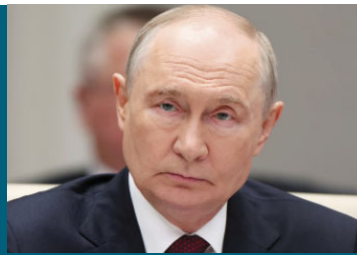

THREE NEW MEMBERS APPOINTED IN RAM TEMPLE TRUST



Ayodhya, Sep 2 (TSIT): The Shri Ram Jannabhoomi Teerth Kshetra Trust appointed three new members to the Trust on Wednesday, one of whom is said to be a relative of former Vishwa Hindu Parishad (VHP) leader Ashok Singhal. According to TV reports, Delhi-based Mahesh Bhagchandka and Ayodhya-based Madan Mohan Pandey and Shikohabad-based Nirmala Yadav are among the three newly appointed Trustees.

IRAN'S IRGC CLAIMS ATTACKS ON US BASES IN KUWAIT, JORDAN AND IRAQ

Tehran, Sep 2 : Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) on Wednesday claimed that it carried out attacks on the US Ali Al-Salem base in Kuwait, a military camp housing US Marines in Jordan and destroyed a US surveillance balloon control system at an American base in Iraq, local media reported. In the statement, the IRGC said that it successfully hit the living quarters and command post of the US Ali Al-Salem base's American commander in Kuwait.

CM Vijay to withdraw cases against farmers, teachers

CHENNAI (TSIT):

The Tamil Nadu government has announced the withdrawal of all criminal cases registered against farmers and teachers who participated in peaceful protests between May 2021 and April 2026 in support of their livelihood, rights and other legitimate demands.

Chief Minister C. Joseph Vijay announced the decision in the Legislative Assembly under Rule 110, describing it as an effort to protect democratic rights and rebuild trust between the government and ordinary citizens.

The order will cover cases filed against farmers who opposed the proposed State Industries Promotion Corporation of Tamil Nadu industrial estate in Tiruvannamalai district. Cases registered during the prolonged



agitation against the proposed greenfield airport at Parandur in Kancheepuram district will also be withdrawn. Residents of Parandur and surrounding villages had organised sustained protests against the airport project, arguing that it would lead to the acquisition of fertile agricultural land, damage waterbodies and destroy traditional sources of income.

Godavari waters reach North Andhra: CM Naidu

VISAKHAPATNAM (TSIT)

Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu on Wednesday welcomed the arrival of Godavari waters in North Andhra by offering Jala Harathi at the Payakaraopeta Cross Regulator in Anakapalli district. After sprinkling the sacred water on his head, he unveiled a commemorative plaque and offered a Sashtanga Namaskaram to the river.

Large numbers of farmers, women and local residents gathered on both sides of the canal to welcome the waters with flowers and traditional harathi. The Chief Minister said the Godavari waters released through the Polavaram Left Canal would provide irrigation to 2.87 lakh acres and drinking water to 9.23 lakh people in East Godavari, Kakinada, Konaseema and Anakapalli districts.

The government has spent Rs.4,192 crore on the Left Canal and plans to spend another Rs.800 crore to complete the remaining works.



The waters would also be used to fill the Yeleru Canal and 110 tanks in Anakapalli district, ensuring irrigation to the Pushkara, Yeleru, Pampa, Tandava, Varaha and Mamidigedda ayacuts. Officials said 23.44 TMC of water has been planned for industrial, drinking water and irrigation requirements in Visakhapatnam and Anakapalli districts. Addressing a public meet-

ing, Chandrababu Naidu said the arrival of Godavari waters would transform the barren lands of North Andhra into fertile agricultural fields and usher in a new era of prosperity. He said the Left Main Canal would be further expanded and connected to the North Andhra Sujala Sravanthi project.

Twelve major projects in North Andhra would be completed at a

cost of Rs.3,200 crore, while 36 projects worth Rs.35,000 crore would be completed over the next three years.

The Chief Minister said abundant water availability would attract industries, investments, data centres and IT companies, creating employment and livelihood opportunities. Visakhapatnam would emerge as an AI City, Google hub and centre of the knowledge economy, he said. He also announced plans to take Godavari waters to Simhachalam next year and subsequently to Arasavalli and the Vamsadhara. Assembly Speaker Chintakayala Ayyanna Patrudu, Ministers Nimmala Ramanaidu, Vangalapudi Anitha, P. Narayana, K. Atchannaidu, Kollu Ravindra and K. Parthasarathi, MPs CH Vijay and C.M. Ramesh and other public representatives participated in the programme.

Sita's sacrifice greater than Rama's: Shivakumar

CITES SONIA GANDHI'S SACRIFICE & LEADERSHIP



BENGALURU (TSIT):

Karnataka Chief Minister D.K. Shivakumar on Wednesday said Sita's character in the Ramayana was "much greater" than that of Lord Rama, citing her sacrifices and struggles as an inspiration for women. Speaking at the fifth edition of 'Together We Grow—International Women Entrepreneurship Day' in Bengaluru, Shivakumar praised women entrepreneurs who overcame challenges to

build successful businesses. He also cited Congress leader Sonia Gandhi as an example of sacrifice and leadership, saying she faced personal tragedies but continued to lead the party and chose not to become Prime Minister. Shivakumar highlighted the government's women-centric initiatives, including the Shakti scheme and Gruha Lakshmi, under which 1.22 crore women receive Rs.2,000 per month, besides

loans and subsidies. He called for greater women's leadership from gram panchayats to Parliament and said the 33 per cent reservation would create more opportunities for women to emerge as leaders. The Chief Minister also urged women entrepreneurs to support Karnataka's development and appealed for backing for the proposed Bengaluru tunnel road project.

Kiren Rijju holds series of bilateral talks on sidelines of NAM Summit in Belgrade



BELGRADE (TSIT):

Union Parliamentary Affairs Minister Kiren Rijju held a series of bilateral meetings with leaders from several nations on the sidelines of the Non-Aligned Movement (NAM) Summit in Belgrade. The discussions were focused on strengthening bilateral cooperation and expanding engagement in key sectors.

Rijju met with Saudi Arabia's Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs, Waleed A. M. Elkhereiji, as the two leaders discussed ways to deepen the close and longstanding partnership between India and Saudi Arabia and explored avenues to broaden cooperation across areas of mutual interest.

Taking to X, Rijju posted, "Met with H.E. Waleed A. M. Elkhereiji, Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. Exchanged views on further

strengthening the close & enduring India-Saudi Arabia partnership & advancing cooperation across areas of mutual interest."

The Minister also met Ana Brnabic, President of the Serbian National Assembly, where the two sides exchanged views on the enduring India-Serbia relationship and the role of parliamentary engagement in fostering closer ties between the two countries and their people. Following the meeting, the Parliamentary Affairs Minister took to X on Wednesday and said, "Had a warm & meaningful meeting with H.E. Ana Brnabi, President (Speaker) of the National Assembly of the Republic of Serbia. Reflected on the strong bonds of friendship between India & Serbia & the important role of parliamentary exchanges in bringing our two countries & our people closer."

Retired Air Marshal Jeetendra Mishra to be first CEO of Ram Temple

AYODHYA (TSIT):

Retired Air Marshal Jeetendra Mishra is set to become the first Chief Executive Officer



(CEO) of the Ram Temple in Ayodhya, according to people familiar with the Shri Ram Jannabhoomi Teerth Kshetra Trust's decision. Mishra, who held several senior command positions in the Indian Air Force, served as chief of the Western Air Command during Operation Sindoor. His appointment follows a month-long selection process in which 5,585 applications were screened. Of these, 111 candidates were interviewed online and 16 were shortlisted for face-to-face interviews in Ayodhya. The CEO will function independently without government interference and report to the Trust's General Secretary. The official is expected to oversee long-term planning and strengthen temple and donation management. The appointment comes amid controversy over alleged irregularities in temple donations, which resulted in eight arrests and the resignation of Trust General Secretary Champat Rai, according to the report.

Nepal PM calls for global response to rising Himalayan climate risks

KATHMANDU (TSIT):

Nepal Prime Minister Balendra Shah on Wednesday called for stronger international attention to growing climate-related risks in the Himalayan region as the death toll from devastating floods in the Bhotekoshi River crossed 1,100. Addressing the House of Representatives, Shah said Nepal must highlight more forcefully the disasters it is facing due to climate change.

At least 1,114 bodies swept away by last week's floods had been recovered by 9 am Wednesday, according to the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Authority (NDRRMA). Around 3,916 people remain out of contact. Experts said an avalanche blocked the Lengde Khola, a tributary of the Bhotekoshi River near the Nepal-China border. The accumulated water later breached the natural barrier, triggering a massive flood that swept downstream towards the Trishuli River and devas-



tated settlements and infrastructure. Shah said the disaster had raised questions about how such an event occurred and what it meant for Nepal's future. "The huge disaster, whose impacts of climate change we have suddenly experienced, has kept us working around the clock to manage the damage. At the same time, another profound question has arisen in our minds: How did this disaster come upon us?" he said. Referring to expert assess-

ments, Shah said the incident was a serious warning that climate change was increasing risks in the Himalayan region. "We must make the international community aware of the disasters we are experiencing as a result of climate change. Climate change is a global challenge. Its impacts and efforts to mitigate and manage them are the shared responsibility of the global community," he said. Shah also defended the government's response to questions

over whether timely warnings were issued to the public. "As soon as we received information that the flood was approaching, our security personnel were deployed to alert residents. However, they themselves went missing during the operation," he said.

Some media reports had suggested that the Nepali government was reluctant to accept international assistance for the rescue and relief of flood victims. Seven days after the disaster, Shah told Parliament that the government had never adopted a policy of refusing international assistance during major disasters.

"We had been coordinating with international countries from the very beginning to seek assistance as needed in the affected areas. We had also tried to expedite the process of receiving international assistance," Shah said. "Our friendly neighbours, India and China, had already sent technical experts.

CM Revanth seeks Rajnath's support for 'Invest Telangana' summit

HYDERABAD (TSIT):

Telangana Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy on Wednesday met Defence Minister Rajnath Singh in New Delhi and sought cooperation for the 'Invest Telangana Global Summit-2026' being organised by the state government at the 'Bharat Future City' from December 7 to 9.

The Chief Minister briefed the Defence Minister on the main objective of the global summit and requested him to inaugurate the Defence Expo-2026, which is to be conducted as part of the summit. He highlighted that the Defence Expo would feature a special session on the aerospace, defence, and space sectors, alongside a prestigious air show, industrial exhibition and live demonstrations of land-based defence systems.

According to the Chief Minister's Office, Revanth Reddy sought the full cooperation of the Defence Ministry to successfully organise the Defence Expo-2026 in accordance with international standards. The Chief Minister appealed to Rajnath Singh to provide assistance



mainly in granting the necessary airspace clearances for the airshow and ensuring the participation of Indian Air Force aircraft, as well as the 'Surya Kiran', 'Sarang' aerobatic teams and also the support for the static aircraft display. The Union Minister has been requested that state-of-the-art defence systems belonging to the army, navy, and air force be showcased and that senior officials and representatives from the three armed services participate in the event.

CM Revanth Reddy emphasised the presence and guidance of the Defence Minister at the expo, where the defence industries, startups and young scientists from across the country would also join and share their experiences and ideas.

'Cheap, disgraceful act': BJP, SP slam Pakistan PMO over edited SCO summit

New Delhi, Sep 2 : BJP and Samajwadi Party leaders on Wednesday criticised the Pakistan Prime Minister's Office (PMO) for sharing an edited photograph of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) meeting, that left out Prime Minister Narendra Modi and other leaders, calling it a "cheap and disgraceful act".

Talking to reporters, West Bengal Minister Dilip Ghosh said that such actions only damage Pakistan's image internationally.

"The people of Pakistan indulge in such fraud and trickery, which is why no one in the world trusts them. Whether PM Modi's photo is there or not makes no difference at all. They are only tarnishing their own country's image," he said.

Speaking to IANS, Samajwadi Party leader S.T. Hasan also criticised the move, saying Pakistan should not stoop to such a low level.

"This is a very cheap and disgraceful act. Pakistan should not stoop to such a low level. Our country is far ahead of Pakistan in every respect. Its only job is to spread terrorism, and it has shot itself in the foot," he said.



Hasan further said that Pakistan had failed to respond to Prime Minister Narendra Modi's remarks on terrorism during the SCO Summit.

"They could not respond to our Prime Minister's remarks on terrorism and remained silent. Since they had no answer, they edited the picture out of frustration. Such actions serve no purpose and only make them look embarrassed," he said.

The X post by the Pakistan Prime Minister's Office featuring world leaders at the SCO Summit in Kyrgyzstan's Bishkek drew attention on Tuesday after the image was cropped on both sides. The

edited photograph left out Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Iranian President Masoud Pezeshkian, and several other leaders.

"Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif in a group photo with heads of States at the SCO Council of Heads of State Summit in Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan on 1 September 2026," the Pakistan PMO said in the post on Tuesday.

However, a few hours after the Pakistan PMO's post, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif shared the original photograph featuring all the leaders, including Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

"Today, I was honoured to address the SCO Council

of Heads of State Meeting in Bishkek as Pakistan assumed the SCO Chairmanship for 2027. I congratulated the Kyrgyz Republic on successfully hosting the Summit and steering the Organisation with distinction," Sharif said in his post, recalling his country's "immense sacrifices in the fight against terrorism".

Meanwhile, Prime Minister Modi said on Tuesday at the 26th SCO Summit that the West Asia conflict must be resolved through dialogue and diplomacy. He also urged member states to shun "double standards" while unitedly countering the challenge of terrorism.

BRS Slams Congress Over Unfulfilled Promises, Stages Massive Protest in Gadwal.

He also accused the government of failing to protect the interests of farmers in the erstwhile Gadwal region, par-

Dr. Anjaneya Goud further alleged that farmers were facing hardships while unemployed youth and students were disappointed over the lack of employment opportunities. Questioning the Congress government over its promise to provide two lakh jobs, he demanded that the

He clarified that Rs.182 crores have been paid directly to the farmers for land acquisition within the constituency while solving the pending issues.

Challenging the allegations on the temple platform: The MLA reacted strongly to the personal allegations. He stated that his land purchase was a public matter and ZPTC Raghupathi Reddy was an eyewitness to the transaction. "Do you have the guts to

come to Venkateswara Swamy Temple to prove my hard-earned wages? Let's settle it there," he challenged. Raghupathi Reddy demanded to reveal the facts that he is ready to register 39 pits of land in anyone's name. NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court on Wednesday frowned upon the "unwritten ban" imposed by the Tamil Nadu government on fishermen by not granting access passes for using purse seine nets in the Centre's Exclusive Economic Zones (EEZ), and said it is necessary for the Union and the state to abide by the principle of cooperative federalism.

A bench of Justices P S Narasimha and Alok Aradhe ruled that the rights and liabilities of the parties will now be governed according to the relevant laws, EEZ Rules, 2025 and the Tamil Nadu Marine Fishing Regulation Rules, 2020.

The bench said laws, rules



and regulations addressing the issue of access to the EEZ for fishing using purse seine nets and transiting through the territorial waters of the state have come into force and are operating. "For effective and efficient implementation of these rules

and regulations, it is necessary for the Union and the State to abide by the principle of cooperative federalism. The Union as well as the state administration are the duty bearers not only to implement the respective regulations within their

province, but also to ensure that the stakeholders have easy access and efficient clearance of their applications to pursue their fundamental rights under Article 19(1)(g) of the Constitution of India, of course subject to reasonable regulations," it said.

Giving a reality check, the bench said the status of applications for access passes under the EEZ Rules, 2025 on the Registration and Licensing of Fishing Craft Portal (ReALCRaft Portal) as on August 3, 2026 is rather "disturbing" and demonstrates a "lack of coordinated endeavour" between the issuing authority appointed by the Union and the verifying authority of the state, who is a state government official.



Honble Minister for Human Resources Management welcomed Tamil Nadu tourists rescued from the disaster in Nepal at Chennai Airport

CHENNAI: The Tamil Nadu Assembly witnessed lighthearted banter on Wednesday over Nagadosham (serpent curses) and Jaladosham (common cold) after DMK's O Panneerselvam jokingly suggested that a recent spate of snake bites in the state was driven by a celestial curse.

Health Minister KG Arunraj brushed off the astrological theory, maintaining that the state relies on science and is currently tackling common colds and not snake curses. The hilarious discussion began when Panneerselvam, also a Chief Minister took the floor to highlight a recent string of snakebite incidents across several constituencies. Many regions were likely suffering from "Nagadhosham" brought on by displeased serpents, he said and went on to urge the health minister to organise state-sponsored temple rituals to ward off the celestial curse. Arunraj, who was quick to respond, firmly declined to hold rituals to appease snakes in the health budget, and said the administration relied on medical science, not planetary alignments. "The only widespread ailment we are currently tracking is the common cold - Jaladosham and not Nagadosham," the minister said. Refusing to let the joke fade, Panneerselvam playfully offered to provide a team of ritual experts to help the health ministry. The banter drew



Public Works and Sports Minister Aadhav Arjuna into the fray, and he reminded the Assembly of the state's deep roots in the ideals of rationalist leader Periyar, emphasising that the government solves problems with rationalism rather than incantations.

Leader of the Opposition DMK Udhayanidhi Stalin stepped in to clarify the confusion. He said the senior member - Panneerselvam - made a playful jab aimed at the DMK Deputy Leader K N Nehru, who was currently laid down by a severe cold. Immediately, Assembly Speaker J C D Prabhakar wrapped up the debate with the ultimate word of caution, advising Panneerselvam to "take precautions, or you might catch a cold yourself."

CHENNAI: The State government has set the end of September as the deadline for completing all ongoing North-East monsoon preparedness works in Chennai and its suburbs, with Chief Secretary M Sai Kumar directing officials to accelerate flood prevention measures on a war footing. As part of the preparedness, GCC is carrying out desilting along 1,671 km of storm water drains (SWD), while desilting work has been undertaken in 1,10,082 silt catch pits. Similar works have been ordered in suburban areas, with flood-prone areas such as Velachery, Ambattur, SIDCO, Tiruvottiyur and Manali getting focused attention. Officials have also been directed to address gaps in SWD connectivity, particularly in areas where Metro Rail works are under way and along highways. The Water Resources Department has been asked to expedite desilting of rivers and canals and clear obstructions at points. Pending drainage works on key stretches including Demellores road, Nookampalayam and MRH road have also been ordered to be expedited. It is also stressed that there should be no loss of life.



due to electrical leakage during the monsoon. Flood relief centres and community kitchens are to be inspected and equipped with the necessary facilities. At a review meeting at the Secretariat on Tuesday, the Chief Secretary reviewed preparedness across the Greater Chennai, Avadi and Tambaram corporations with zonal monitoring officers and senior officials from the Water Resources, Highways, Electricity, Revenue and Disaster Management departments, besides Metro Rail and Metro Water.

COIMBATORE: Three persons including a woman were arrested for murdering a 55 year old woman and chopping her body into pieces in Salem. The chopped body of Thangamani of Mettupatti Thadanur and working as a maid was found in the overhead water tanks of a house recently at Arisipalayam.

After scrutinising the CCTV footage, police nabbed the accused identified as Nandini, 28, a maid from Sukkampatti, her lover Malik Basha, a driver and her friend Sivaraman, 26. The trio murdered the woman and robbed her four sovereigns of gold jewels, before disposing her body by chopping into pieces.

New Delhi, Sep 2: Climate change, deforestation, unplanned urbanisation and inadequate drainage are creating favourable conditions for mosquitoes and other disease-carrying vectors to spread into newer areas of Northeast India, a parliamentary health panel has warned.

In its report on vector-borne diseases in the northeastern states, the Department-related Parliamentary Standing Committee on Health and Family Welfare highlighted the region's challenging terrain, changing rainfall and temperature patterns, rapid urbanisation and gaps in healthcare access as major factors behind the persistence and geographical expansion of such diseases.

The report noted a significant rise in dengue cases across the Northeast. Reported cases increased from 142 in 2014 to 19,761 in 2023, before declining to 7,186

in 2024. The region recorded 1,524 cases up to August 2025, with the panel noting that this was a partial-year figure and therefore not directly comparable with full-year data. Chikungunya cases also increased from 3,493 in 2023 to 3,991 in 2024, marking a rise of around 14.3%.

The panel said dengue and chikungunya are becoming increasingly urban health concerns, with factors such as rapid urbanisation, water-storage practices, poor waste management, climate change and population movement contributing to their spread.

Sikkim recorded the highest dengue incidence among the northeastern states in 2024, with 374 cases. Based on the state's revised population estimate, the incidence stood at 57.9 cases per lakh population. The state also reported 1,863 chikungunya cases, translating into an incidence of 291.2 cases per lakh.

Malaria, meanwhile, has

shown a more encouraging trend nationally, although challenges remain in parts of the Northeast. The number of districts across India with an Annual Parasite Index above one declined from 155 in 2015 to 37 in 2024. In the Northeast, 16 districts in Arunachal Pradesh and six in Nagaland have reported zero indigenous malaria cases for three consecutive years.

Japanese encephalitis continues to remain a concern, particularly in Assam and other northeastern states. The region recorded 885 cases in 2024, compared to 709 in 2023. At the national level, the fatality rate from Japanese encephalitis declined substantially from 17.6% in 2014 to 7.1% in 2024.

The parliamentary panel recommended strengthening real-time disease surveillance through a dedicated Northeast vector-borne disease portal and introducing AI-based early-warning systems to identify and predict potential disease hotspots.

It also called for mobile health units, pre-monsoon health camps, rapid-response teams, stronger laboratory facilities and dedicated NESIDS funding for high-risk areas. The committee recommended disease-specific treatment protocols for severe dengue and other complications, besides establishing a Regional Entomology Training Hub and making greater use of climate modelling and digital disease reporting.

The panel also flagged gaps in the existing disease surveillance system, noting that vector-borne disease data are not separately collected for tribal, rural and urban populations. It recommended collecting such data separately to enable more targeted prevention and control measures across the region.

All international and national health organizations, including the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Trusted Source, agree that it is important to get vaccinated against the flu on a yearly basis, typically in the autumn and winter season, to prevent not just getting ill due to infection with the influenza virus, but also potential serious complications that may arise from getting the flu. Flu shots are both safe and effective, but some people may still worry about potential side effects. The most common side effects are mild and do not last very long, and they can include low grade fever, headache, muscle aches, and nausea. These side effects are expected, and they are often a sign that the vaccine is working — it is teaching the body's immune system to fight the influenza virus, which can result in these mild and temporary inflammatory responses.

Other people might worry about feeling faint during vaccination — this can be due to anxiety around needles or about vac-

“To help prevent dizziness or lightheadedness, stay well-hydrated and eat a light, balanced snack before a flu shot,” she advised. “As a genetic engineer, I often look at how nutrition can support our immune system at a cellular level, particularly around vaccination. While food and drink cannot change the efficacy of the flu jab itself, certain choices may help the body respond more smoothly and ease common side effects,” Ünliü clarified.

She also emphasized the importance of stabilizing blood sugar levels before getting vaccinated, “particularly for those who may feel lightheaded or anxious about needles.”

Like Routhenstein, Ünliü recommended a protein- and complex carb-rich snack pre-flu jab, suggesting yogurt with oats or wholegrain toast. She also cautioned that “even mild dehydration can increase feelings of dizziness,” recommending drinking “water or an electrolyte-rich drink [as] a simple preventive measure.”

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What should you eat after a flu shot, and why?

Rolt told us that when it comes to what to eat and drink after a flu shot, it is important to have a balanced meal filled with an array of nutrients. "After receiving a flu vaccine, the immune system initiates an inflammatory response to process the vaccine antigens, followed by the formation of antibodies by B cells to provide protection against the virus," she explained.

"This process involves oxidative stress and inflammation as part of immune activation and memory cell development, which are essential for effective immunity but can also temporarily challenge the body's balance," the nutritional therapist detailed. "A balanced meal that would include all of these nutrients would be a chicken broth rich in easily digestible protein, garlic, onions, carrots, bok choy or broccoli, or any other leafy greens, and mushrooms (a great

source of beta-glucans), paired with berry-based drinks like cranberry or sea buckthorn tea with manuka honey, providing vitamin C and polyphenols to modulate inflammation and oxidative stress,” Rolt suggested.

According to Rolt, “this combination helps support the immune system’s recovery, reduces potential side effects and optimises the body’s response to the flu shot.”

In addition, Ülülür also recommended “turmeric and oily fish high in omega-3,” which help moderate inflammation without blunting the immune system’s adaptive response. “A diet with sufficient protein, such as lean meats, legumes, or tofu, also provides the amino acids necessary for antibody production,” she added.

Furthermore, while hydration is crucial before getting vaccinated, it is equally important after vaccination. “Staying hydrated is another important consideration as optimal blood circulation, as it helps the efficient delivery of nutrients and immune cells required for an effective vaccine response,” Rohl explained. “Hydration may also reduce the severity of side effects such as headache, fatigue, and muscle soreness while helping the body to regulate temperature,” she added. “Water, herbal teas, or broths can assist the body in regulating temperature and managing mild post-vaccine symptoms,” said Ünümlüer. Is there a diet you should maintain throughout the flu season?

Why 'Free Coaching'
Sounds Good But
Seldom Works

Prime Minister Narendra Modi, in his Independence Day address from the Red Fort, announced that the government would provide free online coaching to students preparing for competitive examinations. The programme, according to the Prime Minister, would use India's digital public infrastructure and teaching talent, reduce the financial burden on families and allow students to prepare while staying at home.

The concerns that the announcement seeks to address are real. The cost of coaching has increased, students routinely move to coaching hubs, and many parents believe that not enrolling their child in a coaching institute puts them at a disadvantage. However, while free online coaching sounds promising, its ability to deliver what conventional coaching does remains questionable.

THE COACHING INDUSTRY

The private coaching industry in India has grown rapidly over the last two decades. It is a parallel education system, specialising in entrance examinations for medicine, engineering, management, government services and several other careers. A study on the growth of the coaching business in India pointed out that it has grown enough to cast a shadow on the formal education system.

India's private coaching and test-preparation industry is estimated at roughly Rs 58,000 to Rs 1,00,000 crore, growing at a compound annual growth rate (CAGR) of 10% to 14%, with online and hybrid coaching segments surging even faster at over 15%. The latest Comprehensive Modular Survey on Education in 2025 found that nearly a third of all Indian students had taken private coaching during the academic year. The proportion was 30.7% in urban areas and 25.5% in rural India. At the higher-secondary level, urban households spent an average of Rs 9,950 per student annually on private coaching, compared with Rs 4,548 in rural areas. However, free online coaching by the government is not exactly a new idea. The PM eVIDYA platform already provides IITPAL lectures prepared by IIT professors for JEE and NEET. The National Testing Agency's E-Abhyas offers test practice. SATHEE, developed by the Ministry of Education and IIT Kanpur, provides free preparation for JEE, NEET, CUET, and other examinations, and reportedly has over 15 lakh registered learners. There are also separate free or subsidised coaching schemes for Scheduled Castes, Other Backward Classes, De-notified Tribes and other disadvantaged groups. Thus, the government does not lack platforms or content. What is not very clear is how many students use these programmes regularly, complete them, and eventually succeed in the examinations.

Is Online Coaching Enough?

Coaching is not merely about lectures. A well-designed coaching programme involves a tight schedule, regular tests, doubt-clearing sessions, analysis of student performance, remedial inputs, and continuous follow-up. The better programmes also help students develop examination strategies and ensure that those falling behind are identified early.

China's Quiet Power Grab
Is Hiding In Plain Sight

This time around, the meeting of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) is going to be viewed rather differently. Earlier, hardly anyone noticed its somewhat lengthy and verbose statements. This time, however, every foreign correspondent worth his salt is going to be glued to its every move, every handshake, and body language. And that is not just because of the Iran war, or the Ukrainian escalation, though those things are important. It is that Chinese President Xi Jinping is to arrive in Washington at the end of this month, after his visit to India. The equations built before that, in India, Egypt, and the massive SCO meeting, will matter in how the meeting with US President Donald Trump turns out. And that, in turn, will feed back into how everyone else weighs their options. It is like a series of jigsaw puzzle pieces falling into place, in unpredictable ways.

■ **AN ECONOMIC MAZE, WITH ONE ANCHOR**

First, the SCO itself. It is all very impressive upfront. Some 20-plus countries are meeting at the summit, which includes not just the member states - Russia, China, Belarus, India, Iran, Pakistan, and four Central Asian states of Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, and Uzbekistan - but also some 15 dialogue partners or observers; after last year's Tianjin summit, all have been converted to 'Partners'. That list includes Saudi Arabia, Turkey, and the UAE, among others. Three aspects are common among all members, and, increasingly, the 'Partners'. All are neighbours of China, and for



all, it is their biggest trading partner. That means this is a huge Chinese-dominated economic maze. The third is that almost all are also operating Chinese equipment - with Uzbekistan recently opting to buy J-10 CE fighter jets - adding to an existing roster of Chinese-made weaponry. Notably, this buy replaces ageing Soviet-era weaponry. Russian equipment is nowhere to be seen, as it struggles with replacing its own inventory. In short, China is the top dog in this grouping, and everyone knows it.

■ **'AND SO WHAT?'**

The question is what it does about it. For that, a disaggregation of the Bishkek Declaration, which oddly, is available so far only in Russian, is indicative, even if the text itself meanders on about multiple issues - this being a consensus document.

The text stresses the desirability of strengthening the UN, concedes with Iran, swears to help Afghanistan stabilise, and, rather surprisingly, comes down heavily on cross-border terrorism and drug trafficking. But if the existing cooperation on terrorism through the SCO centre for the purpose - the Regional Anti Terrorism Structure (RATS) - is any guide, it won't deliver much.

Even so, Beijing seems serious. It faces a massive drug misuse problem among its teens and has cracked some 12,000 cases so far in 2026. And - surprise! - it also cooperates closely with the US for interdiction. That means it is serious. It has also extended the list of precursors. Indian pharma companies had better watch out. A lot of those vital chemicals, deliberately or otherwise, are going from here. But look at not just the

Declaration but also 28 other documents signed, and a pattern emerges. The main document stresses connectivity, thus enhancing the movement of Chinese goods well beyond its borders. Then consider President Xi's speech. A key sentence is that it welcomes all "to take an active part in the 'Big Market for All: Export to China' event series to seize the opportunities to China's super-sized market". That's the exact opposite of what the US is doing. But dig a little deeper, and you'll find that it's not that easy to export to China. In fact, an advisory from the Indian embassy warns of fraud and cheats, quite apart from high tariff barriers. No, China has no intention of doing the SCO members any favours. Quite the reverse. Look also among the welter of mundane documents at an 'Action Plan (Roadmap) for the Development of Ports and

Logistics Centers 2026-2030', and a 'Concept for the Establishment of Regional Data Processing Centers, Computing Capacities and the Development of the Artificial Intelligence Industry within the SCO'. Guess where those ports are going to be and whom they are likely to benefit. Pakistan will certainly see a boost in its already rapidly rising port capacities following the complete breakdown of Chabahar and other Iranian ports. And yes, the race for hugely environmentally damaging and power-hungry data centres has begun in the SCO as well, with the poorest countries likely to be targeted to expend their resources. In short, China is not very different from the exploitative US companies that look for foreign shores, including India, when they feel hemmed in by environmental laws of their own coun-

tries.

■ **WHAT THE SCO HAS AND HASN'T DONE**

Now consider the SCO for what it has actually done to deal with the multiple crises that it outlines. On the face of it, it seems China has done nothing to help Iran in its corrosive war with the US. But then, a US force battering itself against the Iranians suits Beijing very well. Not only does it leave it free to exercise its 'rights' in Taiwan, but it also gives it an image of being the less destructive power. In fact, that's the central message in Bishkek. In addition, it has managed to play Washington so well that its own oil shipments were earlier exempt from sanctions, while India was arm-twisted. There is also the mystery of how a battered Iran continues to produce drones, missiles, and all its sub-components.

Bayern Munich Academy Chief Lays Down Football Roadmap For India: "Don't Repeat China Mistake"

India has long searched for the right formula to develop football at the grass-roots and youth levels. While various academies, leagues, foreign partnerships, and pathway programmes have been introduced over the years, consistency remains a significant hurdle. During a recent visit to Germany, NDTV explored the world-renowned academy of the country's premier football club, Bayern Munich. In an exclusive 3-part interview, Bayern Campus Director Jochen Sauer outlined the blueprint for building a successful football system from the ground up. While acknowledging that he does not possess in-depth knowledge of Indian football, Sauer highlighted that the country already holds a crucial ingredient: a genuine appetite for sport. According to Sauer, the greater challenges lie in establishing a clear development structure, educating high-calibre coaches, and, crucially, giving a long-term strategy sufficient time to bear fruit. He also stressed that India must focus on the fundamentals by ensuring aspiring youngsters receive ample opportunities simply to play the game. During the chat with NDTV, Sauer also pointed out his experience of working with China, where the constant changes in strategy, youth development system, structure and approach continued to derail the country's football aspirations. He warned India against repeating such mistakes and urged the country's football administration to stick to a 10-year project with a uniform system in place. Q. What are the biggest lessons a country like India can learn from the Bayern Campus? Jochen Sauer: It is difficult for me to answer because I am not too involved in the details of Indian football. But what I believe is that Indian people are very dedicated to sport in general, and that already helps. India is also a country that has grown very quickly over the last decades. If you are trying to take a sport to the highest level, the most important thing is structure. A country has to think about what the struc-



ture of football should be. What is the league system? What is the youth system? How can we get the best talents competing against each other at the highest level? That is most important ingredient is finding a structure. Q. How important is consistency in that structure? Jochen Sauer: You have to have a clear plan and follow it for at least 10 years. I have some experience from when we opened or cooperated with two or three academies in China. The ongoing discussion there was always about changing the strategy, having a youth system, then not having a youth system, linking academies to top clubs, then linking them to universities and going back and forth. I think that is the biggest mistake you can make. You have to have a structure, have a clear plan, and follow the plan for at least 10 years. Youth development always needs time. Q. Can you give an example from Bayern itself? Jochen Sauer: Uli Hoeness (Supervisory board member at Bayern Munich) already asked the question after two years of the Campus: "Where are the top talents?" I told him, "Uli, ask me in five years." We were talking about 11- and 12-year-old kids. If you want to know how good they are, ask me in five years, when they are 17 or 18, and then I can answer the question. It is similar for a country. If you want to

build something, have a strategy, have a plan, and stick to it for at least 10 years. Then you can see whether it works and think about changing things. Q. If India were starting from a blank slate, what should be the biggest priority? Jochen Sauer: For sure, it is working with the youngest players. Working with the youngest means they need to learn about playing football. You can see it with young players from Africa. They go to school, but as soon as they have a ball at their feet, they play with it. Sometimes the focus is too much on having a structure in an academy, developing players physically, focusing on athletics, and so on. I think that is completely wrong. The game is a game. The game is played with the ball. You need to give those kids the ball. As soon as they can train with the ball, they are lucky, happy, and having fun. That is the most important thing: trying to play the game. Bayern Munich On Working With Indian Talent: Over the years, Bayern have worked with talented footballers from India. Some have even been included in their world squad, with Aryan Bose being the most recent example. He was added to the Bayern World squad in June 2026. Sauer feels young footballers in India are way more talented now than they were 10-15 years ago.

URBAN FLOODING: RAIN WOES OR PLANNING FAILURE?

Indian cities seem to repeat the same story every monsoon—a few hours of heavy rain, waterlogging on roads, vehicles stuck in traffic jams, flooded underpasses, water entering homes and shops, and the administration scrambling for relief and evacuation efforts. Rapidly developing metropolitan areas like Delhi-NCR and Gurugram are examples of this. The question is, are floods in these cities solely the result of excessive rainfall? The answer is no. Urban flooding is a crisis born out of the interaction of natural rainfall and human disruption. While changing weather has certainly increased the risk, poor urban planning and weak governance have exacerbated the situation. Urban flooding occurs when rainwater exceeds the city's drainage, groundwater infiltration, and natural or artificial water storage capacity. In rural areas, water has the space to spread and seep into the ground through fields, ponds, and natural channels, but increasing concretization in cities blocks natural waterways. As a result, even heavy rainfall over a short period can cause widespread waterlogging. The primary reason for Indian cities becoming flood-prone is changing rainfall patterns. Climate change is increasing the frequency of heavy rainfall over short periods of time in many areas. Drainage systems designed based on historical rainfall averages are unable to handle such intense rainfall. The intense monsoon

rains in Delhi-NCR are a case in point. The problem isn't just the total amount of rainfall, but also the excessive concentration of rainfall over a short period of time. Another major reason is rapid concretization. Cities like Gurugram have seen rapid expansion of residential colonies, high-rise buildings, commercial complexes, and roads over the past few decades. Ground that previously absorbed rainwater is now covered with cement and asphalt. This reduces groundwater recharge and increases surface runoff. When large amounts of water flow simultaneously to roads and drains, the drainage system quickly fails. Encroachment on natural drains and waterways also exacerbates urban flooding. Urban development often ignores the fact that every watercourse has its own natural flow area. Narrowing drains, covering them, or building on their banks obstructs water flow. Similarly, the disappearance of ponds, lakes, and wetlands robs cities of their natural water storage areas. The degradation of wetlands and water bodies in Delhi-NCR points to this problem. Weak and unorganized stormwater drainage systems further exacerbate the problem. In many cities, the capacity of drains has not been increased to meet local needs and current rainfall conditions. In many places, sewer and stormwater drainage systems are interconnected, causing both systems to be overwhelmed during heavy rains. Furthermore, plastic and

other solid waste clogs drains. This means that as much as rain is a major problem, so too is the waste we ourselves dump into the drainage system. Therefore, it's not appropriate to consider urban flooding solely as a natural disaster. It's also a failure of governance. In cities, responsibilities for roads, building construction, drainage, land use, environment, and disaster management are often divided among different agencies. When an area becomes waterlogged, assigning responsibility becomes difficult. Lack of coordination leads to one department building a road, another constructing a drain, and a third granting land use permission, but planning doesn't consider the entire catchment area as a single unit. Flood risk and catchment areas are not adequately addressed in urban master plans. Despite existing regulations governing construction in low-lying areas, floodplains, and around water bodies, they are not effectively enforced. Unauthorized construction and encroachment gradually destroy natural waterways. Pre-disaster risk reduction should be a priority, rather than focusing on post-disaster relief and rescue. Building climate-resilient cities requires first considering the city as a natural watershed, not just a collection of buildings and roads. The concept of a "sponge city" can be useful for this. Its aim is to capture, absorb, and reuse rainwater within the city, rather than letting it drain rapidly. Permeable

surfaces, rain gardens, rainwater harvesting, and local water harvesting structures can be developed in parking areas, sidewalks, and other suitable locations. At the same time, "blue-green infrastructure" must be integrated into urban planning. Ponds, lakes, wetlands, rivers, streams, urban forests, and green spaces are not just aesthetically pleasing; they are the city's natural flood-fighting system. Their conservation and restoration help retain water, infiltrate the ground, and regulate temperatures. Stormwater drainage design capacities will also need to be adjusted to account for future climate conditions. Instead of relying on outdated rainfall data, it's essential to incorporate updated climate models and extreme rainfall projections into planning. GIS-based flood-risk maps can be developed to determine which areas should limit construction and where additional water storage capacity needs to be developed. It is also essential to provide local bodies with financial resources, technical expertise, and adequate decision-making power. Each city should develop a comprehensive Urban Flood Risk Management Plan, integrating drainage, land use, water bodies, waste management, and disaster management. Clear accountability should be established between municipal bodies and relevant agencies. Ultimately, extreme rainfall cannot be completely prevented, but it can be significantly reduced from becoming an urban disaster.



Stock markets tumble in early trade on escalating tensions

Mumbai: Stock market benchmark indices Sensex and Nifty slumped in early trade on Wednesday, September 2, tracking a bearish trend in global equities and higher oil prices due to escalating conflict in West Asia. The 30-share BSE Sensex tanked 788.52 points to 76,155.76 in early trade. The 50-share NSE Nifty slumped 269 points to 23,786.80. Among the 30 Sensex firms, InterGlobe Aviation, Eternal, Mahindra & Mahindra, UltraTech Cement, Bajaj Finserv and Bajaj Finance were the major laggards. Adani Ports and Sun Pharma were the winners. Brent crude, the global oil benchmark, traded 0.76 per cent higher at USD 95.37 per barrel. "Indian markets are likely to remain under pressure as surging crude oil prices and rising global bond yields continue to weigh on investor sentiment amid the escalating conflict in the Middle East. While India's resilient



domestic growth outlook provides an underlying cushion, external macroeconomic and geopolitical risks are expected to dominate near-term market direction, keeping the broader outlook cautious," Ponmudi R, CEO of Enrich Money, an online trading and wealth-tech firm, said. Crude oil has emerged as the key near-term risk for domestic equities, he said adding that WTI crude has surged more than 8 per cent over the past two sessions following renewed US-Iran military tensions, reigniting concerns over potential disruptions

to energy supplies from the region. "The escalation of the US-Iran conflict and the consequent 5 per cent spurt in Brent crude overnight to USD 96 is a sentiment negative," V K Vijayakumar, Chief Investment Strategist, Geojit Investments Limited, said. In Asian markets, South Korea's Kospi tumbled over 3 per cent, Japan's Nikkei 225 index dropped nearly 3 per cent. Shanghai's SSE Composite index and Hong Kong's Hang Seng index also traded lower. US markets ended lower on Tuesday.

BESSENT URGES G20 COUNTRIES TO ADOPT TRUMP'S TARIFF PLAYBOOK

Asheville(US): US Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent says he's urging some of his G20 counterparts to take a page from the Trump administration's playbook of using tariffs and other measures to crack down on trade imbalances. Bessent told reporters that he had warned other nations at the beginning of President Donald Trump's second term that the new US "tariff wall" would mean that Chinese goods would flood their markets. "And unfortunately, I was right," Bessent told reporters on the sidelines of the G20 finance minister meetings. "The rest of the world probably needs to take a hard look at what they should be doing to protect their citizens' jobs, their manufacturing base, so that everything they do doesn't get offshored." The Trump administration's tariff policies have been criticised by economists and politicians for raising costs for US consumers and, in many cases,



for punishing allies. The Tax Foundation, an independent think tank, found that the tariffs imposed by the Trump administration throughout 2025 raised the overall retail price of imported consumer goods by roughly 7 per cent relative to pre-tariff trends. Supreme Court rules Trump's tariffs as unconstitutional Ultimately, the US Supreme Court in February decided that the sweeping global tariffs that Trump

imposed under an emergency powers law during his second term in office were unconstitutional. The Trump administration has been overhauling its approach, and is eyeing an additional 7.5 per cent tariff on Chinese imports after investigating alleged Chinese excess industrial capacity and forced-labour regulations. Bessent met with his counterparts from China at the summit, though he did not provide

details of how those talks went. "I often say in our trade discussions with China that we do not want to pull apart from them, but we have to de-risk," Bessent said during a conversation on Tuesday with Fox Business commentator Larry Kudlow, who was a top economic adviser to Trump in his first term. China's trade surplus barrier to economic growth: Bessent "We have more in common with the Chinese on

Iran than we disagree on," Bessent said. "The Chinese agree Iran cannot have a nuclear weapon. The Chinese agree that there should be freedom of navigation in the Strait of Hormuz." Bessent has said China's trade surplus, which reached a record-high USD 1.2 trillion in 2025, is a barrier to global economic growth — as well as what he calls excessive regulation. Meanwhile, global debt has reached a record high of USD 353 trillion, with the US debt reaching a record USD 40 trillion in August. Markets have been concerned about a sell-off in US government bonds, but Bessent told reporters "I don't think we're in any kind of dire situation" on bond markets. "The rest of the world probably needs to take a hard look at what they should be doing to protect their citizens' jobs, their manufacturing base, so that everything they do doesn't get offshored," he said.

HYDERABAD ACCOUNTS FOR 91 PC OF TELANGANA'S GST COLLECTIONS



Hyderabad: The city accounted for more than 91 percent of Telangana's Goods and Services Tax (GST) revenue in August 2026. The city collected Rs 3,956 crore in GST during August 2026 out of Telangana's total collection of Rs 4,341 crore, as per the data from the state commercial taxes department quoted in a Times of India report. Hyderabad GST collections rise 20.5 pc Hyderabad's GST revenue increased by Rs 674 crore in August compared with Rs 3,282 crore collected during the same month in 2025. The increase from Hyderabad alone made up 96.3 per cent of the Rs 700-crore rise recorded in Telangana's GST collections during the month. Between April and August 2026, Hyderabad collected Rs 18,892 crore in GST, up from Rs 15,535

crore during the same period in 2025. City has nearly 4 lakh GST taxpayers Telangana has around 5.8 lakh registered GST taxpayers, of whom approximately 4 lakh are located in Hyderabad. The capital city generated Rs 3,956 crore of the Rs 4,341 crore collected by Telangana in August. The GST collection per taxpayer is higher in Hyderabad, as in August, it was around Rs 98,900. It is Rs 74,845 in the entire Telangana. With a large share of the state's taxpayers and GST revenue concentrated in Hyderabad, efficient tax administration has become important for revenue collection and taxpayer services. The city collected Rs 3,956 crore in GST during August 2026 out of Telangana's total collection of Rs 4,341 crore.

REVISIONS REFLECT DATA UPGRADE: GOVT DEFENDS NEW GDP ESTIMATES

New Delhi: The statistics ministry on Wednesday, September 2, defended the methodology behind its newly released economic growth estimates, saying revisions to last year's GDP and the divergence between different price measures reflect updated data and estimation techniques rather than an attempt to artificially boost headline growth. The clarification came two days after the government released an updated series of annual and quarterly GDP estimates with 2022-23 as the base year, incorporating a new Producer Price Index (PPI), Banking Services Price Index and additional administrative data. The ministry's detailed questions-and-answers addressed concerns ranging from negative implicit price deflators in manufacturing to the sharp difference between nominal and real growth in mining, as well as the sizeable statistical discrepancy between production- and expenditure-side estimates. India's economy grew 7.8 per cent in real



terms in the first quarter of fiscal 2026-27, according to the revised GDP series. The ministry said a negative implicit GVA deflator for manufacturing should not be interpreted as evidence that factory-gate prices declined. Manufacturing GVA in the June quarter was compiled using a double-deflation method, under which output and intermediate consumption are separately adjusted for price changes before real GVA is derived. When input prices rise faster than output prices, nominal GVA can grow more slowly than real GVA, producing a negative implicit deflator even when

both output and input prices are increasing. Manufacturing real GVA grew 9.2 per cent in the quarter compared to nominal growth of 7.7 per cent, resulting in an implicit GVA deflator of minus 1.5 per cent, the ministry said. It cited textiles and cotton spinning, basic metals, and rubber and plastic products among activities where input-price growth exceeded output-price growth. The ministry also pointed to international experience, saying negative or volatile manufacturing deflators can emerge in economies using double deflation during periods of energy and raw-material price shocks.

■ WHY AGRICULTURE PRESENTS DIFFERENT CASE Agriculture presents a different case because quarterly agricultural GVA is first estimated at constant prices using production data, with current-price estimates subsequently derived using the relevant producer-price index. The agriculture, forestry and fishing output PPI rose about 5 per cent in the quarter, resulting in a positive implied inflation rate of 3.9 per cent, the ministry said. It also rejected claims that the Q1 2025-26 current-price GDP estimate was reduced from Rs 86.05 lakh crore to Rs 80 lakh crore to make the latest growth rate appear stronger. The Rs 86.05 lakh crore figure was calculated under the superseded 2011-12 base-year series and was initially published in August 2025. When the government introduced the 2022-23 base-year series in February 2026, the corresponding Q1 estimate was revised to Rs 80.32 lakh crore.

"WORLD LAUGHING AT US":

Pakistan Selector Blames Babar Azam, Explains Mass Sackings

Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) selection committee chief Aaqib Javed finds himself in the line of fire over the decision to remove several players from the squad midway through the England Test series. Javed was at the centre of the PCB decision that saw 7 new players being sent to the United Kingdom ahead of the 3rd and final Test while white-ball coach Mike Hesson was suddenly given the charge of the Test team, replacing Sarfaraz Ahmed. In a conversation with Geo TV, Javed explained what caused the board to spring such big changes all of a sudden. Javed didn't spare Pakistan Test captain Babar Azam or head coach Sarfaraz as he pointed out the factors that led to Pakistan's horror show in England. Javed accused the captain-coach duo of failing to take certain decisions on



the field, prompting the board to step in. They [the management] had a pace all-rounder available, a second wicketkeeper, a fast bowler in Ubaid Shah. But those decisions were not being made. I spoke to the captain [Babar Azam] and coach

and asked them to put Ubaid in because the other bowlers [Mohammad Abbas, Mohammad Ali and Khurram Shahzad] are all similarly paced," Javed said. "No batter in our top seven bowls. We should have included an all-

rounder, but most importantly, get in Ubaid Shah, who bowls close to 140kph. One fast bowler changes the composition of your attack. I understand dropping [Salman] Agha, who's out of form, but you should have played Ghazi Ghorri instead

of [Mohammad] Rizwan [as the wicketkeeper]. When management fails to make tough calls, action has to be taken. We have already lost the series, and the world is laughing at us because we aren't even competing," he added, taking a direct swipe at Babar and Sarfaraz. The PCB has long been accused of meddling in day-to-day affairs on the field. Javed had no qualms in admitting that the board officials step in from time to time, even in cases of playing XI selection, a role usually fulfilled by the coach and the captain. "When decisions aren't aligned with planning, messages are sent to fix the playing XI and balance the combination," he said. When asked about the decision to send 7 new players to England, Javed said that since the series is already lost, there's no harm in trying new players.

LAKSHYA SEN BOWS OUT; KIDAMBI SRIKANTH, TANVI SHARMA PROGRESS IN CHINA MASTERS

Lakshya Sen was knocked out of the China Masters after a listless performance in the opening round but Kidambi Srikanth and Tanvi Sharma registered straight-game wins to progress to the second round of men's and women's singles competition here on Wednesday. Lakshya, a 2021 world championships bronze-medallist, played an error-riddled game to go down 14-21 7-21 in 38 minutes to world No. 9 Canada's Victor Lai, who won his second bronze medal at the World Championships last month. It was Lakshya's third defeat to the Canadian with his only win being at the All England Championships in March this year. Srikanth, a 2021 world championships silver-medallist, however, progressed after beating Chinese Taipei's Chi Yu Jen 21-16 21-15 in another men's singles opener. The former World No. 1 Indian, who reached the US Open final this year, will face Lai next. Tanvi, who won her maiden



BWF World Tour title at the Taipei Open last month, defeated Denmark's Amalie Schulz 21-16 21-17 to also advance to the women's singles second round. The 17-year-old from Punjab, a bronze medallist at the Junior World Championships in Guwahati last year, will face Japan's Tomoka Miyazaki next. Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty, a two-time world championships bronze winner, also moved to the next round with a 21-11 21-16 win over Malaysia's Junaiddi Arif and Kang Khai Xing. The Asian Games gold medallist pair will next take on the

Popov brothers - Christo and Toma Junior - of France. India's mixed doubles pair of Dhruv Kapila and Tanisha Crasto too entered the next round after defeating Thailand's Tonnakorn Saeheng and Tonnicha Saeheng 21-8 21-9. The duo will meet Chinese Taipei's Liu Kuang Heng and Hsu Yin-Hui next. However, Devika Sihag went down 18-21 15-21 to Bulgaria's Kaloyana Nalbantova to end her campaign. Mixed doubles pair of Rohan Kapoor and Ruthvika Gadde also couldn't cross the opening hurdle, losing 16-21 18-21 to Chinese Taipei's Wu Guan Xun and Lee Chia Hsin.

English Premier League clubs flexed their financial muscle once again on deadline day, spending a mind-boggling USD 4.7 billion on players over the summer. Manchester City matched the all-time British transfer record to sign Argentina midfielder Enzo Fernandez from Chelsea for a fee of 125 million pounds (USD 169 million) in the final hours of the transfer window. Chelsea and Tottenham also spent well over USD 400 million in the summer transfer window, proving why England is in a league of its own compared to other top leagues in Europe when it comes to financial pull. In comparison to England, the combined expenditure of



Europe's remaining top five leagues like Spain, Germany, France, and Italy reached a cumulative sum of USD 3.8 billion spent over the summer. The fee for Fernandez is a joint British record,

equalling the amount Liverpool paid last year for Alexander Isak. They are tied in fourth place on the all-time list of the most expensive football players, behind Neymar (Barcelona to PSG for 222

million euros), Kylian Mbappe (Monaco to PSG for 180 million euros), and Ousmane Dembele (Borussia Dortmund to Barcelona for 148 million euros), according to Transfermarkt

A report has now explained the new approach the BCCI has adopted over players' selection amid recent criticism of its handling of injured players. The last few months have seen the BCCI Centre of Excellence (CoE) coming in the line of fire over poor management of

Rs 446 crore). A frantic final two days of the window, which closed at 2200 GMT on Tuesday, pushed spending in the summer window significantly beyond last season's record of GBP 3.14 billion. More than half of the clubs in the English top flight broke their transfer records, with multiple deals topping GBP 100 million. Chelsea midfielder Fernandez, 25, signed for Enzo Marsca's City late Tuesday for GBP 125 million, matching the British record fee Liverpool paid 12 months ago for forward Alexander Isak. Argentina's Fernandez will be part of a

new-look City midfield alongside England's Elliot Anderson, who arrived from Nottingham Forest shortly after the World Cup for GBP 116 million. City also snapped up Senegal forward Iliman Ndiaye from Everton on Tuesday in a deal worth GBP 65 million, taking their summer spending above GBP 450 million. The club are embarking on a new era with a significantly reshaped squad following the departure of manager Pep Guardiola, who oversaw a decade of unprecedented success at the Etihad. Former Ballon d'Or winner Rodri, who captained Spain to World Cup glory in July, has joined Barcelona while long-serving pair Bernardo Silva and John Stones have also left City. "At Manchester City, we are always looking to bring in world-class players and Enzo fits the bill.

Gujarat Titans Star Makes Big Revelation On Shubman Gill's Captaincy Skills

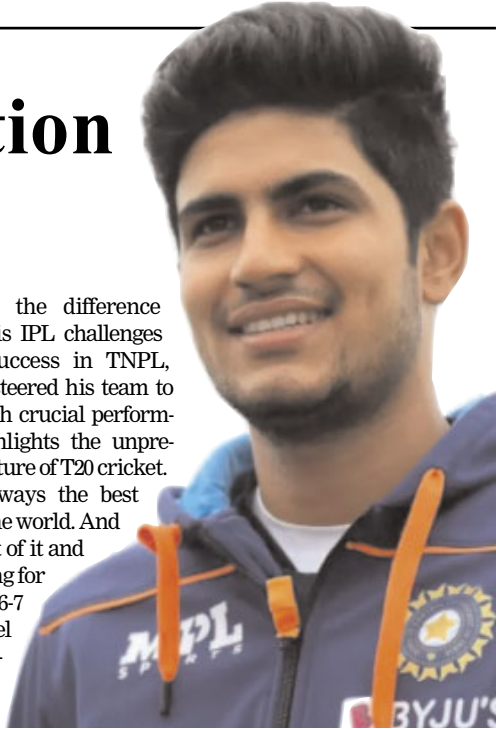

-My character is very entertaining. He has debts to everyone. No one in the village trusts him. He is a character that everyone thinks is a bit negative. He faces a lot of difficulties.

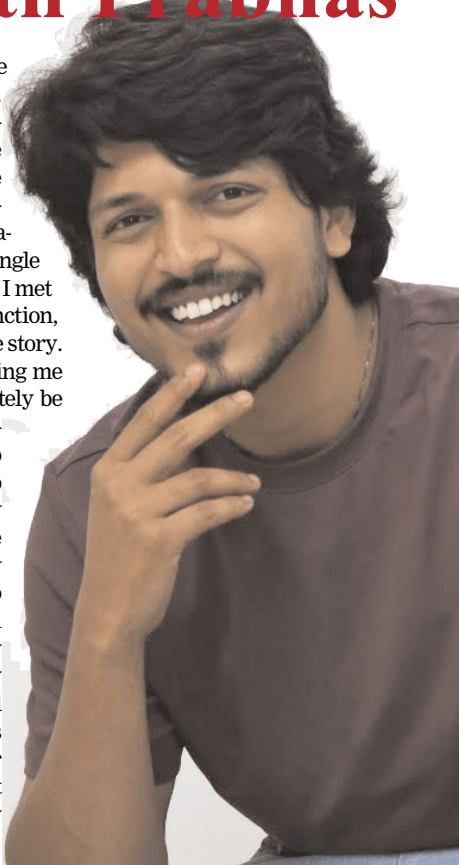
"ROMANCHAKAM" IS A FRESH LOVE STORY;
