Rs 4 lac bounty PLA militant arrested in Manipur

Imphal: Assam Rifles and Manipur Police have apprehended a senior militant of the outlawed People's Liberation Army (PLA), carrying a Rs 4 lakh bounty, in a joint counter-insurgency operation in Manipur, officials said on Sunday. A defence spokesperson said self-styled PLA Captain Thiyam Boycha Singh alias Balin, 28, was arrested from Ushoipokpi in Thoubal district on Saturday night. The operation was launched following intelligence developed by the Assam Rifles indicating the militant's presence in Bishnupur district. Security forces subsequently conducted a targeted search operation on Saturday evening and intercepted the suspected PLA cadre.

US proposes hike in H-1B visa, to affect Indians

Washington (TSIT) The US on Monday proposed a USD 1,03,265 fee for all H-1B visa cap-subject applications, including those eligible for the advanced degree exemption, the Department of Homeland Security said. The new proposal from the DHS came a month after a federal appeals court rejected a plea to stay a district judge's order overturning the Trump administration plan to charge a USD 1,00,000 fee for H-1B visa applications. "...DHS proposes to implement the USD 1,03,265 amount as a separate, additional H-1B fee rather than combining it with the existing H-1B petition fee," according to a notice published in the Federal Register. It said the fee would apply only to H-1B cap-subject petitions, including those eligible for the advanced degree exemption, but not to cap-exempt filings.

Four-member Hindu family found dead in locked Rangpur

Dhaka, Aug 23: A retired Hindu school teacher, his wife, daughter and 12-year-old son were found dead inside their locked home in Rangpur city, in circumstances that have prompted a police investigation. The bodies were recovered around 11.30 p.m. on Saturday from a house in the Daspara (Machhuapara) area. Rangpur Metropolitan Kotwali Police Station Officer-in-Charge Nazmul Kader said police entered the locked house and recovered the bodies, according to The Daily Star.

Modi urges private sector to make India global space hub

New Delhi (TSIT): Prime Minister Narendra Modi has said India has the potential to emerge as a global leader in the space sector and called on private companies to build an ecosystem capable of attracting international talent, investment and innovation. Modi made the remarks during an interaction with chief executive officers and founders of 20 private space companies. The meeting was held on Friday, with details released on Sunday, which is observed as National Space Day to commemorate the successful soft landing of the Vikram lander during the Chandrayaan-3 mission.

Modi said India could become a global hub for space startups by leveraging its cost competitiveness, large domestic talent pool and growing private-sector capabilities. "We must create such an aura that people all over the world feel that if they want to build their life, they should come to Hindustan. Join some Indian start-up. Join some Indian space agency," he said.

India opened its space sector to private participation in 2020, allowing companies and startups to participate across areas including satellites, launch sys-



tems and space applications. The Indian Space Policy 2023 further expanded private participation across the space value chain. According to government figures, the number of private space startups in India has increased from just one in 2014 to 440 currently.

Modi told the entrepreneurs that the government had sought to create an environment of trust and consistency to encourage private companies to take risks and invest in new areas.

"My view has always been that whatever decisions we take, we must remain consistent in them... so that anyone who wants to take a risk can have confidence," he said. The global space industry is estimated to be worth around \$600 billion, while India's current share stands at about \$9 billion.

The government has set a target of increasing India's share to between \$40 billion and \$45 billion over the next decade.

Private investment in India's space sector has also increased sharply, rising nearly six-fold from \$100.5 million in 2021-22 to \$618.5 million by March 31, 2026. Around \$187 million was invested during the current year, according to government figures. "In cost we are very competitive, in talent there is no question at all, and the risk-taking capacity of our people is any way greater. And because of that we can very quickly make our place," Modi said.

Representatives of leading space companies including Skyroot Aerospace, Agnikul Cosmos, Pixxel, Dhruva Space and GalaxEye participated in the

interaction.

The companies outlined plans for developing advanced space technologies, including robotic spacecraft capable of removing defunct satellites from orbit, docking and refuelling systems aimed at creating space-based fuel stations, and technologies for manufacturing pharmaceuticals in space and bringing them back to Earth.

Skyroot Aerospace, which conducted India's first private rocket launch in July, described the achievement as the beginning of its plans to increase launch frequency and expand its operations. Modi said successful breakthroughs by Indian space startups would attract global attention and encourage further investment in the sector. The CEOs also discussed applications of space technology beyond rocket launches, including global ground-station networks, advanced propulsion systems and satellite-based solutions for agriculture and other sectors. They highlighted increasing international contracts, growing investor confidence and expanding opportunities in overseas markets, supported by government measures to promote exports and open up India's space sector.

CJP announces peaceful march in Delhi on Sep 5 over Centre's unfulfilled promises

New Delhi (TSIT) : The Cockroach Janta Party (CJP) on Monday announced a peaceful protest march in the national capital on September 5, accusing the Centre of failing to honour commitments made to young people on July 25.

In a statement, the CJP said it would mobilise young people for a peaceful march from India Gate to the new Delhi Police Headquarters. The protest will be led by the families of deceased NEET victims and victims of alleged police brutality. "CJP announces youth mobilisation on September 5th, with a peaceful march from India Gate to Delhi Police Headquarters, led by families of deceased NEET victims and victims of police brutality, over the Government's failure to honour its July 25 commitments," it said in the statement.



"The National Working Committee of the Cockroach Janta Party (CJP) convened today to review the Government of India and BJP/NDA ruled states' compliance with the solemn commitments made to the young people of this country on 25 July 2026, on the basis of

which the nationwide youth protests were withdrawn in good faith. Members of the Committee expressed serious doubts over whether the Government intends to honour its word at all."

The party alleged that, instead of implementing the commit-

ments made a month ago, the government had delayed action and avoided providing clear assurances.

"For a month now, instead of implementing what was solemnly promised, the Government has played delay games, hidden behind technicalities, and avoided giving clear commitments even before the Supreme Court of India," the CJP said. Referring to the Supreme Court proceedings on August 18, the party said the court had repeatedly asked the Union Government to provide a list of FIRs registered across the country so that it could consider quashing them collectively. "Yet, the Government refused to give a clear commitment to do so. The written assurance from the Government to the CJP is also due," it added.

Indian scientists develop 'smart' cancer drug that targets tumour cells



New Delhi (TSIT) : Indian scientists have developed a new smart cancer drug candidate designed to become active primarily inside cancer cells, offering a potentially more targeted approach to cancer treatment and reducing the risk of damage to healthy cells.

The research has been led by Dr Asis Bala of the Institute of Advanced Study in Science and Technology (IASST), an autonomous institute under the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India, in collaboration with Dr K.P. Bhabak of the Indian Institute of

Technology Guwahati.

The drug candidate, named RK-251, is designed to remain relatively inactive in normal tissues and become activated inside cancer cells, according to reports. Conventional cancer treatments can affect healthy cells along with tumour cells, often resulting in significant side effects. The new approach seeks to overcome this limitation by using a biological difference between cancerous and healthy cells as a trigger for drug activation, the report noted.

Cancer cells typically generate higher levels of reactive oxygen species (ROS), molecules that can cause cellular damage but can also be exploited for targeted drug delivery. When RK-251 enters a cancer cell, the elevated ROS levels are designed to trigger activation of the compound, releasing NBDHEX, a potent anticancer agent.

Handed over 'personal message' from PM Modi, says EAM Jaishankar after meeting Putin in Moscow

Moscow, Aug 24 : External Affairs Minister (EAM) S Jaishankar called on Russian President Vladimir Putin in Moscow on Monday and handed over a "personal message" from Prime Minister Narendra Modi. "Pleased to call on President Vladimir Putin of Russia in Moscow today. Handed over a personal message from Prime Minister Narendra Modi," EAM Jaishankar posted on X after the meeting.

"Briefed him on the deliberation held under the 27th IRIGC-TEC, reviewing our cooperation across a wide range of domains. Value his guidance in that regard. Also discussed regional and global issues of importance," he added.

According to a statement released by the Kremlin, during the meeting, Putin stated that EAM Jaishankar's visit underscores the level of relations that has long been established between Russia and India, over decades.

"We continue to work together in virtually all areas. This



includes governmental ties, inter-parliamentary ties, and economic cooperation. I'm pleased to note that our trade turnover has increased this year. While it declined slightly last year, it's growing this year, and this is partly, and perhaps primarily, thanks to Prime Minister [Narendra Modi], who is devoting his personal attention to developing Russian-Indian relations," the Russian President said during

the meeting.

"And at the beginning of our conversation, I would like to ask you to convey my best wishes to Mr. Modi. I hope to see him soon, as we planned, within the framework of the Shanghai Cooperation Organization, very soon. Our schedule is such that we will probably be able to meet again this year," he added.

Ahead of meeting Putin, EAM Jaishankar co-chaired the 27th

Naidu Unveils India's First Non-GMO Popcorn Hybrid Seed



Amaravati (TSIT): Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu on Monday said agriculture must be transformed from a means of livelihood into a powerful economic sector by turning farmers into entrepreneurs and promoting value addition.

Speaking at an event organised by Gourmet Popcornika at Musunuru near Nuzvid, Naidu, along with Vice President C.P. Radhakrishnan, launched what was described as India's first non-GMO popcorn hybrid seed.

Naidu said Gourmet had helped reduce India's dependence on imported popcorn

and saved more than \$125 million in foreign exchange over 11 years. The company, established in 2014, works with 17,500 farmers across eight states, cultivating popcorn on about 40,000 acres and supplying 3,400 cinema theatres.

He stressed the need to process, brand and export agricultural and aqua products to increase farmers' incomes. Only about 10% of the State's aqua exports are currently processed, he said, adding that increasing this to 60-70% could generate employment and boost foreign exchange earnings.

"I know that you and your Russian counterpart, Mr. Manturov, who heads the Russian part of the intergovernmental commission, have already worked hard and have undoubtedly discussed the most important issues. There are many of them. One of these issues is not only energy – it is, of course, fertilizer supplies. We are doing everything to address this issue for Indian farmers, for agriculture; we are increasing these supplies and are ready to do so further. And all other issues related to nuclear energy, cooperation in high-tech sectors, and other areas – they are all on the agenda, and progress is progressing quite steadily," Russian President Putin said in his remarks during the meeting.

Indian EVMs not connected to internet, Bluetooth or Wi-Fi: CEC Gyanesh Kumar

Lucknow (TSIT) Chief Election Commissioner Gyanesh Kumar on Monday said Indian electronic voting machines (EVMs) are manufactured by public sector companies and do not have internet, Bluetooth, or Wi-Fi connectivity.

During his two-day visit to Lucknow, Kumar interacted with students at the historic Colvin Taluqdars' College and discussed India's democratic system, the electoral process, the reliability of EVMs, and the importance of young voters, according to an official statement.

In response to questions about EVMs, the CEC emphasised that the machines used in India are produced by public sector companies and are not connected to the internet or any wireless technologies. He advised students to verify the sources and authenticity of information before accepting or sharing it, particularly in today's social media landscape. "Before accepting any information, it is essential to check its source and verify its authenticity," Kumar stated.

Reflecting on his own student days in 1979, he shared fond memories of his teachers and school, highlighting their significant role in shaping his journey. Recalling the period when he was preparing to go to the United States, Kumar said his mother's wish and his attachment to the motherland motivated him to stay in India and pursue public service.

He subsequently cleared the civil services examination and began his administrative career in the Kerala cadre of the Indian Administrative Service. He said his journey in public service eventually led him to the role of Chief Election Commissioner in the world's largest democracy.

Highlighting the scale of India's electoral exercise, Kumar said the



country has around 100 crore voters and conducting elections for such a vast electorate was itself a massive task. Kumar stated that a large number of officials and employees work to ensure the electoral process runs smoothly.

He encouraged young people to actively engage in the democratic process and referred to Article 326 of the Constitution while urging students who have reached the age of 18 to register as voters. The commission provides voter registration facilities through its digital platforms, he said. Kumar also implored young people to not only become voters themselves but also to encourage their family members and peers to participate in elections. "Young people are the most important force behind the democratic future of the country. If they participate in the electoral process with awareness, democracy will become stronger," he said.

No Need to Panic Over 22-A Lands Minister Ponguleti srinivas Reddy

Hyderabad, August 24: Revenue Minister Ponguleti Srinivasa Reddy on Monday urged people not to believe what he described as false propaganda over the Section 22-A prohibited properties list, asserting that the government was taking fast-track measures to resolve genuine grievances.

Addressing a press conference at the State Secretariat, the Minister rejected allegations that lakhs of acres had been newly brought under the prohibited list. He said the government was ready to place complete records before the public, detailing how much land was under Section 22-A, the category of each parcel and the reasons for its inclusion.

Ponguleti said nearly 98 per cent of genuine registrations among eligible booked slots had already been cleared. Genuine 22-A grievances were being examined on a fast-



track basis and could be resolved within 24 to 36 hours after verification.

He said the government's objective was to protect both legitimate private property rights and valuable government land. Where genuine private properties had been wrongly included in the prohibited list, the errors would be corrected, he assured.

Citing Jubilee Hills Survey No. 403, the Minister said only two plots were actually affected, but the entire survey number had at one stage

been reflected in the prohibited list while records were uploaded. The mistake was subsequently rectified.

Ponguleti also cited cases in Sangareddy, Medchal-Malkajgiri and Rangareddy districts to explain why government, assigned, Bhoodan and other disputed lands had to remain protected from unauthorised transactions.

He warned of stringent action against those attempting to register government lands using fake Government Orders,

bogus memos, forged certificates or fabricated signatures of officials. Criminal cases would be registered wherever such fraud was detected, he said.

The Minister said the government would soon take a policy decision to address long-pending Urban Land Ceiling (ULC) issues. Bhoodan-related disputes would be examined on a case-by-case basis. He also expressed readiness for an SIT probe into alleged irregularities concerning CS-7 and CS-14 lands.

Centralized Kitchen Launched to Serve Breakfast to 40,052 Students



Manthani, August 24 (TSIT): Minister for IT, Industries and Commerce Duddilla Sridhar Babu inaugurated a state-of-the-art centralized community kitchen at Manthani to provide nutritious breakfast to 40,052 government school students.

The kitchen, established by Hare Krishna Movement Charitable Foundation India (HKMCF India) with CSR support from Singareni Collieries Company Limited (SCCL), will serve students across 694 government schools and 17 junior colleges in Peddapalli and Bhupalpally districts.

The facility is equipped with automated systems for

preparing idlis, dosas, puris, sambar and other meals, besides a milk processing unit. It can prepare thousands of meals daily while maintaining hygiene and quality standards. The kitchen also has RO, biogas, boiler and waste-treatment facilities.

The Minister and dignitaries also flagged off vehicles for breakfast distribution and served meals to schoolchildren.

Two-Year-Old Girl Suffering from Severe Epilepsy gets a new lease of Life with the advanced Brain Surgery at Yashoda Hospitals-Secunderabad

Hyderabad, August 24, 2026: Two year old Baby Vagdevi from Bhongir, the daughter of Saidulu and Maheshwari who had been suffering from severe seizures almost every day since the age of six months, has become seizure-free following advanced epilepsy surgery at Yashoda Hospitals, Secunderabad. The child had been experiencing seizures despite being treated with multiple anti-seizure medications for nearly a year. Along with recurrent seizures, she had also developed delays in speech, physical and cognitive development.



As part of the comprehensive pre-surgical evaluation, brain MRI and PET-CT scans revealed a small lesion (an area of abnormal tissue) in the left temporal region, close to the amygdala and hippocampus, which was identified as the likely cause of the seizures. A specialised paediatric neuro team comprising a paediatric neurologist, neurosurgeon and neuroanaesthesiologist jointly managed the case.

Speaking on the occasion, Dr. N. Varsha Monica Reddy, Senior Paediatric Neurologist, Yashoda Hospitals, Secunderabad, said, "The child had been suffering from severe seizures almost every day since she was six months old. Despite being treated with multiple anti-seizure medications, her seizures could not be brought under control. After the child was brought to Yashoda Hospitals on July 26, com-

prehensive pre-surgical investigations were carried out to accurately identify the area of the brain responsible for the seizures, which was crucial in planning the treatment. Timely and appropriate treatment is very important for children with epilepsy that is not controlled with medications. The brain has a high degree of neuroplasticity during childhood, and once seizures are controlled, there is a greater possibility of improvement in speech, learning abilities, and overall physical and cognitive development. Therefore, if seizures are not controlled with medications, parents must not delay in consulting epilepsy specialists," said Dr. N. Varsha Monica Reddy.

Dr. R. Ayyadurai, Senior Neurosurgeon, Yashoda Hospitals, Secunderabad, said, "As part of the surgery, an anterior temporal lobectomy was performed along with successful removal of the lesion, an area of abnormal tissue

responsible for the seizures. During the surgery, brain activity was continuously monitored using intra-operative electrocorticography (ECoG) and intra-operative neuromonitoring (IONM). This enabled us to remove the abnormal tissue responsible for the seizures while protecting the critical areas involved in normal brain function. The post-operative EEG showed that the abnormal electrical brain activity observed earlier was no longer present, which was a positive outcome of the treatment. The child recovered well after surgery and, with no further seizures, was discharged from the hospital within a week. For children with drug-resistant epilepsy, advanced imaging, comprehensive pre-surgical evaluation, multidisciplinary coordination, modern surgical techniques and neuromonitoring can provide an opportunity to achieve better treatment outcomes," said Dr. R. Ayyadurai.

BJP Slams Government Over Parakala Hospital

Parakala, August 24 (TSIT): BJP leaders at a Parakala Assembly-level workshop on electoral roll revision alleged that the newly inaugurated government hospital in Parakala was not functioning properly and demanded that the government fulfil its promises. tate Executive Committee member Dr. Pagadala Kaliprasad Rao alleged that the hospital was inaugurated in haste and urged the government to complete pending development works in the con-



stituency. The BJP leaders also demanded immediate release of pending fee reimbursement dues. Expressing solidarity with Telangana BJP president N. Ramchander Rao's 48-hour hunger strike, they said delays in reimbursement were affecting students and urged the

Young Innovators from Andhra Pradesh Enter Samsung Solve for Tomorrow Top 40

Andhra Pradesh – August 24, 2026: From exploring ways to make specialised healthcare easier to access to enabling visually impaired swimmers to train with greater independence, four young innovators from Andhra Pradesh have made it to the national Top 40 of Samsung Solve for Tomorrow.

Kotipalli Siva Sankar, Shaik Nehaal Khasim, Pasupuleti Ruthvik and Kolla Venkata Siva Surya are among a new generation of young Indians looking at challenges around them and asking a simple question: can technology help solve them?

Samsung Solve for Tomorrow is Samsung's flagship CSR innovation programme for young people aged 14 to 22. Through design thinking, mentorship and hands-on learning, the programme enables young innovators



from across India to identify real-world challenges and develop potential solutions, helping them take ideas from the early stages towards prototypes.

Three Solutions, Four Young Innovators

For Kotipalli Siva Sankar and Shaik Nehaal Khasim from Guntur, the challenge is access to information around specialised healthcare. Their solution explores how technology could help international patients

more easily discover specialised healthcare options in India.

The proposed platform looks at differences in the cost of procedures such as knee replacement, cancer surgery and spine surgery in India and overseas, while exploring how patients could be connected with JCI-accredited hospitals with relevant expertise and capacity. Their approach focuses on making information about potential healthcare pro-

viders easier for patients to access when exploring treatment options across countries.

Pasupuleti Ruthvik, 21, from Chittoor, is developing a technology-led solution to help visually impaired swimmers recognise when they are approaching the end of a swimming pool. While coaches may currently use a tapping stick to provide swimmers with a physical cue, his solution explores how technology could provide this information and potentially help swimmers train with greater safety and independence. In Visakhapatnam, 16-year-old Kolla Venkata Siva Surya is exploring a solution to address veering — the unintended sideways drift that can make it difficult for visually impaired swimmers to maintain a straight path while swimming. His approach looks at how technology could

help swimmers better understand their movement and maintain direction, with the aim of supporting a more inclusive sporting experience.

Three solutions. Four young innovators. And challenges spanning healthcare access and inclusive sports.

Their achievement comes as India's innovation map itself is expanding. More than half of the national Top 40 teams in this year's Samsung Solve for Tomorrow are from Tier 2 and Tier 3 cities, highlighting how young innovators from different corners of the country are bringing fresh perspectives to real-world challenges.

For Andhra Pradesh, the presence of young innovators from Guntur, Chittoor and Visakhapatnam among the national Top 40 reflects this growing breadth of

The hidden cost of compassion: women trapped in caregiver fatigue

In the middle of June heat, Nallammal Thamizhselvan, 40, was getting ready for farm work. Her days usually start much before everyone else in her family wakes up. She has to be on the farm by 6 am and all the household chores have to be done before that. Every day, before she sets off, she leaves one instruction with her two daughters: “Appavukku edhavadhuna udanea phone panunga (call me immediately if anything happens to your dad).” Her husband, Thamizhselvan, has been living for decades with schizophrenia and is also prone to epileptic seizures.

This constant fear of a crisis means that Nallammal has to be available at all times to deal with medical emergencies. She routinely turns down any farm work that needs her to travel more than 3 km. In the 17 years of their marriage, she has been his only caregiver and she is exhausted by the responsibility. “I can’t leave him. But, I need to sleep at least one night peacefully in my life without anxieties,” she says. She is the primary earner in her family but there are few jobs for her in her village, Kothakottai, situated in Alangudi Taluk of Tamil Nadu’s Pudukottai district. It is an arid region where agriculture depends largely on rainfall. This means that farm work is erratic – one day, Nallammal would be cleaning the field, the next she would be plucking chillies or pounding tamarind, sometimes she reaps greens.

Eight hours of hard work earns her just Rs 170. Women farm workers earn no more than Rs 200 in this region, half what the men can demand. If Thamizhselvan needs hospitalisation or medicines, she has to borrow from her neighbours. This has left her family in a state of constant precarity. The family also bears the stigma of mental illness and the isolation this brings, as we detail later. The caregiver burden for mental health is all consuming – it is physical, psychological, emotional, social, and financial, show our interviews with women. Chronic stress, declining personal well-being, exhaustion, and low energy experienced by spouses are often referred to as spousal caregiver fatigue. And this fatigue can last years given the failure of early detection of mental illness. Till three years ago, Nallammal had no help from any quarter, not even from her own or her husband’s family. Nallammal’s entire life is planned around Thamizhselvan’s needs – adapting, calculating, overextended, overexploited, and of course, uncompensated because carework is assumed of a wife. Seventeen years of marriage have deepened Nallammal’s time poverty. It was her encounter with WORD (Women’s Organisation and Rural Development), an NGO that works in partnership with Carers Worldwide India to support unpaid carers, that lifted her and her family out of precarity. WORD has been working in around 80 villages of Pudukottai district spread over Thiruvarangulam and Pudukottai to provide support to carers of persons with mental health issues. It offers monetary support to carers and also guides them on how they can access mental health care at government hospitals. When Nallammal became a part of the network, she got a loan of Rs 5000 to buy goats for her husband to rear. The network of support also gave her the courage to take on better-paying work as a catering assistant at weddings outside the village.

Delimitation goes beyond just votes.

It is also about India’s economic future

The debate around delimitation has been vociferous given the government’s plan to address the issue head on by expanding the number of seats in parliament proportionately while the opposition has countered it with their own concerns of demography, electoral map redistribution and other implications. Yet the underlying essence of the story — why delimitation matters as a concept — seems to be missing. Besides the constitutional obligation for delimitation, what is its economic rationale? The current governance structure in India is in need of reform. There is an urgent need for representation aligned with India’s economic geography and a pre-condition for the responsive, accountable governance that sustained economic success requires. When political representation systematically diverges from where value is created, the result is a persistent misallocation of public capital.

India’s urban areas, particularly its metros, are key engines of agglomeration and productivity growth yet they remain highly under-represented in the electoral map. For instance, India’s urban population is expected to grow from 410 million in 2014 to 814 million by 2050. India is projected to add 416 million urban dwellers by 2050 — more than any other country in the world. Urban India makes up roughly 37 per cent of the country’s population, yet the largest, most heavily urban constituencies such as Malkajgiri, Bangalore North, the Delhi-NCR seats, at 30-38 lakh elector, carry the same



single vote in Parliament as constituencies a fraction of their size such as Lakshadweep with just about 50,000 electors. Urban voters are therefore structurally underweighted.

This leads to a situation where urban economic issues are not represented adequately and are given less electoral weight by politicians. Furthermore, since the urban population is more educated and demands greater accountability on economic issues such as housing, transit, and municipal finance that directly affect productivity, the case for increasing their political voice is an important shift in the economic story of India.

Another important economic factor that warrants change is the importance of decentralized governance. Ironically, even though delimitation might shift some political weight towards the more populated parts of the country, it might also ensure that decentralized governance takes place more effectively. Greater public representatives per capita can mean that local issues get more attention.

Why representation matters for growth

Many developed countries such as the United States and Japan all pair large populations with empowered subnational units that deliver local public goods and compete to attract capital, and ensure effective business governance due to greater attention to issues raised by society. This could be an important factor in boosting ease of businesses especially in constituencies which have excessively large populations.

The empirical literature is clear that quality of governance, which correlates highly with per capita of public representatives at the state and central level, and political stability are significant determinants of sovereign risk premia (Bekaert et al.; the sovereign-spreads literature). As such, providing incentives for long term investment, channeling growth for more inclusive goals — which can be achieved effectively by credible and effective governance from the district level to the central administration — ensure that risks for investing in the country for foreign

investors is being reduced. This also will ensure greater accountability among politicians and eventually lead to more refined political class. Therefore, it can play an important role in reducing long term risk premia for investors investing in the country.

Lastly, the aggregate impact at the level of the central government could be better and might lead to data systems that allow improved fiscal planning and alignment with the states. For instance, does it make sense for us to measure inflation of today using a basket of goods that were used in the 1970s? Similarly, how does it make sense to use the political representation from the 1970 census as a benchmark for electoral representation — the core of data driven public policy making — in 2026? Greater representation per capita along with better governance would ensure that more accurate population and boundary data feed into resource allocation, welfare targeting, and planning. Better data can further reduce leakage and mis-

matches in how funds reach people. Therefore, all of this could lead to better state and central fiscal planning and coordination due to more effective representation of the people’s wishes.

Several of the structural reforms that economists have been urging governments to do could be addressed through the redesign of the governance pillars of the country. This provides an important opportunity for transparency and reforms for the delimitation exercise to engage with so as to ensure structural governance reforms are implemented by design and not necessarily by stealth and through legislative arduousness. These provide an important opportunity to ensure economic growth is accelerated through ease of governance at scale across the country.

An exercise built on consensus

Yet, given the importance of such a reform, it must be a consensus driven initiative which most of the political class is in agreement with. There are various challenges including issues of north-south divide, population-based representation, reservations from some affected states among others. These issues should be sorted through diplomatic efforts and a collective spirit for the larger cause of the nation. Postponing the exercise due to its complexity and the need to make hard decisions is not doing justice to the aspirations of the youngest population in the world. The debates should be about how effective and inclusive the design of delimitation should be rather than questioning the importance of the exercise itself.

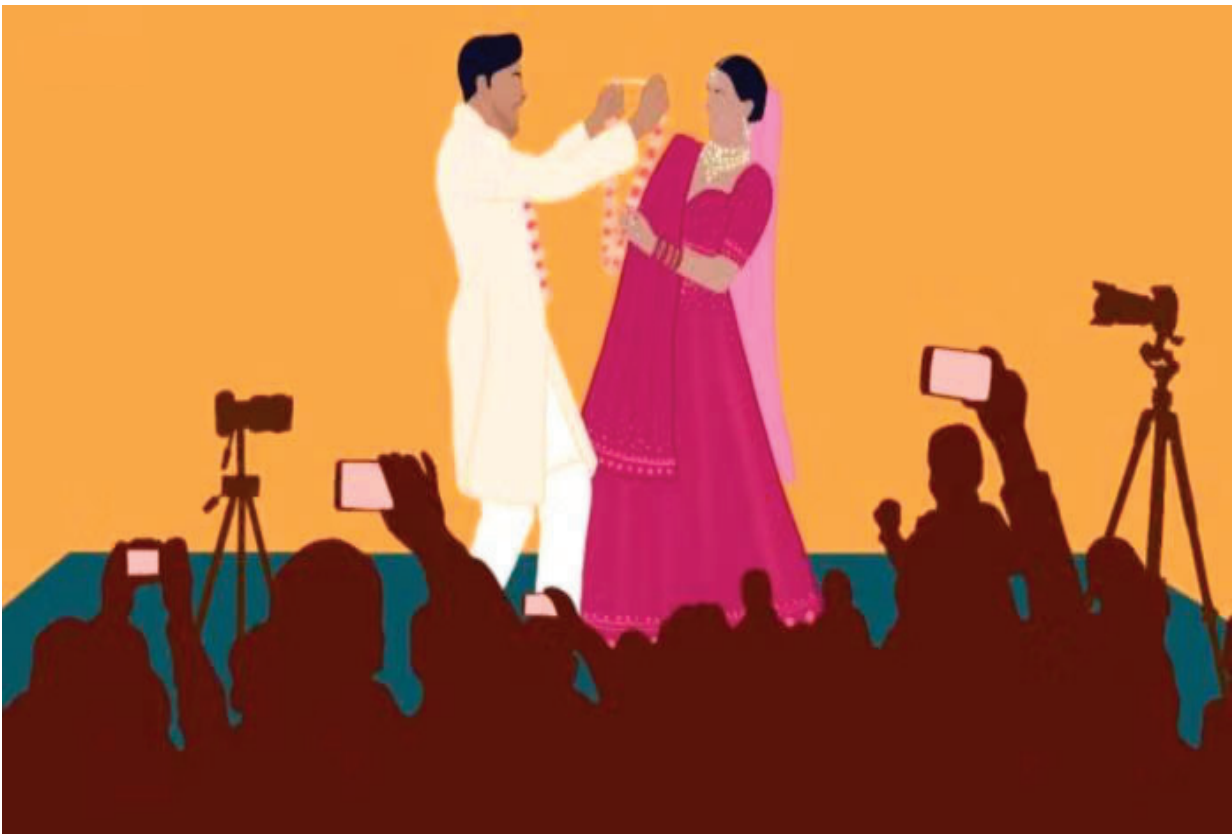

I have been waiting for my moment on the sidelines of the mandap since I was 16. It was my cousin’s wedding, and I was wearing the first Anarkali suit of my life. As the bride and groom went round and round the fire, I sat very still, wearing a soft, conspicuous smile for anyone who cared to notice. My older cousins did. They made sure I never heard the end of it.

Now, as I hit past the “right age”, they are extremely concerned about my marriage prospects. Well, whose fault is it? If it is mine, then I don’t want to hear about it. That’s why I have stopped attending weddings of family members. It feels like a tender lamb entering the cave of hawks—nobody lets you flirt with men, and everybody wants to know why you are not married.

Weddings are where the unmarried are put on display, whether they like it or not. For



better or worse, Indian shaadis don’t have a designated singles table, but the metaphorical one is always there. Mothers crack open their finest saris for their daughters and send them into these great matrimonial fairs. Aunties keep an eye out for eligible boys, collect intelligence on salaries, family backgrounds and these days they also find out Instagram handles.

And then there are the women who have already crossed the invisible deadline: the bride’s sister who suddenly discovers an urgent reason to be in the

kitchen whenever an aunty comes looking, because she knows the conversation will inevitably end with, “Beta, aapka number kab aa raha hai?” When can we see you on the chopping block?

A bride’s sister at one grand Indore wedding spent the entire event on her toes. There were 5,000 errands to run and too many relatives to pamper. Chachaji needed scissors to trim his nose hair, Buaji needed rasgullas packed for the neighbours back home, and every passing guest seemed to develop an

urgent need for chai immediately after finishing their last cup. All manageable. What she could not manage were the interrogations about when she planned to “settle down”.

“I have a boyfriend. We’ll get married two Decembers from now,” she told anyone who asked. Given that the grooms-men were available for a chat, shots and twerk on the dance floor, she knew she wasn’t exactly lying. She was manifesting.

The handsome, eligible bachelors came through for the weekend, slipping her flowers and

booze. Did any of them ask for her hand in marriage? No. But they posed for cosy selfies with her, and those pictures did the trick. An ex watching her Instagram stories straightened up and slid into her DMs, asking to meet. It has been two Decembers since, and there is still no wedding on the cards, but at least they are together.

Being pretty at a wedding rarely goes to waste. Sometimes, it even reels a man back in. Good for the weekend.

It’s not easy to show up solo to weddings. Watching the happy couple look deep into each other’s eyes and celebrate in front of everyone they love can make even the cynics tear up—with equal parts joy and sadness. It makes you want something: love, romance, a quick hookup, anything. The guests are too drunk on whiskey to pretend otherwise.

I, for one, have ugly-cried watching my best friends lock it down with the loves of their lives. There’s a chance I want what they have, or at least that’s how it feels in the moment. Since none of the relatives conducting surveillance around the venue is mine, I am blissfully anonymous. I am free to feel, laugh and party like an animal.

Sakshi Shivdasani, the host of the Moment of Silence podcast, is also a veteran in attending weddings of friends. Her co-host Naina Bhasin jokes that it is only kind of vacation she’s been having. These weddings must be a certain kind of colourful because Shivdesani now wants to ban grooms-men and bridesmaids from having sex.

Apparently, they are doing too much of it. The singles performing thumkas on the dance floor want to be looked at, pursued, hit on. So, it happens.

A friend from Mangalore has collected an impressive roster of grooms-men simply by attending weddings. They will probably be watching her Instagram stories for years to come. The sweet boy she was paired with at a Catholic wedding was not her type, but made for excellent company nonetheless. He may have misread the situation, because he left promising to visit her in London. Another eager boy at another wedding offered to take her on a long drive in Dubai.

Every time she needed a nap-kin or a refill, they were ready to help on their knees. She could easily make bad boys good for a weekend. We should all learn her ways because she can also dodge her relatives by appearing too wobbly with spiked juice in her system.

Now that another friend has sent out invitations for her December wedding, I am back in the ethnic-wear section of Myntra. I must bring my A-game. There will be a beach nearby, a free supply of beer and, if the wedding gods are kind, a healthy population of financially stable men.

Don’t get me wrong: I am perfectly happy to play the tail to my soon-to-be-bride friend, patting the sweat off her face, fixing her outfit and being there for her on the biggest day of her life. But I also know that standing next to a bride comes with its own kind of visibility. And I intend to make the most of it.

2nd Test: Jurel's ton, Pant's fifty, bowlers help India seize control against SL

Colombo, Aug 24 : Dhruv Jurel hit an unbeaten 115 while Rishabh Pant smashed a rollicking 63 before Prasidh Krishna and Manav Suthar struck late in fading light as India asserted total dominance over Sri Lanka on Day Two of the second Test at the Sinhalese Sports Club (SSC) Ground in Colombo on Monday.

Having declared their first innings at 503/9 after a rain delay of two hours and ten minutes in the final session, Sri Lanka were reduced to a precarious 8/2 in just three overs. India crossing the 500-run mark was possible thanks to wicketkeeper-batter Dhruv Jurel hitting an unbeaten and rock-solid 115 off 177 balls – his second Test century and first in the island nation, while Rishabh Pant hit a rollicking 63. In fading light, Suthar finished with figures of 1-6 from his lone over, while Krishna took 1-1 as Sri Lanka now trail India by 495 runs with eight wickets remaining in their first innings. India entered Day Two looking to build upon their firm foundation, but Sri Lanka made an early breakthrough with the second new ball.

Fast bowler Asitha Fernando surprised debutant Saransh Jain with a sharp bouncer from round the wicket, extracting a leading edge that was safely taken by gully. The early setback brought Pant to the crease, after he retired hurt on three due to a blow to his left wrist. Pant was immediately targeted with a barrage of short-pitched bowling by the Sri Lankan seamers. But Pant soon began batting in his usual destructive style. A short ball down leg from Lahiru Kumara was pulled by Pant over the stadium roof, even damaging a solar panel as a replacement ball was sought.

Tested thoroughly by Kumara and Fernando, Pant took two painful hits to his right shoulder that required medical treatment. However, he countered using paddle sweeps, decisive footwork, and aggressive strokes to unsettle the opposition.

Alongside a solid Jurel, who relied on crisp drives, flicks, and authoritative pulls against spinners Prabath Jayasuriya and Keshara Nuwantha, India wrested complete control. Both batters reached their half-centuries smoothly – Pant thump-



ing a pull to square leg for his 21st Test fifty, while Jurel pulled through mid-wicket to bring up his third half-century, as the duo took India to safety at lunch. But Sri Lanka struck on the very first delivery after lunch when Pant hit Nuwantha straight to long-off and departed for an entertaining 63 off 89 balls. Jurel quickly re-established authority alongside Manav Suthar, who proved to be an able partner by handling

the host side's short-ball tactics with composure and stepping down the pitch to loft Nuwantha over the mid-off boundary.

The pair added 39 runs to take India past the 450-mark before Jayasuriya broke through by drawing Suthar (18) into pushing outside off-stump and extracting a thin edge which was safely pouched by wicketkeeper Niroshan Dickwella.

With Mohammed Siraj con-

tent to defend at the other end, Jurel smartly farmed the strike, deploying a fine reverse sweep off Sonal Dinusha to move into the 80s. As dark clouds gathered ominously overhead, Jurel flicked a full toss from Fernando through mid-wicket to reach 95. High winds, darkening skies, and heavy rain subsequently forced an early tea break, as a lengthy interruption of two hours and ten minutes occurred.

play resumed under cleared skies and a little bit of sunshine, Jurel took his time against Sri Lanka's tight close-in fielders. After playing out a maiden over from Jayasuriya, Jurel reached his second Test century, and his first in Sri Lankan conditions, by driving Fernando over the bowler's head and diving full length to complete a risky single. Jurel celebrated by raising his sleeve to display a tattoo reading "Jai Jawan, Jai Kisan".

his century secured, Jurel shifted gears immediately by launching Fernando over long-on for six. Jayasuriya ended Siraj's 29-ball stay by trapping him plumb LBW with a slider. Prasidh Krishna then joined Jurel, who pulled Fernando over deep backward square leg for another six.

Krishna added the final touches by scything a low full-toss through cover for a boundary to push India past the 500-mark. After that, skipper Shubman Gill immediately declared the innings and called the batters back to have a crack at the Sri Lankan batting order in the toughest time to bat.

India handed the new ball to Siraj, who conceded just one

run in a tight opening over. Krishna struck with his second ball in the next over, dropping one back of a length outside off that straightened sharply off the deck. Lahiru Udara was squared up and edged the ball to gully, where Yashasvi Jaiswal took a sharp diving catch to send him packing for one. With light deteriorating rapidly, India introduced Suthar, who on the final ball of the third over, fired in a flatter delivery that skidded through to trap nightwatcher Jayasuriya lbw.

decision was upheld on review via umpire's call, prompting a frustrated Jayasuriya to fling his gloves away upon reaching the dressing room as umpires officially halted play for the day, as India put themselves in a commanding position on day two.

Chess: India's GM Pranesh M wins Kanizsa Open title in Hungary



Mumbai, Aug 24 : India's 19-year-old Grandmaster Pranesh M emerged as the champion in the prestigious Kanizsa Open 2026 in Nagykanizsa, Hungary, securing the Group A title with a superb performance. In the ninth and final round of the tournament on Sunday, Pranesh defeated Vadim Petrovskiy of Germany with white pieces. Pranesh has a rating of 2673 and is ranked 44th in the latest FIDE Rankings of August 2026.

Pranesh, who hails from Karaikudi in Tamil Nadu, finished with seven points from nine rounds, sharing the top spot with three other players. He claimed the title on a better tie-break with Or Bronstein of Israel, Andrei Volokitin of Ukraine, and India's Karthik Venkataraman, finishing second to fourth in that order.

Karthik Venkataraman could have won the title outright but was held to a draw in the final round by Volokitin as they both fin-

ished with seven points. Bronstein jumped into a share of the top spot by beating compatriot IM Benny Aizenberg in the ninth round.

The Indian Embassy in Hungary hailed Pranesh for winning the title.

PSG coach says players must defend rapid attacks better after two games without a win

PARIS: Paris Saint-Germain coach Luis Enrique urged his players to be more "attentive" to rapid attacks after failing to win two games in a row. PSG salvaged a 2-2 draw at Rennes on Sunday thanks to two late goals from substitute Ferran Torres on his club debut. That draw followed a 1-0 defeat to Lens in the Trophée des Champions, the French Super Cup.

"(Transitional play) was one of our strengths over the past three seasons, being attentive to that," PSG coach Luis Enrique said after the Rennes game. "There are certain positions where you need to be sure your position is covered by another player. If you're a

little bit distracted, you can have problems." Both Rennes goals were scored on quick breaks and PSG's transitional play was also exposed when Lens scored the week before. With so many players involved in the World Cup, PSG's players barely had any pre-season training before beating Aston Villa 2-1 in the UEFA Super Cup on Aug. 12. "I think it depends on the physical shape of the players," Luis Enrique said, reflecting further on the Rennes goals. Some PSG players looked a bit jaded against Rennes, with Ballon d'Or winner Ousmane Dembélé who starred for France at the World Cup replaced at halftime.

Uncapped wicketkeeper-batter Noor Rahman has been included as the second wicket-keeper alongside Rahmanullah Gurbaz following his performances in domestic cricket, the Shpageeza Cricket League and at A-team level.

Era of sustained dominance is over: men's singles enters genuinely open era



NEW DELHI: Men's singles has entered an unusually open phase, with a deepening pool of contenders making sustained dominance increasingly difficult to imagine, according to several leading players, including new World Badminton champion Alex Lanier of France and world No. 7 Victor Lai.

The evidence is not just in the names at the top of the

rankings but in the uncertainty surrounding almost every major tournament. The gap between the established elite and the chasing pack has narrowed considerably, while the physical demands of the modern men's game have made consistency across an entire season increasingly difficult. "It's a tough question, but I definitely feel that this is a different period," said Lanier when

asked whether it is possible to achieve the kind of domination that the old guards such as Lee Chong Wei, Lin Dan or Viktor Axelsen once achieved. "There are more tournaments nowadays, and there are also more good players. We can lose from the first round, and the intensity in the opening round is already very high." At the World Championships here, that depth has been particularly evident, with India's Ayush Shetty, ranked world No. 22, stunning defending champion and world No. 1 Shi in the opening round or Denmark's World No 26 Rasmus Gemke beating All England champion Lin Chun-Yi and Indonesia's World No 3 Jonatan Christie. Lanier, who became the first Frenchman to win the men's singles title at the World Championships.

Champions League fairytale team Bodø/Glimt close to return as 7 playoffs decide full 36-team lineup

Glimt has scored three goals in each of its three games so far, first eliminating Union Saint-Gilloise 6-5 on aggregate score. Almost its entire squad was retained with just one big-money exit, selling Denmark forward Kasper Høgh to Celtic for a reported 11 million pounds (\$15 million). Høgh and Celtic also are in action Tuesday, taking a 3-0 first-leg lead to Austria against LASK. Israel's champion Hapoel Beer-Sheva has a 2-1 lead going to Azerbaijan to face Sabah, a club which was created just nine years ago.
