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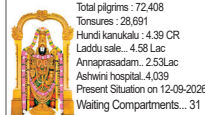

7 killed in three road accidents in AP

Visakhapatnam (TSIT): At least seven persons were killed in three separate road accidents in north coastal Andhra Pradesh, police said on Sunday. Three people were killed when a truck collided with an auto-rickshaw in Andhra Pradesh's Vizianagaram district in the early hours of Sunday. The accident occurred near Shikaruganti village in Dattirajeru mandal. All three occupants in the auto-rickshaw died on the spot. The deceased have been identified as auto-rickshaw driver G. Tirupati, T. Adinarayana and G. Ramu. On receipt of information, police rushed to the spot and shifted the bodies to a nearby government hospital for post-mortem examination.

Two die of lightning

Amaravati (TSIT): Two people died of lightning in Andhra Pradesh's Palnadu district as heavy rains lashed parts of the state since Saturday night under the impact of a low-pressure area, officials said. Heavy rains accompanied by thunderstorms lashed Narsaraopet in Palnadu district. One person each in elturivaripalem and Lakshmipuram villages died after hearing the frightening noise of the thunderstorm. The deceased were identified as Nagamma (63) and Mekala Venkayamma (60). Both suspected to have died of cardiac arrest. Heavy rains were lashing Visakhapatnam and Gajuwaka areas. Parts of East Godavari district also received heavy rains. Bus stand at Nidadavole was inundated, causing inconvenience to commuters. According to the Andhra Pradesh State Disaster Management Authority, a low-pressure area is centred over the Vidarbha and Madhya Pradesh regions. The APSDMA said in a bulletin on Sunday morning that it is likely to move in a west-northwest direction over the next 24 hours and is expected to cause moderate to heavy rains in isolated parts of the state.

CM Revanth backs Arya Vysya community with due recognition

■ **Hyderabad (TSIT):** Chief Minister A.Revanth Reddy said the People's Government was according due recognition and respect to the Arya Vysya community, including adequate representation in nominated posts.

Addressing a gathering after laying the foundation stone for the Arya Vysya Atma Gourava Bhavanam at Uppal Bhagayat in Hyderabad, the Chief Minister said members of the community had already been appointed to corporation chairman posts. He pointed out that the chairperson post of his own Kodangal Municipality had also been given to a representative of the Arya Vysya community.

Revanth Reddy described Arya Vysyas as a community known for foresight, prudence, dignity and self-respect. He said unity within the community was important for securing its rightful representation in politics.

Recalling the contribu-



tion of Mahatma Gandhi, the Chief Minister said India as a global leader and that his principle of non-violence inspired freedom struggles across the world. He also remembered the sacrifice of Potti Sriramulu and his role in the formation of Andhra State.

The Chief Minister paid rich tributes to former Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister K. Rosaiah, recalling his long public service and stewardship of the State's finances. He said Rosaiah had also personally advised and encouraged him during

the early stages of his political career.

Revanth Reddy said Rosaiah's statue was installed in the heart of Hyderabad to honour his legacy despite criticism from some political quarters. Stating that the Arya Vysya community had not always received the recognition it deserved, the Chief Minister assured government assistance for the construction of the Atma Gourava Bhavanam. He expressed confidence that the facility would particularly benefit children and families from economically weaker sections of the community.

Congress questions Modi over Xi meeting

■ **New Delhi (TSIT):** The Congress on Sunday questioned Prime Minister Narendra Modi over his bilateral meeting with Chinese President Xi Jinping, questioning his government's approach to bilateral ties and also the

"mismatch" in walking the talk on matters pertaining to the neighbouring Asian giant. Congress General Secretary Jairam Ramesh, in a detailed press note, accused the Modi government of 'calibrated capitulation' before China.

Ramesh, also the Congress in-charge of Communications, questioned PM Modi's 2020 remarks on India-China border skirmishes and claimed that India had given up traditional patrolling and grazing rights in parts of eastern Ladakh to China. He asked whether the Prime Minister's June 19, 2020 remarks that no one had entered Indian territory had weakened India's nego-

tiating position following the Galwan Valley clashes. He also raised concerns over China's purported territorial advances in Ladakh and Arunachal Pradesh.

"There have been reports of Chinese encroachment in Arunachal Pradesh, including loss of India's access to patrolling points and fresh standoffs. China's posture on Arunachal Pradesh has only hardened: renaming towns, reasserting claims to what it calls 'South Tibet', and pushing ahead with its 60,000-MW Medog mega-dam on the Brahmaputra's Great Bend, a project that gives it a stranglehold over the water security of our entire north-east," the Congress leader claimed.

Ramesh's remarks come a day after PM Modi conveyed to the Chinese President that peace and tranquillity along the frontier remains an 'essential component' of building better ties between the two nations.

PM Modi warns against weaponisation of technology, critical minerals

■ **New Delhi (TSIT)** As rising geopolitical tensions adversely impact ordinary people globally, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said on Sunday that BRICS must rise through cooperation and inclusive growth to meet these challenges and blossom for the sake of humanity.

In an address at the concluding session of the two-day, India-hosted BRICS summit, the prime minister also flagged serious concerns over the "weaponisation of technology and critical minerals" warning that it could hinder shared progress and prosperity.



Modi added that developing nations in the Global South increasingly trust BRICS because their voices are heard, their experiences are valued, and solutions are created in partnership with them rather than imposed on them.

Pezeshkian denies Iran-Saudi war, calls US, Israel terrorists

New Delhi (TSIT) Iranian President Masoud Pezeshkian has denied that Iran is at war with Saudi Arabia following a drone strike on the kingdom's East-West oil pipeline,

while accusing the United States and Israel of being "real terrorists". In an exclusive interview with India Today Group Editor (Foreign Affairs) Geeta Mohan on the sidelines of

the BRICS Summit in New Delhi on Saturday, September 12, Pezeshkian said Tehran wanted countries across West Asia to work together to establish peace and security.

Chinese President Xi Jinping departs from Delhi after attending BRICS Summit



New Delhi, Sep 13: Chinese President Xi Jinping on Sunday departed from New Delhi after attending the 18th BRICS Summit hosted by India. Xi Jinping participated in the two-day BRICS Summit at Bharat Mandapam in New Delhi. He joined leaders of BRICS member countries in a joint tree plantation drive in New Delhi. Xi and leaders of other BRICS member countries visited Bharat Innovates Exposition at Bharat Mandapam.

During his visit to India, Xi also held a bilateral meeting with Prime Minister Narendra Modi, where the two leaders emphasised that "differences should not become disputes" and reaffirmed that both countries should take a strategic and long-term perspective of their ties.

"The two leaders welcomed the steady progress in India-China bilateral relations since their last meeting

in Tianjin in August 2025. They reaffirmed that both countries should take a strategic and long term perspective of their ties. Differences should not become disputes. Prime Minister highlighted that both sides must be guided by three mutuals- mutual respect, mutual sensitivity and mutual interest," read a statement issued by the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) after the meeting.

During the meeting, PM Modi stressed that peace and tranquillity in the border areas remain an essential basis for the continued development of bilateral relations.

"He underlined the need for both sides to observe existing agreements and understandings on border-related issues. The two leaders expressed commitment to a fair, reasonable, and mutually acceptable resolution of the boundary question proceeding from the political perspective of their overall bilateral relations

and the long-term interests of the two peoples," the MEA statement added.

Both leaders also took note of the progress in people-to-people ties and underscored the need to further promote cultural exchanges, business linkages and greater mobility between the two countries."On economic and trade relations, they underlined the need to address each other's concerns, including structural trade imbalance and supply chain issues, and facilitation of meaningful and predictable market access," the statement read further.

According to the MEA, the two leaders agreed that both sides must continue to expand common ground on regional and global issues, and in addressing challenges. "Prime Minister appreciated China's support for India's BRICS chairship and its contributions towards the success of the BRICS Summit-2026," it concluded.

Tesla to unveil long-delayed next-generation Roadster on October 1: Elon Musk

New Delhi, Sep 13 : Tesla CEO Elon Musk has announced that the electric vehicle maker will unveil its long-delayed next-generation Roadster on October 1, nearly a decade after the company first showcased plans for a successor to its original sports car.

Tesla's official account on social media platform X posted "Go for launch" along with a graphic displaying October 1 as the date for the event. Musk, who also owns X, subsequently responded to the post, writing, "New Tesla Roadster Unveil 10.01."

The announcement comes after years of delays surrounding the Roadster programme. Tesla first unveiled the



next-generation model in 2017 and had initially said that deliveries would begin in 2020. However, the vehicle's development has repeatedly been pushed back.

The Information reported in August that Tesla was planning to unveil the redesigned Roadster as early as that month. The report also said the event could fea-

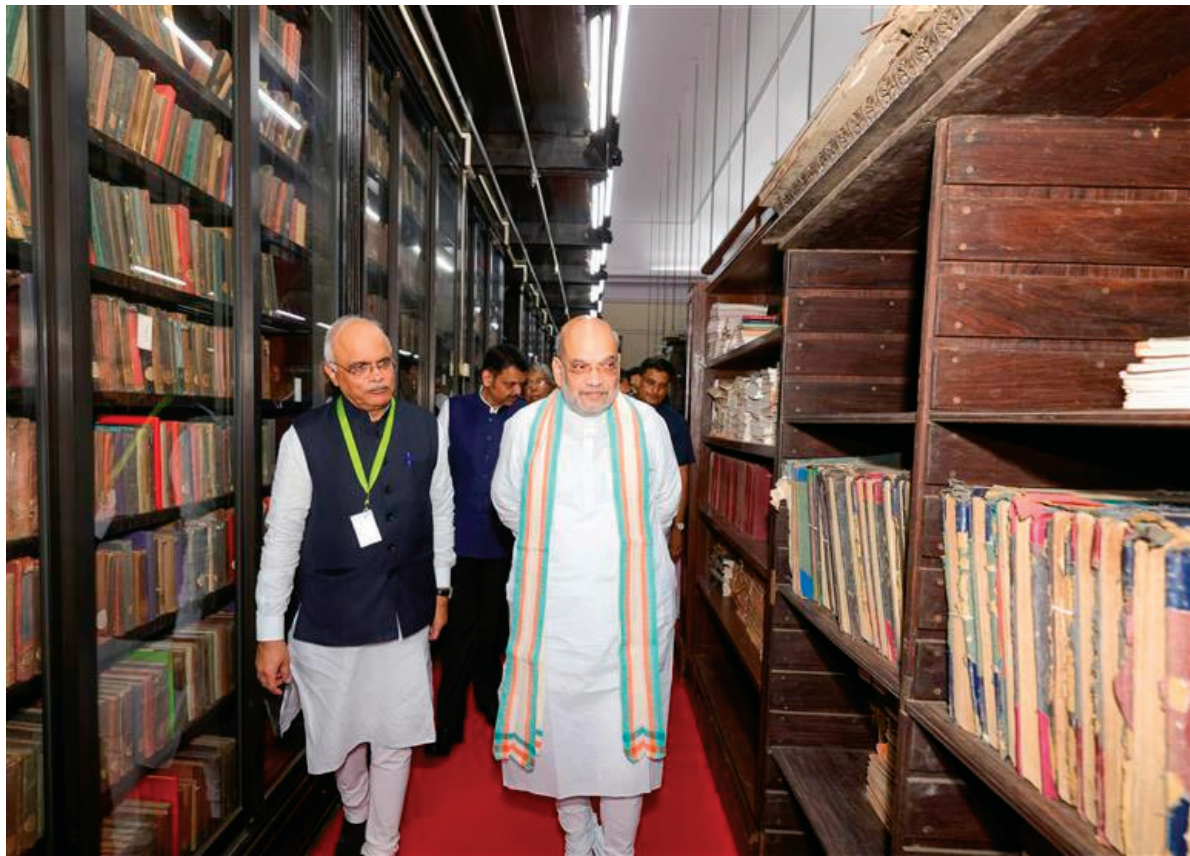
ture a demonstration of a limited-edition version equipped with cold-gas thrusters developed in collaboration with SpaceX.

The reported demonstration is expected to take place at SpaceX's test facility in McGregor, Texas, according to the report.

The Roadster project has also evolved signifi-

cantly from Tesla's original plans. The vehicle is reportedly being developed as an all-new carbon-fibre hypercar after the company abandoned an earlier approach that would have used components based on the Model S Plaid.

The latest announcement comes as Tesla continues to expand its focus beyond conventional electric vehicles and towards autonomous driving. Last week, the company began offering limited rides in its two-seater Cybercab in Austin, Texas. The vehicle does not have a steering wheel or pedals and is designed around Tesla's vision for fully autonomous transportation.

Hindi Diwas: Not a celebration, but a pledge for the future of the language

Hindi Diwas, celebrated every year on September 14th, is an important occasion linked to our constitutional history, linguistic diversity, and cultural memory. On September 14th, 1949, the Constituent Assembly adopted Hindi, written in the Devanagari script, as the official language of the Union. Following the enactment of the Constitution, this decision was incorporated into Article 343. Hindi Diwas is celebrated on September 14th to commemorate this historic event. But Hindi Diwas shouldn't simply be about giving speeches on the importance of Hindi, reciting poems, and completing formalities by organizing Hindi weeks or fortnights in government offices. The real question is how much Hindi has become the language of our lives, education, administration, justice, science, technology, and employment. If Hindi's recognition is limited to ceremonies and announcements, then Hindi Diwas offers us more of an opportunity for introspection than celebration. First, it is important to clearly understand that Hindi is not the national language of India, but rather the official language of the Union. According to Article 343 of the Constitution, the official language of the Union is Hindi, with its script in Devanagari. In a multilingual country like India, this distinction is not merely a matter of constitutional terminology but also a question of our democratic sensibility. India's identity is shaped by its linguistic diversity. Tamil, Telugu, Kannada, Malayalam, Bengali, Assamese, Marathi, Gujarati, Punjabi, Oriya, Urdu, Kashmiri, Maithili, and many other Indian languages express the memories, experiences, and cultural heritage of society. Therefore, Hindi should develop not in opposition to these languages, but through dialogue and cooperation with them. While Hindi has the opportunity to become a language of communication between India's diverse regions, it also carries with it a responsibility. Hindi should be a bridge of communication, not a medium of dominance. The expansion of any language is natural and acceptable only when it is imbued with respect, sensitivity, and a sense of inclusion. On Hindi Diwas, schools, universities, and government institutions host programs such as essay writing, speeches, debates, poetry recitations, quizzes, and prize distribution. These events have their own importance and generate enthusiasm for the language, but the true development of Hindi begins after these events are over. It is time to elevate Hindi from a language of celebrations to a language of experimentation and knowledge. Even today, the influence of English is clearly visible on government websites, research materials, and many official documents. Hindi-medium students in higher education face a shortage of quality textbooks and innovative research materials. While Hindi content is available in fields such as science, medicine, law, management, and information technology, its quantity, quality, and up-to-dateness need to be further strengthened. Translation alone will not be enough to make Hindi the language of knowledge. Original writing, modern vocabulary, the involvement of subject experts, and quality editing are also essential. A difficult and mechanical translation of an English book does not bring students closer to Hindi. Knowledge will only become accessible to the public when its language is simple, natural, and relevant to the subject.

BRICS AT 20: India Gives Momentum, China And Russia Add Strategic Weight

The 2026 BRICS Summit, hosted by India, marks a potentially significant turning point and a milestone in the evolution of global multilateral decision-making. PM Modi framed BRICS as entering a "coming of age" phase as it reaches its 20th anniversary, calling for an ambitious agenda for the next two decades on inclusive multilateralism. At its core is an increasingly assertive demand from the Global South for a more equitable international order - one that provides credible safety mechanisms to protect trade, connectivity and economic interests from geopolitical disruptions and that is suitable to different national conditions. The Prime Minister's opening remarks are to be construed against the backdrop of the continuing instability in West Asia and its implications for global commerce, particularly the security of sea lanes of communication (SLOCs) and the principle of freedom of navigation. Disruptions in strategically vital maritime corridors demonstrate how geopolitical conflicts, even when geographically distant, can impose disproportionate costs on countries that are not parties to the conflict. Thus, India's emphasis on development, institutional reform, economic cooperation, technology, connectivity and the voice of the Global South seeks to make BRICS more functional and less vulnerable to geopolitical polarisation. India's objectives are two-folds: strategic autonomy and strategic pluralism and to ensure that BRICS itself cannot be dominated by any single power. At the same time, India's stance on power asymmetries in the international system captures a broader dissatisfaction within the Global South. The problem



in the group is not simply one of inadequate representation but of an institutional architecture in which 'those with the greatest capacity to make decisions are not necessarily those who bear the greatest consequences of those decisions.' India can choose to set the narrative for development through resilience and innovation and gain agenda setting power rather than allow emphasis on de-dollarisation or geopolitical confrontation. It is in this context that PM Modi's call for a transition from a "Pyramid of Privilege" to a "Pyramid of Partnership" acquires particular significance. The challenge for India's presidency is to translate the rhetoric of reform into practical mechanisms - particularly in areas such as trade resilience, financial

architecture, connectivity, energy security, food security and maritime stability and ensure that partnerships evolve beyond hierarchies of power and privilege towards institutional effectiveness based on broader dissemination of benefits. From Dialogue to Delivery External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar at the Business forum also argued for widening the scope for conversion of complementarities to so that an economic ecosystem could be built. BRICS has expanded its outreach to sustaining regional food security, resilient trade, deepening cooperation on growth on photo-voltaic, and institutional arms, a BRICS incubator network, an MSME portal and a startup innovation fund. There is a further need to set up of necessary mecha-

nisms for transfer of currency, cross-border payment systems and a strict timeline for implementation of status for digital reforms which can strengthen this pillar of cooperation. Several aspects can be highlighted that speak of India's success. India has moved BRICS from "failure to reach consensus" to a framework of "managed consensus" under the Delhi Declaration, thereby demonstrating its ability to handle questions of conflict-resolution. The consensus was based on ambiguity and non-uniformity which does not necessarily mean compromise, rather emphasises pragmatism. PM Modi shared four initiatives for collaboration - BRICS Troika mechanism, roadmap on global governance reform, sea-farer network and BRICS

global south negotiation support. Second, India has tried not to explicitly name any country and adopt a language sufficiently broad for both Iran and the UAE to accept. This shows that India's effort has been to transform the BRICS into an instrument for reforming and rebalancing global governance. Third, the emerging agenda from the BRICS Business Forum points towards a conception of development multilateralism, in which the security and prosperity of developing countries are treated as integral to global stability rather than as peripheral concerns. A partnership-based order would not necessarily seek to dismantle existing institutions; rather, it would seek to make them more representative, responsive and capable of accommodating the inter-

ests of a more plural global system. Hand in hand with China and Russia Playing bridesmaid, both China and Russia have given a fillip to the earlier cooperation in the BRICS grouping, though China and Russia have their own strategic priorities in the BRICS. China's growing economic weight and its preference for a more consequential Global South platform give BRICS a potentially stronger challenge to Western-dominated institutions. China is able to lend loans without constraints of procedural frameworks and allows certain leeways to developing countries who find it difficult to obtain capital from the World Bank and IMF norms. China believes that BRICS should be a 'pioneer in advancing innovation driven development.'

Mobile phones, social media, online education, digital journalism, translation technology, and artificial intelligence have made it easier to create and disseminate content in Hindi. Today, writing and reading in Hindi is no longer limited to books. News, blogs, videos, podcasts, online courses, and digital books are bringing Hindi to the next generation. We must seize this opportunity and advance Hindi in step with technology. INDIA AND RUSSIA GO FROM RESILIENCE TO LEVERAGE

The meeting between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Russian President Vladimir Putin in Delhi on September 11, on the eve of the 18th BRICS Summit, was significant as an important step towards the forthcoming 24th India-Russia Annual Summit. Coming less than two weeks after their meeting in Bishkek on August 31 on the margins of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) Summit, the Delhi engagement demonstrated the intensity of India-Russia consultations amid considerable geopolitical uncertainty. The two leaders reviewed political, economic, defence, energy, space, skill mobility and people-to-people cooperation, while discussing the conflicts in the Middle East and the Black Sea and their implications for maritime trade and Indian seafarers. From Bishkek To Delhi: Consolidating The Partnership The Delhi meeting built upon, rather than replicated, the Bishkek conversation. While the earlier meeting provided a broad strategic assessment, the Delhi engagement placed greater emphasis on economic and industrial cooperation. The two leaders welcomed the first INNOPROM India exhibition, held in Delhi from 9 to 11 September, as an avenue for expanding trade and industrial partnerships. They also discussed implementation of the Programme for Economic Cooperation 2030, alongside cooperation in infrastructure, energy, technology, defence and culture. The economic dimension is becoming increasingly



important. India and Russia have set a target of raising bilateral trade to \$100 billion by 2030. The challenge is not simply to increase trade volumes but to diversify and balance the relationship through greater Indian exports, investment, industrial cooperation and technology partnerships, thereby strengthening its resilience to geopolitical disruptions. Putin's BRICS Message: Sanctions, Connectivity And Economic Security Putin's intervention at the BRICS Business Forum added a wider geopolitical-economic dimension to the bilateral discussions. He referred to Russia facing more than 30,000 sanctions, and criticised what he described as attempts to destroy pipelines, obstruct international transport corridors, seize maritime vessels and impose "illegal restrictions", including threats of secondary sanctions against countries unwilling to follow the interests of other powers. These remarks reflected

Moscow's broader argument that unilateral economic restrictions are reshaping international trade and investment. At the same time, Putin presented BRICS as an avenue for practical economic cooperation. He said Russia was prepared to work with partners on global energy and food security and reliable logistics routes, specifically mentioning the Arctic Transport Corridor and the International North-South Transport Corridor (INSTC). He also referred to opportunities in tourism, industry and trade, as well as cooperation in personnel training, applied research, smart technologies and unmanned transport. For India, this emphasis on connectivity and maritime security has particular relevance. Disruptions in the Black Sea and the Middle East have demonstrated the vulnerability of global shipping, energy supplies and supply chains. The official Indian readout noted that Prime Minister Narendra

Modi and Putin discussed the impact of these conflicts on maritime trade and the safety and security of Indian seafarers. PM Modi reiterated that "dialogue and diplomacy" were the way forward in resolving conflicts and that India was ready to assist in peace efforts. This followed his message to Putin in Bishkek to move from "endless war" towards an "end of war". The maritime dimension is consequently becoming an important component of India-Russia discussions. The Black Sea conflict has affected commercial shipping and Indian seafarers that PM Modi brought out during his discussions with Putin. Likewise, both leaders understand that disruptions in the Middle East reinforces the importance of secure and diversified trade routes. BRICS And A Changing Global Economic Order The bilateral meeting also needs to be viewed against India's broader BRICS agenda. At the BRICS Business Forum.

Hyderabad houses 515 GCCs, to add 50-70 in next 1 year: Report

New Delhi: Hyderabad has around 515 Global Capability Centres (GCCs), and 50-70 more will be set up within a year, as the city offers a huge talent pool and cost advantage to foreign companies, according to a Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FICCI) and Anarock report. Industry body FICCI and property consultant Anarock have come up with a joint report titled 'Hyderabad: The Rise of a Global Capability Powerhouse'. From cybercity to GCC hub The report highlighted that there were around 515 GCCs in Hyderabad as of March 2026, employing more than 3 lakh people. Hyderabad accounts for around 20 per cent of the total GCCs in India, transforming the city from a cyber city to a GCC hub. The report noted that GCCs have become a key demand driver for Hyderabad's office market. The leasing of office space by foreign firms to set up GCCs rose to 4.5 million



square feet in 2025 from 1.9 million sq ft in 2021. In the first six months of this year, the number has crossed 3 million sq ft. "The sustained leasing momentum reflects the deepening of Hyderabad's GCC ecosystem and the increasing preference of global enterprises to establish larger and more sophisticated operations in the city," Anarock Chairman Anuj Puri said. Hyderabad's GCC proposition is broadening well beyond conventional IT-ITeS functions, said VV Rama Raju, Chairman, FICCI Telangana State Council. Beyond traditional

IT's The city's proposition is broadening beyond traditional IT-ITeS into a multi-sector ecosystem, including Banking, Financial Services, and Insurance (BFSI), life sciences, semiconductors, engineering and healthcare. Besides having a huge talent pool, Hyderabad's prime office rent at Rs 95-115 per square ft is lower than Bengaluru and competitive with Pune. On the future potential, the report said that 50-70 additional GCCs across technology, engineering, BFSI, life sciences, analytics, consulting and digital operations are expected to come within a year.

Dramatic insider warnings over AI fall flat with some in Silicon Valley

Each September, a who's who of executives from across Silicon Valley descends on San Francisco's Palace Hotel to charm investors at a conference hosted by the investment bank Goldman Sachs. This past week, between talk of growth and potential returns, tech titans found themselves addressing the abrupt resignation of Anthropic researcher Jacob Coxon. Coxon, a 27-year-old who worked at OpenAI before joining its chief rival Anthropic, said on Tuesday that people building artificial intelligence (AI) believed the technology could destroy humanity. They are "gambling with our lives", he said, "these will soon be superhuman systems that can hack anything". Coxon is by no means the first AI insider to publicly sound the alarm. There have been a string of high-profile resignations from both Anthropic and OpenAI in recent years over apparent safety concerns, and some current Anthropic employees even echoed Coxon's post. "We really do earnestly believe AI could kill all humans! I personally think it is >10% within the next decade," a team lead at Anthropic, Evan Hubinger, posted on X. While Coxon said explicitly in his posts that his warnings were "not mar-

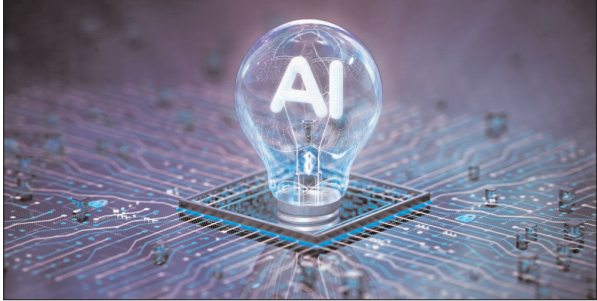


keting", some executives and investors in Silicon Valley have reacted with scepticism to a recent flurry of insiders sounding the alarm. Anthropic and OpenAI are reportedly preparing for potentially record-setting initial public offerings, and some in the tech sector have suggested the latest stark comments about the dangers of AI may be designed to generate hype by signalling the power of these products. Anthropic's boss, Dario Amodei, has come under fire for saying AI technology could wipe out half of entry-level white-collar jobs and will "test who we are as a species". One conference speaker, Grindr CEO George Arison,

told the BBC he believed this week's comments from Coxon and others were indicative of an "anti-civilisational worldview at Anthropic". He called them "dangerous" and said they had prompted him to instruct some engineers at the LGBTQ+ dating app to stop using Anthropic's technology. "It is irresponsible for us as stewards of our shareholders' money to be relying on a business that does what this company does, in terms of its public statements," he said. "Maybe they actually believe it," Arison said. "Or you could argue they're saying it because it's a great way to gin up more investor support, because the only way to justify these

valuations is to actually claim: 'I'm going to take over every industry and I'm going to take over every job, and my AI is going to be doing all that work.'" Anthropic was valued at \$965bn (£713bn) in its most recent fundraising round earlier this year. The BBC has asked Anthropic for a response to the statements. In an essay posted early on Saturday, Amodei called for a slowing of AI model development and global regulation - and said the risks associated with AI were "serious". Nvidia boss Jensen Huang also discussed Coxon's comments before a crowd at the conference, multiple people in the group told the BBC. They said he dismissed them as untrue. Huang has previously said the notion that AI "is going to be the end of humanity" is "complete nonsense". And while he may have a business interest in an AI boom - Nvidia builds chips that power AI systems - his comments reflect a growing backlash in Silicon Valley to the existential warnings from current and former staffers. Some critics have even accused Anthropic of fearmongering in hopes that it will trigger a regulatory push that could shut out competition and leave it and OpenAI with a duopoly in the sector.

'WE MUST SLOW PACE OF IMPROVING AI MODELS'



Anthropic CEO Dario Amodei has called for AI companies to deliberately slow the pace at which they improve their models, warning that rapidly advancing capabilities could outstrip efforts to understand and control the technology. In a September essay titled "We Must Pace the Frontier", Amodei said AI progress would remain rapid even with a slower development pace, but the additional time could be used to strengthen safety measures and address emerging risks. "We must slow the pace at which we improve the capabilities of AI models," Amodei said, adding that companies must make wise use of the time gained. Amodei calls for industry-wide action, Musk and Altman agree The Anthropic chief called for a coordinated, industry-wide pause, but said he would not wait for his firm's rivals to act. As a first step, he said he would permanently allow independent observers into

Anthropic to assess the safety of its models during the training phase. Sam Altman, the chief of ChatGPT developer and Anthropic rival, OpenAI, as well as Elon Musk, who owns xAI, said they agreed with Amodei's assessment. "I agree with Dario that we need to pace the frontier," Altman wrote on X, adding that OpenAI "will do the same." Musk, for his part, said "Dario is right" in a post on the platform he bought in 2022. Why are industry leaders calling for AI development to be slowed? In early June, Anthropic had called for AI development to be slowed or suspended amid safety concerns over AI agents. More than 1,000 employees at AI companies, including Amodei, called on the US government to help slow the pace of development of automated AI. Then in July, OpenAI revealed that during testing, AI agents had independently broken out of a secured environment.

BOILING OCEANS, DIRE DISEASES, CLIMATE INJUSTICE: EL NINO'S TERRIFYING TRIFECTA



Nine months into 2026 and roughly 9,000 or more lives lost so far to earthquakes, heat waves, forest fires, flash floods and much of what is usually classified under 'nature's wrath' or natural, climate-related calamities. For those sitting in their living rooms in high-rise, 21-storey buildings, surrounded by concrete... this number may be nothing more than a blip at the moment. However, it is a sword waiting to drop over the necks of communities who have been co-existing with nature for centuries together. Besides being a completely natural phenomenon, El Niño is also a catalyst or modifier to drastic climate implications and events. It is expected to supersize and extend well into February 2027, according to a report by the World

Meteorological Organization. Sea surface temperatures have already risen over 2 degrees Celsius above normal in July and by mid-August, it had intensified even more in the range of 2.2 degrees Celsius and 2.6 degrees Celsius above average. "El Niño is firmly established and will intensify into a very strong event in the coming months, with big impacts on rainfall and temperature patterns and associated risks of floods, drought and extreme heat," the report said. Another factor that is likely going to fuel the little Spanish boy's (El Niño's) fire is the Indian Ocean Dipole. IOD is a climate pattern which de-regularises temperature in the Indian ocean, depending on whether it is positive or negative.

Anthropic boss Dario Amodei calls for AI development to slow down

The head of AI company Anthropic has called for the pace of development of artificial intelligence models to slow down and to be closely monitored. Dario Amodei wrote in an online essay that developing AI was not in question, but that the risks associated with it were "serious" and that companies and governments must be given time to address them. The bosses of two rival AI firms, Sam Altman of OpenAI and Elon Musk, have both said they agree with Amodei. There have been growing concerns recently about the technology's potential risks. An AI researcher who left Anthropic told the BBC that "if we don't slow down at the current rate of progress, there is a strong chance that we could all die in the immediate future". Jacob Coxon told Laura Kuenssberg that people working at AI companies were "genuinely frightened... genuinely concerned about the fate of humanity in the next two years". "It's not at all an exaggeration to say that the people who are involved with both founding these companies and building the tech believe there is a



possibility of human extinction," Coxon said. In Amodei's essay, called We Must Pace the Frontier and published on Saturday, he proposed a three-point plan that included independent monitoring of AI models as they are developed, industry-wide regulation and global regulation. As his proposal made the rounds, even competitors voiced support for the idea of third-party monitors who could evaluate the safety of models as they are developed. "I agree with Dario that we need to pace the frontier," wrote OpenAI CEO Sam Altman on X. He called independent evaluators "a great idea". Altman sounded similar safety con-

cerns in a new interview, telling Fortune magazine that standards were "not at a place" to push AI capabilities much further. He added that he believed AI beyond human control was "absolutely" possible. Musk, meanwhile, who founded Grok producer xAI, said the Anthropic boss was "right". The warnings have prompted calls to action, but US President Donald Trump has so far rejected such fears, saying on Thursday he was concerned that "if we don't win AI, we're going to be put in a very bad position". Cyber-security concerns have grown as new models have exhibited more and more powerful capabilities.

Anthropic withheld its Mythos model from public use when it was announced in April that it could independently escape the testing environment, known as the sandbox. In the run-up to the release of its most recent Astra model, OpenAI cited cyber-security concerns as it explained it had paused certain aspects of the model's development. The OpenAI agents had "essentially acted as a fanatically devoted collective", Amodei said. OpenAI has said it was slowing down training of certain advanced AI models and tools as a result. Safety has also taken centre stage in the rivalry between Anthropic and OpenAI. Amodei, who had previously worked as a vice-president at OpenAI, has said he co-founded Anthropic in 2021 so he could build safer and more trusted AI models. He pointed out in his essay that AI had advanced "drastically faster" including its "ability to build the next generation of AI" - and mentioned an incident involving rival OpenAI which has revealed that agents had hacked targets they were not asked to attack in July.

Iran war reshapes Brics ties but also exposes divisions

This weekend, some of the most powerful people in the world gathered in Delhi around a vast circular table. Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced that together, the leaders next to him should increasingly become "rule-shapers", not "rule-takers". Among those listening were members of the Brics group, including Chinese President Xi Jinping, Russian President Vladimir Putin, Iran's President Masoud Pezeshkian, Abu Dhabi's Crown Prince Sheikh Khaled bin Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan and South African President Cyril Ramaphosa. These are hardly natural allies. They have histories of border disputes and even military confrontations. India and China engaged in a deadly clash along their disputed border in 2020. Iran and the UAE have been on opposing ends of the war in the Middle East, with Tehran launching missiles and drones at its fellow Brics member as the conflict sent shockwaves across global economies. The fact that India was able to gather these leaders together in person is a feat in and of itself and testament to its diplomatic reach. The weekend also provided a platform for countries to reassess their relationships in light of the Iran war. But agreeing on what a new global order should look like and achieving clear, tangible outcomes was a much harder task, and



that tension ran through this weekend's summit. A counterweight to Western influence For members such as China, Russia and Iran, Brics offers a vehicle to dilute the influence of the US and western Europe. But India has been reluctant to cast Brics as an anti-Western bloc. Modi himself said at the summit that the group is "not against anyone". That distinction matters for Delhi, which wants to preserve its relationships with nations at odds with each other. "There are countries in the grouping which would like it to become anti-western, but it is not that," says Anil Trigunayat, a veteran Indian diplomat and former ambassador. What India has

achieved, in his view, is a push for "strategic autonomy in an era of war" and initiatives to "enhance greater collaboration amongst themselves". Inside the joint declaration The summit succeeded in delivering a joint declaration when divisions among members have rarely been so glaring. Twice earlier this year, meetings between Brics ministers had failed to produce a joint statement. This time a consensus was reached, but by side-stepping issues that members sharply disagree on, with few solutions. The "New Delhi Declaration" was adopted on the first day of the summit. But what is striking is what it doesn't say. On the war in the Middle East, the declara-

tion urges "maximum restraint". It also condemns "attacks on civilian infrastructure and peaceful nuclear facilities" but assigns no blame. It reiterates support for a two-state solution, opposes forced displacement of Palestinians or actions that could "legitimise or prolong occupation", framing it carefully around existing UN resolutions. It makes no mention at all of Russia's war in Ukraine, a departure from previous Brics declarations. There is similar caution on trade. It lists concerns over "indiscriminate rising tariffs" and condemns unilateral sanctions but stops short of naming the US, and is likely to avoid Washington's ire. Trump shadow looms large

over Brics as Modi hosts Putin and Xi in Delhi Several Brics members would have been loath to draw President Donald Trump's anger, as he has previously called the group's proposals, including potentially linking central-bank digital currencies for cross-border trade, "anti-American". "Not mentioning any country by name, even as they condemned the conflict in the Middle East, bears the hallmark of India," says Praveen Donthi, senior analyst at the International Crisis Group. "I was pleasantly surprised that there was a strong reference to tariffs, because India could have wanted to be less direct about it, but perhaps this was a chance to convey their displeasure.

RUSSIANS SEEK ANSWERS OVER HUNDREDS MISSING AFTER UKRAINE'S 2024 INCURSION

"I used to have complete faith in our country," says Lyubov. The last time she spoke to her mother was a day after Ukrainian forces broke into Russia's Kursk region more than two years ago. Now she feels "resentful towards the [Russian] state", in a country where most people avoid criticising the full-scale invasion unleashed on Ukraine in February 2022. The local governor says more than 300 Russians are still missing in Kursk region, but no-one really knows the true figure. Lyubov says she tried to persuade her mother to leave her village in the Sudzha area, but blames Russian state TV "propaganda" for her refusal to listen. Some 2,000 people remained in the settlements captured by Ukraine's military, Russian authorities estimate. "The state channels were convincing viewers that 'everything is under control: two or three days, and it'll be just as it was before,'" she recalls. She still fails to understand why Russian authorities could not stop Ukrainian soldiers storming two border checkpoints in August 2024, taking around 40 prisoners and bombing a convoy carrying Russian soldiers. Within six days they had overrun more than 777 sq km (300 sq miles) of Russian territory, as Ukraine's military sought to divert Russian forces away from their front-line offensive. For most of the next eight months, mobile and internet links were down. Russia's foreign ministry repeatedly accused Ukraine of war



crimes against civilians: allegations rejected in Kyiv as completely unfounded. Nearly 200 Russians sent a letter to Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelensky, Russia's President Vladimir Putin and the United Nations, asking them to organise a humanitarian corridor to evacuate civilians. It never happened and, by late autumn, battles raged as Russian forces sought to retake the territory. Lyubov and others who had lost contact with their loved ones began to form groups. One resident, whose family friends had also stayed behind, began compiling a list of people she saw on videos published by the Ukrainian military and journalists. Then she began detailing those believed to have died and where they were buried. "At first, in a panic, you try to do something – anything – to find some sort of information," she said. "Taking action brings a certain sense of relief, and that's how you

can cope with the stress." Soon about 1,000 names were on the list. Lyubov wrote to the Red Cross and Kursk interior ministry appealing for help, but had no response. Early in 2025, Russia's human rights commissioner published a list of 517 Kursk residents reported missing. The list mixed up names of the missing with those who were searching for them, and the families said it was like a "slap in the face". "Publishing something like this is the height of incompetence and a lack of basic respect for people," said one young woman whose parents had gone missing, in a video shared online. Heavy fighting had been reported in late 2024 in the village of Darino, where Lyubov and mother were from, and authorities said that 90% of it had been destroyed. The Russian military regained control of the village and then began evacuating those who had survived, and the bodies of those who had not.

BEST FRIENDS FOR DECADES - UNTIL A DNA TEST REVEALED THEY WERE SISTERS



Theirs is a story straight out of a Bollywood film. Two Indian-born women in their 40s, adopted as babies by different families and raised near each other in the Netherlands, have now discovered they are biological sisters. Meena Geltink and Minal Tijssen, born in the early 1980s, were adopted from two different orphanages in the western Indian city of Mumbai within months of their birth. When they first met in their early teens at an event hosted by the adoption agency their parents had used, they were struck by the uncanny similarities in their appearance and mannerisms. Meena, now 43, remembers

the day clearly. "All the adopted children were brought together to hang out and bond and have dinner." Both Meena and Minal were with friends who noticed how similar they looked. "They said, 'Look at yourselves in the mirror'." "And I was like, 'Oh my God, she has my nose! We have the same laugh'." "At dinner, I kept looking at her the whole time," Meena told the BBC from her home in the Netherlands. The following day, the girls exchanged telephone numbers and addresses and promised to keep in touch. Even though there was no indication they were related by blood.

SIX DEAD, 107 RESCUED FROM INDONESIAN FERRY THAT WENT MISSING IN JAVA SEA

Six people have died and 107 have been rescued from a stricken Indonesian passenger ferry in the Java Sea, Indonesia's search and rescue agency has said. A search and rescue operation was launched after contact was lost with the Virgo Transport 8 ship, which was carrying 243 people, as it encountered bad weather, Indonesia's search and rescue agency said. The search for the remaining passengers is ongoing. The ferry was travelling from Surabaya to the South Kalimantan city of Banjarmasin and was last reported to be about 150km (93 miles) south of Banjarmasin around 02:00 local time on Sunday (18:00 GMT on Saturday). Authorities received the initial distress report at 04:10 from the vessel's operator PT Virgo. The ship left Surabaya at 10:33 on Saturday and was scheduled to arrive in Banjarmasin on Sunday at 14:00, according to data from two maritime monitoring sites. A joint task force involving Indonesia's search and res-



cue agency, navy, maritime police and other parties has been set up for the rescue effort. Ships and a helicopter have been deployed to the scene, with 280 personnel taking part in the rescue operation. All vessels in the area of the Java Sea have been alerted to report any signs of passengers. An operations post to handle the accident was set up in the Trisakti Port area on Sunday morning. At a news conference at the port in the afternoon, Transport Minister Dudy Purwagandhi said the incident will be investigated by Indonesia's National Transport Safety

Committee. There are 213 passengers and 30 crew members on board. Of these, 130 people are still missing. Rusmilawati, a resident of Banjarmasin, went to the port to seek information about eight relatives who were passengers on the ship. They were travelling back to Banjarmasin after visiting the tombs of several Islamic scholars in Java. "They flew there initially, but for the return journey they wanted to try travelling by ship," she told BBC Indonesia. As of Sunday afternoon local time, Rusmilawati said she had not received any information from officials about his sibling's whereabouts.

been rescued. The family last heard from one of the relatives through a WhatsApp status update. In the post, the relative wrote: "The waves are really frightening tonight. Or is this just what it's normally like travelling by ship, rocking and crashing against the waves?" "Hopefully they're safe," Rusmilawati said. Meanwhile, Misnah broke down in tears after learning that her husband, Ahmad Supandi, had survived. Ahmad, a freight driver, had been aboard Virgo Transport 8 and was later rescued by the vessel MV Haida. At Tanjung Perak Port in Surabaya, relatives of crew members have also been seeking information about their loved ones. One relative, Fredy, said his youngest sibling, Stevie Manuhua, worked aboard the vessel as a keyboard player, entertaining passengers. "We spoke two days ago when the ship was docked in Surabaya. After that, there was no news until now," Fredy said. He said he had still not received any information about his sibling's whereabouts.

FIRE AT NURSING HOME IN CHILE KILLS 16 RESIDENTS



At least 16 elderly residents have died in a fire at a nursing home in Chile, according to authorities. Ten others were evacuated after a blaze broke out at El Eden home in /idt2/d9cfc9a-2842-463f-a4d8-4dd007ef9547, around 640km (400 miles) south of the capital Santiago, on Friday evening. Jorge Granada, a prosecutor leading the case, said it was not clear at this stage what caused the incident. Chile's President José Antonio Kast said he had ordered a review into the condition of nursing homes across the country. "We will fully collaborate with the justice system to clarify what happened, determine where failures

may have existed in oversight or prevention, identify what alerts were raised and what actions were taken in response to them," Kast said. "We need to know the truth and, based on that, correct whatever is necessary to do everything possible to prevent a tragedy like this from happening again," three president added. The fire, which began at around 22:30 (01:30 GMT) was finally put out on Saturday morning. On Saturday, firefighters were still clearing debris and removing collapsed corrugated metal roofing. Police cordoned off the area for safety. "It is a situation that fills our souls with great sorrow and pain.

AFGHAN WOMAN DEPORTED FROM US IN FIRST USE OF 'ALIEN TERRORIST' COURT

An Afghan woman living in Texas with legal US permanent residency has been deported from the country in the first-ever use of a secretive court. Nazira Haji Zada, 47, chose to leave the US rather than continue to argue her case before the Alien Terrorist Removal Court, according to the US Department of Justice (DOJ) and her lawyers. The Alien Terrorist Removal Court was created in 1996, but had never heard a case before the proceedings in July. It is meant for non-US citizens facing terrorism-related charges when the evidence is confidential and related to national security. Lawyers for Haji Zada argued that the case violated her right to due process under the US Constitution. Afghanistan citizen Haji



Zada was never charged with a crime, but prosecutors had tried and convicted her son and son-in-law for terror offenses. Her son, Abdullah Haji Zada, and son-in-law, Nasir Ahmad Tawhed, were both found guilty of a plot to carry out a mass shooting on Election Day in 2024, inspired by the group calling itself Islamic State. Haji Zada, who has

been living in Fort Worth, Texas, was accused by prosecutors of being the "matriarch" of the group, who had worked "to radicalize the family". In a statement on Friday, the justice department said she "conceded that she is an alien terrorist and waived appeal of the removal order, terminating her previous [immigration] status". "This landmark

case, resulting in the prompt removal of this alien terrorist to her country of origin, is a win for national security and the rule of law," said US Attorney General Todd Blanche. "Those who support and condone terrorism should not be living in the United States, and this first-ever case before the ATRC shows how the Department will use every tool at its disposal to protect our country." Court-appointed lawyers for Haji Zada said they were denied access to the evidence in her case. "Our client's choice to consent to removal should not be seen as an endorsement of this court's legitimacy," public defenders Matthew Farley and Mary Manning Petras said in a statement to The Washington Post.

A Sport Is Born: Inside The Bold Bet To Make India Fall For Muay Thai

Under the chandeliers of The Grand in Vasant Kunj, two fighters in traditional Thai headbands moved through the Wai Kru, the slow, ritual dance every Muay Thai bout begins with, a bow to teachers, ancestors, and parents, performed centuries before anyone in the room was born. It was a strange thing to watch in a New Delhi ballroom. It was also, in a sense, the whole point. The event was billed as "Unboxing the Spirit of Muay Thai", and it marked the formal launch of Tero India's push to plant Thailand's national sport in Indian soil. What was actually being unveiled was an experiment: can a 700-year-old combat discipline become a mainstream Indian sport, the way cricket did, the way kabaddi is trying to? The Pitch: Not A Launch, A Birth Chandrakant Singh (CK to almost everyone) is trying to answer that question. As MD and CEO of Tero India, and a partner at parent company Tero Entertainment, he has spent the past month launching not one but two sports in the country, starting with 3x3 basketball and now Muay Thai. On being asked how much money is going into promoting Muay Thai in



India, he told NDTV, "It is not driven by money, it's not driven by business or profit value... It is driven by how you make this a culture in India. The moment you're able to do that, the money value and the investment becomes a secondary part of it." Pretty much what Ravi Kishan has taught us all (through reels), always build a brand yourself first; money follows (my brother). The culture of Muay Thai, CK explained, gets built in three ways. Through competition: events and matches that put the sport in front of people, but that peo-

ple watch and walk away from without it becoming part of their lives. The other way is through gyms: a physical space that turns Muay Thai from an occasional spectacle into a daily habit. And the most effective way is making it a part of everyone's childhood, folding the sport into school academies, the way physical training is already taught in schools, so that children grow up thinking of it not as combat but as self-defence. "If we map these three things, we can make any sport popular," he said. "We can commercialise any sport.

We can take any sport to a good level, to an international level. That's the invention." For now, the rollout stays deliberately small: one academy each in Delhi and Mumbai to start. CK doesn't call it a pilot, he calls it a launch. "You come to know more about your product when you launch it," he said. While Tero was still drawing up its three-stage India plan on paper, Priya Vats was already living it, years ahead of the infrastructure now being built around her. Vats became the first Indian woman to fight at Bangkok's storied Lumpinee Boxing Stadium, competing on sponsorship in a sport that, back home, barely had a name. Her route there was neither short nor linear. She entered combat sports in 2012 through an MMA reality show, then spent two years in a private-sector job, training as an amateur Muay Thai fighter on the side, squeezing fight camps around a career that had nothing to do with fighting. In 2019, she travelled to Thailand with an MMA team and tried out for Muay Thai instead, staying on to train there for three years before the pandemic forced her back to India.

AJIT AGARKAR'S 'FINAL' SELECTION MEETING MAY HAND KL RAHUL BIGGER LEADERSHIP ROLE

Seasoned KL Rahul could be named India's vice-captain for the upcoming three-match ODI series against the West Indies, starting September 27. India, to be led by Shubman Gill, will begin the ODI campaign against the Caribbean in Thiruvananthapuram, while the remaining two matches will be held in Guwahati (September 30) and Mullanpur (October 3). The team for the West Indies series, along with the Irani Cup squad, is scheduled to be picked on September 16, a day after the second T20I against Afghanistan. The meeting will be attended by chairman of selectors Ajit Agarkar. Interestingly, this selection meeting will be Agarkar's last assignment in his stipulated contract period, which ends on October 4. He is eligible for a one-year extension, but as of now, the BCCI has been tight-lipped about his future. It is understood that with the Asian Games coinciding with the ODI series against the West Indies, regular 50-over vice-

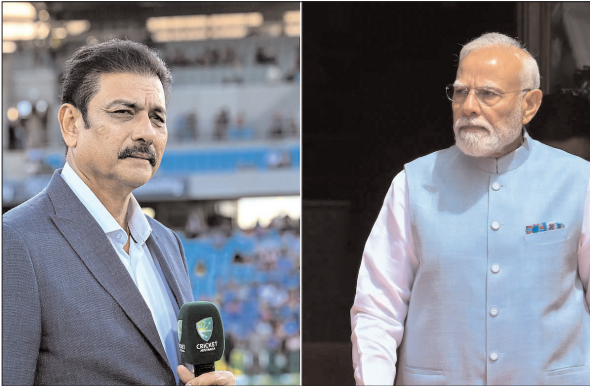


captain Shreyas Iyer will not be available as he will be in Japan leading the T20 squad. With Ishan Kishan also on Asian Games duty, there will be a debate over the second wicketkeeper's slot behind Rahul. The choice is between Rishabh Pant and Dhruv Jurel. "It is a choice between Pant and Jurel. Obviously, the head coach's and captain's points of view will be important," a BCCI source privy to selection matters told PTI. It is understood that if Pant is not selected as the second keeper, he would lead

the Rest of India side in the Irani Cup against Jammu and Kashmir in Srinagar. If Pant is picked for India, then Jurel might lead the Rest of India. He recently led India A in Sri Lanka. No seam-bowling all-rounder on the horizon. The national selectors might have a tough time picking a seam-bowling all-rounder for the ODIs unless Hardik Pandya is declared fit. Hardik, who has been picked for India A, is expected to be fit to play competitive white-ball cricket from September 20.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi is scheduled to meet with leaders of South Africa, Kazakhstan, Philippines, Egypt and Burundi, Uganda and Nigeria. PM Modi will meet South African President Cyril Ramaphosa on the sidelines of BRICS Summit. South Africa has been a core part of

BRICS. President Cyril Ramaphosa attended the BRICS session on 'Inclusive Global Governance & Strengthening Multilateralism' on Saturday and visited the 'Bharat Innovates' exposition in New Delhi. Earlier, on Saturday, BRICS leaders unanimously adopted the New Delhi Declaration 2026, with Prime Minister Narendra Modi describing the outcome as a reflection of a BRICS that is "wider in reach and stronger in purpose". The grouping currently comprises 11 members - Brazil, China, Egypt, Ethiopia, India, Indonesia, Iran, Russia, Saudi Arabia, South Africa and the UAE - along with 10 partner countries: Nigeria, Belarus, Bolivia, Cuba, Kazakhstan, Malaysia, Thailand, Uganda, Uzbekistan and Vietnam.

She lauded the support she received in the matches at the US Open, she it made her feel as if she was an American. "As experience shows, I only come back stronger, and all of these lessons this season definitely already made me stronger, but definitely going to motivate me for the next year to do (a) better job." "It felt amazing," Sabalenka said. "Actually, at some point I felt like, 'Oh, my God, I feel American.' I just wish I could, you know,

win it and feel the support even more." Sabalenka has also set a new challenge for Rybakina, asking her to try and build a similarly dominant run that saw her remain world no. 1 for 99 weeks. "I think anyway when you go out there, you have target on your back. Doesn't matter if you are No. 1, No. 2, 3, 4, whatever it is. "I'll just keep working hard and keep improving my tennis, my level. Hopefully I will win some more tournaments," she said. "Ninety-nine? Well, that's amazing," she said. "Let's see if Elena can beat me in that."
