belonging to the Congress party, towards building India's economy, military and education sectors, while claiming that "90 per cent" of the progress in India has been brought by the party.

Speaking on the occasion of the 80th Independence Day celebrations at Indira Bhawan, Kharge said: "Today's historic day is not merely a day to commemorate the struggle for Independence, but also an occasion to ask: To what extent has the dream of India



envisioned by our freedom fighters been fulfilled? In its 141-year history, the Congress party fought against foreign colonial rule for 62 years. Millions of people made immense sacrifices and laid down their lives."

He emphasised that the youth played an integral role, not only during the freedom struggle but also in nation building after independence. Highlighting the contribu-

tion of India's first Prime Minister, he said: "Jawaharlal Nehru ji laid the foundation of a modern, democratic, and secular India, and he built institutions like IITs, IIMs, Public Sector Units, as well as basic infrastructure. He referred to irrigation projects as the temples of modern India. Nehru ji did a lot for the country but still he didn't have an iota of arrogance within him."

CM Naidu calls for collective efforts to build Swarna Andhra by 2047

Visakhapatnam (TSIT) Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu extended his Independence Day greetings to the people of Andhra Pradesh and Telugu people across the world, calling upon them to collectively work towards building a developed India and a prosperous Andhra Pradesh by 2047. Addressing the 80th Independence Day celebrations, the Chief Minister said the sacrifices of freedom fighters had secured the country's freedom and the best tribute to them would be to build a stronger future. He urged people to think not about what the country could do for them, but about what they could contribute to the nation. Naidu said providing irrigation to every acre remained a key priority. Nearly Rs.25,000 crore had been spent on irrigation projects in the last 26 months, while an irrigation calendar had been prepared to complete 36 major projects with an estimated investment of Rs.35,000 crore over the next three years. He said



Phase-I of the long-pending Veligonda project would soon be launched and 89 per cent of Polavaram works had been completed. The project would be completed by March next year and dedicated to the nation before the Pushkarams, he said. Stressing the importance of development along with welfare, Naidu said the government was rapidly developing ports, fishing harbours, airports, highways and railway infrastructure. Railway works worth Rs.64,000 crore and highway projects worth

Rs.38,000 crore were currently under way, positioning Andhra Pradesh as a major logistics hub.

Amaravati and Rural Development

Describing Amaravati as a symbol of the self-respect of the people of Andhra Pradesh, Naidu said works worth around Rs.50,000 crore were in progress. The capital would be developed as a green, blue, carbon-neutral and deep-tech city of global standards. He said strengthening villages was essential for the State's progress. Andhra Pradesh had conducted 13,326 Gram Sabhas in a single day and secured 13 national Panchayat awards in two years. More than 9,600 km of CC roads had been constructed under the 'Palle Panduga' programme.

Green Energy and Women Empowerment

Naidu said the government had set a target of increasing the State's green cover to 50 per cent and had already developed mangrove forests over 1,400 hectares. He said electric-

ity tariffs had not been increased during the last two years and Andhra Pradesh was targeting 160 GW of green energy capacity. More than 4.12 lakh households had benefited from rooftop solar installations under the PM Surya Ghar scheme. He said women's economic empowerment was a major priority, with one lakh self-help group members already transformed into entrepreneurs and a target of five lakh entrepreneurs by next year. The 'Swayam AP' brand had also been launched for DWCR products.

Tourism, Governance and Law and Order

Tourism was being promoted as a major source of employment and income, with 107 MoUs involving investments of Rs.19,390 crore signed during the last two years. Beach tourism, temple tourism and homestays were being encouraged, he said. The Chief Minister said revenue reforms were being implemented to resolve land disputes and protect property rights.

INDIA AT 80: THE NATION THAT STOPPED WAITING

India marks its 80th Independence Day today, and with it, eight decades of a nation's argument with its own destiny. Every anniversary is an occasion to celebrate; this one is an occasion to reckon, with the battles fought within our borders and beyond them, with the price paid for the freedom we now take for granted, and with the distance travelled from a fragile young republic to a civilisation that once again speaks in its own voice. There was a time, not so long ago, when India was reduced in the Western imagination to a curiosity: the land of snake charmers, a country whose poverty was assumed and whose potential was doubted. Visitors from the West arrived expecting to be unimpressed and often were. We had no seat at the high table of diplomacy; at best, we were permitted to stand at its edge, non-aligned by policy and, in truth, unaligned with power itself. The world's trajectory was decided elsewhere. India watched and waited. That India no longer exists. Today's India is not non-aligned; it is multi-aligned, courted rather than courting. We are among the world's five largest economies, and when we choose to deepen economic ties with a nation, the relationship reshapes not just our future but theirs. We no longer wait at the edge of the table; we help set its terms. The West, out of old habit, still offers its sermons on democracy. But India's answer is no longer rhetoric, it is our young population building, launching, and governing a future of its own making. Indian private enterprise now reaches into space without waiting on the state's permission or purse. A generation once caricatured for its restlessness is, in fact, laying the foundations of what may well be remembered as the Indian century. None of this arrived without cost. For nearly four decades, half of independent India's life, the nation has fought a war that was never formally declared: Pakistan-sponsored terrorism in Jammu and Kashmir and beyond. From Pulwama to Pahalgam, the intent behind these attacks was never only to kill civilians and spread fear. It was to slow India down, to choke a rising power in its own blood before it could rise further. Pakistan, having failed its own people, chose instead to export chaos to ours. That strategy has not gone unanswered. The surgical strikes of 2016, following the Uri terror attack, and the Balakot airstrikes of 2019, following the Pulwama attack, announced a new doctrine of response. But Operation Sindoor in 2025, launched after the Pahalgam attack, marked a paradigm shift, a demonstration that India's patience has limits, and its reach does not. The image of a base near Rawalpindi in flames is one that Pakistan's military establishment will not soon forget. India intends that it shouldn't. Alongside this external vigilance came an internal reckoning. The abrogation of Article 370 in 2019 closed a chapter of manufactured separatism that had defined Jammu and Kashmir for over three decades, opening instead a slow, uneven, but real path toward development and opportunity. Change in J&K was never going to arrive overnight after decades of neglect, but it has, finally, begun to arrive. Elsewhere, in the forests and hinterlands of the Red Corridor, another war quietly turned.

Tracing India's Journey Through PM Modi's Independence Day Speeches

There is a simple way to measure the distance India has travelled in the last decade: listen to the prime minister's Independence Day speeches. Things have changed; it is undeniable. But what has also changed is the very nature of what Prime Minister Narendra Modi has to talk about. In the early years of the Modi government, the speeches were often about problems that we may today consider as ordinary: toilets, electricity, poverty, roads, bank accounts, fertiliser shortages. But the prime minister's tone was urgent when he addressed them. The challenge was to fix what was broken, reach those who had been left out. Over the years, his vocabulary began to change. The conversation moved from access to aspiration, from plugging gaps to building capabilities, from solving immediate problems to creating systems that could prevent those problems from defining India again. From dignity to delivery and onwards to dreams - that has been the trajectory our nation has taken in just about 13 years of PM Modi's leadership. Perhaps that is also why the length and sweep of his Independence Day addresses have become a phenomenon in themselves. For a prime minister whose working life is famously relentless, the sheer time devoted to presenting the nation's journey from the Red Fort is telling. These are not simply annual speeches; read together, they become something closer to a running record of the country's transformation. And there is no better starting point than the promise PM Modi made in 2023. He said, in part, "When I came in 2014, I came with a promise of change. Through reform, perform, transform, I have turned this promise into belief. Based on my performance, you blessed me once again in 2019. The next five years will be the years of unprecedented development." It will be impossible to analyse every change, but using the Independence Day speeches as a lens, let's look backwards before looking forward. If "unprecedented development" was the promise, the Independence Day speeches provide an unusually revealing way of asking: what happened to the prob-



lems that once occupied the prime minister's attention? The answer lies in how India moved from firefighting to future-proofing. When Poverty Became A Possibility We Could Defeat In 2014, poverty was presented as a national challenge requiring a national resolve. PM Modi asked, "If the people of India could remove such a big empire without the power of the government, without weapons and even without resources, then friends, it is the need of the hour to eradicate poverty, can we not overcome poverty? Can we not defeat poverty?" Seven years later, in the midst of a once-in-a-century pandemic, he said, "The way India has kept the stoves burning in the poor households by providing free food grains to 80 crore countrymen continuously for months during the pandemic is not only astonishing to the world but also a matter of discussion." Readers should appreciate that a decade is a minuscule period in the trajectory of a billion-plus nation. And by 2023, the vocabulary had moved beyond simply fighting poverty, to measuring people who had escaped it: "In my first five-year term, 13.5 crore of my fellow poor brothers and sisters have been freed from the chains of poverty and entered the new middle class. There can be no greater satisfac-

tion in life than this." By 2026, when PM Modi reiterated how 25 crore people had risen out of poverty, it was nothing less than a declaration that we were finally and perhaps for the first time in our history arresting the backward slide and beginning to move forward. The courage to dream big and achieve big is the hallmark of the new India, and the world has been forced to take note of our efforts. The welfare reached the people, and the nation reached for the stars. Few contrasts capture the transformation better than the distance between the 2014 and 2026 speeches. In 2014, the prime minister spoke about something as fundamental as sanitation and dignity: "Can't we just make arrangements for toilets for the dignity of our mothers and sisters?" That was the India that needed to solve first-order problems. But the same national conversation eventually reached semiconductors. This year, announcing seven to eight new semiconductor plants in the pipeline, the prime minister hinted at technological sovereignty. In today's digital world and the age of technology, we understand the importance of chips. Whether it is electronic goods, medical equipment or transportation systems, chips are indispensable to all of them. Without chips, the entire world could come to a standstill.

We were still building, but the 'what' had changed dramatically. We once built for our most basic needs. Today, it builds for the world's most advanced ones. Similarly, in 2016, PM Modi spoke of basic rural infrastructure, that rural roads are a perpetual issue in our country. Every rural citizen craves for pakka roads. In 2025, India's Gaganyaan aimed at becoming aatmanirbhar with tasks like building our own space station. This year, PM Modi spoke about how a homegrown startup was able to send a rocket to space in a first attempt. We are still thinking of connectivity, but in a little over a decade, it has moved from the gamin ilaaka (rural areas) to the great beyond, as outer space is often referred to. There are far too many examples that can be sought out, as they should be - because they show us how far we have come, and how we are going to continue ahead at full steam - all aboard the reform express. Startup India, the prime minister's flagship initiative that redefined how young India viewed the future, is a perfect example. In 2015, it was a resolve. "I have to provide strength to startups and, therefore, I resolve that in the coming days 'Startup India' and 'Stand-up India' will be there." A year later, the resolve had become an

ambition to ensure that no district or block was left untouched by startups. By 2021, startups were becoming unicorns; by 2023, India had entered the world's top three startup ecosystems. And by 2025, more than 300 Indian startups were operating in the space sector alone. Nari Shakti Becomes Changemaker Consider once the significance of this journey for India's women, our Nari Shakti. They had to wait for darkness due to lack of toilets - something that the prime minister spoke of in his very first Independence Day address. By 2018, he declared that institutional doors into the armed forces, including the Permanent Commission, had been thrown open to them. By 2023, women in villages were becoming entrepreneurs, technology users and leaders. It is indeed fulfilling to see that while on the one hand our CEOs are dominating the global business landscape, on the other hand one crore mothers and sisters joined women self-help groups and are becoming 'lakhpati didis'. By 2025, PM Modi told us that our Nari Shakti is dominating startups, space, sports and the armed forces and in 2026, he assured that soon, we will see six crore 'lakhpati didis' bolstering our rural economy. We have moved beyond simply empowering women by making them leaders and epicentres of transformation. From ensuring basic dignity towards ensuring 33 per cent representation in parliament and state assemblies. Are these not women-led development in action? The real story of these speeches, then, is not merely what India has achieved, but how profoundly its sense of possibility has changed. PM Modi's speeches are perhaps the clearest measure of change. They show how a nation acquired the confidence to solve problems that once seemed impossible. That is the real audacity of a nation's ambition: to dream bigger, and having travelled far enough to have the confidence and the conviction to transform those dreams into reality.

NOAKHALI TO PARLIAMENT, WHAT GANDHI, NEHRU, JINNAH AND FAIZ WERE DOING ON AUG 15, 1947

On February 20, 1947, British Prime Minister Clement Attlee announced that the British would leave India. On June 3, Viceroy Lord Louis Mountbatten published a plan to transfer power in the next 72 days. The task included the partition of the subcontinent, dividing its army, civil service, railways, police and postal system, and apportioning the respective share of assets down to the office equipment, etc. Mountbatten had a tear-off calendar at his table that showed how many days were left to complete the task. On August 15, 1947, the country's first Prime Minister, Jawaharlal Nehru, made a ringing speech inside Parliament at midnight, saying, "Long ago we made a tryst with destiny, and now the time comes when we shall redeem our pledge..." Minutes after the historic speech, Nehru arrived at the Viceregal Palace (now Rashtrapati Bhavan) to formally invite Mountbatten to become independent India's Governor-General, and handed him an envelope that supposedly contained the names of his Council of Ministers. Perhaps in the excitement of independence, someone had sealed the envelope without putting the list inside. An 'Inauspicious' Day For Mountbatten Some astrologers had considered August 15, 1947, to be inauspicious, but for Mountbatten, it was a red-letter day. In 1945, Tokyo



was surrendered by the Japanese Army, where Mountbatten was serving as Allied Supreme Commander. August 15, 1945, is remembered as Victory over Japan (V-J) Day. Across the border, Pakistan came into being on August 14. It was the 26th day of the ongoing month of Ramazan when Mohammad Ali Jinnah hosted a lunch for Lord Mountbatten, while many in the newly created Islamic state were observing fast. Interestingly, Pakistan should have come into existence on August 15. The Indian Independence Act, promulgated on July 18, 1947, in the British Parliament, reads, "As from the fifteenth day of August, nineteen hundred and forty-seven, two independent Dominions shall be set up in India, to be known respectively as India and Pakistan." Thus, legally, Pakistan should have come into existence on August 15, 1947. But August 14 became

the official date because Mountbatten had to travel from Karachi to New Delhi. At the time of our country's independence, Mahatma Gandhi was walking barefoot from village to village in Noakhali district of Bengal, in a hostile atmosphere created by riots, making people take a pledge not to kill others. He carried holy books, appealing to Hindus as well as Muslims to ensure peace. There was a moving incident in a village, where Gandhi reportedly asked the local Hindus and Muslims to come out of their hutments for a common prayer and a common pledge for peace. But nobody turned up. Gandhi waited for half an hour in vain. He then came up with an ingenious plan. He approached young boys with a ball and remarked, "Small kids from this village, your parents are frightened of each other, but what fright can you have? Elderly Hindus and Muslims might be fright-

ened of one another. But children are innocent. You are children of God. I am inviting you to play the game of ball." After playing with them for half an hour, Gandhi told villagers, "You have no courage, but if you want that courage, induct it from your children." The Visit To Kingsway Hospital When Gandhi returned to Delhi, he learnt that his disciple, Subhadra Joshi, was hospitalised at Kingsway Hospital in Delhi. Gandhi came to visit her. He asked Subhadra how many innocent lives had been lost in Delhi due to the communal violence. When Subhadra speculated that the figure could be more than a thousand, Gandhi asked if it included some Congress peace-workers too. Subhadra recalled that Gandhi was dismayed to hear her reply, 'none', and he wondered how he could believe that she and the other Congress peace-workers had tried to save innocent lives.

ATTACK ON SUKHBIR BADAL: TIME TO HEAL, TIME TO RETHINK PANTHAK POLITICS

A sacred Sikh space in the Deccan has become the setting for a question Punjab can no longer avoid. What happens when religious identity, grievance and violence begin appearing too closely together? The motive behind the attack on Sukhbir Singh Badal remains under investigation. But the incident raises questions about the direction of Sikh public discourse. I was in Nanded in June, walking through a city where Sikh history feels inseparable from the cultural world around it. Takht Sachkhand Sri Hazur Sahib is a holy centre of enormous importance, associated with Guru Gobind Singh's final days in 1708 and the continuing Sikh presence in the Deccan. That experience challenged the neat categories through which many of us in Delhi have understood Sikhi. Sikhs in the Deccan have absorbed the cultural landscape around them without surrendering their own identity. Then, back in London, came the news that Sukhbir Singh Badal had been attacked inside a gurdwara in Nanded by Jaspal Singh, identified by police as a Nihang. Badal reportedly suffered a penetrating wound to his hand and underwent surgery. A Faith That Leaves Room For Mercy The question is larger than Badal. He carries political baggage. The sacrilege incidents of 2015, during the Akali-BJP government, caused a wound that cannot be dismissed in religious life. The controversies around the handling of those cases



and the religious pardon granted to Sirda Dera chief Ram Rahim by the then Jathedar of the Akal Takht for an earlier instance of blasphemy, followed by its revocation, remain embedded in Sikh memory. Badal later sought Panthak and religious forgiveness for wrongdoings committed during his years in power. Sikhi gives considerable space to confession, correction and forgiveness. Gurbani places daya at the heart of the Sikh moral imagination. "Make compassion the cotton, contentment the thread, modesty the knot and truth the twist." — Guru Nanak, Ang 471, Sri Guru Granth Sahib The Guru turns daya into the material from which the sacred thread of the soul is made. Compassion is foundational. Guru Arjan, the fifth Guru, describes the Divine as: "The Supreme Being is the treasure of mercy, compassionate

and forgiving." So what should religious wrongdoing produce? A demand for accountability, repentance and justice. The answer cannot be presumed to be violence. And in Nanded, with the motive still unknown, it would be irresponsible to presume that it was. The Nihangs And A Damaging Headline There is another uncomfortable part of this story. The Nihang order has a long and important place in Sikh history, associated with martial service, protection of Sikh institutions and distinctive traditions. In recent years, however, Nihangs have repeatedly entered public headlines for the wrong reasons. In England, the murder of 18-year-old Henry Nowak by Vickrum Digwa became entangled in public discussion about Sikh identity, the kirpan and the convicted attacker's association with Nihang traditions. Sikh

organisations condemned the murder. The case also generated wider hostility and misinformation around Sikhs in Britain this year. Now Nanded brings the Nihang identity back into headlines, this time through an attack on the head of the Shiromani Akali Dal inside a gurdwara. This recurring association with acts of violence in public discourse should concern the Sikh community. A tradition known for the kirpan, a symbol whose name is traditionally linked to kirpa, or grace, cannot allow a sword used as an attacking weapon to become its most visible public language. Looking Beyond The Panthak Space Badal is at his strongest when he acts as a public figure for Punjab in all its diversity. Last year, when floods ravaged the state, he was on the ground. During the farmers' agitation, he stood beside farmers.



FRANCE'S TOP COURT BLOCKS SOCIAL MEDIA BAN FOR UNDER-15S



France's top court has struck down a ban on social media for under-15s, saying it infringed upon freedom of expression. The legislation was backed by French lawmakers in July, making it the first European country to block young people from the platforms, after concerns over the harmful effects on children's mental health. Friday's ruling by the Constitutional Council overrides the ban, which Emmanuel Macron had pledged would be introduced in stages from September. Responding to the news, the French president immediately asked Prime Minister Sébastien Lecornu to prepare a new draft that would take into account all the council's points. After lawmakers voted through the bill last month, Lecornu referred parts of the legislation to the council - a nine-member authority that checks whether a law complies with the constitution - for review. The Constitutional Council said it had found that Article 1 of the legislation "constitutes an infringement that is neither appropriate, necessary, nor proportionate" to the freedom of expression and communi-

cation for under-15s. The ruling also raised concerns over the law's requirement to provide proof of age to access online services and said it failed to establish "the legal safeguards necessary". Macron's office said after the ruling that the French government would work "as quickly as possible" to propose a new draft and said the president was determined to see the reform implemented by early 2027. The original legislation had envisaged that from September all those under-15 would not be able to open accounts, and verification would be required on all new accounts. And from January, this would have applied to all existing accounts. Opponents have repeatedly questioned the law's viability and raised concerns over privacy, the efficacy of age-verification tools, the risks of young people bypassing them, and how quickly the ban has been designed and brought in. Australia was the first country to introduce last December a social media ban for those under-16, although it is widely acknowledged that many in the country continue to use the platforms.

US AIRCRAFT CARRIER ON WAY TO RELIEVE USS LINCOLN AFTER ISSUES REPORTED ABOARD

A US aircraft carrier is headed to the Middle East to replace the USS Abraham Lincoln, on which thousands of sailors have reportedly faced food shortages and difficult conditions on an extended, nine-month deployment. The USS George Washington, which was near Malaysia on Thursday, could arrive in the region in about nine days, BBC analysis shows. Family members of sailors aboard the Lincoln have expressed concern about their mental health deteriorating due to the conditions, with some sailors having reportedly attempted to jump overboard. While the US Navy has acknowledged supply challenges, it has denied that a mental health crisis was taking place on the Lincoln, which has 5,000 aboard. US President Donald Trump denied that family members



were concerned about the welfare of their relatives and dismissed the possibility that the deployment had been too long. "Not nearly long enough," he told reporters on Friday. Trump also confirmed that another ship will replace the Lincoln, although he did not identify it by name. The USS George Washington left a naval facility in Yokosuka, Japan in May to patrol the Pacific region and is now head-

ed to replace the Lincoln, CBS News, the BBC's US partner, reported, citing a US official. Tracking data compiled by BBC Verify shows that at its last recorded speed, the vessel would reach Dugm port in Oman, about 500 miles off the coast of Iran, around 22 August. Once it arrives in the Middle East, it will be the third aircraft carrier in the area. The USS George HW Bush is also there. No US aircraft car-

rier will remain in the Pacific. The Lincoln has been at sea since 11 December on a deployment that was initially scheduled to end in May, tracking data compiled by BBC Verify shows. Earlier this week, the Military Times and Stars & Stripes reported that the families of multiple sailors reported that their loved ones had considered jumping overboard due to conditions on the vessel. The conditions have reportedly included poor sanitation, infrequent ports-of-call, broken plumbing, exhaustion and shortages of fresh food. In an interview with the BBC, a relative of a sailor on the Lincoln claimed that their family member had lost 65lbs (29kg) since the ship headed out to sea and had been suffering from exhaustion because of the constant noise of aircraft and the ship's vibrations.

SOUTH KOREA PROPOSES TALKS TO OFFICIALLY END WAR WITH NORTH



South Korea's president has proposed talks with its northern neighbour on officially ending the war between the two that is technically still active. Lee Jae Myung suggested a "multi-layered security system" to avoid flare-ups along the countries' de-facto border, known as the demilitarised zone (DMZ), and offered to discuss practical ways of halting Pyongyang's nuclear ambitions. North Korea has continually tested ballistic missiles capable of carrying nuclear warheads, which has been perceived in Seoul and nearby Japan as an attempt to intimidate and project power. The conflict between the two occupants of the Korean peninsula has been effectively frozen since an armistice was signed in 1953. However, there have been clashes and tensions along the DMZ in the decades since, along with accusations from both sides of provocations, including dropping balloons carrying rubbish and propaganda. Lee, who became South Korean president last year after his predecessor Yoon Suk Yeol was impeached for attempting to declare martial law, has sought to thaw relations with North Korea and its ally China, which had soured under Yoon. "Let us put down our intentions to threaten each other and begin discussions to end the long-running war as the directly involved parties," he told a ceremony marking Liberation Day, which commemorates the peninsula's liberation from Japanese

rule. Lee expressed hope that the two nations "will sit face-to-face for peaceful coexistence and mutual growth", adding this could serve as a forum for discussing "effective ways to halt the advancement of the North's nuclear capabilities". North Korea declared itself a nuclear power in 2022 and vowed never to relinquish its weapons, of which it is estimated to possess dozens. Lee has previously said Pyongyang was producing 15 to 20 more warheads annually, telling the BBC last year he would back a deal between US President Donald Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un to freeze production. He said this was a "realistic" goal, while Seoul continued to push for full denuclearisation. Trump is the only western leader to have met Kim, which happened during the US president's first term. Though he has turned his attention to other regions since returning to the White House, Trump said last August that he hoped to meet Kim again when "appropriate". North Korea has yet to react to Lee's offer. The authoritarian regime's state news agency carried news of Kim marking the country's own Liberation Day commemorations with a wreath-laying and guard of honour. Pyongyang has previously rebuffed Lee's offers of engagement, criticising a deal for the US to build South Korea a fleet of nuclear-powered submarines and denouncing joint drills between the two allies.

Activists try to deliver aid to Palestinians in homes besieged by Israeli settlers

Activists have tried to deliver supplies to Palestinians whose homes in the occupied West Bank have been besieged for days by Israeli settlers. The group left water and food near one of the houses in Qusra where two Palestinian families have been trapped since Sunday, with their power and water supplies cut off. Two of the residents said Israeli forces had prevented the activists from delivering the aid directly to them, and the supplies had to be left outside. The Israel Defense Forces (IDF) denied this. Also on Friday, a number of settlers returned to set up a tent near the site - a day after an operation to disperse them from the area. It was later removed by Israeli forces. The IDF said Qusra was a "closed military zone" and so Israeli civilians - who were among the activists - could not enter the area. "But they weren't prevented from transferring aid to the Palestinian homes in Qusra." It said in a further statement that Israeli civilians had erected a tent in the



Qusra area earlier on Friday, "and IDF soldiers operated to remove it while protecting the local residents". About a dozen Palestinian households were told to leave their properties during the operation to disperse settlers on Thursday, including members of the Abu Ridi and Hassan families living in two of their three besieged homes. Qusra Mayor Abdul Azim Wadi told the BBC that Israeli forces were using some of the vacated Palestinian houses as barracks. The Israeli military said the aim was "to protect the residents" and soldiers

had been "instructed that the Qusra residents will remain in their homes". A spokesman had previously described the settlers' actions as "deplorable" and "unacceptable", adding that the government would investigate and arrest those responsible. The situation in Qusra began on Sunday when settlers blocked the road to the Palestinian families' gates and cut off their power and water supplies. The first Israeli soldiers who came to the site prayed with the settlers - an act for which the Israeli military said they would be disciplined. An

attempt by Israeli security forces to dislodge the settlers on Wednesday led to confrontations with a bigger group. Palestinian security camera video shared with the BBC showed confrontations between Israeli soldiers and border police and a large crowd of settlers. The security forces used tear gas and stun grenades. It is not clear exactly what the settlers in Qusra want. In the past, settlers have forced Palestinians out of their homes and seized their properties. Their stated aim is to empty the area of its Palestinian residents. Settlements are illegal under international law, but the Israeli government has promoted their recent rapid expansion. The case is the latest to draw attention to the relative impunity of settlers and how Israeli forces are struggling to deal with rising settler violence. Since January 2023, 127 Palestinian communities in the occupied West Bank have experienced full or partial displacement, including 47 that have been entirely displaced.

FAMILY STRANDED AT SEA FOR 16 HOURS AFTER JET SKI CAPSIZED IN THAILAND



A French family was left stranded at sea for more than 16 hours overnight after their rented jet ski capsized off the coast of Thailand. A 50-year-old father and his sons, five and seven, were left "pale" and "exhausted after swallowing a lot of seawater" before being rescued, local government official Amorn Chomchoey told AFP. All three were taken to hospital for checks but were discharged shortly afterwards, Chomchoey said. The father had rented the jet ski for a 45-minute ride on Koh Samui, one of Thailand's most popular islands for tourists, at

around 17:00 local time (10:00 GMT) on Thursday, the Bangkok Post reports. Rescuers were alerted after the jet ski was not returned at the agreed time. People used speedboats and more jet skis to comb the waters surrounding Koh Samui and towards the nearby island of Koh Phangan searching for the family, the Bangkok Post reports. Search efforts had to be suspended overnight before the family were found still drifting at sea the following day, Thai media report. The father and sons were found by rescuers at around 10:00 local time on Friday, according to AFP.

Many Canadians are boycotting the US, so this is where they're travelling instead

Prior to US President Donald Trump's re-election, Kent Truscott and his family, from London, Ontario, had taken multiple trips south of the border, including to California and most recently New York in 2023. But since late 2024, "my family and I have completely decided to boycott the United States", he told BBC. That meant cancelling a trip last spring to Texas to watch the SpaceX Starship launch with his brother. The two had planned to fly down from Toronto, rent a car and stay a week to watch the launch, likely spending "thousands of dollars". Truscott and his wife decided to spend that money in Canada instead - the Atlantic provinces of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, to be exact. Their



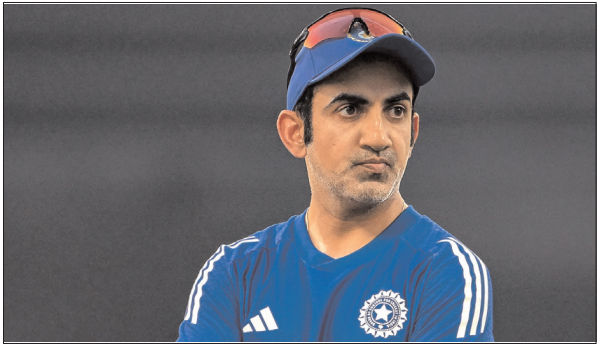
decision is a response to US tariffs and the president's comments about annexing their country. More than a year after Trump's return to the White House, many Canadians like Truscott are still holding firm on their boycott on travel to the US. Even with a slight uptick in road trips to the US in April, Canadians made 800,000 fewer trips that month com-

pared to the same time in 2024, before Trump was elected, according to national data. The boycott has meant a loss of about C\$3.3bn (\$2.35bn; £1.75bn) in travel revenue for the US last year - money that Canadians have instead chosen to spend overseas or exploring their own country. That financial void has been felt by a number of

American cities and states, who have urged Canadians to return through targeted advertisements and special deals. In July, New York City's tourism board said it will offer Broadway tickets and hotel rooms to Canadian tourists at a 30% discount. The BBC spoke to a few Canadians about why they have chosen to avoid the US, where they have gone instead and what it would take for them to return. Not everyone is driven solely by Trump's treatment of Canada, with some noting that the declining Canadian dollar has also made the US less affordable. But many say they feel their country's relationship with the US has hit a breaking point, and that it would take a lot for them to return, if at all.

India's 2011 World Cup-Winning Coach's Big Verdict On Gautam Gambhir Amid Criticism

Coach Gary Kirsten, who was in charge when India won the 2011 Cricket World Cup, has backed Gautam Gambhir amid criticism. The India head coach has been under the scanner for the team's poor performances, especially in Test and T20Is. Under Gambhir, the team suffered white-washes at the hands of New Zealand and South Africa. Of late, the Indian cricket team was clean swept by Ireland in a two-match T20I series before being outplayed by England by a 4-0 margin in yet another disappointing outing in the format. Kirsten said he enjoyed working with Gambhir during his stint as India coach. He added that he was confident of Gambhir's success as a coach as well. "He's a fantastic coach. He's had incredible success. He has won a T20 World Cup (2026) and the ICC Champions Trophy (2025). He's also had success in the IPL (Gambhir was the team



mentor for the 2024 IPL champions, Kolkata Knight Riders). His record speaks for itself. I really enjoyed working with him when he was a player. He's a smart cricketer and I knew he'd have success as a coach," Kirsten told Times of India. Kirsten coached India from 2008 to 2011, which included the World Cup glory that saw the side defeat Sri Lanka in the final to clinch the prestigious trophy after a wait of 28 years. Gambhir, who was active as an international cricketer from 2003 to 2016, also played under Kirsten's coaching. "It was a great three years

and a privileged one to work with Indian players. There was a lot of skill in that dressing room. What I appreciated was that they accepted me into their space and felt I could add value," Kirsten added. In April this year, Kirsten took over the role of head coach for the Sri Lanka national team. "I've approached the Sri Lankan role with the same seriousness," he said. India and Sri Lanka are set to play a two-match Test series, starting August 15 in Galle. The second and final game of the series will begin on August 23 in Colombo.

Nationwide Talent Hunt To Be Launched With Olympics 2036 In Focus:PM Modi

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday said India is a strong contender to host the 2036 Olympics and to ensure that the country also has a strong presence in the mega-event, a nationwide talent hunt would be launched to identify prospects in the age group of 5 to 15. Addressing the country from the ramparts of Red Fort on the 80th Independence Day, Modi said the government's flagship Target Olympic Podium Scheme (TOPS), which was launched in 2014, has been a major success in providing support to athletes. "India is making space for itself in the world of sports. We hear our national anthem frequently and see our tri-colour going up very often. TOPS has achieved great success. Whether it is Khelo India Games, University Games, Beach Games, Winter Games, or sports training, sports medicine, sports nutrition, India is moving ahead at great pace," he said. "India's performance is improving, and we are strong contenders to become an Olympic host in 2036. We are hosting the CWG in 2030. There are about 40 disciplines in Olympics,



with nearly 350 events. It is sad that we don't compete in at least two third of these events because we are not even able to qualify. "We have decided that in 2036, we should have participation in at least three fourth events. We are launching a nationwide talent hunt for children aged 5 to 15 to identify prospects in every corner of the country. They will get special training to become world class athletes," he added. The fate of India's 2036 bid is expected to be

known only in 2029. PTI had reported in January this year that plans to start a talent hunt with the 2036 Games in view were in the brainstorming stage so that the country finds its footing in disciplines like aquatics and cycling. Both these competitions offer over a 100 Olympic medals combined but none so far for India. It's an approach that China adopted for the 2008 Beijing Olympics. It drastically improved its performance in disciplines that it did

n't do well previously, such as boxing, canoeing and archery, for a record tally of 100 medals in that edition. Driving India's expansion plan would be aquatics, cycling, rowing and gymnastics. Aquatics, which includes swimming, diving, waterpolo, artistic swimming, and open water swimming, will offer 55 of the more than 350 overall medals that will be up for grabs across 36 disciplines in the 2028 Los Angeles Olympics. But India is not expected to get any of these. Ditto for rowing, which has 45 medals at stake in Los Angeles across 15 events, and cycling, where 22 events will throw up 66 medals. India is hosting the 2030 CWG in Ahmedabad, which is also in the race to host the 2036 Olympics. The talent hunt programme will rely heavily on Artificial Intelligence which will be used for fitness battery tests, which are a series of exercises to measure cardiovascular endurance, muscular strength, speed and agility, flexibility and balance along with movement. "Not every school-going kid would know his sporting capabilities or take to sport naturally.

BCCI To Take Big Call On Ajit Agarkar's Future After Sri Lanka Test Series. Big Details Emerge

The Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) office bearers are set to meet selection committee chairman Ajit Agarkar after India's Test series against Sri Lanka to discuss his future, according to a report by The Indian Express. Agarkar will complete three years as chairman in September and is eligible for a one-year extension. The report claimed that the meeting will take place amid differences of opinion between the selectors and the BCCI regarding Rohit Sharma's future. While the selectors had reportedly informed Sharma that they were looking to replace him in the squad after the England series in July, BCCI secretary Devajit Saikia said that Sharma will "continue to represent the country as long as he is in the scheme of things". The report further claimed that the BCCI wants the selectors to assess Sharma's future on a series-by-series basis in the lead-up to the 2027 ODI World Cup. However, Saikia's



comments reportedly left the selectors unhappy. Earlier, former India head coach Ravi Shastri has lauded Rohit Sharma for his brilliant century against England in the third and final ODI at Lord's, stating that the opener has 'shut everyone up' on speculations about his future in the 50-over format. Rohit made a sublime 138 – the first ODI century hit by an

Indian batter at Lord's and quashed speculations about the end of his 50-over set-up. He shared stands of 147 and 113 with skipper Shubman Gill (77) and Virat Kohli (74), though it went in vain as India lost by 27 runs and suffered a 2-1 series defeat. "He didn't need to do so, but he shut up everybody, because when you get those kinds of rumours floating

Real Madrid coach Jose Mourinho on Saturday named new record signing Yan Diomande and stars Kylian Mbappe and Jude Bellingham in his team's squad for the first time, to face German side Schalke in a friendly this weekend. Los Blancos take on Schalke on Sunday in Gelsenkirchen in their final friendly before they kick off their La Liga season on August 22 at Espanyol. Marc Cucurella, Thibaut Courtois and Ibrahima Konate were also named in the squad for the first time under Mourinho, following holidays after playing with their countries at the World Cup like Diomande, Mbappe and Bellingham. Madrid have overhauled their squad after two straight seasons



without winning a major trophy, signing several players including Diomande, for 140 million

euros (\$162 million) including bonuses from RB Leipzig, as well as Cucurella and Konate.

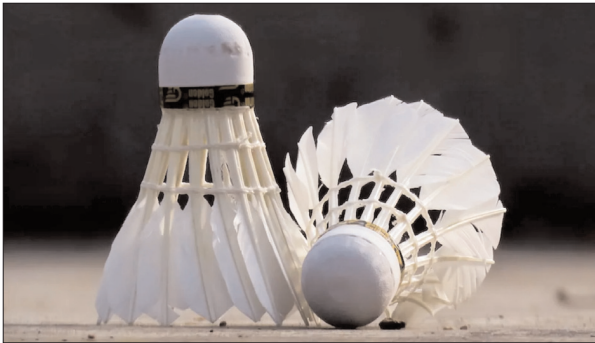
'Commitment To Growth': Hero MotoCorp's Long Partnership With World Hockey

and practice areas at the K.D. Jadhav Indoor Hall and the Indira Gandhi Indoor Stadium during the India Open, drawing attention to the poor state of the facilities. "We've worked on every issue that came up then, and I'm happy to say those problems have been resolved completely. Sanjay Mishra told PTI on the sidelines of the draw ceremony for the World Championships, which begin in New Delhi on August 17. Venus Williams Falls Again At Cincinnati Open, Singles Skid Hits 13 With 6-2, 6-2 Loss To Qualifier



Venus Williams' losing streak in singles play has reached 13 matches. The seven-time major champion was defeated 6-2, 6-2 by Emiliana Arango on Friday in the first round of the Cincinnati Open. The 46-year-old Williams received a wild-card entry to the WTA 1000 event. She has not won a singles match since July 2025. Arango, a 25-year-old qualifier from Colombia ranked 95th, needed 1 hour, 5 minutes to defeat Williams on the grandstand court at Lindner Tennis Center. Williams had her serve broken in the first game of the match and faced an uphill battle the rest of the way. Arango was 4 of 5 on converting break points and won 71% of her first-serve points. Williams was unable to convert on her lone break opportunity and was only 41% on first-serve points. "That kind of eased my nerves a little bit of having maybe a little bit of breathing room. And then I think I just did a good job of staying on it, trying to make her play as much as possible." Arango said

about getting ahead early. Arango will face No. 7 seed and defending Cincinnati champion Iga Swiatek in the second round. Williams' last singles victory came last year in Washington, when she defeated Peyton Stearns. "I think that at all times I was really controlling the point, but unfortunately didn't finish it the way I wanted to," said Williams, who is making her 11th appearance in the tournament. "The encouraging part is that I'm controlling the shots, but I have to just get a little more consistent on that last part." Williams will remain in Cincinnati to play doubles with her sister, Serena, after they received a wild-card entry. They last played doubles together at the 2022 U.S. Open. The Williams sisters were slated to play doubles at Wimbledon before an injury to Serena. They will play Marta Kostyuk and Peyton Stearns in the first round. The doubles portion of the tournament starts Sunday. "I'm excited and hope that we can both go into it fresh, on our toes and ready.

"I can't find a label for his worth as a person. We aren't talking about his

value as a player, but his worth as a wonderful human being with a huge heart. Sometimes, words just aren't enough." Messi trained with the team on Friday morning as Inter Miami prepared to face Nashville SC on Saturday in MLS action.
