

Seed Access Road Opens as Gateway to Amaravati Capital

Visakhapatnam. (TSIT) Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu on Thursday inaugurated the Seed Access Road and steel bridges over the Buckingham Canal, describing the road as the “gateway” to Amaravati and the first major step in the construction of the state capital. The Seed Access Road connects Amaravati with Vijayawada, Mangalagiri and Guntur, providing improved connectivity to the capital region. The Chief Minister, along with Ministers P. Narayana and Nadendla Manohar, unveiled a plaque at Undavalli to mark the inauguration. The CRDA has constructed the Seed Access Road from Rayapudi through



Venkatapalem and Penumaka to Undavalli. The third phase is planned to connect the road to National Highway-16 near Manipal Hospital at an estimated cost of Rs.1,519 crore.

Speaking at a public meeting after inspecting the road and steel bridges, Naidu said Amaravati represented the first success of his vision for the development of Andhra Pradesh. He recalled the contribution of farmers who voluntarily gave their lands for the capital and thanked them for their support. He said the government was committed to developing Amaravati along with all regions of the state. Naidu said Amaravati was being developed as a modern, pollution-free and technology-driven capital. He said the city was being planned around five major concepts, including blue and green development, green energy, deep technology and quantum technology. Amaravati would emerge as an AI and Quantum Computing Valley and one of the country's top cities, he said.

The Chief Minister said Amaravati, Mangalagiri-Tadepalli, Guntur and Vijayawada would form part of the wider capital region. He thanked the Centre for approving a 190-km Outer Ring Road and a 96-km Inner Ring Road. He expressed confidence that Amaravati would be developed into a capital admired across the country and inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi by 2028. Calling the Seed Access Road only the beginning of Amaravati's development, Naidu said the capital would be built with a long-term vision and modern infrastructure. He said the government was setting clear targets for the development of the state and urged people to contribute their ideas to the growth of Amaravati.

Women Should Rise as Entrepreneurs

World Elephant Day Celebrations Held in Grand Style in Visakhapatnam

Visakhapatnam (TSIT) The national celebrations of World Elephant Day 2026 were held in a grand manner in Visakhapatnam on Thursday, with Union Minister of State for Environment, Forest and Climate Change Keerthi Vardhan Singh presiding over the event and Andhra Pradesh Deputy Chief Minister K. Pawan Kalyan attending as the chief guest. Senior officials from the Central and State Forest Departments, representatives of the Railways, scientists and wildlife experts participated in the programme. Addressing the gathering, Keerthi Vardhan Singh said nearly 60 per cent of the



world's wild Asian elephant population is found in India. The country has 33 elephant reserves and 150 scientifically identified elephant corridors, he said. The Centre was integrating modern technologies such as artificial intelligence, remote sensing and geospatial mapping with tradi-

tional knowledge to strengthen elephant conservation. He stressed the need for public participation, scientific approaches and inter-departmental coordination to reduce human-elephant conflict. Deputy Chief Minister Pawan Kalyan said the Andhra Pradesh government was working with the vision of “Conflict to Coexistence” to address human-elephant conflict. Through the HANUMAN programme, the government was strengthening wildlife conservation by combining modern technology with community participation and specialised training for forest personnel.

Obesity Emerges as a Major Public Health Challenge

Visakhapatnam (TSIT) Obesity has emerged as a serious public health challenge in Andhra Pradesh, with nearly one in every two people in the state being overweight, Health Minister Satyakumar Yadav said on Thursday. Expressing concern over the high prevalence, particularly among women, he announced that a Joint Task Force would be constituted with the participation of the Health, Education, Sports and Women & Child Welfare departments to tackle the issue comprehensively. Speaking at a state-level conference on obesity and metabolic health organised by the Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) in Vijayawada, the Minister said changing lifestyles, unhealthy food habits, reduced physical activity, consumption of ultra-processed foods and sugary drinks, work stress and excessive screen time were major contributors to obesity.



According to NFHS-6, 47.90 per cent of women and 44.40 per cent of men in Andhra Pradesh are overweight, making the situation a matter of serious concern. The Minister warned that obesity could adversely affect public health, productivity and economic growth if preventive measures were not taken in time. He said the government would prepare a comprehensive action plan based on the recommendations of the CII conference and submit

them to Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu. He stressed the need to focus on prevention and early detection rather than treatment after diseases develop. The Minister said the state had already identified 59 lakh people with hypertension and 48 lakh with diabetes through NCD screening. Under the Universal Health Screening programme, 41 types of medical tests are being offered free of cost through mobile medical units, with the programme to be expanded across the

state. Special attention is also being given to children through the Rashtriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram, under which their height and weight are being monitored and metabolic health problems can be detected early. Health and Family Welfare Commissioner Chakradhar Babu said reduced physical activity and increased screen time were contributing significantly to obesity among all age groups. He stressed the importance of moderate food intake, regular physical activity, natural foods and reduced consumption of oil, salt and sugar. CII representatives said the organisation was collecting views from different states and would submit recommendations to governments on measures to control the growing obesity crisis. Doctors, health officials and experts from various fields participated in the conference.

SPMVV Marks 80th Independence Day with Grand 100-Metre Tiranga Rally

Student Attempts Suicide Allegedly Due to School Management Pressure

VIJAYAWADA (TSIT): A shocking incident involving an eighth-grade student attempting suicide at Ravindra Bharathi School in Satyanarayanapuram has created concern among parents and students. Sanvika, an eighth-grade student at the school, allegedly attempted suicide by jumping from the fourth floor of the school building.

The parents and fellow students have alleged that negligence by the school management was responsible for the incident. They claimed that Sanvika was subjected to academic pressure and was allegedly humiliated by the school management in the presence of other students. Strong allegations have been raised that the treatment meted out to the student by the school management caused her severe mental distress and contributed to the suicide attempt. The parents also alleged that the school management behaved negligently after the incident and delayed informing them about the incident. Sanvika sustained serious injuries after falling from the fourth floor and is currently undergoing treatment at Swara Hospital in the city.

Doctors have reportedly informed the family that she may require five major surgeries. Parents and fellow students have expressed anger over the incident, alleging that the school management failed to ensure the safety of students on the school premises. They questioned how an eighth-grade student was able to reach the fourth floor without being noticed by the school staff. Parents and student organisations have alleged that adequate safety measures should have been in place to prevent students from accessing the top floors. They said school staff should continuously monitor students, particularly when they are alone on the prem-

ises. The parents and student organisations further alleged that the management had failed to give adequate attention to student safety and was primarily focused on fee collection. They demanded a thorough inquiry into the circumstances leading to the incident and strict action against those responsible. The incident has raised serious questions about Sanvika's future and the responsibility of educational institutions towards the safety and well-being of students. Student organisations have urged the Education Department to take immediate action against the school management and ensure that such incidents do not recur.

Higher education department, Adani sign MoU



Visakhapatnam (TSIT) The Andhra Pradesh Higher Education Commissionerate has taken a significant step to enhance employment opportunities for polytechnic students in the State and to align technical education with industry requirements. As part of this initiative, a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed on Thursday with Adani Skills and Education (ASE). The agreement, signed under the 'Industry Connect Initiative', aims to strengthen industry-academia collaboration and provide better access to internships, training, industrial exposure, and employment opportunities for polytechnic students across the State. Speaking on the occasion, Higher Education Commissioner Dr. Narayana Bharat Gupta said the MoU would help further refine techni-

cal education in line with industry needs. He noted that enhancing industry-relevant skills among polytechnic students would significantly expand their employment prospects. Adani Skills and Education Chief Executive Officer Robin Bhowmik said the partnership with the Government of Andhra Pradesh marks an important step towards developing a workforce equipped with global standards and future-ready skills. The MoU was signed by Higher Education Commissioner Dr. Narayana Bharat Gupta and Adani Skills and Education Chief Operating Officer Sudhanwa Kimmane. The agreement will remain in force for five years, enabling long-term collaboration between the Higher Education Department and ASE in developing industry-ready polytechnic diploma talent.

Head Constable Faces Allegations of Misconduct at Penamaluru Police Station

Vijayawada, Krishna District: Serious allegations have been levelled against a Head Constable attached to Penamaluru Police Station in Vijayawada, with complainants accusing him of interfering in cases and allegedly misusing his official position.



According to complaints, the Head Constable, identified as Arise Srinivasa Rao, allegedly attempted to establish personal contact with women and young women who approached the police station seeking assistance. In one case, a young woman who reportedly approached the station with a sexual assault complaint alleged that the Head Constable made inappropriate phone calls and engaged her in personal conversations during the inquiry. She claimed that he contacted her late at night, asked personal questions about her residence, activities and hobbies, and allegedly told her she could call him if she could not sleep before asking her to make a WhatsApp call.

The Head Constable has also been accused of interfering in family disputes, land-related complaints and grievance petitions. In another complaint, an elderly woman who approached the station over a financial dispute and alleged threats claimed that he intervened in the matter and allegedly supported the opposite party. The woman later approached the Krishna District Superintendent of Police through the grievance redressal system. She alleged that after the complaint was forwarded to the station, the Head Constable expressed anger when

she and her son returned and questioned them about complaining against him. The allegations have raised concerns over the treatment of complainants, particularly women, and the functioning of the grievance mechanism at the police station. There are also allegations of corruption and misuse of official position. The allegations have not been independently established. A comprehensive inquiry by senior police officials would be necessary to determine the facts and take appropriate action, if the charges are found to be true.

Shikha Goel Warns Citizens Against Fake SIR Form Scam

TGCSB Director cautions voters against malicious WhatsApp links, nominal payment demands and attempts to steal banking details

Hyderabad, TSIT: Telangana Cyber Security Bureau (TGCSB) Director Shikha Goel has warned citizens to remain vigilant against cybercriminals perpetrating fraud in the name of the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) process.

In a public advisory issued on Thursday, Shikha Goel said fraudsters were impersonating Election Commission officials and sending messages claiming that voters' details were incorrect or that their SIR forms had been rejected. Such messages may contain malicious



links asking citizens to "correct" or update their voter details. She cautioned that cybercriminals may send WhatsApp links and demand nominal payments, such as 5, for updating or verifying voter information. Once victims click such links

or provide information, fraudsters may attempt to steal bank login credentials, card details, PINs, passwords and OTPs. Shikha Goel made it clear that the official SIR process is completely free and no payment is required for updating or correcting voter details. She urged citizens not to click suspicious links, make payments or share confidential banking information with anyone claiming to be an Election Commission official. Any SIR-related communication should be verified only through official channels.

MLA alleges medical negligence in pregnant woman's death



Sangareddy, Aug. 13 (TSIT): Sangareddy MLA Chinta Prabhakar has alleged medical negligence in the death of a 33-year-old pregnant woman, Anita of Badrigudem village, at Sangareddy Government Hospital and demanded a comprehensive inquiry. The MLA said Anita, who had conceived after 12 years of marriage, was

reportedly in stable condition when admitted for delivery. He alleged that delayed medical intervention during the delivery resulted in her death and demanded strict action against those found responsible. Prabhakar criticised the government healthcare system, citing alleged shortages of medicines and staff, inadequate monitoring and delayed emergency response at government hospitals. He urged the government to investigate the incident impartially, ensure justice for Anita's family and strengthen emergency services and medical facilities.

Collector urges farmers to avoid paddy cultivation



Nalgonda: District Collector B. Chandrasekhar has urged farmers not to cultivate paddy during the current season due to inadequate water availability and the risk of financial losses. He directed agriculture officials to visit farmers' fields and create awareness about low-water crops based on rainfall, groundwater availability, cultivation costs and labour expenses. During a visit to Tippiarhi, the Collector advised farmers preparing fields for paddy to opt for black gram, green gram and horticultural crops instead. He said these crops require lower investment and can provide better returns under prevailing conditions. He also directed officials to promote semi-dry crops and submit an indent for urea.

'Organ Donation Is the Greatest of All Donations': Dr. R.V. Kumar



Tirupati: Sri Venkateswara Institute of Medical Sciences (SVIMS) organised an awareness rally on Thursday, August 13, on the occasion of National Organ Donation Day, to create awareness about organ donation and encourage people to pledge their organs.

The rally began at 9 a.m. from SVIMS NTR Circle and proceeded to Valmiki Circle. It was flagged off by Dr. R.V. Kumar, Director-cum-Vice Chancellor, SVIMS. Speaking on the occasion, Dr. R.V. Kumar said organ donation enables a person to continue living through their donated organs even after death. He explained that when vital organs such as the kidneys or liver fail and other treatments are no longer effective, transplantation may become necessary, making donated organs crucial for saving lives.

He urged people to come forward and donate the organs of brain-dead individuals and encouraged voluntary registration as organ donors. He also called upon students to help dispel myths and misconceptions surrounding organ donation. Paramedical staff and nurses, he said, should play an active role in educating people and addressing their concerns. As part of National Organ Donation Week, voluntary organ donation registrations were also conducted.

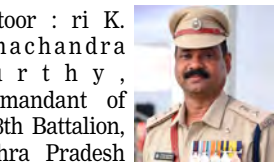

Father Donates Kidney to Save 16-Yr-Old Aspiring Cricketer

Hyderabad, Aug. 13: A 16-year-old intermediate student and aspiring cricketer from Malakpet has been given a fresh lease of life after undergoing a successful pre-emptive kidney transplant at the Asian Institute of Nephrology and Urology (AINU), Banjara Hills.

The teenager, an aspiring bowler and ardent cricket fan who idolises Virat Kohli, was born with a congenital urinary bladder anomaly that resulted in severe urinary reflux. The condition progressively damaged his kidney function, affected his physical growth and eventually led to end-stage renal disease (ESRD).

Doctors recommended a pre-emptive kidney trans-



plant to avoid prolonged dialysis and improve his long-term health prospects. His father, Khaja Asimuddin, volunteered to donate one of his kidneys to his son. Following comprehensive medical evaluation and donor matching, the transplant was successfully per-

formed on June 17, 2026. The teenager made a smooth postoperative recovery and was discharged on June 25. Dr. Srikanth Gundlapalli, Senior Consultant Nephrologist and Transplant Physician at AINU Banjara Hills, said pre-emptive transplanta-

tion before long-term dialysis can offer adolescent ESRD patients better prospects for normal growth, longevity and quality of life. Dr. Mallikarjuna C, Managing Director, Chief Consultant Urologist and Robotic Surgeon, said transplant planning should begin before a patient reaches the dialysis stage. Early identification of disease progression can help determine the appropriate time for transplantation and improve recovery and quality of life. The teenager is currently recovering at home under standard post-transplant precautions while focusing on his health and studies. He hopes to resume college and return to the cricket field after receiving medical clearance.

EDITORIAL

The BJP's Politics of the 'Ideal' Citizen

A fifteen-year-old girl sits before her phone camera and records an apology to the prime minister for the abusive language she used during the student protests following the police action at Delhi's Jantar Mantar. It is an unusual image. A protest begins with a grievance. It should end with the state answering for its actions. Increasingly, it ends with protesters answering for themselves. Prime minister Narendra Modi responded through a series of Instagram reels, describing the language directed at him and his late mother as a "cultural shock". The PM urged the society to guide such young people rather than condemn them. A protest over education and allegations of police violence has become a debate about the protesters themselves.

The sequence has become one of the most effective political scripts of the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). The first move is to classify the protester. In his Instagram reels, the prime minister described the students as "misguided youth". Soon afterwards, social media accounts such as Bharat with RSS followed; asking if those gathered at Jantar Mantar were really students, or anti-social elements masquerading as protesters. Their civility, legitimacy and even identity has come under scrutiny. The protest had not changed, people protesting it had. Before their demands could be addressed, they first had to be identified. During the farmers' movement, the distinction was named. Modi separated the andolan kari from the "andolanjeevi" – the legitimate protester from the parasitic one. The other described those who, in the PM's telling, had turned protest into a profession by attaching themselves to every agitation. The distinction made legitimacy part of the debate itself. Before the government defended the farm laws, the farmers first had to establish that they were genuine protesters. The protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act (CAA) took the pattern a step further. There is an irony here that would have been amusing had it not been so politically consequential. A movement that sought to debate the meaning of citizenship gradually found itself defending its own. Somewhere between the Constitution and the television studio, the question quietly changed. Instead of asking whether the law was constitutionally defensible, public attention increasingly turned to the people opposing it. Modi's remark that those indulging in violence could be recognised "by their clothes" crystallised that shift. The constitutional arguments against the Act did not disappear. They simply had to compete with another question: who exactly was claiming the Constitution's protection? The Constitution begins with a simple premise: citizens possess rights because they are citizens. The anti-CAA movement increasingly confronted a different proposition. Before constitutional arguments could be heard, the identities of those advancing them acquired political significance. The script does not stop at identity. It also questions political agency. Democratic protest assumes that citizens act because they choose to. Allegations of funding, hidden organisers or political handlers reverse that assumption. During the anti-CAA movement, the women of Shaheen Bagh were repeatedly portrayed as paid, funded or mobilised by hidden actors. BJP IT Cell chief Amit Malviya circulated a video alleging that women were being paid to participate, a claim later challenged by the protesters and debunked by independent fact-checkers.

INDIAN PARLIAMENT AND THE PERILS OF EMPTY 'SWAGGER'

The Indian Parliament has settled into a disturbing rhythm. The founding fathers of the Constitution had crafted it for debates that are focused on the welfare of the electors, and legislation that is filtered through the wisdom of each and every elected MP. Thursday sharp at 11 am, Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla walked up to his chair. The now-familiar crescendo, of Opposition MPs unleashing their lung power to disrupt the last six-seven hours of the proceedings, rose. Birla didn't ask them to sit. He didn't tell them to calm down. He asked everyone to stand up for the National Song. For a few minutes, the serenity of Vande Mataram echoed inside the House. And then the Speaker adjourned the House sine die, bringing the curtain down on the Monsoon Session of Parliament about seven hours before the scheduled end. The 250-odd sq. feet, transparent-vinyl-walled porta-cabin 'media hut' in Parliament is placed at exactly the same radial distance from the old Parliament building's Gate No. 1 (past entry point for MPs) and the Makar Dwar, the entry point in the new building. It provides a ring-side view of how things have transitioned and degenerated over time. For the 29th day, or the 19th sitting of the Houses, watching the MPs troop out without doing much work reminded me of what Senator Gracchus said in Director Ridley Scott's epic adventure drama, Gladiator. Gracchus had provided a cynical view of Roman politics by telling someone that the "beating heart of Rome is not the marble of the Senate; it's the sand of the Colosseum". Each day of the now virtually-bombed and annihilated-by-disruptions Monsoon Session this year, MPs from both sides of the political fence emerged from the Makar Dwar like gladiators from the Colosseum, claiming victory. But it takes a bit of sitting back and think-



ing to deduce that all parties and groupings across the various divides have been managing to have their way, and that there is only one loser: the voter. Reconfirming that distraction through spectacle is more effective than political accountability and performance. The Congressmen's Newfound Swagger Ask any journalist covering the monsoon session of Parliament what the key takeaway of the session is, and they will tell you that in the second half of the month-long session, the stand-out element has been the Leader of Opposition, Rahul Gandhi, walking with the swagger of a winner inside or outside Parliament. This swagger has rubbed off on most Congressmen. They admit that this was in stark contrast to the session's earlier half, as not them, but the Cockroach Janata Party (CJP) had stolen the headlines. The satirical platform achieved what had been mission impossible for the entire Opposition for 12 long years of the NDA rule. The Gen Z anger made the BJP leadership sack a minister right in the middle of

a Parliament session. The Congress had initially stayed away from the protests. And thus, couldn't claim victory for Dharmendra Pradhan's ouster. Rahul Gandhi entered the arena late with a foiled sit-in outside the Prime Minister's residence. Then he shifted the goalpost. For the Congressmen, that shift brought a note of triumph - and the swagger. The CJP's trophy was Pradhan's resignation. But Rahul Gandhi and the Congress needed a more visible hit. So he picked the pellet-hit protesters, the crack-down on the protesters, Delhi Police's fumbles, and Union Home Minister Amit Shah's silence on these to build a "missing" narrative. He wanted Shah to tell the House who ordered the crackdown. The government dug its heels in. Its gladiators laid down the rules for a statement by Shah. No dialogue till there is disruption. The remnants of the depleted INDIA bloc, after the DMK's exit and the TMC's desertions, realised the potential of the manufactured deadlock. The target was Shah - the man anointed by the BJP as

'Chanakya', the man who cracked the Article 370 code and decimated the Naxal threat. As the monsoon session ends, Rahul Gandhi is being credited by his party as the leader who made Shah squirm. A senior Congress leader bursting with pride told me, "Shah's aura is gone". That's the trophy with which the Opposition departed from the session. But The Government Hasn't Lost Either The latest monsoon session is an outing the government would perhaps like to forget. On day one, it had swarms of protesters battling on the streets to reach Parliament. Within days, it had to ease out Pradhan. Its attempts to stitch the numbers for the reintroduction of the Delimitation bill have not reached fruition. Its FCRA bill has faced internal dissent, external protests, and nudges from global superpowers. But does the government qualify to be a loser if the Opposition won? The answer is buried in the session track. In modern conventions, the Opposition can be called a winner if a key government legislation is

defeated or a session is a washout and no legislation is passed. Put these parameters on paper, juxtapose the statistics from the session, and the picture gets muddled. The victor-loser lines blur. Understated Wins Although the government is not walking with a winner's swagger, it has its own collection of trophies from this session. The monsoon session of Parliament may have stayed log-jammed by the Opposition, but it was not a complete washout. The big-ticket FCRA or the Delimitation Bills may not have seen daylight, but the government managed to push through some 20-odd bills or legislation despite the din. Almost every bill listed for introduction at the start of the session was passed. Sample this. The theme of the session was crafting a new political recipe to seduce the 'Generation Z'. With the coveted demography in focus, the Opposition couldn't disrupt the passing of the Public Examinations (Prevention of Unfair Means) Amendment Bill. By bringing stricter rules

against exam paper leaks, the government offered an olive branch to Gen Z. Since the Opposition was under public scrutiny, the Bill saw 11 hours of debate in the Lok Sabha and 7 hours and 14 minutes in the Rajya Sabha. The government managed to pass the Bill for renaming Kerala as 'Keralam'. The Opposition couldn't stop the BJP's pet project, The Prevention of Insults to National Honour (Amendment) Bill, which stems from declarations made in the Constituent Assembly by Dr Rajendra Prasad on January 24, 1950, stating that Vande Mataram holds a status equal to Jana Gana Mana. Then there is the shortage of judges in the Supreme Court; the government's Supreme Court (Number of Judges) Amendment Act, 2026, which increases the sanctioned strength of the Supreme Court of India from 34 to 38 judges (including the Chief Justice of India), sailed through. But Who Lost - And How? The government took four days after the July 20 protests to ease out Pradhan. The Opposition claimed it had a reason to disrupt the proceedings. Then, in a clever pivot, Rahul Gandhi asked Amit Shah to respond. On the penultimate day, the Home Minister spoke. He dared the Opposition to submit a letter to the Speaker for a debate by 2 pm. "I am ready to answer the Opposition's questions on the police action." But the Opposition rejected Shah's proposal and said it was not interested in the Home Minister's "lectures". There are reasons why the issue never got resolved. The Opposition wasn't interested in a Shah response, as it would have diluted the "weak-Home-Minister" campaign it had constructed so carefully. The government, in turn, was hesitant to field the Home Minister all these days as it knew that once Shah spoke, the Opposition's next demand would be an apology by the Prime Minister.

China's PLA Is Entering A Dangerous New Phase, And India Can't Afford To Look Away

Amid tumultuous times and a looming modernisation deadline, August 1 this year marked 99 years since the founding of the Chinese People's Liberation Army (PLA). As the final year in the run-up to the PLA's centenary goals commences, three problems stand out as unresolved. These are the slow speed of "intelligentisation", the persistence of "official airs" and military graft, and an inability to prioritise quality over quantity. The West's sustained technology-denial efforts against Beijing, and the curbs placed on its defence state-owned enterprises (SOEs) by a growing roster of American lists, only add to the headwinds. At the outset, it is important to understand the 2027 timeline. It is not more than a capability milestone, part of a "new three-step strategy": basically complete informatisation and enter the advanced stage of intelligentisation by 2027, achieve basic realisation of defence modernisation by 2035, and become a world-class military by 2049. Hence, it is notable that while operationally, an invasion of Taiwan is possible tomorrow, the PLA's sustained strategy of consistent modernisation and militarisation is the threat to look out for and prepare for, especially for decision-makers sitting in Washington and Delhi. So what were the key signals emergent from the varied meetings, commentaries, and lectures that set the stage for the anniversary? The first was the emphasis on political building, framed as the foundation governing the "direction and fundamental character" of modernisation. The



second was combat effectiveness, described, as always, the fundamental standard for testing it. The third was the Integrated National Strategic System and Capabilities theory - which can be understood as a modern successor to 'Military-Civil Fusion' - presented as the only route to achieving it. Together, these point to a framework likely to structure every military work report until the 21st Party Congress in October 2027. They also confirm that 'political building', which loosely means creating a more red, more loyal army, comes ahead of combat preparedness. The candour over quality is more remarkable still. A Collective Study Session held by the highest CPC decision-making body, the Politburo, just before the anniversary, highlighted that development without quality is useless, however much of it is done, and that some of it becomes a "burden" and "hindrance" to the armed forces. This is the Party conceding, however obliquely, that parts of the past decade's modernisation and reform budget were

wasted, or worse. The correction prescribed is "high efficiency, low cost, and sustainable development", which fundamentally shifts the focus away from quantitative growth to qualitative improvement. The era of throwing money at the problem has hence been formally declared over. On discipline, Xi instructed the force to fold political rectification into daily life and make it a regular practice. The corresponding PLA Daily commentary of August 1 articulated that more sharply, and explained that there are no unrestrained special people. Conceptually, this moves the conversation a step past bribery towards the condemnation of privilege itself. It was likened to the "invisible arsenic" that is infamous for poisoning groundwater and going undetected. In a system that has just purged the man long described as Xi's closest military aide and childhood friend - former Central Military Commission Vice Chairman Zhang Youxia - the new reality expressed is that no one is beyond cleansing. Finally, in

terms of tactical modernisation, the elevation of "intelligentisation" from one leg of that sequence to the decisive one, came along obvious lines. To this end, a Xinhua explainer from August 3 argued that whoever builds an intelligent military system first will hold the initiative on the future battlefield. Warfare, it contends, has entered a stage where algorithms determine victory and detection equals destruction. An illustrative example is the fibre-optic-enabled first-person-view drone, costing a few thousand dollars and capable of destroying armour worth millions. Unmanned and intelligent forces, it insists, must be treated as the main force and protagonist - given a fixed place in organisational structure, used as simulated adversaries in training, and pushed to the last mile in tactics. Hence, a four-level architecture of perception, decision-making, operations and institutional support, with human-machine collaborative decision-making as the endpoint (for now), becomes evident.

Modi Spoke of Education at a Vivekananda Memorial. He Forgot the Girls' School Demolished to Build It.

"Friends, Swami Vivekananda believed that educating the youth was the ultimate foundation for nation-building." Prime Minister Narendra Modi said these words recently in Mysuru while inaugurating the Swami Vivekananda Cultural Youth Centre, built by the Ramakrishna Ashrama on Narayana Shastri Road, in the heart of the city. It is a place steeped in Vivekananda's Mysuru connection. The memorial stands adjoining the historic Niranjana Mutt, where Swami Vivekananda is recorded to have stayed during his visit to Mysuru in November 1892. Spread across about 36,591 square feet, the new memorial is meant to preserve his memory, his ideas and his vision for generations to come. But there was a history beneath those words that remained unspoken. He did not mention that the memorial stands on the very ground where a 140-year-old school once stood, a school that was among the earliest institutions in Asia established specifically for the education of girls. He did not mention that this was the Maharani's school, established under the patronage of Maharani Kempananjammani Devi of Mysuru at a time when sending a girl to school was itself a radical act. He did not mention the thousands of girls who had passed through its doors, carrying books in their hands and dreams in their hearts. He did not mention the protests, the petitions, the legal battle, the citizens who stood in the streets, the former students who refused to let their school disappear quietly. He did not mention that



when the question arose of building a memorial to Vivekananda on that very land, Mysoreans did not say, "No memorial." They said, "Let the memorial come. But let the school live too." After all, this was never a battle between a school and Vivekananda. And Modi certainly did not mention the night when the school was finally brought down under heavy police protection in 2022. By morning, the walls were gone. What disappeared that night was a chapter of Mysuru's educational history; a place where generations of girls had learned to read, to think, to dream and perhaps to believe that they could shape their own future. Today, a memorial stands there in Vivekananda's name. But beneath it lies a school. And beneath that school lie generations of dreams. As a Mysorean, I carry a very personal sense of grief about what happened. And as the daughter of Rajasekhar Koti, the founder-editor of Andolana newspaper, I cannot think about the NTM School without remembering the people who fought, struggled and stood their

ground to save it. Perhaps that is why this story feels so personal for me. It is personal. When I hear the word "education" being spoken from the very place where a historic school once stood, I remember my father and the children he refused to let disappear along with their school. And whenever I think of the long struggle to save that school, one particular morning comes back to me. It was an ordinary morning, like any other. I was busy getting my children ready for school and attending to household work. It was around 8.30 am when I received a call from Appaji. "Papu, I'm near your house. Come outside." I was surprised. He rarely came to my house at that hour. When I stepped out, I saw his Qualis parked in the apartment parking lot. What caught my attention was that the car was filled with schoolchildren. "Appaji, who are all these children?" I asked. "They are children from NTM School," he told me. Their parents, frightened by everything that was happening around the school, had stopped sending them to classes. Appaji feared that if the number of students fell, the

authorities would use that as a reason to merge or eventually shut down the school. So he had gone from house to house, met the parents and assured them. "Send your children to school. I will take responsibility for getting them there safely and bringing them back home." That morning was the first day he had taken on that responsibility. The children lived around my neighbourhood. He had gone to their homes, picked them up and was taking them to school when he stopped at my house. From that day on, they began calling him affectionately, "Driver Uncle". Every morning, he picked them up from their homes and took them to school. Every evening, after classes, he brought them back safely. A few days later, he arranged a school vehicle at his own expense. For him, it was crucial to keep children connected to a school that was slowly being pushed towards extinction. It was his way of saying, "You cannot save a school by saving only its walls. You save it by making sure its children continue to walk through its doors." Until the end of his life, Appaji continued that responsibility.

Officials were further directed to initiate measures to ban plastic within HWHAMA limits. The Vijayanagara Deputy Commissioner and HWHAMA Chairman were asked to ensure regular cleaning and maintenance of the toilet complex near Virupaksha Temple. A proposal for constructing a new toilet complex under the Hampi Nook Project was also sought to meet growing visitor requirements.

Minister K. J. George said conservation and cleanliness of Hampi are key priorities and emphasised preserving its heritage significance while developing it as a clean, green and visitor-friendly destination.

TN Assembly: CM Vijay and Udhayanidhi Stalin united against delimitation

NDA bloc opposes resolution on delimitation moved by CM, DMDK stays neutral; all back 33% for women

CHENNAI (TSIT): Ending days of suspense over the DMK's stand on delimitation, contained within which is the speculation over the Dravidian major's future relationship with the Centre-ruling BJP, Leader of Opposition Udhayanidhi Stalin on Wednesday supported Chief Minister C Joseph Vijay's resolution urging the Union government to retain the existing strength of 543 Lok Sabha seats and implement 33% reservation for women in the Lok Sabha without linking it to the delimitation exercise.

Supporting the resolution while reiterating the DMK's position that if delimitation was undertaken to implement women's reservation, Udhayanidhi said it should be based on the 1971 Census. "If there



is any change in Tamil Nadu's proportion of MPs, its representation should not fall below 7.18 per cent," he said. He also accused the TVK

and its allies of changing their stand from supporting fair delimitation to opposing the exercise. Eventually, even as all parties sup-

ported women's reservation but differed on the means and methods to implement it, the Assembly adopted the resolution by voice vote, with the DMK, CPM, CPI, Congress, VCK and IUML supporting it, while the AIADMK, BJP, PMK, and DMDK opposed it.

Moving the resolution, Vijay said legislation providing for onethird reservation for women in Parliament and State Assemblies had already been enacted, but its implementation had been delayed.

"Delaying women's reservation by linking it with the census and delimitation amounts to denying women their political rights. Women's reservation should not be postponed or merged with the census and delimitation exercise," he said.

Special category MBBS, BDS counselling begins offline in Tamil Nadu

CHENNAI: Special category counselling for admission to MBBS and BDS courses began in person on Thursday, with candidates under the 7.5% reservation for government school students, sports quota, children of ex-servicemen and persons with disabilities attending the counselling. A total of 72,633 applications were received for MBBS and BDS admissions. Of these, 4,860 applications were under the 7.5% reservation for government school students, 468 under the sports quota, 524 from children of ex-servicemen and 212 from persons with disabilities.

After scrutiny, 3,625 applications under the 7.5% government school reservation were accepted. As part of Thursday's counselling, call letters were issued to candidates under the government school quota based on their rank and NEET scores. In the general cate-



gory, candidates who scored between 599 and 469 marks and those who scored between 468 and 433 marks were called for counselling.

Candidates belonging to the SC, SCA and ST categories under the government school quota were also called based on their respective ranks.

The special category counselling is being con-

ducted offline, with candidates required to attend the venue according to the schedule mentioned in their call letters. Meanwhile, general online counselling for MBBS and BDS courses began at noon on Thursday. Eligible candidates can register, pay the counselling fee and fill in their preferred colleges and courses until 5 pm on August 19.

Tamil Nadu Fisheries Minister Srinath to visit Delhi over fishermen arrests by Sri Lankan Navy

CHENNAI: Amid the arrest of nine fishermen from Rameswaram by the Sri Lankan Navy, Tamil Nadu Fisheries Minister Srinath on Thursday said that he will visit Delhi next week to take up the issue with the Union Minister of External Affairs, S Jaishankar, and the Union Minister of Fisheries, Rajiv Ranjan Singh.

Speaking to reporters at the Thoothukudi Airport, he stated that talks regarding the Tamil Nadu fishermen's issue are ongoing and that he has discussed the matter with the Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu. He further added, "Next week, we will go to Delhi and meet the Union Minister of External



Affairs and the Union Minister of Fisheries to discuss measures to prevent the arrest of Tamil Nadu fishermen. A positive outcome will be reached soon." The Minister also mentioned that various beneficial schemes for fishermen will be included in the demand for grants for the

Fisheries Department. He stated that several schemes aimed at benefiting fishermen have been evaluated, and discussions have been held with the Chief Minister and the Finance Minister regarding them. "Many good schemes will be included in the demand for grants to fully benefit fishermen in a suitable manner," Minister Srinath said.

On the demand of Thoothukudi mechanized boat fishermen to grant permission for deep-sea fishing, the Minister responded that this request too has been included in the Fisheries Department's demand for grants, and an announcement regarding it will be made during the session.

Teacher held for allegedly beating 10 female students in TN govt school

TENKASI: A case has been registered against a 44-year-old government school teacher for allegedly beating 10 Class 10 female students with a cane, leaving them with severe hand injuries and unable to write their exams, police said on Thursday.

The incident took place at a Government Higher Secondary School in V K Pudur near Surandai in Tenkasi district on July 20. According to police, the accused, identified as Thenmaria Suganthi, was conducting a Class 11 session when she became enraged by noise emanating from an adjacent Class 10 room. She subsequently entered the classroom and severely caned the students. Around 10 students sus-



tained severe injuries to their hands and required immediate medical attention. The injured students were treated at the V K Pudur Government Hospital and local private facilities. Pavithra, one of the students was transferred to the Tenkasi Government Hospital, where she remained an inpatient for three days, officials said.

Due to persistent swelling in their hands, the injured students were unable to attend school or appear for their exams.

Proper chewing may boost brain alertness, say experts

Bengaluru: Health experts say that properly chewing food may do more than aid digestion, as it could also help improve brain stimulation, alertness and concentration. According to Dr Harish Hovale Bheemrao, Consultant Neurology at Fortis Hospital, chewing activates several nerves and muscles connected to the brain. "When we chew food properly, the jaw muscles and nerves send signals to different areas of the brain. This process may help increase blood flow and improve alertness for a short period of time," he explained.

Dr Bheemrao said some studies have linked chewing with better attention, concentration and memory-related functions. He noted that the brain requires continuous oxygen-rich blood flow and sensory stimulation to remain active, and chewing

absorb nutrients more effectively," she said. She added that improved nutrient absorption may indirectly support energy levels, concentration and overall brain performance. Experts also highlighted the growing understanding of the gut-brain connection, where digestive health may influence mood, focus and mental wellbeing. Doctors warned that modern fast-eating habits, often caused by stress, work pressure and excessive screen exposure, may negatively affect both digestion and mindfulness. "When you chew slowly, you become more aware of hunger and fullness signals. This supports both physical health and mental wellbeing," Selvi said. Dr Bheemrao also noted that distractions during meals could reduce mindful eating and indirectly contribute to stress and poor



may act as a mild trigger for these processes. "That is one of the reasons some people feel more alert while chewing gum or eating slowly, rather than rushing through meals," he added.

A study published in the journal BioMed Research International stated that chewing directly stimulates the brain and may enhance alertness, sustained attention and cognitive processing. Researchers noted that the rhythmic muscle action involved in chewing increases blood flow to the head and oxygenates important brain networks.

Experts further explained that chewing is not only a digestive activity but also a neurosensory process that activates areas of the brain linked to awareness and cognition. Ms Karthigai Selvi, CF Dietician at Gleneagles BGS Hospitals, said proper chewing begins digestion in the mouth itself. "When food is chewed properly, it breaks down into smaller particles and mixes well with saliva, which contains digestive enzymes. This helps the body

focus over time. Experts further suggested that chewing may help reduce stress in some individuals.

"There is growing curiosity about how oral activity links with stress reduction and brain performance. Chewing might help reduce stress responses in certain people because it can lower tension and help the body move toward a calmer state," Dr Bheemrao explained.

However, doctors clarified that chewing alone is not a treatment for cognitive decline or neurological disorders.

Experts recommended eating meals slowly without distractions, limiting screen time while eating, maintaining a balanced diet, staying hydrated, getting adequate sleep and exercise, and practising mindful eating habits to support both digestion and mental wellbeing. They said simple habits like proper chewing, when combined with a healthy lifestyle, may contribute to better focus, reduced stress and improved overall health over time.

Monsoon skin troubles: Why oily skin may still lack hydration

New Delhi: Monsoon weather often leaves the skin sticky, sweaty and oily, but an oily appearance does not necessarily mean the skin is properly hydrated, skincare experts caution. According to skincare specialist Shaily Mehrotra, high humidity can slow water evaporation from the skin, but it does not guarantee adequate hydration. Humidity, sweat and excess sebum can together contribute to clogged pores, breakouts and sensitivity during the rainy season. Humid conditions can cause sweat and sebum to remain on the skin for longer. When they

mix with dirt, makeup, pollution and other impurities, the combination may increase the risk of clogged pores and acne, particularly among people with oily or acne-prone skin.

However, oil and hydration are not the same. Sebum forms a protective layer on the skin, while hydration refers to the presence of water in the skin. As a result, a person can have an oily surface while still experiencing tightness, sensitivity or dehydration underneath.

Experts also caution against repeatedly washing the face to deal with the sticky feeling

caused by monsoon humidity. Excessive cleansing can strip the skin of its natural oils, weaken its protective barrier and increase water loss, potentially creating a cycle of irritation and dehydration.

Dr Rahul Chaudhary, Medical Advisor at Fixderma, said humid weather can make the skin feel moist and sweaty without necessarily keeping it properly hydrated. He cautioned that repeated washing aimed at removing the sticky sensation can strip natural oils and compromise the skin barrier.

Monsoon-related skin con-

cerns can also affect the body. Warm temperatures, moisture and prolonged sweating can create favourable conditions for bacteria and fungi, while staying in damp clothes or sweaty workout wear for long periods can increase the risk of body acne, folliculitis and fungal infections. Skincare experts therefore recommend paying attention to hygiene and keeping the skin dry, particularly around areas where moisture can remain trapped. There is also no need to completely stop using active skincare products during the monsoon.

Gold rates fall to Rs 1.57 lakh per 10g after seven-day gain

New Delhi: Gold snapped a seven-session rally on Thursday, August 13, with prices declining by Rs 2,800 to Rs 1,57,000 per 10 grams in the national capital as traders booked profits after a recent surge. The yellow metal of 99.9 per cent purity had closed at Rs 1,59,800 per 10 grams on Wednesday, August 12. Silver also bore the brunt of the sell-off, tumbling Rs 6,000 to Rs 2,40,000 per kilogram (inclusive of all taxes), according to the All India Sarafa Association. The white metal had settled at Rs 2,46,000 per kg in the preceding session. Gold traded lower on Thursday, with investors booking profits as the softer US inflation outcome had already been largely priced into bullion during the recent rally, said Jateen Trivedi, VP Research Analyst – Commodity and Currency, LKP Securities. The retreat was echoed in the international markets. Spot gold was trading 0.43



per cent lower at USD 4,389.67 per ounce, while spot silver declined marginally to USD 65.03 per ounce. Spot gold was trading lower at USD 4,380 per ounce in overseas markets due to profit booking. Traders booked profits as the much-awaited US July Consumer Price Index (CPI) inflation data came in line with the forecast, said Praveen Singh, Head of Commodities at Mirae Asset ShareKhan. Crude oil prices edge lower as differing claims arise over Hormuz. Crude oil prices edged lower amid conflicting claims over the Strait of

Hormuz, while the dollar index remained steady, he added. Saumil Gandhi, Senior Analyst – Commodities at HDFC Securities, said that with the CPI trigger now behind the market, investors' attention has shifted to the US producer price index (PPI) for further clues on inflation and the Federal Reserve's policy path. "A lower PPI reading could strengthen hopes for a more relaxed approach from the Fed and boost prices for precious metals, while a higher-than-expected result could raise worries about ongoing inflation and lead to selling," he added.

Crypto becomes Gen Z's gateway to investing in India: Report

New Delhi: India's Gen Z is entering financial markets earlier and increasingly using cryptocurrency as a gateway to investing, while showing a preference for diversified portfolios and a willingness to stay invested through market volatility, data from crypto exchange WazirX showed. Nearly 44.4 per cent of Gen Z investors on the platform began their investment journey through crypto, suggesting that a large share of young investors are entering financial markets through digital assets rather than adding crypto to established portfolios. The median age of Gen Z investors on WazirX is 25, while the generation accounted for 72 per cent of all new investors on the platform in the first half of 2026. Gen Z also made up 32.1 per cent of active traders, the company said. The trend is spreading beyond India's largest cities. Nearly 80 per cent of WazirX's Gen Z users come from outside the country's top 10 cities, highlighting the growing participation of investors from Tier-2 and Tier-3 centres. Mumbai and Delhi continue to have the highest individual concentration of users. The data also challenges the perception that young crypto investors are primarily chasing



speculative assets. Gen Z users allocate 25 per cent of their portfolios to established "blue-chip" cryptocurrencies, 16 per cent to memecoins and 59 per cent to utility-focused categories including decentralised finance, Layer-2 ecosystems and payment tokens. The figures indicate that while memecoins remain part of the investment mix, the majority of Gen Z holdings are concentrated in categories WazirX associates with utility, liquidity and longer-term potential. Young investors are also showing a willingness to buy during market downturns rather than retreating from

crypto, according to WazirX. About 52.8 per cent of Gen Z investors buy during mild market corrections, while 43.7 per cent continue buying even on the worst trading days. Their average investment size remains nearly unchanged during major market declines compared with normal trading days, the exchange said. The data suggests that some young investors are increasingly treating market corrections as opportunities to accumulate assets, while using rallies to rebalance portfolios or realise gains. WazirX's findings come as its broader user base also becomes

increasingly concentrated outside India's major metropolitan areas. In a July report, the exchange said more than 82 per cent of its users came from non-metro cities. The Gen Z investor base on WazirX is also dominated by relatively young and lower-income participants. Nearly 79.6 per cent have annual incomes between Rs 1 lakh and Rs 5 lakh. Students account for 40 per cent of Gen Z users, followed by salaried professionals at 33 per cent and self-employed users at 27 per cent, according to the company. The findings suggest that crypto is being incorporated into investment strategies relatively early in the financial lives of many young Indians, rather than being used solely by investors who have already accumulated substantial wealth. "Gen Z is proving that wealth creation isn't about where you come from or how much you start with, but finding the right opportunities, doing your research, and starting early. Young Indians were investing in crypto earlier, but they're doing so with discipline, curiosity, and a long-term mindset now. That's the foundation of India's next financial revolution," WazirX founder Nischal Shetty said.

TELANGANA HC UPHOLDS CANCELLATION OF PATANJALI'S PALM OIL ZONE

Hyderabad: The Telangana High Court upheld the state government's decision to cancel an oil palm factory zone in Suryapet district allotted to Patanjali Foods Limited, holding that the company failed to set up a processing unit within the agreed timeframe despite repeated extensions. A division bench of Chief Justice Apareesh Kumar Singh and Justice GM Mohiuddin dismissed Patanjali's appeal against an earlier single-judge ruling that had upheld the cancellation. The court also found the company's performance in meeting plantation targets in the zone unsatisfactory, with only about 14 per cent of the proposed area actually covered. "Admittedly, the appellant failed to establish the processing unit within the stipulated period and continued to remain in default despite repeated opportunities and extensions afforded by the respondents," the court observed, holding that the company could not expect the allotment to continue indefinitely in the face of its own admitted failure to meet its obligations. Background of dispute Patanjali has been engaged in oil palm cultivation in the state since 2009, initially through MAC Oil Palm Limited, which was later



merged into the company. In 2017, it signed a second memorandum of agreement (MOA) with the state government. Under that agreement, the company was required to set up an oil palm processing unit within 24 months and to identify and finalise a site for it within two years of receiving the final allotment order. The company was later allotted additional areas in Nalgonda and Suryapet districts, and in June 2021 gave a sworn undertaking to abide by the MOA's terms for those extended areas, an affidavit that expressly acknowledged that failing to comply could result in forfeiture of its deposit and cancellation of the factory zone. Authorities issued a first show-cause notice in December 2022, alleging the company had missed its plantation targets and failed to build the required processing mill. Further notices

followed in December 2023 and October 2024. Patanjali blamed the delays on a shortage of planting material, deficit rainfall and price fluctuations. It said in early 2025 that it had bought 16.24 acres in Nalgonda district for the mill. The state cancelled the Suryapet factory zone through a government order dated March 15, 2025, and re-allotted the zone to another party the same day. Patanjali challenged both orders. Patanjali's arguments rejected Before the division bench, Patanjali argued that the MOA permitted cancellation only where a company failed to furnish information and documents sought by the Commissioner of Horticulture and that failing to build a processing mill within 24 months did not by itself justify cancellation. It relied on a separate clause requiring companies that have not yet begun process-

ing to keep buying Fresh Fruit Bunches (FFB) from farmers at government-notified rates and transport them to the nearest processing unit at their own cost. This requirement, it said, was met by procuring FFBs from Suryapet farmers and processing them at its unit in Andhra Pradesh. The court rejected this, holding that the two clauses operate in "distinct fields" – one protects farmers by ensuring their produce continues to be bought while a mill is pending, while the other provides for regulatory consequences when a company fails to show it is taking effective steps to meet its obligations. "The requirement of furnishing information and documents is not an end in itself but serves the purpose of enabling the Commissioner to satisfy himself that the occupier is taking effective steps towards fulfilment of the obligations," the bench said, holding that all the clauses had to be read together as part of an "integrated contractual framework." Patanjali also argued that time was not of the essence in the contract, pointing to the state having allowed it to continue operating past the deadline and issuing repeated notices instead of cancelling outright.

L&T BAGS MEGA ORDER TO BUILD INDIA'S LARGEST AI FACILITY



New Delhi: Infrastructure major Larsen & Toubro (L&T) on Thursday, August 13, said it has secured an order ranging between Rs 10,000 and Rs 15,000 crore to build the country's largest single-cluster artificial intelligence (AI) infrastructure facility, marking the company's foray into the AI Factory business. Through its AI infrastructure arm, LTN Compute, and L&T's AI and data centre business, Vyoma.AI, L&T will set up an NVIDIA B300-based AI Factory at its Chennai data centre campus to power the AI-native cloud platform of the US-based Together AI. The AI Factory will power the AI-native cloud platform for large-scale inference, fine-tuning and training workloads, strengthening India's AI infrastructure ecosystem while supporting global innovation, L&T said in a statement. L&T has not revealed the exact value of the order. However, under

its order classification, a 'mega order' ranges between Rs 10,000 and 15,000 crore. Vyoma's Chennai data centre campus, conceived as a gigawatt-scale AI infrastructure site, has been designed with Phase 1 capacity of 250 MW and power infrastructure readiness of 150 MVA, laying a scalable foundation for future AI Factory expansion. The integrated AI Factory, with a capacity of 10,000 NVIDIA B300 GPUs, will be hosted at Vyoma's Chennai data centre, the statement added. The platform combines hyperscale data centre infrastructure, accelerated computing, high-performance networking, ultra-low-latency interconnects, high-throughput parallel storage and AI infrastructure operations, enabling customers to seamlessly deploy and scale AI workloads through a unified, end-to-end AI infrastructure stack.

French ambassador to CAR accused of misconduct at official residence faces disciplinary action



France has opened disciplinary proceedings against its top diplomat in the Central African Republic (CAR) over accusations of misconduct. This emerged after a report in a French weekly that Ambassador Bruno Foucher allegedly had brought dozens of women into his official residence and had sex with some of them. He has not commented publicly. The allegations, which refer to events said to have happened between January 2024 and March this year, prompted investigations by France's foreign ministry into a potential security breach. A French diplomat told the BBC that the ministry has since initiated administrative procedures against the ambassador, which are "ongoing". The BBC has contacted the French embassy in the capital, Bangui, for comment. It is unclear what the disciplinary procedures against Foucher entail or how long they will last. According to reports from French

media outlets, Foucher is alleged to have invited about 30 women to his residence in Bangui. Some of the women are said to have stayed overnight, raising security concerns. Foucher, 65, has been serving as his country's top diplomat in Bangui since 2023. His alleged misconduct comes as France and the CAR are working to improve their bilateral relationship which had been strained in the past. During his visit to Bangui in March, French Foreign Minister Jean-Noël Barrot praised the "complete restoration of relations" between the two countries.

UK DEFENDS SEIZING SHADOW FLEET TANKER AFTER PUTIN THREAT

The UK government has defended its seizure of a Russian "shadow fleet" oil tanker in the English Channel, after Russian President Vladimir Putin threatened to "respond in kind". The Smyrtos has been anchored off Weymouth after Royal Marines Commandos intercepted and boarded the vessel in a first-of-its-kind operation to disrupt the sanctioned tanker in June. The vessel's captain, Ajay Pant, has been charged with breaching Russian sanctions, accused of directly or indirectly supplying or delivering prohibited Russian oil. Overseeing Russian navy drills in the Pacific Ocean, Putin scolded Western countries for "seizing our vessels", branding such action "nothing other than piracy and



banditry". Western nations allege Russia has been operating a "shadow fleet" of hundreds of vessels to evade international sanctions imposed on its oil exports. These vessels stand accused of using complex ownership structures and various tactics to obscure the origin of their cargo, masking their link to Russia. The UK Ministry of Defence says

we will have to respond in kind. "And not necessarily in the waters where raids on our ships and vessels are planned, but wherever we deem it necessary and appropriate, anywhere." Viktor Liina, commander of Russia's Pacific Fleet, accused Western countries such as Britain and France of operating their own "shadow fleets". "We have the capacity to inspect and detain vessels of unfriendly states and their shadow fleets, and interagency cooperation is in place, ready to begin addressing these challenges," Liina said. In response to Putin's comments, the UK government said Britain's armed forces and law-enforcement officers had boarded the Smyrtos "in full accordance with international law".

Ebola outbreak on track to be deadliest ever, WHO chief says



The current outbreak of Ebola in the Democratic Republic of Congo is on track to surpass the deadliest outbreak of the disease ever, the director-general of the World Health Organization (WHO) has said. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus told reporters that the 2026 outbreak, "at its current pace", would "eclipse" that of the 2014-2016 occurrence, which killed at least 11,000 people. The outbreak this year, declared on 15 May, has seen at least 4,300 cases and caused more than 2,000 deaths. The WHO said on Wednesday it hoped to reverse the spread of the disease within three months but warned that this meant bringing transmission under control - not ending the outbreak entirely. The epidemic was only officially declared in May, but it is believed the outbreak began at least three months before then, health officials said this week. "We are chasing the virus, the virus is ahead of us," WHO Africa director Dr Mohamed Janabi said at a news conference in the city of Bunia, near the centre of the outbreak. He cited research showing that the virus started spreading in February and was initially misdiagnosed as malaria or typhoid. The 2026 outbreak is caused by the rare Bundibugyo species of Ebola, which has previously caused

only two known outbreaks - in 2007 and 2012. No approved vaccine or recognised therapeutic drugs can treat this species of the virus. Ongoing regional instability near the location of the outbreak, in the east of DR Congo, has added to challenges in controlling the spread of the disease. As a result, health workers are only reaching about 30% of cases, according to Janabi. Ebola is a rare but deadly viral disease, with symptoms appearing within two to 21 days of infection. Symptoms similar to the flu or malaria, including fever, headache and tiredness, can begin suddenly. As the disease progresses, vomiting and diarrhoea can develop, leading to organ failure. The virus spreads from one person to another by contact with infected bodily fluids such as blood or vomit. The UK's medicines regulator, the MHRA, has given permission for the first human trials of a vaccine for Bundibugyo to go ahead. The jab is being created by a team from the University of Oxford based on the same technology used in the Oxford-AstraZeneca Covid vaccine. Three other groups are also developing different vaccines for Bundibugyo although they have not yet entered clinical trials.

More troops to be sent to West Bank village besieged by Israeli settlers

The Israeli military says it will deploy additional troops to the occupied West Bank after failing to force away Israeli settlers who have trapped two Palestinian families in their homes since Sunday. The Abu Ridi and Hassan families - who live on the outskirts of the village of Qusra, south of Nablus - made appeals for help after their water and power supplies were cut off and their food stocks ran low. The case is the latest to draw attention to the relative impunity of settlers and how Israeli forces are struggling to deal with rising settler violence. Videos shared from Qusra overnight show a dozen Israeli security vehicles - including a bulldozer. In later footage - filmed in the daylight - there is a long line of Israeli security forces on the road to the Palestinian village, which remains a closed military zone. Local media reports say that a nearby Israeli settler outpost was demolished. Qusay Abu Ridi, who has been trapped by settlers in his home since Sunday with his water and



power cut off, told the BBC that the house had been attacked again overnight and that a few settlers remained in the area, hiding from the army. His brother - who owns the property - is a Palestinian-American businessman who had complained to the US embassy. The US ambassador to Israel Mike Huckabee said his embassy had asked Israel to remove the settlers, describing them as "Israeli terrorists". "Actions by those who carried out this horrific act of terror meant to intimidate and harass this family are disgusting. No excuse for

such thuggish behavior," he posted on X. The situation in Qusra first began on Sunday when settlers blocked the road to the Palestinian families' gates and cut off their power and water supplies. The first Israeli soldiers who came to the site prayed with the settlers - an act for which the Israel military later said they would be disciplined. On Wednesday an attempt by Israeli security forces to dislodge the settlers led to confrontations with a bigger group - and ultimately failed. Palestinian security camera video shared with the BBC showed confrontations

between Israeli soldiers and border police and a large crowd of settlers. The security forces used tear gas and stun grenades. In other footage, the Israeli forces appear to have confiscated the canopy under which the settlers were sheltering, while leaving their other equipment. It is not clear exactly what the settlers in Qusra want. In the past, settlers have forced Palestinians out of their homes and seized their properties. The stated aim of the settlers is to empty the area of its Palestinian residents. Settlements are illegal under international law, but the Israeli government has promoted their recent rapid expansion. The Palestinian village mayor, Abdel Azim Wadi, told the BBC that local residents had seen "a clear and sustained pattern of targeting Qusra". Last month a newly completed mosque was set on fire with graffiti in Hebrew sprayed nearby. That settler attack was one of many that followed on from an incident in the Palestinian village of Tal.

BTS STAR V REVEALS HEARING LOSS BATTLE DURING LIVESTREAM



V, a member of pop sensation BTS, says he has been receiving treatment for hearing loss in one ear, an announcement that comes midway through the band's highly-anticipated world tour. In a livestream on Wednesday, the 30-year-old said that he has dealt with the problem for about two and a half years. This was the first time he was revealing it to the band's fans, he said. "If the hearing in my left ear is at 100, it's only about 30 in my right," said V, whose real name is Kim Tae-hyung. The band is currently on its first world tour in years, marking the reunion of all seven mem-

bers since they went on a hiatus for mandatory military service. During the livestream, V said his hearing became worse when he was serving in the military. But he said he did not take it seriously at first, believing it to be "a matter of mental strength". He added he was now taking medication and going to hospital regularly. With rare exceptions, all able-bodied men are required to serve 18 months of military service in South Korea. This included BTS members, who were at the height of their fame in 2022 when they started taking career breaks to enlist in the military.

JAPAN PM SAYS PUTIN'S VISIT TO DISPUTED ISLANDS 'ABSOLUTELY UNACCEPTABLE'

Japan's Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi has criticised Vladimir Putin's first-ever visit to the disputed Kuril islands on Thursday as "absolutely unacceptable". Russian state media reported that Putin visited Iturup, known in Japan as Etorofu, one of four islands in the Kuril chain that are claimed by Russia and Japan. Putin's trip "has worsened Japanese sentiment towards Russia," Takaichi told reporters, maintaining the island chain was "a unique territory of [Japan] historically and under international law". The countries have been locked in a dispute over the Kurils for decades, and it is the main reason Moscow and Tokyo did not sign a peace treaty after World War Two. The Kuril islands sit between Hokkaido in north-



ern Japan and Russia's Kamchatka Peninsula. Four of the southernmost islands are claimed by Japan, which calls them the Northern Territories. They are administered by Russia. At the end of World War Two, the Soviet Union annexed the island chain and deported around 17,000 Japanese residents. During his visit, Putin sampled fish roe and spoke to

island locals, Russian state media reported. Speaking from the prime minister's office on Thursday, Takaichi said his trip "wounds the feelings of the Japanese people" and is "incompatible with Japan's consistent position on the Northern Territories". "I hope that the Russian side will take the gravity of this matter very seriously," she said. Earlier that day, Japan's

foreign minister Toshimitsu Motegi said the islands were "inherently Japanese territory both historically and under international law, and the Government of Japan strongly protests this visit". Over the years, attempts to resolve the territorial dispute have made little progress. Bilateral ties have also remained frosty, with Japan imposing sanctions against Russia for its invasion of Ukraine in 2022. Japan has protested against previous visits by Russian officials to the disputed islands, including Russian Prime Minister Mikhail Mishustin and his predecessor Dmitry Medvedev. The Kuril islands are a strategic area for Russia, which has beefed up its military presence on the islands over the past decade.

"THE THOUGHT OF PLAYING FOR INDIA PUMPS ME UP": CWG 2026 GOLD MEDALIST BOXER SAKSHI CHAUDHARY

Commonwealth Games gold medalist Sakshi Chaudhary said that she has already shifted her attention to the Asian Games 2026, with the Indian boxer determined to build on her impressive campaign in Glasgow and challenge for another major international title. Sakshi produced a dominant performance in the women's 51kg boxing category at the Commonwealth Games, defeating England's Ruby White 5-0 in the final to claim the gold medal. The Indian remained unbeaten throughout the competition and maintained a perfect 5-0 unanimous-decision record from the pre-quarterfinals through to the final. Her gold medal-winning performance in Glasgow was built on sharp movement, composed defence, accurate combinations and intelligent tactical adjustments. Against White in the final, Sakshi controlled the con-



test from the opening bell and secured a unanimous victory, with the judges' scorecards reading 30-27, 29-28, 30-27, 30-26 and 30-27. The triumph has given Sakshi further confidence ahead of the Asian Games, which are scheduled to begin in Japan on September 19. "Winning a gold medal at the Commonwealth Games is a dream come true moment for me. And now my complete focus is on the Asian Games. These are the platforms that I have always aimed at, and I want to give the best of my abilities,"

Sakshi said. The boxer added that representing India remains her biggest source of motivation and helps her push herself to improve with every bout. "I play for my country. This constant thought pumps me up and gives me the strength and courage to do better than the last match I played," she added. Sakshi said she would immediately begin preparations for the Asian Games and use the lessons from her Commonwealth Games campaign to further sharpen her game.

Lovlina Borgohain Expresses Delight At Meeting PM Narendra Modi

Indian boxer Lovlina Borgohain, who won a silver medal at the 2026 Commonwealth Games in Glasgow, expressed her happiness at meeting Prime Minister Narendra Modi and opened up about receiving praise for her stand concerning the Indian map at a restaurant in Glasgow. She also expressed sadness over the floods in Assam. Borgohain met PM Modi during his interaction with India's medal winners at his residence. Speaking to ANI, Borgohain said she was happy to meet PM Modi again and lauded his personal encouragement and support for athletes. She said it was her sixth meeting with him and noted that athletes today are fortunate to have such opportunities, unlike in earlier generations. "After the Commonwealth Games, I came back home and went to meet the flood victims here. At that time, an invitation for a meeting with PM sir also came, so I had to go there quickly. And I felt very good meeting him, like every time. I met him for the sixth time. I also met him during the Olympics, every Commonwealth

Hence, in order to create the next generation of sports heroes in India, it is extremely important that our coaches have access to world-class education, mentorship, and the latest knowledge in sports science and athlete development.

AUSTRALIAN WOMEN'S CRICKET STAR ASHLEIGH GARDNER BREAKS SILENCE AMID EXPLOSIVE AFFAIR CLAIMS

Australia women's cricket team vice-captain Ashleigh Gardner finally reacted to the controversy surrounding her separation from estranged wife Monica Wright. Wright alleged that Gardner had an affair with teammate Georgia Vull and that ultimately led to their separation. Wright went on to slam Cricket Australia (CA) for not taking action against Gardner and allowing her to hold a leadership position in the team. Gardner took to social media to thank CA for the support and said that her separation with Wright is a personal matter. She added that she will not be making any further public statements about the subject. "While my separation from my wife is a personal matter, I understand my current relationship status needed to be addressed by Cricket Australia given my



position as vice-captain. I am grateful that the CA Board has chosen to support my continued leadership. I look forward to playing a strong role as a leader and providing the best possible support for my teammates in the season to come. I am grateful for the time Monica and shared and sorry for the pain this has caused. I wish her nothing but happiness and success in the future. I won't be making any further

public comment on this matter at this time and ask that the privacy of those involved is respected," Gardner posted on her Instagram story. Earlier, Wright demanded the authorities to strip Gardner of the vice-captaincy role. "I think if you're privileged enough to represent your country and be seen as a role model, there's a responsibility to hold yourself to a high moral standard.

INDIA PULL OUT OF ASEAN CUP TO PRIORITISE BRAZIL FRIENDLY

India have withdrawn from the inaugural FIFA ASEAN Cup, opting to prioritise their high-profile international friendly against five-time world champions Brazil in October. All India Football Federation (AIFF) deputy secretary general M Satyanarayanan said on Thursday. India's withdrawal from the upcoming tournament also means they will miss the opportunity to face some of Southeast Asia's leading sides in a FIFA-sanctioned competition. "We have pulled out of the FIFA ASEAN Cup since we can't play both Brazil and FIFA ASEAN Cup," Satyanarayanan told PTI. The inaugural tournament was conceived as a new international competition for teams from the ASEAN



region, with India invited as one of the non-ASEAN participants. India had initially accepted FIFA's invitation to participate in the new tournament and were subsequently drawn in Division 1 Group A alongside Indonesia, Malaysia and Singapore. The competition is scheduled to be played during the September 21-October 6 FIFA international win-

dow. However, India's commitment to play Brazil on October 3 at Kolkata's Salt Lake Stadium created a scheduling clash. The AIFF had earlier explored the possibility of fielding a separate or developmental squad in the ASEAN Cup, but has now opted to withdraw altogether and use the international window for friendlies. The match against Brazil was officially announced last month.

Fearless Madjo, 17, ends eight-month wait with eye-catching Villa debut



After eight months in limbo, the outcome was worth the wait for Brian Madjo. Aston Villa may have lost the Uefa Super Cup 2-1 to Paris St-Germain in Salzburg on Wednesday but the striker made an impressive impact after finally getting the chance to showcase his talent. After initially joining from Metz in January, the 17-year-old ended the frustration which has built during his 212-day wait for competitive action with a grand entrance. An England Under-17 international, the bruising forward will naturally grab more headlines if he maintains the level he found in Austria against the back-to-back Champions League winners. Villa were barred from registering the teenager by Fifa until they won an appeal through the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS) at the start of this month. He was unleashed against PSG -

and quickly repaid the faith shown by boss Unai Emery. Villa had fought since the start of the year to register the 6ft 4in Madjo following his £10m arrival from Metz. Under-18 players cannot complete international transfers, but the club argued that since Madjo was born in London he should be exempt - despite having three caps for Luxembourg in friendlies. Since those games, he accepted an England Under-17 call up last year and has four goals in nine appearances, scoring on his debut against Venezuela. With England searching for their next No.9 once Harry Kane eventually retires, Madjo could force himself into the conversation in the coming years. Fifa does allow some exemptions for minor players to make moves, including if a 16 or 17-year-old transfers within the European Union - something the UK is no longer part of.

Hodgkinson into 800m final and Werro through despite nasty fall

Keely Hodgkinson's bid for European gold continued as she stormed into the final of the women's 800m - moments after rival Audrey Werro suffered a dramatic fall that put her place in Friday's showpiece in doubt. Werro - who ran the fastest time for 43 years earlier this season - led from the start in the first semi-final, but crashed to the floor on the final bend in Birmingham. The Swiss 22-year-old got back to her feet a moment later and finished the race in last place, grimacing and clutching her chest. However, Werro will

race against Hodgkinson in a highly anticipated final following a successful appeal, with footage showing France's Anaïs Bourgoïn had hit Werro's right foot with her left hand. An earlier angle had appeared to show Werro clipping her own leg before falling. There was less drama in the second semi-final, with Hodgkinson safely crossing the line first in one minute 57.38 seconds. The Olympic champion led from the start and held off the fast-improving Femke Broeders-Bol - a two-time world 400m hurdles champion who chose to switch

events this season - to advance. Asked if she had seen Werro's fall before her race, Hodgkinson told BBC TV: "I heard an 'ooh' [from the crowd] which is never a good sign. I don't know what it looked like." Speaking before Werro's appeal, Hodgkinson added: "Obviously it's a real shame and I hope she's OK. 'I hope she's in the final tomorrow [Friday], that'd be a really exciting race." The women's 800m has become the must-watch event of the championships because of the expected three-way battle between Hodgkinson, Werro and Broeders-Bol.
