Governance with people's aspirations as priority

Paleru (Khammam): Implementing welfare and development programmes swiftly in line with people's aspirations is the primary objective of the people's government, said Telangana Revenue, Housing and Information & Public Relations Minister Ponguleti Srinivas Reddy. Accompanied by District Collector Divakar T.S., the minister toured Kusumanchi mandal on Thursday and laid foundation stones for various development works at an estimated cost of Rs 6.74 crore.

The works include BT roads from Eswaramadaram to Bhadruthanda and Tallagadda Thanda, a high-level bridge at Choutapalli and an R&B BT road at Lingaram Thanda.

Ponguleti said Telangana was the only state in the country providing free fine rice to every ration-card holder, with each beneficiary receiving six kg every month. He said the government had sanctioned eight lakh Indiramma houses and that the selection process for the second phase would begin shortly.

He said Rythu Bharosa funds had already been credited to farmers and a bonus of Rs 500 per quintal was being provided for fine paddy. The land re-survey in the Palair constituency was progressing rapidly and genuine farmers would be issued valid pattadar passbooks after the cancellation of fake ones, he said.

At Lingaram Thanda, the minister interacted with farmers and personally ploughed a field using a bullock-drawn plough. Earlier, at Eswaramadaram, he distributed three months' free fine rice to beneficiaries at a fair-price shop. Beneficiaries expressed happiness over the improved quality of the rice and said they were now using it at home.

Interstate Vehicle Thief Held, Rs.10 Lakh Vehicles Recovered



Siddipet, Aug. 6: Kukunoorpally Police under the Siddipet Commissionerate arrested an interstate vehicle thief and recovered three stolen vehicles worth around Rs.10 lakh.

The accused, identified as Pendyala Sudarshan (32) of Nagarkurnool district, allegedly targeted lone cab and taxi drivers by hiring them for long-distance trips. He would ask drivers to stop at isolated locations for food or rest and flee with the vehicle when they stepped away.

The arrest was made following a complaint by an Ola cab driver whose Swift Dzire was stolen near Mangol Crossroads on July 3. During investigation, police analyzed CCTV footage and technical evidence to trace and arrest the accused.

Police recovered a Swift Dzire, Toyota Etios, and Royal Enfield Hunter motorcycle, all reported stolen in separate cases across Telangana and Andhra Pradesh.

The accused reportedly confessed to involvement in multiple vehicle theft cases across several police station limits and was remanded to judicial custody. Siddipet Police Commissioner Rashmi Perumal appreciated the investigation team for successfully solving the case.

Collector Urges SHGs to Use Loans Productively



Jogulamba Gadwal TSIT. District Collector Rizwan Basha Shaik has urged members of Women Self-Help Groups (SHGs) to utilize interest-free loans effectively by taking up sustainable livelihood activities and income-generating enterprises to achieve economic empowerment.

Addressing the Stree Nidhi District Committee Review Meeting held at the IDOC Conference Hall on Thursday, the Collector said that although substantial interest-free loans are being extended every year to SHGs through SERP and MEPMA, there is a need to assess how effectively these funds are being utilized.

He advised women to move beyond small-scale businesses and focus on manufacturing products that have strong market demand by adopting innovative and entrepreneurial approaches. He stressed the importance of encouraging SHGs to participate in sectors such as poultry, dairy, fisheries, and other allied industries to enhance their income and contribute to rural economic development.

The Collector also suggested that women SHG members in remote areas with limited public transportation facilities should consider purchasing electric auto-rickshaws, mini vans, and other transport vehicles to generate sustainable livelihoods.

He directed officials not to limit loan assistance only to older SHGs but to ensure that members of Sneha Committees and other eligible groups also receive interest-free loans to improve their employment opportunities. Community Coordinators (CCs) and Assistant Project Managers (APMs) were instructed to make significant progress in expanding access to such financial assistance.

Ponnam Vows to Complete Gouravelli Project



Husnabad, Aug. 6: Telangana BC Welfare and Transport Minister Ponnam Prabhakar on Thursday said he was taking full responsibility for completing the Gouravelli project and urged farmers to cooperate with land acquisition for its canals.

During his visit to Koheda mandal in Siddipet district, the Minister inaugurated a Rs.20 lakh Gram Panchayat building at Dharmasagarpalli, inspected the ongoing Young India Integrated Residential School at Tangallapalli, and directed officials to complete it before the next academic year.

He said Rs.250 crore had been released for land acquisition for the Gouravelli canals, adding that legal hurdles had been cleared. The Minister also announced Rs.5 lakh incentives for villages promoting borewell recharge and oil palm cultivation, and assured completion of pending development works.

LIC Q1 FY27 Profit Rises 23%, VNB Surges 61%



Mumbai, Aug. 6: State-owned Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) on Thursday reported a 22.81% year-on-year rise in net profit to Rs.13,492 crore for the first quarter of FY2026-27, driven by strong growth in new business and improved margins.

LIC's total premium income increased 6.75% to Rs.1,27,250 crore, while individual new business premium rose 14.48% to Rs.14,351 crore. The insurer's Value of New Business (VNB) jumped 61.32% to Rs.3,136 crore, with the VNB margin improving to 22.9% from 15.4% a year ago.

The corporation maintained its leadership in the life insurance sector with an overall market share of 60.10% based on first-year premium income. Its Assets Under Management (AUM) grew 4.10% to Rs.59.39 lakh crore, while the solvency ratio improved to 2.42 from 2.17.

LIC sold 31.02 lakh individual policies during the quarter, a 2.06% increase over the corresponding period last year. CEO & MD R. Doraiswamy said the strong performance reflects the success of LIC's product diversification and distribution strategy, adding that the insurer will celebrate its 70th anniversary on September 1, 2026, with more innovative product launches planned.

Who Controls The Conversation? Meta, Algorithmic Power And India's Democracy

Recent developments surrounding Meta's content amplification practices have raised serious questions about the role of global technology platforms in shaping political discourse in India. Admissions made by the company, coupled with Parliamentary scrutiny, have intensified concerns over whether certain campaigns received artificial amplification far beyond their organic reach. If political visibility is determined not by genuine public engagement but by opaque algorithmic intervention or paid amplification, it fundamentally alters the democratic information ecosystem. The issue is no longer about social media marketing; it is about transparency, accountability, and the possibility of foreign influence over India's political processes.

Questions Meta Must Answer

Several critical questions remain unanswered. Why did Meta allegedly fail to disclose when content linked to the CJP campaign was being amplified, despite concerns reportedly raised before the Parliamentary Committee? What are the internal criteria that determine when Meta boosts political content? Who authorises such interventions? If amplification is linked to commercial arrangements, who funded these campaigns, and what safeguards exist to prevent financial influence over political narratives? If Meta's recommendation systems disproportionately amplified narratives targeting the elected Modi Government, was this merely an automated outcome, or did it reflect conscious editorial or algorithmic choices? These are not merely technical questions. They go to the heart of whether a private multinational platform can influence political opinion without transparency or accountability.

Parliamentary Scrutiny Has Intensified

The matter has already moved beyond public debate into institutional scrutiny. Meta was previously summoned by the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY) over the takedown of a video involving Prime Minister Narendra Modi. Since then, the Parliamentary Committee has reportedly escalated the matter by seeking a personal apology from Mark Zuckerberg within a stipulated timeframe and warning that continued non-compliance could invite a review of Meta's Safe Harbour protections. If such protections are revisited, platform executives could potentially face direct legal liability under Indian law for content moderation decisions and platform conduct. Equally significant is what Meta has not explained. Questions surrounding the functioning of its recommendation systems and the criteria governing political amplification reportedly remain unanswered before the Parliamentary panel. That silence only deepens concerns over how political content is prioritised and whether external commercial or institutional influences play any role. A Global Pattern of Algorithmic Concerns

The questions confronting Meta today are not unique to India. Across several countries, the company has faced allegations that its systems have selectively amplified some political narratives while suppressing others.

From Kathmandu, With Care: Lessons For India From Nepal's Gen Z Movement

As youth protests culminated in a Parliament March in New Delhi in the third week of July, and as reels of young protesters went viral on social media, most Nepalis were watching the developments in India with a sense of dread: What will happen to the government of Narendra Modi? Most Nepalis had one (expressed or unexpressed) wish: May what happened in Nepal on September 9 never happen in India. Why did Nepalis think so? Why did they wish what they wished? As people sharing an affinity with India on multiple levels and in multiple layers, Nepalis have always wished well for India and the Indian people. But the reason they had that particular wish is because of their own lived experience of youth protests and the events that followed. Few may have thought the protests of September 8, 2025, called by the Gen Zs, would spiral into a mammoth mass agitation. The common feeling among the people at large, who had full support for the anti-corruption protests, was that the demonstration would be peaceful, and the nation would return to business as usual on September 9. That was not meant to be. The protests were an expression of pent-up frustration against malgovernance, which had been building for years. Students from schools, colleges, and universities were ready to hit the streets if that would help hold the government - thought to be thoroughly corrupt and utterly insensitive to the youth's voice - to account. It would probably have ended up that way too. But when protesting youth clashed with police personnel in Kathmandu on September 8, the first day of the protest, and the police opened fire, the protest took a deadly, ugly turn. Young students were shot; over a dozen of them died while undergoing treatment in hospitals. Curfews failed to deter the angry youths, and



the government ministers showed no sign of reassuring them that their genuine concerns would be addressed. Instead, government ministers, including the Prime Minister of the day, continued to speak of the Gen Z protesters in denigrating terms. It was, therefore, evident that the protest would continue on September 9 and that it would turn violent. But that it would burn down the nation was beyond anyone's imagination. What happened on September 9 was something that Nepal had never witnessed in its history-the total breakdown of law and order. Police posts, the houses of political leaders, Singha Durbar (the Rana-era palace that houses the administrative offices of the Government of Nepal), the Supreme Court, the Parliament building, ministers' quarters, hotels and supermarkets were attacked, vandalised, looted or set ablaze. The nation had fallen apart; anarchy had been loosed upon Nepal, it seemed. Anyone who witnessed any of this would break down in tears. Amid this moment of chaos, arson attacks, looting

and vandalism, just anybody's house could be burnt down, just any leader could be chased away from his dwelling place, anybody could be killed. Common people prayed for peace and for the restoration of law and order. The situation began to normalise after the Nepal Army appealed for calm and was mobilised to restore order. The rest, as they say, is history: the resignation of Prime Minister KP Oli, the formation of an interim government under the leadership of former Chief Justice Sushila Karki, the announcement of elections for the House of Representatives, the then serving Mayor of Kathmandu Metropolitan City Balendra Shah joining the Rastriya Swatantra Party (RSP), the RSP emerging as the largest force, and the formation of the government under the leadership of Balendra Shah. Wounds And Scars The deaths of September 8 and the vandalism, arson attacks, deaths and destruction of September 9 not only left a deep scar on the country's image of peace and harmony but also challenged the long-

held notion that Nepal and Nepalis are fundamentally peaceful, with no animosity or ill feeling towards anyone. Neither the political parties that were in power at the time nor the youths who led the protests have been able to come to terms with the trauma of loss and destruction. While the old guard lives with the guilt of its apathy towards the legitimate concerns raised by the youths, its insensitivity and lack of readiness to address their demands, and the repercussions of what a ban on social media platforms would entail for the youth, many now believe that an earlier political response-a call for talks by the Prime Minister, young leaders of the ruling parties mediating talks between the government and the Gen Zs, and some reassuring words from people in power-would possibly have reduced the risks of violence. Maybe the chaos of September 9 would not have followed; maybe the nation would not have been inflicted with such pain and loss. On their part, those who led the protests (the majority of whom are leading the government today) have

answers to why they had to hit the streets on September 8, but they have no reasonable justification for the anarchy that followed the next day. The two sides blame each other for the incidents of September 8 and 9. Questions of accountability for both the violence and the destruction are avoided by both sides as far as possible. At times, some political actors of the pre-September 8 order point to conspiracy theories that the whole episode was orchestrated by foreign elements' bent on destabilising not only Nepal but the whole of South Asia (implying India as well), but these claims are difficult to substantiate with the available evidence. Message to India Some argue that India's situation is incomparable to that of Nepal. True, but not entirely. Nepal's Gen Z protests were fuelled by years of malgovernance that had gnawed at the nation to its core, a lack of accountability, corruption and a lack of opportunities for the youth. The frustration had reached a boiling point; the government's decision to ban 26 social media platforms acted as a trigger that unleashed it.

In India, the NEET paper leaks and controversial remarks by a Supreme Court judge appear to have worked as a catalyst in uniting the youth in protest. In India, the restraint shown by the youth helped keep much of the movement peaceful, and the security forces appear to have acted with restraint, although allegations of excessive force have emerged. The resignation of Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan, interpreted as a 'victory' by protesters, led the Cockroach Janta Party (CJP) to call off the immediate protests, but the possibility of their resumption still remains. Youths in India and Nepal have common aspirations: They want jobs, they want transparency, accountable government, corruption-free governance, they want to be heard, they want results, and they want the government to safeguard their future in their own homes. When their expectations are not met, when they feel that the government is treating them unfairly, when corruption, or the perception of corruption, becomes rampant, they can resort to protests and demonstrations. Needless to say, Nepal and India differ significantly in size, economic structures and political dynamics. Yet the dynamics of youth movements and the government response offer valuable lessons for each other. First, when the youth rise and speak out, the government must listen before anger becomes rage. Undermining their voices and denigrating them can be costly. On their part, the youth need to be cognisant that governance is about process, the government has limitations, and it is not always possible to address all of their demands. Maturity, tolerance, reason and the ability to listen to the other side are the hallmarks of leadership. Second, institutions and the way they function can be flawed. But they need reform.

I WANT EVERYTHING IN THE VILLAGE, BUT I DON'T WANT THE VILLAGE

"We want everything from the village, but not the village itself." This isn't a simple statement, but rather a fitting depiction of the changing mindset of modern Indian society. We talk about pure village milk, praise desi ghee, are willing to pay more to buy organic grains, consider village fruits and vegetables the foundation of health, and identify village culture, folk songs, folk dances, and traditional life as our identity. We seek to take everything from villages, yet we fall short in providing them with the respect, facilities, and opportunities they deserve. Today, there's a huge market for "organic" in cities. Village wheat, millet, mustard oil, local pulses, and fresh vegetables sell at high prices. People consider village honey, local jaggery, and coarse grains to be healthy. But the lives of the farmers who produce these products are often filled with struggles. The children of the same farmers whose hard work fills the plates of urban residents are forced to migrate to cities for better

education and healthcare. Rural life's greatest asset has been its social connections. The entire village stood together as one family, through joys and sorrows. Weddings, festivals, harvests, or times of crisis—every occasion symbolized togetherness. Today, in urban life, people seek this same sense of belonging. People living in large apartments don't even know their neighbors. Meanwhile, the village square, the shade of the peepal tree, and group conversations are slowly fading into memory. We praise that intimacy, but do nothing to preserve it. The search for education and employment has accelerated the migration of youth from villages. This migration is not only economic but also cultural. Educated youth consider settling in cities a success. Returning to villages is seen as a symbol of backwardness. As a result, more elderly people, women, and children remain in villages, while the energy of young people is being expended in cities. If quality education, modern healthcare, industry, and respectable employment were available in villages, a large number of people would choose to remain in their villages. It's also true that villages face many challenges. Lack of basic amenities like education, health, transportation, internet, drinking water, sanitation, and employment is still evident in many areas. Problems like social evils, caste discrimination, and conservatism also persist. It's important to acknowledge these shortcomings, but the solution lies not in fleeing villages, but in improving them.

Today, when the entire world is grappling with an environmental crisis, the importance of villages increases even more. Clean air, open fields, trees, water sources, and a life in harmony with nature are the hallmarks of villages. In cities, people seek to experience nature by building artificial parks, whereas in villages, nature is a natural part of life. If we expand cities without preserving villages, future generations will only see natural life in books and pictures. The COVID-19 pandemic also reminded us of the importance of villages. When economic activity in cities ground to a halt, millions of people returned to their villages. Villages provided them with shelter, food, and the opportunity to rebuild their lives. It became clear then that villages are not just geographical entities, but also society's strongest security system in times of crisis. Today, the need is not just to create rural development plans, but to change the mindset of development. The need is not to turn villages into cities, but to integrate them with modern amenities while retaining their unique characteristics. Good roads, quality schools, digital connectivity, modern hospitals, agriculture-based industries, skill development, and local employment—these are the true foundations of rural development. If opportunities exist in villages, migration will naturally decrease. We must also inculcate respect for villages in our education system. Children must understand that farming is not just a profession, but the foundation of the

nation's food security. Farmers are not only food providers but also environmental protectors. Villages are not just places to live, but the very source of our civilization and culture. The media and entertainment industry also play a significant role in this. Villages are often portrayed as either extremely backward or merely romanticized. The real village is different from both these images. It offers struggles and possibilities; it also offers tradition and the desire for change. Only a balanced portrayal can foster a positive perspective in society. The government, society, and the private sector must work together to strengthen the rural economy. Villages can become self-reliant by promoting agriculture, animal husbandry, beekeeping, fisheries, cottage industries, rural tourism, and handicrafts. Digital technology and e-commerce can help rural products reach consumers directly. This will increase the income of farmers and rural entrepreneurs and create new employment opportunities in villages. A village is defined not only by its farms but also by its culture. Parliamentary Deadlock and Democracy: When Will the Culture of Dialogue Return?

The greatest strength of Indian democracy lies in its Parliament. Parliament is not merely a platform for enacting laws; it is the supreme democratic institution that shapes the aspirations and problems of the people and determines the nation's future direction. Here, both the ruling party and the opposition sit as representatives of the people. The ruling party arrives with a mandate to govern, while the opposition fulfills the constitutional responsibility of reviewing government policies, offering criticism, and suggesting necessary reforms. Democracy is strengthened when Parliament functions smoothly; conversely, when it falls prey to persistent deadlock, not only is the House's time wasted, but public trust also begins to erode. In recent years, deadlocks over various issues have been witnessed in almost every parliamentary session. At times, the opposition demands a discussion on a specific subject, while at other times, the government accuses the opposition of preventing the House from functioning. The consequences include the adjournment of Question Hour, the passing of bills without comprehensive debate, and the wastage of crores of rupees worth of public time and resources. While differences of opinion are natural in a democracy, the very soul of democracy is wounded when these differences transform into confrontation rather than dialogue. Uproar in Parliament is nothing new. Indian parliamentary history has witnessed heated debates, protests, and disruptions to proceedings on numerous

occasions. However, the past also saw extensive and serious deliberations. The opposition would hold the government accountable, the government would respond, and ultimately, the facts would be laid before the public. Today, the situation is such that slogan-shouting has replaced debate, and political strategy has supplanted dialogue. This undermines the dignity of Parliament. The role of the opposition is of paramount importance in a democracy. The opposition exists not merely to oppose the government but to present alternative perspectives. It is the opposition's duty to check the government if it makes a flawed decision, to raise public grievances in the House, and to ensure accountability. Conversely, the government has a responsibility to listen to the opposition, facilitate discussions on critical issues, and proceed by taking Parliament into confidence. If both sides fail to balance their respective responsibilities, democracy is weakened. Today, numerous significant subjects await discussion in Parliament. Issues such as unemployment, inflation, farmers' concerns, education, healthcare, national security, border disputes, digital crime, environmental conservation, judicial reforms, the challenges of artificial intelligence, and economic inequality demand comprehensive debate. Unfortunately, one often witnesses more political recrimination than serious deliberation on these matters. The public sends representatives to Parliament not to shout slogans, but to find solutions. Respecting parliamentary traditions is a prerequisite for a robust democracy.

Millions of people watch the live broadcast of parliamentary proceedings. The younger generation learns from their representatives how dissent is expressed within a democracy. If the scene in Parliament is one of constant uproar, slogan-shouting, and disorder, the culture of dialogue in society also weakens. Democracy signifies not just majority rule, but also respect for dissent. A serious question also arises: who pays the price for the repeated wastage of Parliament's precious time? Running Parliament costs crores of rupees daily; this money comes from the hard-earned income of taxpayers. When House proceedings are adjourned without any meaningful discussion, it results not only in financial loss but also in a loss of democratic accountability. The public expects its representatives to utilize every minute in the public interest. Adequate discussion on bills is a fundamental requirement of democracy. Any law impacts society for years to come. If bills are passed without sufficient debate, numerous practical difficulties may arise in the future. The more transparent and well-considered the law-making process, the more effective and acceptable the laws will be. Therefore, the government should allow the opposition ample time to discuss important bills, and the opposition, in turn, should participate in the debate by offering constructive suggestions. The role of the media is also crucial in this context. If the media prioritizes political confrontation while failing to give adequate coverage to serious parliamentary debates, political parties will also prioritize headline-grab-

bing politics. In a democracy, the media's responsibility extends beyond merely highlighting controversies; it also involves fostering meaningful discourse on policies, laws, and issues of public interest. Political polarization is another reason for the deadlock in Parliament. Today, ideological differences between political parties appear to have transcended reasonable limits, evolving into personal and entrenched animosity. While electoral competition is essential in a democracy, national interest must take precedence over elections are over. In Parliament, the ruling party and the opposition may be rivals, but they are not enemies. If the sentiment of "country first, politics later" takes root, solutions to many problems will emerge naturally. India is the world's largest democracy. Many developing nations regard India's parliamentary system as a model. Consequently, the conduct of our Parliament sends a message not only to the nation but to the global community as well. If Parliament becomes synonymous with constant deadlock, it will tarnish India's democratic image. Therefore, every Member of Parliament bears the responsibility of rising above personal and partisan interests to fulfill their national obligations. To make Parliament more effective, certain practical reforms should also be considered. Regular all-party meetings should be held, efforts should be made to build consensus on contentious issues beforehand, parliamentary committees should be further empowered, and the dignity of Question Hour and Zero Hour must be upheld under all circumstances.

Mumbai: Stock market benchmark indices Sensex and Nifty edged higher in opening trade on Thursday, August 6, amid lower crude oil prices and buying in Reliance Industries. The 30-share BSE Sensex climbed 201.43 points to 78,782.43 in opening trade. The 50-share NSE Nifty was marginally up 16.35 points to 24,641. Benchmark indices have been facing divergence since Monday after stock exchanges introduced a new auction mechanism for shares having futures and options (F&O) contracts. The Closing Auction Session (CAS) in the equity cash segment became operational on Monday, introducing a new auction-based mechanism for determining the closing prices of eligible stocks in a move aimed at making the price discovery process more transparent and robust. From the Sensex pack, Titan, Reliance Industries, Eternal,

Bharat Electronics, State Bank of India and Asian Paints were among the major winners. Power Grid, Trent, Mahindra & Mahindra and Axis Bank were among the laggards. Brent crude, the global oil benchmark, traded 0.13 per cent lower at USD 79.35 per barrel. The Reserve Bank of India on Wednesday maintained a status quo on its benchmark policy rate for the fourth consecutive meeting and retained the stance as "neutral", with Governor Sanjay Malhotra saying the next move of the central bank on interest rates, as well as policy stance, will be data dependent. The six-member Monetary Policy Committee unanimously voted to keep the policy repo rate unchanged at 5.25 per cent, and opted to wait for more clarity on whether higher energy costs in the wake of the West Asia crisis feed into broader inflationary pressures.

After deadly Kyiv strike, Ukraine warns interceptor shortage is costing lives



At the Kvitneva railway station near Kyiv, workers lift white body bags from the pockmarked platform and carry them to waiting ambulances. Shoes, glasses and some pieces of clothing mark the spot where eight people were killed during Russia's latest massive aerial attack on Ukraine. Overnight, Moscow fired 115 drones and 24 ballistic missiles. Most of the drones were shot down, but Kyiv's depleted air defences did not intercept any of the missiles. Twenty-one people were killed and dozens more were injured. The latest Russian barrage destroyed storage and logistics facilities - from online retailer warehouses to a postal sorting centre. In Kvitneva, it is not clear if the target was the railway itself or the warehouse beside it, which was also hit and was still smouldering hours later. Down the road, another warehouse was still ablaze more than 12 hours after the attack. The attack started just after midnight, with very little warning. It was one of the most intense nights of bombardment

Kyiv has endured in recent months. Nearby, Anastasiia Dudley's house was almost totally destroyed but she and her mother survived - shaken but unharmed. Anastasiia has lived through years of war - but Wednesday was her "scariest night" since the start of Russia's full-scale war on Ukraine in February 2022, she says. She looks up at the precariously leaning walls of her house, which she says was hit by a drone a few hours before missiles struck the warehouse and the station nearby. "You see two floors - the first and the second, but it was a three-floor house with a roof," she says. The building's top floor has been sliced off. "So no roof, no third floor, and extensive damage on the second floor. It's pretty unstable". Ukrainians have lived through four-and-a-half years of war, but now air defences are increasingly vulnerable, resulting in dozens of deaths at a time. For years, Ukraine has relied on US supplies of Patriot interceptor missiles to shoot down Russian ballistic missiles.

Iran says deal with Oman on Strait of Hormuz is in final stages

Iran says it has reached an agreement with Oman on a route for shipping through the Strait of Hormuz. Foreign ministry spokesman Esmail Bagaei did not give any further details on the agreement, which he said was "in the final stages". Bagaei warned, however, that a deal with Oman would not guarantee safe navigation through the strait, arguing security remained impacted by the US blockade of Iran's ports. The US and Oman have not commented on the proposal. Since the US and Israel attacked Iran in February, Tehran has largely blocked the Strait of Hormuz through which about a fifth of the world's oil and liquefied natural gas usually passes. On Tuesday, US President Donald Trump



warned that Iran would be "hit very hard" if the strait did not open "very soon". His comments came after senior US officials said talks had progressed to allow shipments to potentially resume later this week, though Iran has maintained that it is not negotiating with the US and has no plans to do so. In his statement, the Iranian foreign ministry spokesman

said the "geographical coordinates of the route" had been agreed with Oman. "The factors making the Strait of Hormuz insecure still exist on the part of the United States, particularly the naval blockade and other aggressive and threatening actions against Iran and its interests," he said, according to Iran's official Irna news agency. Iran's Deputy Foreign Minister Kazem Gharibabadi later told Irna the new route would be temporary and could stay open from two to four months. He did not give further details. Oil prices edged lower on Thursday, with global benchmark Brent crude down by 0.3% at \$79.24 (£58.84) in morning Asian trade. Energy prices have fluctuated wildly during the conflict as shipments through the key route for around 20% of the world's oil and liquefied natural gas (LNG) have been severely disrupted. Since the beginning of the war, traffic through the strait has dwindled. Iran has said all passage needs to be cleared beforehand - and it has attacked vessels which have ignored the order.

Senate committee votes to hold Dr. Anthony Fauci in contempt of Congress

Thousands of workers from Khan's Tehreek-e-Insaf party took to the streets in rallies across the country on Wednesday to demand the release of the former star cricketer-turned-politician

and his wife Bushra Bibi. Khan, who led the country from 2018 until his ouster in a parliamentary no-confidence vote in 2022, has been in prison since his conviction a year later on charges including corruption and revealing state secrets - charges he and his supporters say are a politically motivated response to his opposition to the current government of Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif. Following his ouster, Khan had led large rallies against Sharif's government, which he accused of orchestrating his downfall in collusion with the military and the United States (a claim denied by both the military and the US).

FUNERAL OF IRISH ACTRESS BRENDA FRICKER TAKES PLACE IN DUBLIN

Oscar winning actress Brenda Fricker "brought out the best in people" and "shot from the hip", her funeral in Dublin has heard. Fricker, who died last month, won the Oscar for best supporting actress in 1990 for playing Daniel Day-Lewis's on-screen mother in My Left Foot. She was the first Irish woman to win an Academy Award, beating Hollywood stars including Julia Roberts and Anjelica Huston. The funeral mass took place in St Catherine's Church on Meath Street at 11:00 local time and was followed by a private burial. The 81-year-old was also well known for playing nurse Megan Roach in the BBC's Casualty from 1986, making her final appearance in 2010; and was the Central Park pigeon



lady in 1992's Home Alone sequel. Crowds of locals gathered outside on the street and clapped as her hearse made its way down the road and into the church. Monsignor Eoin Thynne said Fricker was a "Liberty belle at heart", referring to the place in Dublin where the actress lived. "Brenda wanted this day to be simple and dignified. CWG JUDO GOLD-WINNER ASMITA DEY FACES UTTAR PRADESH REWARD ELIGIBILITY QUESTION

India's Asmita Dey etched her name in the history books by winning the country's first-ever judo gold at the Commonwealth Games. She produced a spirited comeback to clinch the top honours in the women's 48kg final, defeating Canada's Heidi Quach in a dramatic Golden Score contest in Glasgow. The 23-year-old from Tripura found herself on the back foot early in the final after conceding a yuko and then receiving a penalty, allowing Quach to take control of the bout. However, Asmita responded brilliantly, attacking with greater intent and levelling the scores at 1-1 shortly after the midway stage of the four-minute contest. Neither judoka could find the decisive score during regulation time despite a series of intense exchanges, forcing the match into the Golden Score period, where the first



scoring action determines the winner. Maintaining her composure under pressure, Asmita launched a decisive attack in sudden-death overtime and earned another yuko to seal a memorable victory and hand India the gold medal. The triumph capped an impressive campaign for the young judoka, who showed remarkable resilience to recover from an early deficit and outfight her Canadian opponent in a gripping final. Days after her

victory, the Indian judoka finds herself in a bit of controversy over her eligibility for Uttar Pradesh's state athlete benefits. It is worth noting that Asmita, who hails from Tripura, represents Uttar Pradesh in judo events. So, is she eligible for UP's state rewards according to the August 2024 order? If Asmita gets a green signal, she will receive a massive sum of Rs 1.5 crore for her achievement at the Games in Glasgow.

BCCI Questions Team India Physio Over 'Dip In Fitness Standards': Report



The medical team at the Centre of Excellence (CoE) in Bengaluru is looking to restructure its fitness programme amid injury concerns of players in the Indian cricket team, according to a report by Times Of India. The report claimed that the CoE is working on a standardised base fitness parameter for all cricketers instead of customised tests. Since Adrian Leroux took over as the strength and conditioning coach, it was decided that the Bronco test would be the primary test to judge fitness

instead of Yo-Yo test. Now, the BCCI medical team has reportedly decided on 5.15-5.20 minutes as a 'base figure to complete the assorted drills to be declared fit'. The CoE has also set 9-10 minute mark to complete the 2 km running test. "The Indian players are not used to the Bronco test. Over the last year, the CoE had set different base parameters for players. It has now emerged that certain senior players were given much comfortable targets to meet to clear fitness tests.

Banned from football at home, Afghan women's team reunite 8,000 miles away

The changing room is busy with footballers going through their pre-match routines. Some stretch and tighten their boots, others embrace. "Be strong as always because we are representing Afghan women," says midfielder Fatima Haidari to fellow members of Afghan Women United. Applause erupts in the room where an Afghan flag hangs and a patriotic song is played. As the women sing along some struggle to hold back tears. There's a final team huddle with words of encouragement from their coach before they head out to the pitch – a place that for years they had been told they did not belong. The 23-player squad, selected from Afghan players now living abroad, has travelled to New Zealand for a training camp and to play two unofficial friendly games against the Cook Islands. This is the first time they have been together since football governing body Fifa ruled in April that they could represent their country in official matches in the future. Previously, they would have needed the approval of the Afghanistan



Football Federation. This was not possible under the Taliban, who returned to power in August 2021, imposing wide-ranging restrictions on women and girls, including barring them from secondary school and university, most professions and organised sport. The country's national women's team, formed in 2007, could no longer play and its members were among those evacuated and resettled in countries including Australia, the UK and Portugal. Years of campaigning led to the creation of a refugee team, which became Afghan Women United. Thanks to Fifa's ruling, it can now try to qualify for international competitions such as the Olympics and World Cup.

Gathered in New Zealand, the squad is excited to be playing together - as asylum seekers living in various countries it has been hard for them to get the travel documents in order to train as a team over the past five years. Sitting in the hotel in Auckland the day before the match, Manozh Noori, who has short hair, wears a T-shirt and knee-length shorts - a look that she says has often drawn criticism from relatives for looking too masculine. As the 23-year-old speaks to BBC Global Women about her family, her voice begins to falter. She pauses, takes a deep breath and looks away for a moment before continuing. There are no tears, but the emotion is clear.

Pakistan Can Hold India To A draw In FIH Men's World Cup Clash On August 19: Chief Selector

Chief selector Samiullah Khan on Thursday said that Pakistan can hold arch-rivals India to a draw in their hockey World Cup clash on August 19, which will be the key for them to get past the first round pool stage in the showpiece in Belgium and the Netherlands. Pakistan on Wednesday announced a 20-member squad for the World Cup (August 15-30) in which the national team is taking part after eight years. 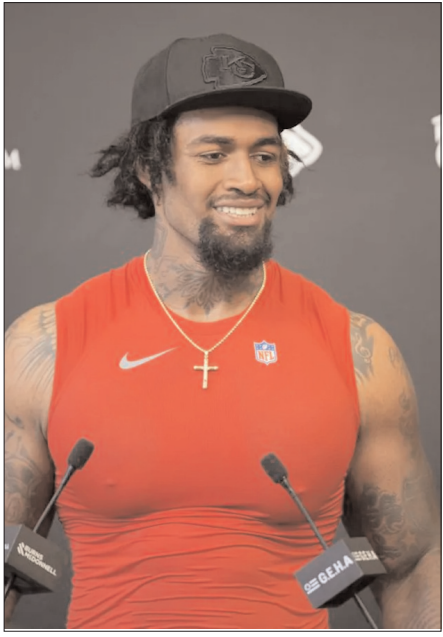

Thai Footballer Dies As Lightning Strikes During Match, Tragic Incident Caught On Camera

In a tragic incident on Tuesday, a Thai footballer named Softwan Awae, who was just 24 years old, lost his life after being struck by lightning during a local football match in southern Thailand. Twelve other players were also injured, as the incident left everyone in shock. A video has surfaced on social media showing players playing football amid rain when lightning suddenly struck the pitch, followed by a loud explosion. The players rushed to Awae, who fell to the ground and remained motionless. As per reports, Awae, who was a winger, succumbed to the critical injuries he suffered despite the efforts of emergency medical teams. As per The Independent, the incident occurred during the Golok FA Cup, a local tournament featuring amateur and Thai-Malaysian teams. The match was between Awae's



side, SAMCOLTS, and Abu x Nong Sirin. As the video surfaced on social media, condolences started pouring in from all corners. Meanwhile, some users also questioned the decision to conduct the match under such conditions. "That's devastating. Stopping a match in storm conditions should be automatic protocol everywhere," wrote a user. "This is disastrous and so sad to see. Imagine watching your child play football and this happened. God rest his soul,"

wrote another user. "The league is responsible, they need to take more precautions. RIP to the player who got hit," another comment read. The news outlet also pointed out that deaths due to lightning in Thailand are quote common. Quoting data from the Department of Disease Control, it stated that at least 283 people were struck by lightning across the country between 2020 and 2024, and many of them died on the spot.

Report Says Gianni Infantino Offered 2030 World Cup Final To Morocco Amid Ongoing Row. FIFA Responds



FIFA president Gianni Infantino offered Morocco the chance to host the FIFA World Cup 2030 final in exchange for political backing amid the ongoing controversy, according to a report by The Times. Infantino found himself in the middle of a major controversy after his plans of selling a minority stake in the World Cup to private investors led to massive outrage. The report claimed that Infantino made the offer to Morocco in order to receive public backing from member

associations ahead of next year's FIFA presidential election. Morocco is all set to host the World Cup in 2030 along with Spain and Portugal but the venue for the final has not been decided yet. According to the report, Infantino privately promised the final to Morocco with the under-construction Hassan II Stadium near Casablanca as the chosen venue for the summit clash. However, FIFA has denied the report and said that no such commitment was made to any nation. "It is

false and misleading to claim the FIFA President has made any promise in relation to hosting the FIFA World Cup 2030 final. A decision will be made by FIFA in due course," a FIFA spokesperson said. FIFA said on Wednesday that it had apologised for errors made over Gianni Infantino's failed plan to sell stakes in the World Cup and that senior staff in attendance at a crisis meeting in Morocco "reaffirmed their full support" for his presidency.

World football's governing body attempted to present a unified front amid the turbulence caused by Infantino's controversial plans, with calls for him to step down. In a statement, FIFA said Secretary-General Mattias Grafstrom and members of the management board in attendance in Rabat had given their support to the embattled president.

ALEXANDER ZVEREV, FELIX AUGER-ALIASSIME AND DANIIL MEDVEDEV EXIT MONTREAL MASTERS



The ATP Montreal Masters lost its top two seeds in the space of a few hours on Wednesday as Germany's Alexander Zverev and Canadian Felix Auger-Aliassime both exited the field. Top seed and world number three Zverev, this year's French Open champion and Wimbledon runner-up, was toppled by Dutchman Tallon Griekspoor, who rallied for a 6-7 (3/7), 6-2, 6-4 second-round upset. "I didn't expect to play well," Zverev said. "I also didn't expect to play this bad, to be honest." Montreal native Auger-Aliassime had to withdraw before his scheduled night match after injuring his back during training on Monday. "It was quite sudden. I was training here for two weeks and I had zero problems," Auger-Aliassime said. "Just the timing is tough. I thought that day by day things would get better, but I tried to go on court today, I tried to warm up, and then I basically couldn't serve really, so it was impossible for me

to think about even competing." Joining his fellow elites on the sidelines was fourth seed Daniil Medvedev, the 2021 champion, who went out 6-3, 7-6 (7/5) to Botic Van de Zandschulp, another Dutch spoiler. Medvedev missed out on achieving his 100th career victory at the Masters level as he lost in his Canada opener, weighed down by 40 unforced errors. Tournament officials already were fuming at an event in which world number one Jannik Sinner and Novak Djokovic were both high-profile absentees even before the start. "I'm not going to lie, we were hoping that Felix was going to win at least a few matches," tournament director Valerie Tetreault said. "He's definitely the player everybody was talking about and people wanted to know when he was going to play." Zverev was competing for the first time since his Wimbledon final loss to Sinner and began to fade in the second set against world number 69 Griekspoor.

LIONEL MESSI SCORES 2 GOALS, PROVIDES ASSIST FOR INTER MIAMI TO LEAVE FANS BUZZING



Lionel Messi scored his first two goals since the World Cup and took the career scoring lead in the Leagues Cup as Inter Miami overcame an early deficit to beat Atletico San Luis 4-2 on a rainy Wednesday night. The match at Nu Stadium was delayed 30 minutes in the second half because of lightning in the area. Messi scored in the 11th and the 44th minutes. He has 14 goals in 12 Leagues Cup matches — one ahead of Los Angeles FC's Denis Bouanga for most in the tournament's four-year history. Telasco Segovia and defender Micael

also scored, and Noah Allen had three assists as Inter Miami extended its unbeaten streak to eight matches. Messi returned to Miami's starting lineup in his second match since the World Cup, where he led Argentina to its second straight final appearance before La Albiceleste lost 1-0 to Spain. The 39-year-old played 37 minutes as a substitute in a 2-2 draw with the Columbus Crew on Saturday. After being held off the scoresheet against Columbus, it didn't take Messi long to make an impact on Wednesday. He

fired a long cross from Allen past Andres Sanchez to equalize after David Rodriguez put San Luis ahead with a header four minutes into the match. Messi finished from close range later in the first half and assisted on Micael's header in stoppage time. Rafa Llorente also scored for San Luis. Messi led Miami to the Leagues Cup title in 2023 shortly after his arrival with the club. Inter Miami reached the final again last year, losing 3-0 to Seattle in a match that ended with a brawl involving Luis Suarez.

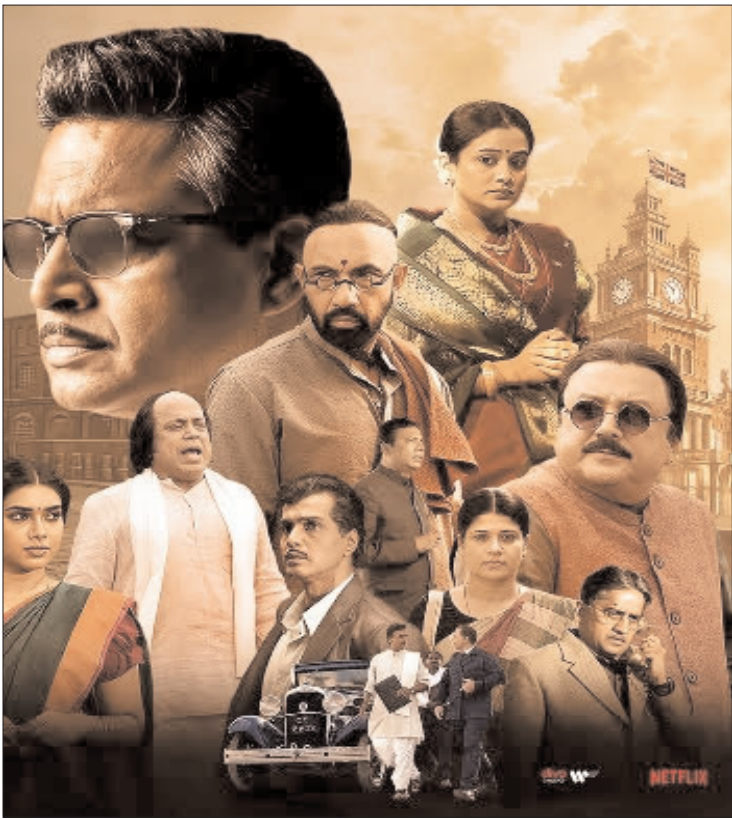
